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Judge Rules Use of Park Waste Plant

GRAND HAVEN — Holland State Park was allowed to resume use of its sewage treatment facility following a hearing on a court order Friday in Ottawa Circuit Court.

Judge Raymond L. Smith ruled in a pollution suit brought against the Department of Natural Resources by O. W. Lowry of Holland who claimed the state park was dumping raw sewage into the channel separating Lake Michigan and Lake Macatawa.

The state park has been hauling the sewage by truck to the City of Holland's waste water treatment plant since Circuit Judge Wendell A. Miles granted a temporary injunction June 28 banning the park from dumping sewage into the channel.

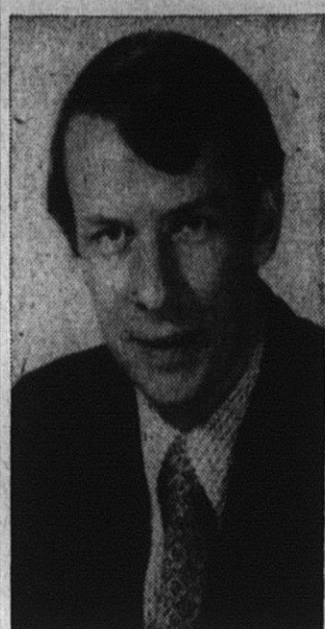
In his ruling today, Judge Smith, substituting for Judge Miles who had a trial in Allegan, denied a motion to dismiss the court order and continued jurisdiction of the case in the event the plaintiffs decide to reopen the case to show the sewage disposal question has become worse.

Judge Smith said a question of "raw sewage" was discussed and said he and Judge Miles agreed that sewage from the state park goes through primary and secondary treatment facilities before being dumped into the lake.

The suit had protested alleged dumping of raw sewage. Smith ruled the park may continue using the sewage treatment facility at the park through the summer until a new sewage system is installed.

The DNR said bids were being taken this summer for the proposed facility and that the system should be in operation by next spring.

Park Manager Donald Ike said arrangements were being made to activate the treatment facilities this afternoon.



Schools Name Director Of Curriculum

Appointment of Dr. Philip H. Schoo as Curriculum Director for the Holland Public Schools was announced Friday by Supt. Donald L. Ihrman. Dr. Schoo will direct and supervise a comprehensive educational program for the system.

A graduate of Calvin College and the University of Michigan, Schoo was a teacher and administrator in the Glendale, Calif., and Birmingham and Trenton, Mich., school systems. He served as an educational consultant with the Bureau of School Services, University of Michigan from 1968 to 1971.

Schoo, 34, is to assume his responsibilities in Holland Aug. 1. He is married and has two children. His wife is the former Sarah Dahm of Grand Rapids.

He earned a BA degree in English and history from Calvin in 1962, an MA in secondary administration from the University of Michigan in 1968, and a Ph.D. in general administration from the U of M in 1970.

Car Pushes Way Into Bedroom

MARNE — Members of the Paul Norton family, 14942 16th Ave., Marne, were surprised to find a car in one of their bedrooms Sunday night.

Ottawa county deputies said an auto driven by Louis De Boer, 21, of Comstock Park, went out of control while southbound on 16th Ave. one-tenth of a mile north of I-96 at 10:08 p.m. Sunday.

Deputies said the car traveled 203 feet off the road, snapped a utility pole and then crashed into the north side of the Norton house, pushing itself into a bedroom and coming to rest with only two feet of the car extending outside the house.

Three of the Norton children were at home at the time. Only Marcia Norton, 14, was reported injured. She was treated in Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids and released. Marcia's sister, Joan, 12, and brother, Scott, 9, were not injured.

The driver of the car and a passenger, Garold Gorney, 20, of Grand Rapids, were injured and taken to Butterworth Hospital where De Boer was treated and released and Gorney sought his own treatment.

Deputies said De Boer told them he swerved to avoid a dog that ran in front of his car.

Police Conducting Vehicle Inspection

An estimated 150 vehicles were inspected by the Holland Police Traffic Safety unit at a check lane at 22nd St. and State St. Wednesday and 15 repair tickets were issued for violations including bad lights.

Hudsonville Cyclist Dies After Crash

Orrin Dean Kroon, 19, of 5230 Riley St., Hudsonville, was fatally injured Thursday when the motorcycle he was riding skidded out of control into the path of an oncoming car at Chicago Dr. and East Eighth St. in Holland Township.

