## Dr. J. R. Mulder Succumbs at 70

Dr. John R. Mulder, 70, of 80 West 18th St., president emeritus of Western Theological Seminary in Holland, died Saturday morning after a lingering illness at Pine Rest Christian Hospital.

A native of Holland, he graduated from Hope College in 1917, obtaining a scholarship to the University of Michigan, where he was awarded a Master of Theology Degree in 1918. He graduated from Western Theological Seminary in 1921. Later that same year, he married the former Jeanette W. Schoon of Holland.

In the fall of 1921, Dr. Mulder became a Professor of Bible and Philosophy at Central College in Pella, Iowa, and remained there until 1924 when he accepted the pastorate of Bethany Reformed Church of Roseland, Chicago. It was during his pastorate that a new church edifice was built.

In 1928, Dr. Mulder was asked to return to Western Theological Seminary to become Professor of Practical Theology and a few years later also Professor of Systematic Theology. Hope College conferred upon him a Doctor of Divinity Degree in June, 1931. In 1942, he became the president of Western Theological Seminary and upon retirement in 1960 he had served the seminary for 32 years. Central College honored Dr. Mulder in May, 1943, with the degree of Master of Laws.

Dr. Mulder served on many boards of the Reformed Church in America, being a member of the Board of Education for the greatest length. He also was a vice president of the General Synod of the Reformed Church.

He spearheaded action for the present seminary buildings and campus, now one of Holland's beauty spots. The work was completed and dedicated, debt-free, in May of 1954.

Dr. Mulder was known throughout the church world as an outstanding preacher. He preached in most of the mid-west Reformed Churches as well as those in the eastern part of the United States, appearing many times in the pulpit of the Marble Collegiate Church of New York City for Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, its pastor.

For many years he was on the staff of the "Church Herald" of the Reformed Church. He also was past president of the Holland Exchange Club and the Century Club, as well as a member of the greater consistency of Trinity Reformed Church and the Holland Ministerial Association.

Surviving are the wife; two daughters, Mrs. Philip (Mary Jane) Baron and Mrs. Eugene (Joyce) Scholten; six grandchildren, Jeffrey, Mart and Amy Jo Baron and John R., David and Nancy Scholten; a brother, Dr. Peter J. Mulder of Chicago; two sisters, Mrs. George Wolterink of Holland and Mrs. Harold J. Damstra of Pleasant Hill, Calif.

## Tax Collections Reach \$100,000

Well over \$100,000 already has been collected in city summer taxes so far.

Tax bills were delivered Tuesday and that afternoon \$18,000 was turned in at the city treasurer's office on the first floor of City Hall. Close to \$80,000 was collected Wednesday.

Total levy covering both city and school taxes is \$2,309,405.38. Of this figure, \$1,422,673.94 is for the Holland school district and \$886,731.44 for the city.

Persons owning property inside the city but within another school district will be billed for school taxes on the fall tax bills.

Aug. 15 is the deadline for summer taxes. Thereafter a 2 per cent charge is added until Sept. 10 when the penalty jumps to 6 per cent.

## Approve Fire Protection In Allegan

ALLEGAN — Allegan Township residents, attending a meeting Monday night, were told by board members that a decision had already been made to "do just as the city asked" in meeting terms for rental of space in the soon-to-be-built Allegan fire hall.

The more than 30 residents on hand had obviously come prepared to try and persuade the board to accept the city's terms.

Board secretary, Robert Hopkins, announced that under terms of the city's request of June 23, the township will pay \$600 in 1965; \$800 in 1966; 1,000 in 1967; and \$1,200 in 1968, the agreement to be re-negotiated at the end of 1968. All other costs to the township will remain the same. The township will furnish a radio for station-to-truck communication and continue to pay a per fire fee as before.

In the past 14 years Allegan and Trowbridge townships have paid \$200 per year rental fees. Hopkins and township supervisor Jack Billman indicated Trowbridge township would probably go along with the city also, as a result of a joint June 29 meeting of the two townships.

Township residents at Monday night's meeting voiced disapproval of "unpublicized" meetings and expressed concern that fire protection might have "expired" before an agreement had been reached. Board members reassured them "We would never have allowed such a thing to happen."

It was also brought out that Allegan township owns a pumper and Trowbridge, a tanker, maintained and housed by the city, and "we have always worked well together in the past."

Hopkins told the group "There are two things we can look forward to in the future: either the township is going to grow or the city is going to annex and we may be needing a larger tanker."

## Whitcomb Will Seek Reelection

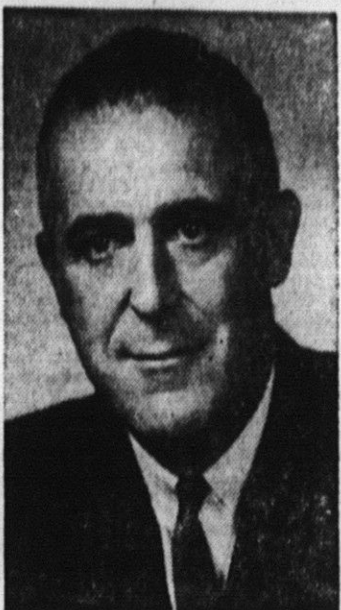
ALLEGAN — Allegan County Sheriff Robert Whitcomb announced Wednesday he will seek reelection this year.

