Zeeland Family Enjoys First Reunion Since '43

ZEELAND (Special) — A dinner, prepared by "mom," was the highlight of a brief reunion for the five children of Mr. and Mrs. Adrian De Pree, 143 South Centennial St. Sunday.

And well it should have been for it marked the first time since 1943 that the five De Pree children had been together with their parents around the family table.

Although the "food tasted as good as it always does when mom fixes it," the five agreed, the 1957 dinner took on quite a different appearance from the last, one 14 years ago. All of the five children are married and two of the boys have children.

The Sunday meeting was quite a milestone, too, because plans call for more traveling and it may be quite awhile before the family gets together again.

Willard, the second oldest son, will be the first to leave the United States. He is headed for a vice counsel's post in Cairo, Egypt along with his Swedish wife, whom he met while in the Army stationed in Europe, and five-month old daughter and will leave Aug. 9. They will be in Egypt two or three years.

Lila, the only daughter, returned to Columbus, Ohio, Sunday with her husband, Dr. Kenneth McCormack. He plans additional medical study in Sweden and Scotland and they will be leaving in the near future. When they return, the couple plan to settle in Seattle, Wash.

Glenn, the youngest son, is presently serving in the Army at Fort Rucker, Ala., and has one year of duty remaining.

The Rev. Gordon returned early in June from a two-year tour of Army duty, 16 months of which were spent in Korea as a chaplain, and is planning to enter religious work.

Bruce, who started the exodus in 1943 when he left for Germany as a soldier in World War II, is secretary-treasurer of the Colonial Manufacturing Co., in Zeeland. He plans to bring up his two daughters in Zeeland. Bruce is a Northwestern University graduate.

Lila was next to leave, taking up nurse's training at Presbyterian Hospital in Chicago. She later took a position in California.

Bill followed and in preparing for his diplomatic career his studies took him to the University of Wales. He is a Harvard College graduate. Gordon and Glenn both are Hope College graduates with Gordon attending Western Theological Seminary. Both entered the armed forces following the completion of their schooling.

Coast Guard Will Hold Festival in Grand Haven

Treasury Department, Governor, Admirals to Attend 3-Day Event

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — A number of dignitaries have announced their intentions to attend the Coast Guard Festival to be held in Grand Haven August 2-4. The United States Treasury Department, under which the Coast Guard operates, is to be represented for the first time.

David W. Kendall, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury has accepted Mayor William Creason's invitation and is expected to arrive Friday afternoon with Senator Charles Potter and Representative Gerald R. Ford. These men will attend the functions and affairs through Saturday afternoon.

Vice Admiral A.C. Richmond, commandant of the 9th District at Cleveland, will be represented by Rear Admiral and Mrs. K. K. Cowart. Also arriving on Friday will be Captain Quentin Greeley from Chicago and Captain and Mrs. D. O. Reed of Washington. On Saturday Rear Admiral and Mrs. E.H. Thiel and their daughter Viveke will arrive. Rear Admiral Thiel is the new commander of the 9th Coast Guard District at Cleveland.

Governor G. Mennen Williams, State Senator Clyde H. Geerlings and Speaker of the House George M. Van Peltsem will be present for the parade Saturday.

The U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Mackinaw will arrive Thursday morning and remain in Grand Haven until Monday morning. Both the Mackinaw and the Woodbine will be open on Friday and Saturday for public inspection.

Festivities will begin at 9:45 a.m. on Friday, August 2 with the inspection of Coast Guard facilities. At 11:30 a.m. the City of Grand Haven will entertain with a reception and official luncheon at the Hotel Schuler. Mayor William Creason will preside at the two functions.

At 2 p.m. on Friday two separate events will take place. A baseball game between the crews of the Woodbine and the Mackinaw will be played at 7th Street ball field, while the officials of the Grand Haven Police Department and Sheriff's Departments will hold their Pistol Match. Members of Muskegon, Grand Rapids, Holland and surrounding areas will compete.

The Community Dinner at the Spring Lake Country Club at 6:30 p.m. will have an outstanding program. George Jason, receiver of the PAPA award will entertain the public. The final event for Friday will be the Street Dance at 9 p.m. to be held at the Barn.

The two outstanding events of the second day of festivities will be the parade at 4:30 p.m. and the fireworks display from Dewey Hill at 9 p.m.

