At an earlier meeting council was urged by a committee to adopt a no-burning ordinance and the city attorney was directed to prepare such an ordinance.

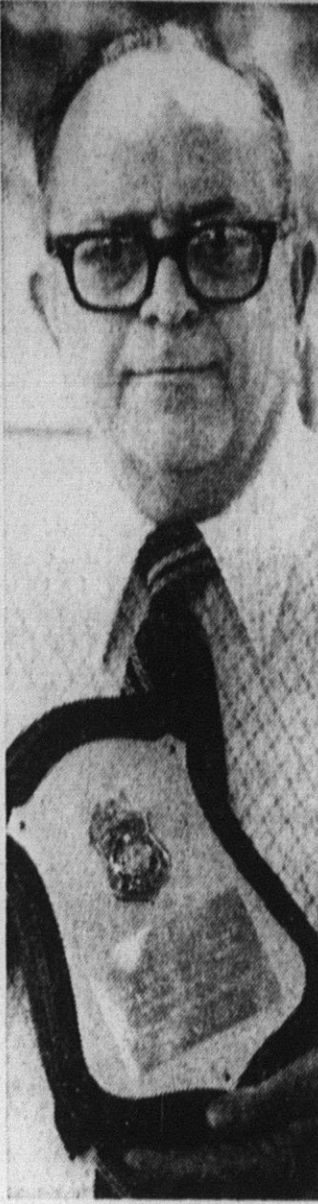
Council decided to continue an ordinance that gives only council power to order abatement of nuisance such as high weeds and those involving unattended lots.

Council Has Long Hearings

City Council approved several ordinances and assessment rolls for sewers following public hearings and discussion which took well over two hours before the issues were resolved.

Bringing the most objections hearing on rezoning certain lots in Ottawa Heights subdivision in the vicinity of 31st St. and Homestead Ave. to A-2 one and two - family residential districts. The change, sought by Russ Homkes and Gerald Klein, had been under study for many months.

Roger Plagenhoef, of 727 Plasman Ave., presented a petition bearing 17 signatures opposing the zoning change, and indicated there might be court litigation if passed. At least eight others including Atty. George Lieverse voiced objections. Several were accompanied by small children to emphasize what they considered a threat to safety.

This public hearing lasted 35 minutes and proponents and opponents later were invited to appear in a private committee - of - the - whole meeting in the mayor's office. Passage of the zoning ordinance came at 9:50 p.m. along with action on several other hearings.

In passing an involved offstreet parking ordinance, Council deleted the section pertaining to parking recreational vehicles and trailers, a subject which turned out to be more complex than was originally anticipated. The deleted section was referred back to the Planning Commission for further study.

A few other sections also were amended on offstreet parking at existing residential structures, particularly in regard to durable surfaced driveways in those areas where curb and gutter are already installed. The section requiring surfaced driveways will not take effect until a year later. The requirement of no parking on other than clearly designated driveways will take effect in 90 days.

During the hearings, Environmental Health Director Roger Stroh explained the zoning change, citing exhaustive studies on density of population and other aspects, and also reviewed the offstreet parking ordinance designed mainly to curb parking in curb strips, on lawns and other places in residential zones. He said indiscriminate parking of vehicles is one of the first signs of decay in a residential neighborhood.

Several persons sought information at the review of assessment rolls. All rolls were confirmed except at 30th St. and Ottawa Ave., one which will be constructed privately, with design to be approved by the city. City Manager William L. Bopf said first assessments will be made in December and the projects will be completed next year. It takes an average 17 months on planning, he said.

The planned sewers are in 30th St. west of Ottawa Ave., in Holland Heights and in the Southgate - Concord area near 26th St.

Frank Vaclavik, representing the American Legion, asked to have the Legion included in the Holland Heights sewer district, a request which was granted at the cost of another \$950 benefit.

Also passed was ordinance 619 which requires a driver of a motor vehicle to yield the right of way to a pedestrian or bicyclist on any sidewalk or bicycle path, except where such sidewalk or bicycle path crosses the traveled portion of any public roadway.

Paving Fourth St. from Pine to River Ave. also was approved, the work to be completed this summer if possible.

