Draft Registrations Continue in County

GRAND HAVEN — Selective Service System Executive Secretary Mrs. Helen Pomper, who manages Ottawa County's local board, says the current congressional impasse over extending the induction authority has created great uncertainty among area draft-age men.

Mrs. Pomper explained Selective Service Director Curtis Tarr has recently stressed the importance of explaining to our draft-age men the high probability that draft calls will resume in the near future and that the current impasse in the Congress is not likely to affect any registrant's chance of being drafted.

Our local board has been specifically instructed to continue to register and classify men, and to order for preinduction physical examinations those young men who may be needed to fill draft calls in the coming months, Mrs. Pomper said. Men with lottery number through 125 were eligible for induction in June in order to fill draft calls. Since then, the Defense Department has asked Selective Service to draft 16,000 men in July-August. This request is being held by Selective Service headquarters pending final Congressional action on the draft bill, which is expected within several weeks.

Those young men with relatively low lottery numbers who are eligible for induction this year, particularly those with numbers below 175 - the current processing ceiling - have a good chance of being processed for induction after draft calls are restored, Mrs. Pomper said.

Many young men seem to think that the Selective Service Act has permanently expired and that they probably will never be drafted. They are wrong since it is only the induction authority that has expired. They therefore, may be unintentionally breaking the law by failing to register at age 18, by not keeping their local boards informed of their current address, or by failing to report, if ordered, for their preinduction physical examinations. Mrs. Pomper said.

She also stressed that local

boards are continuing to consider CO, hardship, and student deferments and to take other classification actions.

Young men who had planned to submit requests for deferments or exemptions are encouraged to do so, Mrs. Pomper said. "The expiration of the induction authority does not affect our responsibility to classify young men," Mrs. Pomper added.

29 Japanese Students At Hope College

Thirty-nine Japanese college and university students and their two group leaders arrived on the Hope campus on Saturday, July 17, to begin a five-week course of study on Contemporary America.

The first week featured a series of lectures by Dr. Donald Williams of the Hope department of chemistry on the environment. Subsequent weeks will deal with environmental politics (Dr. Earl Curry), American theater (Prof. John Tammi), the urban environment (Prof. Howard Jams), and the American character (Dean John Stewart).

Field trips to the South Haven Nuclear Plant, the State Capitol, Interlochen National Music Camp, and Chicago will highlight the weekly lectures.

For the first four weeks of the session the students are living in college housing with American students. Then, on Aug. 13, they will begin an eight-day homestay during which they live in the homes of local families that have volunteered to participate in the program.

The students will leave Holland on the morning of Aug. 21 to continue their cross country tour which began on July 6 in Oakland, Calif. and will terminate in New York on Aug. 28.

G. Larry Penrose, Director of the International Summer Session, reports that this is perhaps the most capable group in terms of English ability in the program's history and he gives credit for an excellent start to the strong leadership of Prof. Yutaka Hayashi of Meiji Gakuin University and his assistant, Miss Yoko Narita.

Penrose added that chief English instructor David Baas and his assistants Karin Granberg, Joyce Fisher, John Traylor, and Garrett De Graaf, all current or former Hope students, have done a first rate job of putting together a language program that shares top priority with the lecture series.

Township Dump Closings Signal County Trend

The announced closings of the Holland and Olive township dumps effective Aug. 1 signal a trend throughout the county to close township dumps which do not meet health and environmental specifications.

According to Leslie Toth, sanitary supervisor at the Ottawa County Health Department, the policy to close the dumps has been in effect since 1965 when Public Act 87 spelled out rules and regulations for all types of solid waste disposal areas. A proposed quadrat system of sanitary landfills throughout the county is tentatively set to replace the township dump system, and the dumps will only be closed when there are sanitary landfills near enough to replace them.

Of the original 18 township dumps in the county, only six are still operating. Toth said, adding that eventually there will be no township dumps because the townships are generally not financially able to meet state specifications necessary to keep the areas open.

