Approve Zoning Amendment In City Council Action

City Council unanimously adopted a zoning ordinance amendment to rezone property west of Maple Ave. between 31st and 32nd Streets from A-2 one and two family residential to C-1 neighborhood commercial after a public hearing on the issue was held at the regular Council meeting Wednesday evening.

The adoption of the zoning amendment clears the way for the building of a new Kroger Store or similar retail grocery store, and the rehabilitation of the former Kroger Store into small related businesses, according to Dr. Frank Dykema. Dykema is the president of John Dykema Sons Company, a local corporation which leased property to the Kroger Company prior to the burning of the Kroger Store in March. The statement by Dykema was made upon questioning by Jason Roels as to the proposed use of the property if rezoned.

Also adopted unanimously following public hearings were an application from Jacob Essenburg for a variance from the requirements of the Fire District Ordinance in connection with the construction of a car wash at 523 West 17th St., and an application from Vandenberg Motors, Inc., for variance from requirements of the Fire District Ordinance to permit the construction of a body shop on property at 1191 Washington Ave.

A resolution to eliminate all parking on the west side of River Ave. between 3rd and 11th Streets passed unanimously. Traffic designations such as the left turn restrictions and bus stops will remain the same.

The parking elimination, which will complete the removal of all parking on either side of River Ave. from the northern city limits to 19th st., will be effective upon publication of these council proceedings and posting of additional signs. Councilman Robert Dykstra suggested the posting of additional signs directing persons to parking facilities at various other locations.

An application from the Jacob Essenburg Co. for a permit to install gas pumps in connection with a car wash at 523 West 17th St. was adopted on the following conditions: installation of a sand gravel interceptor ahead of the discharge into sanitary sewer, easement be granted for installation of storm water drainage structure, and parking blocks be used to channelize the traffic existing on 17th St. to harmonize with the present traffic pattern.

In further business Council approved the seven year extension of a lease by the First Methodist Church and the city for the metered off-street parking lot on 10th St., west of River Ave. The lot is jointly owned by Mass estate and the church and the extended lease will coincide with the Mass estate lease which will terminate July 1, 1975. The Mass lease was initially for 15 years, the church lease from the city for eight years.

A change of a speed limit of 35 miles per hour to 45 miles per hour on Waverly Road from 32nd St. to 48th St. was carried unanimously. It will be effective upon publication of these council proceedings and posting of the area with appropriate signs. Jason Roels, of 322 West 33rd St. commented upon the bad appearance of the corner of the corner of Washington Ave. and 32nd St. He also proposed the installation of a turnaround on vacated service station property at the corner and possible entry to Michigan Ave. from Washington Ave. at that point.

A resolution was carried to publish notice to all owners of property within the city that all unpaid utility charges which have remained unpaid for a period of three months or more prior to June 30, 1968, and which are not paid by July 31, 1968, shall be assessed upon the city's tax roll. The city auditor's report listing the utility bills unpaid for three months or more was presented.

A report was made by Councilman Morris Peerbolt stating a meeting was set for July 25 to interview more firms concerning the Data Processing system for the city.

George Hillis, area manager for the Automobile Club of Michigan, presented a plaque to Mayor Nelson Bosman symbolizing a Pedestrian Safety Citation awarded to the City of Holland for having no pedestrian fatalities for three years.

Councilman Dykstra urged the republication of the obnoxious weed ordinance and asked persons who have complaints of weeds growing over 12 inches in height on property other than their own to notify the Department of Health.

Council accepted the bid of R. G. Moeller Company for the Trojan Model 204A front end loader for the amount of \$18,700. Council also accepted the bid of Safe-T-Fence for \$2,614 for fencing of Holland Heights Magic Square. It was the low of four bids.

Oaths of office from the Rev.

Miner Stegenga, Human Relations Commission; Mark Vander Ark, Human Relations Commission; and Marvin Wabeke, member of panel of Space Heating Examiners, were filed. A claim against the city by Hattie Hinken, of 333 East Lakewood Blvd., was referred to the city's insurance carrier for consideration and action.

A note of thanks from Mrs. Bertal Slagh was filed. The Appropriations and Disbursements report for the period ended May 31, 1968, as prepared by the city auditor was presented and filed.

City Manager Activity Report covering activities of various departments, including collections by the City Treasurer was presented and filed.

Purchases were approved for the following: Councilman Dyk, Holland Litho, Engineering Department, \$280.80; Councilman Lamb, Lamb, Inc., Fire, Engineering and Cemetery Departments, \$100; Councilman Peerbolt, Peerbolts, Inc., Windmill Island, \$11.75; Councilman Smith, Wade Drug Co., Police, Fire and Recreation Departments, \$76.99.

The Council adjourned at 8:20 p.m. Mayor Bosman presided and Councilman Bertal Slagh was reported absent. The invocation was given by Dr. J. J. De Valois.

Immediately after the meeting at a gathering of councilmen and the mayor, in the mayor's office, Sen. Gary Byker of Hudsonville presented a State of Michigan Senate and House of Representative resolution to Henry J. Steffens, honoring him as retired Hope College treasurer and vice-president for financial affairs.

Grand Rapids Boy, 12, Drowns At Grand Haven

GRAND HAVEN — A Grand Rapids boy, Michael Howard, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Howard, drowned in Lake Michigan at the state park here Wednesday night.

The child was one of 135 youths from the Hall School Recreation Department who went to Grand Haven in three buses for an outing at the park. The youths were reportedly using the buddy system and swimming in pairs, when the boy was reported missing about 7 p.m. Michael's two brothers, Larry, 13, and Robert, 10, were also in the group.

The life guard immediately called everyone out of the water and a human chain was formed and the body located within minutes. It was found in four feet of water about 125 feet from shore.

Mouth to mouth resuscitation was given by the life guard with Michigan State Police at Grand Haven assisting. An ambulance was called and a resuscitator was used on the way to the North Ottawa Community Hospital where the boy was pronounced dead at 7:50 p.m. by Dr. Robert N. Gamble.

The body was first taken to the Kammeraad Funeral Home here and later transferred to the Alt Mortuary in Grand Rapids.

Fennville Man Dies at Age 67

FENNVILLE — Harry Jansen, 67, of route 2, Fennville, died Sunday afternoon of an apparent heart attack.

He had lived in Chicago until June, 1968, when he moved to Lake Shore Rd. He had been a foreman of the Bird and Sons Roofing Co., Chicago, until his retirement in 1966. His wife, Martha died in 1950.

Surviving are one sister, Miss Elizabeth Jansen of Fennville; and one brother, Henry of Garden Grove, Calif.

