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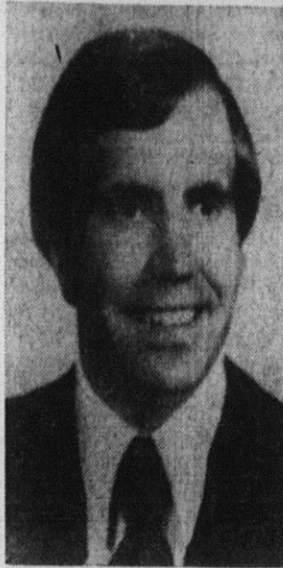
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Assistant Principal Approved

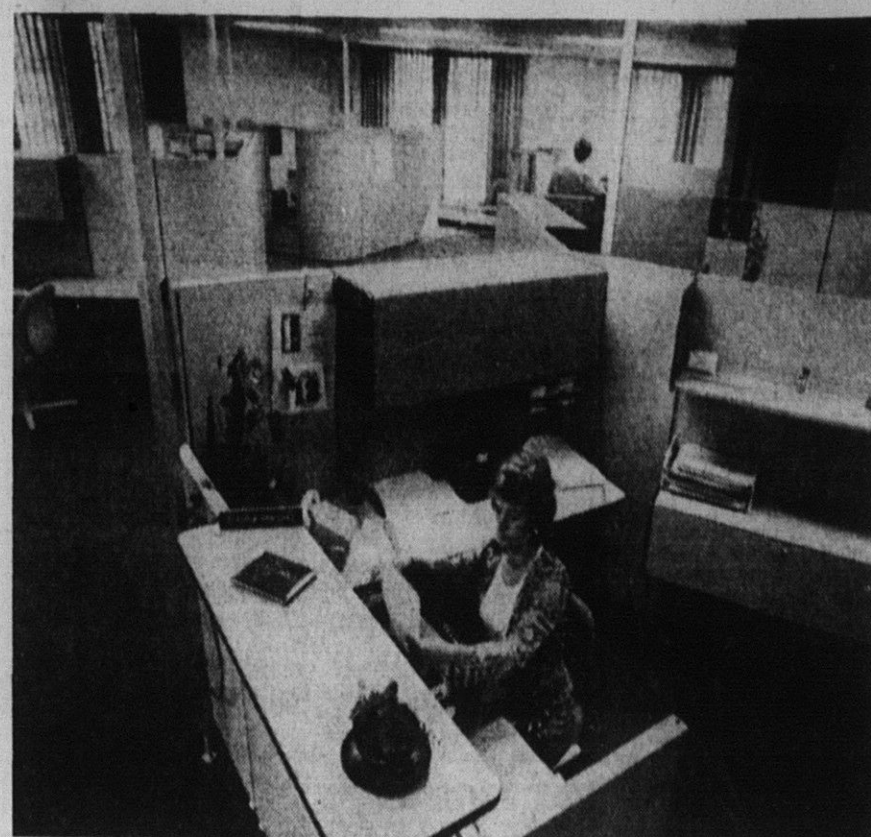
Garbage, Trash Cans Prohibited from Curbs

The storage or placement of refuse and garbage for any period of time in the curbside between the sidewalk and street or along the shoulders of curbside streets is prohibited by city ordinance, the Department of Environmental Health said today.

The restrictions have been part of the ordinance for several years, according to Roger Stroh, director of the department.

Stroh said rates charged by private haulers of garbage and refuse include the cost of backyard pickup and such service is part of the license granted to the hauler.

Dearborn Man Rescued from Lake

Training Plans Are Put to Use

A training exercise turned into the real thing Tuesday as a Coast Guard helicopter and boats from the Holland Coast Guard and Ottawa County sheriff's department took part in a rescue of a bather from a Lake Michigan undertow.

The helicopter from Chicago had been engaged in training exercises with the Coast Guard and sheriff's department personnel when the call was received at 1:59 p.m.

Authorities said Randy Carter, 28, of Dearborn, and some companions were bathing in the rough waters of Lake Michigan a quarter mile south of the Holland channel when Carter became caught in the undertow currents of the six to eight foot waves.

