## Construction Projects Approved

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa County Board of Commissioners voted 17 to 2 Monday to approve plans for the proposed new \$400,000 concrete bridge over Smith's bayou of Spring Lake in Ferrysburg. The action highlighted the board's July meeting. Commissioners Ray Lamb and Robert Visscher of the Holland area cast the no votes.

Commissioner Franklin Schmidt of the improvement committee reported that architect's plans for the new district court building at Holland will be ready in a week and it is planned to open bids Aug. 17. The Holland city council and members of the county board will meet Thursday at 8 p.m. in the Holland mayor's office to discuss problems. The court building will be built in conjunction with a new police building for Holland on Eighth St., at a cost of \$200,000.

County officials have been notified that the Board of Public Works seeks to take over the old court room and offices in Holland city hall and the Holland district court will use the city council chamber for court until the new building is completed.

The board approved remodeling of the Holland branch county building at its June meeting and Commissioner William Robinson of Spring Lake, chairman of the building and grounds committee, reported a meeting is planned Wednesday to review the plans. The sheriff's branch office will be removed from that building into a mobile home purchased from North Ottawa Community Hospital at Grand Haven and the mobile unit was to be moved to Holland today. The purchasing committee was also authorized to order microfilm equipment for the probate court at a cost of \$1,735.

Engineer - manager Ronald Bakker of the Ottawa County Road Commission presented a petition to the board for approval of the Smith bayou span, required by the U. S. Coast Guard, as the bayou, which splits the east part of Ferrysburg on West Spring Lake Rd., is a navigable stream. The county board had previously approved the replacing of the present bridge, which is in poor repair and too narrow, with a new bridge and Monday's hearing was a formality.

Bakker said the bridge will have two lanes and will be of prestressed concrete, similar to the year - old Eastmanville bridge. There will be sidewalks for pedestrians and fishermen on each side. State vehicle money has been accumulated over a period of several years and work will start in 1972, Bakker said.

Joe Martinez of the Holland Police Department was named to the mental health services board to fill a vacancy left by the resignation of Dr. William Baum of Holland.

A proposal by a Holland resident to exchange large acreage in the Manistee National Forest for county-owned land in Port Sheldon Township for industrial purposes was referred to the planning committee and the committee on agriculture.

Donald Goostrey of the U. S. Department of Commerce, economic development administration office for lower Michigan, reported to the board that Ottawa county is eligible for 50 per cent matching federal funds for projects, such as industrial parks, to improve the employment picture. Several officials from Ottawa communities conferred with Goostrey after the meeting and the program was referred to the planning committee of the board.

## District Court Dismisses Lake Sewage Question

LANSING (UPI)—A suit filed in U.S. District Court in Detroit challenging Michigan's law which prohibits vessels from discharging sewage and wastes into the Great Lakes had been dismissed, it was disclosed Tuesday.

Attorney General Frank J. Kelley said his office received an opinion by a three-judge panel dismissing the complaint.

The Wayne County Circuit Court took similar action in 1970 when it upheld state regulations prohibiting overboard discharge of sewage and wastes from recreational watercraft.

The opinion by the federal panel said the suit had no merit because it was based on "anticipation that other governmental units will act, presumably in the imminently near future and that such action will in fact conflict with Michigan standards."

Kelley termed the ruling "an important victory for all of the people of Michigan." He said it "upholds one of the most effective legal tools we have to preserve our environment."

## Several Talk On Parking

About 80 to 100 persons, including downtown merchants, property owners, and City Council members, attended an informational meeting Wednesday night in the Hotel Warm Friend to discuss the Preliminary Parking Report.

The meeting was chaired by Mayor L. W. Lamb Jr., and many comments were heard. Several raised opposition to the recommendation that the parking fees be raised to a minimum of 10 cents per hour, and that parking fines be raised to \$1 minimum.

Interest was shown to the possibility of having attendant parking lots which would give the merchants an opportunity to develop a validated parking system. Opposition was also raised to the creation of special assessment districts for all of a portion of the total recommended program.

Some persons suggested the improvements be delayed until the question of a downtown mall was settled.

