## Freon Sniffing Linked to Death

## Hamilton Youth Killed In Crash

Matthew John Brink, 16, of route 2, Hamilton was fatally injured Sunday when the car he was driving collided head-on with another auto at 3:30 p.m. along the narrow and gravelled 57th St. a half mile north of 133rd Ave. north of New Richmond.

Allegan County deputies said Brink's car was northbound on 57th while the other car, driven by David Bureson, 23, of St. Joseph, was southbound. Deputies said dust from heavy road use may have obscured the vision of the drivers.

Brink suffered internal injuries and died in Holland Hospital at 6:15 p.m. He was the eighth traffic fatality in Allegan County this year.

Bureson and two passengers in his car, Garred Bureson, 9-months, and Peggy Hettinger, 19, of Stevensville, were injured and treated in Holland Hospital and released.

Brink was a baptized member of the East Saugatuck Christian Reformed Church and would have been a senior at Hamilton High School this fall.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Laurence Brink; two sisters, Mrs. Dale (Pamela) Tanis of Kalamazoo and Mrs. Bruce (Patti) Grothuis of Webberville; two brothers, Brad L. and Keldon L., both at home and his paternal grandfather, Justin Schievink of Hamilton.

## Shoreline Report Set For Allegan

ALLEGAN—A 60-page report on shoreline management for Allegan County and recommending the use of innovative techniques to preserve the shorelines was to be submitted to the county commissioners this month.

The report was prepared by Region 8 of the West Michigan Shoreline Planning Commission.

Erosion and the need for more public access to Lake Michigan were two key problems identified in the study. The study said only six per cent of the shoreline was in public ownership in Allegan County.

Population growth can be expected in the northern half of Laketown township south of Holland, in the Saugatuck-Douglas area and along the shoreline south of Douglas.

Among the recommendations of the study are more comprehensive and stringent land use regulations, sand mining legislation, regulation of the use of off-the-road vehicles, increased funding and new state programs to acquire shorelands for preservation and public enjoyment and establishment of a system of public parks and nature preserves.

The study said a variety of structures have been constructed to prevent erosion along the lake shorelines but added there is no guarantee that the structures will accomplish the intended purpose and the investment may be lost altogether.

## June Was Wet First, Then Hot

June had a wide variety of weather this year, the first part wet and the last part hot.

Records kept by Weather Observer Glen Timmer reveal a total rainfall of 5.31 inches including the worst hailstorm on record June 4, followed later in the month by a hot spell which had temperatures of over 90 on five days.

The hailstorm which brought hailstones up to three inches in diameter caused severe damage particularly north of Holland. Rainfall on that occasion totaled 1.54 inches. A severe thunderstorm June 14-15 resulted in 1.0 inches of

GRAYLING — One member of the Road Knights motorcycle club from Holland is dead and another was treated in a hospital for possible overdoses of freon, State Police at Houghton Lake said today.

Dead is Wally L. Blake, 21, of 1995 Ottawa Beach Rd. He was one of about 30 members of the Road Knights camping in a field in a state forest area near Grayling for the holiday.

State Police said Blake was taken unconscious to the post and was revived twice before being taken to Mercy Hospital where he died Saturday shortly after being admitted.

Troopers said Blake apparently died of asphyxiation but the exact cause of death was not known pending results of an autopsy.

The name of the person treated in the hospital and released was not immediately learned from State Police or the hospital.

Freon is the chemical propellant used in aerosol spray cans.

Blake and other members of the motorcycle club had been in the Grayling area for the holiday.

He moved to Holland six years ago from Wyoming, Mich. and had been employed by Brute Construction Co. of Hudsonville.

Survivors include the wife, Barbara; his mother, Mrs. Mary Blake of Holland; a brother, Leo of Wyoming; a sister, Mrs. Donna Lightfoot of Holland; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Leo Powney of Wyoming; his in-laws, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Heyboer of Zutphen, several nieces and nephews.

## Electric And Water Rates Up

ZEELAND — Zeeland City Council ratified a Board of Public Works recommendation to increase electric rates 5.1 per cent and all classes of water rates 10 per cent at a regular meeting Monday night.

