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## Sewer Site Factors Reviewed

GRAND HAVEN—City Council has issued a statement indicating its concern over anxiety expressed by Grand Haven township residents living near the Memorial Airpark, proposed site of the Spring Lake-Grand Haven-Eagle-Ottawa sewer treatment plant.

The statement reads: "The council and members of the Grand Haven-Spring Lake sewer authority have also been concerned about the location of the plant and we want residents to be aware of the factors which were considered in selecting the site of the airport property, just north of Hayes Road on 168th Ave., old 'Holland Road.'"

The statement continues: "We have been assured by our consulting engineers that the location on the airport will not interfere with the continued operation of the airport. We have not received formal approval from the State or Federal Government for locating the Wastewater Plant on airport property at this time. We have not been able to request approval because we have not completed the detailed design for the new plant."

"At a recent meeting with City Council, L. C. Andrews, assistant director, Michigan Aeronautic's Commission, advised members of Council and the City Airpark Board that industrial plants and other facilities are being constructed on airport property in other communities."

"The city consulting engineer considered many sites for the new Wastewater Treatment facility which must be constructed for our city. They analyzed in detail the following six sites: the existing Sewage Treatment Plant site in Grand Haven; a site on the city owned island property; a site on a privately owned island located in the Grand River; a site located near Eagle-Ottawa bounded roughly by the rear lot lines of lots facing on Beechtree and Pennoyer to the Grand River; the 30 acres acquired by the city connecting the city to the airport; and the site located on the airport in the triangle formed by Hayes Road, the north-south runway, and the northwest-southeast runway."

"The report prepared by the consulting engineers of the site evaluation assigns a numeric point system to each of the items considered."

"The site evaluation considered four major criteria: locations available; the type of construction at each location; the value of the pipe transportation system involved; and considerations. Considerations were broken down into four major categories: environmental; initial cost; operating efficiencies; expandability and its long term location with respect to a greatly enlarged urban area."

"In considering the environmental factor, a total of 19 different items were included. In the total category, the airport property was the best site. In terms of priority points, it was 32 points higher than the second best site which was the 30 acres acquired by the city north of

TORONTO (UPI) — An Allegan native was among the 108 persons killed in the flaming crash of an Air Canada DC 8 near Toronto Airport Sunday.

Dwight Smith, 24-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Smith, 245 Grove St., Allegan, Mich., was returning to California after spending a week with a boyfriend friend, Robert Purkey, in Montreal.

Smith who had been working for a brokerage firm in San Francisco is a graduate of Allegan High School where he had been active in sports. He spent three years with the U.S. Army, 2½ of them in Germany, before settling on the west coast. He had planned to enter the University of California at Berkeley in the fall to study business administration.

Purkey, the youth he was visiting, was scheduled to be married today in Montreal.

## Koning's Widow Receives Medal

## Brother Of Local Man Is Drowned

RACINE, Wis. — Memorial services are planned here Friday for Dr. Lawrence Gearhart, 42, and his son Lawrence Jr., about 13, who drowned last Friday in a boating mishap on Lake Michigan. It was learned in Holland, Mich., Tuesday.

Another son, Jeff, 10, clung to a life preserver for 17 hours before being rescued Saturday by the Coast Guard.

Dr. Gearhart, a veterinarian in Racine, was the brother of Dr. E. F. Gearhart of Holland, now with the Hope College Vienna Summer school and who will return to Michigan in the fall as chairman of the Foreign Language Department at Grand Valley State College.

The bodies of Dr. Gearhart and his son were not immediately recovered from Lake Michigan. A spokesman for the family said details of the incident with the boat were not clear but it was believed the boat was swamped or capsized in the lake off Racine.

Survivors include the widow, Nancy, of Racine; his mother in Holland, Mrs. Mildred Gearhart, widow of 212 East Seventh St.; a brother in Wheaton, Ill., and a sister in Kalamazoo.

GRAND RAPIDS — Mrs. Marcia E. Koning of 333 East Lakewood Blvd., Holland, widow of Sgt. Douglas L. Koning, who was killed February 2 in Vietnam action, received the Silver Star award for gallantry presented to Koning posthumously by the army in ceremonies Wednesday at the U.S. Army Reserve Center.

Sgt. Koning, 25, a 1964 graduate of Holland Christian High School, was cited for "gallantry in action against an armed hostile force" in Vietnam.

