### Willemstyn To Head BPW Office

Chester I. Willemstyn, business manager of the Kent Intermediate School District skills center, has been named the new utilities office manager for the Holland Board of Public Works, it was announced Saturday by Ronald Rainson, BPW superintendent.

Willemstyn, 36, of Grand Rapids, succeeds Gordon Schrotenboer who assumed the duties of the newly created position of Controller of the BPW on July 1. He began his post Monday.

Prior to his association with the Kent skills center, Willemstyn was employed as accountant and controller of American Die Casting Company, Grand Rapids and had similar duties with Peninsular Die Casting Company prior to its merger with American Die Casting.

In making the announcement of Willemstyn's appointment as office manager, Rainson said that the addition of Willemstyn to the BPW management team was expected to contribute substantially to the total goal of the BPW of profitability, cost reduction and increased efficiency in operation for Holland's electric, water and sewer utilities.

Willemstyn received his education at Grand Rapids Christian High School, Grand Rapids Junior College, and took additional studies at University of Michigan extension school and with the International Accountants Society, Chicago. He and his wife have three children, ages 11, 10 and 9.

Margaret A. Cecil, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert M. Cecil of 133 West 11th St., was among four Peace Corps volunteers from Michigan who were detained in Uganda and freed today.


the Peace Corps as a teacher in the Zaire Republic formerly known as the Belgian Congo.

### Dr. J. Linnell Is Appointed Dean at GVSC

ALLEDALE — Dr. John V. S. Linnell, 46, joins the Grand Valley State College staff Aug. 6 as the dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, according to Dr. Glenn A. Niemeyer, GVSC vice president of the colleges.

For the past nine years, Dr. Linnell has been associated with Luther College, Decorah, Iowa, first as dean of the college, then vice president for academic affairs and most recently as provost.

A graduate of Augustana College, Dr. Linnell received the M. A. degree in philosophy from the State University of Iowa and the Ph.D. degree in philosophy from the University of Minnesota. He was also involved in post - doctoral research at the University of Cambridge, England.

Before joining Luther College in 1964, he served as assistant, associate and professor of philosophy at Sacramento State College (1954-64) and instructor in philosophy at the College of Wooster (1952-54).

Dr. Linnell is author of numerous papers, lectures and book reviews, as well as serving as consultant on academic affairs throughout the country.

Also while at Luther, Dr. Linnell was appointed to the nominating committee of the American Conference of Academic Deans and as examiner for the National Council of Colleges of Teacher Education.

He is a Danforth Associate and is a member of the American Philosophical Association.

A native of St. Paul, Minn., Dr. Linnell is married to the former Naomi Seim, also a graduate of Augustana College. The couple and their three children will soon move to the west - central Michigan area.



### Planning Commission Conducts Aerial Survey

Representatives of Holland's Planning Commission and supporting staff recently conducted an aerial survey of Holland in conjunction with a continuing program of master plan revision.

Commission Chairman Howard Kammeraad, Henry Hekman and Roger Stroh and Dale Wyngarden of the Environmental Health Department participated in the survey which concentrated on areas of current planning activity. Hekman, who is serving his second term as a member of the Commission, donated use of his plane for the survey, which included aerial photographs taken for later use in planning activities.

Planning activities of the local Commission are presently directed toward the southeastern areas of the City, including the HEDCOR Industrial Park and surrounding lands. "As with our recently completed master plan review of the Holland Heights area," noted Kammeraad, "priority is given to the southeastern area because of the anticipated impact of the new interstate highway interchange at M-40."

Kammeraad noted, in addition, that rapid growth of the first two development phases of the HEDCOR Industrial Park make it imperative to allocate and protect areas for future industrial needs. "A few years back," he said, "communities gave full effort to protecting

### Mary Van Kampen Killed in Crash

Mary Beth Van Kampen, 22, of 133 East 22nd St., daughter of Sixth Ward Councilman and Mrs. Hazen Van Kampen, was killed at 3:43 a.m. Sunday when the motorcycle on which she was riding was struck from behind by a semi-trailer truck in Allegan County's Laketown township.

She was pronounced dead on

a broken neck, State Police at South Haven said.

Miss Van Kampen was riding on the cycle operated by Stephen Vander Made, 21, of 148½ East 13th St., when it became disabled in the left traffic lane of southbound I-96.