Council had prepared a ballot for persons to mark down their first and second choice of an approach to parking improvements, and 42 ballots were returned, with 30 persons making special comments. The ballots are being tabulated and it is expected a report will be given at the next Council meeting.

The meeting lasted about 1½ hours, with refreshments following.

## Three Youths Are Slightly Injured in 2-Car Crash

GRAND HAVEN — Three persons were treated and released at North Ottawa Community Hospital here Tuesday evening following a two-car accident on Harbor Ave., ¼ mile west of Sherman St.

According to Grand Haven city police, a car operated by Stephen Harold Henry, 22, Kentwood, was stopped in the westbound lane waiting to make a left turn when it was struck in the rear by a vehicle operated by Michael Wayne Wildey, 16, Spring Lake.

Wildey, his passenger, Rodney Kelley, 16, of Spring Lake, and Royce McDonald, 21, Grand Rapids, a passenger in the Henry car, received minor injuries.

Wildey was cited for failure to stop in an assured clear distance.

## Firemen Battle Blaze At Zeeland Industries

ZEELAND—An explosion in a spray booth ignited a blaze at Zeeland Industries, 340 Garfield, Wednesday and firemen were on the scene about an hour.

According to John Van Eden, Zeeland Fire Chief, the department received the call about 7 p.m. Holland township departments 1, 2 and 3 also received calls from the factory.

Origin of the explosion has not been determined and there is no estimate of damage. Zeeland Industries does spray painting and assembly work for other companies.

## Open House For Zeeland Medical Center Scheduled

ZEELAND — The Zeeland Medical Center, 200 South Taft St., will hold open house Thursday from 2 p.m. to 9 p.m. This structure, recently completed, will accommodate four doctor's offices. Dr. R. J. Gemmen, surgeon, is already located in this building.

The Zeeland Medical Center was promoted by the Zeeland Chamber of Commerce in an effort to secure more doctors for this community. The building of this unit coincides with the addition being built on the Zeeland Community Hospital across the street. This addition to the Zeeland hospital will provide more than 60 beds to serve the Zeeland community.

About two years ago the Zeeland Chamber of Commerce secured options on the property of the Center. The structure is modern and commodious. Offices are carpeted throughout. Cut stone walls line the corridors the length of the building north and south. Planters add to the decor of the surroundings.

Coffee and cookies will be served at open house Thursday.

## Water Plan Is Approved In Township

Holland Township voters approved a contract with Ottawa County Tuesday to provide a primary public water system in the township with 1,212 yes votes, a no vote of 793 for a total vote of 2,005.

According to the engineer, contracts for the project to construct a metering station, water storage tank and install eight miles of water mains will be let late this year or early next year with construction expected to start in the spring of 1972 with completion in the fall of 1972.

Work on laying mains on Douglas Ave. where the county is widening the road and installing storm sewer will begin next week.

J. Herbert Johnson, chairman of Holland Township Citizens for water, a committee which conducted a pre-election information campaign in the township made this statement today:

"The resounding success of the Holland Township water election clearly demonstrates the desire of the township residents to move forward. It also shows a recognition on the part of the voters that the need for clean water really exists."

"The Township Board is to be commended for its efforts in developing the proposed water system which was approved by the voters. The completion of the initial phase of this project will be a major step forward in attracting industry to the township, improving fire protection, and in solving the problems of contaminated surface wells."

The project won overwhelming approval in three of the township's five precincts, and was defeated in two. Absentee voters approved with 50 yes votes against seven no votes.

The breakdown of the vote by precincts: Precinct 1, 440 yes, 187 no; Precinct 2, 311 yes, 146 no; Precinct 3, 34 yes, 36 no; Precinct 4, 117 yes, 245 no; Precinct 5, 260 yes, 172 no; absent voters, 50 yes, 7 no.

## Grand Haven, Spring Lake Okay Treatment Proposal

GRAND HAVEN — Voters in Spring Lake and Grand Haven okayed a bond proposal Tuesday, opening the way for construction of a new sewage treatment plant by the Grand Haven-Spring Lake Sewer Authority.

