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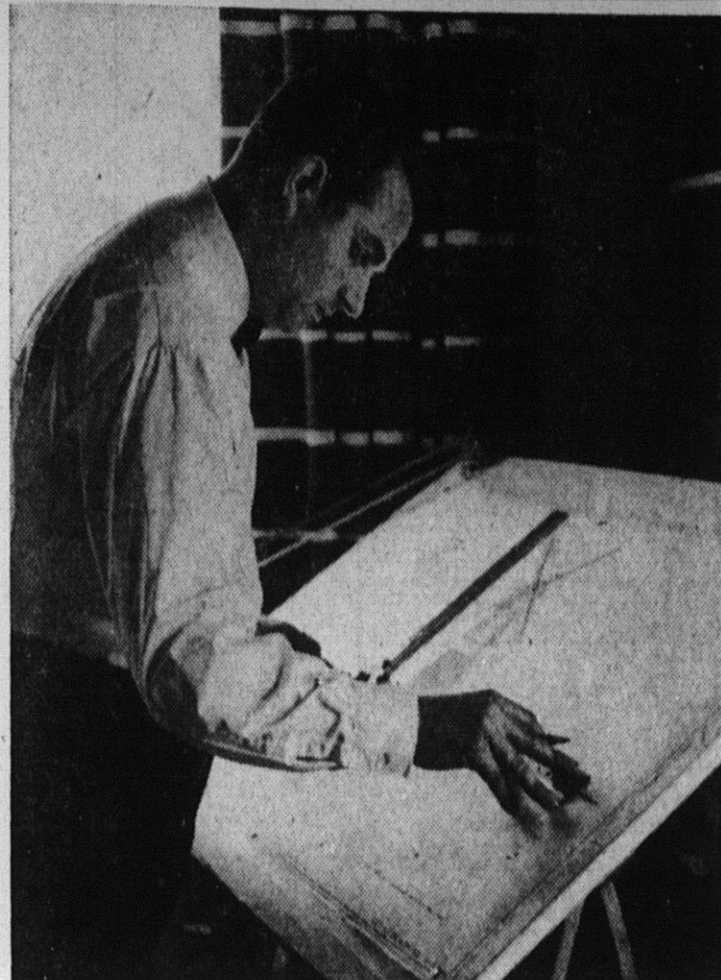

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COMING TO HOLLAND — A. J. de Koning, Dutch architect who is an expert on restoration of windmills, will arrive in Holland Saturday night to spend two weeks here studying sites and other data relative to moving a windmill here from the Netherlands. Windmill Expert Arriving Here

"Project Windmill," Holland's plan to import a windmill from The Netherlands, will receive new impetus with the arrival of A. J. de Koning, a Dutch architect and expert on restoration of windmills.

De Koning, who will spend about two weeks in Holland, is arriving at Detroit Metropolitan Airport at 2:20 p.m. Friday and will be greeted by Mayor Nelson Bosman, City Manager Herb Holt, and Carter Brown and Henry S. Maentz of the mayor's committee on windmills.

Willard C. Wichers, midwestern director of the Netherlands Information Bureau, will join the group in the evening, and the following day will take de Koning and others remaining overnight on a tour of Greenfield Village, Wayne University, the new downtown development (urban renewal) and perhaps a shopping center. The group will arrive in Holland Saturday night.

On Monday, de Koning will start his study of possible sites for a windmill in Holland, continuing this study Tuesday and Wednesday. He will be taken about the area by Park Supt. Jacob De Graaf and various committee members, and will study elevations, wind velocity and direction, and other aspects leading to selection of a site to put the windmill in an advantageous position.

This study also will include costs, materials, contractors, and many other factors. Some of the larger Dutch mills are seven stories high with a wingspread of 60 feet, equivalent to six stories.

As yet, no estimate of costs has been advanced, although Wichers learned during his visit to The Netherlands last May that a restoration price tag there runs about 100,000 guilders or \$23,000. This does not take into consideration the initial cost of the mill or transportation costs. No program has been adopted for raising the necessary funds, although popular subscription has often been mentioned.

De Koning will be officially welcomed at a dinner Monday night given by the mayor and City Council.

Carter Brown, chairman of the special Windmill committee, has often expressed the hope that the new windmill would be a grain mill which would allow townfolk and visitors to see such a mill in operation, and perhaps buy flour or meal on the side.

So that de Koning might have a full picture of the history and culture of this area, Wichers plans to take him on a tour of Northern Michigan later next week, visiting Fort Michilimackinac at Mackinaw City as well as Mackinac Island to see the restored tower there as well as other places of historic interest. A visit to the locks at Sault Ste. Marie also is scheduled. A visit to Chicago will be made later.

A civic barbecue at which de Koning will meet the people of Holland is planned Tuesday, July 24, at Civic Center. The Legion band concert will be moved from Kollen Park to Civic Center parking lot that night. The Holland Junior Chamber of Commerce is promoting the chicken barbecue in which all tickets must be sold in advance.

There will be no planned program, but motion pictures of windmills in The Netherlands and slides will be shown inside Civic Center.

Before de Koning leaves for The Netherlands that weekend, he is expected to make some recommendation on a site for a windmill here in a setting which, of course, would allow for plenty of tulip plantings.

Wichers expects to return to The Netherlands in August and will pursue and expedite plans for a mill.

Grand Haven Woman Dies In Accident

GRAND HAVEN — One person was killed and three others injured, one critically, in a two-car head-on collision at 9:30 p.m. Monday on M-50 near 96th Ave. in Robinson Township.

Mrs. Ronald Hagstrom, 26, of 1549 Penoyer Ave., driver of one of the cars, was dead on arrival at Municipal Hospital while Mrs. William Byl, 21, of 15913 Lake Ave., passenger in the Hagstrom car, is in serious condition in Hackley Hospital in Muskegon, State Police said.

Driver of the second auto was Maynard De Garmo, 25, a corporal in the U. S. Marine Corps stationed at Cherry Point, N.C., and presently home on leave. De Garmo and his passenger, Robert De Verno, 21, of route 2, both were treated in Grand Haven Municipal Hospital for minor cuts and bruises.

Prosecuting Attorney James W. Bussard, after conferring with State Police, authorized issuance of a warrant out of Grand Haven Municipal Court charging De Garmo with negligent homicide. Bussard is also seeking release from the commanding officer at Cherry Point for jurisdiction here.

De Garmo was headed west and the Hagstrom car east when the accident happened in the east-bound lane of traffic, police said. The husbands of Mrs. Hagstrom and Mrs. Byl, both of whom were with the National Guards at Camp Grayling, arrived in Grand Haven today.

Mrs. Hagstrom, the former Rose Marie Cuti, was graduated from Grand Haven High School in 1954 and was married to Mr. Hagstrom in 1955.