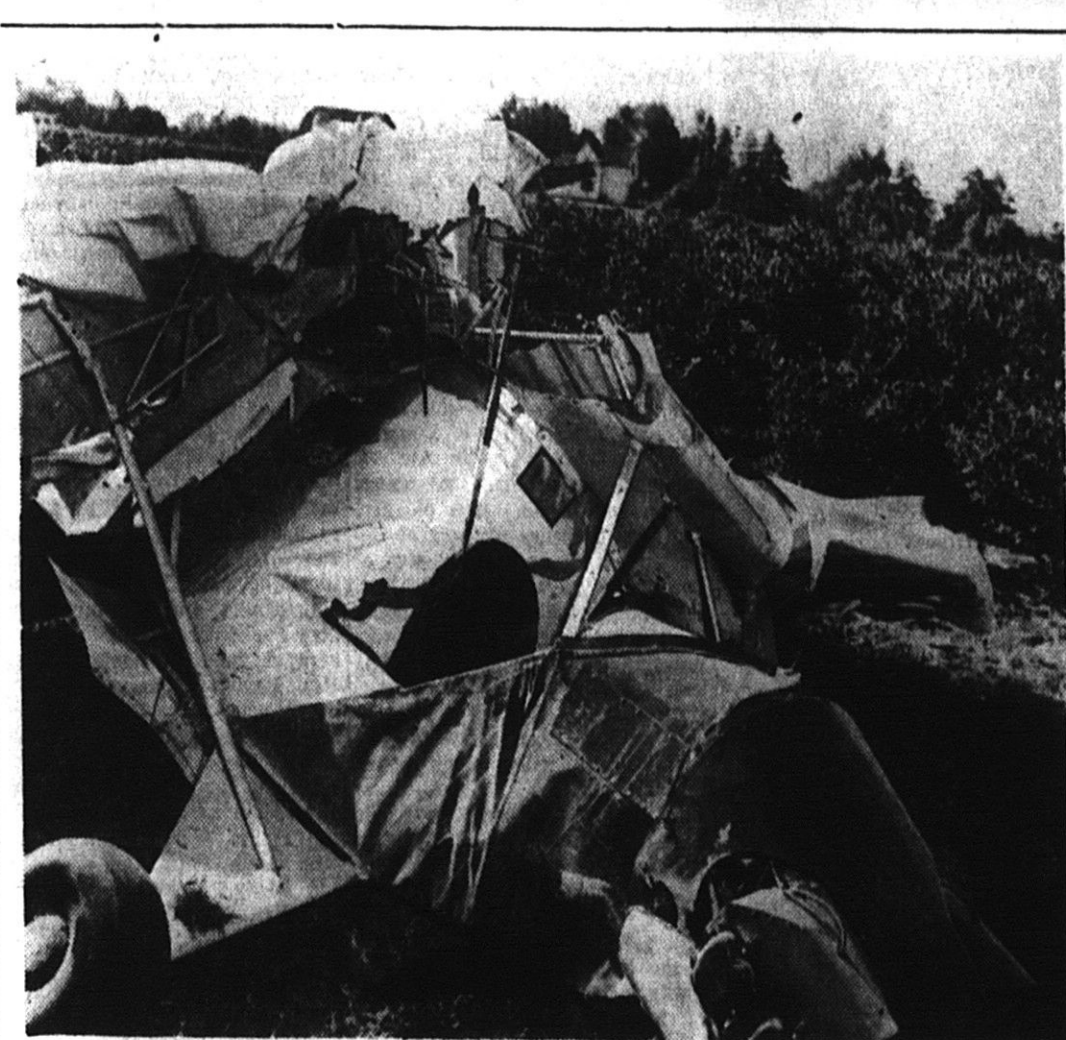

Pilot Escapes Death As Plane Crashes

Jess Keesling Receives Possible Fractured Leg

Crop Dusting Plane's Wing Hits High Tension Wire As Motor Fails

A crop dusting pilot escaped serious injury at 8:30 a.m. today when his light plane crashed a quarter of a mile north of the Harlem Church on 144th Ave.

Jess Keesling, 35, route 1, Dowling, was in "good" condition at Holland Hospital with a possible fractured left leg, cuts and bruises. He was to undergo x-rays later this afternoon.

