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Two Firms Seek Permits For Building

Variety of Building And Repair Work Planned in Holland

Two Holland firms filed applications last week for building permits in Building Inspector William Layman's office at City Hall.

Rooks Transfer Co. plans to construct an office, maintenance garage and transfer terminal at the southwest corner of East 16th St. and 120th Ave. The office and terminal are to be 70 by 100 feet, and plans call for the garage to measure 72 by 100 feet. Russell Lamar is contractor and total cost of the construction will be \$110,000.

Northern Fibre Products Co. is planning to build a \$70,000 plant at 50 West Third St. The building to be constructed by the F.H. Taylor Co. of Detroit, will be 92 by 150 feet.

Two Injured In 3-Car Crash

Two Holland girls escaped serious injury when they were thrown from a car into the road in a three-car collision today at 9 a.m. at the intersection of US-31 and Eighth St.

Sally Dokter, 15, of 120th Ave., received leg bruises Debbie Barkel, 5, of route 3, Holland, received facial bruises.

Both girls were passengers in a car driven by Mrs. Joyce D. Barkel, 31, of route 3, Holland, headed west on Eighth St. A car driven by William Butler, 52, of Northlake, Ill., was headed south on US-31, according to Ottawa County deputies, while a car driven by Richard A. McAdams, 41, of Lima, Ohio was parked facing east on Eighth St., waiting for traffic.

Mrs. Barkel told deputies she had stopped for the stop sign on US-31, between the north and southbound lanes, but saw no cars coming and pulled out onto the highway. Deputies said Butler's car struck the Barkel car in the right rear, turned it around and shunted it into the McAdams car.

Deputies said both girls were taken home after the accident. They estimated the damage to Butler's 1955 model car at \$250, the damage to Mrs. Barkel's 1951 model car at \$300, and the damage to McAdams' 1957 model car at \$50.

Funeral mass will be at 9 a.m. Friday at St. Francis de Sales Church and burial will be in Garfield Park Cemetery in Grand Rapids. The body is at the Sullivan Funeral Home in Grand Rapids where the rosary will be read at 8 p.m. tonight.

Elderly Fennville Man Held Prisoner in Fraud Scheme

ALLEGAN, Mich. (UPI) — An elderly "unwilling captive" held in Ohio has been released and his "hostess" returned to Michigan to face fraud charges.

Allegan County sheriff's officers said Mrs. Loretta Conley, 43, Allegan, was to be arraigned today on an outstanding warrant, charging her with obtaining \$800 worth of household appliances by signing the name of her 7-year-old granddaughter to the sales contract.

The "unwilling captive," Arthur F. Berg, 78, rural Fennville, a retired Chicago insurance agent, has been returned to Allegan County, suffering from malnutrition.

Sheriff's officers said an investigation into Berg's captivity was continuing and additional charges may be forthcoming.

Undersheriff Robert Whitcomb said Mrs. Conley went to an Allegan private nursing home where Berg was a county patient last August, representing herself as a niece, asking permission to take Berg for a ride.

Allegan Justice of the Peace

Otto Schmidt, who had befriended the elderly man, asked local police to begin an investigation after Berg did not return to the nursing home.

A Newark, N.J., insurance company entered into the case after noting that signatures on Berg's monthly \$54 pension check did not match previous ones.

When it was learned that the checks were sent to McClure, Ohio, the town marshal was asked to watch the post office general delivery window to see who picked up the checks, Whitcomb said.

Henry County (Ohio) Sheriff Fred Bartels found Berg at a home Mrs. Conley rented, held prisoner in a fifth-story bedroom, described Berg as an "unwilling captive."

Authorities said Mrs. Conley also apparently had been receiving Berg's monthly \$66 social security check.

When asked if he had any money, Berg replied: "No, Loretta took it all. She's the boss and everyone does what she tells them to."

Former City Fireman Dies At Age of 72

Egbert E. Beekman, 72, Holland fireman who retired in 1956 after serving 40 years, died Tuesday evening at Holland Hospital where he had been a patient for the past 10 days. He had been in ill health for some time. He lived at 65 South River Ave.