Surviving besides the husband are a son, Steven, 6; a daughter, Katherine, 4; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Cuti of Grand Haven; two brothers, Richard Cuti of Spring Lake and Michael Cuti of Grand Haven.

Rozema Funeral Planned Saturday

Funeral services for Harry Rozema, 69, of 61 North River Ave., will be held Saturday at 2 p.m. in the Calvary Christian Reformed Church with the Rev. Alfred Walcott officiating. Burial will be in Pilgrim Home Cemetery.

Mr. Rozema died Wednesday morning when he fell from a 10th story window of the Randolph Hotel in downtown Milwaukee, Wis.

Surviving are two sons, Arnold and Wayne, both of Holland; two daughters, Mrs. William Kesom of San Diego, Calif., and Mrs. Charles Brinklow of Holland; 10 grandchildren; a sister, Miss Grace Rozema of Holland.

Mr. Rozema was a veteran of World War I and a member of the Henry Walters Post No. 2144 of the V. F. W.

Pipeline Will Cross Lake Macatawa

Details of a proposed submarine pipeline for petroleum products across Lake Macatawa have been disclosed in an official notice of the U. S. Army Engineer district, Detroit Corps of Engineers, which has scheduled a public hearing July 24 at 4:30 p.m. to hear any objections based on reasons affecting navigation.

The Wolverine Pipe Line Co. of Indianapolis, Ind., has applied for a federal permit to place an eight-inch submarine pipeline across Lake Macatawa from the foot of Graafschap Rd. northward to Division Ave. or 144th Ave. on the north shore.

Plans call for a minimum burial depth of 30 feet below international Great Lakes datum elevation 576.8 feet above mean level at Fairport Point, Quebec, Canada for the limits of the navigable channel, and for all other areas of the reach to be crossed by a minimum burial depth of five feet below the existing lakebed.

The pipeline would be laid in the general vicinity of Graafschap Rd. to the Texas Co. storage tanks and then north across Lake Macatawa.

City Council tabled the request to cross city streets until next meeting. Grand Haven City Council Monday night granted permission for laying the pipeline in that area. The proposed pipeline, which is a secondary line from one running from Chicago to Niles and Jackson, would terminate at storage tanks in Ferrysburg.

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Benton Harbor Man Loses Control of Car

Russell T. Haynes, 43, of Benton Harbor, was listed in good condition at Holland Hospital Wednesday following his car accident Tuesday afternoon on Felch St. at the US-31 intersection.

According to the Ottawa County Sheriff's Department, Haynes was going east on Felch St. at a high rate of speed. In attempting to pass a semi-truck he apparently lost control of his car, which traveled across the median on US-31 for 610 feet before ending up on its top.

Haynes reportedly is suffering from fractured ribs and other possible injuries. Sheriff's officers say he is being charged with driving on a revoked driver's license and also driving while under the influence of intoxicants. His car was totally demolished.

Marine Stands Mute On Homicide Charge

GRAND HAVEN — Maynard De Garmo, 25, of route 2, Grand Haven, a corporal in the U. S. Marine Corps stationed at Cherry Point, N. C., stood mute when arraigned in Grand Haven Municipal Court Wednesday on a charge of negligent homicide.

The court ordered that a preliminary examination be held on July 19 at 1:30 p.m. He is being held without bond.

The charge is the result of an accident on M-50 Monday night when Mrs. Ronald Hagstrom, 26, of Grand Haven, was fatally injured when the car she was driving collided with a car driven by De Garmo.

Farm Tractor Kills Child

ALLENDALE — A two-year-old Allendale child was killed Wednesday when he was run over by a farm tractor driven by his father at their farm near Allendale at 9 a.m.

Mark Allen Vander West, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Vander West, of 8633 Warner St., was pronounced dead on arrival at Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids. Medical examiner was Dr. James Humphrey of Grand Rapids.

Ottawa County Sheriff Bernard Grysen said the youngster had been playing in front of the tractor at his home. His father had failed to see the tot when he started the tractor, Grysen said. The front wheels of the tractor ran over the boy's head.

The Vander West farm is located about a mile north of Allendale.

Holland Man Hurt in Crash

TRAVERSE CITY — A Holland man, injured in an auto accident near here Monday night, remained in serious condition Wednesday at James Decker Munson Hospital. Jake Steigenza, 47, of 97 West Lakewood Blvd., Holland, suffered a fractured leg, fractured ribs and possible internal injuries when his car left US-31 and rolled over.

Troopers at the Traverse City state police post said the accident occurred on US-31, six miles east of Honor, at 10:50 p.m. Monday. Steigenza was headed west on US-31. His car ran off the right side of the road and skidded sideways for about 200 feet before rolling for another 77 feet. Steigenza was thrown from the vehicle, troopers said.

State police have been unable to talk to Steigenza, but they said a second vehicle may have been indirectly involved in the crash. They said Steigenza was headed from Traverse City to Crystal Lake, near Beulah, where he was vacationing when the accident occurred. Steigenza was alone in the auto at the time of the mishap.

Red Cross Studies Blood Affiliation

The executive committee of the Ottawa County Red Cross Chapter will recommend to the board of directors at a forthcoming meeting that Ottawa County go into partnership with the Muskegon chapter in the blood program. The new arrangement, designed to serve the entire county instead of the Holland-Zeeland area which constitutes about a third of the county, would result in a greater efficiency and in generally reduced operational costs. A partnership would eliminate the necessity in Holland of full time professional help required for regional blood banks under the national Institute of Health.

Under the new program, the Muskegon chapter would send its mobile unit periodically not only to Holland but to other points in the county eliminating to a great degree transportation difficulties for donors. The mobile unit carries supplies (cots, etc.) and clinics are set up in almost any area providing 1,500 square feet of floor space.

This arrangement would allow clinics to be set up in industrial plants as well as outlying villages. The mobile unit and its staff usually operate on a six-hour day, allowing greater latitude in scheduling donors who previously had reported to Holland clinics between 5 and 7 p.m. From 125 to 150 donors could be handled at a six-hour clinic.

The local recruitment program would operate much the same as before, and local hospitals on occasion might continue to call for emergency donors for rare blood types.

The main difference in the new program would be that all blood would be processed by the Muskegon center and requisitioned to participating hospitals.

Dr. Otto van der Velde, medical director of the Holland Community Blood Bank since its inception more than a decade ago, has recommended affiliation with Muskegon, following a thorough study.

Decision to recommend affiliation was made at a meeting Tuesday night of the Red Cross executive committee and representatives of Grand Haven and Holland Hospitals. Miss Corinne Otto, field representative for the American Red Cross, also was present.

Approval of the County Medical Association, participating hospitals and the county health department also is necessary before the affiliation is effected. It is believed September would be the earliest that the new partnership could function.