Ottawa County deputies said that the motor on Keesling's plane failed as he swept low over a blueberry farm owned by Floyd Lowe of Wayland.

Keesling attempted to clear a high tension line as he glided down. When he saw this was impossible he tried to go under it. The right wing tip of the plane clipped the line.

He crashed into a stack of blueberry boxes demolishing his single engine Piper Cub J-3.

The plane was owned by Bob Mueller of Bangor. It was one of three planes dusting blueberries in the Harlem area.

Keesling had taken off from the Park Township airport shortly before the crash. Deputies said the plane's motor failed as he made his initial sweep over the Lowe farm to inspect the fields he was about to dust.

Library Displays Butterfly Bush

Shrub of the week at the Holland Public Library is the Butterfly Bush or Buddleia Davidi. Also on display this week is Summersweet or Clethra Ailnolia.

The butterfly bush is one of the most colorful of the comparatively few August blooming shrubs. There are varieties in pink, red, lavender, purple and white.

The bush normally dies down in the winter but since it blooms on the new growth this is not harmful. Throwing some dirt over the base of the plants in winter as is done with roses, then trimming them back to the level of this hill of soil when removing it in the spring will insure a good full bush each year.

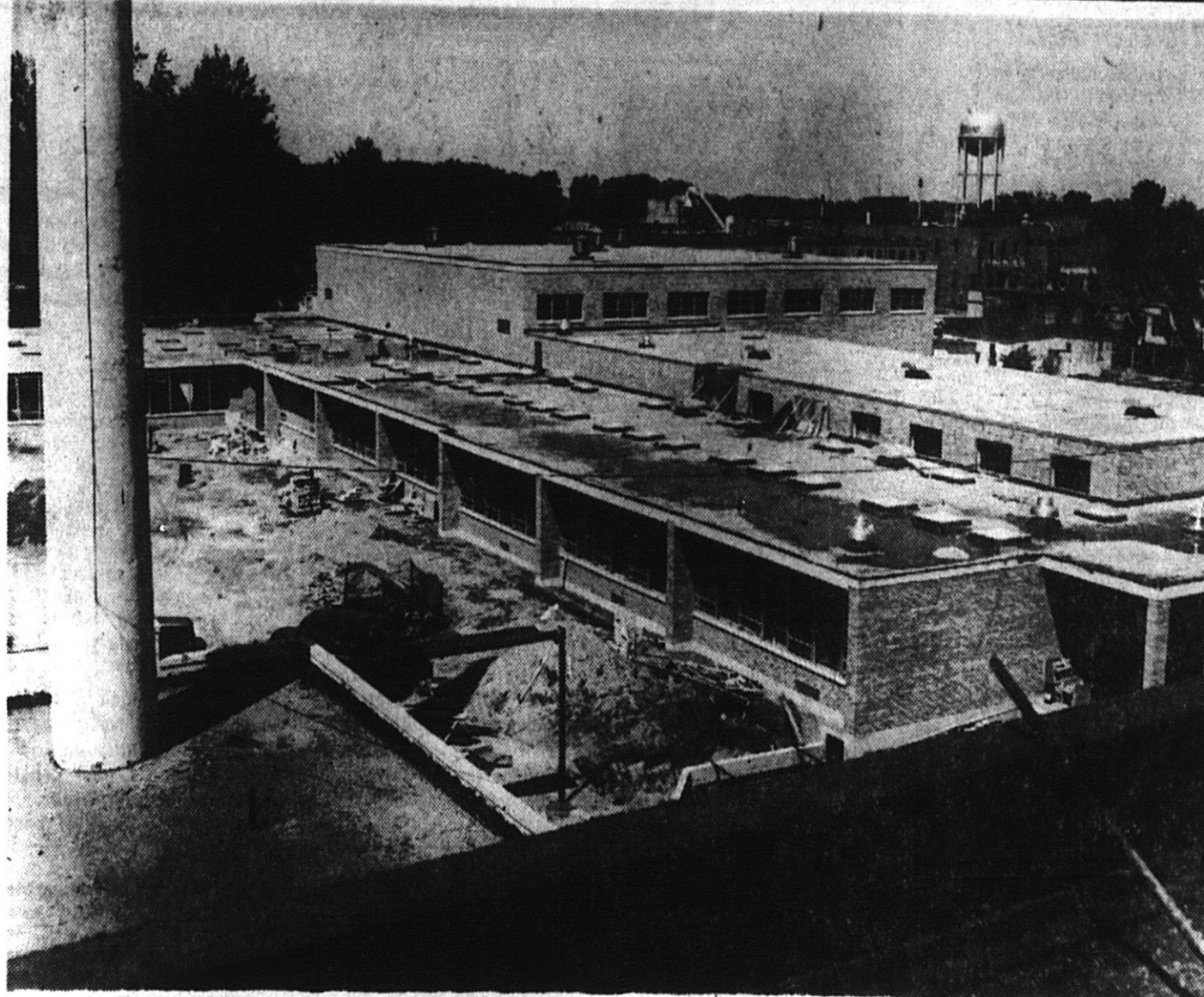

Zeeland Junior High Will Be Ready in September

ZEELAND (Special) — Youngsters of junior high age will be attending school in a new, \$600,000 building this September.

The construction was started in September, 1956, and it is expected to be completed for the opening of 1957-58 session, according to Julius Schipper, superintendent of schools.

The modern structure, designed by James K. Haveman of Grand Rapids, will provide nine classrooms, a band room, two shop rooms, two home economics rooms, an art room and an office. In addition, there will be a huge gymnasium which will seat 1,850 persons and several locker rooms. The gym and special rooms will also be used by senior high students.

The new building, which is estimated to cover 40,000 square feet, is located on Main St., between Centennial and Maple Aves. It will be east of the old Junior High School, which will eventually be torn down.

The operations have run into some delay, with a three-week labor strike last winter and a fire which destroyed the school warehouse on July 11. Materials for the school were ruined in the fire, but the equipment was such that it is fairly easily replaced.

Fixtures for the light domes will not arrive before classes begin, but it is not expected to cause any problem. Flooring for the gym was also destroyed, and re-ordering may take a little extra time.

The new gymnasium will provide a basketball court for the Zeeland High School team, which has previously been using the Holland Armory for its games. The bleachers will be pulled out to accommodate the students at assemblies, and a portable stage will probably be added in the near future.