State Police said the truck driver, William Earl Gathardt, 53, of Eau Claire, Mich., told them he failed to see the cycle stopped in the traffic lane with no lights operating until it was too late to avoid striking the cycle.

Troopers said the truck was traveling at about 50 miles per hour at the time of the impact. Gathardt was not reported injured.

Vander Made was taken to Holland Hospital where he was admitted with lacerations, abrasions and a concussion. His condition Monday was listed as "good."

A 1972 graduate of Hope College, Miss Van Kampen was a member of Trinity Reformed Church and was a secretary in the financial aid department at Hope College.

Survivors include the parents, two brothers, David and Jack, both of Holland, a niece, four nephews and several aunts and uncles.

### Van Wylen Tells Rotary About Energy Crisis

Dr. Gordon J. Van Wylen, president of Hope College, spoke to Rotary club members on energy, Dr. Van Wylen pointed out that each individual in this country now uses about three times as much energy per day as did the person living in this country at the turn of the century.

"This increase in individual use, coupled with the great increase in population since 1900, accounts for the tremendous increase of energy consumption in this country," he said.

"Further, this trend is likely to continue into the future. Throughout the world, there is a deep desire on the part of its citizens, and this increase in the standard of living involves a greater use of energy and, thus, the demand for energy has strong international dimensions."

"As regards energy reserves," Dr. Van Wylen continued, "apart from nuclear energy the greatest reserves are by far the coal reserves of the world. The coal reserves are about 15 to 20 times larger than either the petroleum and/or natural gas reserves."

"The United States has very extensive reserves of both coal and uranium, but our reserves of petroleum and natural gas are not adequate to meet the anticipated demand in the years ahead."

"The estimated amount of petroleum only by importing substantial amounts. It is estimated that if the present trend continues, the balance of payments for petroleum imports will be \$30 billion per year in 1985."

"What is very much needed in this country is a coherent policy for energy," he said. Dr. Van Wylen concluded by listing some of the elements which might go into such a policy. They include:

"An emphasis on conserving energy as one of our natural reserves. Most Americans could use considerably less energy without significantly detracting from the quality of life."

"We should push the construction of nuclear reactors so that we no longer continue to use oil or natural gas for electrical power generation."

"We should immediately make a decision regarding what mode of transportation we will use to bring oil from Alaska to this country and proceed to implement this decision."

"We should push exploration for both oil and natural gas in this country and improve recovery techniques."

"We should vigorously push the development of the Breeder reactor so that it will be available in the early 1980s."

"We should push research on coal so as to improve the effectiveness of coal without environmental damage and vigorous push research on the area of solar energy, fusion and geothermal energy."

### Local Man, Three From Battle Creek

3 Injured Seriously;  
Family Enroute Home  
From Visit to Holland

ALLEGAN — A Holland man and two members of a Battle Creek family with relatives in Holland were among four persons killed Monday in a grinding two-car collision along rainswept M-40 near M-89 about six miles north of here. Three other persons were seriously injured.

Killed were Terry Leon Godfrey, 32, of 543 Woodland Dr., Holland, driver of one car, and Patricia Ruhlig, 33, of Battle Creek, a passenger in the car driven by her husband, Edward Martin Ruhlig, 34, and a daughter, Kristi Michelle, 9, and David Mullins, 12, of Battle Creek, a family friend.

Injured in the crash were Ruhlig, a son Eddie, 11, and Arden Gail Munger, 24, of Battle Creek, a friend of Ruhlig who was on a baseball team Ruhlig managed.

Ruhlig is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. Edward M. Ruhlig of 66 West 31st St., Holland, pastor of the Zion Lutheran church. The Ruhlig family had been visiting in Holland at the end of a vacation at a family cottage at Elk Rapids and were enroute to their battle Creek home.

Another daughter, Patty, 13, was attending the Blue Lake music camp.

Allegan county deputies said it appeared the Ruhlig car was southbound on M-40 while the Godfrey auto was northbound. The collision was believed to have occurred in the northbound traffic lane but deputies said they were unable to determine which driver was at fault. The cars slammed into guard rails after the impact. The accident occurred at 5:05 p.m.

The dead were pronounced dead on arrival at Allegan General Hospital. The injured were taken to hospitals in Kalamazoo.

Admitted to Bronson Hospital where their conditions Tuesday were listed as "serious" were Ruhlig and his son. Munger was listed in "critical" condition in Borgess Hospital with head injuries.