Under the new arrangement, the local chapter would be responsible for donors, providing a center, volunteers and general promotion. The Muskegon Regional Blood Center would provide equipment, staff (registered nurses draw the blood), processing and distribution.

Ottawa Fair To Add Seats

Additional seating on the track in front of the stage for the Brenda Lee Show at the Ottawa County Fair opening night, July 31, was approved Tuesday night at a meeting of the Fair Board.

The added bleachers will provide 2,000 added seats and will push the capacity for the 7 and 9 p.m. shows to 4,500. Fair manager Cliff Steketee said.

Sheriff Bernard Grysen met with the group and plans for traffic control and grounds protection were outlined. Owen Fransens, representing the 4-H participation in the fair, said the 4-H exhibits would be the "largest in the four-year history of the fair."

Wednesday, Aug. 1, will be Children's Day and a free 4-H horse show will be staged at 2 p.m. Clubs from Coopersville, West Ottawa, Grand Valley and Jenison will participate. Keith Avery will be the judge.

Children will also receive rides on Bert Remink's steam tractor Wednesday. The Michigan Christmas Tree Association will have an exhibit at the fair this year.

A livestock parade will be held Saturday, Aug. 4, following the harness races. The livestock, poultry and rabbit displays are "filling fast" it was reported and the poultry and rabbit exhibits will be "one-third larger than last year."

Pavilion Owner Dies in Douglas

DOUGLAS — Herbert A. Byfield, 72, of 3021 Lakeshore, died early Wednesday at Community Hospital where he had been a patient for the past 10 days.

Mr. Byfield was born in Chicago in 1890, came to Douglas about 20 years ago and lived on Lakeshore in their home called "Cobblestones." He was a former owner of the Big Pavilion in Saugatuck for 30 years.

Surviving are his wife, Olga; one daughter, Mrs. Harold Gilden of Highland Park, Ill.; three grandchildren, one sister, Miss Irma Byfield of Chicago.

New Airport Authority Proposed

Establishment of a Greater Holland Airport Authority in which Holland and Park Townships were proposed to City Council Thursday night by Charles Cooper, member of the Airport Study Committee of the Holland Chamber of Commerce.

The proposal, tabled until the first regular meeting in September, includes a development plan involving not more than 3 mill on equalized valuation of the three units to finance improvements for the airport. Should all three units approve the authority, the election for property owners could take place in the November election.

A petition from Wolverine Pipe Line Co. for a road and street crossing permits covering its proposed pipeline through Holland was tabled until next meeting. This pipeline would be laid in the general vicinity of Graafschap Rd. to the Texas Co. storage tanks and then north across Lake Macatawa.

A representative of the company explained that this pipeline from Niles to Grand Haven would be an eight-inch line secondary to the 16-inch line running from Chicago to Niles and Jackson.

Council also was informed that the Michigan Public Service Commission has scheduled a public hearing July 17 at 1:30 p.m. in Lansing on an application of Wolverine Pipe Line Co. to construct and operate a common carrier petroleum products pipeline from Niles to a proposed terminal near Grand Haven.

Under unfinished business, Council discussed a proposal from the C and O Railway Co. to install a flasher signal at the 11th St. crossing to replace a watchman at that site, and referred the matter to City Manager Herb Holt with power to act, not only on this crossing but on other crossings in the city if and when such signals are deemed necessary.

A petition for sanitary sewer service on 34th St. from Columbia to Central Ave., as well as a petition requesting sidewalks on both sides of Cleveland Ave., from 20th to 22nd Sts. were referred to the city manager.

A letter from Kelly Van Wieren, sales manager for Van Wieren and Veen, requesting rezoning of two lots in Diekmann Homestead addition from residential to commercial was referred to the Planning Commission for recommendation.

A petition from persons living in the vicinity of 22nd St. and Van Raalte Ave. requesting a study as to the best possible means of controlling traffic at that intersection to prevent accidents and speeding was referred to the Traffic and Safety Commission for study and report.

Several gifts were reported by the Hospital Board as follows: one overbed table from Margaret Hummer guild, \$70.50; one anesthesia machine from Margaret Hummer Guild, \$505; three window air conditioners for periatric department from Children's Guild and Margaret Hummer Guild, \$580; six framed pictures for pediatric department from Children's Guild valued at \$100; \$100 for educational purposes from an anonymous donor; \$10 for toys from the Junior Christian Endeavor Society of Trinity Reformed Church. All gifts were accepted with thanks.

A city auditor report listed utility bills remaining unpaid for a period of three months or more as of June 30. According to city charter, such bills not paid by July 31 will be assessed on the city's tax roll. The delinquent bills totaled 476 for an amount of \$8,259.33. Over \$7,000 was in delinquent sewer bills, with others for water and light.

City Clerk D. W. Schipper reported that an investigation and search of the records indicates that Council at no time had adopted a policy on purchasing procedures involving awarding of bids to local bidders if his bid was within a certain percentage over bids of vendors located outside the city. The report was received and filed.

Council approved low bid of Reimink Plumbing and Heating Co. for renovating the City Hall heating system at a cost of \$21,614. The Reimink bid was the low of two bids.

The city manager reported that the hospital director, superintendent and city manager had met relative to wage and salary adjustments and recommended that some 31 positions be adjusted for pay raises to take effect for the pay period ending July 7. On motion of Henry Steffens, the recommendation was tabled with the understanding that the changes be discussed with the special committee and that any adjustments date back to July 1.

In the absence of Chairman John Beltman, Councilman Morris Peerbolt asked the new city attorney to have a report possibly in two weeks on the special committee's study on limiting natural gas services for home heating but not for industrial heating.

A report from the Planning Commission related to possible increased traffic at the proposed shopping center at 40th St. and Central Ave. but after conferring with the Maplewood school board, the police department and the Traffic and Safety Commission, the Planning Commission feels that once a pattern of traffic is set that it can be dealt with.

Four Persons Hurt In Two-Car Crash

SAUGATUCK — Four persons were injured Friday night in a two-car accident about four miles east of Saugatuck at the intersection of 38th St. and 133rd Ave.

Robert Lyttaker, 19, East Saugatuck, driver of one car, is reported in good condition at Holland Hospital with a laceration of the right arm.

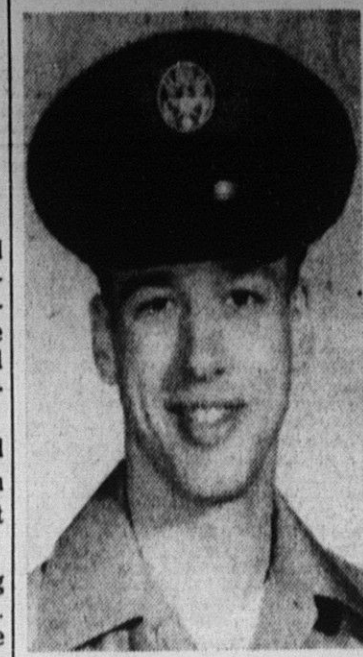

The play continues through Saturday with curtain time at 8:30. There is a matinee on Wednesday at 2:30 p.m.