The walls of the building are of painted cinderblock and the dome lights throughout the school will give lots of sunshine. The interior decorating is being done by the Herman Miller color consultant. Almost every room is in a different condition of construction, but several rooms need only blackboards and door trim before they will be completed. Although work on the gym is progressing well, it probably will not be finished until shortly after classes begin in the fall.

Stolen Car Recovered In Hurry by Deputies

"Pakistan has completed its first five year plan and is now implementing its second development plan. Assistance is being received from the United States, United Nations, and under the Commonwealth, from Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and Great Britain."

"Polygamy is not encouraged in Pakistan. The government is based on a parliamentary system of democracy," Khan said.

"We value the friendship of the U.S. and will continue to make our utmost contribution to the security and well-being of our own country and our neighbors. Nixon recently said 'no country is a closer friend or ally of the U.S. than that represented by our visitor (Pak premier Suhrawardy),' the speaker said."

"We stand and will continue to stand for the right of self-determination for the people of Kashmir," he said.

WATER MISHAPS

Water tragedies last weekend took at least 21 lives in Michigan. The drowning toll was believed to be the highest in the nation.

Thousands of persons flocked to lakes and streams seeking relief from the heat. Under such conditions a higher toll was certain to result.

But reading the grim tale of those tragedies, one cannot help wondering if the majority of them could not have been prevented by the exercise of a few common safety precautions.

Several persons lost their lives when their boats overturned. At least two people drowned after falling out of boats. One youngster drowned in a gravel pit. Two small children drowned while bathing. One life was lost when a man dived from a boat and failed to come up.

News accounts fail to reveal whether the boats which overturned were equipped with floating cushions which can be used as life preservers, or whether the people who fell overboard were wearing life preservers. Presumably they were not. And yet, safety experts warn constantly that boats should be so equipped, and persons who are unable to swim are urged to wear preservers. The time may come when a boat owner who fails to provide such equipment, and who fails to insist upon its use, may be liable to criminal prosecution.

Each year, scores of persons lose their lives bathing in gravel pits. Because of the possibility of stepping into deep holes, these gravel pits constitute the most dangerous kind of swimming facility. Each year, scores of small children drown because they are not properly supervised while in the water. And every year a number of persons are drowned or injured by diving into unfamiliar water and striking rocks, tree stumps or other such obstructions.

