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## Local Sewer Program Is Abandoned

After a two-hour public hearing on sanitary sewer laterals for the Holland Heights area, City Council abandoned the project Wednesday night and left the desired improvements to the various areas to petition separately.

In abandoning the program, Council made it clear to protesting Heights residents that it could not guarantee prices on future petitions and that in all probability such costs would exceed the \$9.20 cost per foot which Heights residents felt were excessive.

It was the third public hearing in a three-week period which brought record crowds to City Hall. Two previous hearings June 20 and July 3 were on paving South Shore Dr. with about 140 persons attending the first and over 100 the second. One lasted 40 minutes and the other nearly 1½ hours. Wednesday's sewer hearing also had standing room only, with an estimated 140 present.

It was clear at the outset that very few persons favored the sewer installation, and the greater share of the protests concerned the \$9.20 per foot based on firm bid, whereas estimates three months earlier had listed \$4.97 per foot.

City Engineer Harold Derks and City Manager Herb Holt both admitted the city was in error in its estimates as the point was belabored again and again.

A good share of the disgruntled feeling stemmed from the fact that the city adopted a new policy Jan. 1, 1968, changing full costs of sewers to property owners, made necessary by depleted funds in the sewer fund. This put a disproportionate share of costs on the proposed sewers whereas residents whose property abuts streets where the interceptors were installed are charged the old rate which ran about \$2.50 per foot.

Charles Hook of Moore and Bruggink, Grand Rapids consultants, spoke of comparable installations in Kentwood, Walker, Wyoming, Grandville and Grand Rapids at costs considerably higher than the quoted Heights figure.

It was pointed out that the city street department lays sanitary sewers in Holland with most areas presenting fewer problems with water and clay than Holland Heights. The concept that doing the entire Heights project at the same time should result in a cheaper price unfortunately proved untrue when the job was put up for bid since the city had not the necessary equipment or staff for the Heights project which calls for some excavations deeper than 12 feet.

City Manager Holt said perhaps many Heights residents were not aware that the quoted price included installation of sewer stubs to the property line accounting for perhaps 25 per cent of the cost.

There was considerable confusion in understanding methods of assessment which covers cost of laying the pipe, manhole covers, backfill, yard repair and perhaps mailbox replacement.

It also was doubtful whether a share of the audience understood the terms interceptors, laterals, assessments, assessable footage, interest on unpaid balance, plant operation, sewer service costs.

Answering a charge of democratic procedures in "forcing sewers on us," Councilman Alvin Dyk pointed out that the program has been in the making for four years, mainly on request of Heights residents. He asked for a show of hands of those signing petitions requesting the service, and a good number went up. Then he asked who wanted the service now, and some eight to 10 hands rose. This seemed to cement feeling among Councilmen to drop the project.

Indiana authorities said the car swerved across the median strip of the Indiana Toll Road and crashed into a bridge east of Michigan City, Ind.

Mr. and Mrs. Le Poire were members of First Christian Reformed Church. They were in the flower growing business.

Surviving them are seven sons, Bernie of Marshalltown, Ia., Roger, Harvey, Marvin and George all of Zeeland, Donald of Holland and Henrydale of Hudsonville; three daughters, Mrs. A. Junior (Frances) Schreur of Oakland, Mrs. Edward (Wilma) Bowman and Marilyn Morren both of Zeeland; and 24 grandchildren.

## Electric Shock Stuns Brakeman

A young Grand Rapids man was admitted to Holland Hospital early Wednesday for observation after being stunned by an electric shock of 600 volts.

He is 22-year-old Thomas Braden who was brakeman on a Chesapeake and Ohio freight train that was bound for Chicago when the accident occurred at 12:10 a.m. Wednesday near the 21st St. railroad crossing.

Holland police reported Braden was regulating an insulator on one of the three diesels of the Grand Rapids-to-Chicago freight when the switch shorted out. It was thought the insulator may have been wet from a leaking water hose.

Police said Braden managed to pull the air brake to stop the train. The engineer backed the train to the Eighth St. crossing and Braden was taken to Holland Hospital.

Hospital officials said Braden was held for observation and had complained of a headache. He was released later the same day.

## Boy Drowns At Holland State Park

A 5-year-old suburban Grand Rapids boy drowned Wednesday afternoon when he slipped and fell into the channel between Lake Macatawa and Lake Michigan at Holland State Park.