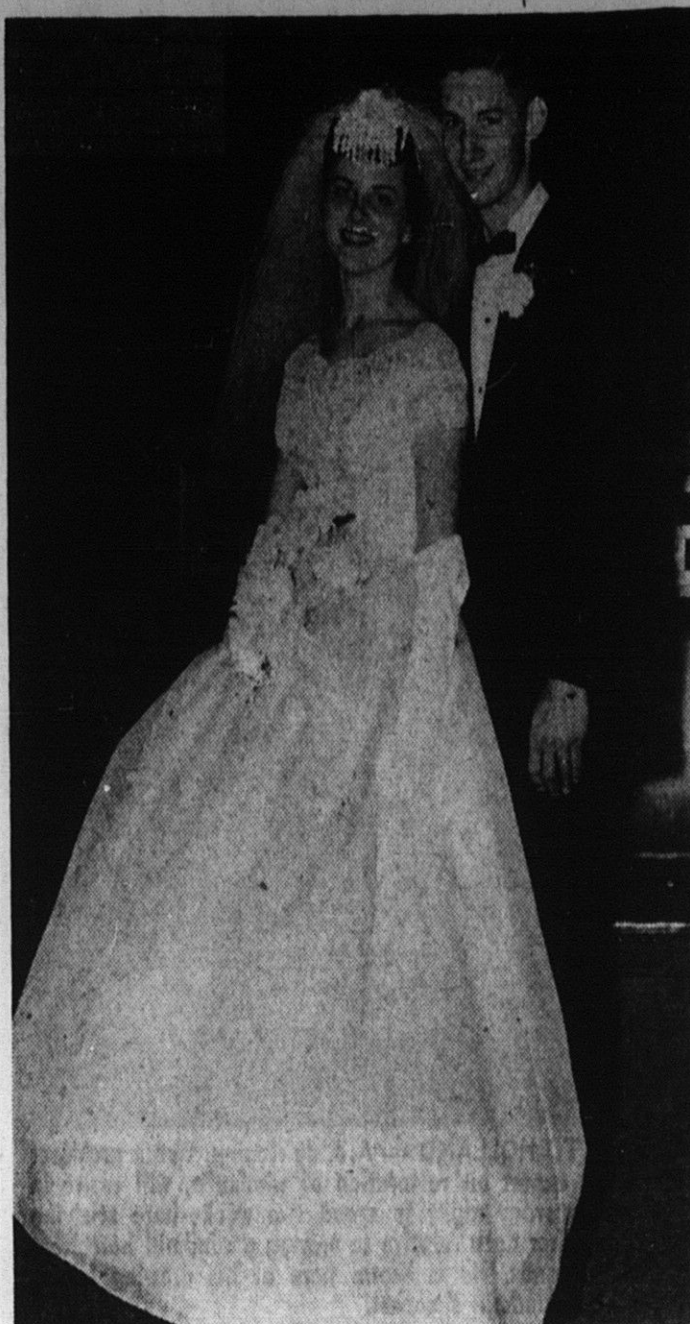

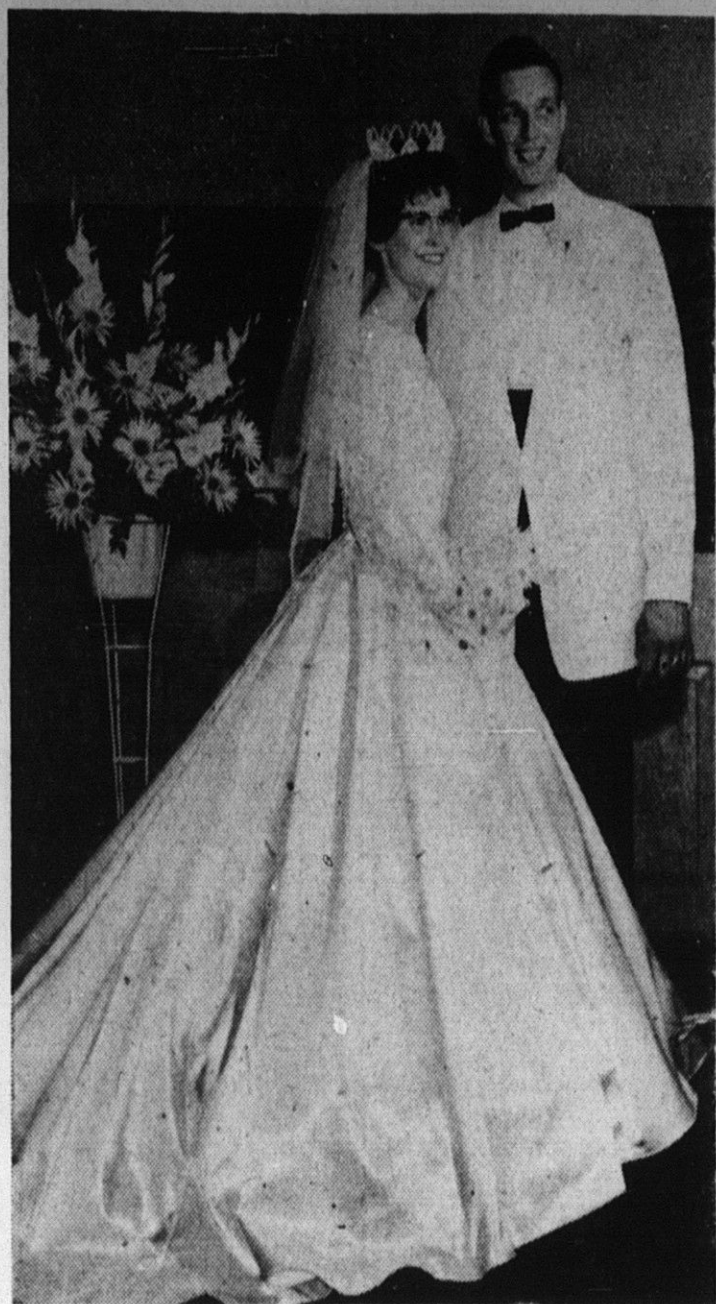

Campers Call State Park 'Best in the Nation'

A Michigan resident staying at the Holland State Park says, "For the past four years I and my family have traveled around the United States visiting various places during our vacation. We have found that this (Ottawa Beach) is by far the best place to stay."

A family of campers from Illinois echoes this statement. "We come here every year because our own state doesn't compare with Michigan with its fine park system."

Many other persons feel the same way. This fact was made clear last Wednesday when park officials at Ottawa Beach began turning cars away from the filled area by 8:00 in the morning. They report that over 15,000 persons crowded into the park during the holiday.

