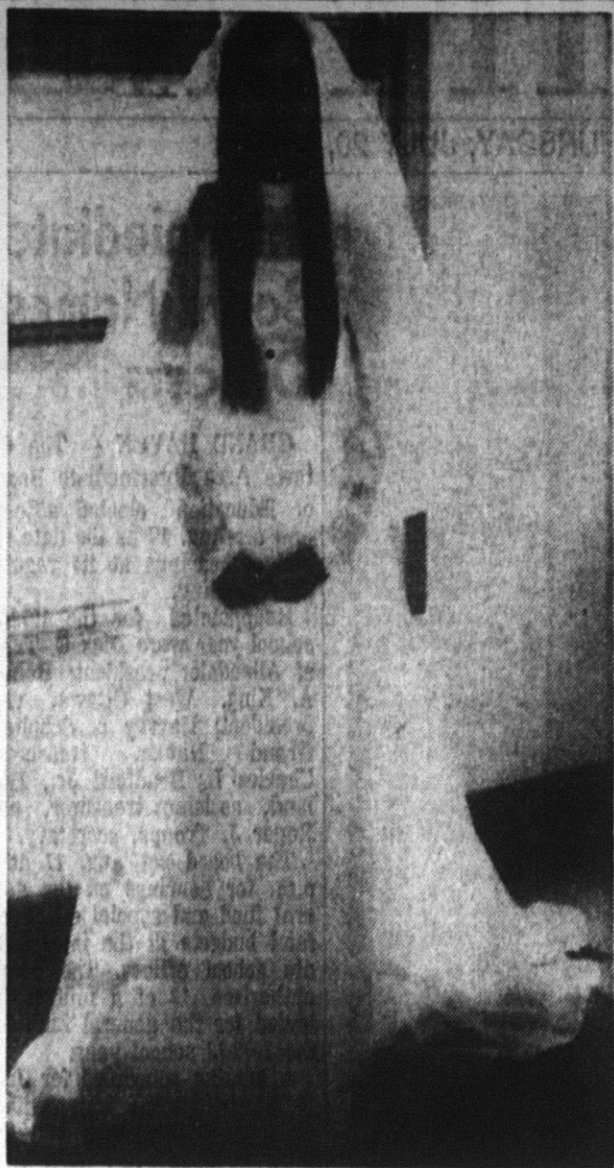

The bride was attired in a floor-length gown of white satin

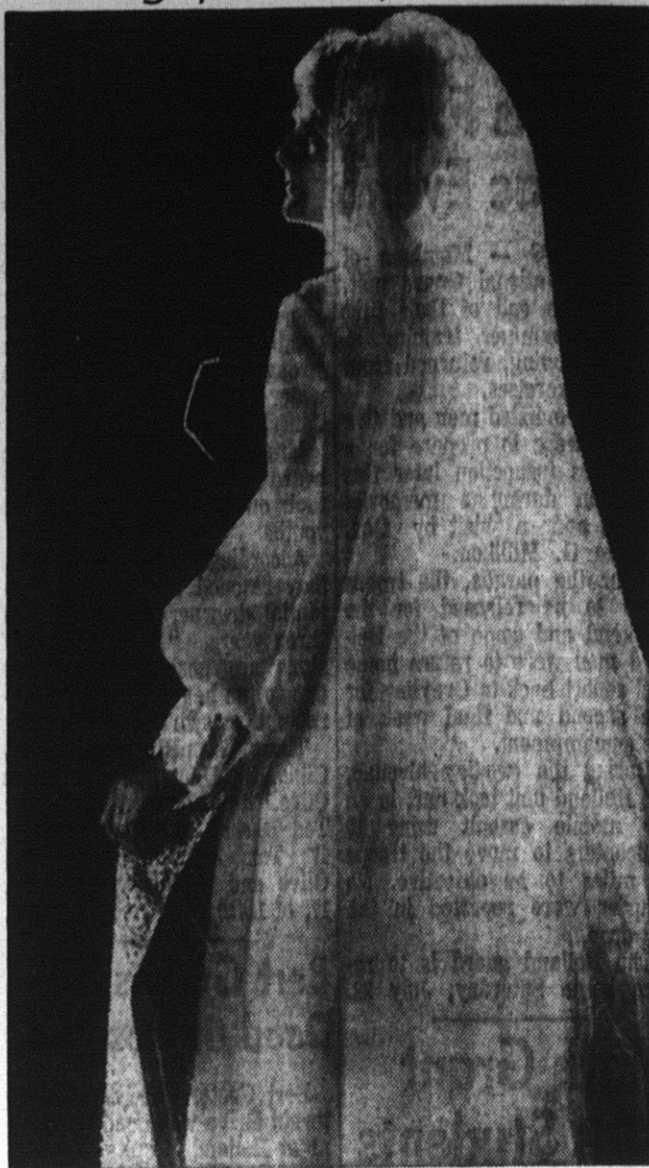

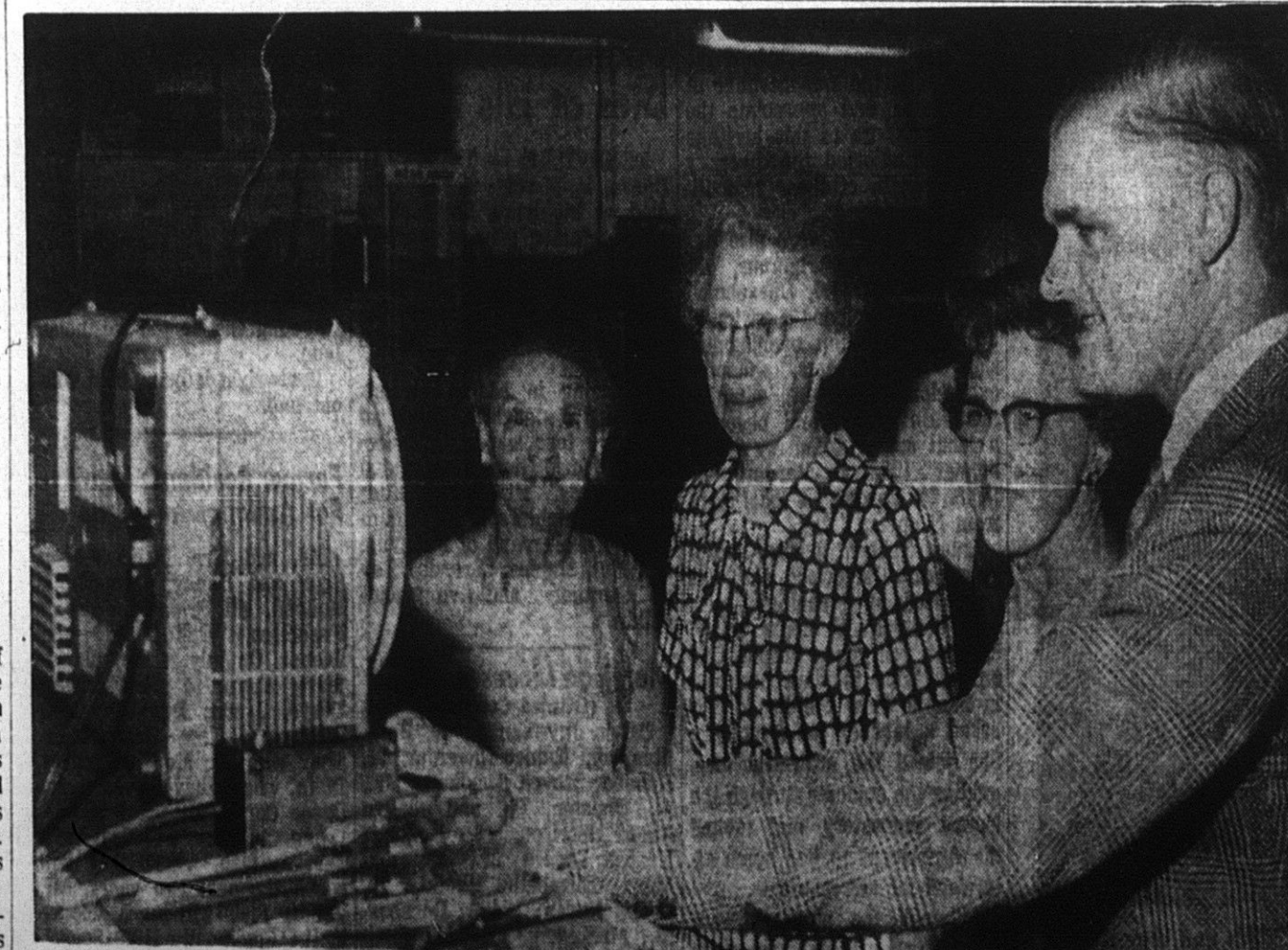

Ed Fredericks Tells Rotary About Korea

Ed Fredericks, son of Russel Fredericks, and a member of the Foreign Service Division of the State Department in Washington, told Rotary Club members of his experiences "as a Consulate Officer in Seoul, Korea, during 1970-72."

He is now back in Washington as a member of the Foreign Service Division.

Fredericks pointed out that there are five divisions of the Consulate Office in Korea and those divisions include the political, economic, administrative, communication and consulate sections.

In his particular work as Vice-Consul in Korea, Fredericks handled such matters as deaths, births, marriages, visas, draft registrations, (for those Americans in Korea who have reached their 18th birthday), assisted in legal matters, citizenship determinations, and provided assistance for those persons who have traveled abroad and ran out of money. He pointed out that in those matters where Americans ran out of funds, the State Department assisted in contacting relatives or friends who could offer financial assistance. The state Department did not make funds available.

One of his major duties was providing assistance, primarily to American Servicemen marrying Korean girls. He said there were about three thousand such marriages a year. Fredericks also told of the many problems involved with those marriages where Korean Law had certain specifics that must be followed.

Seoul, Korea, has a population of 6 million persons and is growing by leaps and bounds. The population of Seoul at the end of World War II was around 400,000.

Fredericks attended Calvin College and Western Michigan University and has degrees in political science and sociology.

