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## Board Hears Report From Undertakers

GRAND HAVEN — After a report by Claude Ver Duin, chairman of a committee in north Ottawa county, that undertakers are dropping out of the ambulance business July 1, the Ottawa county board of supervisors voted Monday, at its May meeting, to hold a county-wide meeting in an attempt to solve the problem.

Ver Duin, secretary-manager of the Tri-Cities Chamber of Commerce, said that a conference is planned in Lansing June 20, after which clarification of some of the new state and federal regulations will be made. The county meeting is planned after the state meeting.

Raymond Vander Laan, a member of the board and a Hudsonville undertaker, said that the high cost of operating ambulances is forcing many undertakers out of business. He is negotiating with the city fire department in his city to assist in answering calls. The health committee will study the board's part in an attempt to solve the ambulance problem.

The board acted to hire a new county dentist at its April session but as the salary could not be set at that session the action was rescinded. The health committee was asked to study a plan under which the dental work for county children would be done under contract. Jack Frost of the Hilton-Frost Business Equipment Co. of Muskegon offered to make a survey of the condition of all equipment in county offices free of charge and the board accepted the offer.

A survey of the costs of the sheriff's department in Ottawa will be made, comparing the cost to the cost of sheriff's operations in other counties. The Rev. George Timberlake of Grand Haven submitted a letter to the board and claims that the annual cost has grown to \$338,000, last year, compared with \$108,000 in 1958.

Supervisor William Winstrom of Holland asked that the survey be made and that the figures be published. Sheriff Bernard Grysen was present and was asked to provide the figures.

The board voted to oppose a bill before the state legislature which would exempt fruits and vegetables, stored in stores or factories, from taxation by municipalities. The bill number is 2326 and letters will be sent to area legislators. The board referred to the legislative committee of the board a request to obtain the status of littering penalties in the courts in the county.

Supervisor Lawrence Vredevoogd of Jenison asked that the activities of the new mental health department office, which will occupy rooms in the new county building addition, be reviewed and a report made at the June session of the board.

## Park Township No. 2 Firemen Start Law Suit

GRAND HAVEN — Judge Stuart Hoffius of Kent County Circuit Court, acting in the absence of the two Ottawa judges, Wednesday issued an order to show cause why a writ of mandamus should not be issued against Park township board and the Park Township Fire Board granting the release requested by 13 members of the township fire department No. 2. A hearing will be held Monday, May 19 at 9 a.m. in Ottawa Circuit Court.

The petition filed late Wednesday claims that on May 13 plaintiffs received notice that they had been removed from office, effective May 14, and were notified by Supervisor Herman Windemuller. The petition seeking a writ of mandamus asked that the removal of employees be rescinded until the matter is mediated.

Plaintiffs claim that firing of the 13 men is the result of a labor dispute between employees and the fire board.

Plaintiffs are Jack Witteveen, Arnold De Feyter, Robert Boes, Arnold Streur, Robert Tubergen, Leon Rithamel, Howard Helder, Deane Lengkeek, Richard Scheerhorn, Larry Topp, Robert Rhoda, Alton Harrington and Carl Nies.

Donald Hann, attorney for the firemen, said the firemen are looking at the problem as a labor dispute and charge that the township board has not followed their own rules for hearings or suspensions, that the township fire board which has come up with the rules is illegally constituted and that the township is violating their statutory duty to provide adequate fire protection to the township residents.

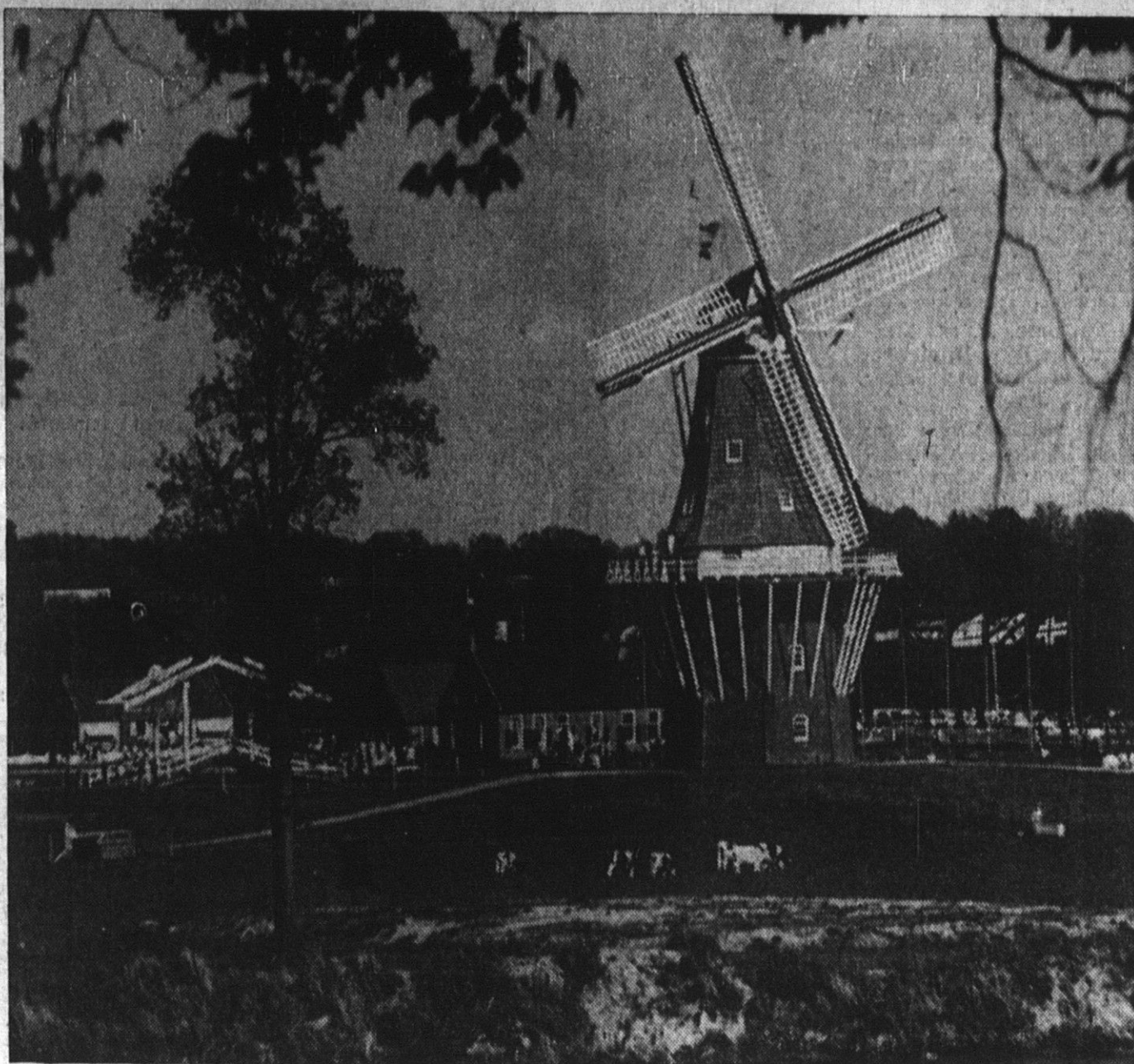
Hann said they plan to file a temporary restraining order allowing the firemen to cover any fires, pending the hearing Monday morning. Hann said "the firemen who have served for so long wish to continue to serve the township and feel quite sure that independent arbiters could work out a solution acceptable to both sides."