## Rep. Van Til Runs in New 55th District

State Rep. Riemer Van Til of Holland Wednesday announced he will be a candidate for state representative in the newly created 55th district. He is completing his third term as representative of Ottawa county district.

The new 55th district lumps Holland city and Jamestown and Zeeland townships together with a good share of Allegan county and several townships of Barry county.

"Although I have been shamefully gerrymandered out of the major portion of my present district, I will not change my legal residence for political advantage but consider it a challenge for making new friends and being of greater public service," Van Til said.

Van Til has served as chairman of the House Labor Committee, vice chairman of the tourist committee and member of the elections committee and the rules and resolutions committee. He is chairman of the interim study committee on workmen's compensation revision, and is on the committee to advise an audio visual production of state universities.

## Agree on Plan For New Area

Holland's planning commission approved a development plan for an area on the south side of the city between 40th St. and Central Ave. north of the US-31 By-Pass at its meeting Tuesday afternoon in the Council Chambers.

The plan adopted was an engineer's plan setting out proposed subdivision lines and roads for the area, according to deputy city clerk Terry Hofmeyer. This plan will be used as a guideline when the area is developed in the future. The area is now mostly farmland.

The commission also discussed a proposed plat for an area on the southwest corner of the city around Graafschap Road and 32nd St. The commission tabled discussion on this proposed plat until its next meeting in August.

## Buter Again Heads City School Unit

Harvey Buter was reelected president of the Holland Board of Education at an organizational meeting Monday afternoon in the high school library. Such a meeting is required the first Monday in July according to the new state constitution.

Also reelected were Harry Frissel as secretary and Albert Schaafsma as treasurer. William Gargano was elected vice president. There were four ballots for president, four for vice president and one each for secretary and treasurer.

Reelecting a president for a second year is a departure for the board which for many years has named presidents to one-year terms.

Welcomed to the board were the two new members, John Keuning and Russel Fredricks. Speaking for the two, Keuning said their first impressions were genial and both he and Fredricks appreciated being consulted on important developments since the June 8 election.

On recommendation of Supt. Walter W. Scott, the board approved two new teachers.

Robert Van Dyke of Holland who graduated from Central Michigan University this year will teach elementary physical education. He graduated from Holland High School in 1954 and played professional baseball for a time. He has taught one year at Leslie. His wife, the former Carol Harrington, also is a teacher.

Charles R. Smiley, who has taught 3½ years at Unionville, will be boys' counselor at the high school. A native of Clarkdale, Miss., Smiley dropped out of school at 18 to join the Air Force and completed his high school training under Special Services. He later graduated from Central Michigan University. He taught English at Unionville and during the last year was employed half-time to earn a master's degree.

The board approved the request from Henrietta Althuis for release from contract after 32 years with the public schools. Miss Althuis who has taught art at junior high is eligible for retirement.

Two teachers, Leonard Dick and Roland Aussicker will attend the National Audio Visual Association conference in Chicago July 17 and 18.

The board authorized high school diplomas for Arthur Justine and Roger Olund who have completed a special education course.

Municipal Judge Jacob Ponstein was reelected board president for the fourth year. Ivan Fosheim is vice president. The board voted to meet the first and third Tuesday of each month.

James Van Dam of Zeeland, a recent graduate of Hope college, was engaged by the board as a high school science instructor. He will also be assistant to the high school reserves football team coach, Dick Fulkerson.

All officers of the Spring Lake board were reelected. They are Gerald Whiting, president; Carl Briegel, secretary; and Wilfred Merz, treasurer. The board has expanded to seven members and voted to meet the first and third Thursday of each month.

## Guard Unit Set for Camp

Holland's National Guard company today was in the final stages of preparation for its annual two-week summer encampment at Camp Grayling.

The local unit is scheduled to leave for Camp Grayling at 6 a.m. Saturday by motor convoy. They will return to Holland July 25. Convoy vehicles will be loaded Friday evening at the Civic Center parking lot.

Company B, made up of 123 enlisted men and three officers, will take part in a variety of activities during the two-week encampment. Climaxing the rigorous training schedule will be a four-day bivouac during the second week of camp.

On Saturday, July 18, Governor George Romney, Commander-in-Chief of the Michigan National Guard, will inspect the troops and Sunday will speak at the traditional memorial service honoring Michigan's war dead.

Highlighting the Company B four-day bivouac this year will be several night training exercises and attack exercises using live ammunition.

The military convoy which will leave for Grayling Saturday consists of six 2½-ton trucks, six trailers, two three-quarter ton trucks, two one-quarter ton vehicles and two 105 mm recoilless rifles, mounted on one-quarter ton vehicles.

## Meyers Pulls Out Of State Race

ZEELAND — Hannes Meyers Jr., Zeeland attorney, has withdrawn as a candidate for the Republican nomination as state representative of the new 95th district covering most of Ottawa county.

His decision came after a verbal opinion by the Michigan attorney general's office that under the new constitution he would be unable to serve as city attorney if elected. Meyers serves as city attorney for both Zeeland city and Hudsonville.

Under the old constitution, resignation from such posts would not have been necessary.

## Mrs. L. Jungblut Succumbs at 65

NEW YORK—Mrs. Leo (Francina) Jungblut, 65, of 353 College Ave., Holland, died Wednesday apparently of a heart attack while aboard a plane returning from the Netherlands.

Mrs. Jungblut was returning from The Netherlands after visiting with relatives and died shortly before landing at New York Kennedy International Airport. The body was taken to the Queen's General Hospital where an autopsy was scheduled.