Many campers waited in line for two or three days for a camping spot even though the Holland park has the largest such facility in Michigan.

It has a total capacity of 377 camping sites, 184 spots where tents can be pitched and 193 parking places for trailers.

Park officials say that this pace is expected to continue all summer. Especially in this beautiful Michigan weather more campers and picnickers than ever will be coming to enjoy the park's benefits.

But there isn't room for all who would like to come. What is the answer to overcrowding? Throughout Michigan many other state parks are expanding and improving their facilities, but this never seems to keep up with the need.

One answer frequently brought up is that the park limits the number of days a camper may stay there. The Holland park used to have a ten-day maximum but this resulted in confusion for the campers since many other parks had different limits.

The Michigan legislature eliminated this by setting up a uniform 15-day limit for all state parks. Now any camper is limited in his stay in the Holland park to 15 days between June 15 and Labor Day.

Officials at the park say that even with a shorter maximum camping time there would be little change in the available space because the demand would keep the park filled.

Glenn Kraai, assistant park manager at Holland, in commenting upon one improvement says, "We have done away with commercial campers who rented four or five campsites and in this way prevented other campers from having a chance to get in. Now campers must bring their trailer or tent into the park with their own car when they begin their stay."

Kraai pointed out that it is up to the legislature to change existing conditions in the overcrowded park system.

The Michigan legislature recently turned down a proposed \$5 million bond issue for park improvement.

Deaths in the original subdivision some 80 years ago as a park area for the property owners living there. Since that time, he says, the property owners have been paying taxes and maintenance expenses on the land. Last year their taxes were increased for these park areas set aside in the original plat.

Alt maintains that the county had no right to deed the property over to the state because the land belongs to the residents there. He says the owners once offered to deed the property over to the county when there was an apparent need for more park property but the local government refused.

The property owners have also proposed selling the land to the state at a reasonable price but, he says, this was before there was talk of another park being constructed.

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New Raphael Plant Heads Township Building Permits

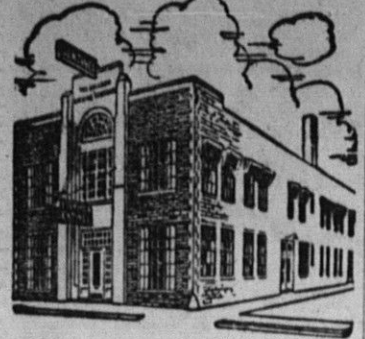

Lesson

Habakkuk Questions
The Ways of God
Habakkuk 1:1-6; 2:2-4

We do not know anything about Habakkuk save that which is told us in his book. He was one of the Twelve Minor Prophets, a contemporary of Jeremiah, Nahum, and Zephaniah. His book is dated about 600 B.C. He lived in a time when nations were struggling for mastery. In 607 B.C. the Babylonians captured Nineveh, the capital of Assyria and they defeated Egypt in 605 B.C. This brought joy to Judah for it hated cruel Assyria. The prophet realized that the victorious Babylonians would eventually overcome Judah. Although Habakkuk is sometimes called a doubter he was a man of great faith.

1. God's ways sometimes puzzle his people. In the first verse of the book the prophet uses the word "burden" which means a vision or a message from God. The Old Testament prophets were sure of being God's messengers. The book opens with a dialogue between God and the prophet which extends into chapter two. The prophet was troubled by the lawlessness in Judah. And God did nothing about it! To him it seemed as if a holy God did not care. This created a moral difficulty in the mind of the prophet. It was time for God to be active and do something.

God answered the prophet but his answer created more difficulty. God told the prophet to look beyond the borders of his own country. He was going to use the Babylonians to punish wayward Judah. This troubled the prophet much. How could a holy God use the cruel and wicked Babylonians who are also called Chaldeans, to discipline God's people? This seemed inconsistent with God's holiness. It did not look right to the prophet. Well, when we look around in our world today we are often troubled by the seeming inactivity of God.

II. God asks for patience. "And the Lord answered me." The prophet sat in a lonely tower to which he had retired and God told him to write the vision, that is the prophecy or revelation, on tablets and thus make it available to all people so that they too would get the profit. What was the answer the prophet got? "Behold, his soul is puffed up; it is not upright in him, but the just shall live by faith."

God agreed with the prophet in his opinion regarding the Chaldeans. The nation was puffed up—that was their attitude to life. There is a better attitude to life—that of faith. The just live by faith. Three times in the New Testament, the words, "The just shall live by faith" appear—Romans 1:17; Galatians 3:11; Hebrews 10:38. God spoke those words to Habakkuk in the year 600 B.C. they were written by Paul in 60 A.D. and proclaimed by Luther in 1517 A.D. God told the prophet and he tells us the same thing—be patient. The triumph of the wicked is only temporary.

The book of Habakkuk is composed of three chapters. If you read the first verses of chapter one you will note how troubled the prophet was. If you now turn to the last chapter and read the last verses you will discover that the prophet learned to trust God. The book ends with a triumphant note. We do well to catch this spirit and reveal it in daily life.

Overisel Holds July 4th Event

OVERISEL — A Fourth of July celebration that goes back for 92 years was held in Overisel Grove Wednesday with nearly 600 persons present for the occasion. It was the Overisel Community July 4 observance.

At first the celebration in 1870 had the appearance of a Sunday School picnic with folks coming by horse and buggy to Krooze Woods, almost across the street from the present site. Later picnics were held in Klomper's Woods and Michmerhuizen's Woods and a few times on the village square.

John K. Dangremond, one-time proprietor of the Overisel Implement store had much to do with the early July 4 celebrations. Overisel had been settled in 1848.

In those early days home-made ice cream was made the day before and served for a nickel a dish. Lemonade brought in creamery cans was sold for two glasses for a nickel. Herring could be bought for 18 cents a box and passed out free—which increased the sale of lemonade.

Fireworks, which in those days were legal, could be purchased for \$40, according to Edward A. Dangremond of Hamilton, son of one of the celebration originators.

Roman candles, pinwheels and other spectacular pieces were shot off. Other activities during the day included running races, bicycle races, sack races and others. Impromptu baseball games were often played.

Featured ballgame of the 1962 celebration was between the Little Leaguers of Dorr and Overisel Little Leaguers at 3 p.m. The Dorr team won.

Dr. Jacob Prins of Forest Grove was the afternoon speaker. In the evening "Uncle Bob" Seigler of the Rural Bible Missions was featured. Stereophonic slides "Faith and Freedom" were shown by Fred Kleinhekel.

The Overisel Community Association sponsored the holiday event. The Rev. J. Bult was program chairman. Carl Immlink is Association president.

A canteen on the Community Grove grounds was available for those who cared to take advantage of the refreshments.