Marine Hero Roark Gets Purple Heart In Vietnam Action

Lance Corporal Bruce J. "Huey" Roark of the Marines has added a second purple heart to the one he received in March for wounds received in action in Vietnam.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Allison Roark of 526 Flesher St., Spring Lake, former Ada resi-

dents, was a hero in the battle for Hill 689 north of Khe Sanh. Evidently the UPI news dispatch was held up until all the Marines had been removed by helicopter and were safely in the Landing Zone.

According to Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Roark, brother and sister-in-law of the battling Marine, who live in Hamilton, he was actually wounded on July 7. This information was received in a telegram delivered to the parents last Wednesday, July 10. A letter followed saying he was slightly wounded by shrapnel and was hospitalized.

The first the Roark family heard of their son's heroism was in a dispatch from Saigon from UPI which was released Saturday, July 13 and published in The Sentinel that day. The family called The Sentinel with additional information.

Arrests Clear Out-of-State, Area Crimes

Ottawa county sheriff's officers Wednesday cleared \$500 worth of bad checks, two armed robberies in Pennsylvania and other crimes in the Kansas City area with the arrest of two men.

Cornelius De Jong, 20, of 485 Washington Ave., Holland, and Allen Sibley, 24, of Muskegon appeared before Holland Municipal Court Associate Judge Gerald Van Wyke Tuesday on charges of uttering and publishing. The offense occurred at Shopper's Fair in Holland on May 15.

The two waived examination and were bound over to Ottawa Circuit Court to appear July 22. Unable to furnish \$1,000 bond, they are being held in Ottawa county jail.

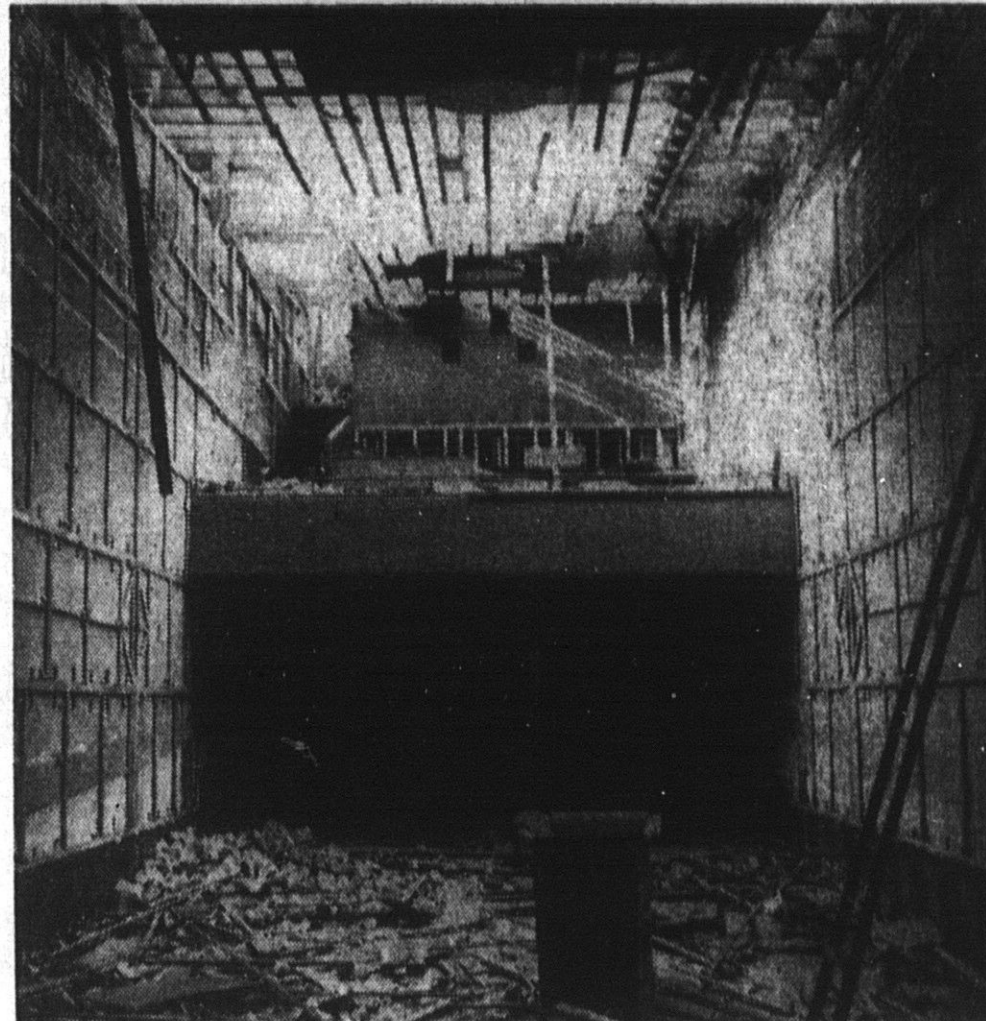
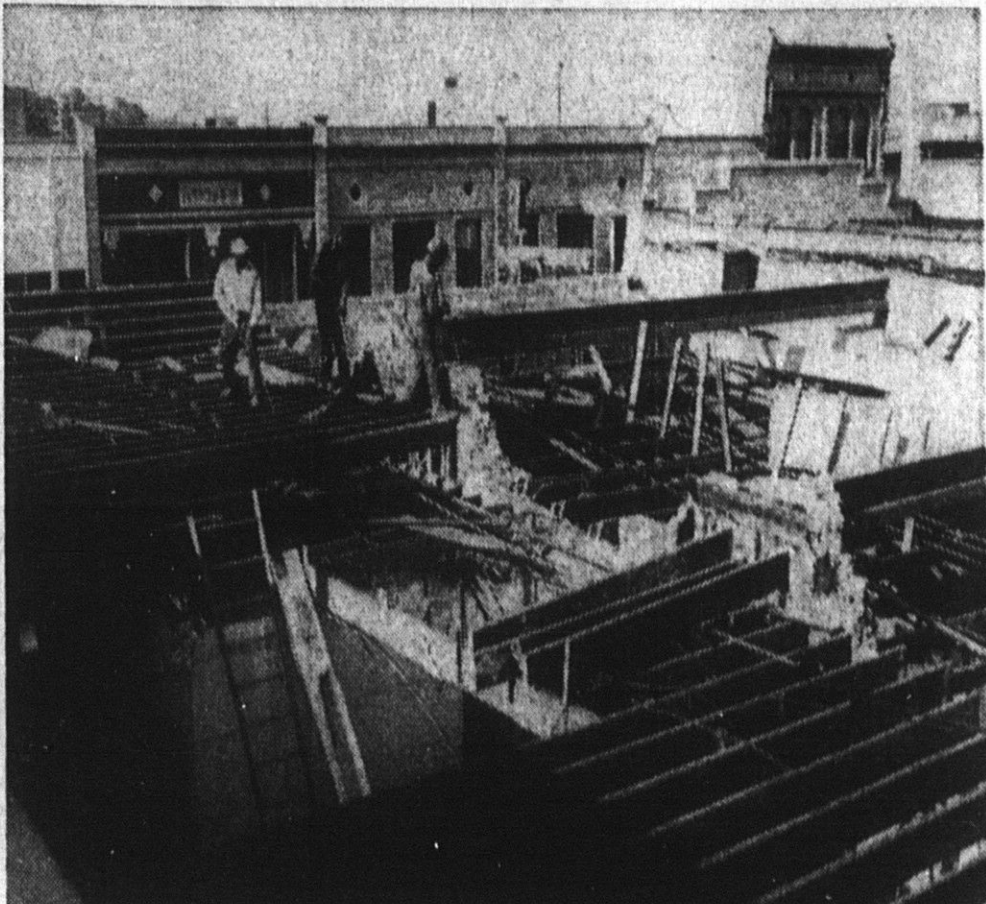
Both, arrested by Det. Sgt. John Hemple and Det. Lee Posma, are also being held in the breaking and entering of the Ralph Fik residence on South Shore Dr., and the break in at another Holland home as well as the theft of a car from Vandenberg Motors, Inc.