Mrs. Jungblut left Wednesday afternoon for New York to identify the body.

## Ihrman Will Head City Schools

Former Resident Was School Superintendent In Paw Paw Since 1962

Donald L. Ihrman, a graduate of Holland High School and Hope College, is Holland's new superintendent of schools.

Ihrman was unanimously appointed at a special meeting of the Holland Board of Education Tuesday. He has served as superintendent of Paw Paw schools since October, 1962. The Paw Paw Board of Education granted his release from contract Monday night.

Ihrman, 39, was reared by his aunt, Hermine Ihrman, for nearly 40 years principal of Van Raalte School. The home is at 182 West 15th St. where Miss Ihrman still resides. As a youngster in Holland, he attended Washington School, E.E. Fell Junior High and was graduated from Holland High School in 1943. He was an honor student and was active in instrumental music.

While training in the Navy's V-5 program, he attended Central Michigan University in Mt. Pleasant, Wesleyan University in Middletown, Conn., the University of Georgia, St. Mary's in California and Hope College. He received an A.B. degree from Hope in June, 1949, after majoring in social studies with minors in English, Spanish and education.

Ihrman's first educational post was at Maple Grove School in Norton township, Muskegon, where from September, 1949, to the following June he taught eighth grade and coached junior high basketball. For the next three years he was superintendent of the grade school district No. 3 in Norton township with approximately 500 students.

From 1953 to 1958 he was assistant principal at Muskegon High School. In addition to his duties involving attendance, discipline, scheduling, extra-curricular supervision and school-community conferences, he supervised the eight-week summer sessions, developed an orientation program for new teachers in the Muskegon school system and during his last year served Western Michigan University as coordinator for the first off-campus training center established for student teachers.

He moved to Benton Harbor in 1958 to become principal of the high school with an enrollment of nearly 2,000 students.

In October, 1962, Ihrman was appointed superintendent of schools in Paw Paw, working in conjunction with Western Michigan University's off-campus teacher training program. The school district there has a population of some 3,000. The enrollment is approximately 1,700.

Holland's new superintendent received a master's degree in general administration and supervision from WMU in 1954. In this connection he worked six months at Michigan State Prison in Jackson teaching, counseling and participating in general administration. ## Arrests Mark 4th of July In Saugatuck

SAUGATUCK — A gala holiday ended in arrest for more than 200 pleasure-seeking young people in Saugatuck during the Fourth of July weekend.

Most of those arrested were involved in violations of liquor ordinances, according to Allegan County Sheriff Robert Whitcomb and Saugatuck justice of the peace Ervin Kasten Sr.

A total of 214 persons appeared before Justice Kasten in a weekend marathon court session, including 183 persons arrested in Saugatuck last weekend. The remainder were picked up in the Douglas area or were on the regularly scheduled court docket.

Whitcomb said that of 63 new lodgings at the county jail over the weekend, 50 were brought in from Saugatuck.

Most of the persons to appear before Kasten were charged with violations of a Saugatuck village ordinance which prohibits drinking on public streets. Fines ranged from \$25 to \$40, including some jail sentences, for the violation, Kasten said.

A total of 39 persons appearing before Kasten were committed to the county jail at Allegan.

Kasten's justice court was in session all night until daylight Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Kasten said he normally did not have 214 court cases in an entire month.

Whitcomb said that the persons from Saugatuck who were lodged in the county jail were brought in mainly on charges of drinking in a public place, minors in possession and being drunk and disorderly.

Kasten, who estimated that he had fewer than 12 hours sleep during the holiday weekend, said that arrests reached their peak Saturday night.

"Anyone apprehended on a liquor charge can expect a high fine and days in jail," Kasten said. He said he saw this as the only solution to the perennial drinking problem in Saugatuck by fun-loving holiday crowds.

## Ottawa County Farm News

Our farmers might be interested in the information on the retail markets in Grand Rapids. A new farmer's retail market, corner of Scribner and Bridge, N. W. under the freeway, will be in operation on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. The stall rental is \$2 per market day.

Another retail market is located on Fulton St., near Fuller Ave. on Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday.

The south end retail market at Cottage Grove and Division, S. E. is open on Monday, Thursday and Saturday. Also a wholesale facility is located on West Hall St., near Freeman Ave., S. E. This market is an early hour market, opening around 2:30 a.m. and continuing until about 7 a.m.

Area Wheat farmers will sell this year's wheat crop under a new set of wheat standards. The new grades should mean less foreign material and dockage in wheat this year. One of the main changes in the standards that went into effect on June 1 is that maximum damage has been established for "total defects" for each numerical grade of wheat. These defects include damaged kernels, foreign material not readily removed and shrunken or broken kernels.

Still another change has eliminated moisture as a factor in determining the "sample" wheat grades. Moisture content for wheat grading "tough" has been reduced to 13.5 per cent for all classes. New test weights for various wheat grades have also been determined. Test weight is an indicator of the wheat plumpness and is a major test in the process of grading wheat. It indicates the amount of flour that can be milled from each bushel of wheat. Since numerical grades don't always completely describe a certain lot of wheat, special descriptive grades are often added to give the buyer and seller more information.

These special descriptive grades include "tough wheat, smutty wheat, garlic wheat, weevily wheat, treated wheat and heavy wheat." These will provide the buyer and seller with additional information about a particular lot of wheat.