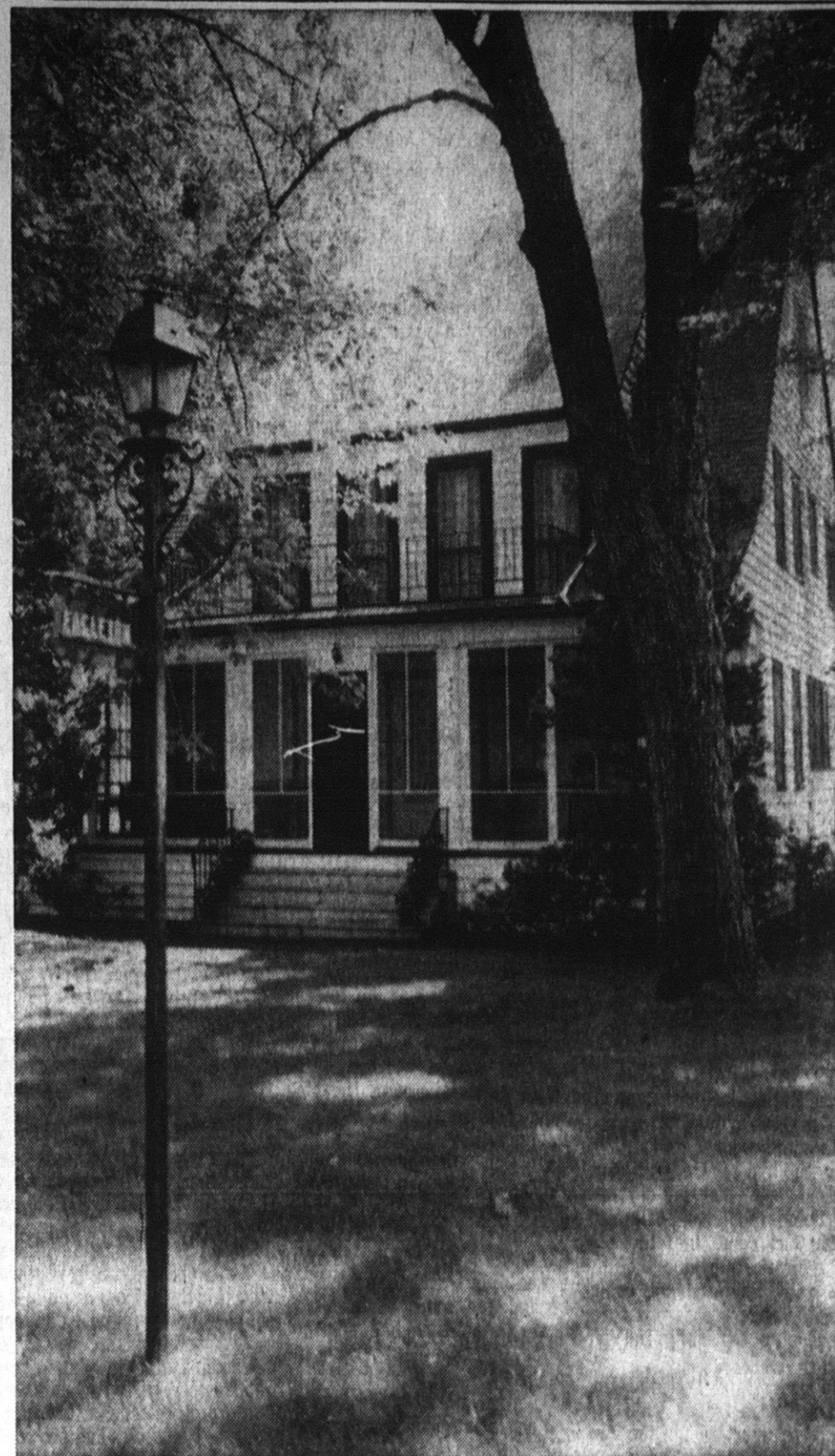

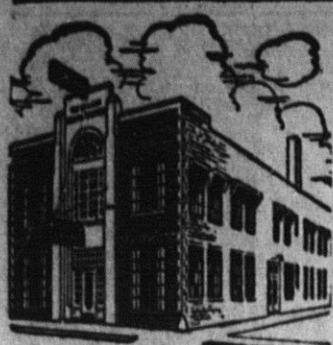

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, July 23
Confession and Forgiveness
Psalm 51:1-12
By C. P. Dame

The sense of guilt is more common than many people realize. The lesson text, several verses from Psalm 51, was written by a man who had a deep and troublesome sense of guilt but found forgiveness after confessing his sins. Forgiveness is still possible by making a confession.

I. Let us look at the guilty man first. He is one of the best known characters of the Bible, a man who has been rightly called a great saint and a great sinner—David, king of Israel, a man gifted in various ways. Oriental kings were accustomed to use absolute power, especially when they felt the need to do so. David, however, was appointed by God and ruled under His authority.

David seduced the wife of one of his loyal soldiers and when she became pregnant she told him. He tried to cover up his sin but failed and so he saw to it that Uriah, the woman's husband, was killed in the war that was going on. God knew what David had done and sent Nathan, His prophet, to tell the guilty king about his sin and his punishment. The prophet's pointed words woke up the sleeping conscience of the king who expressed his guilt in Psalm 51.