Both subjects admitted to Hemple and Posma Wednesday two armed robberies in Pennsylvania — one in a motel and one in a gas station, as well as numerous other crimes in the Kansas City area. Pennsylvania authorities have been notified.

The two are also being held for federal parole officers.

Mercury Inches To 90 Degrees

Holland residents continued to swelter as the mercury inched its way to the 90-degree mark Wednesday and then took a 20-degree drop to an overnight low of 70 degrees, according to official weather observer Lynn Wheaton.

Wednesday's high temperature was identical to the 90-degree high recorded on June 8 of this year. Traverse City, Jackson and Lansing reported 94-degree readings Wednesday while Pella had 93 degrees and Chicago, Bay City - Saginaw, Detroit, Grand Rapids and Muskegon registered 92 degrees.

Holland was included in the severe weather watch that was put out for Ottawa and surrounding counties late Wednesday afternoon until 10 p.m.; however, there were no reports of storm damage in the area.

Holland Coast Guardsmen said winds were reported at around 40 miles an hour late Wednesday and increased to around 60-65 miles an hour early this morning.

Precipitation in Holland area over night until 11 a.m. today totalled .23 inch rain.

The temperature at 11 a.m. today was 73 degrees, the same as the air temperature at Holland State Park today. The Lake Michigan water temperature at Ottawa beach was 72 degrees and a red flag was flying.

Twisters drilled Kentucky, Texas, Minnesota, Illinois, Wisconsin and Missouri Wednesday. Torrential rain swamped Iowa Wednesday and thunderstorms before dawn today threw hail, high winds and funnels from the Plains to the Great Lakes.

A levee broke and flooded 175 blocks of Waterloo, Iowa, Wednesday and a teenage boy drowned in the basement of his home. A man and a wife were killed when floodwaters crumbled a basement wall in their home in Waverly, Iowa.

The rain began in the northeast low town of Denver late Tuesday, coming down as if poured from a gigantic pitcher, necessitating sandbagging. Before it was over, Denver got 14.75 inches of rain.

Pre-dawn thunderstorms today struck Chicago, where two youths on a raft were blown a mile into the furious waters of Lake Michigan. One made it to shore, the other was missing.

Ninety-degree heat burned an area from New England to the Great Plains and throughout the South. The mercury rose to 98 degrees in New York City. The heat caused power failures in Boston, on the north side of Chicago and in Washington, D. C.

Fennville School Board Meet Held

FENNVILLE — Fennville Board of Education met Monday night and inspected the beginning of the elementary addition and locations for a portable classroom before the formal meeting during which members established Aug. 19 at 8 p.m. as time for the annual budget hearing in the high school cafeteria.

Members approved purchase of a portable classroom unit for speech correction use not to exceed \$3,695.

Also approved were contracts of the 1968-69 school year for Lloyd Miles, elementary principal, at a salary of \$12,355, and for Floyd Merrill, junior high school principal, for a salary of \$11,325.

After discussion, members decided to vote on approval of a 1968-69 contract for high school principal Fred Richardson at a later meeting when all board members could be present.

Members also discussed the job description as a supervisor of transportation and maintenance and decided candidates be interviewed for the position with the salary to be established later.

Also approved was the hiring of the secretary to the superintendent of schools at a salary of \$6,800.

Members supported a sick leave policy of 30 days a year, accumulative to 90 days total, for school principals, an administrative assistant, the superintendent and the secretary to the superintendent. It was decided by the board that personal leave days of the foregoing school employees be up to the superintendent of schools.

Driver Gets Ticket After 3-Car Collision

Virgil Allen Statema, 16, of 34 West Washington, Zeeland, was ticketed by Ottawa county sheriff's deputies for failing to stop in an assured clear distance causing a three-vehicle accident at Ottawa Beach Rd. and 152nd St. at 9:10 p.m. Wednesday.

Deputies said the car Statema was driving struck the rear of a car driven by Chester Mitchell Dykstra, 58, of Wyoming, which had stopped for a third car driven by Marlene Ann Elders, 17, of 706 Myrtle Ave. Deputies said the impact forced the Dykstra car to hit the rear of the Elders car.

No one was reported injured in the incident.

Tax Assessment Change Shown

Tax bills for property owners in Holland were put in the mail last week with the total tax rate for this year at \$40.95 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

City Assessor Alwin De Haan today said the change in assessed valuations as reflected on this year's tax bills is all according to state law as part of a tax reform measure in 1965.

The state legislature passed a law requiring all taxing authorities to assess at 50 per cent of market value, De Haan pointed out. Prior to this law, localities could, and did, assess at any convenient level.

In the city of Holland, De Haan added, it happened to be 30 per cent. In some of the townships it was 25 per cent, 15 per cent, 40 per cent, etc.

Now, however, it is mandatory that all units (cities, villages and townships) all over the state of Michigan assess at 50 per cent.

Consequently, in Holland, assessments have been raised from 30 to 50 per cent. In other areas, the increase may be from 25 to 50 or from 15 to 50 or from 40 to 50 per cent. In some of the eastern communities where assessments were 60 to 70 per cent of market value, there was a reduction to 50 per cent.

De Haan said all this is an attempt to bring statewide uniformity in assessing practices.

The level of assessments has nothing to do with the amount of taxes actually paid, De Haan said. He pointed out this is determined by the governing bodies in adopting budgets or by the taxpayers in voting extra millage or authorizing bond issues by referendum.