The new rates will become effective at various dates throughout the year.

Council also approved increasing the water tap rate from \$75 to \$100 and temporarily tabled a BPW request to increase water main charges to \$7 a front foot. The existing rate is \$4 a foot.

A public hearing was set 7 p.m. July 21 to consider establishing "industrial development districts" for two areas in the city. The areas would include a new manufacturing facility for Herman Miller Inc. and Ottawa Door Lights Inc.

Following a public hearing, Council approved rezoning property on the southwest corner of Main and Jefferson to a parking district, on request of First Baptist Church. The church plans to remove an existing dwelling for a church parking lot.

City Building Inspector Arthur Grimes informed Council that an estimated 50 per cent of swimming pools in the city were not in compliance with safety requirements. Council last year passed an ordinance requiring all pools to meet these requirements by June 1, 1975. The inspector was instructed to send a second courtesy letter to pool owners. The city attorney commented on the potential liability of property owners who did not meet safety requirements, also the city if enforcement of safety regulations is not effective.

An opinion of the Department of Labor on the city's request for information on minimum necessary qualifications for a building inspector was presented by the city attorney. The state said it was not enforcing stringent codes but is instead instituting a certification program for Michigan building inspectors. Several Councilmen commented that most cities and townships could not meet these requirements and, if strict state enforcement were made, all construction and administration would cease.

A letter from the "Concerned Citizens Group" requested information on the recent toilet constructed on North Michigan St., also on plans to move police headquarters to the municipal center on Church St. The letter was referred to Council's public relations committee.

Daniel Ash again appeared to object to inconsistent enforcement on the city's burning ordinance in residential areas, and requested Council to ban all burning in the city.

The appointment of Miss Tara Conaway as city librarian was approved. Miss Conaway, who has been a teacher and librarian in the Port Huron Public School system, will start work around July 15.

## Firemen Ask Aid In Access Roads

Holland firemen are concerned about access routes in the Central Park area of the city where South Shore Dr. is being improved and a sked residents to indicate to firemen when making fire calls which routes are open to the fire location.

Fire Chief Marvin Mokma said the department is making efforts to keep posted daily on which roads are closed or inaccessible but said it would help if residents, when reporting a fire, would take a few moments to indicate which access roads are still open to the fire location.

Such help would cut the time necessary for fire trucks to reach the location, Mokma said.