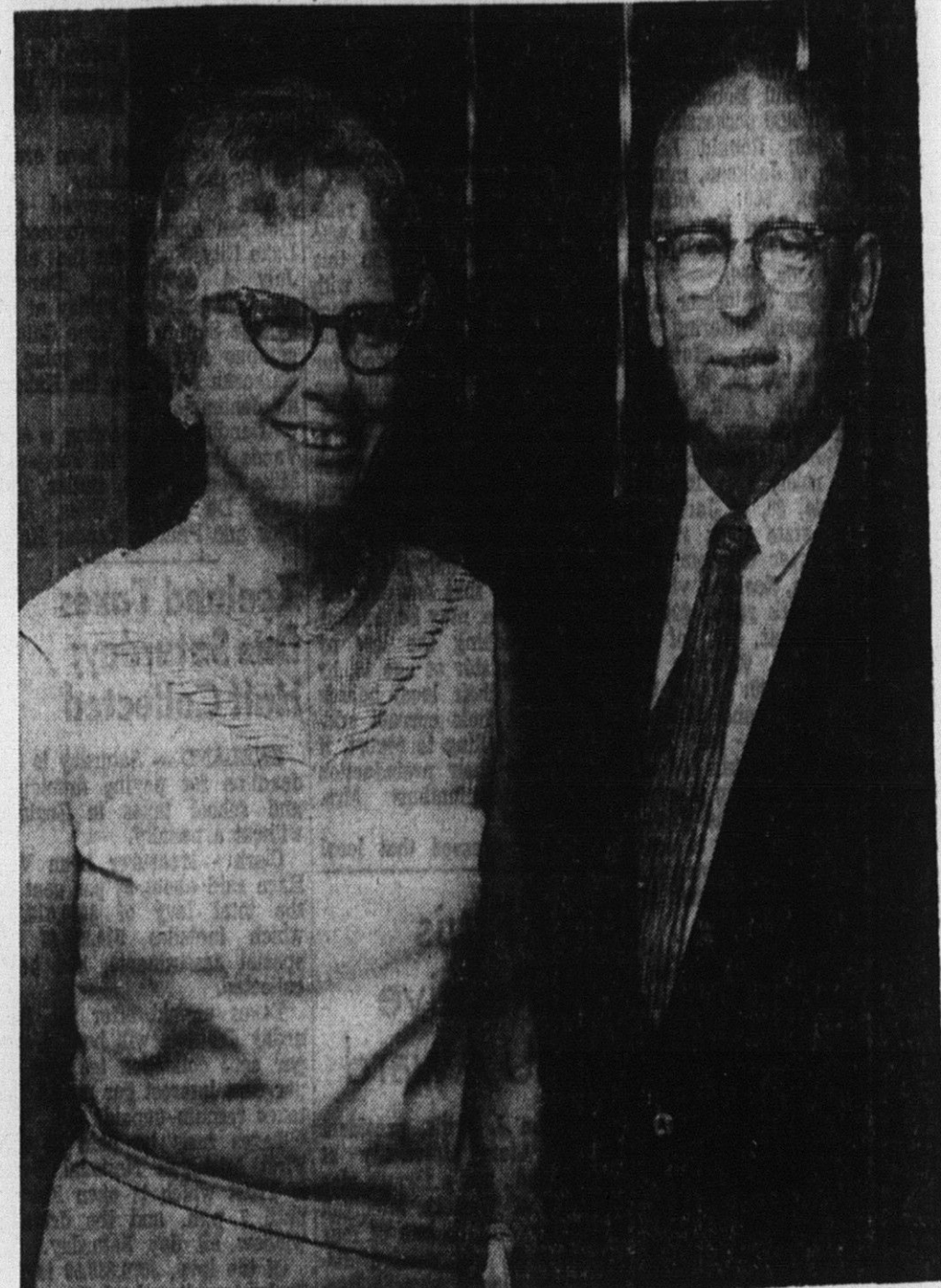

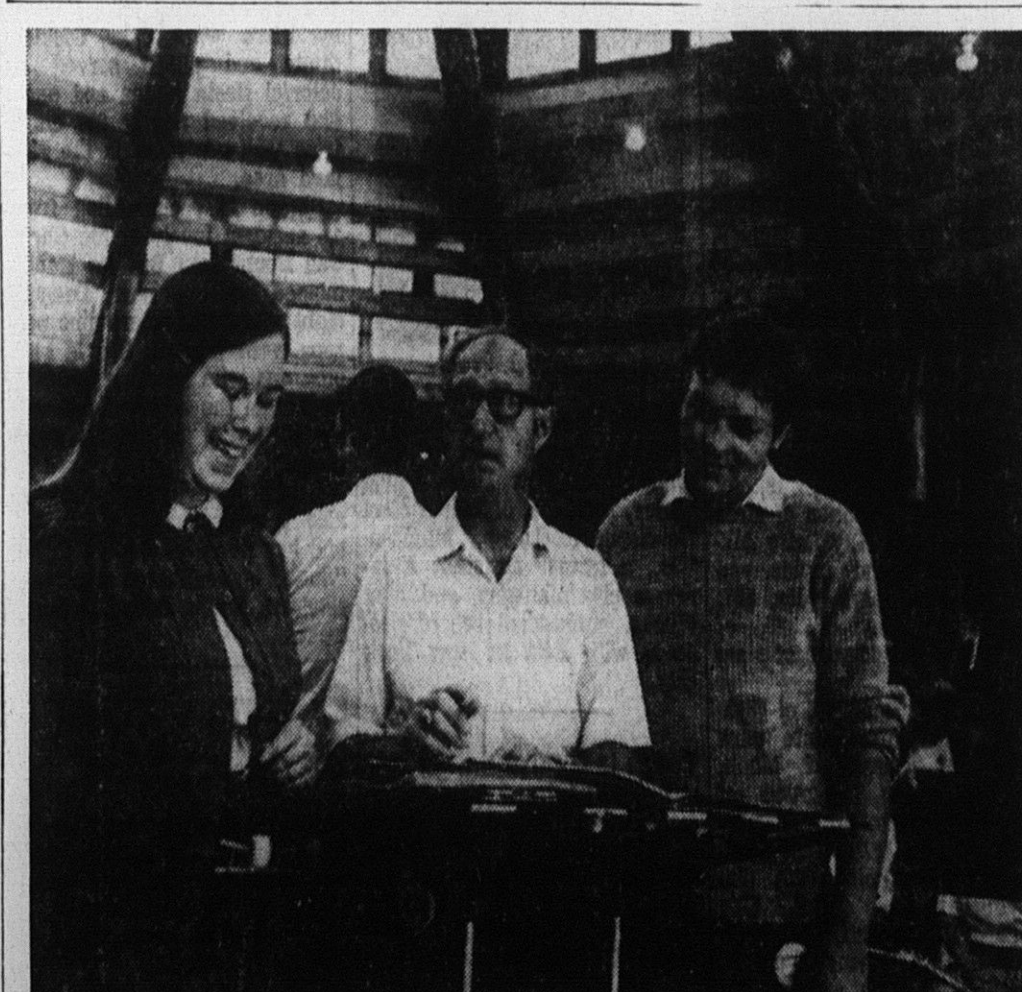

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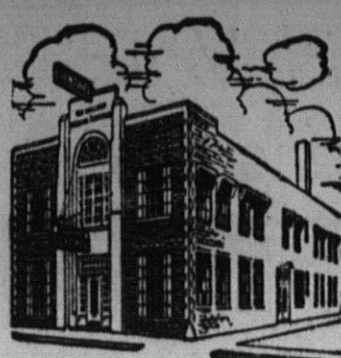


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WOMEN EDGE FORWARD

(Guest Editorial)
One may wish it were possible, with the stroke of a pen or a flash of insight, to adjust the status of women in society where it falls short.

One may make light of such expressions of womanly aspiration as the new National Women's Political Caucus — as White House insiders reportedly did when that group assembled in Washington for its first meeting recently.

But between hoping that a fairer place of women would of a sudden come about, or hoping under a facade of male chauvinism that the movement will go away or stay around to amuse us, the women's rights movement shows no signs of a great, sudden breakthrough — though it does show signs of steady progress.

Politically. The effect of the National Women's Political Caucus should not be counted out. We doubt whether the caucus's lapses into feminist rhetoric will, on balance, do their cause more good than harm. In its excesses, feminists verbal fury invites male chauvinistic jokes. We doubt too whether such an organization will greatly affect women's voting patterns in America. The women's vote has always split pretty much along the same lines as the men's vote. This is not to suggest that women follow their husband's lead. Far from it. We know many a family where the mates habitually cancel each other's ballots out. But the fact is, on most issues there is no such thing as a male or female side. And thus on most issues, except the feminist one itself, it is hard to see where the caucus can do more than duplicate the work of such groups as the League of Women Voters.

But where candidates are concerned, the caucus's effect may be a different matter. A Shirley Chisholm — astute protectress of the New York black community's rights — or a Betty Furness, who just quit her job as consumer watchdog with the Rockefeller administration, with caucus backing could carry considerable political clout. Miss Furness has been scathing in her complaints about New York's do-nothing or worse state Legislature. The nonpartisan caucus could give her a platform with which to win political office. Indeed, a number of Betty Furnesses are being sought out by the New York - New Jersey - Connecticut wing of the national caucus. And if they can be found, many a contest could be enlivened by a smart woman's getting into it.

Employment. Court rulings (chiefly under the 1964 Civil Rights Act and the 1963 Equal Pay Act) are compelling employers to stop discriminating against women in positions, salary, and such matters as the right to work overtime or hold jobs when having small children. Already this year, the courts have ordered employers to pay \$30 million to women unjustly deprived of earnings in the past. The prospect of having to make massive reparations for unfair job treatment no doubt will prompt more employers to do better in the future — though the inequalities of job opportunities and earnings between men and women seem likely to continue for some time.