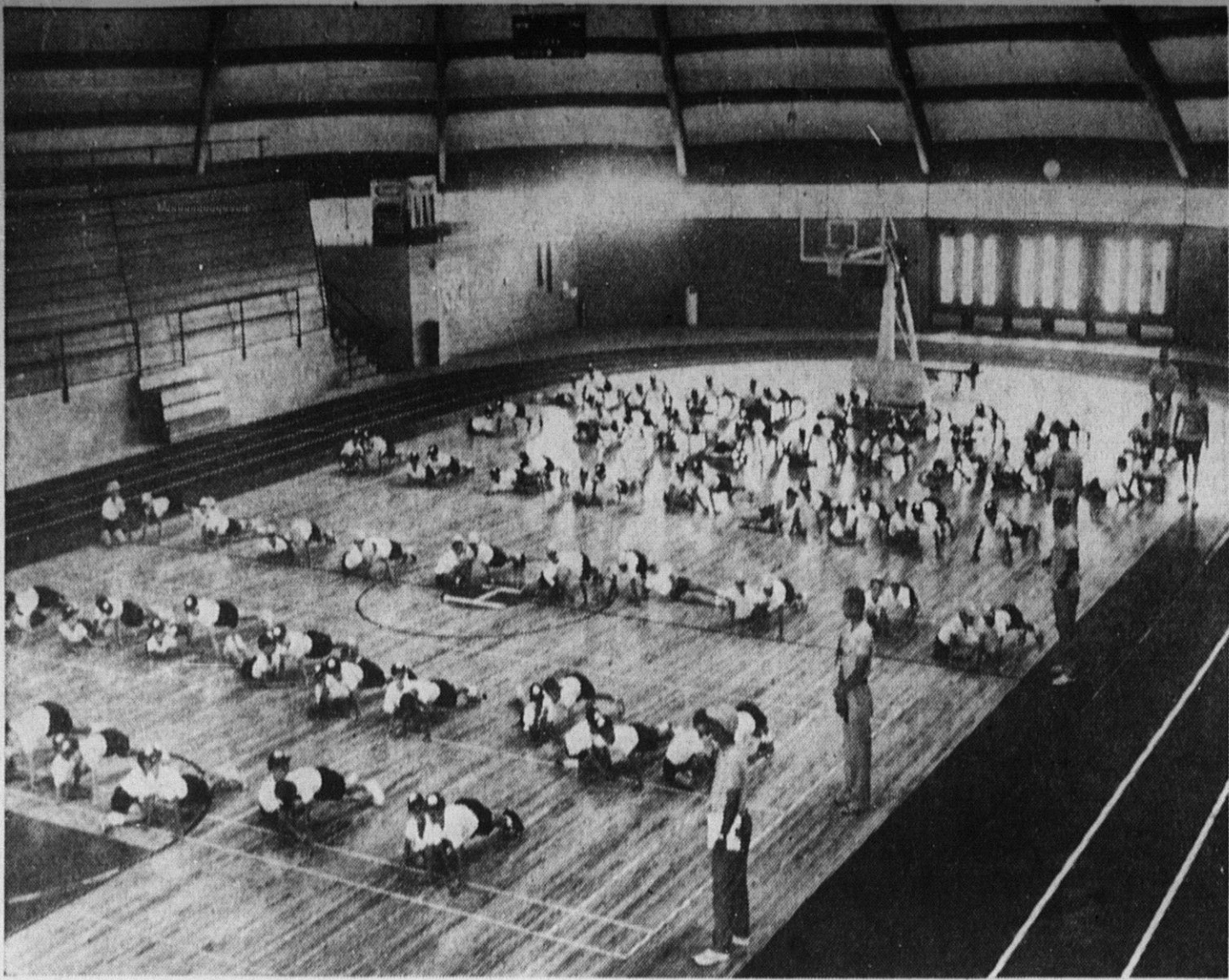

Physical Fitness Tested in Boys Sports School

Physical fitness, advocated on the national level by President Kennedy, and carried out in Holland for several years is a part of the Boys Sports School this summer.

The eight through 13-year-old youngsters participated in the physical fitness unit as one of the many varied sports activities taught in the four weeks of sports school. The school is sponsored by the Holland Recreation Department.

Don Piersma, sports school director, said each boy is graded on his performance in physical fitness. The report card will be sent to his parents.

Included on the card is the boy's personal record in all of the events, the group average of all of the events, the competing groups such as what age group (eight through 13) the youngster is in and how the boys compares with the group in the six events.

The boys were listed average, above or below average. The

events included sit ups for two minutes, push ups, pull ups, bench bounce for 30 seconds, 40-yard dash for eight and nine-year-olds and 440-yard dash for 10, 11, 12 and 13-year-olds.

Five vital areas were tested, Piersma reported, and the youngsters didn't have any practice prior to the tests. Through the 440 and 220, endurance was checked while strength in the upper extremities was measured in the pull ups and push ups.

Flexibility in the stomach area was found in the sit ups while agility was noted through the bench bounce and the 40-yard dash disclosed the speed factor.

Piersma showed the results and a drop in some of the areas as the youngsters grew older was of concern. As an example, some of the 10-year-old averages were lower than the eight and nine-year olds.

In the 220-yard dash, an eight-year-old average was 44 seconds while the nine-year-old was 43 sec-

onds. In the 440-yard dash, the 10, 11, 12 and 13-year-olds had times of 1:39, 1:32 and 1:30.

In the situps for two minutes, the eight-year-old averaged 30; nine-32; 10-37; 11-46 and 12-43-45. Under the push up category, the eight-year-old had 13; nine-12; 10-10; 11-16 and 12-13.

The 11-year-olds led in pull ups with five while the 12 and 13-year-olds had four. Others were eight-4; nine-3; and 10-2.

In the bench bounce, the eight-year-old averaged 16; nine-17; 10-16; 11-25 and 12-13-20. The 40-yard dash showed eight-7.3; nine-7.2; 10-7.2; 11-6.6 and 12-13-6.8.

A total of 43 eight-year-olds took part along with 50 nine-year-olds and 54 10-year-olds. Thirty of the group 11-year-olds and 13 were 12 and 13 years old.

"Parents and children should realize to be a good athlete, speed, agility, strength and endurance are of the utmost importance," Piersma said. "If a boy consistently finds himself below average in

these vital areas, he should improve these areas," Piersma continued.

"We feel that some parts of the fitness can be measured, the same as an IQ test can measure to some degree our mental efficiencies, we can recognize the average, the talented and the physical defects by using the test wisely," Piersma concluded.

Conclusions drawn from the tests showed much evidence of weakness in the upper extremity areas, especially from nine and 10-year-olds, Piersma reported.

Speed, agility and endurance increased by age "very definitely," Piersma noted "and boys who have tremendous desire and competitive spirit to do well, even though they don't have the ability have the best scores."