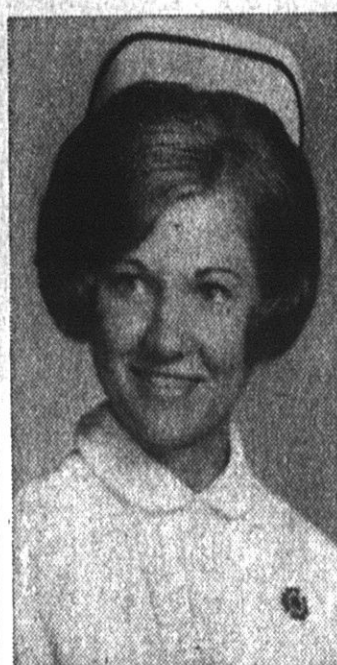
According to the citation, Koning was a platoon sergeant near Huan Hoi when his men came under intense hostile automatic weapons fire from a well concealed enemy force.

Regrouping his men after destroying the emplacement, Koning spotted a wounded comrade and swiftly moved to the side of the soldier and administered first aid. After carrying the man to a rear location, Sgt. Koning returned to begin an assault on remaining enemy bunkers. During the action he was mortally wounded.

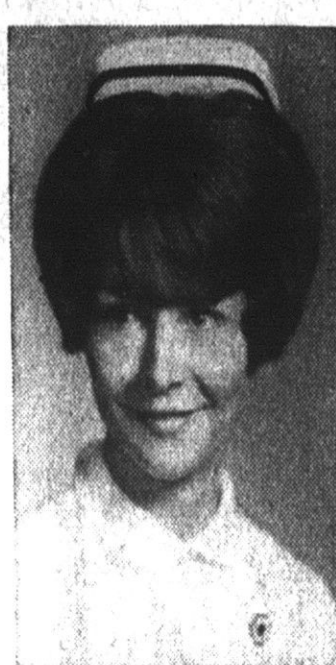
The citation said "his courageous and timely actions were directly responsible for saving the life of his fellow soldier and served as an inspiration to the remainder of the unit."

In addition to the Silver Star award, Koning was awarded the Bronze Star, the Army Commendation Medal, the Purple Heart and the Good Conduct Medal.

Koning was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Koning of 43 East 30th St. He had arrived in Vietnam in October, 1969.



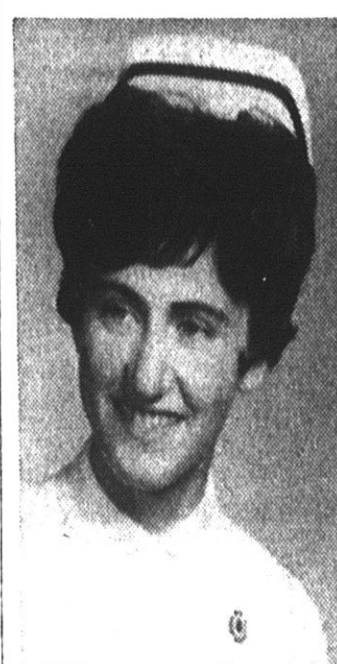

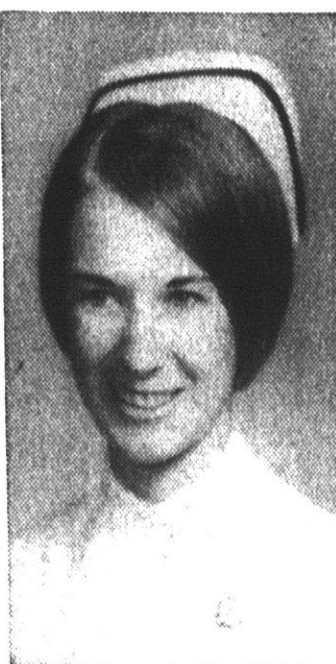

## Search Continues For Assailant In Coin Robbery

ALLEGAN — Authorities continued their search today for a man wanted in connection with the beating and robbery Wednesday of Fred Lemley who lost a coin collection valued at \$15,000 while in a bank.

Authorities said Lemley, 34, a former employee of the First National Bank and Trust Co. of Michigan branch office who has been saving coins several years, made an appointment with a man to show him the collection at the bank for possible purchase of some coins.

Lemley met a man, whose name was being withheld by authorities, in the bank at 11:45 a.m. Wednesday after Lemley withdrew the collection from a safety deposit vault.