All the old, time-tested rules still apply near the water: Swim only in guarded waters. Stay out of gravel pits. Don't swim alone. Don't swim for at least an hour after eating. Don't overload boats and canoes, and don't stand up in them. Wear a life preserver when boating. Don't dive unless you know the water is deep enough and free from obstructions.

In short, use common sense. Swimming and boating are fun. But they can be dangerous when the safety rules are not observed.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, August 4
Ruth, a Foreigner Who Won Her Way
Ruth 2:8-13; 4:13, 17
by C. P. Dame

(Based on copyrighted outlines produced by the Division of Christian Education, National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U. S. A. and used by permission.)

The Book of Judges tells us about one phase of life in the time of the Judges and the Book of Ruth tells us about another phase. This little book tells us how a foreigner won her way into the hearts of the people of Israel who differed much from her own nationality.

I. It is not easy to be accepted by people of another nationality. Young Americans are stationed all over the world and some bring brides of a different race and nationality home. Ruth lived in Moab. A Jewish family consisting of Elimelech, the father, Naomi, the mother, and two sons, Mahlon and Chilion, moved to Moab because there was a famine in Bethlehem in Judah. Many people have moved for economic reasons. There are other factors to consider when a family moves besides the economic. Moab was an idolatrous country. The two Jewish young men in the family married pagan women. This was to be expected. There were no other girls in Moab.

In Moab all the men, the father, and the two sons died, and the three wives became widows. When Naomi heard that times were better in Bethlehem she returned. Her two daughters-in-law went along with her. The relationship between this mother-in-law and her two daughters-in-law was excellent. When the women reached the boundary line Naomi tried to persuade the two young women to return home again. Orpah returned but Ruth clung to her mother-in-law. The return of Naomi with her daughter-in-law created a mild sensation in the town.

II. A splendid reputation is an asset. Ruth went to work gleaning in the field of a rich landowner named Boaz who noted her, asked about her and showed her special attention. Boaz told Ruth about the good things he had heard about her — how she had treated her mother-in-law graciously, had left her parents and the land of her nativity and had come to a strange people. It is interesting to note that in the Book of Ruth there is no villain. Every person shows commendable traits. Boaz was a gentleman in his relationship to Ruth. He was kind to his employees.

Boaz and Ruth were married. The marriage was a happy event, because both Boaz and Ruth were people of character and godliness. Naomi was pleased that her daughter-in-law married again. A child was born to this devoted couple. The son was named Obed and he became the father of Jesse, the father of David, the most famous king of Israel. Ruth became the great-grandmother of David and an ancestress of Jesus. A widow of Moab won an honor every Hebrew maiden coveted.

III. Foreigners often prove a blessing to a nation. Foreigners constantly come to our shores. Some succeed in business, others in the professions, some in the scientific field and others in the realm of religion. Today there are many refugees who would like to come to America. Some organizations have sponsored refugee families. People of the type of Ruth are an asset to any nation.

We have made tremendous progress since the days of Ruth in the realm of agriculture; harvesting is not as laborious today as it was in the days of Ruth. Have we made similar progress in the quality of womanhood who work in so many fields of endeavor today? When we compare some modern women who smoke, drink and live superficially we cannot but wish that the nation had more women of the character of Ruth, the Moabite, the wife of Boaz.

Board Refuses To Take Refund

ALLEGAN (Special) — A check for \$12.94 has been returned to Russell Boeve, former Fillmore Township supervisor, from the Allegan County treasurer for per diem and mileage received June 30, 1954.

Boeve first sent of amount back to the county after State Auditor General Frank S. Szymanski said 13 members or one-time members of the Allegan County Board of Supervisors had collected mileage and per diem pay for board sessions which they did not attend. Szymanski said the overpayments totaled \$355.10 and "should be refunded to the county."

The Allegan County board through its finance committee, the group which Boeve's check was referred to, examined rule 32, adopted April 13, 1954. Rule 32 states "any member of this board who shall be absent from a session shall open his arrival report his presence to the clerk; and no member shall be allowed any compensation for services when he is absent for the day unless excused by a majority of the board." The rule was printed in the Allegan County Manual of the board of supervisors in October, 1937 and approved by a vote at the beginning of each year's sessions.

The board recommended unanimously that the check be returned to Boeve pending further information and advice from Allegan Prosecutor Chester Ray.