Therefore, regardless of whether the assessment is at 50 per cent or at 30 per cent, De Haan explained, the amount of tax paid will be the same. The tax rate will be different. The lower the assessed value, the higher the rate and vice versa.

What all this means, De Haan concluded, is that as long as the assessment formula is applied uniformly to all properties, then each property is paying its proportionate share. The standardization at 50 per cent of value as a statutory basis will do much to bring about equality and equity not only in Ottawa and Allegan counties but throughout the state of Michigan.

De Haan added the city assessor's office is in the process of reviewing all assessments in the city, but not one of these new findings are in effect at this time.

Several Given Sentences in Ray's Court

ALLEGAN — Appearing this week in Circuit Court before Chester A. Ray were Ricky Joe Hamrick, 17, route 4, South Haven, who was found guilty of breaking and entering into the Pullman Tavern on Feb. 5. He was sentenced to 18 months to 10 years at the Southern Michigan prison.

Jose A. Rosales, 21, of Holland, was sentenced to two years probation plus \$150 costs for larceny in Saugatuck township. Roy Mannon, 21, route 5 Allegan, entered a plea of not guilty when charged with larceny at the Office Bar.

Also appearing in court was Terrell W. Vicke, 20, of Kalamazoo who was charged with uttering and publishing. His sentence was deferred to a later date. Elmer Peters, Jr., 23, of route 1, Shelbyville, was charged with statutory rape in a Wayland incident. His bond was continued.

Terry Richmond, 19, of route 2, Gobles had his sentence deferred to August on a charge of larceny of an automobile. James E. Tipton, 28, Grand Rapids, had bond set at \$1,500 and pled guilty to a charge of simple assault and was sentenced to 60 days in the Allegan County Jail with credit for 15 days starting July 1. Judy Wynne, 25, of Otsego, pled guilty when charged with larceny at the Pipp Community Hospital. Her sentencing was deferred.

James Richardson, 21, and Arthur Richardson, 25 both of Gary, Ind. pled guilty to a charge of attempted petty larceny and were sentenced to 90 days in the Allegan County Jail with sentence to be suspended if they return to Gary, Ind.

School Board Asks Hearing On Appeal

Holland Board of Education, plagued with the appeal of a school district reorganization opinion is requesting an immediate hearing on the appeal effecting the merger of Harrington and Federal school districts with Holland.

The local school board was informed last week the opinion filed by Circuit Judge Chester A. Ray, that was to go into effect July 1 pending appeal up to July 15, was being appealed to the Michigan Court of Appeals.

Special request documents asking the immediate hearing on the appeal were being prepared for filing Wednesday and be in the mail Thursday. The request for immediate hearing was noticed for consideration Tuesday in the Grand Rapids division of the Michigan Court of Appeals.

Holland School Superintendent Donald Ihrman said the board is seeking who has jurisdiction over the two districts and the board is filing an emergency appeal for guidance and direction.

In a letter sent to members of the Harrington and Federal school board who were in office as of June, 1968, Holland board members stated:

"Unless the court in temporary or final action authorizes and directs the School District of the City of Holland to assume jurisdiction for the operation of the Harrington and Federal School Districts, the Holland Board of Education deems itself ill - advised to assume obligations to operate school programs in the Harrington and Federal School Districts which action might later be deemed to be improper."