Authorities said Lemley was struck over the head as he walked with the man up a rear stairway to a second floor office and was relieved of the collection.

The thief apparently ran down the stairs, out a rear door to a car parked near the rear of the bank and sped away.

Lemley's wife said her husband had worked at the bank about 10 years before leaving it three years ago. He started his coin collection while working at the bank.

Lemley, a car salesman, was treated at the Allegan Health Center for a head injury.

## 3 Await Exam On Drugs

GRAND HAVEN—Three 19-year-olds from Hazelcrest, Ill., are being held on \$1,000 bond each in Ottawa county jail here awaiting Circuit Court appearance on July 13 on charges of possession of marijuana.

Thomas Freedom, Dan Eichelkraut and Stephen Putman waived exam on the charge at their arraignment in district court here Friday.

All three pleaded guilty to a charge of possession of fireworks for which each was sentenced to pay \$10 fine and \$18 costs. Each was sentenced to pay \$25 fine and \$38 costs on charges of being minors in possession.

## June Weather Near Average

## Air Clears, No Action Taken in Sewer Confab

No action was taken and no real decisions made, but the air cleared in a meeting lasting two hours and 20 minutes Tuesday night in the Holland Hospital Heritage room on Holland city's proposed plans for additional sewage treatment facilities, challenged June 23 when the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners asked federal agencies to withhold matching funds temporarily awaiting plans for a county-wide system on the spray irrigation concept.

Among the 47 persons present were nearly all members of the county board, Holland City Council, Holland Board of Public Works, consultants of both Bauer Engineering working on a county feasibility plan and Black and Veatch who designed the Holland plant, and the Michigan Department of Health.

For the first hour and a half, the discussion was extremely polite, the city representatives conversed with down-to-earth items as costs, deadlines, commitments and the like, and the county group discussing long-range concepts.

Then for close to an hour, the discussion was more down-to-earth with questions and answers (or lack of them) closer to the core of the problem.

At the close of the meeting, Mayor Nelson Bosman expressed the hope that the county commissioners would reconsider its previous action and allow Holland to proceed with its plans. The next meeting is July 13.

City Manager William L. Bopf carried the ball for Holland, and

William L. Kennedy, county board chairman, served as coordinator for the county presentation.

It appeared that a share of the county commissioners were not aware of timetables and deadlines that the city is committed to in having its new plant in operation by December, 1972, nor of the fact that Holland already has spent \$175,000 on engineering studies and plans for the facility slated to provide secondary treatment and phosphate removal.

Last August, Holland voters approved a \$1,230,000 bond issue to defray part of the cost of providing secondary treatment and phosphorus removal at the existing plant. Any change in system would require a new vote, Bopf said.

Bopf also quoted Ralph Purdy, executive secretary of the Michigan Water Resources Commission, who said Holland's current plan is a timely answer to the pollution problem and that the system could be capable of being linked to a county-wide system later. Bopf, Mayor Bosman, BPW President Henry S. Maentz and Supt. Guy Bell and a representative of Black and Veatch were in Lansing Tuesday morning to consult Purdy who gave no indication the 1972 deadline could be extended.

Bopf said Purdy expressed concern that three Michigan communities planning pollution control systems are being challenged, whereas many communities have done nothing to correct existing problems.

William Bauer of Bauer Engineering which is conducting a

feasibility study in Ottawa county on the living filter-spray irrigation concept, said he could not at this time present cost estimates but pointed to the \$29 million Muskegon program. He said Muskegon also is committed to an operating date in 1972 and he figured a smaller but similar system for Holland would lag by some six months.

He said test borings in Ottawa county are much like Muskegon's, and he added the regional system for Muskegon would cost Muskegon city less than if the city designed its own system.

The regional Muskegon plant would require some 15,000 acres, compared with some 800 acres for a Holland-Zeeland plant. Bopf mentioned that land costs are not provided in federal and state grants, but Tom De Pree, a Holland member of the county board and chairman of the county planning group, said Sen. Gary Byker informed him such a bill has passed both House and Senate. De Pree also was of the opinion that secondary treatment is not effective, a statement sharply challenged by some city representatives.

Tom Washbotten of the Michigan Department of Health outlined standards of his department on waste water treatment.

R. V. Terrill, county board member and former city manager of Grand Haven, said it was unfortunate that current differences seem to end up comparing two engineering firms. He said when he cast his vote June 23 he did not understand the situation and advised

the board to give serious consideration to Holland's problem. He added Grand Haven was about to have a "civil war" of its own on a site for its proposed treatment plant.