II. Confession should follow guilt. This often happens, but not often enough. The penitent king asked for God's mercy as all sinners should. David confessed his wrongdoing and begged for mercy from God against whom he had sinned—to be sure he had sinned against a weak woman, against a loyal soldier, his family and nation but primarily against God.

Not only did he need mercy but also cleansing. David's words, "Behold I was shapen in iniquity and in sin did my mother conceive me," do not suggest that his mother was to blame and that the act of procreation is sinful but mean that he belonged to a fallen race. David realized that he had sinned wickedly by his adultery and murder.

III. Forgiveness follows confession. When David confessed his sin the prophet assured him of forgiveness. David prayed also for restoration. The guilty man realized that only God could bring about the needed inner change. He begged that God would not take away from him His Holy Spirit through whose ministry he could recover his lost joy and become better qualified for greater service. When a person acknowledges his sin, confesses it and shows a penitent spirit, forgiveness follows and then service.

Christ has made forgiveness possible by dying for our sins. Anyone pleading upon the merit of Christ can have the joy of forgiveness and reveal it in his service.

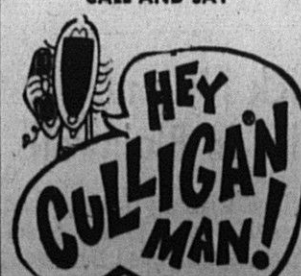

Four Holland Men Backpack On Isle Royal National Park

Four Holland area men recently returned from a 10-day backpacking trip down the length of Isle Royal National Park.

Dirk Bloemendaal, Don Piersma, Ken Bauman and Dick Darby trekked nearly 70 miles around the island which is located 22 miles off the Canadian coast in Lake Superior.

The 210 square-mile island ranges from two to nine miles wide and has 30 inland lakes. Over 200 islands surround Isle Royal forming a rugged land-mass. Called a biological paradise by many, the island boasts 670 species of plant life including ferns and wildflowers. In addition, Isle Royal is the home for over 200 species of birds and a number of smaller mammals. The moose population is approximately 800 and is held in ecological balance by the some two dozen wolves on the island.

After arriving on the island by seaplane, the men began their hike at Rock Harbor at the northern end of the island and then proceeded to hike the length of the island ending their trip 10 days later at Windigo at the southern end of Isle Royal.

The first days hiking found them walking in heavy rain down the shoreline of Lake Superior and up to the rugged Greenstone Ridge. On the trip down the ridge to a lakeside campsite, one of the men suffered a severe fall on slippery rocks nearly ending the trip. Only his rain gear and hiking pants were badly ripped and his light meter was smashed.

The men continued on their Greenstone Ridge trail on their

hike south. The trail is by far the longest and most rugged trail in the park and winds some 40 miles from Rock Harbor to Windigo Inn. Although the most varied and beautiful, the Greenstone Ridge trail is the most difficult and is to be recommended to only the seasoned hiker.

All supplies needed for the trip must be carried in the pack and only the basics should be packed as the trails are rough and involve many steep climbs. There is no water along the ridge trail and is only available at three overnight camps, each located down off the ridge and along the shore of an inland lake.

Because the trails are remote, it is also recommended to travel in groups. Even the most seasoned hikers are urged to exercise extra caution by the park staff.

The four agreed that Isle Royal offered the toughest hiking challenge they have experienced but also provided them the opportunity to witness firsthand the breathtaking scenery and the island's many animals in their natural environment.

had developed well - established travel routes along the shores of the Great Lakes and crisscrossed the wilderness in birch - bark canoes using the rivers and streams as water highways.

Etienne Brule is credited with being the first European to see the Upper Great Lakes, traveling to Sault Ste. Marie in 1618, two years before the landing of the Mayflower. He and his French followers probably used the Indian canoes, later enlarging them into trade craft more than 36 feet long to carry the burdens of the young and growing fur trade.