I have been asked by some of our D. H. I. A. people how 600 pound records are achieved in the D. H. I. A. program. I think the following information from New York State gives some points on how this is accomplished. "When it comes to grain feeding about half reported no top limit, and some with a high of 20 to 40 lbs. of grain per cow."

So you can see, even those with a top limit feed their high producing cows quite liberally. Nearly all reported they wash udders and use a strip cup before putting on the milking machines. Better than half reported they dip teat ends immediately after milking with some sort of antiseptic solution. Prac-

tically all of these men reported they had been or were currently enrolled in the New York mastitis control program.

In checking out the time it takes them to milk, these dairymen in spite of their high production, are spending less time on each cow than is the average dairyman in the state. So in cecking out milking practices in these high producing herds, we find these men following most of the current recommended milking procedures.

Two-thirds of these dairymen reported they use artificial breeding exclusively in their herds. Several others reported they used both their own bulls and artificial breeding. Also, most of them reported raising their own replacements, while a few said they raised some of their replacements and bought some.

During the past year Michigan showed a net increase of 10,000 cows on test. This compares favorably to other states for the same period of time. Wisconsin showed a net increase of 24,000 cows to beat us in this category. They had most of their gain in OS where there was a 20,000 cow net increase. Michigan had a 4,600 cow increase in OS. The D. H. I. A. increase for Michigan was 7,400 cows and this was the highest for all states. Overall there was a 39,018 net increase in cows on test in the United States.

Of this number 25,751 were in the OS program; 9,657 in WADAM and 3,610 in DHIA. Michigan ranked second in net increase in total cows on test, second for net increase in OS and first in net increase in DHIA. During the last year Michigan showed a net increase of 83 DHIA herds and 116 OS herds. Our increase should have been much larger if the "Quit" herds could be cut down. In the 12 month period there were 326 net DHIA herds but 243 quit testing in the same year. For OS there were 539 new herds but 423 quit herds.

## BROTHER CAN YOU SPARE A DIME?

The traditional opening gambit of the old-time panhandler, "Brother can you spare a dime?" may soon become a generally current phrase if the present coin shortage continues.

Despite the fact that during the current fiscal year U. S. mints have produced 4,200,000, 000 of hard money, the coin shortage has become so severe that banks are paying a dollar for 98 cents in coin, and business people whose traffic depends upon coins are sending out teams of youngsters to buy nickels and dimes.

The coin shortage is basically a side effect of automation. Almost everything now can be bought from automated vending machines, the operation of which demands coins of all denominations. Pay telephones, of which there may be 10,000 or more in large cities, keep coins out of circulation sometimes as long as two months. Parking meters — and who can count their number? — stand ready to receive pennies, nickels and dimes, taking thousands of dollars out of circulation daily. Pleasure devices like jukeboxes and pin-ball machines hold up the circulation of coins for a week or two.

Then there are collectors, who for good or bad reasons hoard a variety of coins in amazingly increasing quantities. And the coin collectors are increasing, too. In the last 10 years their number has increased four-fold, and today totals 8,000,000.

The virtual disappearance of the recently-minted Kennedy half-dollar shows how active the professional and amateur collectors can be.

What's to be done? Very little, it seems. The two mints now producing coins, those at Philadelphia and Denver, although they are working round the clock seven days a week, are simply unable to fill the growing need for coins for an exploding population. There may be a new mint in three or four years, but in the meantime the problem promises to become worse instead of better.

So, if in the near future you are accosted by someone with the old saying, "Brother, can you spare a dime?" don't jump to the conclusion that he's a panhandler. He may be an unfortunate looking for a coin to feed to an ever-hungry parking meter.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, July 12  
God's Concern for His People  
Exodus 3:1-12  
By C. P. Dame

If some historian were asked to name ten of the greatest men of all time he surely would include Moses, a liberator, law-giver, leader, writer and orator. This lesson tells us how God called him to lead His people out of bondage. God still calls and commissions men and women for special work.

I. God calls workers. The life of Moses was divided in three periods of forty years. The first forty years were spent in Egypt at the court, the second period was spent in the desert of midian and the last forty years were devoted to the leading of the children of Israel through the desert. During the first eighty years Moses was trained.

Familiar is the story of the adoption of the child Moses by the daughter of Pharaoh who gave him the best education his age offered. One day Moses went "to his people and looked on their burdens." When he saw a cruel Egyptian taskmaster beating a Hebrew he became indignant and killed the Egyptian and hid him in the sand. On the next day he learned that his deed was known and he fled to Midian where he found a home with a member of the Kenite clan, married one of his daughters, and became a herdsman and learned living in the desert.

While Moses was tending the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, who was also called Reuel, he saw a bush burning but it was not consumed. Moses turned aside to see and there God called him. God calls workers in various ways.

II. God is concerned about His people. When Moses was ready to listen, God revealed Himself to him and spoke of His concern regarding His people. God had seen the affliction of His people—Israel. Since God was concerned He told Moses He was going to deliver His people out of the hand of the Egyptians and bring them "unto a good land and large, unto a land flowing with milk and honey." The land God had promised to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

III. God commissions workers. "Come now therefore, and I will send thee unto Pharaoh"—thus God spoke to Moses, the herdsman. Very likely Moses did a lot of thinking during his stay in the desert and often looked upon himself as failure. At forty Moses considered himself ready to lead the Hebrew slaves, at eighty he made several excuses, one after another. There are church members in many congregations who today make excuses when they are asked to teach a class, serve in some way or other in the church.

