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10th Street Closing Is Rescinded

By an 8-1 vote, City Council Wednesday night rescinded action taken June 2, 1971, to close a portion of East 10th St. east from Columbia Ave. Original action was taken to expand and merge the Lincoln School playground and Lincoln Park.

Only speaker from the audience was Alvin Hamelink, 274 East 12th St., who pointed out that 10th St. is one of the few streets that allows the east side of town access to downtown without the difficulties of an almost impossible crossing at Lincoln and Eighth, and one-way traffic on both Eighth and Ninth Sts.

Councilman Al Kleis Jr., who spearheaded rescinding at the last Council meeting said the petitions he presented at that time containing 177 names were collected in a period of two or three days and that many more signatures could have been obtained at that time. His proposal had been tabled to this meeting. Kleis also said a traffic survey revealed 590 to 954 cars using that portion in a 24-hour period over a few days.

Councilman Ken Beelen asked whether barricades could be placed on 10th St. for recess activities at Lincoln School. Councilman Hazen Van Kampen pointed to growing campus activity and the possibility of eventual closing of 12th St.

City Manager William L. Bopf said modern planning encourages cul-de-sacs, but changes of this type represent substantial changes in traffic patterns, and the need for practical application should not be ignored. Councilman Robert Dykstra cast the dissenting vote.

John De Haan, 152 Birchwood, who protested rescinding of two sewer benefits for his property, was informed the matter already is under study, and he was promised a decision before assessment rolls are confirmed.

A request from Surmac Development Center for water, sanitary sewer and storm sewer at its site at M-21 and Waverly Rd. was referred to the city manager and Planning Commission.

Councilman John Bloemendaal presented petitions bearing 70 names asking that the tulip plantings on 12th St. be continued.

Councilman Donald D. Oosterbeek asked that petitions for sewer service in Heather Dr. and Hope Ave. be taken off the table for consideration at the next meeting Aug. 7. A public hearing had been held two weeks ago and a tabling motion could delay action up to 90 days.

A city manager opinion stated that the request for placing religious pamphlets on Windmill Island could be allowed, but that such action would allow other literature too, except in cases bordering on obscenity. The request had come at the last meeting from the World Home Bible League. Action denying the request was by voice vote, and not unanimous. Councilman Beelen felt that Council was overly concerned about a relatively simple request.

The oath of office for F. Sheldon Wetlack on the Human Relations Commission was filed.

A letter was read from Joel Zophy, 670 Myrtle Ave., supporting Council's decision to purchase property between Bay and Black Bass Aves. Council had voted two weeks ago to exercise options which were falling due in the interim. Further action was taken to revise the 1974-75 budget, changing the revenue sharing portion of the third entitlement period of \$51,290 for land acquisition — parks, into two portions, land acquisition — general, \$26,000, and land acquisition — parks, \$25,290. For the present, the land will be part of the city's inventory and not designated for parks.

Council voted 8-1 to hire the engineering firm of Williams and Works to provide structural analysis, cost estimates and bidding documents for work that may be required to place the bridge on Paw Paw Dr. in acceptable condition. The company also will conduct an analysis to determine the expected life of the bridge and major repair work that may be required. Cost is estimated at \$3,500 with a "not to exceed" figure of \$5,000. John Bloemendaal cast the dissenting vote.

Received for first reading was a new sign ordinance amendment concerning display signs on churches and educational institutions. Final reading and passage is expected at the next meeting.

Mayor Lou Hallacy presided at the meeting which lasted an hour and 10 minutes. All Councilmen were present. The invocation was given by the Rev. Frederick Van Houten of Ninth Street Christian Reformed Church.

\$81,800 Grant Given To Hope

Hope College has been awarded an \$81,800 grant by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to continue its Upward Bound program for fiscal 1974-75.

Upward Bound is a pre-college preparatory program designed to generate the skills and motivation necessary for success in education beyond high school among young people from low-income backgrounds and inadequate secondary school preparation. Hope College has provided the program since 1969.