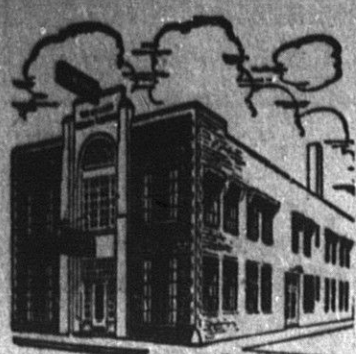
County Board Chairman Kennedy gave a concise rundown on the spray irrigation method and mentioned some six locations for such plants in the county. (1) Grand Haven trillies area, (2) Holland-Zeeland, (3) Jenison-Hudsonville (some pipe currently being laid for treatment in Grandville), (4) existing lagoon system in Allendale serving Grand Valley State College and community, (5) small existing lagoon system in Marne, (6) Coopersville.

Holland Councilman Morris Peerbolt chided the county board for its action. He said Council has not always seen eye-to-eye with the Board of Public Works but after five years of study on this project the vote was unanimous.

"You have scuttled it," he said. "I was in favor of turning over the entire program to you and let you solve all our problems, but Council wouldn't go for it, I have heard nothing positive tonight other than the Bauer engineer say the spray irrigation system can be done. What should we do?"

Throughout the discussion, there was no criticism over the effectiveness of the spray irrigation concept, only practical difficulties, and Mayor Bosman quipped at the close of the meeting, "when you get your system working, we'll send you all the effluent you want."





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### STUDENTS IN POLITICS

In the course of voting on the President's education bill the other day, Edward Gurney of Florida proposed that the Senate prohibit colleges and universities from closing down to give students a chance to campaign in the fall elections. The proposal was greeted with loud boos. So it seems that the great majority of senators are on the bandwagon, and with November Elections in mind, all of them gung-ho for the rights of students.

Certainly all citizens should be interested and engaged in politics. It is one of the obligations of all citizens. Most citizens, however, have to do their politicking on their own time; their bosses don't give them time off to go out touting their political favorites. Not so with students, if schools persist in giving them campaign vacations. It occurs to us that this may be giving students an advantage that cannot be extended to most of the rest of the electorate in the country. In fact, this amounts to giving the students unequal time.

It is not inconceivable that if campaign vacations for students becomes a part of the political pattern in this country, that we may be on our way to bi-annual vacations for everybody to do his political thing.

The vocal senators who turned down Gurney's proposal with such enthusiasm perhaps should reflect on the implications of their decision. There might be a lot more here than immediately meets the eye, and a great deal that the senators won't like very much if this thing grows to its natural conclusions.

## 3 Appear In Court

GRAND HAVEN—Three men apprehended Saturday by Ottawa county sheriff's deputies are in the county jail here today in connection with various charges stemming from a chase and chain of events that also involved police from Zeeland, Hudsonville and Wyoming.

James Earl Sondborn, 26, of Wyoming, driver of the car, demanded examination on a charge or resisting an officer when he was arraigned in Grand Haven District Court Monday. Bond of \$2,500 was not furnished. He pleaded not guilty to a charge of leaving the scene of a property damage accident and bond of \$50 was not furnished.

Merle Paul Fasthorse, 18, of Grand Rapids, demanded examination on a charge of resisting arrest and was unable to furnish bond of \$1,000.

George Mercer, 24, also of Grand Rapids, was charged with being disorderly-drunk, and unable to pay \$15 fine and \$28 costs was committed to Ottawa county jail for 15 days.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, July 12  
Creation, God's Handiwork  
Genesis 1:31; 2:4-9;  
I Corinthians 6:4-6  
By C. P. Dame

As our knowledge of our world increases our appreciation of God's wisdom and power and goodness also ought to increase but this does not happen. This lesson teaches that God created and sustains and rules this universe.

I. God approved of His work of creation. It was very good. The first chapter of Genesis mentions the name of God 32 times in 31 short verses. The chapter makes it clear that this universe came into being through the wisdom and power of God and not through a material force. After God had finished His work it was free from all imperfections, ills or evils of any kind. Pollution was not a problem.

The word "day" is used variously in the Bible. Sometimes it refers to a period of time, sometimes to a day of 24 hours. God who is omnipotent could create this universe in a week but science reveals that creation took a long, long time. The truth to emphasize is that God created it and keeps it going.