Instructors in the sports school this year are Russ Hornbaker, Bob Connell, Dave Kempker, Carl Selover and Jon Gronberg. Plans call for the tests to be held each year to note how the youngsters improve.

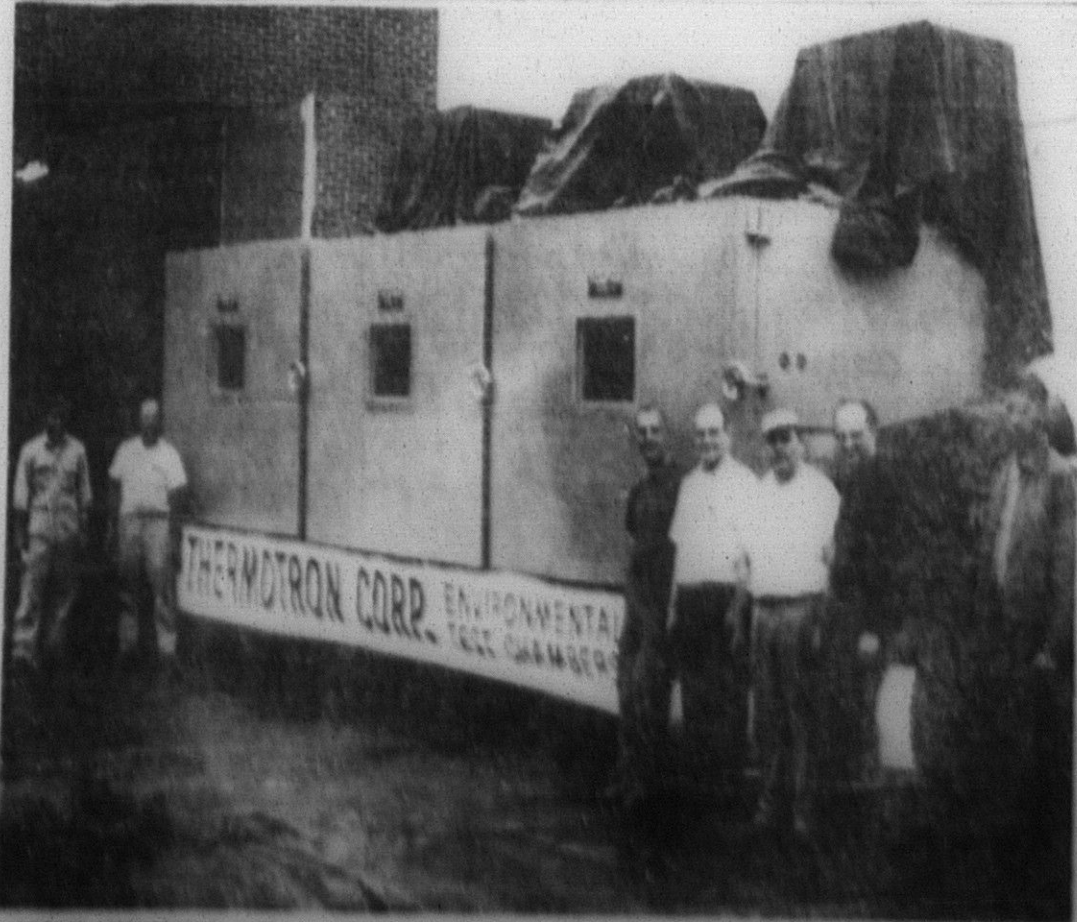

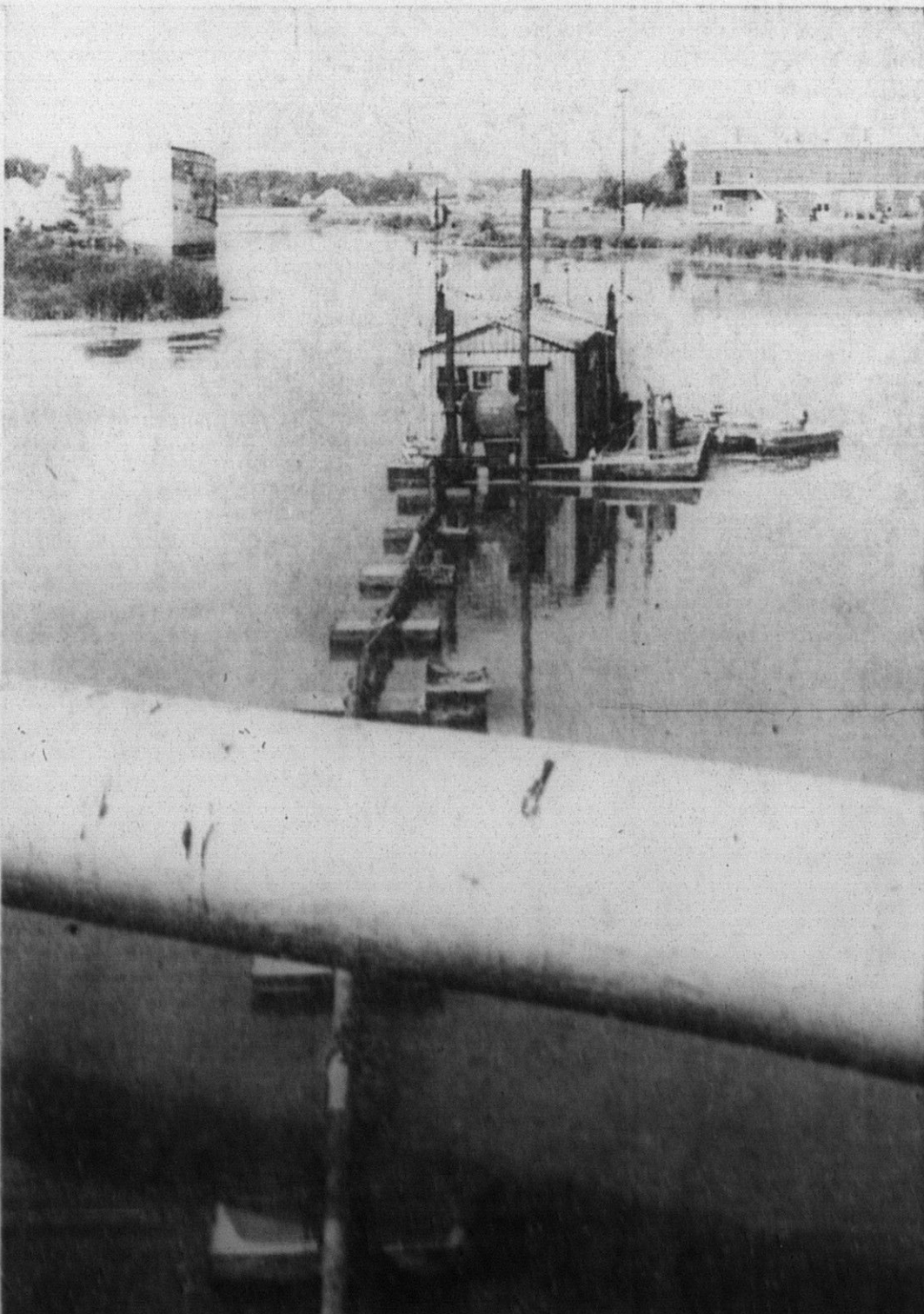

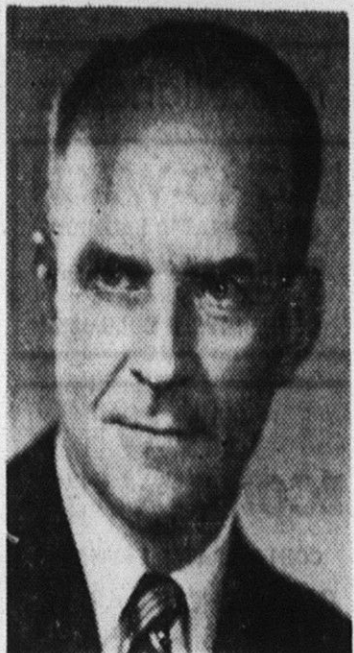

Local School Census Lists 8,086 in '62

The school census conducted in May reveals a total of 8,086 children from birth through 19 years old in Holland school district, Supt. Walter W. Scott told the Board of Education Monday night.

The figure this year includes children from Lakeview district. The total last year was 7,164, compared with 7,292 in 1960 and 7,225 in 1959. In 1959, Montello Park district was added. The 1958 total was 6,288, the year Apple Ave. district was added. Previous totals were 6,188 in 1957, 6,094 in 1956, 5,885 in 1955 and 5,712 in 1954.

Children, aged 5-19 inclusive total 6,056 this year and those from birth through 4 total 2,030. In other business, a communication from the Maplewood district asking that nine first graders, six second graders and two sixth graders be accepted in Thomas Jefferson School on a tuition basis was referred to the schools committee. Maplewood currently is contemplating a bond issue for additional facilities.

Harvey Buter reported working on a sports program for junior high and high school. The proposed budget calls for a \$10,925 program whereas income is estimated at \$7,765. He said the Boosters Club is working on a plan to stimulate ticket sales in an effort to make sports self-supporting.

The salary of the visiting teacher, approved at last month's meeting, was set according to the present scale calling for \$7,300 plus \$500 allowed all special education teachers. The salary is paid from state and county funds.

The board granted releases to two teachers under contract, Robert DuBois who is accepting a coaching and teaching position in Jackson on the junior high level, and Robert Connell who has received an offer in the administrative department of Central Michigan University.

A communication from Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Marlink of Montello Park asking a higher barrier or some other solution at the Montello Park School playground following numerous broken windows in their home was referred to the buildings and grounds committee with power to act.

July bills were estimated at \$22,900. Teachers' salaries for the two summer months were included in the June bills.

William Hinga of the high school faculty submitted a new psychology textbook which he recommended for use in the social problems classes. He explained that under the new block system of the high school that college-bound students have expressed great interest in psychology. He submitted several letters from college and universities encouraging such study on the high school level.

Harry Frissel questioned the five-year plan on the use of textbooks and Scott explained it was a long practice by the board in "holding the line" to some degree on textbook expenditures. He said, however, that some books are outmoded quickly and the board

could always make exceptions.

Scott explained that recently all maps and similar aids in classrooms were reviewed and many maps, some dating back to World War I, were removed.

A report reviewed renovations at the junior high school (both buildings) and because of dust, etc., the board will meet elsewhere for the next two meetings, although Principal Earl Borlace expressed the hope that the board will continue to meet in the school library again in the fall.