Once these issues were resolved at 9:50 p.m., other items on the agenda moved more rapidly for adjournment at 10:45 p.m., one of the longest meetings in recent years, mayor L. W. Lamb Jr. presided and the Rev. Jerrien Gunnink of Providence Christian Reformed Church gave the invocation. All councilmen were present. Council chambers were crowded but less than one - third of the crowd was present when final action was taken on issues involving hearings.

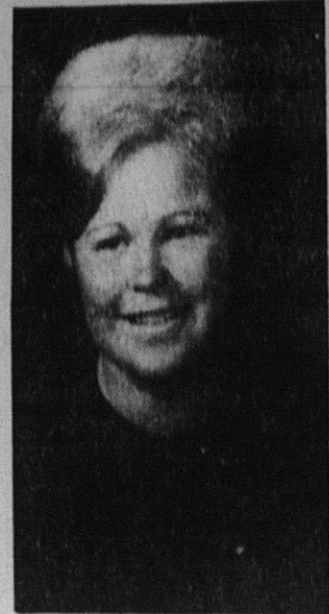

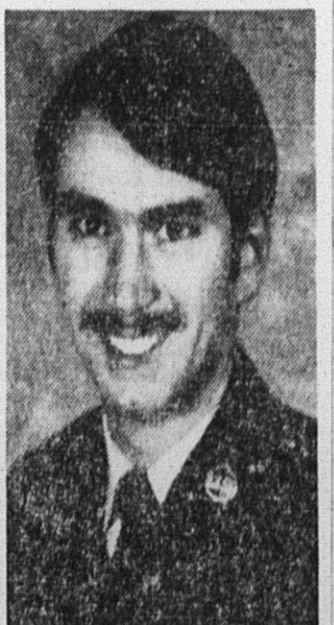
9 Area Jaycee Presidents Meet in Holland

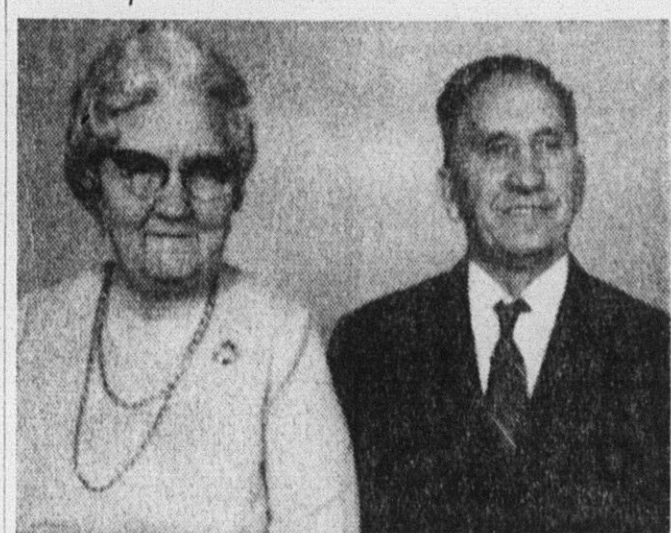

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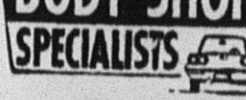


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Western Reinstates Master's Program

Western Theological Seminary has reinstituted its degrees program in Religious Education. Discontinued several years ago because of financial pressures,

the program has been restored because of a continuing demand for it.

The new, revised program has received the sanction of the American Association of Theological Schools and the Board of Education of the State of Michigan. It is designed to prepare both men and women for the education of ministry of the churches in the various forms in which it is being developed today.

A growing number of churches America, as in other denominations, are developing staff ministries and are seeking men as well as women to function as directors of Christian education. At Western, a notable service has been performed in the past to pastors and laymen of other denominations, furnishing them with a meaningful opportunity for professional development.

The purpose of the degree program is best expressed in a statement adopted for presentation to the American Association of Theological Schools:

"Religious education is a means by which the church communicates its faith, nurtures its members, and equips them for Christian living, worship, and mission.

"The purpose of the Master of Religious Education degree program is to enable men and women to become professionally competent leaders in this educational ministry. It seeks to enable students to be competent designers and facilitators of such ministry.

"While work in the parish is the program's major focus, for specialized forms of educational ministry may utilize it to advantage."

At a recent meeting of the Board of Theological Education of the Reformed Church in America at New Brunswick, N.J., Mrs. John Stewart was appointed Assistant Professor of Christian Education.