He is Mark Faber, son of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Faber of 7073 Martin St., who slipped and fell in the water at the end of the channel while playing on some rocks at 3:22 p.m. Wednesday.

The body was recovered by skindivers from the Ottawa county sheriff's department at 5:38 p.m.

Assisting in the search were three members of the research diving team of the University of Michigan and three boats from the Ottawa sheriff's department and the U.S. Coast Guard at Holland.

The body was recovered in seven to 10 feet of water about 30 feet from where the boy fell, deputies reported.

Dr. William-Westrate of Holland was called as medical examiner and ruled death due to accidental drowning.

The body was taken to DeVries Mortuary in Grand Rapids.

## Council Approves South Shore Dr. Paving

After a public hearing lasting nearly 1½ hours on paving a two-mile stretch of South Shore Dr., City Council voted 6-2 to order in the paving at a regular meeting Wednesday night.

Casting dissenting votes were Councilmen Bertal Slagh and Mayor Nelson Bosman. Voting aye were Councilmen Alvin Dyk, Donald D. Oosterbaan, Hollis Clark, L.W. Lamb Jr., Morris Peerbolt and Robert Dykstra. Councilman Jacob Smith was absent. Because there had been written objections, a two-thirds vote was necessary to carry.

Wednesday's hearing had been adjourned from two weeks ago when 140 persons crowded into Council Chambers in City Hall to protest what was termed excessive costs for a street improvement not desired. That hearing lasted 40 minutes.

Atty. Peter S. Boter again represented South Shore property owners present in numbers close to 100. He said he would not belabor facts brought out two weeks ago, and gave main emphasis to assessments which he deemed unfair and inequitable which would prove detrimental rather than beneficial.

After Council's decision to approve the paving, South Shore residents gathered in the conference on the third floor of City Hall for a further conference.

It appeared they will resort to court action.

Before the vote was taken, Mayor Bosman said another hearing on assessment rolls would be scheduled before construction work would begin. This hearing would give property owners opportunity to register objections on assessments.

Before the hearing was thrown open to the public, the city clerk read communications from Adrian Koert, traffic consultant, indicating the desirability of improving South Shore Dr. in terms of safety and attractiveness; and from City Engineer Harold Derks showing the necessity of implementing the improvement by the method proposed. On the basis of these two reports, City Manager Herb Holt said there is little question that the improvement will be of substantial benefit to both the city at large and to property owners abutting South Shore Dr.

A report from City Assessor Alvin De Haan stated that private benefit to properties along South Shore Dr. will be at least equal to the amount special assessed.

Information submitted stated plans for a 28-foot paved roadway with two-foot curbs on each side for a total of 32 feet. Drawings call for the 32-foot roadway to expand at five intersections along Graafschap Rd. to

## Board Ekes Tiny Margin In the Black

Holland school district ended its 1967-68 school year with a balance just under \$2,000, the Board of Education was informed at its monthly meeting Monday night in the Holland High School library.

Treasurer Harvey Buter said, pending an audit, the balance is \$1,918.69 out of a total annual budget of \$2,773,599.62. The balance as of June 30, 1968, listed \$51,348.60 but encumbered funds for approved summer maintenance items list \$38,574, along with \$4,256 for the field-house roof repair, and \$6,600 for purchase of the Oetman property near the high school.

Buter also said audits are being done on books for Federal and Harrington school districts which officially became part of the Holland district July 1, pending possible appeal until July 15 on Circuit Judge Chester A. Ray's opinion ruling on the district merger.

With the addition of the two districts, total assessment of the enlarged Holland district exceeds \$100 million for the first time. Buter listed a total assessment of \$102,889.21.

Buter who was Holland's representative on the Ottawa County Tax Allocation committee reported school millage set this year at 10.445 mills, which will be the rate for the new areas annexed to Holland district as well as in the current district. This rate also affects the Allegan county portion of the school district, hereafter a part of Holland school district which is a part of the Ottawa Area Intermediate School District.

The need for fixed millage in Ottawa county was cited, and a d Supt. Donald L. Ihman was instructed to consult other superintendents of K-12 districts in Ottawa county to determine how to proceed on petitioning the county Board of Supervisors.