The excuses Moses made finally angered God and Moses accepted the challenge and the last forty years of his life became the most fruitful and useful. This one experience of Moses with God changed him all through his difficult years of leadership.

If Moses had not responded to God's call he would have died a herdsman, unknown and having contributed but little to man and God. But because he heeded God's call his life became a blessing to many. God still calls for workers—let us respond when He calls.

LAWTON — Otto Smith, 70, Box 63, Lawton, died Monday at his home. A former Holland resident, Mr. Smith operated a celery farm while in Holland, and was operating a grape vineyard here at the time of his death.

He is survived by his wife, Helen; one daughter, Mrs. Beryl L. Porter of Vacaville, Calif.; two sons, Burton and Leonard both of Holland; five grandchildren.

## Grand Haven Junior High Bids Slated

GRAND HAVEN — Bids will be opened Aug. 4 at 7:30 p.m. by the Board of Education of the Grand Haven school district on the district's new junior high building, which will be erected on South Griffin, near old US-31, Supt. Ralph M. Van Volkinburg announced today.

Final plans were approved by the Board Tuesday after their presentation by Vander Meiden and Koteles, architects. Total cost of the junior high unit was estimated at \$2,150,000, including \$1,586,000 for the building construction, \$250,000 for furnishings and equipment, cost of the 30-acre site and site development. The building will have a capacity of 1,300 students in grades, 7, 8 and 9.

Construction is scheduled to start in August and it is planned to have at least part of the building ready for use by the students in September of next year.

The building will include a planetarium and is the major project of the \$3,400,000 building program approved recently by the voters of the district, which now extends from the Muskegon county line on the north to Port Sheldon on the south, along the east shore of Lake Michigan. The district is now the largest in the county.

The next step in the building program is the additions to several rural schools in the district. The first project, construction of Central elementary school on South Sixth Street in Grand Haven, is 50 per cent complete and will be ready Sept. 1 for use. The building costs \$350,000.

The next regular meeting of the board will be an organization meeting July 6 at 7:30 p.m., when Dr. Frank Groat, recently elected to replace Miller Sherwood, will be seated. Sherwood was honored at a dinner at the Van Volkinburg home Wednesday evening. He has been secretary-treasurer of the board and has been a member eight years.

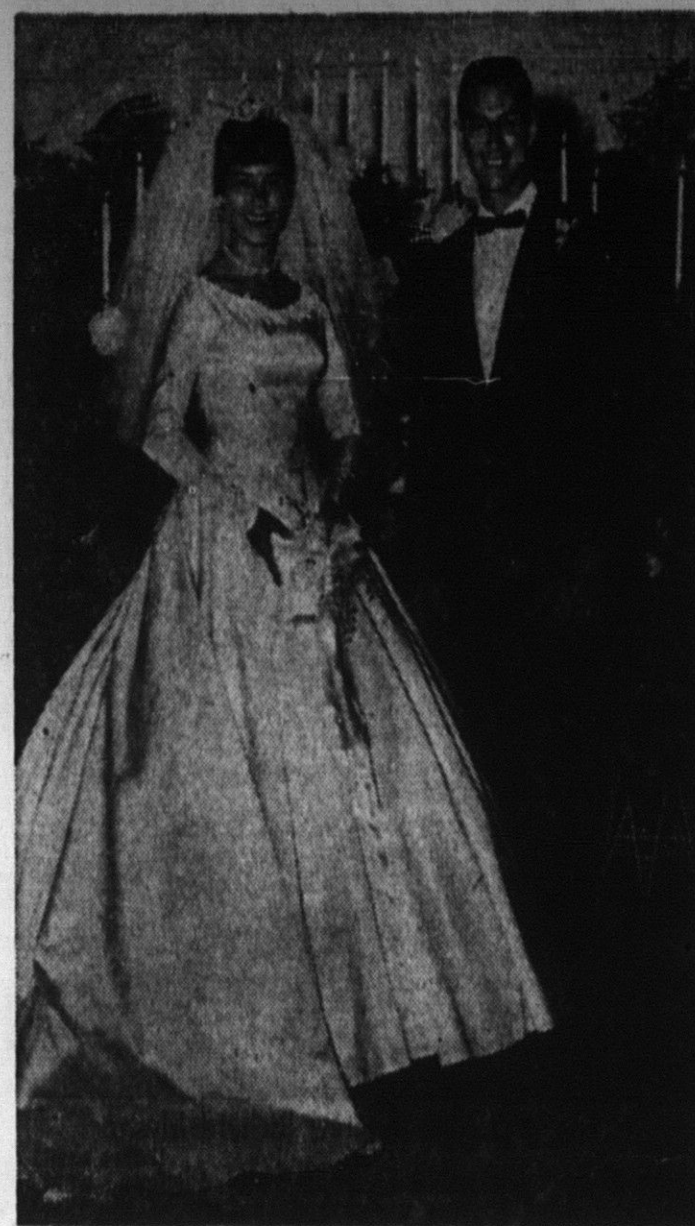

## Summer Tax Bills Mailed Out

Summer tax bills for Holland residents were mailed Tuesday by City Assessor Alwin De Haan, and most of them will be higher than last year's bills.

The higher tax bills are due to an increase in school property tax rates. These rates were raised by a special operating millage issue of \$5.50 per \$1,000 assessed valuation approved by Holland voters March 24.