The accident occurred at 1:19 p.m. and Kroon died in Holland Hospital at 2:30 p.m. He suffered head and chest injuries. Kroon's death was the 22nd in Ottawa County this year compared with 13 a year ago, Ottawa County deputies said.

Deputies said Kroon was westbound along Chicago Dr. and went out of control at the curve leading to Eighth St. The cycle slid on its side and into the path of a car traveling east on Eighth St. and driven by Stanley Lackwan, 36, of Westchester, Ill. Lackwan was not reported injured.

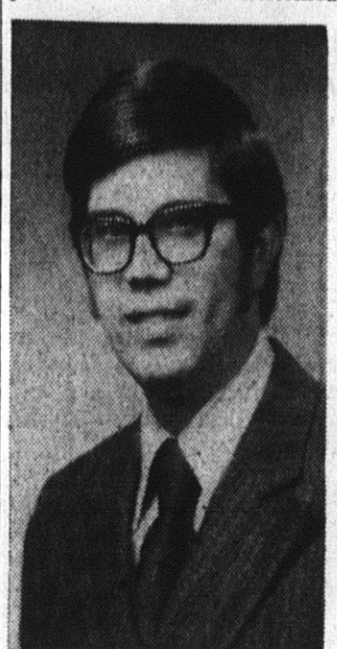

County Sets Funds For New Patrols

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa County Board of Commissioners Monday voted up to \$5,000 from the county's contingency fund to back Sheriff Bernard Grysen's program to "get tough" with persons who are violating state park rules and making disturbances.

The sheriff's committee, Bert Schuitema of Holland, chairman, reported on a meeting with law officers and interested citizens at the county building last Friday and recommended that action be taken immediately.

"We want to control rowdiness at all parks in the county," Schuitema said, "not just at the Holland park, where there was a disturbance July 3."

The board also plans to arrange for a meeting of its judicial committee and the district judges in the county to discuss stiffer penalties assessed violators of park rules.

Plans for additional parking areas near the county building were announced by the board. Erickson's market at 416 Franklin, across the street from the county buildings, will be purchased for \$44,500. The money is to be taken from the board's improvement fund and the building will be vacated by Nov. 1. A lot containing a frame house on Clinton Street, in the rear of the Dr. J. H. Kitchel property on Franklin, will be purchased for \$16,000.

The board voted to give the County Road Commission authority to proceed with negotiations for the purchase of Camp Kirk on Lake Michigan for park purposes.

After a motion by Commissioner William Winstrom of Park Township the board authorized the Road Commission to enter into a water supply agreement with Holland city, to service the Waukazo Woods area in Park Township.

Thomas De Pree, commissioner from Holland, and Rod Dittmar, executive director of the West Michigan Shoreline Regional Planning Commission, gave a progress report on a space and servicing study now under way in the eastern part of the county.

J. C. Grysen of Holland submitted a letter to the board and asked to be relieved from duties on the county's mental health services board for business reasons. The resignation was accepted.

Senator Gary Byker of Hudsonville appeared before the board and presented a resolution from the Senate, honoring Fred Den Herder, county treasurer who is retiring Dec. 31 after serving the county 34 years.

Holland Motorist Injured in Crash Of 2 Automobiles

Inge Olav Waage, 27, of 12851 Renwood Dr., injured in a two-car collision in Holland township Tuesday at 5:11 p.m., was transferred to Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids with head injuries. His condition Wednesday was listed as "satisfactory."

Ottawa county deputies said Waage was traveling west along James St. south of US-31 and the other auto operated by Frances Fendt, 69, of 4778 Butternut Dr. was east bound.

Deputies said the Fendt car was attempting to stop for a vehicle ahead which was making a left turn. Officers said the Fendt car went out of control, skidded across the centerline and hit the oncoming Waage auto in the left front fender.

The impact forced the Waage car off the north side of the road where it rolled over, then continued to the south side of the road and overturned again and went down a 15-foot embankment, coming to rest on its wheels.

Mrs. Fendt was not reported injured.

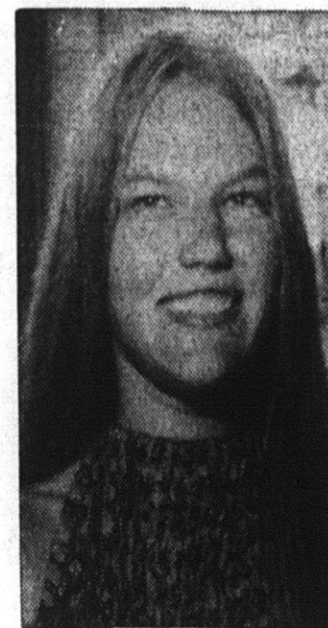
Waage was taken first to Holland Hospital and later transferred to the Grand Rapids hospital.