## Burning Refuse Dumped on Road

Firemen from Holland Township No. 2 were called to put out a fire in rubbish burning in the middle of Felch St. just west of 120th Ave. Thursday.

The rubbish had been dumped there from a Jacobus refuse packer truck when the driver, Robert Jay Vander Wege of 917 Paw Paw Dr., saw smoke coming from the rear of the truck. Ottawa county sheriff's deputies who were also at the scene reported Vander Wege had dumped the load of rubbish on the road to prevent the truck from burning up.

Another truck was brought to the scene to haul away the refuse after the fire was extinguished.

## Officials Await Court Confirmation

ALLEGAN — City officials are awaiting confirmation of an unofficial report that the U. S. Court of Appeals in Washington has upheld a decision of the Federal Power Commission, approving the sale of the city-owned electric system to Consumers Power Company.

Former City Attorney Edward Reed Barton said Tuesday that he had been notified of the decision by Washington attorneys retained by the city to represent its interests in the appeal.

A decision affirming the FPC's approval of the sale will free more than \$2 million in proceeds and accumulated interest which have been under court control ever since a so-called "taxpayers' group" initiated court action in an attempt to halt the transaction.

The sale originally was approved by a three-fifths majority vote at a special city election, Jan. 18, 1967, more than two years ago.

Consumers Power Company officially took over operation of the city system early in 1968. The original purchase price was \$1,782,000. Electric department cash assets retained by the city increased the actual sale proceeds to more than \$2.1 million and the amount has been earning interest at 5 per cent for more than a year.

How the funds are to be used will be up to Allegan voters.

Under Allegan's charter, no disposition of the money can be made without a three-fifths majority vote.

Present city council members favor establishment of a permanent trust fund, leaving the principal amount intact, with interest earned going into the general fund. Even this arrangement would require a revision of the city charter with voter approval.

Lewis Krause Farmers Home Administration director for Allegan county, has told council members the fund could earn as much as 7½ percent interest if invested in FHA notes. This would earn more than \$150,000 annually, approximately three-fourths of the city's present net general fund requirements, raised by taxation.

## Children Take Over For Parade

### Inaugural Band Show Is Tulip Time's Top Attraction Tonight

Beautiful sunshine greeted the second day of Holland's 40th anniversary Tulip Time festival today, and thousands of visitors awaited the highlight of the day, the children's parade, at 2:30 p.m.

This appealing spectacle of some 5,000 children wearing Dutch costumes or band uniforms sometimes proves even more interesting than the unique street scrubbing ceremony which traditionally opens Tulip Time festivals in Holland, Mich.

Gov. and Mrs. William Milliken, outfitted in Dutch costumes, led 500 local burghers in the annual scrubbing rite Wednesday. The Millikens arrived at Park Township Airport at 11:30 a.m. accompanied by Reps. Melvin De Stigter and James Farnsworth, meeting Sen. Gary Byker here. The West Ottawa High School Band and the National Guard were on hand and the governor and Mrs. Milliken inspected band and guards before the governor gave a brief greeting, promising to scrub Holland streets "as they never had been scrubbed before."

Roger Stroh and James Vande Poel headed Wednesday afternoon's program, lining up scrubbers and the folk parade which had 17 bands, 25 floats, and 650 klompen dancers who performed on the freshly scrubbed streets afterwards.

With Wednesday's temperatures at an ideal 67 degrees, there was more water play than usual. This byplay usually is gauged according to the temperature with considerably less splashing when temperatures are 20 degrees lower.

Tonight's main attractions are the 1969 Presidential Inaugural Band show at 8 p.m. in Civic Center put on by the Holland Christian High School band which marched in the inaugural parade, and "Portraits in Opera" put on by Hope College in Dinnent Memorial Chapel.

The Millikens were honored at a luncheon Wednesday noon in Civic Center for several hundred guests. The governor who said he was either in his 102nd or 103rd day of administration spoke of the complexity of problems facing the Michigan legislature and said legislators were addressing themselves to the problems and working on solutions.

His remarks dealt mainly with tourism which is Michigan's second largest industry (automotive industry first and farm crops and processing third) and he praised such cities as Holland and Benton Harbor in staging fine floral festivals attracting visitors to Michigan.

He spoke of the fine beaches in Western Michigan, the many lakes and forests, the color tours and the accommodations for rest and relaxation, pointing out that summer homes on Michigan lakes used to be the privilege of the wealthy only, but today's affluence offers vacation privileges for all.

He said in 1968 tourism brought \$1,120,000,000 into Michigan and of this amount \$75 million went directly into the Michigan state treasury in taxes, in turn financing education, mental hospitals, highway construction and many other services.

"What you are doing in Holland is a major boom not only to yourself but to the entire state of Michigan," he said.

Tom De Free introduced guests and Joel Ver Plank, Ottawa county Republican chairman, introduced the governor. Arlene Welling of the Junior Welfare League presented an Eet Smakelijk cookbook to Mrs. Milliken.

Friday traditionally is a quiet day during Tulip Time, a convenient time for postponed parades in case of rain; otherwise a more relaxed day for townsfolk and visitors.