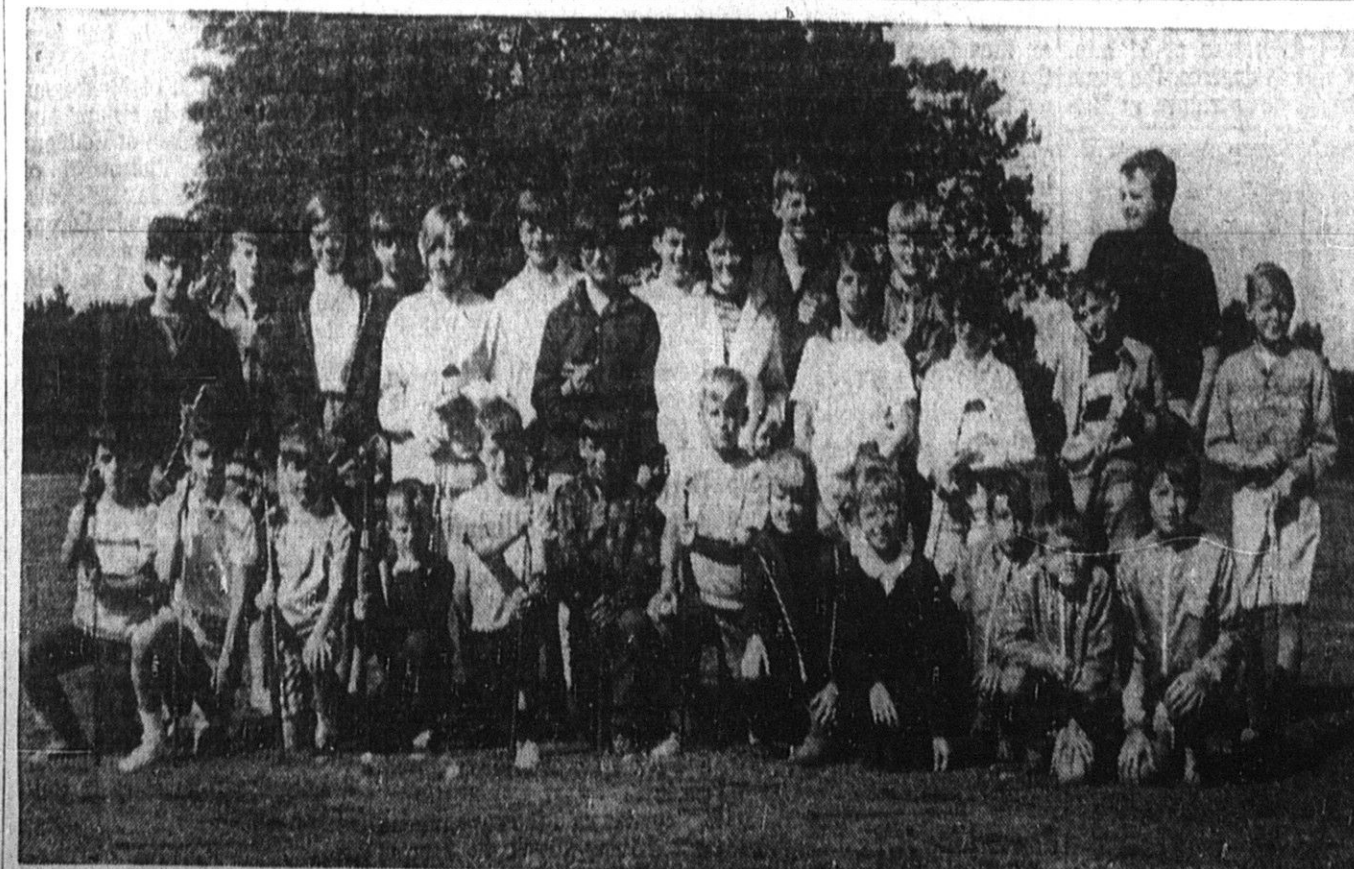

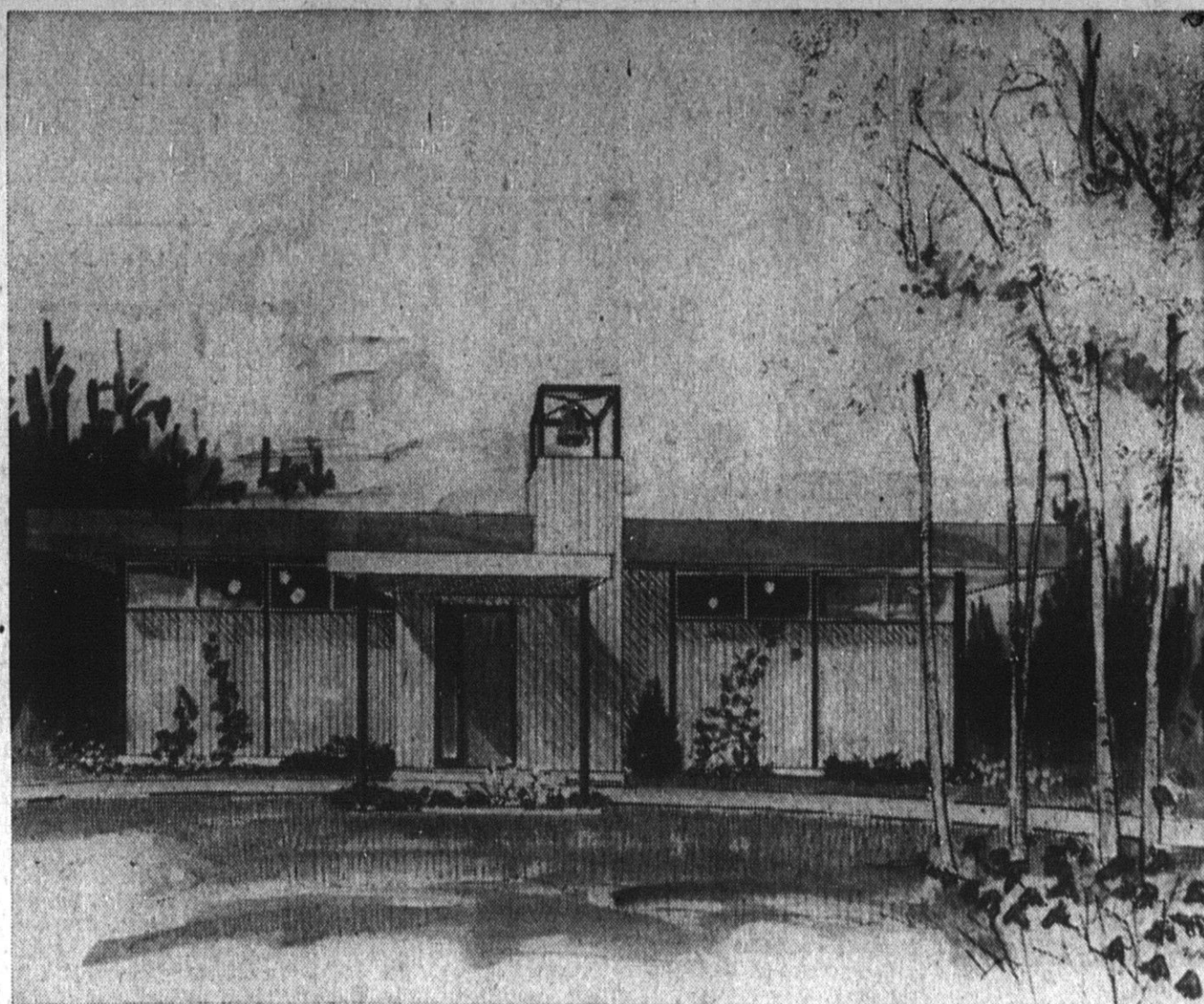

He was a member of the St. Peter's Catholic Church, Douglas. He was a farmer and had lived in the Fennville area since 1940 when he moved from Chicago.

