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## Scholten Heads Area District

GRAND HAVEN — Harvey L. Scholten, longtime member of the Ottawa Area Intermediate Board of Education, was named president at the July meeting of the board.

Robert King of West Ottawa was named vice president; Henry Grit of Hudsonville, treasurer; Charles L. Bradford Jr. of Holland, assistant treasurer, and Robert Troupe, area district superintendent, secretary. The third Thursday of each month was designated as official date for monthly board meetings.

Following a review of a proposed addition to the Trainable Center, the administration was authorized to proceed with plans to add six classrooms, a conference room, additional toilet facilities and additional parking area to present facilities on 96th Ave. just south of M-45.

General fund and special education fund budgets were reviewed in depth and the board set the annual hearing during its monthly meeting Aug. 16, at the trainable center, 10160 96th Ave., at 8 p.m.

The board authorized a .13 mill levy for the general fund, unchanged from last year, and announced that only 1.2 mills of the authorized 1.4 mills will be levied for the special education program. This levy also finances the addition to the trainable center. It will be the second year in a row that 1.2 mills is levied for special education.

A one-year conditional contract with West Ottawa public schools was granted to operate an alternate program for pregnant girls within the Ottawa Area Intermediate School district. This program, available to all local districts, will involve both prenatal and postnatal instruction along with regular classroomwork. The program will be reimbursed by state and intermediate district funds, along with a per capita assessment against each school district for the number of students attending from each respective district.

The resignation of Miss Elizabeth Gersbacher as a Trainable Center teacher was accepted with regret. The board approved hiring Mrs. Phoebe Goven as a language development specialist and occupational therapist for the trainable center at 3-5 time for the 1973-74 school year. The trainable center will open for students Sept. 5 and will end June 6, 1974.

Supt. Troupe was instructed to contact Kent Intermediate for a joint Kent-Ottawa board meeting for hearing two transfer requests from families residing in Coopersville district who wish to transfer their children to the Kenowa Hills district.

A contract with West Ottawa public schools for transportation and hot lunches or Ottawa Area Center students was approved for the coming school year.

## Chickens Create Traffic 'Fowlup'

CHICAGO — A major "fowlup" snarled early morning traffic Friday on two northwest side expressways and a rapid transit line.

A truck trailer carrying 4,000 live chickens from Zeeland, Mich., skidded, overturned and broke up at the junction of the Kennedy and Edens expressways.

Flocks of freed chickens — clucking, fluttering and running — spread across both super-highways and the Chicago Transit Authority's (CTA) rail right-of-way in the median strip of the Kennedy.

Traffic ground to a halt. Motorists caught in the predawn jam got out of their cars and chased chickens. Between 400 and 600 of the fowl were roasted alive when they made contact with the electrified third rail of the CTA line.

## Mares Gets Life Term In Slaying

GRAND HAVEN — Jose Daniel Mares, 18, of 132 West 15th St., Holland, convicted of second degree murder in the Oct. 28, 1972 beating death of Jesse (Tex) Smith, 80, of Holland, was sentenced Monday to life in prison by Ottawa County Circuit Court Judge Wendell A. Miles.

The court recommended that Mares appear before a parole board hearing in seven years. Mares was granted 265 days credit for the time spent in the Ottawa County jail.

Mares was convicted June 7 by a jury following 4½ hours of deliberations. Mares did not take the stand at his trial.

Smith's body was found in a drainage ditch along the Allegan County side of Ottogan St. east of 84th Ave. Authorities said he had been beaten.

Mares and a cousin, Domingo Ramirez Jr., 20, of 1457 Ottawa Beach Rd., were charged in the death. Ramirez pleaded guilty to a charge of larceny from a person and was sentenced to 18 months to ten years in prison.

Ramirez testified at the Mares trial that he was with Mares the night of the slaying but got a ride to a gas station when a car in which he and Mares and Smith were riding went into a ditch. He testified that when he returned with help, the old

## Coast Guard Ends Search for Three Missing Fishermen

GRAND MARAIS — A Coast Guard search for three fishermen missing since Tuesday when their overturned boat was found in Lake Superior has been suspended pending further developments.

The Coast Guard suspended its search Friday at dark. A full six gallon gas can and two seat cushion preservers identified as coming from the boat were recovered from the lake about 6½ miles off the Grand Marais beach and 12 miles east of the harbor.

The overturned boat was found Tuesday evening about 7 miles northeast of the harbor.

Missing are James W. Van Dyke, 32, of Zeeland; Carl Lodenstein, 29, of Forest Grove, and Ronald Poll, 29, of Grandville.

The trio left Grand Marais at about 7 a.m. Tuesday in a 15-foot boat and when they failed to return by afternoon as a storm developed the Coast Guard was notified and a search was launched.


## Local Vandalism Of Mail Boxes Officers Probe

Vandalism to mail boxes the past 10 days in city, suburban and rural areas is being investigated by city police, sheriff's officers and federal inspectors. Postmaster Louis A. Haight said Monday.