The companions reached shore safely but Carter was pulled into the lake by the currents.

The helicopter had left Park Township airport and was flying over the Coast Guard station for Benton Harbor and Chicago when it was sent to the Lake Michigan site.

The chopper hovered over Carter while a rescue platform was lowered to the water and helicopter crewmen pulled Carter onto the platform and took him to the Coast Guard station where the Ottawa County E unit was waiting.

Gomez Arraigned In Shooting Case

Fidencio Gomez, 66, of 491 Lincoln Ave., was arraigned in Holland District Court Monday on a charge of felonious assault in connection with an alleged shooting incident Saturday.

The court entered a demand for a preliminary hearing for Gomez and he was released on \$2,500 personal recognizance bond.

Holland police said Gomez was arrested after two Grand Rapids men reported they were shot at as they attempted to leave the driveway of the Gomez home in their car. A rear window was shot out but neither occupant of the car was reported injured.

Police said they recovered a .22 caliber rifle and six spent shells with the arrest of Gomez.

Ottawa GOP Convention Set Aug. 11

GRAND HAVEN — The fall convention of Ottawa county Republicans will be held Wednesday, Aug. 11, at 8 p.m. in the county building here. Chairman Eunice K. Bareham announced today.

Purpose of the convention is to elect delegates and alternates to attend the Republican State Convention in Grand Rapids Aug. 27 and 28.

The state convention will nominate candidates for state offices in the November election. These are three Supreme Court justices, two board members each for Wayne State University, Michigan State University and the University of Michigan; two members of the State Board of Education; two Presidential electors-at-large, and confirming the nomination in 19 Congressional district caucuses of 19 Presidential electors.

The truck was driven by James Michael Molyneux, 17.

Injured was Robert Michael Grecco, 3, a passenger in the car driven by Angelella Grecco, 26, of Johnston, Iowa. Ottawa County deputies said the Grecco car was southbound on Division while the other car, driven by Janice De Leeuw, 17, of 25 South Shore Dr., was eastbound on Lakewood.

President Reelected At Hospital

Peter J. Vanden Bosch was reelected president of the Hospital Board at its monthly meeting Tuesday afternoon. Kenneth Zuverink was reelected vice president.

In reviewing matters in association with the public vote Aug. 3 for establishing a Hospital Authority for the local area, Vanden Bosch called attention to information brochures which will be mailed shortly and asked all voters to become fully aware of the authority proposal. A discussion revealed that the board was in enthusiastic support of the concept. The vote will be in Holland city and the townships of Park, Holland, Fillmore and Laketown.

It was noted that two board members, Dr. S. Walter Kuipers and Kenneth Zuverink, have been reappointed to the board for five-year terms by Mayor Lou Hallacy. Dr. Dirk Scholten was granted active privileges in psychiatry.

Gifts of an ICU isolette from the Christian Reformed Church Guild and \$1,000 from the Ottawa County March of Dimes for pediatrics equipment were acknowledged with thanks.

The board reviewed Appeal Board action on expanded parking at the hospital and tentatively approved some equipment for the proposed lot, subject to favorable Appeal Board action. A variance on height of the proposed addition also will be sought. A house at 185 West 25th St. was declared surplus.

The board approved rental of IBM equipment. Purchase of EKG equipment was approved from accumulated funds in the gifts and bequests fund, amounting to approximately \$19,000. Also approved was an agreement with Touche-Ross & Co. for a preliminary financial feasibility study in connection with bonding for the new addition.

The board reaffirmed the "open door" policy that no person is denied admission or treatment because of financial reasons.

Attention was called to an article in the Grand Rapids Press on a new \$28 million addition to Butterworth Hospital results in a reduction of total beds from 554 to 527. This proposed building is in addition to a recently completed multimillion dollar addition.

Theater Hats Missing
A straw hat, valued at \$45, and a styrofoam hat, valued at \$7 were reported missing from the Hope College Theater Department Monday at 8:20 p.m. Police said juveniles were believed involved.