Mr. Beekman worked as deputy at the Hope College and Holland High School basketball games for 35 years and also served as special policeman for Holland city for many years. He was chief deputy sheriff of Ottawa County under Sheriff Kammerbeek for four years. Born in Holland he lived here all his life. Before his retirement

in 1951 he was employed as maintenance foreman at Hart and Cooley for 23 years. Mr. Beekman was a member of Third Reformed Church and the Metropolitan Club. Surviving are two daughters, Miss Cornelia Beekman and Miss Bertha Beekman, both at home; one brother, Gerrit Beekman of Holland and one sister-in-law, Mrs. Russell Beekman of Grand Haven.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 3 p.m. at the Dykstra Funeral Chapel with the Rev. J. A. Veldman officiating. Burial will be in Pilgrim Home Cemetery. Members of the Fire Department will act as pallbearers.

City to Have 14 Precincts At Primaries

Enlarged Municipality Will Operate 25 Voting Machines on Tuesday

Holland city will have 14 polling places in operation at Tuesday's primary election. Five additional precincts have been added as the result of the June 3 annexation election, three in the Maplewood district, one in Montello Park and one in Apple Ave. district.

Twenty-five voting machines will be in operation in the 14 precincts from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. City Clerk Clarence Greengood has lined up 48 election workers for the city. These workers will gather in City Hall at 7:30 p.m. tonight for an election school in the first floor lobby.

Ward 1, City Mission, 74 East Eighth St.

Ward 2, Washington School, 11th and Maple.

Ward 3, Lincoln School, 11th and Columbia.

Ward 4-1, Van Raalte School, 20th and Van Raalte.

Ward 4-2, Thomas Jefferson School, 30th and Van Raalte.

Ward 4-3, Montello Park School, 44th and Van Raalte.

Ward 4-4, White Village Inn, south of 32nd St. on US-31.

Ward 5-1, Christian High School, 20th and Michigan.

Ward 5-2, South Side Christian School, 29th and Central.

Ward 5-3, Maplewood School, 48th St. near US-31 junction.

Ward 6-1, Trinity Church, 20th and Central.

Ward 6-2, Longfellow School, State and 24th.

Ward 6-3, Apple Ave. School, Apple Ave. south of 24th.

Ward 6-4, red building at Maplewood Reformed Church, 34th and Columbia.

The three precincts in Maplewood area are in Allegan county and voters face a different ballot on the county level, as well as U. S. representative, state senator and state representative.

Voting in primaries is usually more complicated than in regular elections. In primaries, there can be no split ballots, and the voter must first pull a primary lever designating Republican or Democrat before he is able to pull down any other levers.

Zeeland city has two precincts, both in City Hall. Precinct No. 1 is in council chambers on the first floor and precinct No. 2 is in the American Legion dugout.