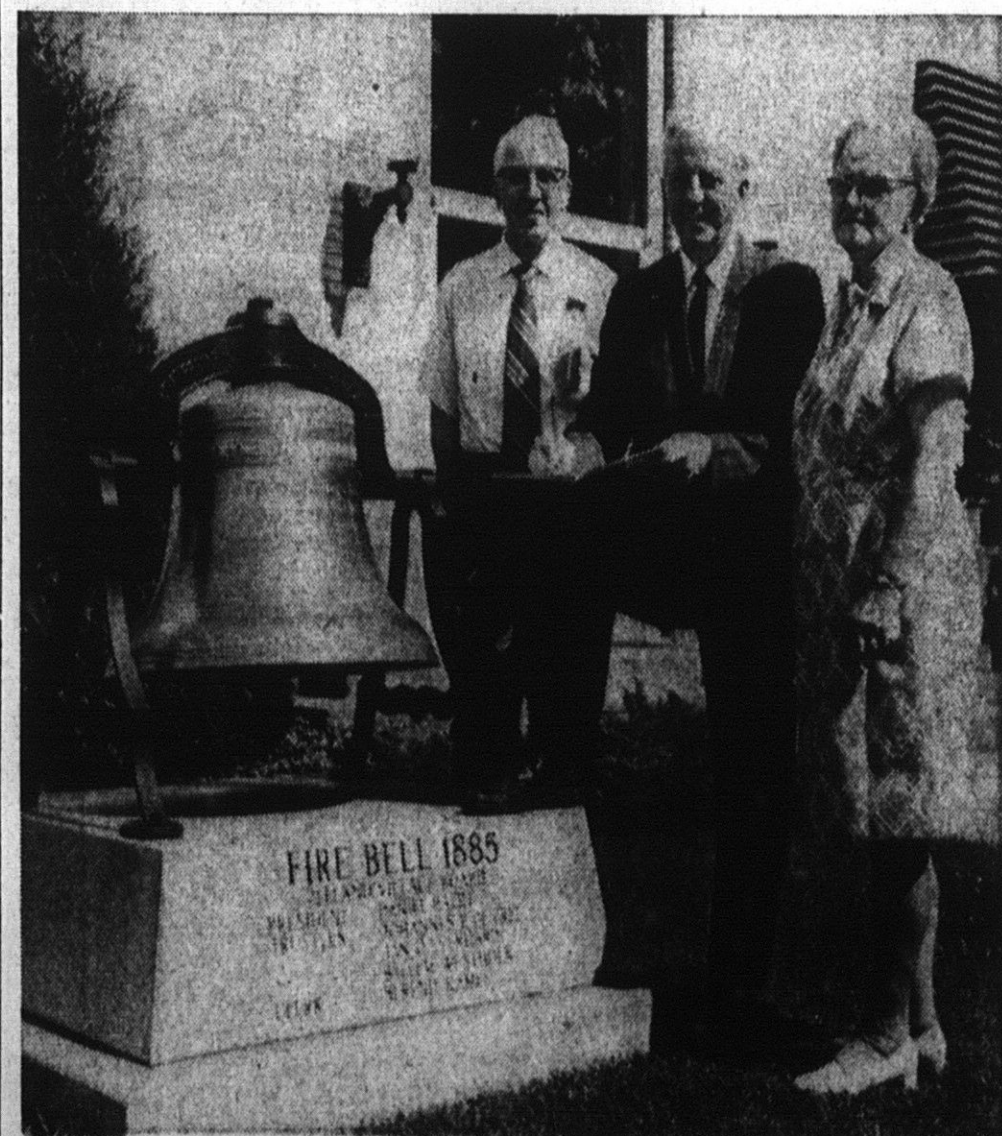
Miss Hiddinga is a member of the band, choir, orchestra, student council and cheerleading squad at West Ottawa High School.