II. God created man and placed him on this world. Genesis one tells about God's relationship to the universe and Genesis two speaks of His relationship to man. Some one aptly said that in Genesis one we have creation in outline and in chapter two in detail. The word "generations" is understood better if the word "history" is used. When the earth was ready for man God created him, "formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul."

Two facts note. God created man from the dust, which indicated that man is related to the physical universe and in addition made of man a living soul which linked him to God. And then God put man in a garden which He had created for him. In this garden was a tree "of the knowledge of good and evil" from which he was forbidden to eat and another tree called "the tree of life." Observe that much more was permitted than forbidden.

III. God is one. In the Corinthian church some people thought it was wrong to eat meat that had been offered to idols. Fire Chief Penna said the fire may have started from a brush fire. The department received the call at 11 a.m. and the firemen were at the scene until 12:30 p.m.

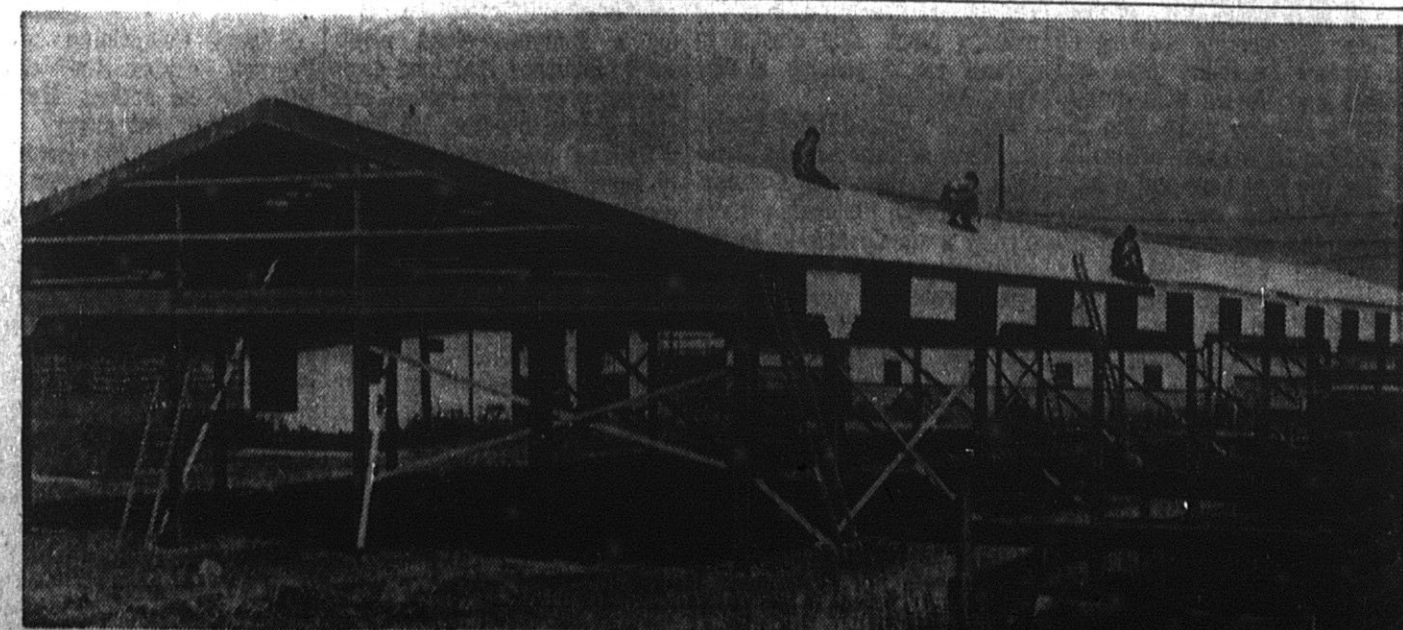

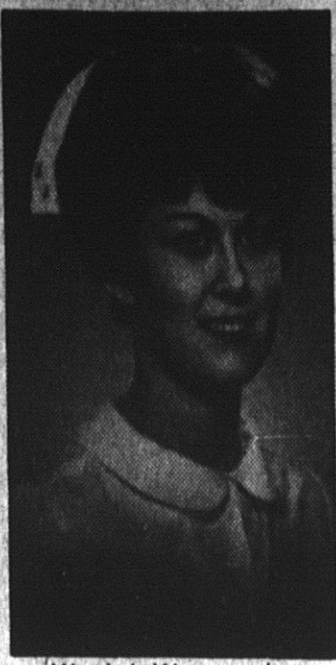

"Also 4 sides oak tanned leather, 1 dozen wooden pitchforks, 1 32-caliber rifle, bullet molds and power horn, 50 gallons of soft ham, bacon and lard, 40 gallons of sorghum molasses, 6 head fox hounds all soft mouthed but one.