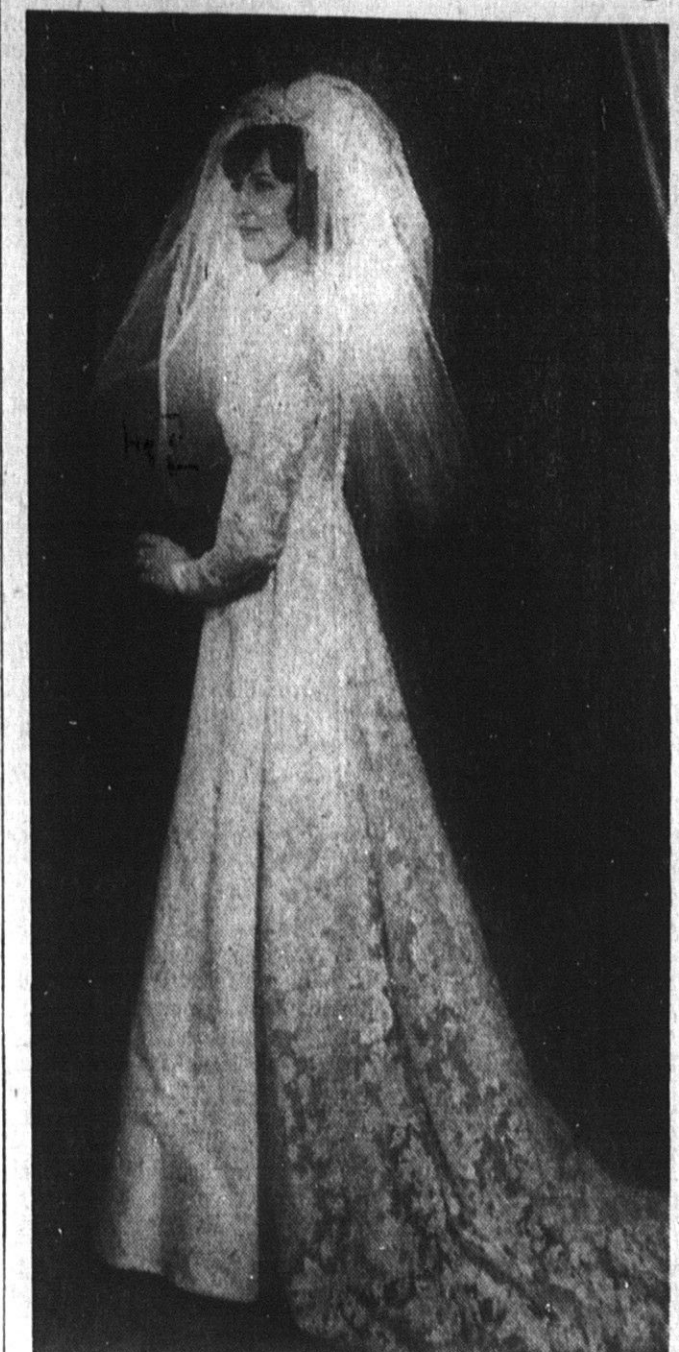

The appeal was filed by Lee Boothby, Niles attorney, on behalf of J. M. Boshka, Frances V. Johnson, Esther Hallquist, Rudolph J. Fojtik, Marie J. Fojtik, Don J. De Pree, Marlene J. De Pree and Edwin Raphael. Originally, these plaintiffs and others had filed suit against the Ottawa Area Intermediate School district challenging the Ottawa county school reorganization program, aimed at reorganizing the county into K-12 school districts. The June 24 opinion dealt mainly with the Holland case.

The Holland Board of Education will meet Monday afternoon to consider implications of the appeal and await developments whether the Holland board should proceed with plans to operate Federal and Har-

ington schools in September. Since allocated millage for schools has been determined in Ottawa county, making no provisions for such millage in Harrington and Federal districts, the implications could be serious if the two districts should continue to operate the schools.

The new appeal also casts a question on the special transportation millage vote slated Aug. 6. This calls for 1½ mills for 3 years to provide bus transportation for pupils in public and parochial schools in the enlarged Holland school district.

27 Injured As Race Car Hits Stands

Four Holland Area Persons Among Those Hurt at Marne Track

MARNE — A number of persons remained in critical condition Monday with injuries suffered when a race car crashed into a crowd of spectators at the Berlin Raceway killing two persons Saturday night.

Killed were James Mason, 35, of Allegan, and Billie Brakefield, 17, of Grand Rapids. Brakefield was killed instantly when the impact threw him from the stands to the middle of the track. His brother, Albert, 15, who was sitting with him, is in critical condition at Butterworth hospital, Grand Rapids.

Twenty-six other persons were also injured, five critically, when the super modified race car went over the retaining wall at 100 miles per hour. The car was driven by Duane Wilson, 18, of Lyons.

Wilson was on the tenth lap of the Mid-Season Championship for super modifieds when his front wheels reportedly jumped onto the rear of another car.

The car then wrenched free and Wilson's front wheel spun against the four foot high cement wall surrounding the track. "He traveled about 31 feet like that and then the whole car was on top of the wall and sped for some 90 feet on the top of the wall into the first five rows of the grandstands," said Sgt. Jack Rosema of the Ottawa sheriff's department.

"It flew up into the grandstand and pieces of it were flying all over," one spectator said. "The people didn't panic and most of them were orderly," she added.

James Meyer, 33, of 558 Lake Dr., starter for the raceway, was thrown from his flag stand by the impact. "Wilson was running near the end of the pack and as I glanced at the fourth turn I saw him hit the wall and become airborne," Meyer said. "I turned my back to the track and leaned over the rear of the flag stand and the next thing I knew I was in the crowd," he added. Meyer did not know if Wilson hit another car before crashing into the wall. Meyer was treated for a laceration of the right leg and released.

The flag stand he was standing in at the edge of the grandstand was torn off by the impact; 10 year-old David Wiley, of Kalamazoo, who sits next to Meyer at many races and hands him the flags, was seriously injured.

Meyer said the boy suffered four fractures of the right leg, three fractures of the left leg, a fractured collar bone and hip and internal injuries. He is in fair condition at Butterworth hospital.

Three other persons from the Holland area besides Meyer were also hurt. They are Roger Kleinheksel, 20, of route 5, Holland; Roger Boerigter, 18, of Zeeland, and James Overweg, 18, also of Zeeland. All were released after treatment.

Witnesses said spectators volunteered station wagons to take the injured to hospitals in nearby Grand Rapids, as well as offering pieces of clothing to serve as emergency bandages. Among those critically injured were three members of a Big Rapids family. They are the father, James Bowers, 38, and two of his sons, Kenneth Jr., 15, and James, 12. All three suffered head injuries.

Wilson was also injured. He was admitted to Butterworth hospital in satisfactory condition.