This year's program consists of 75 students, 60 of them regular high school students in grades 10-12, and 15 students who have dropped out of high school who now seek a G. E. D. diploma or re-entrance to high school. Eighteen students in Upward Bound graduated from high school this year and are presently attending summer courses at Hope. The rest of the Upward Bounders are participating in an intensive six week residential program on Hope's campus, which includes a broad curriculum in the areas of: mathematics, English, developmental and remedial reading, science, social studies and expressive arts.

The vast majority of the students in the Upward Bound program are from Holland, Muskegon, and West Ottawa High Schools. There are some students also from Saugatuck, Fennville, Zeeland and Coopersville High Schools. About 70 per cent of the student enrollment is of Latino background.

On Aug. 2, the students and staff of Upward Bound will present an art exhibition, academic works exhibition, talent show and awards ceremony. The public is invited to those events. Specific information will be announced at a future date.

Police Plan Strict Enforcement Of Downtown Bikers

An increasing number of complaints about bicycle riders in the downtown area has necessitated stricter enforcement of bike laws to combat the problem, Holland Police Chief Charles Lindstrom reported today.

The downtown beautification has generated more than usual activity and the summer months and vacations draw more bicyclists to the area, Lindstrom said.

Stricter enforcement will include stopping violators and issuing written citations to adults and warning letters to parents of youngsters who violate. If problems persist with particular riders, bicycles may be impounded.

Lindstrom also warned that bicycles should be operated on the roadway in the same manner as a motor vehicle, subject to the laws of Michigan and the City of Holland including yielding to pedestrians and walking bicycles where instructed to do so.

Water Plant Sets Record Pumpage

Holland's water filtration plant, with a rated capacity of 14,000,000 gallons a day, delivered a record 16,507,000 gallons in a 24-hour period Tuesday as a dry spell continued.

Board of Public Works officials said the previous record was the 14,765,000 gallons on June 29, 1971.

Officials explained that the record included water in storage at the plant plus the rated capacity of the plant.

Of the total pumped Tuesday, 3,556,000 gallons went to Zeeland.

The BPW said a record pumpage for a Sunday occurred this Sunday when 11,066,000 gallons were delivered.

Zeeland Police Lose Radio Uses

ZEELAND — Antenna cables for the police department and sheriff's department radio communications were cut at a tower at the west end of Zeeland early Sunday and reported Tuesday by Zeeland police.

Officers said the transmission cable to the tower was cut about 20 feet above the ground apparently with a hacksaw. The vandalism knocked the Zeeland police communications off the air and forced the department to use other tower facilities in Coopersville.

Police said damage was estimated at \$100 and believed the vandalism was connected with a strike by Ottawa County Road Commission union members. The road commission shares the tower with its radio communications.

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Varnished Logs Aid Blaze

Road Haus Inn Levelled by Fire

GRAND HAVEN — The Road Haus Inn, a log-cabin type structure formerly known as The Pines, along US-31 north of M-45, was swept by flames of uncertain origin Sunday with damage estimated at \$190,000.

A state fire marshal was called to begin the investigation into the blaze which was discovered Sunday at 5:30 a.m. by two motorcyclists. The fire was believed to have originated in the center of the structure and officials said it may have been burning for about an hour before it was discovered.

More than 60 firemen from five departments battled the blaze fed by the varnished logs

of the building. Fire had broken through the roof when first firemen arrived.

The west and east walls of the building remained standing after the fire as did a fireplace. The building was owned by Richard Antekier of Grand Rapids and the Road Haus was managed by Rick Heald of Grand Haven. The facilities closed at 3 a.m. Sunday, 2½ hours before the fire was discovered.

Firemen from Grand Haven township, Robinson township, Ferrysburg, Spring Lake and Grand Haven cities responded to the alarm.

Union Employees Continue Michigan Power Strike

Michigan Power Co. employees represented by Local 16201, United Steel Workers of America, rejected a proposal Monday and continued their strike now in its third week.