"At same time I will sell my six Negro slaves, two men 35 and 50 years old, two boys 12 and 18, 2 mulatto wenches 40 and 30 years old. Will sell together to same party as I will not separate them.

"My home is two miles south of Versailles, eKentucky. Sale will begin at 8 o'clock a.m. Plenty to eat and drink."

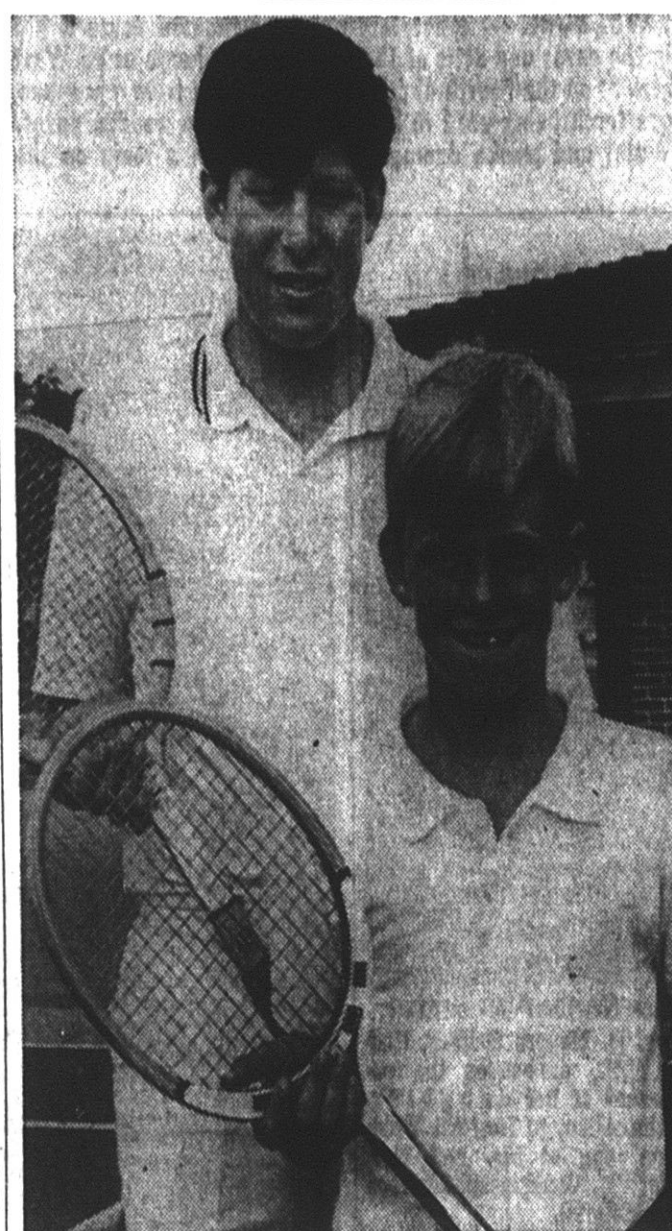

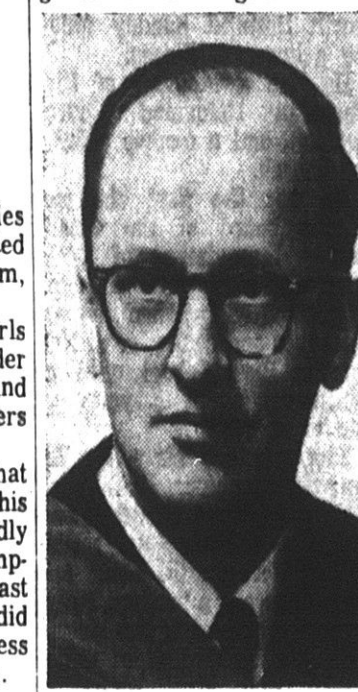

## History of Third Church Is Fascinating Story

A new book, "The Americanization of a Congregation," by Dr. Elton J. Bruins of Hope College, relates the story of the century-old Third Reformed Church of Holland in the light of turning from a Dutch congregation into an English church.