As the millionth visitors the family received wooden shoes for each member, dinner at Point West, a copy of the Eel Smakelijk cookbook, and a book on the history of the Island.

The mementoes were presented by Island manager, Jaap de Blecourt, who noted that the family had picked a fine time to visit the Island because the flowers are better than ever. De Blecourt said he expected the flowers to be in great shape for several more weeks.

The 500,000th visitors to Windmill Island passed through the gates on May 31, 1969.




bodices and three-tiered skirts. Each wore flowers in her hair and carried a long-stemmed pink rose.

## Adm. Hadden Ends Navy Commands

BRUNSWICK, Me. — Rear Adm. Mayo A. Hadden Jr., 56, son of Mrs. Marguerite Hadden of Holland, Mich., has relinquished command over Fleet Air Wings Atlantic, Fleet Air Wing Five and Fleet Air Brunswick.

The blue two-star flag of a rear admiral was lowered at ceremonies June 29 to be replaced a few moments later by another just like it, the flag



Rear Adm. Mayo A. Hadden Jr. of Rear Adm. Harold G. Rich, a 47-year-old Maine native who was assuming the three commands.

Hadden, who retired July 1 to his newly purchased home at Harpswell, Me., thanked "those grand and glorious blue-jackets who fly through some of the most horrendous conditions you can imagine" and his officer colleagues who have worked with and for him.

Maine Gov. Kenneth M. Curtis as principal speaker spoke of the rather precipitous closure of military installations in other New England states, hoping that such economic blows can be turned into assets.

A high point of the ceremony was the unexpected awarding of the Legion of Merit to Rear Adm. Hadden by Vice Adm. Frederick H. Michaelis, commander of the Naval Air Forces of the U. S. Atlantic Fleet.

But for some 600 guests present another incident stood out.

Hadden, his voice laden with the timbre of command gained through 32 years in the Navy, "read" his orders to relinquish his commands.

But he never once looked down as he recited the lengthy and precise instructions, couched in formal military language.

Then came his last official order, referring to the white-starred, red-blue banner on the flagpole outside:

"Capt. Hansen, please haul down my flag."

## John, Berend Nyboer Are Reunited

HAMILTON — "We like all the drive-ins you have in this country: drive-in banks, drive-in movies, drive-in restaurants, but we don't have any in The Netherlands," Ria Nyboer said.

She and her parents, Berend and Hendrika, are in this country for a three-week reunion and visit with Mr. Nyboer's brother, John, and his wife, Anna, of 3552 Butler St., Hamilton. The brothers have not seen each other for 25 years.

Ria, a kindergarten teacher in the Netherlands, accompanied her parents to see the United States and act as interpreter for her parents who speak almost no English.

The occasion of the brothers' last meeting was in 1948 when John visited with his brother in The Netherlands.

The Berend Nyboer family live in Vriezenveen, The Netherlands, and flew from Amsterdam to Chicago for the visit.

Both brothers are retired. John, 72, from celery farming and Berend, 70, from repairing organs. Berend decided that he wanted to see his brother, the only one of two brother and two sisters not living in The Netherlands or Germany.

Noting that her parents were fascinated with drug stores (there aren't any in The Netherlands) "Ria also drew contrasts with 'the old country.'" Americans drive everywhere and on wide highways while in The Netherlands people walk much more, she said.

The Nyboers intend to visit Windmill Island and favorably commented on the hospitality they have received from Americans so far. "Everyone here wants to know what life is like in The Netherlands," Ria said, "and it is amazing how quickly the word spread that we are here."

The visiting Nyboers are also impressed with the room around family homes, the spacious yards.

One recent change Ria thought Americans would be interested in is that English is no longer the compulsory language in Dutch schools; it is now optional as are all foreign languages.





A return to the nostalgic past, at least for longtime newspaper people, proved delightful entertainment at Red Barn's opening Monday night of "The Front Page," a zany, rollicking comedy of the foibles of the Roaring Twenties.

Directed by Dorothy Lee Tompkins, wife of Red Barn Producer James Dyas, the large cast of 23 kept its demanding pace throughout, the story line and fact action improving as the play progressed, ending with fights, handcuffs, deals and counter deals and even a reprieve for the condemned man slated to be hanged at 7 a.m. the next day.

All action took place in the press room of the Criminal Courts building in Chicago some 40 years ago. John York who played lead in the musical, "Promises, Promises," the past two weeks, was cast in lead role of Hildy Johnson, ace reporter anxious to leave the rat race to get married, yet unable to resist the latest development in the big story, in this case, an escapee from Death Row who finds asylum in Press Room and is hidden in a rolitop desk to protect the scoop.

Into the scene wanders Hildy's fiancée, a long suffering nice girl who has trouble getting her man to the altar, and her mother, a wonderful role recently played by Helen Hayes on tv who said her husband, Charley MacArthur, based the character after her own mother. Charley was courting Miss Hayes in those halcyon days of the twenties.