Mrs. Stewart received her degree in Christian Education at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, was director of Christian Education at the First Presbyterian Church of Holland for several years, and has been part-time instructor in that field at Western since September, 1970.

Under Prof. Stewart's leadership, about two-thirds of the regular faculty at Western assist in the course offerings, in addition to a course on work with youth taught by the Rev. John Tien, pastor of the Bethany Reformed Church, Kalamazoo.

Ordinarily a full-time program covering a two-year period and requiring a college degree for entrance, it is taken also on a part-time basis by men and women presently engaged in the work of Christian education in churches within a 50-mile radius of Holland.

Persons interested in enrolling in the M.R.E. program may write to the Academic Dean of the seminary, Dr. Elton M. Eenigenburg, for details.

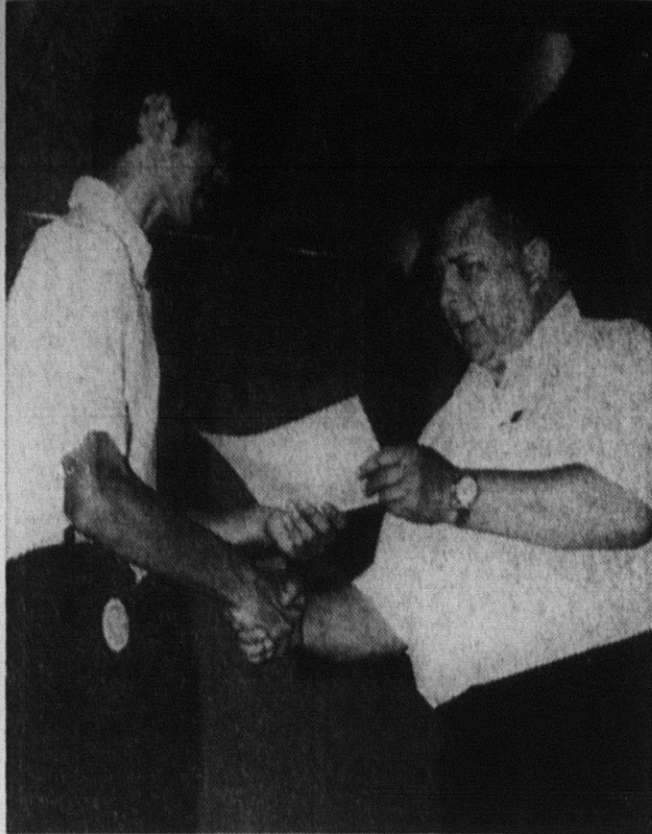

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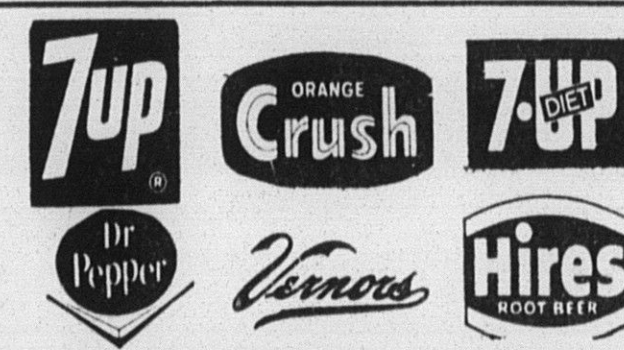
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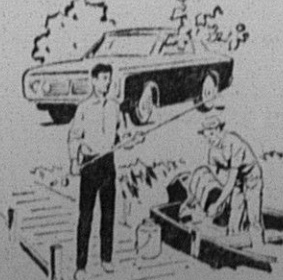
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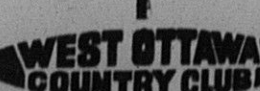


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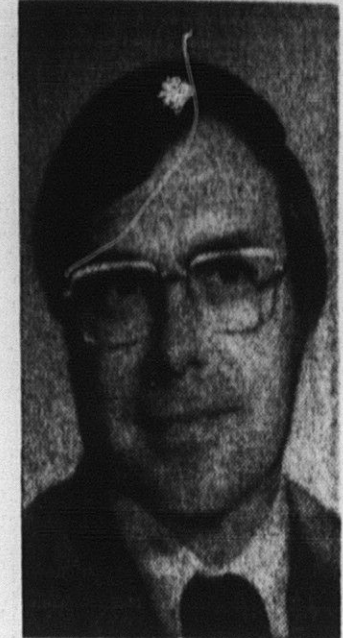


Assistant Principal Is Named

Collins Ottipoby, son of Mrs. J. C. Ottipoby of 1055 Lincoln Ave. and the late Rev. Ottipoby, resides in Kingman, Ariz., and gives a first-hand account of the butane - loaded railroad tank car explosion that occurred in the center of that northwestern Arizona town of 3,000 persons.