Reaction By Chlorine Burns Two

Chlorine crystals being mixed with water for use in a swimming pool erupted and spilled a chlorine solution over a Holland woman who was mixing the substance in the kitchen of her home Thursday evening.

Admitted to Holland Hospital with burns of the face was Helen Zachary of 557 West 23rd St. She was listed in "good" condition.

Holland firemen said the cause of the reaction was not determined but suspected a "foreign" substance must have entered the container in which the mixing was being done.

Fire inspectors said Mrs. Zachary was mixing the crystals in the plastic container in which the crystals were kept and she was using a metal wire whip. The reaction scattered the solution onto Mrs. Zachary and the walls and floors of the kitchen.

Her 12-year-old daughter, Tina, also in the kitchen, suffered minor chemical burns.

A neighbor flushed the solution from Mrs. Zachary with a garden hose and the woman was taken to the hospital.

Firemen used fans to remove chlorine fumes from the home.

Board Hears Reports On Junior High

Several reports on the proposed new Junior High School occupied the Holland Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday.

David Lightfoot, new school principal succeeding John Noe, described the staff involvement, particularly in priority studies leading to studies on goals, space and other ideas, in association with Architects Vander Meiden and Koteles, mainly Mike Koteles.

Business Manager Lee Van Aelst described the interplay of ideas by staff, architects, along with studies of costs and long-range maintenance. He said interim floor plans are almost complete and said work was being done on utility easements. He spoke of special studies on hard surface floors.

The board accepted high bid of \$6,105 from Hazen Van Kampen for the sale of a lot 122 by 120 feet on the west side of Washington Ave. between 24th and 26th St.

The board adopted a 14-page resolution in connection with the \$4.7 million bonding program for financing the new Junior High School as approved by district voters in June.

Board approval was given an assistant bookkeeper position for the coming year financed through CETA funds. It is known as a temporary fulltime position.

Russ Freers, president of the Holland Education Association, commented that little progress has been made thus far in negotiations for a contract with teachers and expressed the hope that greater progress would be made in the coming month.

Vice President Robert Gossele presided in the absence of President Charles Bradford. All other members were present. Carroll Norlin gave the invocation. The meeting lasted some 90 minutes.

Holland Man Gets Prison Sentence For Drug Charge

GRAND HAVEN — Rudy Guzman, 30, of 215½ East Eighth St. Holland was sentenced to three to five years in prison by Judge James E. Townsend in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday for delivery of heroin.

Guzman, who was arrested with Eddie Jasso, 25, of Holland, was given credit for 124 days served in jail. Jasso was sentenced to prison June 14 and was charged with five counts of delivery of heroin. The arrests climaxed a six-month investigation, according to Holland police.

Steven Deurlo 22, of Hudsonville, was sentenced to the Muskegon training unit for 32 months for attempted breaking and entering.

Randall Howard, 19, of 37 West Lakewood Blvd., Holland, charged with an attempt to receive stolen property, was placed on delayed sentence status for one year and ordered to pay \$50 in costs.

Ricky Connor, 18, of 9520 Crescent Dr., Zeeland, charged with burning personal property, pleaded guilty and is to return August 23 for sentencing.

At Transportation Meeting

Urge Interchange At Lakewood Blvd.

Suggestions for an interchange at US-31 and Lakewood Blvd. and changes in the concept of one-way traffic on Pine and River Aves. were heard at public meetings Tuesday on business routes in Holland.

More than 40 persons attended the meetings in City Council chambers in City Hall conducted by the State Transportation Department as part of a program to update business traffic routes through Holland.

Highway planners said restrictions by environmentalists on one-way business routes could end planning for Pine and River Ave. one-way routes through the city. Meeting the restrictions could force the purchase of additional property since the streets are only one block apart.

Pine and River had been suggested one-way as far south as Michigan Ave.

Planners said traffic volumes on Michigan Ave. and State St. during peak hours were at capacity and the traffic volume by 1995 was expected to double.

Alternatives suggested expansion of the present business route system or ways to relieve the congestion during peak traffic hours.