The Mullins youth was a friend of young Eddie and had accompanied the family to the Elk Rapids cottage, according to relatives in Holland. The spokesman said Ruhlig and Munger had driven to Holland to pick up the family which had returned from the cottage vacation and bring them back to Battle Creek.

Godfrey, who was driving alone, was a 1958 graduate of Allegan High school and was employed at Rockwell International Corp. Survivors include the wife, Ann; two children, Jeff and Lisa; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Godfrey of route 5, Allegan; two brothers, Tom of Grand Rapids and Jack of route 5, Allegan; his grandmother, Mrs. Katie Arndt of Hopkins.

Also reported injured was Winnie Langeland, 79, a passenger in the other car driven by her husband, James Arthur Langeland, 77, of 505 West 30th St.


Police said the Langeland car was southbound on Ottawa while the Schippa car was heading west along 32nd St.

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## DIESEL IS WAY TO GO FOR BLP

Grand Haven Board of Public Works made a major decision in ordering the \$970,000 diesel-powered generating unit that powered generating unit that just arrived from Oakland, Calif.

The board purchased a super-charged machine that at the time was the largest 7,000 kilowatt unit available on the American market. It is rated at 10,000 horsepower.

This machine, to go on the line in December, will boost the diesel plant generating capacity from 19,999 kws. to 24,000 kws.

One important feature of the new diesel is that while it is the largest single unit to go into the building, the space it will use is similar to a small, original diesel and will not necessitate any major structural changes at the plant — a considerable saving to the board.

The new unit, scheduled to be moved into the plant this week will sit sideways in the north end of the building with the generator in front. The other generators are in back of each machine.

The diesel plant here is a vital operation in the system, anchored by a steam plant, with two coal-burning units on Harbor Island, that generate 20,000 kw for a total system capacity of 44,000.

Electricity demands peak during each day of use. It is too costly to build for the peak. Expanding the steam plant to handle the peak load today would mean an investing of \$3 million more in a plant that would not be operating at capacity most of the 24 hours.

The diesel plant gives flexibility so units can be started up and added during the day within minutes to provide more power. It would take much longer just to put a steam boiler on the line.

A power study a few years ago, showed that steam unit of 10,000 kilowatt capacity would have cost \$4 million total, compared with the 7,000 diesel unit at \$1 million total installation expense.

Another way to look at this was the diesel cost per kilowatt is \$153 compared with \$400 for a steam installation, according to Roy Edwards, director for the Board of Light and Power.

Much of the saving in the diesel also was in the minimum of building change, compared with a much costlier installation in the building at the steam plant that would require a major change to make room for the third unit.

The foundation for the new machine to go in this week was a 180-yard continuous pour of ready-mix concrete. A crew of eight men completed this in a working day.

It takes a lot of study, and engineering considerations, to keep ahead of steadily increasing electric power usage in the Tri-Cities. The growth never stops.

Keeping the kilowatt expansion cost to a minimum is the trick. Our Board of Light and Power is doing that and staying competitive, too.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, July 15  
The Christian View of Sex  
Exodus 20:14; Matthew 5:27-28;  
1 Corinthians 13b-20

Sex is a popular subject, much talked and written about by all manner of people. God created us sexed persons, established marriage and demands that the marriage relationship be honored.

I. The seventh commandment forbids adultery. This commandment protects the home. Primarily, adultery is the intrusion of another person in the marriage relationship that exists between one man and one woman. This sin destroys the solidarity of the family. By implication this commandment forbids all manner of immorality.

Loose morals are common. Divorces are increasing among the young and middle-aged. Trial marriages, open marriage, wife swapping, premarital sex, unmarried couples living together for a time, easy abortion, permissiveness, are becoming more common. Sex is of God; marriage is a divine institution and after creation God said that everything "was very good." God said marriage and sex are holy.

II. Jesus intensified the seventh commandment. He forbade the lustful look. The Lord did not say that no one should look at a beautiful woman or a handsome man, but He said that a prolonged gaze which arouses a sinful desire which may lead to an overt act involving another person is wrong. There is a difference between desire and temptation. We are all tempted. Sin comes when the will yields to the temptation. A person can yield or resist—yield like David or resist like Joseph.