Commissioned as part of its centennial year program, the book shows a remarkable sensitivity to all aspects of the early history of the Holland colony, its founding by the Dutch group headed by Dr. A. C. Van Raalte, its deep devotion to the church and to education, and to the differences inherent in the people of Dutch descent. While most of these differences are a matter of degree, the reactions of these people in the century elapsed were serious indeed, and the author's treatment of many situations which spawn memories is handled in good taste, at times even with a touch of humor.

Third Church was remarkable in that it was a "liberal" church as compared with the more conservative First Reformed Church or the Christian Reformed Church, and had little or no rivalry with Hope Church, the English church which was organized for the English speaking folk at Hope College and the newcomers who did not speak Dutch.

For years, Third Church was the largest church in the Particular Synod of Chicago and it supported more missionaries, sent more of its members into the ministry and missions than any other church, helped support sister churches and generally became a highly influential congregation. Although it had some well-to-do members, it was never known as a wealthy church and it helped a share of its members financially, paying coal bills and the like.

With the congregation thoroughly Americanized by the end of World War I, the period in the 1920's under the leadership

of the Rev. James P. Martin was something of a Golden Age with innovations, growth, denominational involvement, and advancement in music and education.

The depression years had their effect on Third Church as on all facets of the economy, at one time leaving a balance of \$9.22 with all other funds in closed banks.

While maintaining a liberal view through the years, it was significant in 1966 that the congregation voted 204 to 59 to restore the old sanctuary rather than build a new church, completing a cycle in which first generation immigrants try to shake off the "stigma" of the origin, and finally later generations are sufficiently secure to be sensitive to those things in their past which have lasting value.

The completed restoration preserves the original beauty of the church which members today are proud to refer to as the third oldest public building in Holland. The Pillar Church and Van Vleck Hall on Hope campus survived the Holland fire of 1871. Third Church was totally destroyed and rebuilding started in 1873.

She was a member of Hope Reformed Church where in years past she had been active in the Women's Guild for Christian Service. She also was a former member of the Woman's Literary Club. Her husband, C. Eugene Ripley, died in 1959.

Surviving are one son, Willard E. of La Grange, Ill.; one daughter, Mrs. Lester J. (Helen L.) Deridder of Holland; seven grandchildren; six great-grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Louis Lawrence of Holland, and one brother, F. George Danson of Fullerton, Calif.

Another sister, Mrs. Matilda Boone died Thursday morning and a joint funeral service was held Monday.

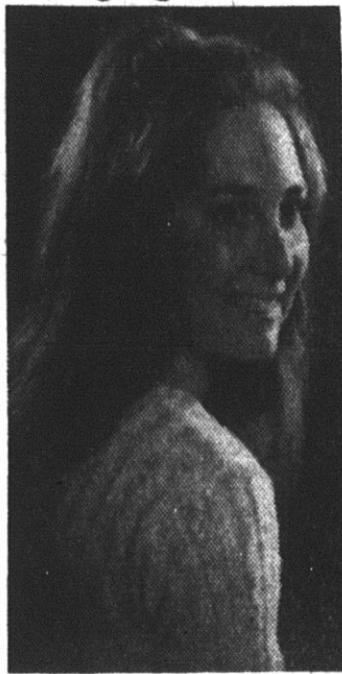

## 50-Year-Old Legion Band Recalls Its First Director

When the American Legion Band was organized here fifty years ago, its first director was John Van Vyven, a lover of good music and a man dedicated to giving his all to molding his fledgling musicians into a fine musical organization.

The band was organized March 22, 1920, under the sponsorship of the Willard G. Leenhouts post No. 6. While it was a Legion organization throughout, it gradually became the city's official band, always available for parades and civic celebrations.

The first band numbered 29 members and the only one still active in the band today is Raymond Knooihuizen, its secretary-treasurer. Several others are still living but are not active in the band.

Van Vyven served as band director until his retirement Jan. 4, 1927. During those years, under his direction the band attended Legion conventions in Kalamazoo, Kansas City, New Orleans, Chicago, St. Paul, Bay City and Philadelphia.

When Director Van Vyven died in 1929, the band attended his funeral in a body.

Van Vyven's wife, Anna, now 92 years old, lives at 22 East 29th St. with their daughter, Margaret, coordinator for Holland's 12 public elementary schools. The daughter previously served as vocal music specialist for elementary schools.