Grand Haven voters passed the proposal by a margin of 1,372 yes to 462 no; and Spring Lake voted 288 yes to 38 no.

Total cost of the project to residents is not to exceed \$2,863,250.

## East Allegan Soil Area Plans Annual Meeting

HOPKINS—The East Allegan Soil Conservation District will hold their annual meeting Saturday, July 31. The meeting will start with a charcoal broiled chicken dinner, at noon in the Hopkins High School.

Two of the SCD directors terms expire and two new directors are to be elected for three year terms.

Mrs. Mary Wark of Fennville will be the main speaker. She recently returned from a trip to Bermuda, and will present a slide illustrated talk sharing her experiences of the trip.

Downtown property owners and merchants met informally with City Council Wednesday at 7 p.m. in the Hotel Warm Friend to discuss the Preliminary Parking Study which was recently completed.

The report was requested by City Council at a meeting held March 3, and at the July 7 Council meeting. City Manager William L. Bopf reported the study had been received and was available for study by interested persons.

The major portion of the report deals with the need for additional off-street parking spaces. The specific new parking areas which are recommended are as follows:

1. Vanden Bos property adjacent to and to the rear of existing city property and the proposed county building—45 cars.
2. Mobil Oil property at the southeast corner of Seventh St. and River Ave.—36 cars.
3. First National Bank property on the north side of Seventh St. between Central and College Aves.—38 cars.
4. Curtis property located at the southwest corner of Seventh St. and College Ave.—15 cars.
5. Hope College property located on the south side of Ninth St., between Central and College Aves.—33 cars.
6. Vogue Restaurant property located on River Ave. between Eighth and Ninth Sts.—24 cars.

The report includes the rationale behind each of these selections and a review of existing lots. Consideration was also given to attendant parking lots which would give the merchants an opportunity to develop a validated parking system.

The present status and condition of the Parking Meter Fund, its revenues and expenditures, were determined and the estimated costs to accomplish and acquisition, demolition and improvement of the recommended new parking areas were projected.

Among the recommendations of the Preliminary Parking Report Committee are that parking fees should be raised to a minimum of 10 cents per hour; parking fines should be raised to \$1 minimum; parking fines or an amount equal to parking fines should be placed in the Parking Meter Fund each year; and the First National Bank lot should be developed as a long term or all day lot with a flat fee per day.

## Vacancies Filled At Board Meet

ALLEGAN — County commissioners devoted most of their time Tuesday to filling vacancies left by the resignation of Oscar Zimmerman, District 10 commissioner. Several ballots were required to elect successors to Zimmerman on the county commission itself, as well as to his posts on the county parks and recreation commission and board of public works.

Cleon Duryea of Monterey township, a farmer and oil company salesman, was elected on a second ballot to succeed Zimmerman as District 10 Commissioner. The district includes Monterey and Hopkins townships.

Ronald Layton, Henry Blaauw, Vernon Brenner and Lloyd Miller also were nominated for the post.

Commissioner Louis Ter Avest of Allegan township was elected to succeed Zimmerman on the County Parks and Recreation Commission. Grover Grigsby of Trowbridge was named to Zimmerman's unexpired term on the County Board of Public Works.

Mrs. Dorothy Dalrymple of Otsego was re-elected to a five-year term on the County Library Board, extending her service to June 9, 1976.

Lloyd Miller of Burnips, John Vogelzang of Holland and John Tien of Lakeland, were elected to three-year terms on the County Planning Commission. Tien is the only incumbent. Miller and Vogelzang will succeed Arnold Ross and Robert Drew whose terms expired June 8.

Register of Deeds Howard Strand reported to commissioners that a 63 per cent increase in operations of his office during the first six months of this year largely reflected a resurgence in oil leasing activity in the county, in northern and eastern townships.

A County Operations Committee report, recommending involvement of the Holland architectural firm of Kammeraad, Stroop and Vander Leek, to provide a survey of county building expansion needs, was approved by the board. The \$2,000 fee would be applicable on any construction work which might result from the survey.