Education. We took close note of Harriet Coffin's column on women's new place at Yale, which she wrote for the New York Times. She told how the maleness of Yale strongly affected the new coeds' need for female companionship, how so many men (a five-to-one ratio) and so few women left the girls deafened by all the men's unloading of the "intimate and emotional details" of their lives as they sought out girls as listening posts and surrogate mothers. In other words, women passing the gates into male preserves find risks as well as

opportunities.
No doubt women will continue to complain about their status — whether with the fire and bluster of militant feminists or the cooler insight of a female Yale lecturer — until the social fabric for women takes on a different texture. Again, one would hope this would come about quickly, and that certain unfairnesses to males be included. But it may be enough that it is, surely if slowly, coming about.

Relationships Within the Family
Exodus 20:12;
Ephesians 5:21, through 6:4

Family troubles hurt. If the teaching of the Bible regarding family life would be followed many families would be far happier than they are now. Do you want a blessed home? Make Jesus Christ the Lord of the home.

"I, 'Honour thy father and thy mother' so God says to children. Both parents must be honored in view of their position and character. If obedience is not taught at home, then disobedience eventually becomes habitual and mars all of life. Today some parents obey their children and disregard God's law and usually reap what they have sown.

II. "Be subject to one another out of reverence for Christ." So wrote Paul and then come the words, "Wives, be subject to your husbands as to the Lord"—words some wives dislike. The submission is for the sake of Christ, given not in a slavish, cringing manner, but lovingly as a husband's helpmeet, whose interests she seeks. Every institution needs a head and God ordained that the husband should be the leader and guardian of the home. Usually the autocratic wife is not honored, and her henpecked husband is pitied. It is never a compliment to a wife when it is said of her, "She runs the roost."

The husband must love his wife "even as Christ loved the church and gave himself for it." More is told the husband than the wife. His love must be sacrificial like that of Christ. The husband loves and the wife responds by being submissive. When both wife and husband do what God tells them to do the family will be happy. The reason why divorces abound is due to the fact that God, who ordained the family, is disobeyed. It is good to remember that rules liberate, not enslave. III. "Children, obey your parents in the Lord for this is right." Honoring parents means obeying them. Today discipline is considered old-fashioned by some and society suffers because of it. Many parents, school teachers and administrators ought to study the book of Proverbs and apply its teaching and the results would appear.

Note two things. God made a promise: "That it may be well with thee, and thou mayest live long on the earth." Obedient children avoid many of life's pitfalls. The other is always timely: "Fathers, don't overcorrect your children, or make it difficult to obey the commandments" (N.E.B.). The teaching of this lesson when applied makes for happiness.