One concept that drew favor was an interchange at US-31 and Lakewood Blvd. The Ottawa County Road Commission said it was planning to widen Lakewood Blvd. east of the US-31 overpass but the bridge itself prevents widening of the road.

Highway planners said expansion of the bridge is in the design process but it was not known whether to widen the

bridge to four or five lanes. Construction of a modified interchange and expansion of the bridge was estimated at \$2½ million. Traffic using the proposed interchange would generally be heading for the industrial park on Holland's south side and would eliminate some traffic through the city, planners said.

Budget Cuts Explained At West Ottawa

Curtailment of approximately \$190,000 of programs in the West Ottawa district was reaffirmed by the Board of Education Monday night.

Recommendations by the administration for specific cuts in the programs was not formally acted upon by the board pending outcome of the state aid.

Supt. Brad Henson reiterated that a budget is merely a guideline and specifics may be changed as the need arises. But he urged the board to approve the general reductions so the administration could contact personnel who may be affected.

Specifically the curtailments include \$28,595 from the elementary, \$33,163 from the Middle School, \$49,109 from the high school, \$3,800 from horticulture, \$1,000 from administration, \$34,267 from operation and maintenance, \$8,616 from small buses and \$56,465 from capital outlay for a total of \$190,623.

The proposal also included necessary additional funds of \$231 for special education, \$1,800 for auto mechanics, \$7,857 for alternative education, \$150 for vehicles, \$3,424 for regular buses, \$10,930 for fixed charges.

Of the specific proposals for cuts presented to the board a suggestion for reducing planetarium operation by 5/6 for a savings of \$13,470 was the most controversial.

The board will discuss specifics in the cuts at a future workshop meeting.

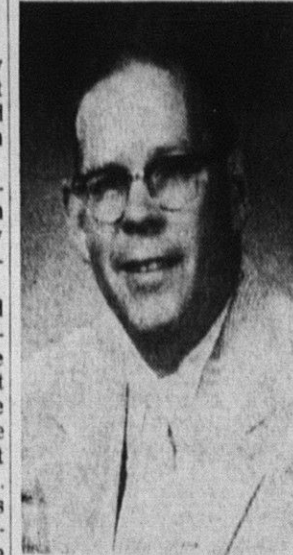

The West Ottawa Board of Education Monday approved the appointment of Martin Ball, 48, former principal of Garber High School in Essexville, as new principal of West Ottawa High School.

Prior to the three years he served as Garber High School Principal, Ball was assistant principal at Greenville High School.

Ball completed his masters degree from Western Michigan University and is doing his

He has worked with foreign exchange students and directed activities for American students in Europe in the Youth for Understanding program.

Ball, who is married with three children, will assume his new post during the first week of August.

Douglas Murdoch, current principal at West Ottawa High School, had earlier requested re-assignment to a teaching post. Supt. Bradley Henson indicated that an appropriate position, although not as yet determined, has been secured for Murdoch.

Henson also stated that Ball was chosen from approximately 100 applicants for the position.

The Board approved the three year contract for Ball with a starting salary of \$25,664.

Hours Set For Tall Ship Visit

GRAND HAVEN — The Norwegian tall ship "Christian Radich" will visit Grand Haven harbor for six hours August 5 but no public tours are expected, it was announced by Mayor John Walhout.

The ship is to arrive at 3 p.m. and leave at 9 p.m.

The Radich, one of 200 tall ships taking part in a bicentennial salute to the United States July 4 in New York harbor, will be sailing from Chicago to Duluth on the Grand Haven stop.

A small reception will be held on board the ship for invited persons and 70 of the ship's 88 cadets will come ashore and tour the community.

'Arsenic' Proves Good Fun, Plenty of Laughs

Everybody had a lovely time at the opening of "Arsenic and Old Lace" at De Witt Cultural Center on Hope College campus Friday night.

The enduring Joseph Kesselring mystery spoof proved an inspired choice for the second production of the Hope Summer Repertory Theatre, providing an evening of laughs and general all-around good fun.