Bargaining talks resumed Monday with the company and union but the 57 employees represented by the union voted to continue the strike. No new talks were scheduled. The strike affects gas customers in the Holland, Niles and Three Rivers area but supervisory personnel are maintaining the services.

Mercury Hits 96 for Second Time This Year

It was hot in Holland during the weekend.

For the second time in July, a high of 96 degrees was recorded Saturday afternoon. It also matched the season's high for 1973.

The maximum Sunday was 92, according to Weather Observer Glenn Timmer.

The alleged offense occurred Monday at 7:35 a.m. at a road commission facility in Grand Haven when a vehicle operated by William Dale Layman, 48, of Holland, attempted to pass through a gate at the facility where employees were on strike.

Layman, whose vehicle allegedly struck the two employees, was charged with simple assault under a city ordinance. Layman is an employee of the Road Commission.

A car operated by June Carol Ter Haar, 16, of 2780 Adams St., Hudsonville, northbound along Central Ave. Monday at 3:24 p.m., struck the door of a car of Jerald Harvey Lubbers, 3829 56th St., which was parked along Central Ave. 75 feet south of Tenth St. Police said the drivers door of the Lubbers car was being opened into the traffic lane as the Ter Haar car passed.

The appointment of Kurt Van Gendern as Director of Development at Hope College has been announced by President Gordon J. Van Wylen.

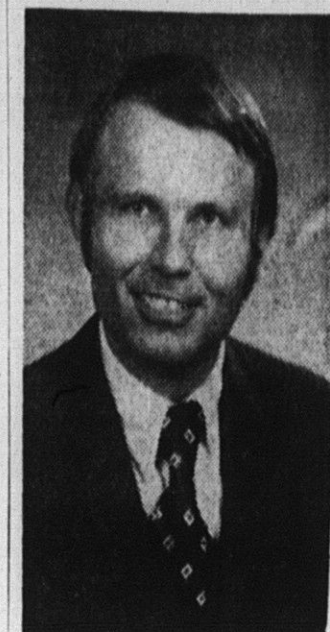
Van Gendern succeeds Robert De Young who in addition to his responsibilities as Vice President for Student Affairs served as interim Director of Development since last December.

West Ottawa Okays New Programs

The West Ottawa Board of Education Monday authorized the borrowing of \$291,000 to meet operating expenses until Sept. 30 and authorized development of a proposal to educational alternatives.

The district business manager was authorized to request permission from the state department of education to borrow summer months since tax collections will not be received until January.

The administration was authorized to proceed with development of a specific proposal that will provide alternatives to traditional programs for high school students who could benefit more from the alternatives.

A special meeting will be held July 29 to review financial matters and set the millage levy for the Aug. 26 election.

The board also authorized the establishment under the special education section of a program for the emotionally impaired child. The programs will be available in the elementary, middle and high school levels.

Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte explained to the board establishment of an advisory committee to advise the administration in the general nature of discipline the community desires in its schools and the steps to achieve the discipline.

After the report the committee will continue to advise the administration concerning the effectiveness of the discipline.

The committee will include a central office administrator, a teacher and parent from the elementary, middle school and high school levels. Appointments will be made later. Duane Hooker of the central staff will be chairman.

Teaching contracts were approved for Nancy Hill, for the emotionally impaired program on the elementary level, and Mary Tietge for mathematics and a girls athletic coach.

Rezoning Requests Granted

Public hearings on two rezoning applications and a house moving brought no opposition at a meeting of City Council Wednesday night and were all approved within 20 minutes.

One was a request from the Ottawa Savings and Loan Association to rezone two residential lots on the north side of 10th St. between Central and College Aves. from A-2 residential to C-1 neighborhood commercial.

The other was a request of John Hoogstra to rezone a lot on 33rd St. near Columbia Ave. from A-1 single family to A-2 one and two-family residential.

The third was an application from Deitz House Moving Engineers for a license to move a house and attached garage from 390 East 48th St. to 1272 Lincoln Ave.