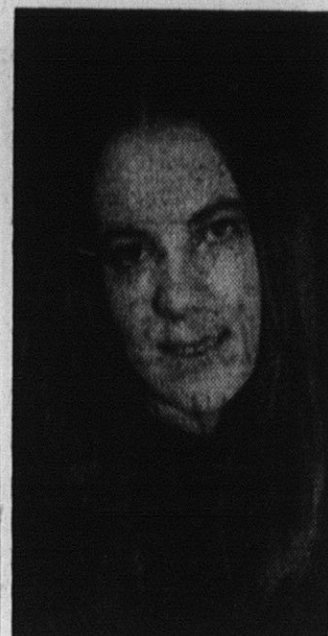

Injured Girl Remains In Illinois Hospital

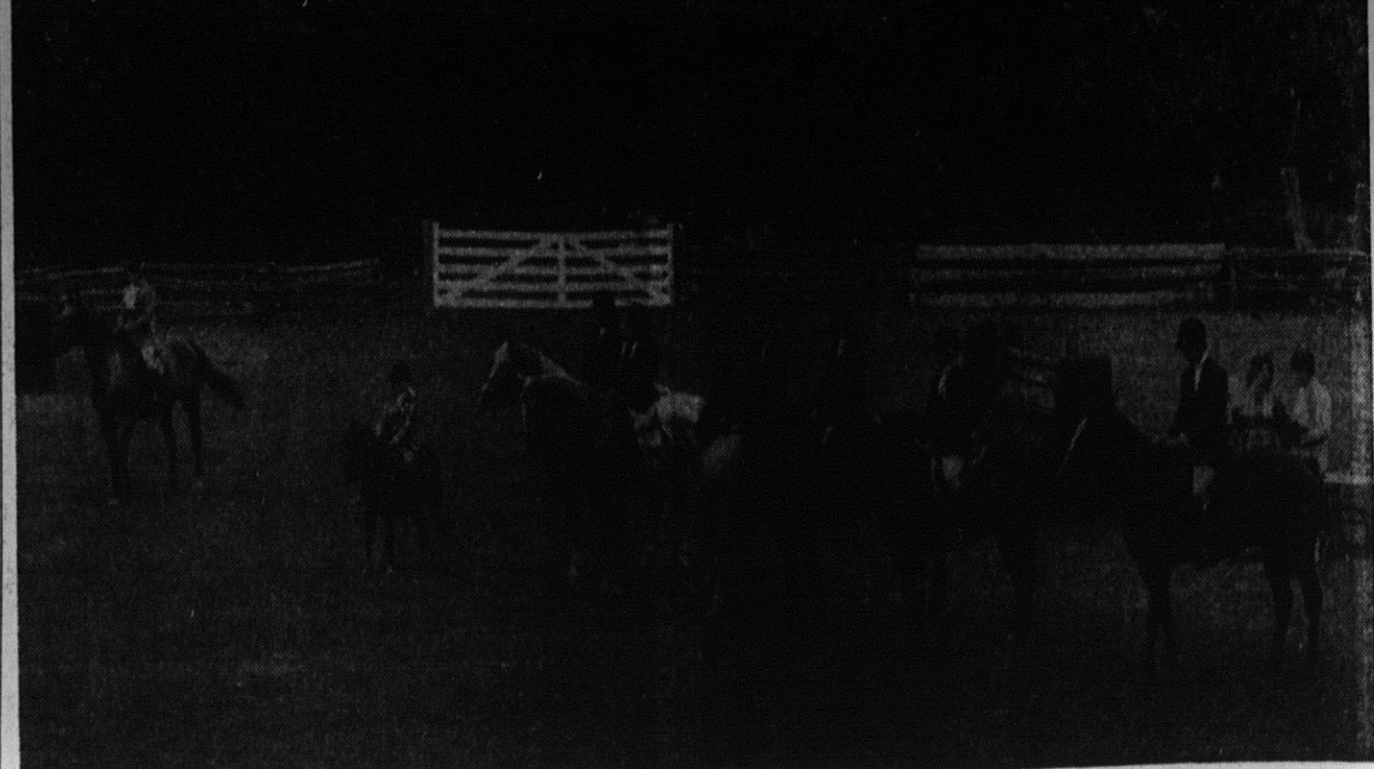

A letter was read from State Rep. Richard J. Allen stating that the Board would be willing to cooperate with the Dept. of Natural Resources in designating a "Michigan by-way"

A letter was read from the Drain Commission stating that the Grand River Watershed Council does not have in full thru June 30, 1972, and this should be considered at the time the budget is prepared.

NEWS RELEASE
On at least two occasions the C.E.D. has caused to be published certain

letters either to the Board of Commissioners or from them in the Grand Haven Tribune.

On one occasion they criticized the county general fund financial statement which among other things showed the county to have \$235,000 balance in the general fund. This is a true and correct statement of the county general fund monies prepared by the Ways and Means Committee of the Board of Commissioners.

The County does have an Improvement Fund which is separate of the General Fund and has a balance of \$265,374.39 as of January 1, 1971. This is the fund that is set aside to be used for building improvement or new county buildings.

The C.E.D. has also publicly noted their displeasure with the County Board of Commissioners for their action in proposing a new building in the City of Holland, to house the District Court.

Under the type of District Court system that Ottawa County is operating, any city within the county of more than 3500 population is entitled to have District Court facilities if they want them.

So it follows that the county must provide District Court facilities in the City of Holland and in the opinion of the majority of the members of the County Board of Commissioners, a new building located adjacent to the new Holland City Police building could best serve the purpose if it is intended to be a District Court building.

The County's books and department's accounts have been audited by the State of Michigan's Auditor General Department each year. The latest complete report available is for the year 1969 and is on file in the County Clerk's office and can be viewed by anyone if they wish to see it. Copies are still available at the Auditor General's office in Lansing and can be secured by writing that office and requesting a copy.

All County Commission meetings are public meetings and anyone can come and sit in on the meeting. Also, in the past the Board members have had good news coverage in the Grand Haven Tribune and the Holland Sentinel papers.

J. Nyhof, Poel, R. V. Terrill, William Robinson, Karl Ball and Bernard J. Schultema have done commendable job of representing the people of the Tri-Cities area. Anyone who feels they need more information about the County Board of Commissioners or their representative on the County Board and I am sure these men will be willing to be as helpful as they can.