And honors were quite evenly divided among cast members, although Peter J. Saputo, here for his second season, proved anew he could steal any scene he chose. Of course, his role was a real plum as Teddy Brewster playing President Teddy Roosevelt, wearing pith helmets and jungle clothes while digging the Panama locks in the cellar. His trumpet playing was atrocious, but that added to the fun, and his charges up stairs (up San Juan Hill) enhanced an already active situation.

It was a real change of pace for Kenneth Kantor, the outstanding Teyve of "Fiddler on the Roof" which opened the repertory season July 9. Kantor played the horrid Jonathan Brewster whose face resembled Boris Karloff. This already tall actor wore elevator shoes which made him tower over everybody, especially his two sweetie-pie aunts, and an assortment of small sized policemen.

So well knit was the production directed by Mark Williams, who holds an MFA degree in directing from the University of New Orleans, that it was difficult to sort out "leading" characters. Rebecca Guy and Amy Mills were outstanding as the "innocent" Victorian spinsters who discovered that a bit of arsenic in elderberry wine helped send lonely persons on their way.

Morgan Williams made a convincing Mortimer Brewster, the one Brewster who was not wacky but rather an acclaimed drama critic, a role played in the film by Cary Grant, and Brenda Hubbard, who played one of Teyve's daughters in "Fiddler" was a charming Elaine Harper, played by Priscilla Lane in the movie.

Playing a minute Dr. Einstein to the gargantuan Jonathan was Andrew P. Glant, practically the spitting image

of Peter Lorre in the film. Deserving a well-earned bow of its own was the stage setting of the Victorian home in Brooklyn, designed by Richard Smith, with lots of antiques and other props collected by Dick Block. Costumes (no small deal in view of period pieces for the aunts) were by Carol Yeckel and lighting (eerie and otherwise) by Mike Rice.