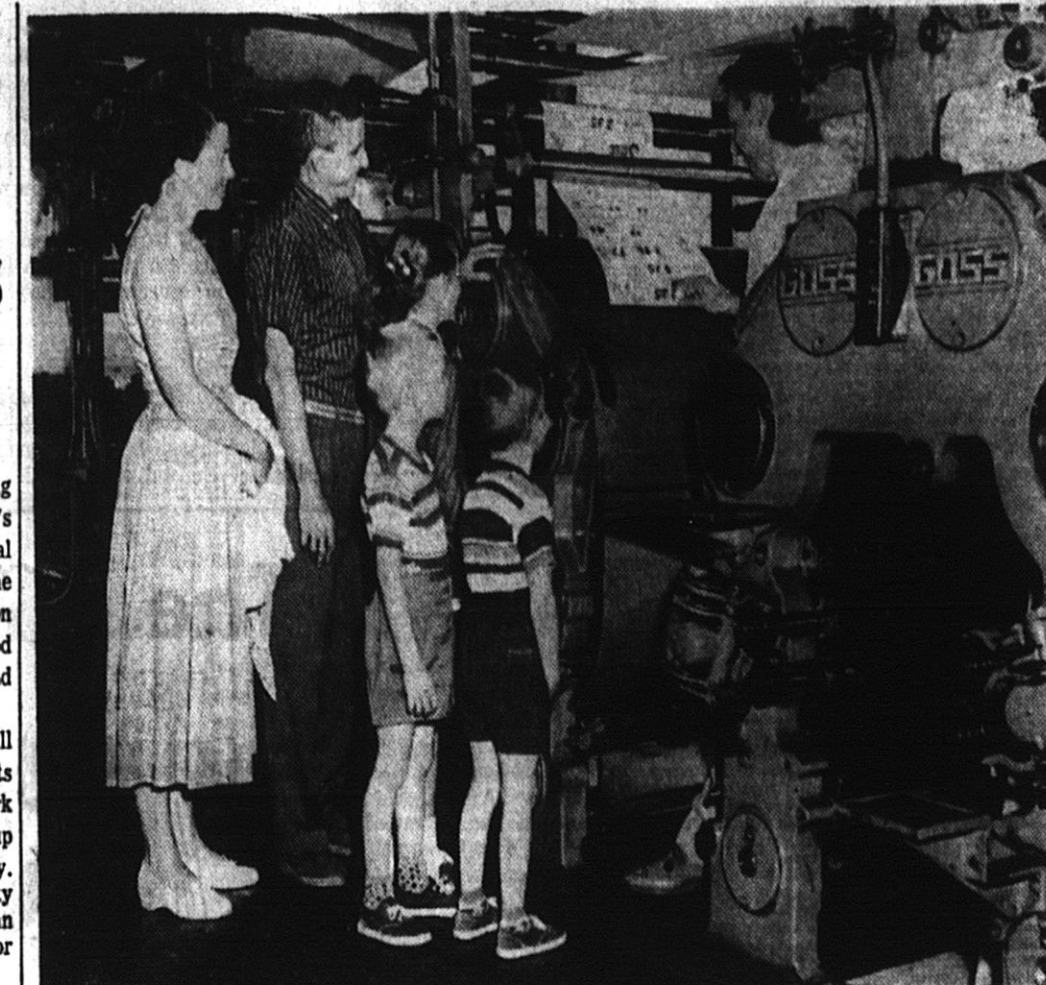
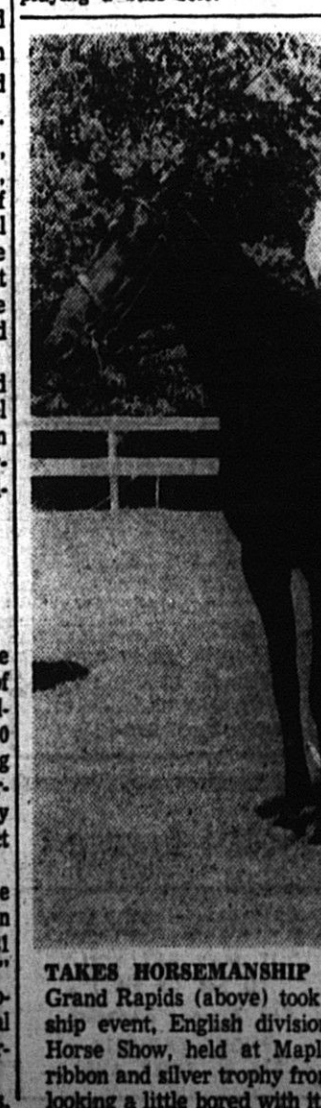
Hudsonville city will vote as a city for the first time Tuesday. Georgetown township will operate three other precincts. Grand Haven will have seven precincts. Holland township will have four precincts instead of five, since Montello Park has been annexed to Holland city. The township precincts will be numbered 1, 3, 4 and 5. Precinct 2 previously was Montello Park and is now designated as Holland city's fourth ward, third precinct.

A vacationing man and his family Wednesday watched the great new press at the Sentinel run off the day's edition with more than ordinary interest.

The visitor, Harold Blake, of Belvidere, Ill., is one of the men who built the press at the Goss Printing Press Co. in Rockford, Ill.