Council granted permission to Holland Downtown Merchants to close Eighth St. from River to College Ave. Friday, July 26, from 7:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. for the annual sidewalk sale. Merchants will defray the cost of closing incurred by the city. A local downtown firm is providing free parking in the city's metered parking lots for the day. Parking meters will be bagged.

Council acknowledged with thanks the gift of \$60 from Dr. E. S. Rhind for the purchase of equipment in the fire department.

Council approved sole bid of \$6,522 by the Motorola Communications and Electronics Ind., for communications equipment for the Emergency Operations Center in the police building.

Also approved was purchase of 186,500 tulip bulbs and 2,090 other miscellaneous bulbs for the Park department and Windmill Island from Mens Brothers of the Netherlands for \$8,848.50. It was the low bid of four submitted.

Claims against the city from Charles Van Ark, 599 Graafschap Rd., Dale R. Poppema, 306 South Waverly Rd., Mrs. Peter Walters, 139 East 18th St., Mattie Manning, Alledale, and John Hutt, 134 East 35th St., were referred to the insurance carrier and city attorney.

Council confirmed certification by Councilman Vande Poel for recent purchases by the Recreation Department from Superior Sport Store for \$908.08.

A letter from Grand Haven Mayor John Walhout, representing the Michigan Municipal League, asked support of a State Revenue Sharing Enrichment Bill, and Council agreed to contact state representatives urging a yes vote.

Council granted a request from Fred Veltman to extend water service to his home at 1024 West 32nd St. outside the city limits, subject to certain conditions.

A request from Reimink Plumbing and Heating Co. for additional funds in connection with a 1970 contract to install some air conditioners was rejected. It involved a sales tax figure of some \$629 which was not included in the bid. The company had been unaware of a change in the sales tax law requiring tax on supplies for municipal projects. The city manager said that although the city is entirely satisfied with the work performed, he did not feel it a vice precedent.

A letter from Margaret Ewing requested permission to install sewer service at 1206-1214 South Shore Dr. with two connections on one lead. Council pointed to a possible alternative of a manhole installation but gave no assurance such an installation would be approved.

Announcement was made that the Michigan Municipal League will hold its annual meeting in Detroit Sept. 11-13. Council's delegate and alternate will be named later.

On recommendation of the Planning Commission, Council denied an application from Terborg and De Young to rezone approximately 36 acres of agricultural land at the southeast corner of 40th St. and Graafschap Rd. to allow development of a mobile home park.

Lines Sag, Power Cut To Central City Area

An estimated 1,500 electric customers lost power for about one hour Monday afternoon when a 12.5 KV line shorted out at Sixth St. near Central Ave.

Board of Public Works officials said the warm weather apparently allowed the lines to sag and additional spacers were added to correct the situation to the affected lines. The power went off at 3:20 p.m. Monday and was restored gradually by 4:15 p.m. Part of the downtown business district was affected by the power outage.

It's always nice to hear a kind word about Holland and Hope College, and a letter from a Japanese man written from Salonika, Greece, refers to a happy experience back in 1966 when he spent two weeks on campus here for the college's Summer Session in American Studies.

Hideyo Araki, at that time a sophomore of Meiji Gakuin University but today at the University of Salonika on a Greek government scholarship, had spent those pleasant two weeks here in 1966 as a guest in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Vearly Coffman, North Division. His memories were spurred by a note from Mom Coffman written from a hospital bed that 39 students and two staff members of Meiji Gakuin University in Tokyo would be on Hope campus again this summer. Mom and Dad Coffman still call him Jim.

The 1966 session for students not only from Japan but also from Yugoslavia, Germany and The Netherlands, gave Araki an enlarged view of cosmopolitanism. Living with the Coffmans, he was able to see the role of the family in a society, that of the father and of the mother in a family.

Araki returned to Holland shortly before the 1973 Tulip Time festival and visited the Coffmans. He also found Hope College much larger and was glad to learn the college had enlarged its international department.

Now in Greece with his wife and two sons, Araki is often reminded of Hope College, sometimes by Japanese students who have been at Hope College and by Hope College students now in Greece.