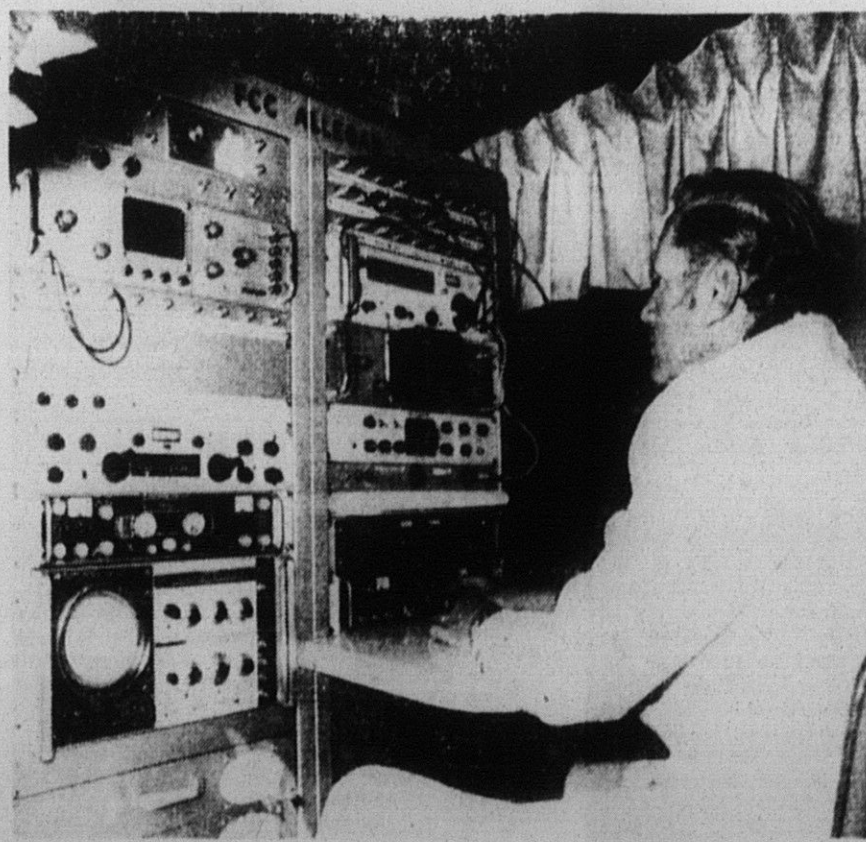

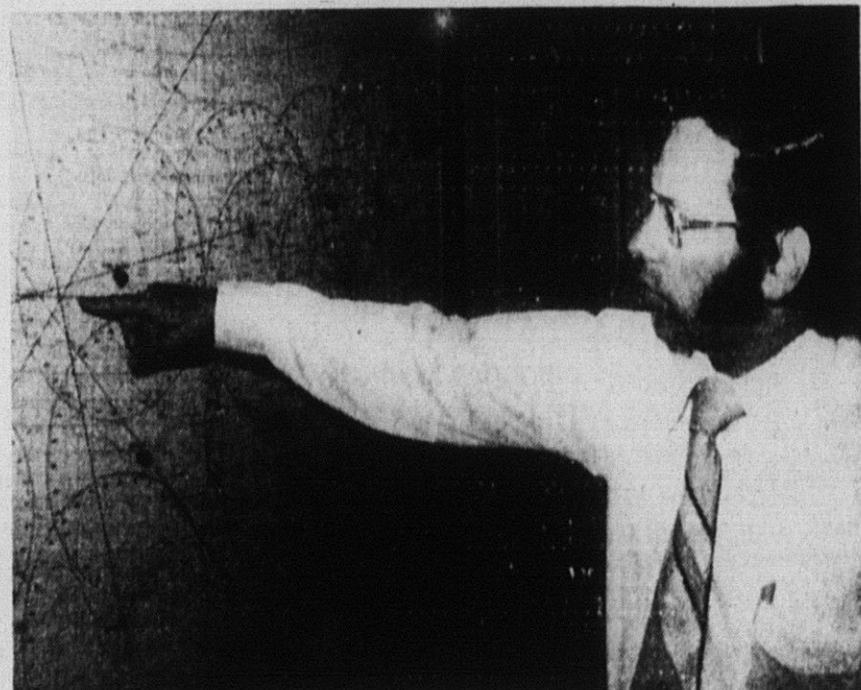

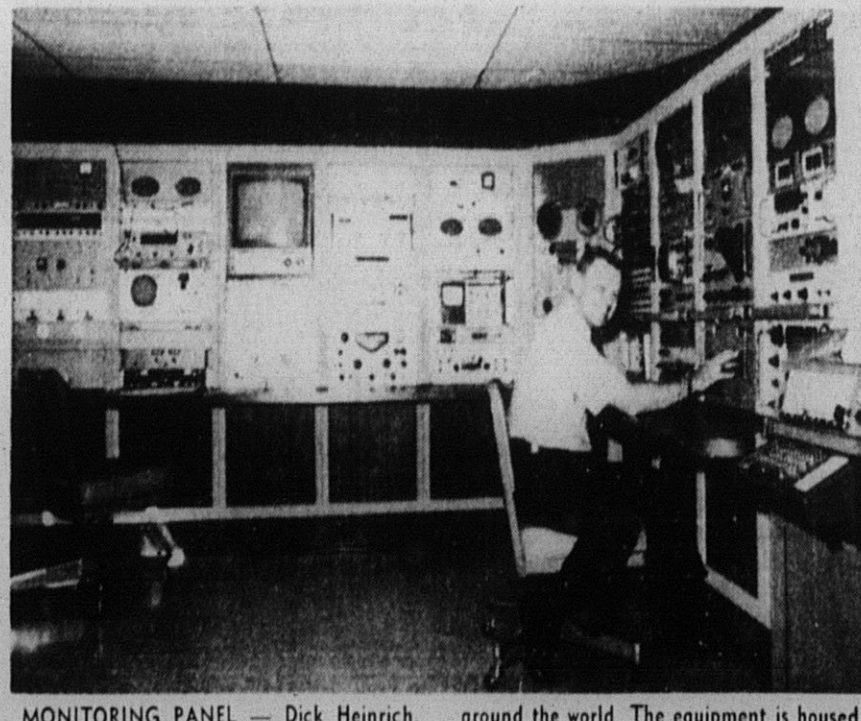
MOBILE UNIT — Arnold Piirtola, electronics technician at the FCC's monitoring outpost near Allegan operates the equip-

ment in the \$200,000 mobile monitoring unit used by the FCC to cover a five state area. (Sentinel photo)