The special operating millage will provide an additional \$256,000 to the school district, De Haan said. The special operating millage was approved for three years.

Offsetting a part of the increase due to the special operating millage are lower tax rates for city taxes and for regular operating expenses and debt retirement in the school district.

De Haan explained that the lower rates were made possible by an increase of \$1,362,055 in Holland's total assessed valuation for 1964. This means, of course, that the city will have more property value than last year to levy taxes on. It also means that the schools will get about \$9,000 more than original estimates from the special operating millage. De Haan said that most of the increase in valuation was due to new building in the city in the last year.

The increase in assessed valuation will more than offset the increased revenue from property taxes that is needed to meet the 1964-1965 budget, De Haan said. The new budget calls for \$886,731.44 in property tax revenue. The 1963-1964 budget called for \$865,601.86 in revenue from property taxes.

City taxes vary according to whether you live in Ottawa or Allegan County. If you live in Ottawa County your city tax bill will be figured at a rate of \$19.08 for every \$1,000 in assessed valuation. The rate in 1963 was \$18.20 per \$1,000.

Those Holland residents who live in Allegan County will pay city taxes at a rate of \$18.33 for every \$1,000 assessed valuation. This is a decrease of ten cents per \$1,000 valuation over 1963.

The city assessor explained that city taxes are higher in

Ottawa than in Allegan County because of welfare payments. In Allegan County each governmental unit makes separate welfare payments. In Allegan County the payments are made on a county-wide basis. De Haan added that Ottawa County plans to switch to the county-wide system soon.

School tax rates in Holland are quite confusing to figure out because of the division into two counties and debt retirement programs left over from old school districts now annexed to the Holland school district. Also, residents in small parts of New Groningen and Hamilton school districts within the city limits will not receive any school tax bill this summer. School taxes in these districts are levied in the fall, De Haan said.

Holland residents living in Ottawa County will be taxed on one of three rates for school taxes.

For most persons the tax will be figured at a rate of \$5.33 per \$1,000 assessed valuation for debt retirement; \$19.82 per \$1,000 for regular operating expenses. This makes a total of \$30.65 per \$1,000 assessed valuation. The total rate in 1963 was \$25.63 per \$1,000.

—If you live in the old Lakeview school district you will pay a different rate on debt retirement and the same operating and special operating millage. The debt retirement rate here is \$3.47 per \$1,000. The total school tax rate for residents in the old Lakeview district then would be \$28.79 per \$1,000. The rate for Lakeview in 1963 was \$23.63 per \$1,000.

—Residents in the former Van Raalte school district will also pay a different debt retirement millage while paying the same operating and special operating millage. The debt retirement for this old district is \$7.60 per \$1,000. This makes a total tax rate of \$32.92 per \$1,000 assessed valuation compared with a 1963 rate of \$28.23 per \$1,000.

There are also different rates for three former school districts in Allegan County.

—Residents in the former Maplewood and Apple Avenue

districts will pay the same rates. These are \$5.33 per \$1,000 for debt retirement; \$19.53 per \$1,000 for regular operating expenses; and \$5.42 per \$1,000 for special operating millage. The total school tax bill will be \$30.28 per \$1,000 assessed valuation. The 1963 rate for Maplewood district was \$33.86 per \$1,000.

—If you live in the part of the former Lakeview district in Allegan County your school tax rates are: \$3.47 per \$1,000 for debt retirement; \$19.53 per \$1,000 for regular operating millage and \$5.42 per \$1,000 for special operating millage. The total school rate of \$28.42 is higher than the total rate for 1963 of \$21.03 per \$1,000.

Whichever of this assortment of bills you receive will be payable upon receipt. Bills not paid by August 15 will be considered delinquent, and a collection fee of two per cent of the total will be added to the bill after that date. If bills are still delinquent after September 10 the collection fee is raised to six per cent of the total bill. Bills can be paid at the office of City Treasurer Jack Leenhouts in City Hall at anytime from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