"I have learned that the performance of your Hope students has been very high. I am very proud of this, because I love Hope and know its high standard of education with the deep idea for better understanding among many nations. Many students of Meiji Gakuin have visited and will visit Hope College in your charming city, and Hope students come to Greece to study . . . and I am here in Greece, who twice learned a lot at Hope College."

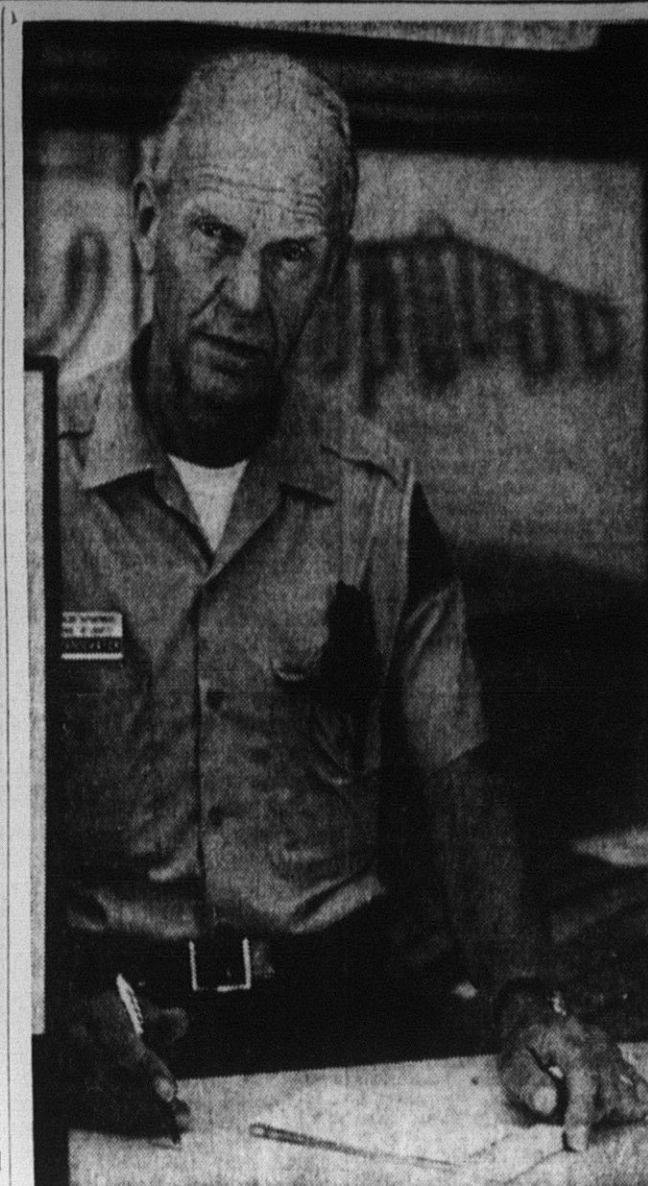
Many local business and professional people will be involved as discussion leaders, panelists, and advisors in specific occupational areas.

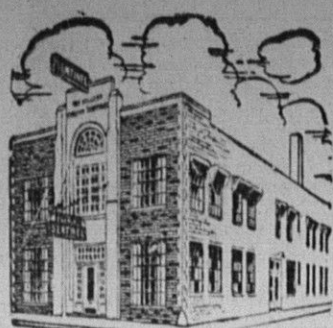

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BICENTENNIAL UPBEAT

The head of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration comes on strong as an optimist who believes in an upbeat approach to commemoration of our country's 200th anniversary. He also is one who goes about the nation preaching the gospel of grassroots Bicentennial planning, funding and involvement. This commendable outlook makes John W. Warner a good choice for the task of rallying the American people at this late hour. The former secretary of the Navy comes to that task with a congressional mandate to get cracking after years of squabbling and indecision by the Bicentennial Administration's predecessor.