While John York adequately held the role of Hildy Johnson, many of the best scenes involved Red Barn regulars. There was Don Bonevich as the hard-bitten managing editor who was Hildy's boss; Bruce Hall as the ael Dominic and James Wilson,

weak-chinned sheriff anxious to corner the sympathy vote in next Tuesday's election; Bill Tost at the finicky milquetoast poet and writer, and Norman E. Anderson as the hard-hitting double-dealing mayor.

Elizabeth Lowry had a wonderful time as the girl's mother, abused by reporters and spilling the beans on a good story. Mary Baird was the comic cleaning lady, Sharon Matia the prostitute with a heart of gold, Linda Robinson the fiancée of Hildy, and Hap Peralta as the gangster added to Bonevich's newspaper staff.

Fast talking newsmen, press cards in their handbags, were played by Don Heuchan, Robert Bugnand, John McMahon, Mich. Others in the cast were Jim White of Holland as a hapless policeman with theories on everything, Rose Pearson as a reporter's wife, Emmet Marlan as the funny man with the reprieve, Michael Salvador in the pivotal role of the escapee, and Peter Mainguy, Dan Parker, Brian O'Sullivan and Paul Tompkins as police officers.

Dyas through the years when urged to produce "The Front Page" always said that this zany comedy is as difficult to stage as a musical. After 17 years "The Front Page" was presented and the difficulties in fast repartee, quick action and devastating one-liners was recognized, and appreciated.

One set was used throughout, a wondrous tacky, littered stage of battered furniture, upright telephones and ancient typewriters, designed by Richard Gunther who also arranged lighting.

Cartoons by Nat Steinberg, international known editorial cartoonist who knew and worked with Ben Hecht and Charles MacArthur 40 years ago, are displayed in the Barn's art gallery.

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
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DEMOLITION DERBY — Spectators filled the grandstand at the Ottawa County Fair Monday night for the demolition

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#### POLITICAL MONEY

If the Watergate episode teaches us anything it is that unlimited amounts of money have a corrupting effect on politics. This is true not only on the national scene but on the state and local scenes as well. If money can influence the outcome of elections and the passage of certain kinds of laws, then the chances of the average citizen of getting a fair political shake are pretty dim.


In Michigan, the laws governing lobbyists' activities and campaign financing are so loose and their enforcement so lax that there may as well be no laws at all, as Attorney General Frank Kelley has commented from time to time. What we need is strict regulation of lobby activities and strict disclosure of sources of political money so that we can be sure which interests are doing what to get certain kinds of legislation. The governor and the Republican legislators have voluntarily disclosed their amounts and sources of political money. Democrats are urged to do likewise. But the better thing might be to have all this regulated so that the voting public knows that influences it is being subjected to. The legislature should address itself to this kind of legislation in the near future so the electorate will have more respect for political operation.



## Convert Old Barn Into Modern Home

A man whose wife describes him as "adept at carpentry" has converted a century old barn near Borculo into a magnificent, year-round, four-level family home.

Mr. and Mrs. Donald Derks constructed the home primarily for a challenge and a change of routine, an option to the urban pace of heavily populated Boca Raton, Fla., where Derks

operates his own excavating business.

Approaching from the north on 104th Ave., the building appears like an unkempt barn while approaching from the south the structure looms as a huge charcoal sided home.

The barn is located on 60 acres formerly owned by Mrs. Derks' grandparents, Geert (George J.) and Julia Wolters. Her grandfather and great-grandfather, John Wolters, built

the barn approximately 98 years ago.

Initial obstacle to renovation was a family of seven raccoons living in the loft who were gently persuaded to leave.

The outside of the barn was replaced with boards and batten and the timbers were sand blasted. The frame and each of the six beams (tree trunks which measure 45 feet long) were all in good condition. The beams were held together with pegs.

With the assistance of professional carpenters, Derks added two living levels to the present two and designed modifications, guided by sug-

gestions from home building magazines.

Through the entire process of remodeling begun early last summer the family lived in a trailer. The Derks have seven children, two living at home, Debi, 15, and David, 11, who helped their parents considerably in the project.

The family has considered a multitude of names for their newly completed home but revert fondly to the first, "barn."

Interior decorator touches include brilliant red shag carpeting in the lofty living room. Strips of carpeting alternate with aged gray barn

boards in the walls. A patchwork quilted throw on the couch and huge terrarium on the floor add even more color to the room.

A swinging sofa suspended with chains screwed firmly into ceiling beams is the fulfillment of one of Mrs. Derks' dreams. Sliding glass doors in the sitting room lead to a sun deck.

Everything possible has been done to preserve the rustic antiquity of the barn's structure and blend it with the interior decorating.

The family will spend the summer months in their home but plan to rent it out during the other seasons. The barn has been doubly insulated and a furnace installed.

Mrs. Derks hopes to find a Franklin stove fireplace soon and plans for next year include landscaping. Presently only one-third of the barn has been used for the home which contains six rooms, a loft, laundry room and bath. Derks is considering expanding into the next bay of the barn next summer.

Their friends who thought they were foolish to try such a project have been astounded at the finished product after seeing it, Mrs. Derks said.