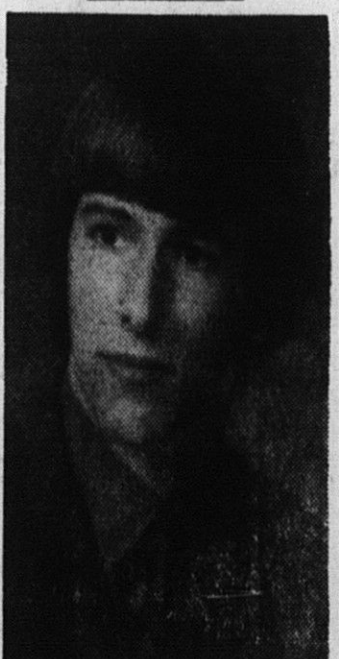

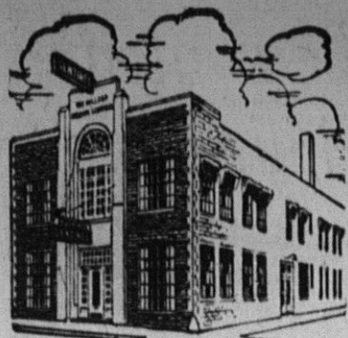
A total of slightly more than 100 will be making the trip which includes 88 band members, chaperones, and bus drivers. The group will return late Friday evening.

## AMERICA. PREPARE

When some startling international event occurs, it is likely to affect the quality of life in the nations which it affects. Usually these events come upon us suddenly and without warning and we accommodate ourselves after the fact rather than getting prepared for it.

But now there seems to be looming on the horizon an event of inestimable international importance, one unprecedented in American history, and we have time to prepare for it and get accustomed to the idea before the event occurs.

This unprecedented event is the likely victory of Bobby Fischer of Brooklyn in the world chess championship match to be played next spring. Fischer by all odds seems to be the favorite contender to meet the Russian World Champion Boris Spassky. Fischer has managed to beat all Russian contenders in the matches leading up to the championship match. Spassky, himself, recognizes Fischer as most logical contender.

Should Fischer beat Spassky next spring, and most experts agree that he will, he will be the first American chess champion ever. And it will be the first time in 25 years that the championship will be held by a non-Russian.

We don't know how many Americans watch the progress of chess tournaments with bated breath. We suspect there are very few. But it seems that an American victory would have great propaganda value if nothing else and prove that Americans can turn out the special kind of chess intellect as well as the Russians.

In this country we're more interested in the World Series than in chess tournaments. Not so in Russia; there the chess championship is equivalent to winning the series. If we could break into that league, it would do something great for the American ego.

## Sunday School Lesson

God, the Christian, and Civil Law  
Sunday, July 18  
Acts 4:13-20  
By C. P. Dame

We are living in times of dissent, demonstrations, protests and marches. The Bible teaches how Christian citizens should speak and do and tells that loyalty to God comes first in life.

I. The church has ever met opposition. The Jewish Christians kept up their Jewish religious life and went to the temple for prayer as usual. One day, on the way to the temple, at the ninth hour, or three o'clock, Peter and John healed a man who had been lame from birth. It is good to have a fixed time and place for prayer as the apostles had.

The lame man leaped and praised God and, because he had been a beggar for a long time and was well known, a crowd gathered. Peter saw the crowd and the opportunity and preached, telling them that the lame man had been healed through Jesus whom they had killed but whom God had raised from the dead. Peter explained the Old Testament teaching about the Messiah and called for repentance.

While Peter preached the authorities arrested both apostles and locked them in jail. The next morning the apostles appeared before the court, the Sanhedrin, which had condemned Jesus.

The ex-fisherman, Peter, "filled with the Holy Spirit," when asked, "By what power, or in what name, have ye done this?" boldly preached Jesus as the only Saviour. The authorities realized that these apostles had been with Jesus and seeing that the apostles were unschooled men they were surprised.

II. Jesus comes first in true believers. When told to stop preaching the apostles refused saying that they put loyalty to God first. The authorities admitted that they had performed a notable miracle.

Threats and orders did not move the apostles one bit and they firmly replied that they had to obey God and had to "speak the things which they had seen and heard" and so they kept right on preaching Jesus.