Included in the renovations are plans to equip room 9 in the E. E. Fell building with food vending machines and to remove the partition between rooms 6 and 8 for tables. This will seat approximately 160-170 pupils each half hour. The food services will be provided by Alvin Bos who also supplies the high school. The renovation is in charge of Architects Kammeraad and Stroop.

Also approved were recommendations by the buildings and grounds committee granting a contract to John Kortman for low bid of 25½ cents per square foot for approximately 500 feet of sidewalk on the south side of 24th St. at the new high school. The Kortman bid was lowest of four submitted.

Other work approved was installation of two eight-inch wells 30 feet deep and submersible pumps at 24th St. and Van Raalte Ave. at the high school at a cost of \$1,345.12 and another well at 27th St. and Van Raalte, 100 feet deep, at a cost of \$2,300. The contract went to Hamilton Supply and Manufacturing Co., the only concern submitting a bid.

The committee also announced plans for locating five mercury vapor lights on concrete poles on the south side of 24th St. facing the campus and seven at alternating 150-foot spaces on each side of Van Raalte Ave. between 24th and 27th Sts. This program is being worked out with the city and the Board of Public Works.

Monday's meeting lasted just over 2½ hours. All members were present and Member Frissel gave the invocation.

School Year Deficit Set At \$96,460

The Board of Education ended its school year June 30 with a net deficit of \$96,460.30, compared with the \$125,000 estimated figure earlier in the year, according to the financial report submitted at a regular meeting of the Board of Education Monday night in E. E. Fell Junior High School.

Included in the revenues of the year, as yet unpaid, are \$78,796.60 in state aid, \$29,128.40 in Lakeview tuition and \$11,278.80 in Van Raalte tuition.

Receipts in the general operating fund for the year including the July 1, 1961, balance was \$1,673,151.32. Disbursements totaled \$1,720,256.35, leaving an operating deficit of \$47,105.03. Loans to be paid and revenues yet to be collected round out the figure to \$96,460.30 actual deficit.

The report on the high school building and site fund reveals a balance of \$376,208.71. This covers not only the new high school but such other projects as junior high renovation, Lincoln gym and improvements at other schools.

On recommendation of Supt. Walter W. Scott, the board deferred action on adopting the proposed 1962-63 school budget. One reason for the delay was further consideration for custodians. The proposed budget as outlined June 25 listed a total of \$1,629,950.35.

Scott also presented a study of financial statistics for Holland, based on the school year of 1960-61, figures for which have just been made available. Compared with Michigan's 537 school districts, K-12, Holland ranked 71st in membership. For per pupil expenditure, Holland ranked 39th with its figure of \$406.81 per pupil. This was almost equal to Grand Rapids, East Grand Rapids, Muskegon and Lansing. Kalamazoo was higher with \$413.52 and Benton Harbor lower with \$394.73.

Holland was 28th on mills levied on state equalized valuation for general school operation. Millage that year was 10.57. Holland was 71st in the amount of state equalized valuation back of each child in membership. That year the state equalized valuation was \$67,400.17 with 3,989 pupils or \$16,922 per child. Grand Rapids, lower with \$394.73.

Pipeline Permission Is Granted