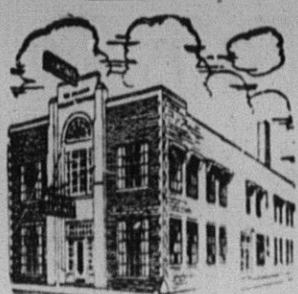

Apparently anything can happen. Which of those children from Chowchilla, Calif., even the most imaginative of them, would have thought of the strange and bizarre events of which they were a reluctant part. Who would have dreamt that three people could collectively be so insane as to abduct a whole busload of children.

One can imagine a single demented person getting himself involved in such an insane affair, but it is almost unbelievable that three people discussing such a plan could convince themselves to go through with it. And who would have dreamt of being held prisoner in a buried van and of having to dig one's way up to safety. It goes almost beyond belief. It is a bizarre story.

But where there is unexpected strangeness there is also unexpected heroism. Frank Ray, Jr., the driver of the bus and the rescuer of the children is one of those typical folk heroes that show up in a pinch from among the common people. Sturdy, inventive, good-hearted, he was the one who could be depended upon to do the work and the comforting when the chips were down.

It is unbelievable what kind of bizarre people put themselves out to make life troublesome for others, but it is also unbelievable how the rescuing hero naturally arises to do his job. He puts the world back together when the kooks have smashed it to pieces. He maintains the balance between the evil and the good.

Brenda Tsavatewa's favorite hobby tells about her life and her life flashes before her as rings on her fingers.

Brenda is traveling with her family, Hopi Indians, as they visit county and state fairs across the country. Until last year the family lived on the Hopi reservation in Moencopie, Ariz. where Brenda, 12, went to school.

Brenda said she is in the seventh, ninth and 12th grades according to the correspondence school she uses to keep up with her studies.

Brenda makes jewelry out of beads and learned the work from her parents, both talented jewelry craftsmen. The family was encouraged by friends to travel the circuit of art shows and fairs selling their unique silver jewelry.

The family is to appear at the Ottawa County Fair which opens July 26 at the fairgrounds.

Brenda's mother is a full blood Hopi from Arizona and her father is a Chippewa from the Midwest.

Jewelry made by the family includes rings and necklaces of silver using turquoise and

other semi-precious stones. Rings appear the favorite jewelry worn by Brenda and her mother.

On her right hand, Brenda wears four rings, each symbolizing something about her personality and life.

On the small finger she wears a small silver and turquoise ring indicating she is a young girl; the next ring indicates she will be a young woman soon; the third ring shows she is not married and her index finger ring says she wants to marry a tall man.

Her mother's jewelry indicates only she is wise, married and has chosen a tall man as her husband.

The Hopi Indians still live in the area in which their forefathers lived and hunted and are ruled by the chief of the tribe.