As Warner points out, the earlier talk of huge, commercialized fairs or expositions as the core of Bicentennial activity has pretty much given way to the grass roots idea. Now, though Congress has authorized a 20-million-dollar grant to be divided equally among the states, the emphasis is on planning and funding at the state and municipal levels.

There has been a strong response to this from around the country. The Bicentennial Administration reports that as of about the end of June it had received word of some 2,000 projects planned in roughly 1,000 communities. More are expected within the near future.

That is heartening, at least so far as the number of proposals is concerned. It also should be kept in mind, however, that the nature of the projects to be undertaken is important.

A great many are focused on a historical theme. Our hope is that there also will be projects which look to the future in light of the nation's experience thus far, emphasizing ways in which the great doctrines of freedom and equality can be better implemented over the next century. For as Warner remarked the other day, the Bicentennial must be "far more than a parade with firecrackers or we will have lost a great opportunity..."

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, July 21
Partnership in the Gospel
Philippians 1:1-11; 4:10-13
By C. P. Dame

Two lessons from Paul's letter to the church in Philippi will engage our thoughts for two weeks. The two will give us interesting information about the letter and the writer. This lesson teaches us the importance of partnership in the service of Jesus Christ.

I. A church is an organization. Acts 16 tells about the founding of the church in Philippi, which was the principal city in Macedonia, a Roman colony, during Paul's second missionary journey. The city was inhabited by Roman legionnaires. Evidently few Jews lived there, not enough to have a synagogue. Paul preached to a number of women gathered by the riverside for prayer. One of them, Lydia was converted. Later on the fort, tunetelling maid and then the jailer and his family became believers.

Paul wrote the letter in prison in Rome, about the year 62 A.D. The letter is very personal, contains no words of reproach, but reveals a joyful spirit and was sent to express appreciation for a gift sent by the church. The church was composed of the "saints in Christ Jesus," people set apart for the Lord and governed by bishops or elders and by deacons—see Acts 6:1-6. Paul and Timothy were Christ's servants, wholly belonging to Him, body and soul. Observe that the church was organized.

II. Pastor and people form a partnership. Paul thanked God for his remembrance of the Philippian Christians, and of their partnership with him in the preaching of the gospel, in suffering, in prayer, in witnessing and in service. Note Paul's confidence. God had begun a good work and would complete it. Consider Paul's prayer for discerning love which may lead to more knowledge and fruitfulness and "to the glory and praise of God."

III. Givers enrich. Epaphroditus, a member of the church had brought a gift to prisoner Paul which he appreciated deeply. Although Paul was in prison he was content due to his relationship with Jesus Christ. His contentment was not dependent upon circumstances they did not control him but he had control over them. A believer's relationship to Jesus Christ affects his attitude toward his condition and circumstances and people. The words, "I can do all things in Him who strengthens me," deserve to be remembered by all believers.