III. Citizens have responsibilities to the state. First the Jews persecuted Christians, then the Romans. Peter in his letter to believers who lived in parts of the Roman Empire told believers to submit themselves to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake. As long as the government did not interfere with their duties to God they were told to obey. This is the Christian attitude. If a law is unjust, it should be changed through legal ways, not through violence. Blameless conduct is the best way to disprove false charge.

The last verse of the text gives four commands: "Honor all men," regardless of color or standing; "love the brotherhood"—the church composed of God's people; "Fear God"—give reverence to mankind's Sovereign; Honor the king"—give respect to government officials.

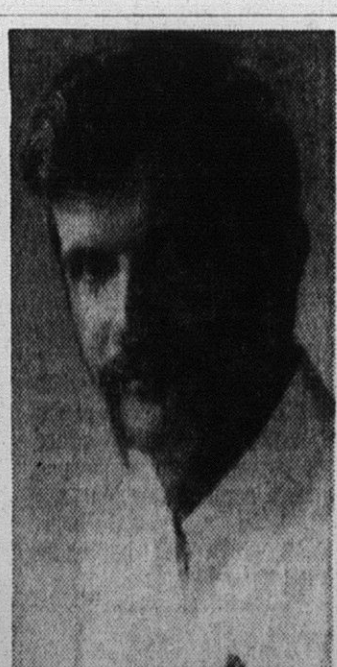

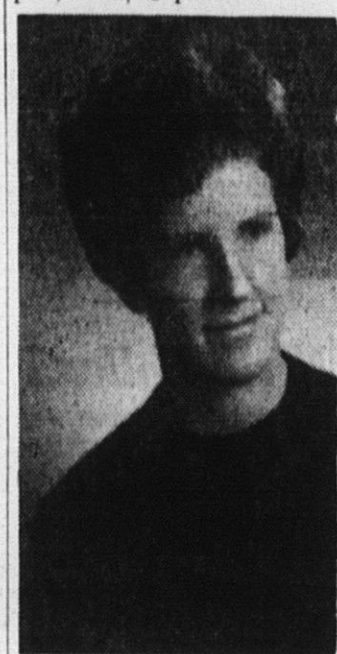

## Grant Given Hope College Geologist

A Hope College geology professor and two of his students are investigating the chemical and mineralogical changes which have occurred in the ore deposits of the Silverton Mining District in Colorado under a grant awarded by the Research Corporation.

The \$7,700 grant was presented to Dr. Robert Reinking, assistant professor of geology, through the Research Corporation's Frederick Gardner Cottrell Grants Program.

Dr. Reinking is conducting the research with Robert Houghton, a sophomore from Beaver Falls, N.Y., and John Morehouse, a freshman from Schenectady, N.Y.

The Frederick Gardner Cottrell Grant Program is named for the scientist, inventor and philanthropist who founded the Research Corporation. Dr. Cottrell and his associates established the foundation in 1912 with the gift of their patent rights in industrial gas cleaning. The Cottrell Program was initiated in 1946 and provides grants to help academic scientists initiate basic research of a high degree of originality and potential significance.

Dr. Reinking and his student assistants are spending the first part of the summer evaluating data accumulated by Dr. Reinking in Colorado in 1969. The researchers will go to Colorado in August to undertake additional field work.

More than 750 million dollars in gold, silver, lead and zinc ores have been produced in the Silverton District area and significant new ore reserves have been discovered in the last ten years.

Dr. Reinking is attempting to determine the physical and chemical characteristics of the fluids which migrated from the surrounding rocks carrying in solution those ore minerals localized in the veins being mined. The ultimate purpose of the research is to determine the processes involved in the formation of ore deposits in general and of the Silverton deposits in particular. An accurate judgment of the source and controls of the mineralizing fluids may enable Dr. Reinking to predict where similar or related ores might be found.

## Zeeland Bank To Appeal Court Ruling

ZEELAND — First Michigan Bank & Trust Co. plans to appeal a Circuit Court ruling in Grand Rapids that the bank be denied permission to open a branch at Jenison Plaza in Georgetown Township.