Ottipoby and his family reside at 2514 Ricca Dr. He is a junior high school mathematics teacher who works with the National Forestry Department in the summer, heading a pumper unit crew. He wrote the following account of the explosion:

"I'm afraid that July 5 at 2 p.m. began a day of disaster for Kingman. Our crew was called to a fire about 14 miles from Kingman. In the meantime, a railroad tank car full of compressed propane gas caught on fire near our Ricca Dr. area.

"Naturally the city fire department was called. While they were attempting to put it out, the whole tank car exploded. Alice (Ottipoby's wife) was indoors and felt the whole house shake and felt the extreme heat of the blast. (The leaves on our trees are now all withered.) Our house was some 500 yards from the blast so you can imagine what happened to people who were closer.

"We, on the out-of-town fire, were suddenly called back to town. We could see the smoke rising high in the sky so we knew something had happened.

"When we got to town, everything was hedlam... We were assigned to a certain area where the fires were spreading. Business establishments for a whole block were on fire.

"Our office had an Air Force bomber that it uses to drop chemicals on forest fires. This bomber was ordered to drop its load right on the worst parts of the fire. Gradually, all fires were suppressed and it has been a sad town since then.

"Once during a lull in the

fire, I quickly went home to let Alice know I was ok. I found that the entire Ricca Drive had been ordered to evacuate. It seemed real strange to see nothing stirring anywhere.

"The remains of the original tank car were found some 400 yards down the tracks. Three of the city firemen were cremated instantly by the blast.

"We in our family survived this and are ok. Other families were not this fortunate. Most of the injured were those who stood at a distance and watched....

"....The stunning part is that in a small town like this, everyone knows everyone else."

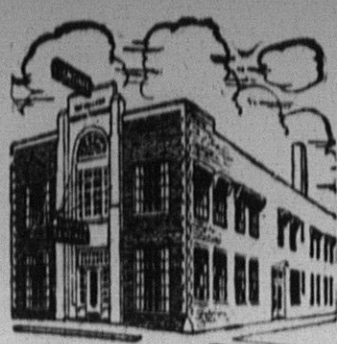

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TAXPAYER IS THE VICTIM

(Guest Editorial)
Economists, like the Greeks, always have a word for it. In the case of Social Security benefits, the economists' word is transfer payment. This bit of jargon will never be better understood than in the wake of the latest increase in Social Security benefits.

Social Security benefits are already subject to an escalator clause to take care of increases in the cost of living. But this provision does not take effect immediately, so Congress increased benefits 5.6 per cent to take care of this year's rapid inflation. The crunch is that workers earning up to \$12,600 will find their Social Security taxes raised to pay for the benefit increase. At the \$12,600 level, it will cost \$35.10 for the employee's share.

So, the worker can practically see his \$35 floating out of his paycheck and into the pocket of a Social Security recipient. Moreover, this transfer payment is not being made to redress some great inequity faced by the elderly: It compensates for the same kind of higher cost of living that is faced by the worker as well. It is not unreasonable for some workers to wonder why they are left out while these transfer payments are being passed around.

Economists can explain that, too. Transfer payments are likely to go to the most politically - united groups from the least politically - united groups. Thus, the elderly, veterans, etc., are the most likely transfer payees while the great bulk of taxpayers are the transfer payers.

The payers should realize that despite all the transfers they are funding, there is no one left to pay transfers for them. There will be one around to hand the payers \$35 to beat the high cost of living and make transfer payments until the arrival of a new generation of taxpayers.

Proper Regard for Ownership
Exodus 20:15; Amos 8:4-5;
Luke 19:1-10

Loose thinking is common and the results are evident. One is the increased stealing today. God forbids taking things which do not belong to us. One of today's many needs is respect for property and personality.