The early French voyageurs built and used another type of vessel called the Batteaux which reflected European boat-building methods. It was a simple, flat - bottomed, clinker-built boat relatively light, quick to build and carried an astonishing amount of weight, and played a major role in Michigan's maritime history.

Visitors to the Straits of Mackinac see some of this segment of Michigan's history on display at the new Michilimackinac Marine Park complex, immediately east of the Mackinac Bridge at Mackinaw City.

The focal point of this major new attraction is the Old Mackinac Point Lighthouse built in 1892 and recently designated a National Historic Site. Features of the Lighthouse include a closed circuit television system which gives visitors a panoramic view of the straits of Mackinac as seen through a camera mounted at the top of the tower. The downstairs floor contains a mock-up of the tower room and a mural dra-

matizing the view from the tower as it was at the turn of the century. Another area house has exhibits which tell the story of Great Lakes ships from the 1600's to the present time. Included is a diorama of the Griffin, first sailing ship to be built in the Great Lakes wilderness.

Open air exhibits will include the hull of the LaWay Schooner, the wreck of the Shay Steamboat and a working shipyard.

The projected development of the Park covers a five - year period and will include the addition of other important and interesting exhibits relating to Michigan's marine history. It will be linked to historic Fort Michilimackinac by the orientation center which was opened at the Fort in 1971.

Michilimackinac Marine Park promises to be a unique, attractive, history - oriented facility appealing to Michiganians and Michigan visitors alike.