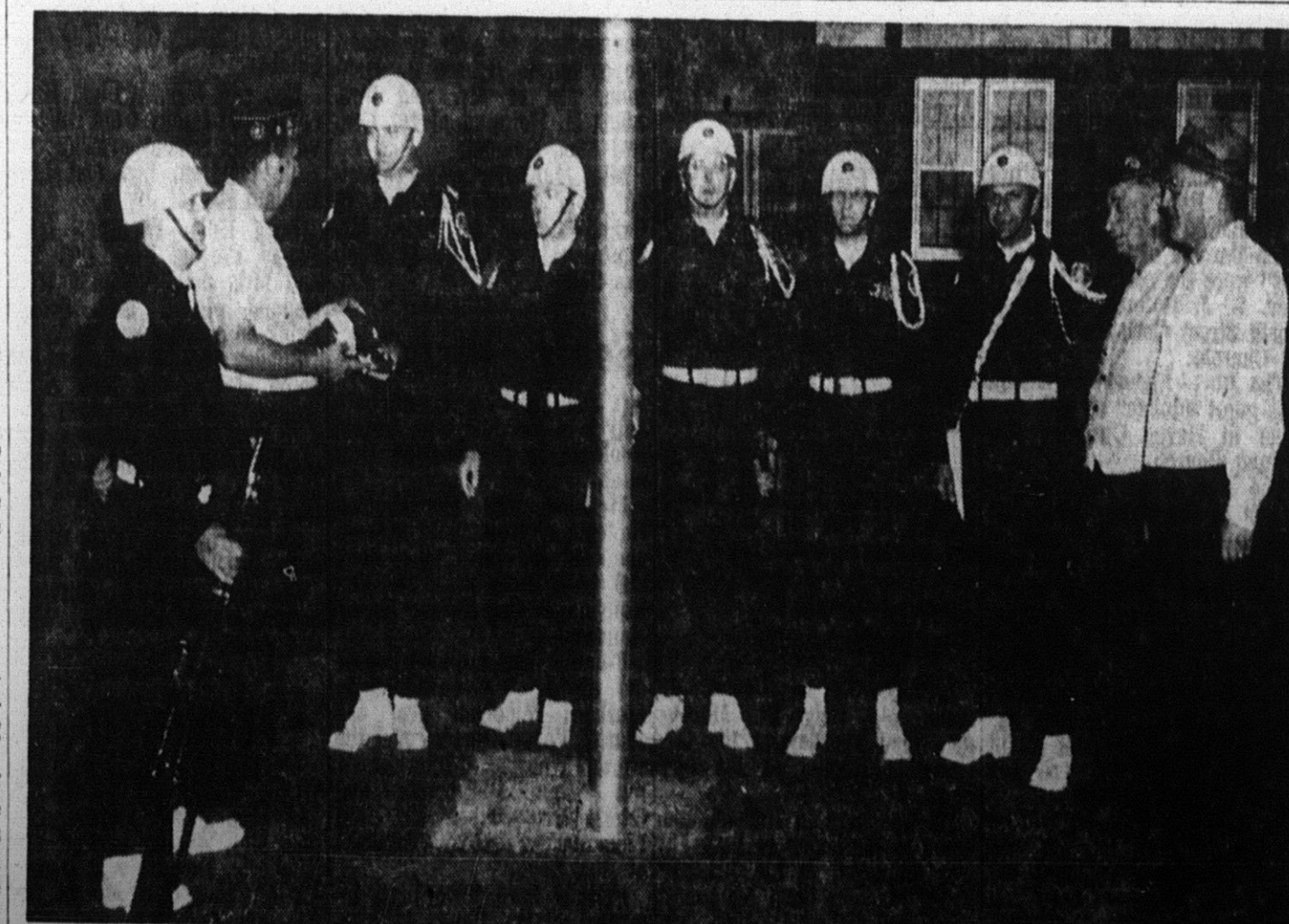

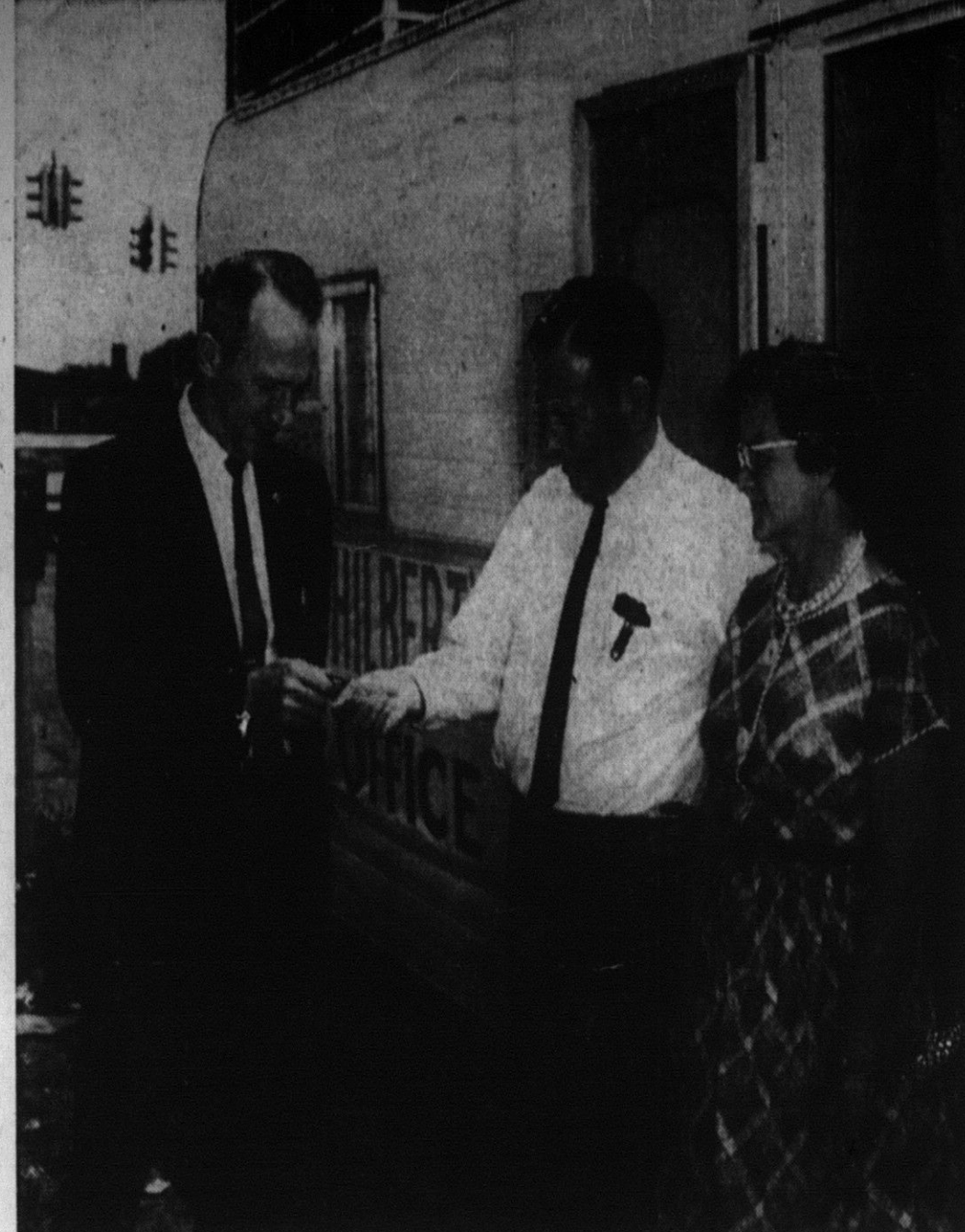

Holland and the immediately surrounding areas are in an excellent position to exert an influence on the world far out of proportion to size and geographical importance. Holland can become a fountainhead of trained and dedicated leaders of the church, the nation and the world of tomorrow if we in Holland will work toward that end. The young people we send out can give the world the values and religious ideals that have been the hallmark of Holland since its founding.

The several school systems in this area can contribute an exciting climate for learning by complementing one another's efforts — by understanding and helping to solve the special problems of each system; by giving our young people an education that is as sound in understanding differing peoples and points of views as it is in providing the basic tools for study and research, thinking and living.

Out of the diversity of educational viewpoints and systems in our midst we need to weld some common purposes that will unite our educational efforts from kindergarten through college. One common purpose can be that of deliberately and self-consciously setting out to produce leaders in every field of endeavor, and through these leaders producing the kind of world that we believe in.

When I consider the staggering amount of brain power, energy and spirit represented by the children and young people who are found in the schools in this area I can only conclude that they have the potential to turn the world upside down, start a new order of things, pull the nations back from the brink of despair and destruction and set them on the road to new attainments.