Musical numbers which will prove hits included the "Villagers Chant," "After All," by

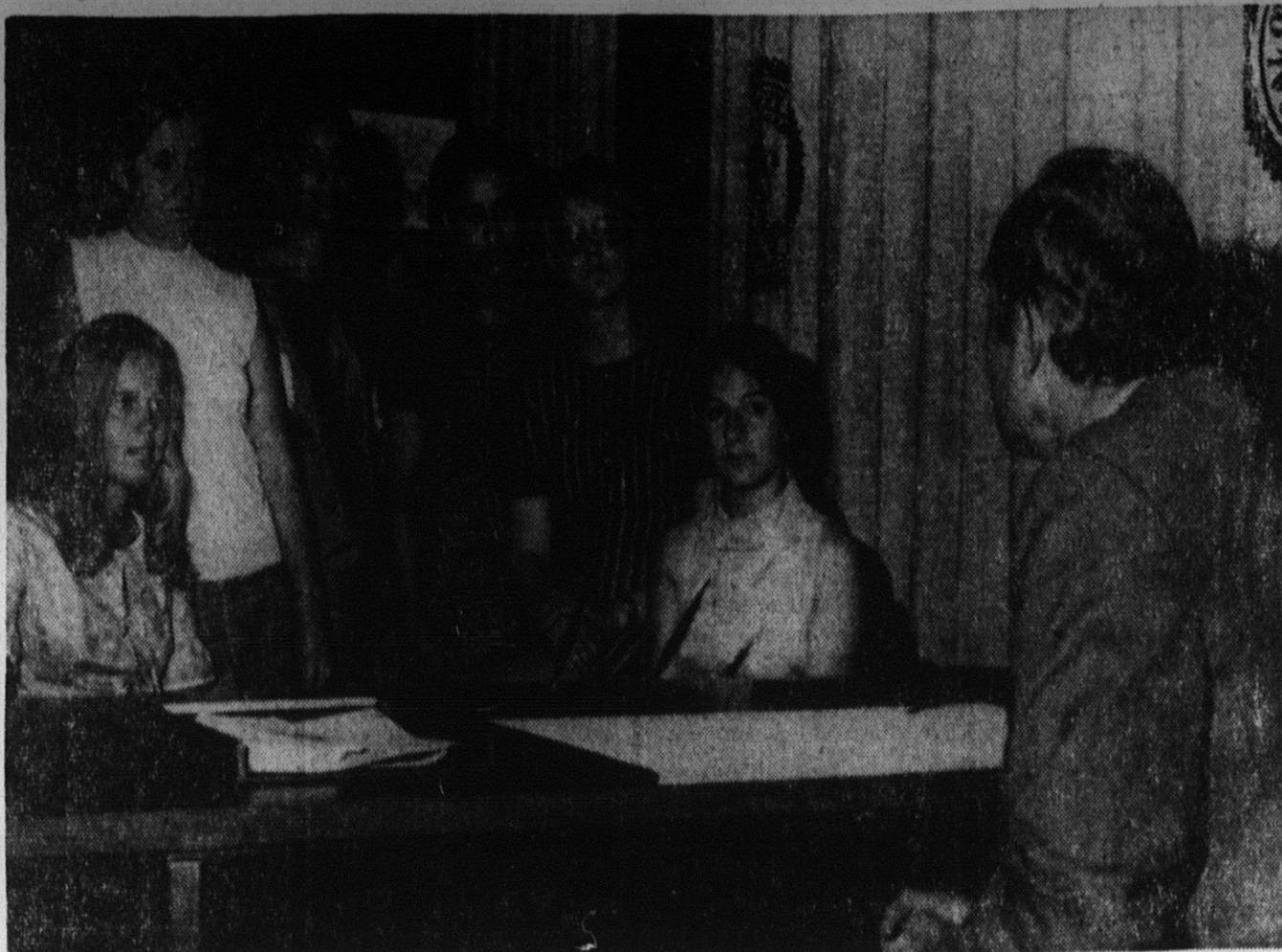
Paul and Jeanne, the "Vamp Dance," "Something Going On," "If I Were You," and "Real Estate."