Randall Dekker, senior vice president of the Zeeland based bank, said the bank would appeal the decision of Judge Stuart Hoffius to the state appeals court.

The decision reversed the June, 1970 findings of the state commissioner of The Financial Institutions Bureau that Union Bank & Trust Co. of Grand Rapids and the proposed First Michigan Bank branch location are in separate villages.

Union Bank had filed suit to block the opening of the Zeeland bank's branch.

The state banking code requires that a new bank or branch may not be established in a village in which a state or national bank or branch is already in operation.

Judge Hoffius wrote that First Michigan Bank "has not shown that there is a separate village dividing its area from that being served by Union Bank" adding that the Jenison Plaza development area "has traditionally been known as Jenison."

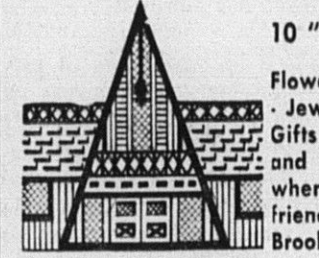

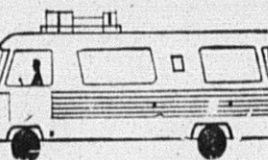

## Fris Removes Sign; Hopes Others Follow

The overhead sign in front of the Fris store, 30 West Eighth St., which for decades proclaimed the wares of the store, was removed recently and owner Dale Fris encouraged other property owners in the business district to follow suit.

Fris, president of the Holland Downtown Development Corp., which is backing revisions in the city's signing codes, says

removal of the overhead signs would add esthetically to the business district, especially in light of a proposed shopping plaza.

"This is going to be the trend (removal of overhead signs) and the emphasis is going to be on the lack of clutter," Fris said.

He added that if all store owners would remove the neon signs and use flat signs against

the building fronts, no store operator would have the edge in signs.

Revisions in the ordinance governing use of outdoor signs is under study and Fris said removal of all overhead signs could be required within about five years after implementation of such provisions of a revised ordinance.

Fris said he was encouraging owners to remove the signs as they require repair rather than remodel or renovate them.

Roger Stroh, head of the Department of Environmental Health whose office is responsible for signing codes, acknowledged revisions in the sign ordinance are under study but added that it may be a "few months" before such revisions are submitted to council for action.