Consider the thousands of children and young people who attend school in any given year within a ten mile radius of Holland. Who among them are we

consciously stimulating and training to pick up where Einstein left off? Do we as a community recognize in any of them the possible successor to the late C. S. Lewis? To which of our young people have we transmitted the vision of becoming a twentieth century John Calvin, or Thomas Edison? That they are in our midst, quietly growing up cannot be doubted. That some who have grown up among us in the past have made significant contributions is written in the record. That more of them can contribute far more in the future than we are training or stimulating them to do is the burden of my concern. I believe we need to combine our best efforts in cooperatively producing the educational enterprise better to do the job.

But an educational community should be concerned not only with developing leaders who push back the ignorance and impotence of man. It is also concerned with the weak students to make them stronger, the slow of apprehension to make them quicker, the handicapped to give them the skills and attitudes needed for productive active and happy lives.

There is not a person in Holland and the surrounding districts who does not have a stake in a forward looking educational community that sees in its pupils the future great ones as well as the future humble but enlightened ones of church and

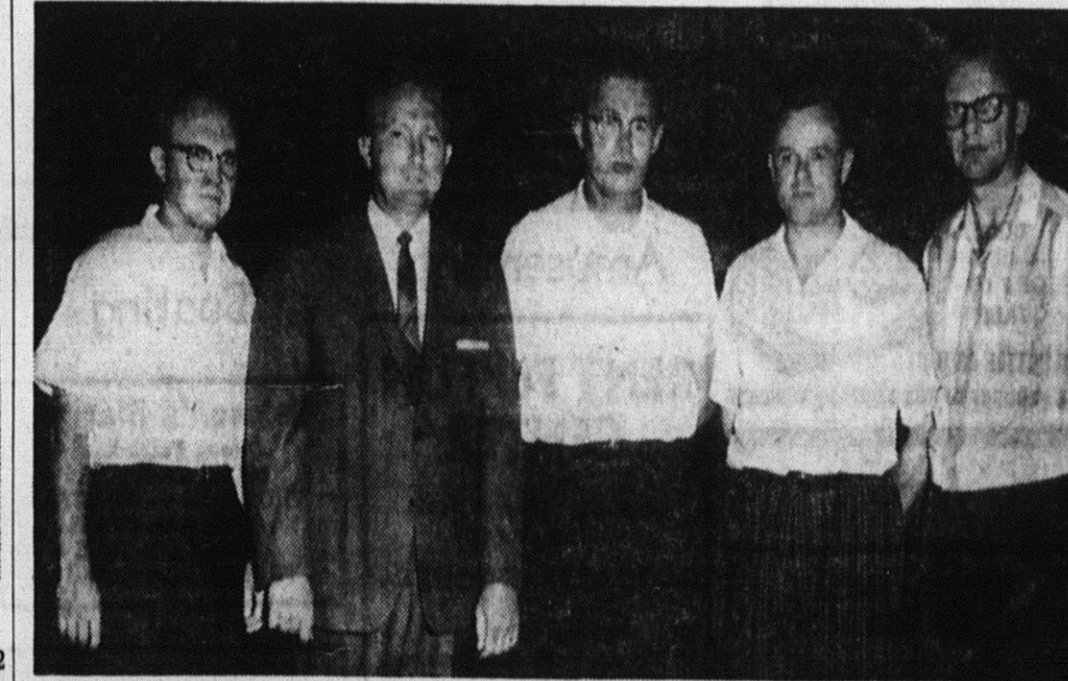