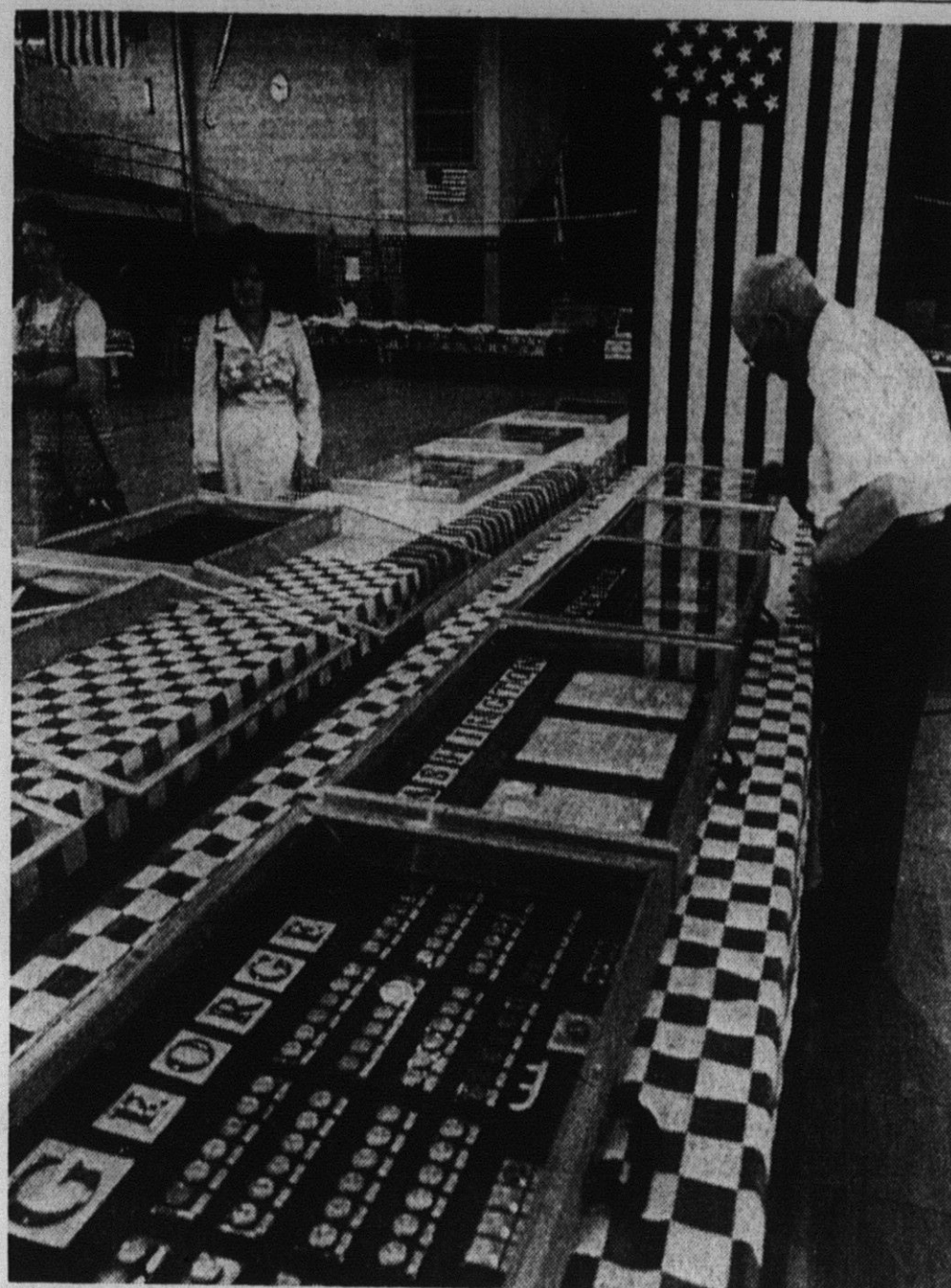
## Slug Strikes Boy Playing in Yard

Deputies said the incident was reported at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday and Todd was taken first to Zeeland Community Hospital and transferred to Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids where his condition Wednesday was "fair."

Deputies said a slug from a 22-caliber weapon entered his left shoulder below the collarbone and lodged in the shoulder blade.

Officers said Todd was playing in his yard when he heard a shot and felt something hit his shoulder.

## Dorr Man Swept From Harbor Pier

SAUGATUCK — Skin divers from the Allegan County sheriff's department resumed their search today in Lake Michigan off the channel for the body of Paul David Langlois, 18, of route 2, Dor, who was swept from the south pier by high winds and waves while fishing and is presumed drowned.

Allegan deputies said two other fishermen who left the pier moments earlier stopped to turn back and saw Langlois being swept off the pier Tuesday at 4:45 p.m.

Deputies said Steve Detrick of Grand Rapids and Larry Prime of Ohio ran back to where Langlois had been fishing and saw him about 50 to 75 yards from the pier in heavy seas.

Deputies said a search was launched for Langlois but darkness and rough weather conditions forced cancellation.

Officers said winds were estimated at 20 to 25 miles per hour and the Coast Guard said seas were running two to five feet.

## 2 Demand Test On Marijuana Count

Michael Edward Gehl and Jose Ramon Trevino, both 24 and both from Grand Rapids, demanded examination at their arraignment in Holland District Court Monday to charges of possession of marijuana.

Gehl was released on \$2,000 personal recognizance bond and Trevino was released on \$1,000 recognizance bond.

Zeeland police said they confiscated a quantity of marijuana from the car driven by Gehl and stopped in traffic. Officers said they stopped the car because occupants allegedly had tossed fireworks from the car while traveling westbound on M-21 from Hudsonville on the Fourth of July.

## County And Citizens To Tour Road

GRAND HAVEN — Recommendations of the County Development Committee concerning widening of Leonard Rd. in Crookery township failed to surface at the Board of Commissioners meeting Tuesday although citizens and some commissioners pressed the issue.