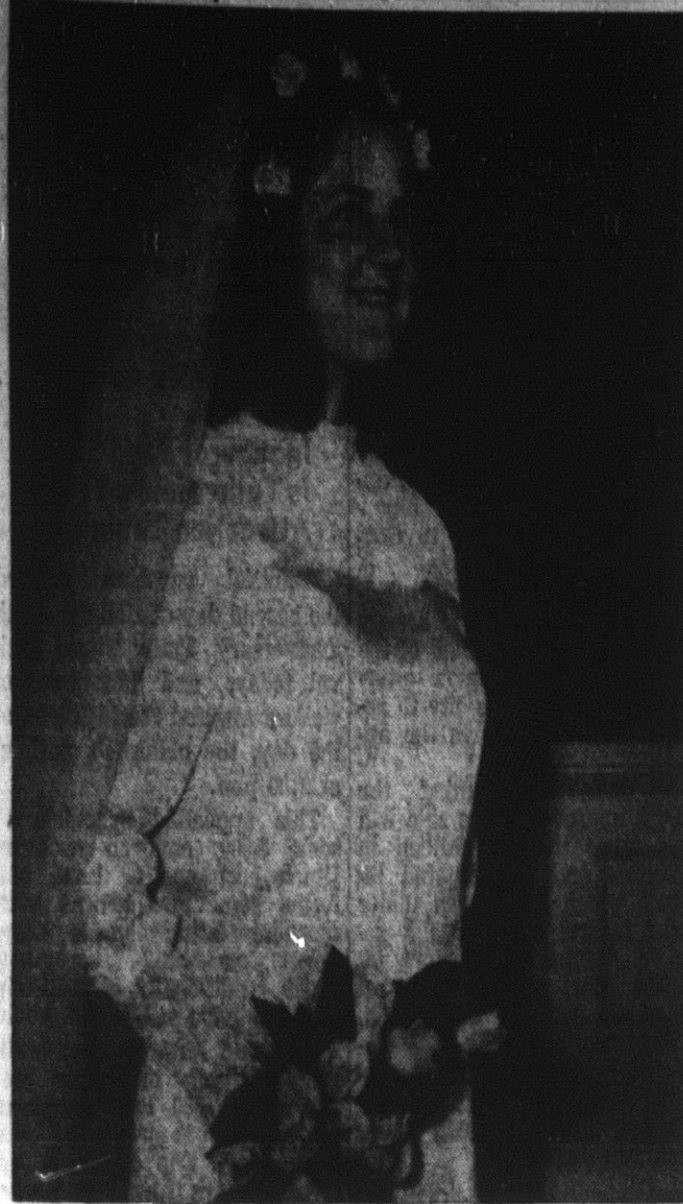

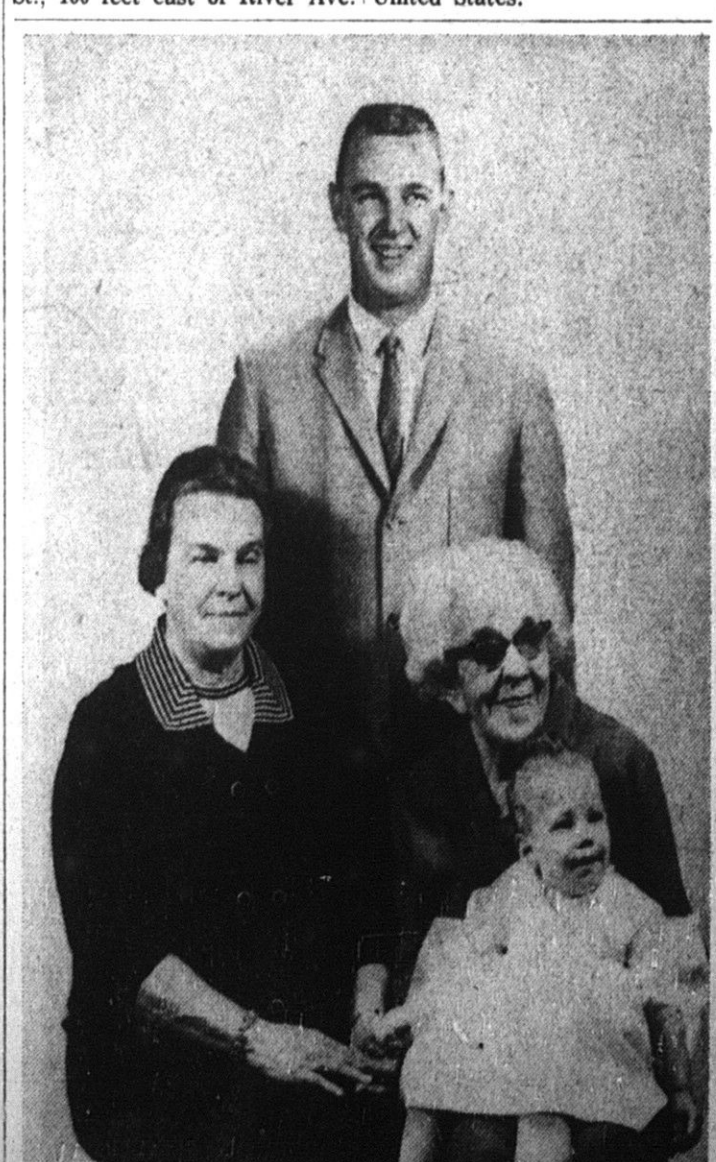

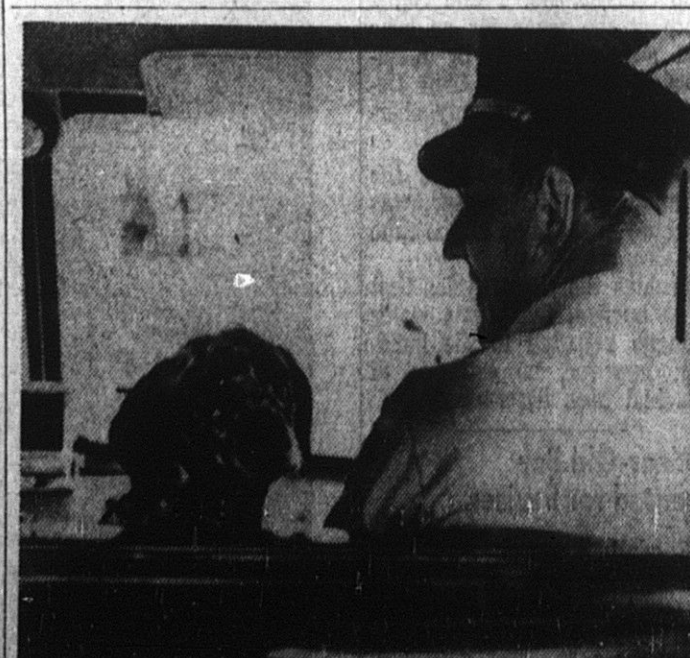

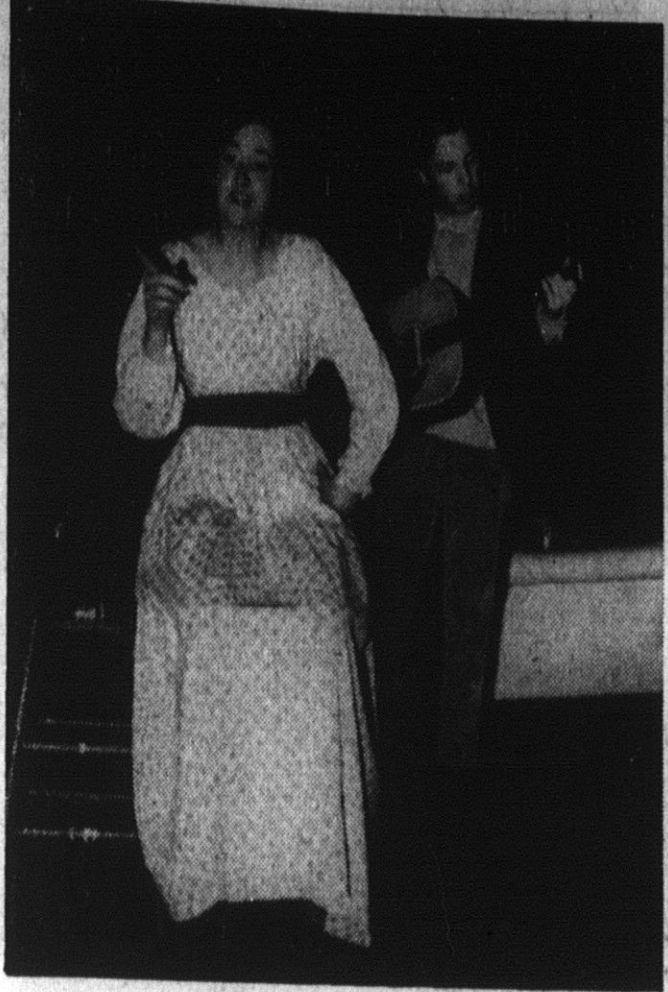

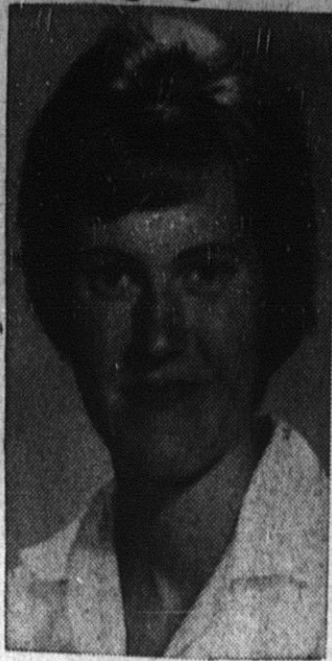

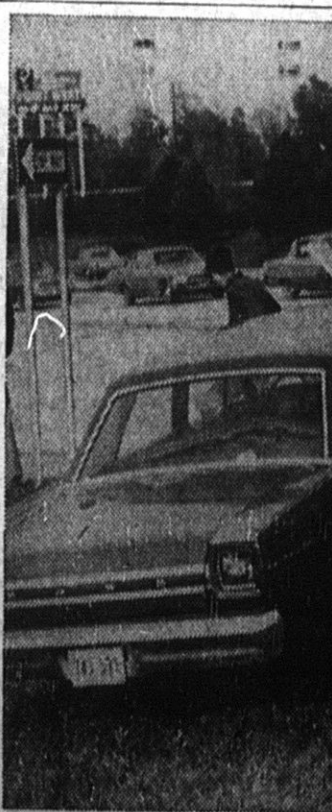