I. To steal is forbidden. God who is the owner of all things seen and unseen says, "Thou shalt not steal." In spite of this command of God, more stealing is going on than ever; nothing is safe; anything that is loose is liable to be picked up. Shoplifting, breaking into homes and carrying away valuables, loading on the job, making false reports, tax evasion, slowdowns, embezzling, kidnapping, cheating by employers and employees and many other ways are practiced today to get money, which some think is the golden gate to happiness.

In the world of industry and labor, many ways are practiced which involve stealing — sometimes in subtle ways, sometimes openly. We used to speak of the Puritan conscience and today we need that kind, but it is hard to find in some quarters.

II. Greed often leads to theft. The prophet Amos lived in times of great change and the rich were getting richer, but not always by honest methods. Often they exploited the poor and cheated in business deals. They tampered with the standards of weight and balances in order to make bigger profits. In addition, they crowded out the small landowners in any way at all. They could not wait for the Sabbath to end so that they could buy and sell. We have merchants like that today and church members patronize them and help keep them in business.

III. Responsibility and ownership go together. Luke records the story of Jesus and Zacheus the publican who got rich collecting taxes. Jesus invited Himself to this man's house. The stay of Jesus in this home brought results, as the publican made two decisions. He promised to give half of his goods to the poor and if he had stolen anything he would restore it fourfold. His conversion made him take a new look at his past, at his future, at his wealth and at the poor and needy.

Today, society is making demands upon corporations and upon the wealthy and some respond. Not only the rich have responsibilities, but all have responsibilities to those in need, the handicapped and disadvantaged. Some have no sense of pride, see only themselves and believe in getting material things in any way they can. God says we should have regard for Him, people, and property, which belongs to Him. Not a few steal from God.

Zeeland Eyes Bond Plan For Schools

ZEELAND — The Board of Education is seeking approval of the Municipal Finance Commission to issue \$570,000 in bonds to finance additions to the New Groningen and Roosevelt elementary schools.

If permission is granted to issue the bonds, construction is scheduled to begin in late summer. The bond issue would be for 11 years and run concurrent with the Middle School bonds, school officials said.

The bond issue would not require an increase in the debt retirement millage rate of 2.5 mills now being levied because of increased valuations in the district.

The action to seek bonding permission was reached at a special meeting of the board of education Tuesday.

The proposed additions would permit fifth grade students to be removed from the Middle School which was designed for grades sixth through eighth.

School district voters last December rejected proposals for a new elementary school and additional high school facilities.

Following the voter rejection of the proposals, the school board conducted two surveys which indicated voters favored additions to the existing New Groningen and Roosevelt schools.