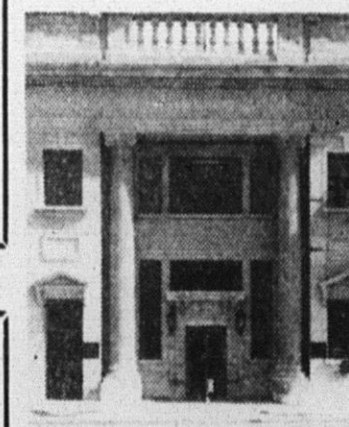

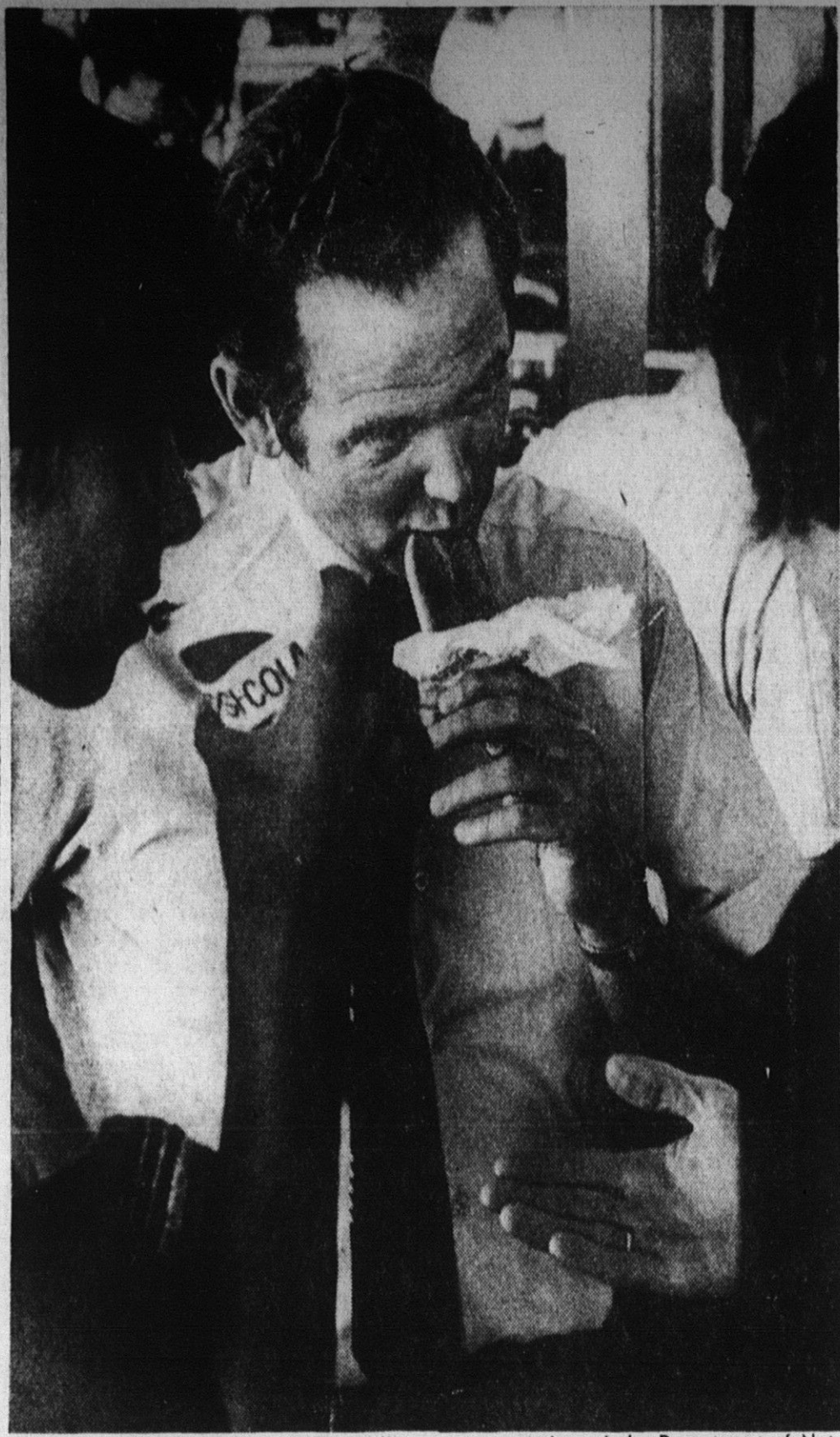

## Milliken Tours Holland State Park on Quick Visit

Governor William Milliken said he was "favorably impressed" with the operations at Holland State Park but added, that, like other heavy-use parks, it had problems.

Milliken made his remarks during a Saturday afternoon visit as part of a day-long tour of heavy-use state parks that brought him to Holland from the Thumb Area.

The governor's party arrived at Park Township airport at 1 p.m. and took walking tours of the Lake Macatawa camp sites and the beach front area before returning to the airport and taking off at 3 p.m. for Traverse City where he was spending the weekend.

Greeting Milliken's party at the airport was Rep. Melvin De Stigter, (R-Hud.) and Park Township Supervisor Jay Van Wieren.

Others in the party included Carl T. Johnson of Grand Rapids, member of the Department of Natural Resources Commission; William Laycock, Region 3 manager; Charles Leeson, Regional Park Supervisor; Norman McDonald, District Manager, and Herb Burns, Conservation Officer for Ottawa and Muskegon Counties.

Milliken said he was visiting the parks to learn first hand of the problems involving heavy

use by youths and resulting vandalism, rowdism, drinking and noise.

He said he was concerned about the youth-family camp conflicts and the need for additional park personnel and equipment.

Wearing shirt sleeves in the blistering 80 degree temperatures, Milliken walked through the Lake Macatawa camping area and talked with numerous campers, including several young people.