For many years it has been the practice of the supervisors to "excuse" members who were ill on the day the board was meeting. When excused, members were allowed their \$10 per diem, and mileage, just as if they had been on hand. It is this practice which Szymanski cited as illegal.

Prosecutor Ray is studying the matter and will render an opinion on alleged overpayments not later than Aug. 15. He stated he may request an attorney general's opinion on the issue.

The 13 members included Fred Buhler, Harold D. Fox, Thomas Gifford, the late Fred Nyberg, H. B. Woodhams, A. H. Warement, Charles Barton, J. H. Scholten, Clem Reva, F. G. Brower, L. J. Dornan, Levi Knoboch and Boeve. The report covered 1954 to 1956 sessions.

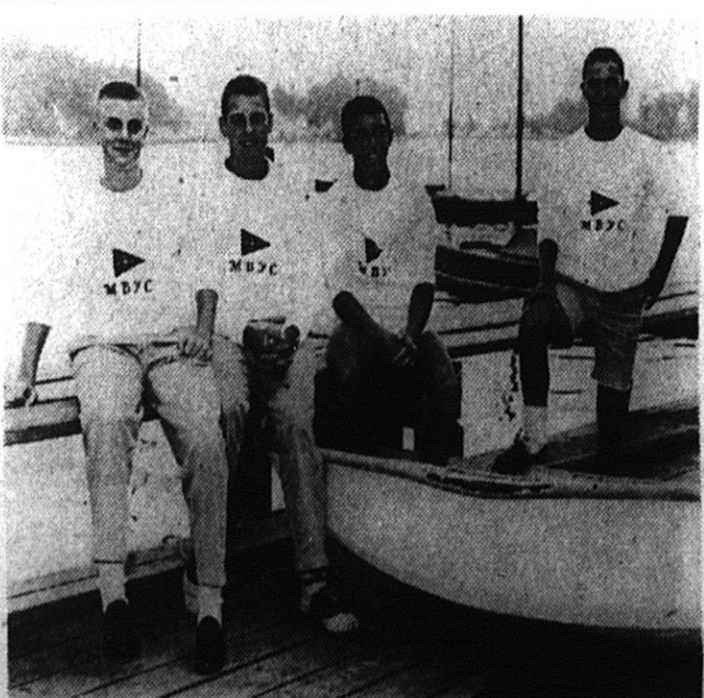

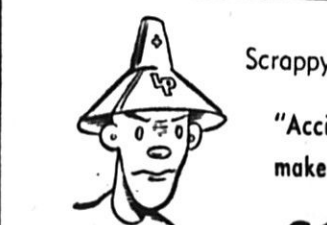

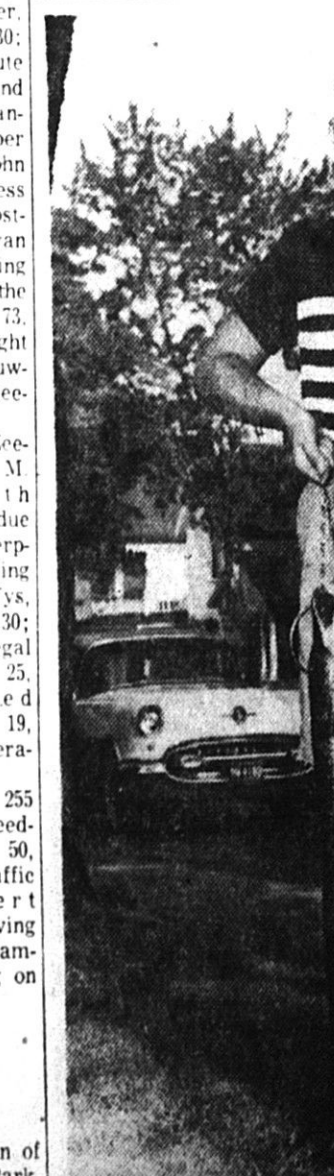

Starlings Raising Havoc Here Again

Anyone know of a sure-fire way to get rid of starlings? If there is such a thing, the residents of Lawndale Ct. would certainly like to hear about it. City Manager Herb Holt reports that the people in that neighborhood say the pesky birds are worse this year than last.