The 10.445 millage is the current school tax rate for the Holland district. In addition, summer tax bills will include the 10 mill levy approved in the special election April 2. The enlarged district will vote Sept. 6 on transportation millage calling for 1½ mills for three years. If passed, this millage will appear on the winter tax bills.

The school census report listed 9,630 persons under 20 years of age in the local district, down 199 from the 1967 total of 9,829. It was pointed out that the reduction is in keeping with a trend all over the country, and that the decline in Holland is less than the national average. The census revealed that 346 babies were added to the census last May and 498 who reached the age of 20 were removed.

But Holland will exceed the 10,000 mark with the addition of Federal and Harrington districts. Harrington brings approximately 800 under 20 and Federal about 400.

Contracts for four new teachers were approved. Mrs. Juna Hoekman, a 1961 Calvin College graduate with nine years of experience, will teach half days at Maplewood school. She served as a substitute for a time the past year.

Richard Rasmussen, a Wayne State graduate with 15 years of experience, will teach in Lakeview School. Sidney J. Tremml, a 1968 graduate of Western Michigan, will teach printing and journalism in Holland High School, and Rein Wolfert, a 1968 graduate of Grand Valley State College, will teach senior high German.

Supt. Ihman said only three or four vacancies exist in the teaching staff for the coming year. Two are in special education and one for an elementary librarian.

Attention was called to a public hearing before City Council Aug. 7 on vacating a portion of College Ave. in the vicinity of the new Maplewood School.

President James O. Lamb welcomed Charles Bradford, new board member, to his first board meeting. He succeeds Russel Fredricks who did not seek reelection. Absent at Monday's meeting were John Keuning and Dale Mossburg.

## June Was Warm, Wet In Holland

Warm weather and lots of rain marked Holland's weather during June, bringing a total of 5.40 inches of precipitation, the heaviest June downpour in several years.

Except for a half inch of rain on June 1 and a few traces in mid-month, all the rain fell from April 18 to the end of the month, according to records compiled by Lynn Wheaton, official weather observer.

Heaviest rain during a 24-hour period measured 1.14 inches June 25, followed by 1.02 inches the following day.

Heavy rain June 21 measured .65 inch and was accompanied by a severe weather watch and marble-sized hailstones.

Worst storm of the season hit Saturday, June 29, dumping .69 inch of rain in winds up to 60 miles an hour. The brunt of this storm struck north of Holland, hitting Port Sheldon area, the Grand Haven tri-city area and Coopersville. Thousands of trees were down in Ottawa county and the cleanup still continues.

Hot weather hit the 90s for the first time this year, registering 91 degrees June 8. It was the only 90-degree reading for the month. In 1965, the June high was 93, in 1964 it was 94 and in 1963, 95 degrees.

A low of 43 was recorded June 20.

Average temperature for June was 66.9 degrees or 2.5 degrees above normal. The average maximum was 77.6 and the average minimum 56.2.

The rainfall of 5.40 inches was 2.54 inches above normal. Rain fell on 16 days.



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
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## FREEDOM IS SO FRAGILE

There is something about freedom that is very fragile and we have a good chance of losing freedom when we get a distorted notion of what it really is. A good example of what we mean is the noisy demonstration that kept candidate George Wallace from making a speech in Minneapolis.

We hold no special arguments for the candidacy of Mr. Wallace but we are interested in the principle involved, for what diminishes ours. And we intend to put up a fight for that which is our heritage, a heritage the American press knows as the backbone of its very existence.

It is a very quick step from demonstration and dissent to an infringement of the rights of others. Those who in the past have taken over classrooms, offices, public buildings and other facilities did this in the name of freedom but seemed to care very little for the rights and freedoms of others. Now in this same vain we have people who refuse others the right to speak in public forums.

We had better not kid ourselves. This kind of restraint of freedom brought in some of the most repressive regimes of Europe, and ultimately it will do the same here. What seems so ironic is that the beginnings of a repression of freedom to speak in the public forum has come from people in colleges and universities, institutions that have always claimed to be bastions of free expression.

Our problem seems to be that we have the notion that certainty of our cause gives us the right to do as we please. Nothing could be more dangerous. Dictators have always had a similar notion.