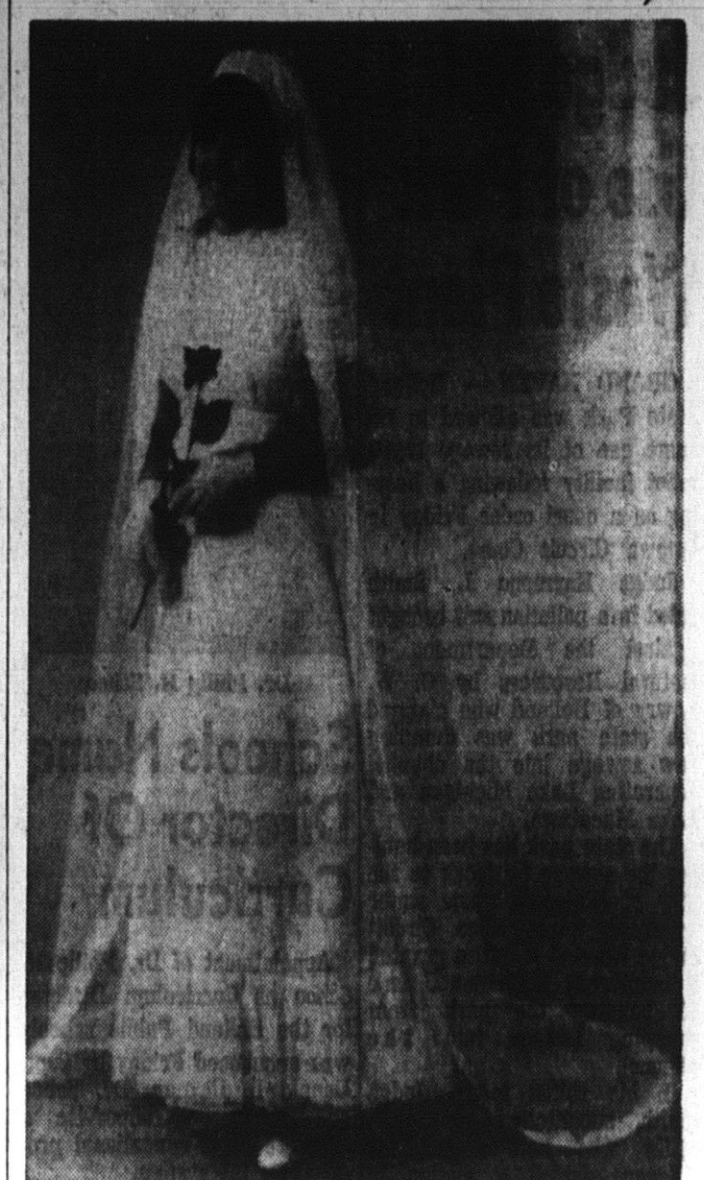
Similarly attired was the bridesmaid, Mrs. Charles Nook. She also had a white crocheted hat and carried a single pink rose.

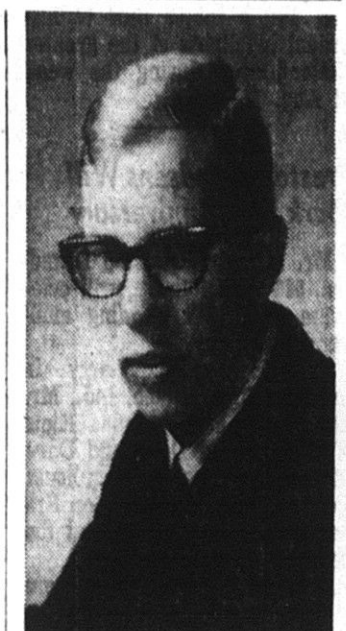

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DEMOCRATS AT MIAMI BEACH

The first test of the new Democratic coalition delegates to the National Convention in Miami Beach came during Monday night and Tuesday morning's long session in which George McGovern demonstrated his power in a rout of the 'old pros.'

It seems likely that McGovern will win nomination in the first ballot tonight.

The new delegates, most of them unfamiliar with the rites of a national convention, responded to the discipline of the McGovern forces in settling the questions of the challenges to the California and Illinois delegations, a key to McGovern's potency.

Democrats have long had a reputation of quarreling among themselves to the brink of chaos, then uniting solidly behind the convention's choice.

LOOK AT THESE FIGURES

If one is looking for a striking illustration of the need for gun control, no better could be found than a sentence bit of information in the Chicago Tribune. On June 25 the Chicago Tribune started a series on gun control. Since the series started, nineteen persons have been killed and 57 have been wounded by firearms.

And that doesn't tell the whole story. The man hours put in by the Chicago police department on some of the shootings, the court cases, the hospital man hours, and the human misery would be enough to fill a good sized novel. And all that in less than nine days.