An "observation" by Road Commissioner Robert Soule indicating a possible conflict of interest by two members of the development committee drew strong denial from commissioners Marilyn Sherwood and John Langeland.

When the discussions, which took up most of the morning session, were over, commissioners directed they meet with the Road Commission members and an equal number of Leonard Rd. citizens Friday afternoon and tour the 3.9 miles of roadway between 112th and 138th Aves. and study the plans and answer questions.

The Road Commission proposes to obtain necessary right of way to allow certain improvements in the road, including widening and sloping of shoulders.

Langeland, who has been active with a citizens group opposing the Road Commission project, is a member of the development committee and said the committee had voted two to one to reject the widening plan. The other member was Marilyn Sherwood.

Committee chairman Herbert Wybenga, in what amounted to a minority report, said he believed the Road Commission plans were good safety factors and that speed limitations could be imposed if desired.

Langeland defended himself as a member of the committee after Soule made what he called were "observations" as to Langeland's and Sherwood's interests.

Soule claimed Mrs. Sherwood had indicated "obligations" toward residents opposed to the widening project.

Langeland and Mrs. Sherwood both said they sought legal counsel regarding the propriety of serving on the development committee and both said legal research indicated no conflict of interest.

Mrs. Sherwood said a Leonard Rd. property owner had contributed \$10 to her campaign and she had shown her interest in the matter to "show that I was not insensitive to the matter."

## Boat Sinks in River, 11 On Board Saved

EASTMANVILLE — Eleven persons on board a 27-foot inboard cruiser escaped injuries Saturday when the craft struck an underwater object and sank in shallow water of the Grand River east of Eastmanville.

Ottawa County deputies said the boat was owned and operated by Raymond Lee Fisher Jr., 36, of Grand Rapids, and was valued at \$4,000.

## School Board Elects New President

The board voted to hold two official board meetings a month. These meetings will be held the first and third Mondays at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

Jack Marquis was retained as legal counsel for routine legal matters.

The board adopted a resolution recognizing John Amaya for his four years of service to the board.

Work continued on the 1975-76 budget. All members were present at the meeting which lasted three hours.

## Bids on Bike Paths Set For Road

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Commissioners Wednesday recommended the Road Commission take bids with alternatives on installing bicycle paths along a portion of Ottawa Beach Rd. scheduled for widening later this year.

Park township told commissioners they were willing to share in the cost of installing bicycle paths along the 4,000 feet of improvements to Ottawa Beach Rd. west of the Pine Creek bridge if the county would pay half the cost.

Commissioners wanted to wait for reports from the West Michigan Shoreline Regional Development Commission which was studying bicycle paths for the county before committing itself to a bike path program.

A change in the carrier for the county's life insurance program for employees was approved by commissioners effective Aug. 1. The coverage will be provided by the Meyer Agency of Hamilton at a savings of \$1,100 for similar existing coverage.

Commissioners adopted a resolution concerning equal employment opportunity in county employment which was prepared by the prosecutor's office.

Application for a grant renewal for the jail corrections program for the fiscal year beginning July 1 was approved by commissioners. The federal government will pay 90 per cent of the \$53,869 cost with the state and county each picking up five per cent or \$2,693.

Commissioners approved a modification request for the summer youth program under Title VI which would expand the funds available from the present \$89,000 to \$144,000.

## Study Of Holland Area Completed

GRAND HAVEN — A massive, inch-thick "Comprehensive Development Planning Study" of Southwest and East Ottawa County" was presented to Ottawa County Commissioners Tuesday for their study.

A similar study was completed earlier for the northwest section of the county and will become useful in application for future federally-funded projects, commissioners said.

The study recommends establishment of an advisory committee to the commissioners and creation of regional planning committees for the three areas.

The study was completed by the West Michigan Shoreline Regional Planning Commission and explained by project director Jack Koerper who said the Greater Holland Planning Committee was already studying plans for development of the Southwest section of the county.

The report includes a detailed study of land use, housing and residential development, economic conditions, population age and density, economic development opportunities and goals and objectives.

Commissioners also received a "working paper" on a Human Resources study which details the work of 110 agencies providing more than 600 programs to county residents.