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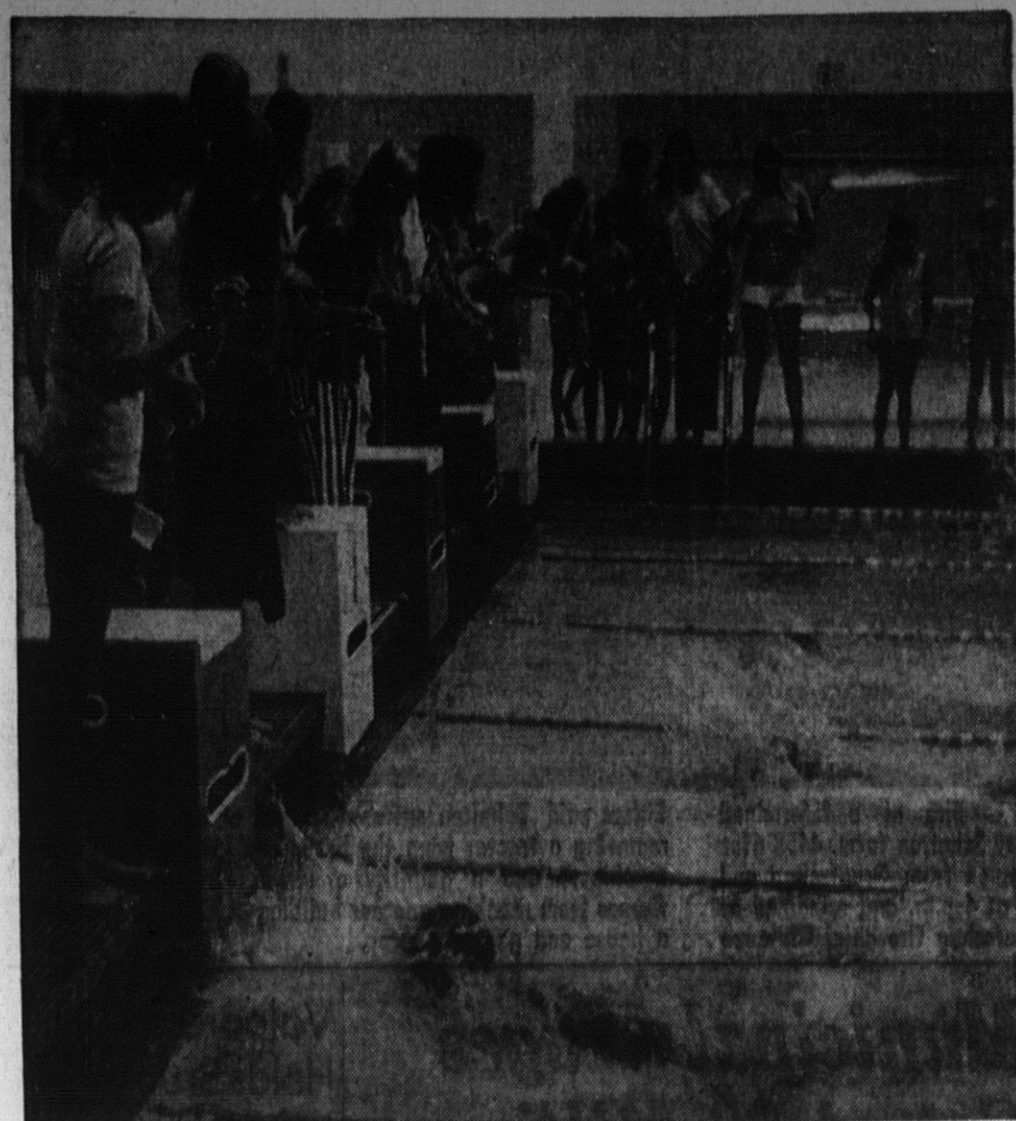