It may well be that those who in this instance kept Wallace from speaking actually have a great deal in common with him — both want their own notions of law and order.

To be free means that we will know and abide by the basic principles of freedom, freedom for all men to express their opinions in the public forum.

The service is a private enterprise and operated at no cost to the taxpayers. It is not subsidized by the county or any of the cities.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, July 14  
Exiled in Babylon  
Lamentations 5:1-7, 15-22  
By C. P. Dame

Lamentations is composed of five chapters, each chapter is a poem, the last poem is a prayer. The book portrays the sad condition of the Jewish nation after it had been captured by the Babylonians. Some of the exiles in Babylon were bitter, some were penitent, and some were indifferent and made the most of the situation. The people who were left in Palestine felt humiliated and acknowledged their sins. The book reveals the penitent spirit of the defeated people.

I. Sin has its tragic consequences. This history teaches plainly. "Remember, O Lord, what has come upon us, and behold our reproach" — or our disgrace. A people who feel disgraced are not happy. The prophets had warned the nation but to no avail. Finally the day of reckoning came. The ten tribes were carried into exile by the Assyrians in 722 B.C. but this did not wake up Judah which in 587 B.C. was brought into captivity by the Babylonians. Some captives in Babylon realized why disaster had come upon them. They thought about their troubles.

"Our inheritance is turned over to strangers." God had given the land to them but others lived in their homeland. The exiles in Babylon pictured the strangers occupying their land. The poor who were still there were ordered around by people from without, they were even compelled to pay for the water they drank and the wood they needed. The nation as a whole was under the yoke of a foreign ruler. Their women were ravished, their children were mistreated, their leaders dishonored, and their situation hopeless. "Our fathers have sinned, and are not, and we have born their iniquities" — they blamed the previous generation for their ills, just as some young people do today.

II. It is good for individuals and nations to confess their sins. The exiles in Babylon bemoaned their lot. They said, "The crown is fallen from our head," their glory had departed. They realized why as the words, "woe unto us, that we have sinned" indicate. Both they and their fathers had sinned. There is always reason for hope when sin is confessed but when only excuses are made no wholesome change will come to pass.

III. Faith in God upholds people. These guilty people prayed to God. They couldn't do anything better. Chastened Judah affirmed its faith in God who "dost reign forever" and whose "throne endures to all generations." Faith in a sovereign God blesses and sustains. The words, "Turn Thou unto Thee, and we shall be turned; renew our days as of old," reveal a fine spirit. When people feel in their hearts and say with their lips that they are facing a perplexing situation, which seems hopeless, and then pray to God and beseech Him to turn them to Him there is great hope.



## New District Court Hailed In Allegan

ALLEGAN — Allegan area's legal community is looking forward to Allegan county's new District Court System which is scheduled to go in effect Jan. 1.

Signed into effect by Gov. Romney June 17, the new law will abolish Allegan's controversial Municipal Court and the county justice court system and replace it with one district judge and a yet undetermined number of magistrates.

Without a municipal judge since 1965, the city has had to depend on a system of set fines for traffic and meter violations which are payable at City Hall, and referred cases with a plea of not guilty to a local justice.

Criticized for lack of a municipal judge, the city had been unable to fill the post because of a lack of funds for salaries.

State funds will be used to pay \$18,000 of the new judge's salary and local authorities — in this case, the county — can boost the figure to \$27,500, the limit proposed by law.

According to Prosecutor George Grieg, the new system will evidence many improvements over the present justice court system.

"The new court," he said, "will have court rules and procedures spelled out by the Michigan Supreme Court which will provide more orderly trial and pre-trial procedures resulting in speedier disposition of criminal as well as civil matter. Also, the district judge will be an attorney versed in trial procedure and the various rules of evidence. In general, the court will be a much more formal court than the present justice court system provides.

Other improvements cited by Grieg will be the court's jurisdiction over all misdemeanors. Justice courts currently cannot handle high court misdemeanors, those carrying a fine or sentence over 1 year or \$1,000.

Statute also provides that the district court will sit at the county seat and in each city having a population of 3,250 or more, in Allegan's case, county court facilities probably will be used.

However advantageous, the new court system still poses a number of unanswered questions. The answers to these will probably take form during the coming months, Grieg said, as the Supreme Court will be formulating rules and procedures under which the district court will be operating.