The study again done by the WMSRDC, showed there has been a lack of evaluation of existing programs by the agencies, a duplication of services and a lack of public knowledge concerning available programs.

Commissioners approved five additional CETA positions for the Mental Health Department including two summer-time positions and asked the manpower committee, in making future appointments, to tailor the Title II program so that majority of the county positions would expire by the end of 1976 provided the payment of unemployment benefits is required.

A low bid of \$19,507 for an addition to a barn at Community Haven at Eastmanville, new milking stalls in the barn and a barn cleaner was approved and the taking of bids for a milk storage tank not to exceed \$6,000 was authorized.

Ottawa County Bicentennial committee chairman Avery Baker of Holland presented commissioners a Nylon Bicentennial flag for use at the County Building to replace one presented to commissioners by Gov. William G. Milliken which Baker suggested be preserved in a county museum.

Larry Hildore, director of the Ottawa County Department of Social Services, was cited by commissioners for the department's 0-5 program which won national honors at the National Association of Counties convention recently in Hawaii. The program seeks to bring welfare children up to the physical, emotional and educational levels of other children their age.

Commissioners recessed their meeting until Wednesday afternoon.

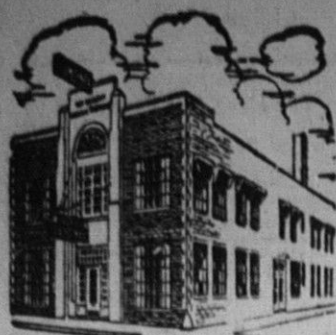
## Explosion, Fire Ruin Mobile Home

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## A DIET OF PAP IN CUBA

One of the abiding constants in authoritarian societies is dullness. A dispatch about the official press (which is to say, the only press) in Cuba makes the point. Readers are limited to two national newspapers, one the Communist party's organ, the other the voice of the party's youth wing. They are, writes Stanley Meisler in the Los Angeles Times, "heavy with texts of speeches, stories about coming programs, features about development projects and productive workers, and tributes to the Soviet Union."

To get the full flavor, consider Page One of the party organ on a typical day: an account of a Castro speech saying the Russians' World War II defeat of Nazi Germany (!) showed socialism's superiority over capitalism, plus stories reporting "that the Russian ambassador had awarded medals to the leaders of the Cuban Communist party, that government officials would honor a women's brigade that day for cutting 50 million pounds of sugar cane, and that Sen. George S. McGovern had returned to Washington."

With stimulating news like that, who needs a soporific at siesta time?

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, July 13  
What Is Christian Maturity?  
Ephesians 4:11-16;  
Philippians 4:11-16;  
1 John 3:1-3.

The three passages from the New Testament which comprise the lesson text furnish enough material for three lessons. The first two passages were written by Paul while in prison, the other was written by the Apostle John. Both men were great lovers of Christ. The Lord's Church today needs members and workers who are growing in Christ-likeness.

I. God is concerned about His church. And that is the reason why He gave a variety of workers to His church. God gave to the early church, apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors and teachers. Since that time due to the change there are different office-bearers in churches. Note that the Lord gave workers and leaders.

The work of the leaders is to play the role of coaches — to train and equip members to work to build up the church. Every member in the church should become Christlike through the ministry of trained members. The purpose for every member is to keep standing up firmly for the truth regardless of the ill winds of fads and trends. The ideal is that every member is related wholly to Christ and all are related to each other through Christ. God has a great purpose for His church and hence He is concerned.

II. A concerned Christian has a goal. Although Paul had many advantages he was not satisfied with himself. Are you? And he wanted to grow and become more Christlike and to measure up to the purpose for which he had been called of God. A person may be so concerned with the past that he forgets to look ahead. To forget the failures and successes of the past is a forward step if this is followed by a resolve to forge ahead. "I press forward toward the goal" so wrote prisoner Paul. This goal would be reached only by wholehearted effort and a complete surrender to Jesus Christ. Eternal life with Christ was his aim. What goal do you have?