III. The body belongs to the Lord. Paul wrote much about sex in his epistle to the Corinthians. The city was notorious for its immorality. The Christians in the city came for the most part from paganism and therefore the temptation to return to its evil ways was strong. The Greeks said that the body was the source of evil. Paul said that eventually the body would be raised up since it belongs to the Lord. To use the redeemed body for sinful acts is wicked. The sex act between a married man and woman is biblical but a sexual union with a prostitute is shameful.

Today there is much frankness about sex and this is admirable for the Bible speaks of sex in a frank and open manner and tells of the joys of sex as well as of its wickedness outside of the marriage relationship and the sad consequences of this sin. Christians should remember that the Holy Spirit dwells in them to direct their lives, body, mind and soul.

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

## 1st National Reveals New Savings Rates

Donald J. Thomas, president of First National Bank of Holland, announced today that effective July 1 new savings rates will apply. Thomas noted that these changes were made possible by a recent ruling of the Federal Reserve Board enabling banks to increase interest rates above previous ceilings.

Forty-eight month certificates of deposit in amounts of \$1,000 or more will be offered at 7 per cent interest. There will be a limit of \$25,000 to any one customer in connection with these four-year certificates.

All certificate of deposit plans, except those with less than one-year maturity will have interest payment option of monthly quarterly, semi-annual or annual checks.

The conference was sponsored under the auspices of the American Philological Association and was funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities.

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



## BPW Holds Regular Meet

Routine matters were listed on the agenda as Holland's Board of Public Works held its regular meeting Monday at the Waste Treatment Plant, 23 West Second St. A tour of the plant followed the meeting.

Superintendent of Utilities Ronald Rainson said the board is just starting to look into plans for expanding the waste treatment plant and there is a possibility of getting as much as 75 per cent federal support on a new plant if the new En-

vironmental Protection Agency requirements were met. If the board proceeds with the expansion that is only in the talking stage at this time, costs are estimated at \$9 million.

The new gas turbine electrical production operation was discussed and the Board awarded a contract in the amount of \$129,950 to Lakewood Construction for the general construction and a contract of \$110,888 to Rowan and Blair Electric for the electrical construction portion.

There was also discussion on the Board's participation in the Computer Center and it was reported the Board doesn't plan to expand its participation on

the center unless it can thoroughly justify the cost. The Board uses the computer center for payroll, accounts payable and inventory system and members feel it can be done cheaper on the outside.

BPW generates about 190,000 invoices every year and members felt it was at least worth exploring the possibility of having the work done on the outside.

The Board also forwarded to the Ottawa County Road Commission and the County Supervisors the City's plans relative to expansion of the water plant and their possible participation in the project.

## Church Body Brings Suit Against City

The Reformed Church in America has filed suit in Ottawa County Circuit Court against the City of Holland to obtain a ruling on tax exemption for denomination-owned houses used by missionaries on full-time.

The Reformed Church owns three houses in Holland for missionary uses. The houses are on the tax rolls of the city and county and the city assessor's office lists the taxes for 1973 on the three properties at \$1,012.67.

Carl Ver Beek, a Grand Rapids attorney who is chairman of the General Program Council of the Reformed Church which administers the missionary program, said the church wanted clarification of the state statutes concerning tax exemption for church owned property.

Ver Beek said the denomination believed the mission houses fall into the same category as parsonages which are tax exempt under state law.

Ver Beek said the Reformed Church claims that the mission houses are parsonages because they are used by persons ordained much like the ordination of clergymen, and if there was justification for tax exemption for parsonages the church believes the exemption should be equally applicable to the mission house.

The three mission houses in Holland and one structure in New Brunswick, N. J., are the only facilities in the United States owned by the Reformed Church for missionary uses. A spokesman at the New York headquarters of the Reformed Church said the New Brunswick facility was tax exempted.

The denomination earlier this year sought approval of the city assessor's office and the board of review for tax exempt status but was turned down.

At issue is interpretation of section 211.7 of the Real Estate Exemptions of the General Property Tax law of Michigan

which exempts "All houses of public worship with the land on which they stand, the furniture therein and all rights in the pews and also any parsonage owned by any religious society of the state and occupied as such."

No hearing date was scheduled on the court suit. The properties in question are located at 29 East 21st St., 174 West 15th St. and 180 West 18th St.