## Dr. Bruggink Given Honor

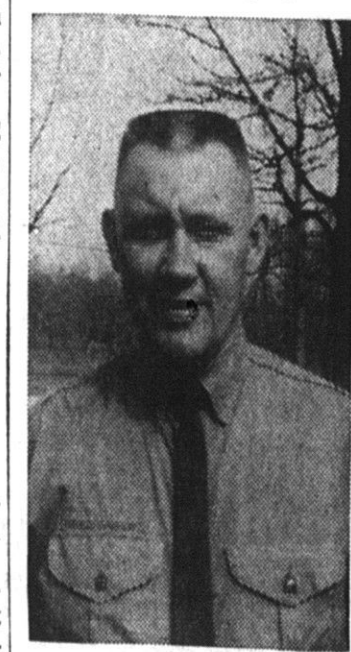

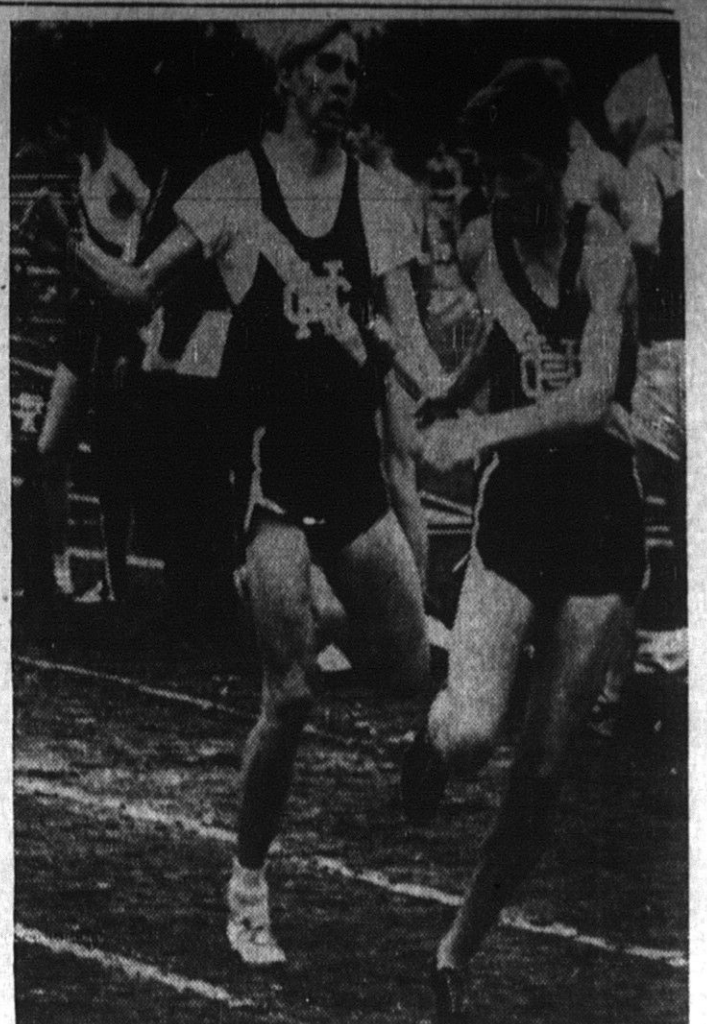

Seeking four-year terms are incumbent Mrs. Kay Mac Kenzie who was appointed to the board a year ago, Dr. James Prins, Rudy Fojtik, Herbert Wiersma, Lynn Wheaton, Paul De Maagd and Delwyn Van Tongeren.