III. A concern for the future is sensible. The third passage is from the pen of John. Three truths he records: the first is that Jesus will come back again. We look for that today. The second is that we will see Him when He comes. And the third thing to note is that we will be like Him—sinless, wholly free. All the members of God's family will be like the Elder Son, the Redeemer who made sonship possible. The word "concern" is a good word to keep to the fore as we pray and work to grow up more and more, becoming mature Christians in a world of much immaturity.

## New Surgical Suite Ranks High in Hospital Priorities

A completely new surgical suite has a high priority in the \$12.9 million building program proposed for Holland City Hospital, it was revealed today by William LaBarge, president of the Hospital Board.

"It's been nearly 20 years since any remodeling has been done," said LaBarge. "The deficiencies cited in our last Michigan Department of Public Health inspection report are so extensive that we can no longer consider just remodeling. A new surgical suite is now at the top of our priority list."

A remodeled surgical suite was one of the recommendations submitted in 1973 by Tribrook Group, Inc., a hospital consulting firm, in its long range plan and organization study. Because the surgical suite deficiencies were not apparent at the time of the recommendations, it was thought the present surgical suite could be remodeled now with a new suite scheduled for construction in 1983.

"To comply with government standards for hospital surgical suites requires changes of such scope that a new, rather than a remodeled surgical suite, is the only practical solution," LaBarge said.

Slenk had a homer for Westernbrook while Al Russell had two round trippers and Rich Hamstra one for Lake Ranch.

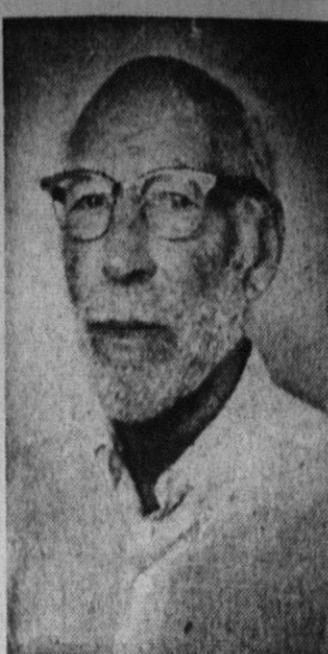
## Parents Without Partners To Play Miniature Golf

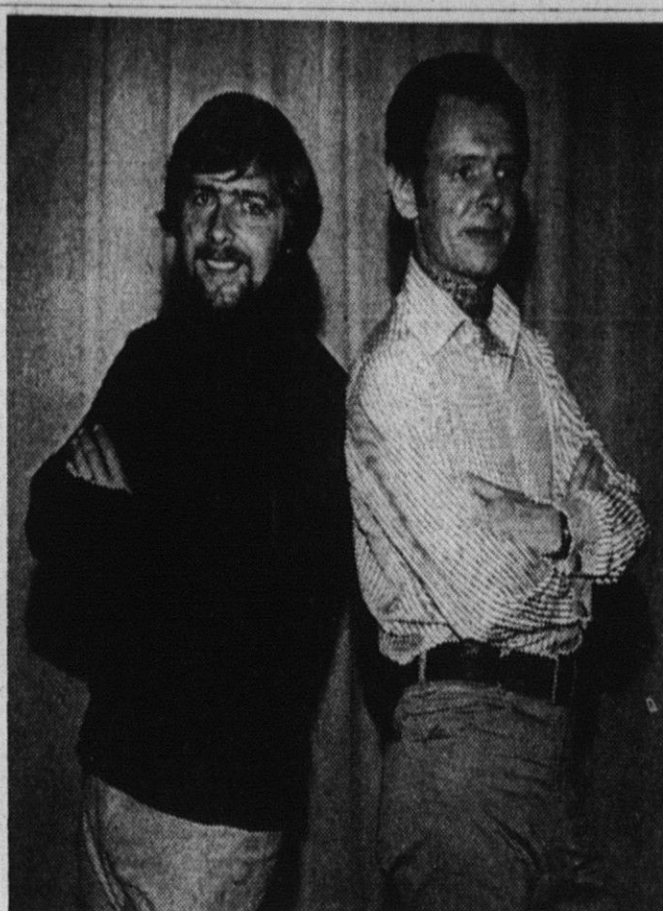