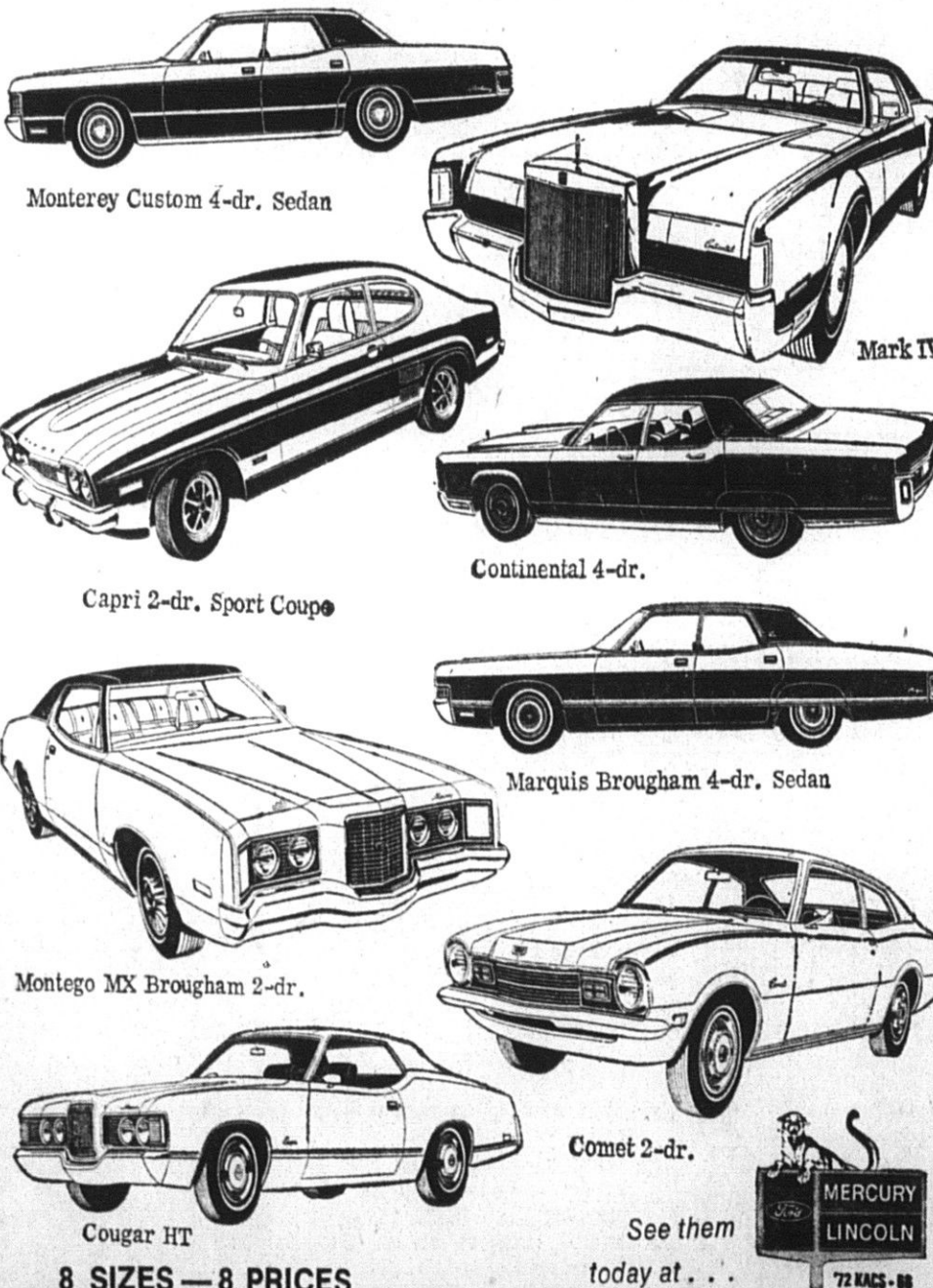

Rain, Lightning Storm Hits City

A lightning and rain storm dumped 2.96 inches of rain on the Holland area Friday night and early Saturday, touched off some fires and left widespread areas of the county without electrical power.

The Holland area was under a severe thunderstorm warning until midnight and a tornado watch was in effect until 3:30 a.m. Saturday.

Some streets in Holland were reported flooded including Pine Ave. and Third and Fourth Sts. and 29th St. and Michigan Ave. where firemen were called to pump the swirling waters from the intersection to prevent flooding of stores.

Holland police said a car was caught in the waters at Fourth St. and Pine Ave. and occupants of the stalled car were rescued as waters rose half way up the door.

Consumers Power Co. said about 700 to 800 customers in the Holland and Zeeland areas were without electrical service after tree limbs and lightning knocked out service lines.