It is almost unbelievable that with such a record and with massive public insistence for action that Congress can't get a sound gun control law on the books. And at this writing we aren't too confident that we will get such a law that has real teeth.

The question why we can't get action is a hard one. Is it a matter of fear, or political expediency, or strong lobbying in opposition, or the inertia of our legislative body? We don't know. But the killing goes on and in between innocent people are being killed, and the rights of citizens to a secure life is being threatened.

We are aware that a gun law will not change the nature of man, but we also believe that a good gun law can curb and frustrate that nature by withholding the instruments of death.

Psalm 104:1, 5-8, 14-17

Seeing that we are taught more about pollution, we should lead in the war against everything that mars the beauty of God's world.

II. God not only created but He also provides. The psalmist saw how all manner of life is sustained and how plants and animals are cared for. In a special way, God makes provision for man's necessities and even provides for luxuries. We have more than any other generation and therefore we should give Him thanks and praise.

Our times call for restraint and temperance, for the abundance we have may tempt us to yield too much to the desires of the flesh. Some spend far more for luxuries than they give to the Lord's cause. Our times call for discipline.

III. God also provides for man's spiritual needs. Every man needs the forgiveness of his sins. "Who forgiveth all thine iniquities" — note the gracious ministry recorded in the last verse of the text. We who know Jesus Christ and His redemption, rejoice in the fact that God is not only our Creator and Provider but that He is also our Redeemer.

Hope College To Share in Grants

WASHINGTON — The National Science Foundation has announced award of 372 grants totaling \$2.9 million, to help colleges and universities purchase scientific equipment needed to improve undergraduate study.

Eleven of the 311 colleges, universities and two-year colleges receiving the grants are in Michigan. Specifically: Alma \$2,500 physics; Delta college \$8,400 chemistry; Genesee County College \$10,100 earth sciences; Grand Valley State college \$4,700, multiple disciplines; Hope College \$5,400 Earth sciences, Michigan Technical University \$15,900 engineering; Oakland County college \$3,200 biological sciences; Oakland University \$17,500 Engineering; Southwestern Michigan College \$1,300 physics; University of Michigan \$20,000 engineering and \$20,000 physics; Western Michigan university \$2,300 physics.

This is one of several NSF programs designed to help colleges and universities improve the quality of undergraduate science instruction by updating curricula and teaching laboratories.

Dutch Seek Salvage Of Historic Vessel

An ambitious project to raise what is claimed the world's second most important shipwreck is under way in the Netherlands and elsewhere in the world.

The vessel, the Amsterdam, built in Amsterdam in 1748 for the Dutch East Indies Company, was the biggest Dutch East Indiaman of her day and was on her maiden voyage Jan. 8, 1749 when she hit a sandbank off the south coast of England and settled into quicksand.

Eventually the vessel was 'sucked' into the sand to a depth of 30 feet and its remaining top structure began to be swept away by wind and tide. Tides of 22 feet covered her from sight.

In 1969 workmen laying pipe across the Hastings beach began to unearth cargo and artifacts with a mechanical digger and the Amsterdam was found. It is believed 80 per cent of the vessel is intact together with thousands of 18th Century artifacts preserved below the beach.

Spearheaded by the English-language newsmagazine Holland Herald, a "Save the Amsterdam" committee was formed to raise an estimated \$3 million needed to raise the ship from the English south coast.

Plans call for the vessel to be towed back to Amsterdam for the 700th anniversary of the Dutch capital in 1975 and a museum established.

Vernon Leonard, editor of The Holland Herald, is in the United States attempting to gain support and interest for the project and stopped in Holland for a few days.

Leonard said marine archaeologists in Holland and Britain believe the salvage is possible and rate the Amsterdam second in world importance to the Swedish warship Wasa, which now attracts 360,000 paying visitors a year.

Peter Marsden, a nautical archaeologist from London, said there are believed to be 12,000 bottles of French wine aboard. About six already have been dug out, tested and tasted. They were sour.

A complete dossier of every man and every item aboard is available as the company kept a paybook for each year which gave details. Of the seven that survive, the oldest is for 1748-49 when the Amsterdam was built and sailed.

The Dutch Ministry of Culture is compiling a cost assessment of raising the vessel. Holland Herald has pledged a continuing campaign to its readers in 73 countries.

Before the vessel settled into her quicksand grave, the 335 passengers and captain Willem Klump waded ashore safely and took off all coins and silver as a precautionary measure.