Candidates for the one-year term are Robert Gosselaar, Morrie Tubergen and David Vande Vusse.

Also on the June 9 ballot will be a proposition calling for a half mill for three years to operate the Holland Community Swimming Pool.

Member Harvey Buter pointed to the fine community relations in the operation of the pool to date and said he believed it was the finest expression of community effort he has seen in Holland. Thousands of boys and girls have learned to swim the past year, he said, pointing to the program for fourth, fifth and sixth graders taught to swim by competent instructors and transported by bus to classes. This service is provided for private and parochial schools in the community, plus opportunities on the junior high and high school levels, as well as programs for other students and adults.

He also spoke of the services to the handicapped children, and the opportunities for extensions of the city recreational program in the summer through use of the pool.

The board passed four resolutions for setting up the June 9 election as drafted by Atty. James E. Townsend. One set up 16 precincts listing the boundaries of the city's 14 precincts plus Federal and Harrington districts. The second named the polling places, the usual ones in the city's 14 precincts and Federal school and Harrington school. The third named inspectors as recommended by D. W. Schipper who is setting up the election for the schools, and the fourth provides for an absent voter counting board.

## County Board Hears Report On Youth Home

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa board of supervisors may have solved the personnel problem at the county youth home at Grand Haven at its May meeting Monday.

Don Meinderstma, director of juvenile court services, appeared before the board and reported that his office is again facing the loss of the house parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bert Van Dyke.

Sufficient personnel is not available on a part time basis to aid the Van Dyke's, Supervisor Larry Wade and Supervisor Bert Schuitema of Holland both asked that the problem be solved by hiring another full-time couple to assist in operating the home.

The director said the home was opened in 1962 and cost \$150,000. It has house eight boys and four girls and is filled most of the time. There are two over the limit at the home now, he said.

He said that Muskegon spends \$40,000 a year and Allegan \$25,000 for help, compared with \$15,000 in Ottawa. Meinderstma was requested to submit a revised salary schedule for the home at the October session of the board, when the 1970 budget will be approved.

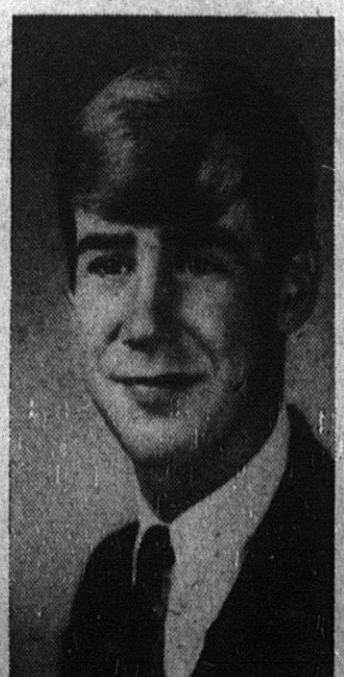

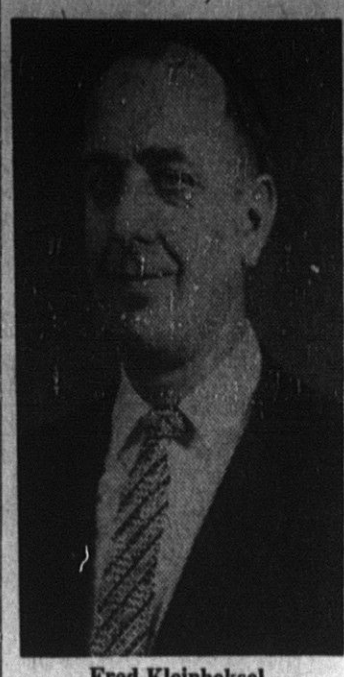

## Grandstanding

The adage "success builds success" has special meaning for Holland High tennis teams. A successful player now coaching, a tradition of success on the courts and a successful city summer recreation tennis program have combined to make tennis Holland High's best sport.

The coach, Roger Plagenhoef, is a former standout player for Holland and Michigan State University. He was ranked 13th in the country at one time and finished second in the Big Ten tourney.

A glance at the record shows that the likeable coach has found the formula for passing on his knowledge of the game. When Holland High whipped Muskegon Mona Shores last Thursday it marked the 100th win against nine losses in six years under Plagenhoef's tutelage.

Plagenhoef took over from Joe Moran, the present city recreation director, who had built up the winning tennis tradition. Moran's teams at one time won 66 straight dual matches in the 1950's.

Moran also developed the city's summer tennis program which has provided opportunity for many youngsters to play and learn tennis. Those that excel can go on to get plenty of top-flight competition in tournaments and in matches with other cities. The program has been under the direction of Tom Essenburg for the last few years.

Plagenhoef said you have to give all the credit to the summer recreation program for getting youngsters started right.

In his coaching Plagenhoef sticks to the fundamentals and spends a lot of time on strategy. He stresses teaching team members to think on their feet.

"Psychology plays a big part in high school tennis," Plagenhoef added. "The intellectual side of tennis is one of the most interesting aspects. You have to have the ability to let go of the last point, and go on to the one at hand," he said.

He tries to build up "psychosomatic action" the proper mental attitude which transfers into the proper moves on the court. The goal, he explained, is to have his men in control of their matches.

Plagenhoef, a biology teacher at the high school, is active in tennis beyond the four months of the high school season. He's

president of the Western Michigan Tennis Association, and a delegate to the Western Tennis Association, a section of the United States Lawn Tennis Association. During July and August he's a teaching pro at the Little Harbor Club in Harbor Springs.