## Kandu Employees Improve Mental Health Program

The back yard of the Mental Health Residential Treatment Center at 20th St. and Ottawa in Holland is taking on a new look. During the past weeks employees of Kandu Industries, Inc., of Grand Haven and Holland, have spread many yards of top soil over the sand and gravel former playground and parking area.

The yard will be seeded to grass, and will include an improved baseball field. Many of the materials used have been provided by the Holland Garden Club. The green area will beautify the building and give it a more home-like feeling for residents.

The Residential Treatment Center building served for 20 years as the West Side Christian elementary school. It was leased a year ago by Community Mental Health Services and is used as a short-term residence and treatment facility for Ottawa County residents who are experiencing emotional problems.

Kandu Industries, Inc., provides employment and job training for handicapped persons. Employees at the Center lawn project are paid for their work and at the same time receive experience in landscaping occupations. They take an obvious pride in their work.

Both Kandu and Community Mental Health Services are United Way agencies. By working together the two agencies feel they can fund contributions and other public monies most economically.

## 111 Permits Were Issued In June

A total of 111 building permits were issued during the month of June bringing the yearly total to 470, according to Holland building inspector Jack Langfeldt.

Total fees collected in June amounted to \$1,961. The year's total fee is \$7,007 on \$832,470 worth of business for the year to date.

A breakdown of permits recorded in June and the yearly amounts to date is as follows:

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
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
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

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


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## Landfill Is Issue At Meet

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Commissioners met in regular session Monday and agreed 6-4 to enter into a six-month contract with Haven Garbage to use the Olive township landfill for commercial use. The county will receive five percent of the gross fees taken in by Haven Garbage.

Hudsonville Commissioner Raymond Vander Laan told the board the solid waste committee has come to the conclusion in its thinking that a ruling must be obtained from the courts on whether the county can use the Olive township landfill or not.

The Olive township residents and their attorney Leo Hoffman will seek an injunction against the county to close the landfill until the courts decide. Residents claim the landfill is being operated on land designated for parks.

In a report presented by Ron Bakker of the Ottawa County Road Commission, total cost from Jan. 2 through June 16 were \$7,338.55 compared to \$5,369.50 in receipts. From Jan. 2 through March 17 when the landfill was operating on Tuesday afternoon and Saturday morning, receipts totalled \$1,347 and costs totalled \$2,853.96, a loss of \$1,506.

The landfill was opened all day Saturday, March 24 through June 16 and a smaller deficit resulted. It was reported receipts for that period totalled \$2,873, and costs \$3,586.22, resulting in a \$713. loss. An average of \$200 was taken in on Saturday for the past three months at the landfill.

According to William Kennedy, the landfill serves 35,000 people and if only one-half of one percent are using it, it is not needed.

Commissioner William Kiest reasoned that any business that has its hours changed as much

as the landfill's wouldn't do a good business either.

Kennedy entered a substitute motion that the board members be furnished with copies of the contract with Haven Garbage and that the issue be tabled to the Aug. 6 board meeting.

Vander Laan stated that "this is an emotion-packed issue and that he would like to get it passed without a room filled with emotionally-involved Olive township residents."

Board Chairman William Winstrom stated: "Let's approve this contract. Let's put it into the court to decide if we can operate the landfill or not." The substitute motion lost and the original motion passed making the Olive township landfill Haven Garbage's primary dumping spot.

The next meeting will be held Aug. 6 instead of the regularly scheduled Aug. 13 as Commissioners Kenneth Northouse, J. Nyhoff Poel, Kennedy and Winstrom will be attending the Michigan Association of Counties convention at Boyne Mountain Aug. 13-15.

In other business, Larry Dickman and Donna Victor explained financial deficiency of the American Red Cross Blood program. They asked for \$8,000 to pay off the deficit. It was referred to the Finance Committee.

The board approved the issuance of \$200,000 in Ottawa county bonds to purchase the additional capacity of the Wyoming Water system.

Commissioners also approved the design submitted by Gray, Lundwall and Borgeson Associates for a building to house a sawmill at Hager Park.

Commissioners planned to meet today at Community Haven in Eastmanville to hear Larry Hildore of the Social Services make recommendations on improvements there.

Peter Sherwood of Ferrysburg was appointed to the Elections Scheduling committee and Sharon Rocker of the Citizens Advisory Council to the Ottawa County Juvenile Court explained the functions of that group.