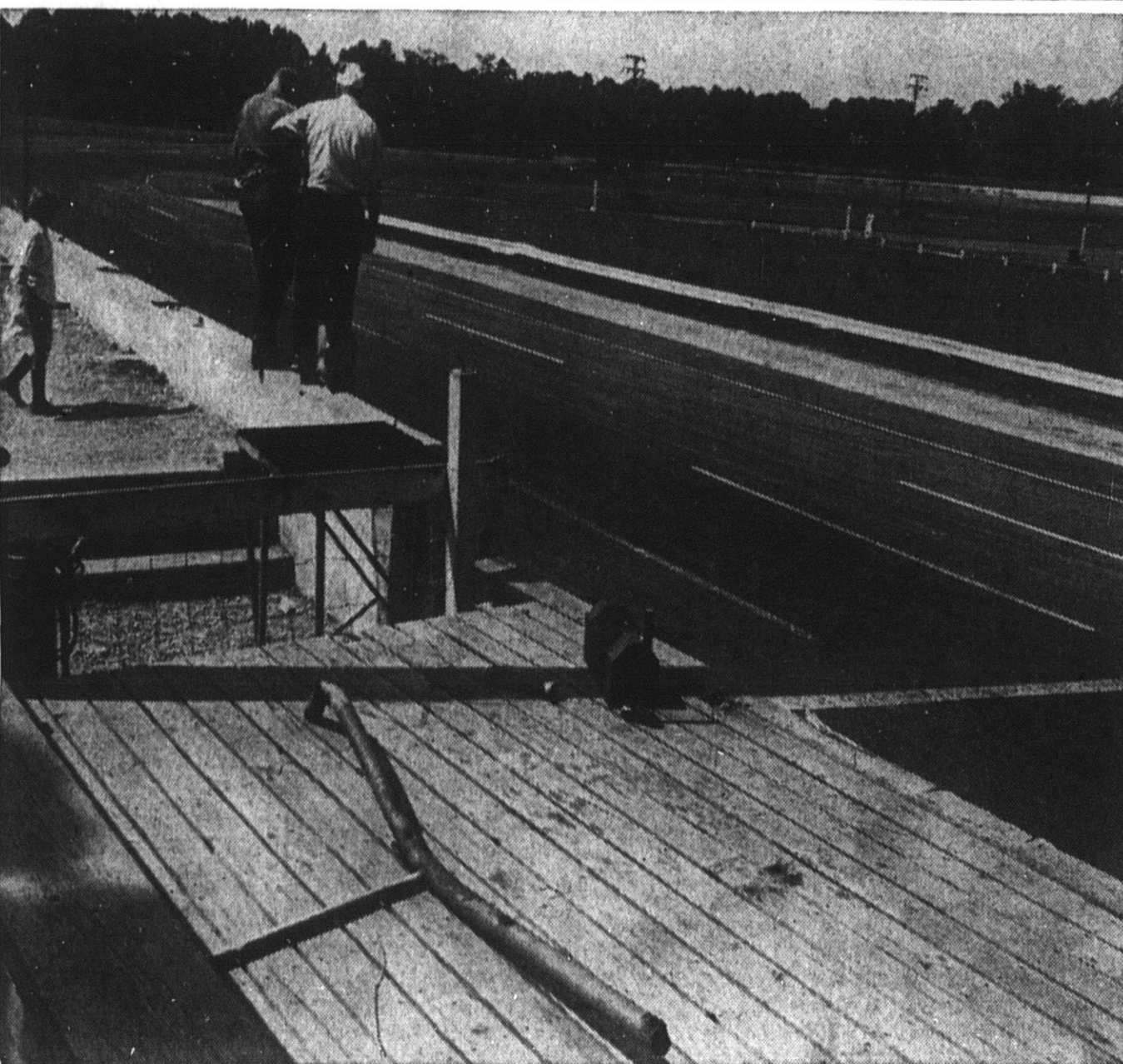

City Tax Bills Sent In Mail

Over 10,000 tax bills for property owners in Holland were in the mail Friday, calling for a total levy of \$3,688,090.61.

Total tax rate this year is \$40.95 per \$1,000 assessed valuation listing \$16.80 for the city and \$24.15 for schools.

Taxes are payable at the city treasurer's office in City Hall through Aug. 15. A 2 per cent penalty is added until Sept. 10; thereafter the penalty is 6 per cent.

The city tax lists \$2.59 for debt and \$14.21 for general operations. The school tax lists \$3.45 for debt, \$10.45 for general operations and \$10.25 for special voted tax. The latter includes the 10 - mill levy for school operations voted April 2 and swimming pool operations.

Tax bills were late this year, awaiting determination of millage allocations on the county level.

Taxes are up \$7.38 per \$1,000 this year with a \$2.60 increase for city and \$7.38 for schools. Taxes are based on a total equalized valuation of \$90,316,065, down approximately \$3.06

In a United Press International release out of Saigon on Saturday, the story of how "Huey" Roark battled away North Vietnamese grenades with his rifle was a victory story for the battered Marine force that held the hill for seven days.

Marine Roark has a family that is proud of him—and they live in the area. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Allison Roark of 526 Flesher St., Spring Lake and a brother Conrad Roark who lives in Hamilton. He has four brothers and two sisters.

The UPI story continued with the report which said "A lot of heroes were plucked by helicopter off the 2,000 foot peak at the battle's end, but the Marines are proudest of a 6-foot-3, 200-pound youngster from Ada, B.J. "Huey" Roark.

"A Marine patrol moved down the hill one night and the North Vietnamese began throwing in mortars like they were going out of style. Everyone hit the deck, but Huey stood up firing his M16 rifle and tossing grenades at the communist in their spider holes," said 1st Lt. Joe Fulginiti. "A little later Roark used the stock of his M79 grenade launcher to bat away, baseball style, grenades which had been fired at him."

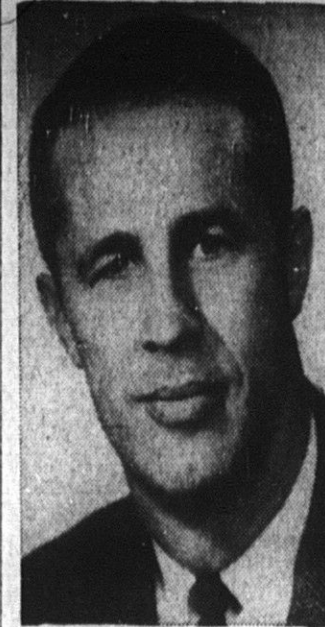

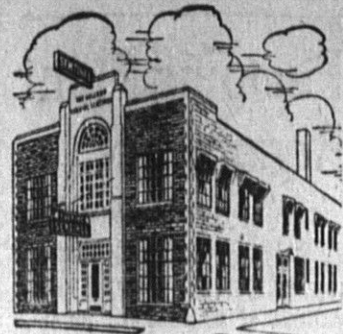

"YOU'VE GOT TO STAY WITH IT"

It's a rapidly changing world and the growth of knowledge continues to make its impact on society. Recently the Oregon Medical Association told its members that they must continue their medical education on a regular basis or face stiff penalties, including expulsion. That's pretty stiff language, but it does show some concern for both doctor and patient. The medical profession isn't alone in this constant growth of information.

Scores of teachers all over the country find they must get back into the classroom for further help or be out of date in their teaching. We may have the notion that this need for further education applies only to those in the professions.

It just isn't so. One need only talk to the mechanic at the nearest garage. He can tell about dozens of changes in the constantly changing models, changes that require more know-how and generally also a new set of tools. Cars now have modern air-conditioning, and somebody has to be an authority in that field.

There was a time when the farmer got along on the information passed on from his father. But not so today. Farming has moved into a more technical world and farmers all over the country are attending courses given by their schools of agriculture. In Iowa the number of young men taking courses in agriculture at the college level is on the increase.

As if this doesn't make the point that life changes on all fronts, we ought to note something new for the cherry growers. A new chemical now makes possible a uniform maturation of all the cherries on a tree, and one can only imagine the impact of this chemical on the life of the fruit farmer.

One's first impression of the story by the Oregon Medical Association is one of uniqueness. But a little more thought, and we come to the conclusion that life is complex at every level, and getting more so. You've got to stay with it.

Lesson

Sunday, July 21
Ezekiel's Challenge
Ezekiel 18:26-32; 36:26-28
By C. P. Dame

This lesson teaches two truths which our times badly need to learn. The first truth is that every man is responsible to God. The second is that every person is a sinner and needs a radical change of heart.