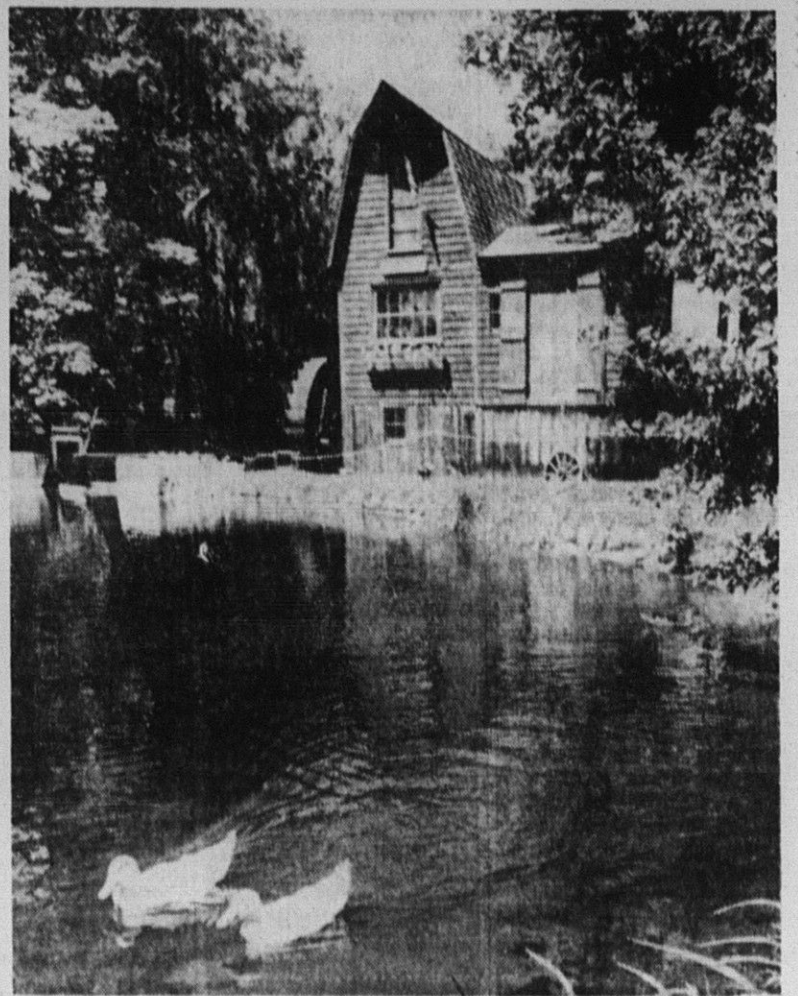

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New Music Teacher Is Hired

The appointment of a new Middle School music teacher was approved by the West Ottawa Board of Education which met in regular session Monday.

Gary Rizner, a first year teacher and recent graduate of Northern Michigan University, will work primarily in string music. He replaces Fred Reiert who retired in January, 1976.

In other business Gordon Scheerhorn, business manager, was given approval to secure bids on the high school drain field.

The board also approved re-negotiating a contract for payroll of the district with First Michigan Bank and Trust Co.

Supt. Brad Henson reported on transportation of students outside the district and told the board that a total of 68 students were transported outside the district in 1975-76 for a transportation cost of \$22,846. Of this figure, Henson said, only \$1,660 was not directly reimbursable and was of cost to the district.

The distribution included several students to Holland High School for shared time programs and to the city of Holland for cosmetology; six students to Grand Haven for advanced auto; two students to agricultural courses in Fennville; one student with special needs to Hamilton; students to physical and hearing impaired classes in Holland; 16 to the Ottawa Area Center.

Peter Roon stated that the district was granted provisional approval of Title I by Division of Child Care Center Licensing but indicated that the district may be required to purchase 60 cots for the program next year.

Roon also stated that ten of the 11 districts in the Ottawa Area Intermediate District enrolled students in the Ventura

project, an alternative education program.

The program, while serving 58 students during the concluding school year, usually has 35 students at any one time.

Roon also reported on a study by Tom Updegraff, assistant high school principal, that revealed an improvement in tardies, absents without excuses and suspensions but which indicated that vandalism is still a problem in West Ottawa as well as other districts.

The Updegraff report indicated that there was a decline in the dropout rate from 6.4 a few years ago to 4.6 last year, which is below state average.

Henson discussed the recently passed state aid bill which will be identical to the March estimate of state aid. Henson explained that Gov. Milliken is expected to line veto some of the programs but initial reports suggest that none of the expected vetoes would influence the programs of the West Ottawa district.

The next regular meeting will be held Aug. 16 in Beechwood School.

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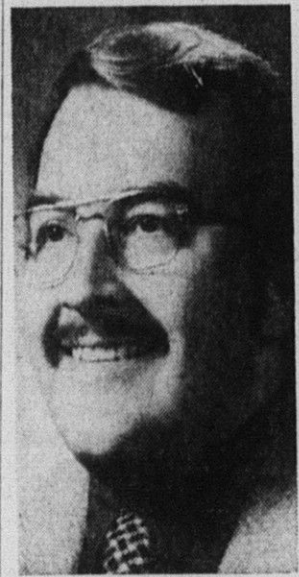