Among the artifacts recently recovered were five bronze cannon, cargo wrapped in cloth and held by the original brass pins, tobacco pipes, horn combs,

The helicopter was to arrive in Grand Haven this week.

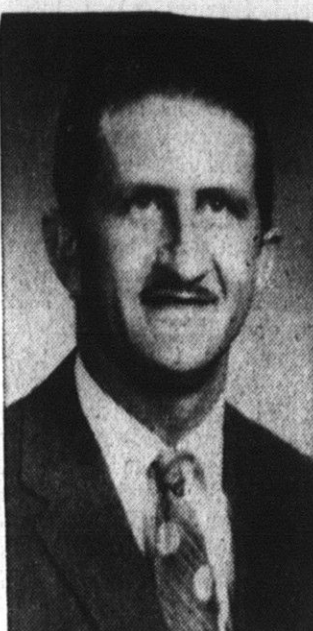

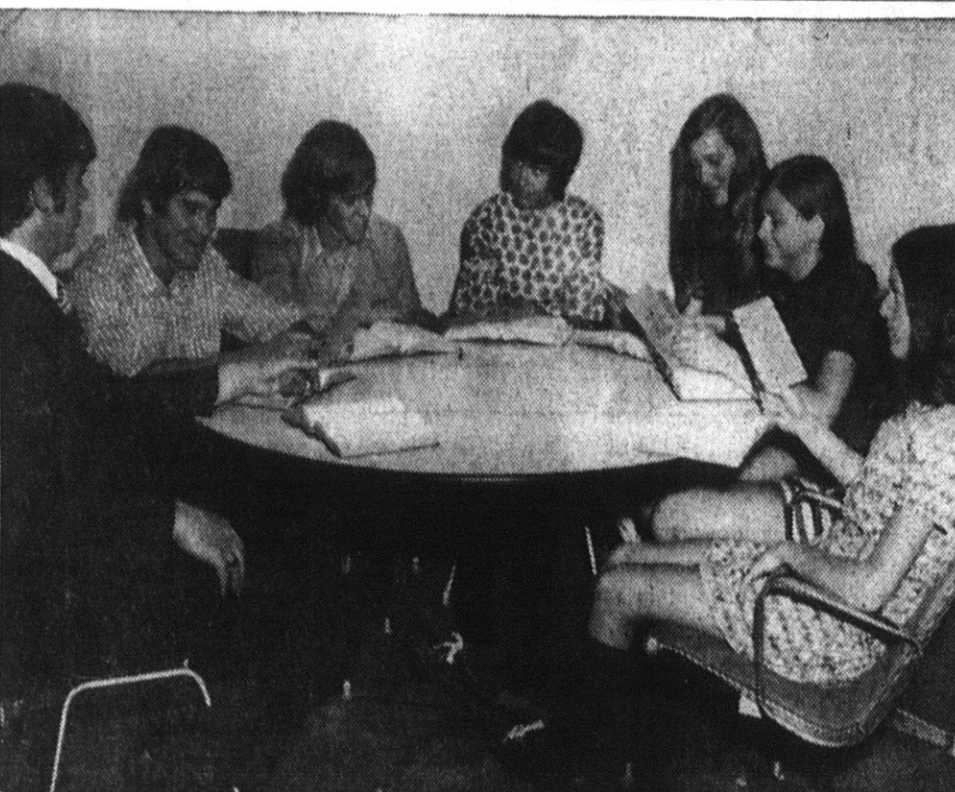

Holland Rotary Club Hears Dr. Van Wylen

Dr. Gordon J. Van Wylen, ninth president of Hope College spoke to Holland Rotary Club Thursday about the college's relationship to the community and its responsibilities to its students.

Dr. Van Wylen said the real purpose of higher education is learning rather than the current trend of experience which seems to be emphasized in many colleges around the country.

He said it is more difficult to obtain a traditional education in college today than it was in the past. Colleges seem to emphasize involvement rather than the traditional academic courses which prepares students for their future lives and careers. A school should be strong academically, and his hopes and aspirations are that Hope College will stress these goals of a classical education, learning, scholarship and knowledge.

Dr. Van Wylen stressed that he would like to develop some kind of campus community for warmer relationships between faculty and students and an interaction between the college and community.

Van Wylen said that a college, such as Hope, is an asset to a community because of the social and cultural advantages and that which the faculty and students can offer to Holland. Everyone profits from outside influences.