This year's Holland team has carried on the winning tradition,

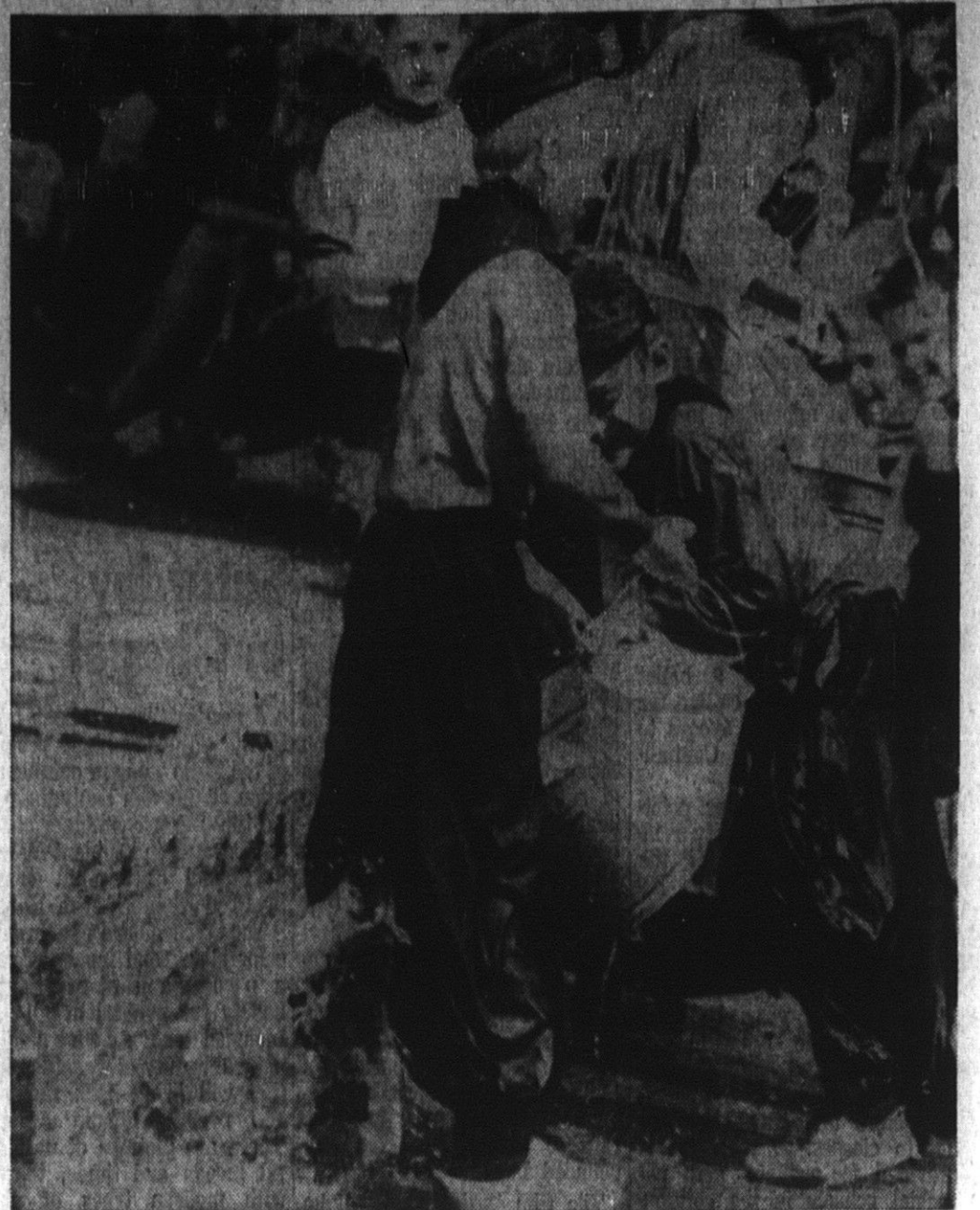

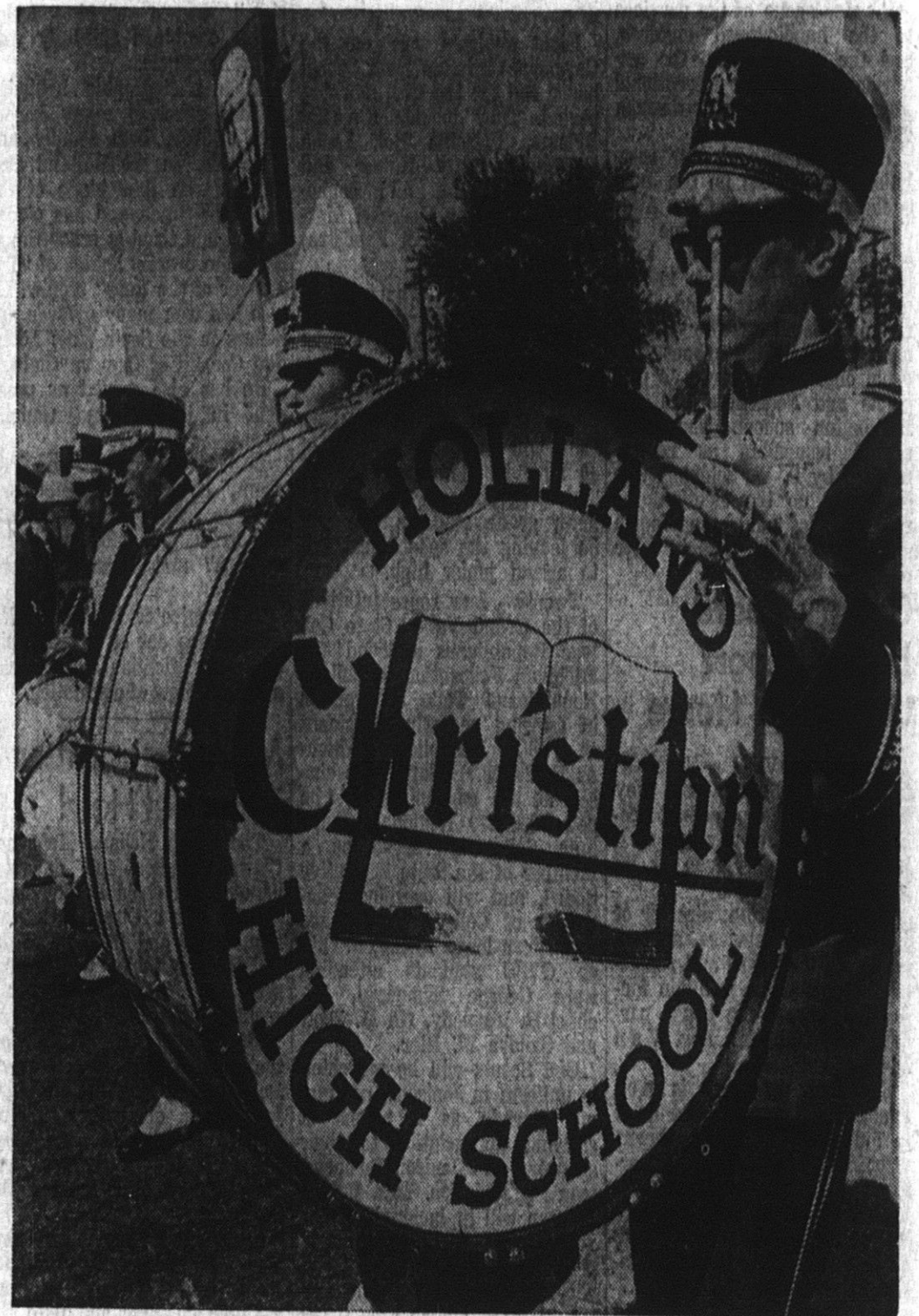

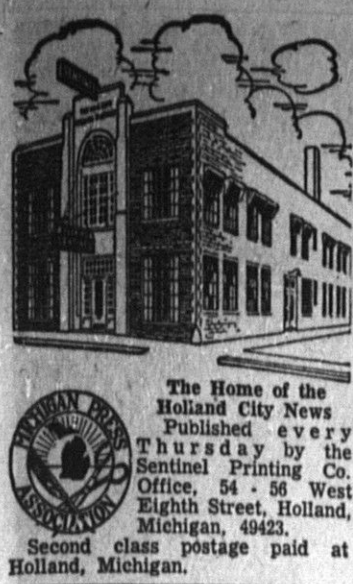

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### "AN EXCELLENT START"

For a good many years Americans have complained that we have been sending money all over the world while neglecting our own needy citizens. More recently Congressional investigators have shown that the presence of a large number of needy and even hungry people was no myth. It is against this background that we should applaud the action of President Nixon in making available food for our own people. This, of course, doesn't mean that the needs of others are not our concern.

Speaking to the Congress, President Nixon said "that hunger and malnutrition should persist in a land such as ours is embarrassing and intolerable." He is right. It even goes beyond that. It is immoral.

Our problem has not been raising enough food for our people, it has been that many do not have the money to purchase what is necessary. A family earning \$4,000 a year, trying to raise four children, will either cut down on the food budget, or go without a great many other necessities of life. And a rich nation ought to be more than embarrassed to ask people to do without enough food.

Perhaps one of the better ways for all of us to get a perspective on the needs of a great many people is to pick up a recent copy of the World Almanac or a publication similar to it. A quick look at the statistics on income of families will reveal the truth of what President Nixon has in mind. It is very easy to overlook the economic facts of life when dealing with other people.

There is something heartening about a President's concern for the hungry. We may find that getting our priorities straight, and feeding the hungry ought to be at the head of the list, will give us the kind of perspective that will aid us in solving some of our other problems. We will come to know that men, women, and children constitute the nation. And our moral strength will be shown in the way we treat one another as the very basic level of life.

### Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, May 18  
Keys To Understanding  
The Bible  
John 16:12-15; Acts 17:10-12;  
James 1:22-25  
By C. P. Dame

The word "understanding" is popular today. There is a great need for much more understanding between people and people. Many people do not understand the Bible and its teaching. May this lesson teach us how better to understand God's Word.

I. We need the guidance of the Holy Spirit in our study of the Bible. The lesson text is composed of three passages of the Bible. We will look at the first passage from John's gospel first. It speaks of the guidance of the Holy Spirit. The disciples did not grasp truths Jesus tried to teach them. "I have yet many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now"—they did not have the ability to understand His teaching but they would have the ability shortly when the Holy Spirit would come to teach them. Jesus foretold His coming.