I. Let's first note a few facts about the man Ezekiel. He was born a priest, God called him to be a prophet, and so he held two offices. A priest speaks for the people to God, while a prophet speaks for God to the people. Ezekiel's name means, "God strengthens" or "God is strong." He was a contemporary of Jeremiah, his ministry was from 592 B. C. to 570 B. C. an era marked by troubles and trials.

In 597 B. C. he and some other young men were carried to Babylon. Jerusalem fell in 587 B. C. while Ezekiel was in Babylon where he ministered to the captives who were bitter because they were suffering on account of the sins of their fathers. "The fathers have eaten sour grapes and the children's teeth are set on edge." Today the younger generation is blaming the older generation for the mess the world is in.

II. We are all responsible to God. Ezekiel taught the importance of a personal religion, the relationship between God and the individual. God had made a covenant with Israel and so the individual's responsibility was to the nation—that was the popular reasoning. The prophet said that a man's standing before God is not determined by his ancestry, by the way his grandfather or father lived, but by the way he lives. Again, a man's past conduct does not determine a man's standing before God, it is his present conduct that matters. A man's past can be forgiven.

God judges both the nation and the individual. The exile brought punishment to the nation and to the individuals. Both needed to repent and obtain pardon. How true that is of our nation today! And this involves a sense of sin and the need of pardon.

III. A new heart only God can give. "A new heart also will I give you, and a new spirit will I put within you," so wrote the prophet a long time ago. The need is still here. Only God can provide the new heart and the new spirit. The new heart means a new life for out of the heart are the issues of life. Regeneration, an inner radical transformation comes first. The Lord takes away the heart of stone and gives in its place a heart of flesh. The stony heart is cold and spiritually dead and unresponsive; the heart of flesh is warm, soft, responsive.

Regeneration is followed by sanctification which is a process. Obedience to God comes naturally. A new motive comes to the light — the desire to glorify God in things large and small. Unfortunately today some churchmen look to the legislative halls for new laws which will transform society. The necessity of an inner change in the individual is overlooked. Let us not be misled by politically minded preachers who overlook the teaching of God's Word.

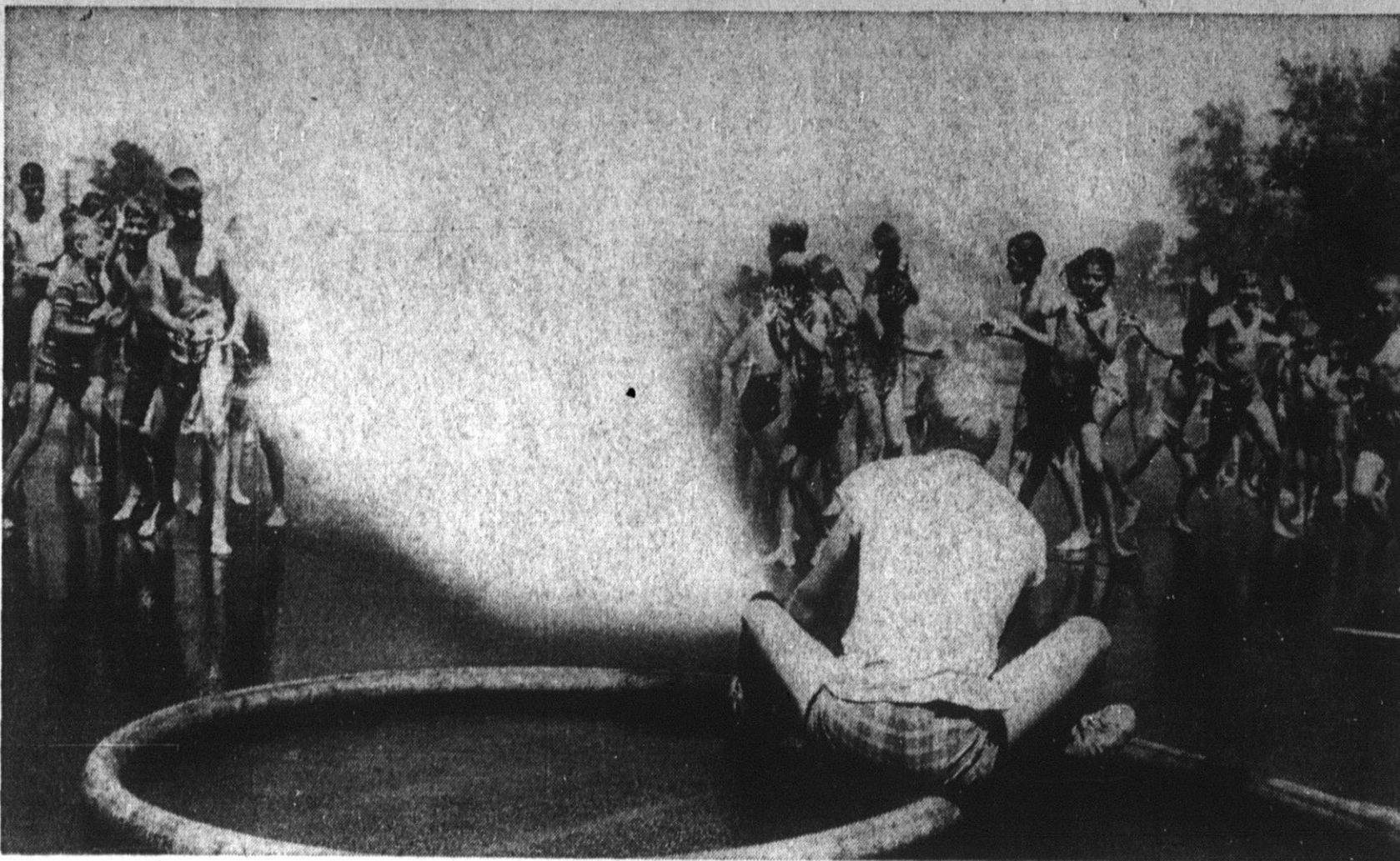

Pumping Plant Record Set

Guy E. Bell, Superintendent of Public Works, said a record was set Tuesday when 12,966,000 gallons of water were pumped at the Filtration Plant on Lakeshore Dr.

Bell said it was the highest pumpage for a 24-hour period. The last record was set July 25, 1966, when 12,723,000 gallons were pumped in a single day.

Bell said the capacity is to pump at a rate of 14 million gallons a day; however, on several three-to-four hour peak periods water has been pumped at a rate of 16 or 17 million gallons a day.

As an example, Bell said 11 million gallons were pumped on June 7 but for a 5-hour period that same day pumping was done at a rate of 15 million gallons a day.

Bell also said there was a 5-million gallon reservoir on Waverly Rd. available.