The board approved the expenditure of \$252.21 for remodeling the Christian Friendship Center and up to \$675 for installation of an air conditioner for



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
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

## Changes In City Parking Code Seen

On July 18 the City Council will act on a proposed change in the Holland ordinance code regarding off street parking.

The proposed change has two main focal points, the first concerning parking in a non-residential area and the second, parking in a residential area.

The old ruling for a non-residential area stated that there must be one square foot of parking for every square foot of floor space. This one-to-one formula has proved inadequate.

For example a warehouse does not need a square foot of parking for each square foot of floor space. Also a drive-in food franchise needs more parking space than the one to one ratio provides.

The new parking regulation for non-residential areas will coordinate parking to the use of the building and not to the size of the structure.

The school system, Chamber of Commerce, and others affected by the proposed change have responded favorably to the new proposed change according to Dale Wyngarden of the Planning Commission.

The proposed change for the residential areas calls for two changes. One of the changes concerns driveway surfacing. The change will make it mandatory to have a concrete, asphalt, or other durable surface on the driveway, if there is a sidewalk or proper curb and gutter facility on the street.

However, in the absence of the sidewalks, curbs, and gutters the driveway may be surfaced with gravel so long as this surfacing produces no nuisance either by creating dust or causing improper drainage.


The other change will limit the use of recreational and utility parking in residential areas. Permanent storage of recreational or utility vehicles or trailers in front yard areas or side yards adjoining a side street will not be permitted under the new proposal.


The spokesman said the fumes were not considered toxic.



## Chemical Fish Kill Projects Halted For State Study

Chemical reclamation projects in Lake Macatawa and other lakes in the state have been halted temporarily to review the Department of Natural Resources policy on them.

The moratorium was imposed when problems with dead fish disposal resulted after the treatment of Ford Lake in Washtenaw County.

DNR personnel had been conducting a program in Lake Macatawa and marshes east of the lake to rid the lake of unwanted fish such as carp in preparation for restocking with game fish.

Monies and chemicals on hand for the projects will be held until the projects can be rescheduled this fall or next spring, according to E. J. Trimmerger, district fisheries executive in Grand Rapids.

The moratorium affects several projects including panfish thinnings on Big Pine Island Lake and Bass Lake in Kent County and Clifford and Cowden Lakes in Montcalm County as well as the Lake Macatawa marsh project.

It is expected the moratorium will be lifted after this summer.



## Lack of Manpower Delays Lake Macatawa Dikes

Construction of the low-level levees or dikes on areas of Lake Macatawa has been delayed for at least a month, according to Project Engineer Ross Kittleman of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers who confirmed the information today.

Kittleman said the necessary field and design work has been done to protect the areas from anticipated high waters; however, higher priorities with greater problems on Lakes Erie, St. Clair and Huron have concentrated the manpower in those areas leaving a lack of staff for the project here.

Work was to have begun the middle of this month to protect the Bayview Ave. area in Holland and the Ottawa Beach Rd. area in Park township from Scotts Marina eastward along Waukazoo and Norwood areas.

The earliest the project can be started is the middle part of August, Kittleman said. Work is done under the federally-funded "Operation Foresight" program which authorizes the Corps of Engineers to do work to prevent flooding due to the high waters of the Great Lakes.

Kittleman said applications which have been received and areas looked at prior to June 30 are included in the program. Construction will be started as soon as plans and specifications can be completed. He said no new applications are being considered.

He reiterated while new applications are being accepted, "it is doubtful anything will be done under the program for lack of ability to get the work out."

Projects on this Michigan side of Lake Michigan are scheduled in St. Joseph, Benton Harbor, Muskegon, Norton Shores, Ferrysburg, Grand Haven, Spring Lake, Spring Lake township and Montague.

There has been a great deal of concern indicating a desire to have the work done before the end of July because of the high water levels projected for the end of the month, Kittleman said; however, he pointed out the real problem period will start developing in September, October and the winter months when fall and winter storms start blowing lake levels up on a day-to-day basis. The level they're talking about now is the still-water level, he said.

Kittleman said atmospheric conditions also introduce higher waters and winds can push the levels up as much as one-and-a-half to two feet higher. This is what is happening on Lake Erie with the winds upping the lake level five to six feet, and that's why work

is being done there first, he said.

Kittleman felt residents could see a slightly lower lake level next year only if the rainfall would drop back to the normal average of 31 inches. Currently the rainfall has been averaging 36 inches, he said.