Note the Lord's words—"He will guide you into all the truth," and "whatever He hears He will speak," and "He will declare to you the things that are to come," and "He will glorify Me." The Holy Spirit made clear to the disciples the meaning of the death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus. The Holy Spirit continues to guide us in the reading of the Bible.

II. Studying the Bible gives understanding of it. The second part of the text is from Acts and it tells the story of how the Bereans studied the Bible. They heard the gospel preached and they turned to the Old Testament to see whether those things which they had heard were so. These hearers wanted to know and so they studied.

We need far more Bible study in our churches. Some churches give courses of study in all manner of subjects but they overlook the Bible. Why not offer courses in the Bible and learn what it has to say about all the problems of our day and times? Families can study the Bible together and learn much. Daily reading by the family and by individuals profits. An article in Time magazine on Ethel Kennedy the widow of Senator Robert Kennedy says that "She sits down to every meal with them (the children), says the rosary and reads the Bible with them every night." Today's children need the principles of the Bible so that they may live uprightly in a secular society.

III. Hearing the Word must be followed by doing. The third section of the lesson text is from the Epistle of James which deals primarily with the moral and spiritual obligations of believers. More than half of the 108 verses of the epistle deal with Christian conduct. James likens the man who hears the Word and does nothing about it to the man who looks at himself in a mirror and sees things which ought to be corrected but leaves them as they are. After we have heard the Word at the worship services and at Sunday School then comes the task of doing it in all the daily affairs of life.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies completed their 15-hour course in emergency operations Thursday night with the night practice training session held at the Fraternal Order of Police grounds north of Holland.

Sheriff Bernard Grysen said live tear gas was among items used to simulate possible conditions in the mock-up to test various formations, techniques and methods used in coping with civil disorders and natural disasters.

Half the county's 70 reserve officers manned the regular patrol shifts while the other half participated in the session that was the last phase of training for the 50 regular officers.

Sheriff Grysen said Sgts. Gerald Wittveen and William Halter headed arrangements for the practice.

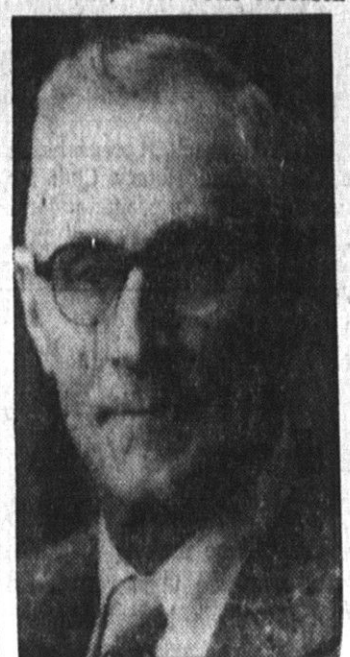

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### Research Vessel Surveys Movement Of Fish In Area

Wondering where the fish are? So is the Department of Natural Resources. To answer that question the fish management research vessel Steelhead is surveying in this area for the next few days.