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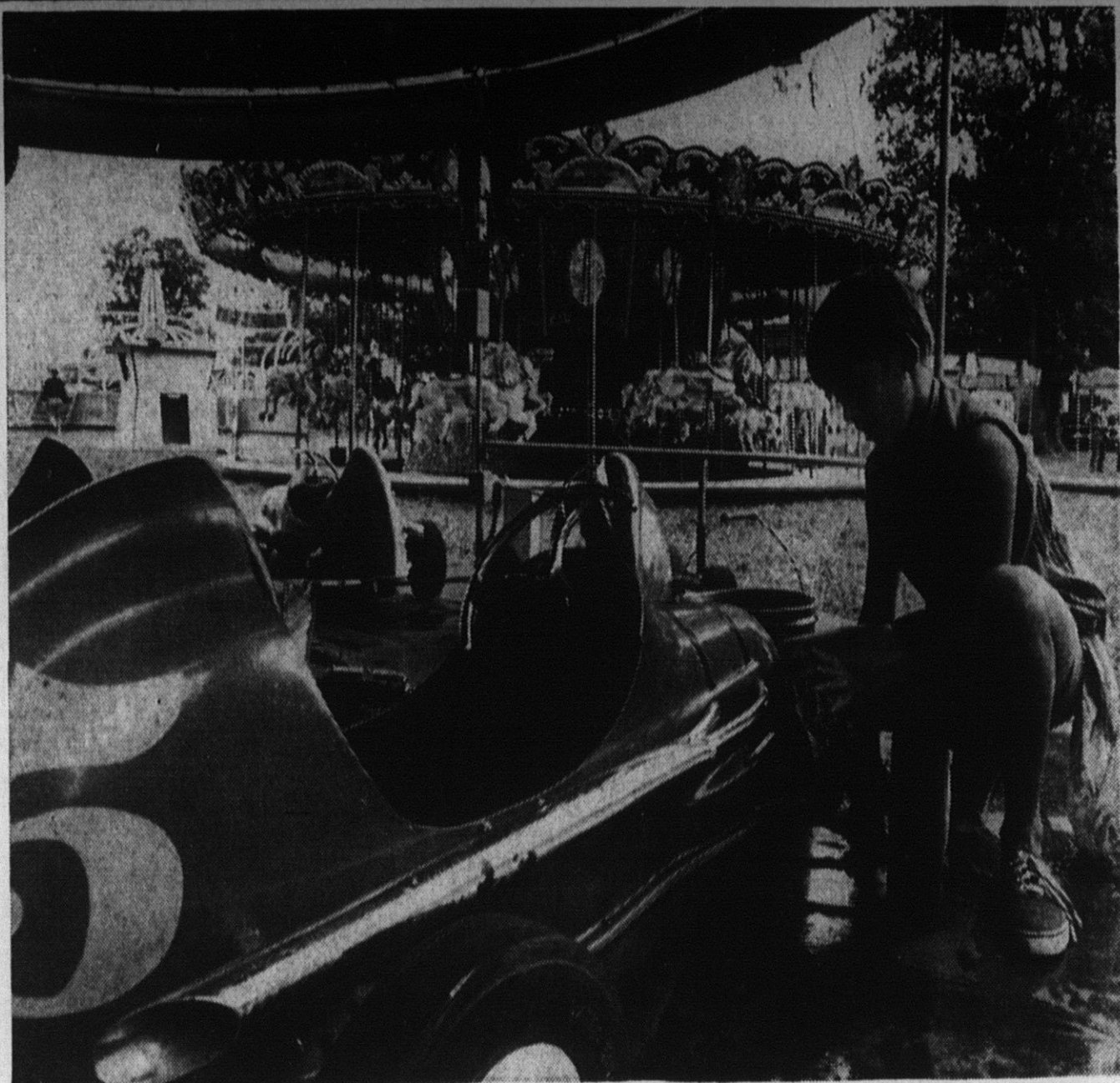

Municipal Wages Set at \$6 Million

Holland's 1971-72 city budget calls for \$5,975,369.87 in salaries to be distributed among its 912 municipal employees listed as of July 1.

Included in the salary figures are pay for full time, part time and seasonal employees as well as overtime, sick pay allowance, holiday pay, vacation pay and other pay.

Largest block of municipal employees is with Holland City Hospital where 501 persons are listed on the payroll with a budgeted amount of \$2,870,059. Next largest employee - area is the general city with 271 persons and a budget for payrolls of \$1,888,816.

The Board of Public Works has 106 employees and a tentative payroll of \$1,047,197. As of July 1 agreement on salary schedules had not been agreed upon.

Herrick Public Library has 34 employees with a budgeted payroll of \$169,297.76.

City Manager William Bopf said a general salary increase of 7 per cent was granted municipal employees while police and fire were given a 10 per cent pay boost.

Bopf said salary schedules were based on an analysis of comparable jobs in area industry plus a cost of living hike and general municipal average pay scales in area communities.

Police and firemen were given a greater salary increase this year because of a small increase granted last year, Bopf said. It brings the wages of a starting patrolman to \$7,966 and a full time beginning firefighter to \$7,592.

Standard salaries in annual equivalents for classified employees in municipal work range from a low of \$3,494 to \$4,264 for ward helpers at the hospital and custodial workers (student help) for public works and utility operations to a high of \$14,664 to \$17,825 for classifications which cover the computer services administrator and the power plant superintendent.

Salaries for city department heads, including the clerk, treasurer, assessor, auditor, environmental health director and manager's assistant range from \$12,064 to a high of \$14,661.

Unclassified positions such as the city manager, superintendent of utilities, assistant superintendent of utilities, hospital director, assistant director of general administration and fiscal services, assistant director of nursing services and library director, range in pay from \$14,300 to a high of \$25,000. The range does not include 1971-72 salaries for BPW which had not reached agreement on salary schedules as of July 1.

Highest paid municipal employee as of July 1 was the hospital director at \$25,000 but settlement with the BPW could push the superintendent's salary higher than that.

Information concerning wages and salaries and other items budgeted for the 1971-72 fiscal year are contained in the published budget which is public information and copies of which can be obtained at the City Clerk's office.