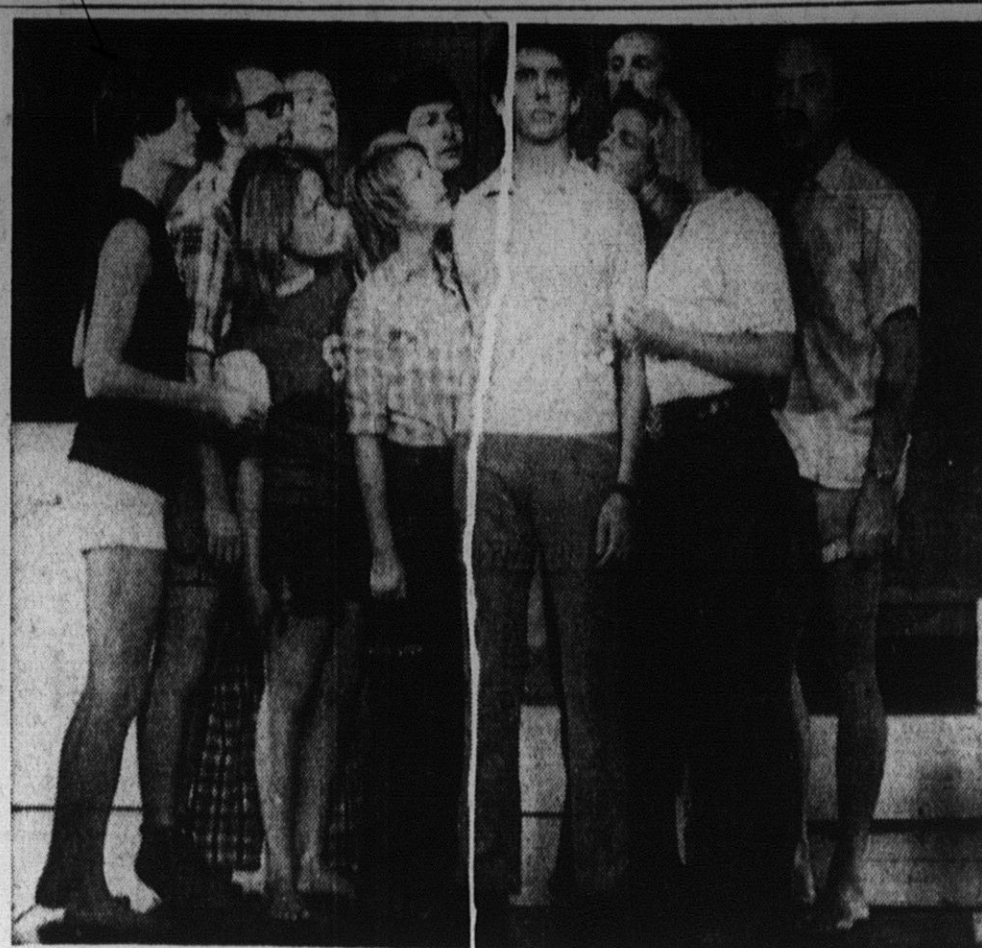

Tuesday night's audience at the Red Barn Theatre really enjoyed itself as the opening of the modern musical "Company" revealed some fine comedy and some excellent musical talent that took plenty of energy from its fresh young resident company. The title song "Company" opens the action.

Kirk Swenk as Robert, the eligible bachelor who tries to avoid actual marital involvement, does a creditable job in his dual role of lead and choreographer for the show. He is quite believable as the "poor lonesome baby" all the married women try to take care of and he appealed to all the married women in the audience who at one time or another have known somebody exactly like "Robert."

Each pair of married couples had a different problem that somehow rose to the surface as he visited each one. Deborah Nelson as Sarah and Don Bonevich as Harry were the dieting variety with the karate practice who actually "threw each other" on the stage.

Julie Bellisle and David King were Jenny and David who "turned on" together with Robert's help in the pot department. Kristin and Arnold Johnston managed to achieve freedom to live together by getting a divorce.

Mary Godfrey as Joanne sings one of Stephen Sondheim's most famous songs "Ladies Who Lunch" explaining the rich, bored women and their inactive marriages. Her patient husband was played by Simon Frederick.

In one of the show-stopping scenes in the musical, Paula Dewey sings the difficult and rapid-fire "Getting Married Today." Although Paula who plays the role of Amy has been living for years with Paul, played by Gayland Spaulding, they decide to take the plunge into matrimony, only to have Amy get panicky at the last minute and turn to Robert for advice. The action draws the most applause of the musical.

Karen Kalinsky as Marta, Linda Starkweather as Kathy and Joy Pylman as April play Robert's assorted girl friends with April, the stewardess, taking the most active role in the bedroom scene which was well done as the five married women sing their songs of concern for "Poor Baby."

Other songs include three of the husbands singing the clever "Sorry - Grateful" telling how they really feel about marriage. Martha Dewey ties the production together in her musical direction and as accompanist.

Ted Kistler directs the play and has designed a workable setting which requires quick changes in the least possible confusion. He is quick to realize his role at the Red Barn Theatre as a director following a

long-term monopoly and has wisely stayed out of the limelight giving all the applause and credit to his performers.