The vessel which is being docked in Holland at the Coast Guard Station, is primarily maintaining surveillance of salmon movement in Lake Michigan. During the past weekend concentrations of salmon were located approximately five miles south of Holland in the Saugatuck area.

Monday the Steelhead crew lifted nets one mile North of Holland in 24 to 48 feet of water and found large concentrations of lake trout in the two and three pound size and some Chinook Salmon in the 6 to 10 pound size, according to acting district nine fish biologist, John Trimmerberg.

While docked at the Holland Coast Guard Station the Steelhead will be open to the public for inspection in the late afternoon and early evening.

Included in the equipment which should be of interest to visitors is a fishfinder and various types of data collecting equipment. Daily reports from the Steelhead will be called in to the Grand Rapids district office.

## Hope Offers New Course On Culture

The Department of Interdisciplinary Studies at Hope College will offer next fall a new four-hour course aimed at introducing students to some of the central aspects of the cultural crisis of contemporary American society.

"This course is one attempt to begin to get at some clearer vision of the relatedness of all our social problems," Dr. Mueller said.

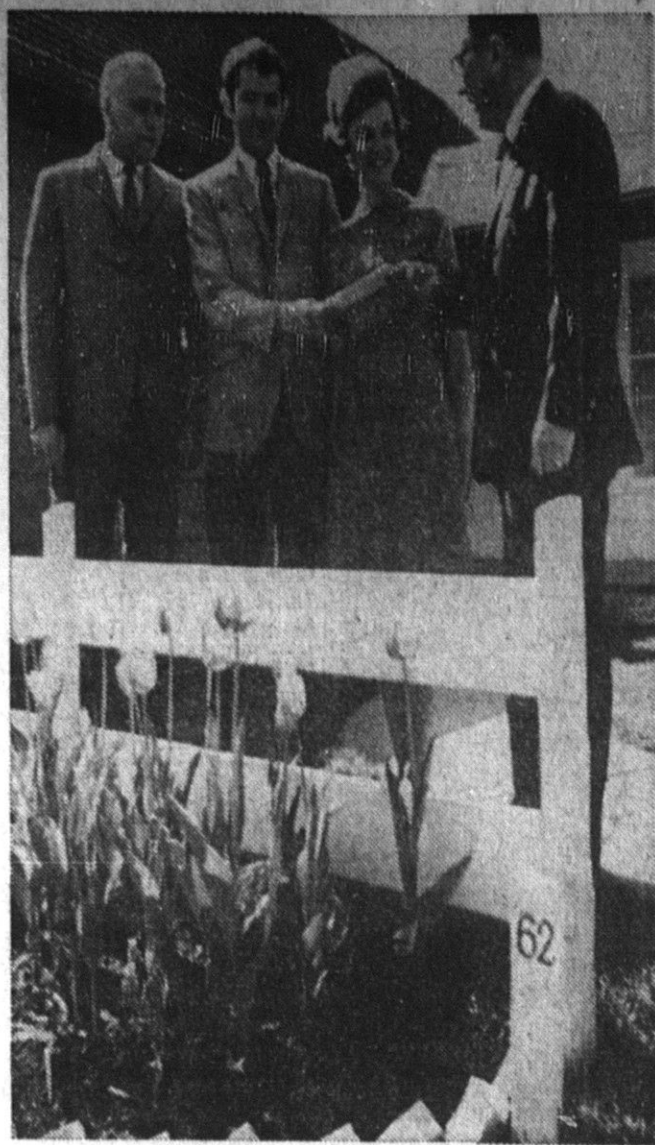
### Christian High Band Performs For Patients

## Hospital Auxiliary Meets In New Heritage Room

The Holland Hospital Auxiliary which has raised approximately \$60,000 for the hospital in the last dozen or more years had an opportunity to see some of its money at work when members gathered in the new Heritage room of the hospital Monday noon for the annual meeting.

More than 150 women were served at an attractively arranged smorgasbord highlighted by an ice sculpture of a huge wooden shoe topped with a bouquet of tulips.

The Heritage Room is on the basement level of the new addition and has its own entrance off 24th St. The walls are adorned with attractively framed pictures of old scenes, documents and maps of early America and early Holland.

Mrs. John K. Winter, auxiliary president, told the women the luncheon this year fell on the birthday anniversary of Florence Nightingale May 12 which also signals the opening of Hospital Week and Holland hospital is planning an open house for the new addition June 25-26. She said the auxiliary, its guilds and the Junior Welfare League had provided \$28,000 towards furnishings, new equipment and renovating the hospital shop in the current building program now rapidly nearing completion.

Greetings were brought by John H. Van Dyke, hospital board president, and Frederick S. Burd, hospital director, both expressing appreciation to the auxiliary for continuing effort and gifts on behalf of the hospital.

The speaker, Mrs. William P. Greenberg, active in volunteer work at Sinai Hospital in Detroit, likened the work of hospital auxiliaries to the Apollo moonshot, and its program of cohesiveness, purpose and action.

There are three types of people, she said, a small minority who make things happen, a larger group who watch things happen and a larger group who don't know what's happening. In women's work, there is always lip service but there is a lot of volunteer service too, and she likened the hospital to the controlling planet and the auxiliary as its satellite.

ellite with (in Holland's case) 18 guilds.

In turning toward total involvement, in the health program, she said the auxiliary is bringing a new dimension in hospital volunteerism, encouraging teamwork without consideration to race, color or creed.

She said change and progress have brought hospitals to the pushbutton era with computerization and automatic data processing doing much of the paper work and even some of the diagnosis, but she said auxiliary volunteers must never lose their identity, that services to patients are still on an individual basis and gifts of kindness, understanding and human compassion must never be forgotten.

She said preventive medicine and scientific research have done much to prolong life but there are serious questions whether it has made life better. She spoke of possibilities of volunteers expanding efforts for helping senior citizens, possibly an area depot which would assist in paper work for Medicare, Medicaid and a host of other health services not always utilized because of complicated blanks.

She also plugged for blood programs because blood supplies are always limited, encouraged financial aid in out-right scholarships and promoted continuing education in the health field.