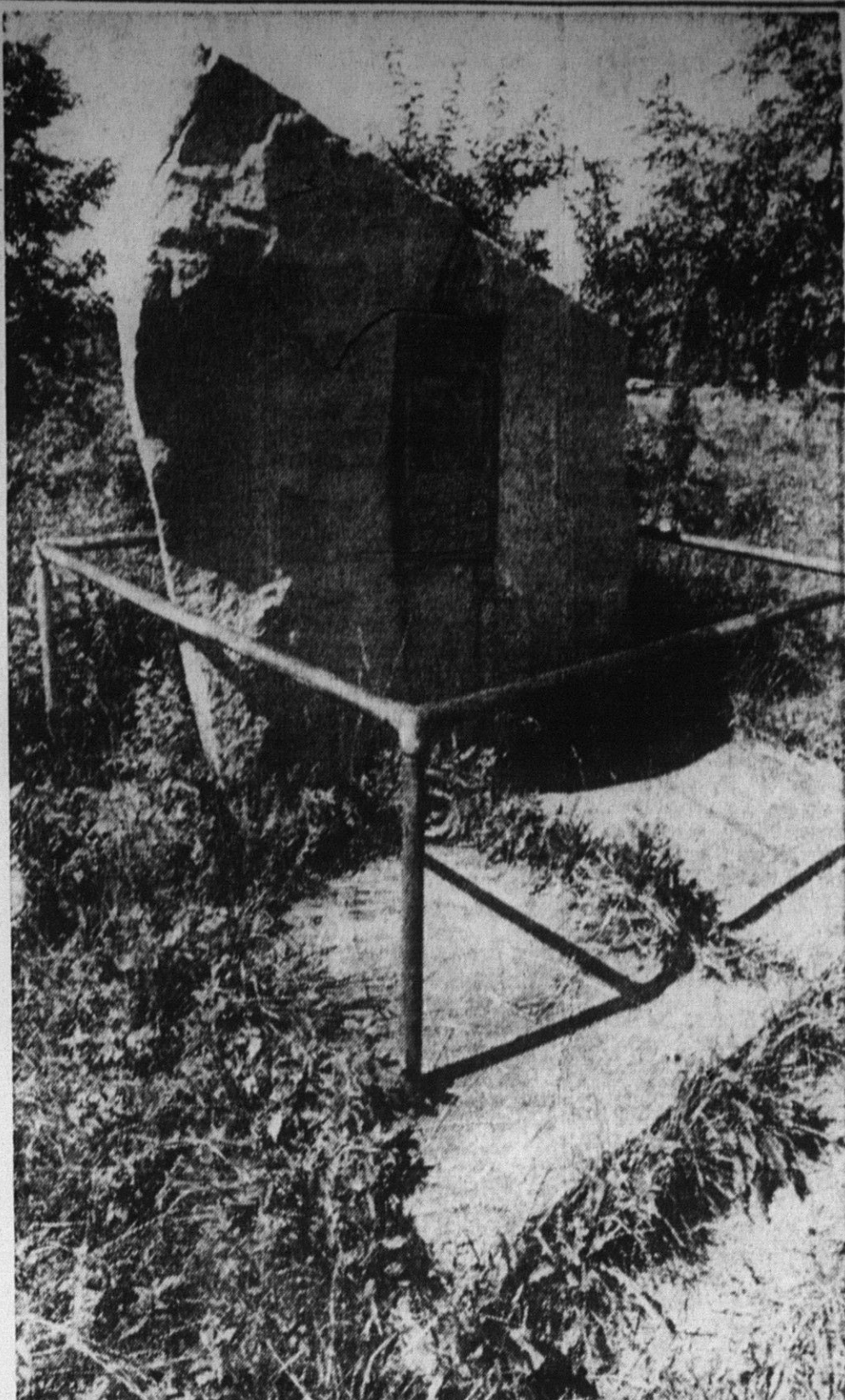

Etta Fox Questers Spark Memorial Restoration

An historic marker on the Black River banks has been rescued from near - oblivion by the Etta Fox Questers.

The group discovered that the memorial, marking the site of "Het Waterhuisje" temporary quarters for the 1847 party which settled Zeeland, Vriesland and Drenthe was grown up in weeds and that some asphalt paving had been dumped in the area, further contributing to the unkempt look of the marker, placed there in 1922, just inside the Holland east boundaries on Paw Paw Dr.

Checking first with the Ottawa County Road Commission, they discovered that the American Legion had ordered the asphalt as part of a plan to build up the Black River banks adjacent to the golf course to prevent spring flooding of the course.

The brass plaque on the marker records the arrival of the Dutch settlers, by flat boat at the then head of navigation of the Black River, just a few rods south and east of the marker; and the building of the log and bark structure, "Het Waterhuisje," used first as a temporary home and later for a distribution station of building materials, tools and supplies arriving by raft or scow from Singapore on the Kalamazoo River.

The Etta Fox Questers are enlisting the support of the American Legion in the 1250 restoration project; and have written to the City Council about it, and hope that public interest may be aroused to assist in providing a more attractive setting for the memorial to the early settlers.

Local Residents Tell of Seeing Amish Family

"All appeared well and the horses seemed healthy and rested with no hint of lameness. We exchanged mutual salutes as we passed. God had indeed tended to their needs and healed their lame horse."

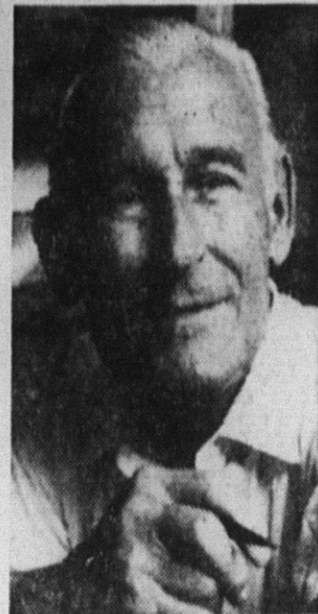