Doug Carter, assistant park manager, said records showed about 25 per cent of the sites occupied were by family campers. He added that the ratio normally runs about five per cent family camps and during the Fourth of July weekend family camps were outnumbered by youth camps 99 to 1.

At the beach front camping area, Milliken talked with the Albertus Elenbaas family of Grand Rapids and was told the camp grounds were noisy until about the 10 p.m. closing hour.

During his stroll along the water front numerous young people walked up to Milliken and greeted him.

At the pavilion, Milliken and other members of his party took time out for ice cream bars and soft drinks before heading back to the airport.

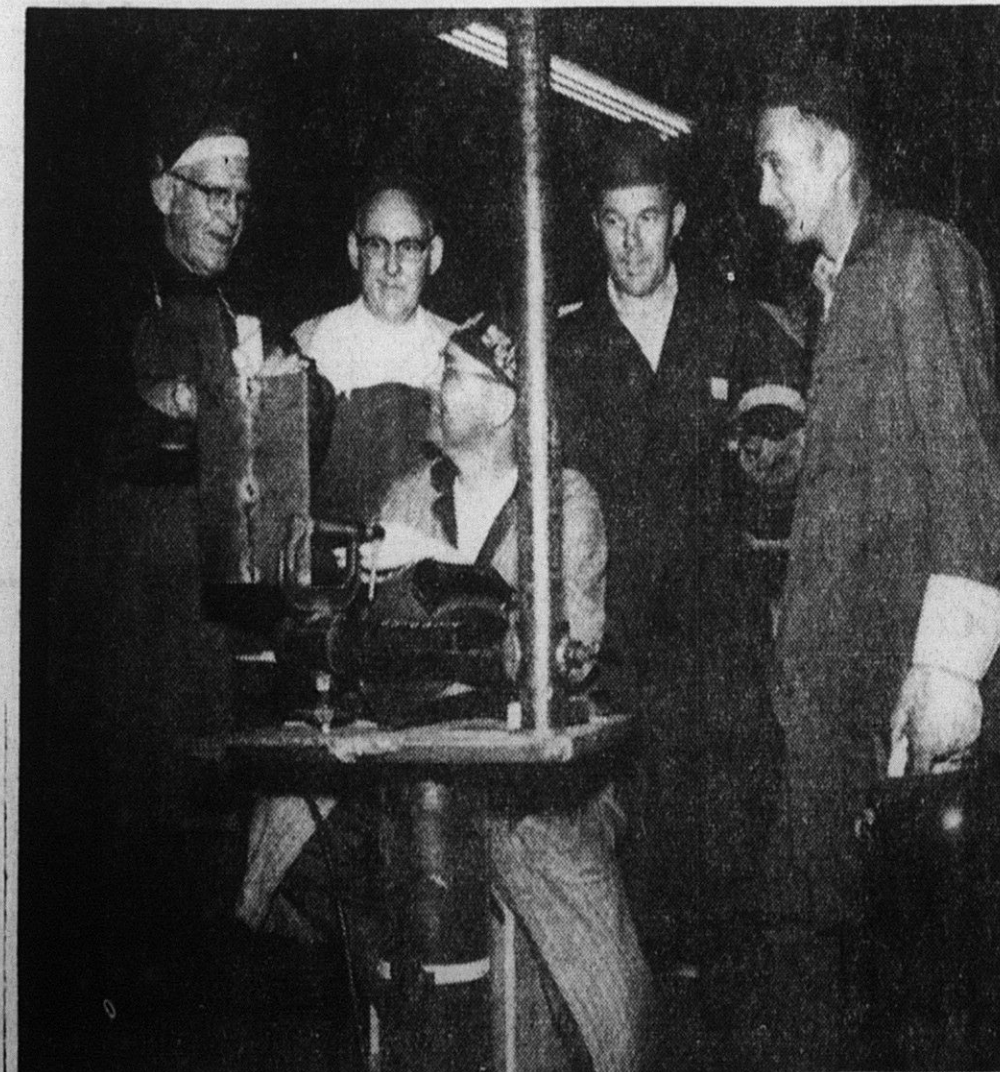