A Consumers spokesman in Grand Rapids said this morning crews worked throughout the night to restore service and he said all service to about 7,000 customers affected the Kent-Ottawa county areas was restored Saturday afternoon.

The Holland Board of Public Works reported no major power interruptions in the city.

Lightning struck the FM broadcasting tower of radio station WJBL along James St. at US-31, knocking the station off the air at 10:20 p.m. The station returned to the air at 6 a.m. Saturday but a power failure interrupted all broadcast operations of the station until after 7 a.m.

The other sessions devoted to Questioned Document and handwriting identification will be conducted during the congress. One, "Forensic Graphoanalysis 505" will be conducted by Dr. Andrew A. Moenssens of the Chicago - Kent College of Law, Illinois Institute of Technology, and the other, "Questioned Documents 205" will be taught by L. Keith Parkinson, Questioned Document expert from Boise, Idaho.

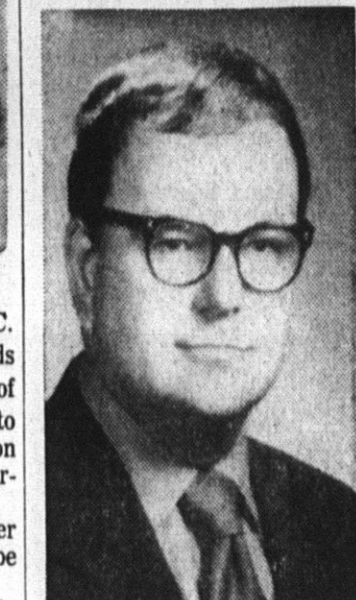