They have been around for years, but nobody has figured out how to make them move. Residents once tried to capture several starlings and record their distress call, but the birds were uncooperative and wouldn't make a squeak.

City officials are considering getting a product called "Roost No More" which has been successful in several cities. The sticky brown fluid is placed on the trees and gives the starlings a sort of "hot foot." Another solution under consideration again is recording the distress call.

Owosso officials report that this method has worked fairly well, except that the terrible noise sometimes scares the people and their pets more than it does the starlings. Another drawback with the distress call plan is that it is only temporary while "Roost No More" is supposed to be permanent.

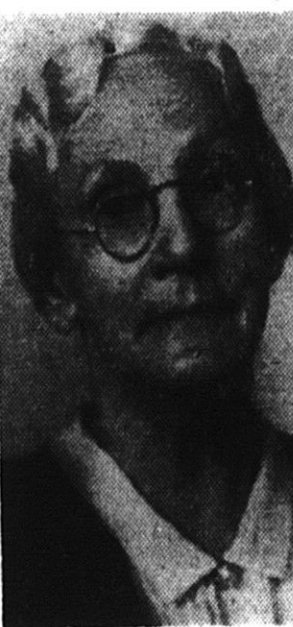
The week's total was 77,700 which brings the attendance for the year to 884,804, about 10 per cent ahead of last year.

Hollenbachs Find Cairo Delightful As Well As a Politically Hot Area

Dr. John Hollenbach has just returned from two years in the "most interesting place to live — what I call the hub of the mid-east." He is speaking of Cairo where he held the position of dean of undergraduate faculties at the American University.

Before he took his leave of absence, Dr. Hollenbach was dean of the college at Hope. This fall he will assume the role of vice-president of Hope.

The Hollenbach family lived in suburb called Maadi, about eight miles south of Cairo along the Nile. Their two sons Jeff, 10, and David, 14, went to an American school.

called Cairo-American College "Don't let the word college confuse you," Dr. Hollenbach warned, "in Egypt it means a secondary school or one including a secondary school."

Dr. Hollenbach called Cairo a "very sociable place with dinners, reception parties, etc." Through the American church and the embassy the American people met other Americans. "In fact," Hollenbach stated, "we met more people in those two years than ever before."

Speaking of the Israeli-Arab flare-up, Dr. Hollenbach said, "It was as unexpected to us living there as it was to the people in the States. It was so sudden that we could hardly believe it was true or that it could amount to anything."

"Eisenhower sent a message for all Americans to get out," Hollenbach said, "and all the schools were closed down including the American University at Cairo."

The Hollenbach family along with others were evacuated. Shortly after they left Cairo for Alexandria the Cairo airports and the radio station were bombed. They spent the evening in Alexandria before continuing on to Geneva, Switzerland.

"There were two air raids in Alexandria before we left," Hollenbach said. "The planes were going over and the anti-aircraft guns were shooting at them. It was quite interesting," he grinned.

There was complete order throughout this time, according to Hollenbach.

In Alexandria cars left by people evacuating were parked in the middle of the streets. The American consulates had arranged with General Motors and Ford warehouses to store the American people's cars. "When we returned," Dr. Hollenbach said, "we merely picked up our keys and drove our car out of the warehouse." In Cairo also there was complete order with no looting or thievery of the evacuated villas, he said.

Special permission from the state department was needed to get back to Cairo from Geneva. The faculty was granted permission in groups of six and Hollenbach was in the first group to be allowed to return.

Wives and families were not allowed to return to Cairo until the ban was lifted on April 2. As a result Mrs. Hollenbach and her two sons returned to the United States to await Hollenbach's return July 14.

In describing the American University at Cairo, Hollenbach said that instruction is given in English but the student body is mainly Middle Eastern. The university was founded by an American and is supported by American donations. They try to give an education along the lines of an American University, he said.

There are about 90 members in the professional staff and approximately 750 students, 40 per cent of which are women. Hollenbach stated that the proportion of women to men is slightly higher at the American University than at other universities in Egypt, but that the proportion is constantly growing.

"It is a small experimental school," Hollenbach said. "We try to start something new, not to compete. Our function is to get things started. Journalism classes were first given at the American University, and since then they have been picked up by the National University in Cairo."

In describing the students Hollenbach said, "They are interesting, more volatile than the American student, and more mature in a political sense. Perhaps it is inevitable as they live in such a politically hot area."