It was only by mistake that the Blake family stopped in to see The Sentinel press, which was installed in May, 1957.

Homeward bound Tuesday night after a vacation on Mackinac Island, Blake was seeking accommodations for the night and lost his way. Trying to find his way back to US-31, he pulled into the Sentinel parking lot to turn around.

Blake stopped dead. He saw something he had recognized instantly.

Reckless Driving Count Brings \$75 Fine

Faces Court Examination August 15

Linford Neal Signs Statement Telling How He Killed Schoenmaker

ALLEGAN (Special) — Linford Neal, 33-year-old Fennville man who Monday admitted the Sunday bludgeon murder of Ervin E. Schoenmaker Tuesday waived examination when arraigned in Allegan Municipal Court on a charge of first degree murder.

He was bound over to Circuit Court to appear on Aug. 15 and was returned to Allegan County Jail.

Neal admitted the brutal killing Monday afternoon when he was taken to view the body of his victim in Fennville.

Allegan County Undersheriff Bob Whitcomb said that Neal first continued his denials of the act at the funeral home, but then turned to Whitcomb and asked to talk to him alone.

The two went into another room and Neal told Whitcomb, "I did it." He later signed a written statement admitting the deed in full.

According to Neal, he had met Schoenmaker in a Grand Junction bar and they had a few drinks together on Saturday night. Sometime after midnight, Neal told deputies, Schoenmaker was driving him home when a violent argument erupted between the two men near the spot where the victim's body was found.

Neal stated that they stopped the car to fight, and Neal clubbed Schoenmaker with a soft drink bottle.

Schoenmaker's body was found Sunday behind a shed on an unhabited farm five miles south of Fennville. Twenty-two and a half hours later the case was solved, after Neal was picked up in Kalamazoo driving the car Schoenmaker had borrowed from his sister and brother-in-law in Pullman, Mr. and Mrs. Neal Zeyer.

Dr. John Walters of Battle Creek, the pathologist who examined Schoenmaker's body, said it was the "most brutal beating I have ever seen."

Taken to the scene of the crime after his admission of the deed, Neal re-enacted the crime for the officers. After telling the officers about slugging Schoenmaker with the bottle, Neal was asked about the bloodstained, nail-studded two-by-four board found near the body.

"I guess I used that to finish him off," Neal told Whitcomb. "I must have."

Schoenmaker's wallet was found in the car by Kalamazoo police, who are holding the car and attempting to find fingerprints on the wallet.

Whitcomb said no money was found in the wallet, although Schoenmaker's papers appeared to be all there. Schoenmaker was known to be carrying about \$12 when he left on Saturday evening, Whitcomb said.

Neal has denied robbing Schoenmaker. Kalamazoo police reported Neal was carrying \$7 when he was picked up.

Allegan County Prosecutor Chester Ray said that indications were that Neal was not responsible for the July 20 bludgeon slaying of Nelson Elwood, 67, of Comstock.

Prior to admitting the murder Monday afternoon, Neal demanded examination when arraigned on a charge of unlawfully driving away Schoenmaker's car. The date for that hearing was set for Aug. 6 and bond for him was set at \$10,000.

The Explorers will leave Holland at 5:30 a.m. and the trip will include camping at Rocky Island lake and travel through five adjacent lakes. They will fish each one of the lakes.

Plans call for the group to travel by four cars with trailer and boat and four canoes on car top carriers. This will be the sixth major canoe trip the group has made.

Ben D. Mulder and George Piers are leaders and the Post is sponsored by the First Reformed Church.

30 Absent Voter Ballots Issued

City Clerk Clarence Greengood said Wednesday that so far 30 voters have applied for absentee ballots for the primary election Aug. 5 in Holland city. Deadline for applying for such ballots is 2 p.m. Saturday.

The ballots must be returned on or before Tuesday in sufficient time so that the clerk may deliver them to the respective precincts by the time the polls close, Holland City will have 14 precincts in operation. Five new precincts have been added with the annexation of three areas to the city last June 3.

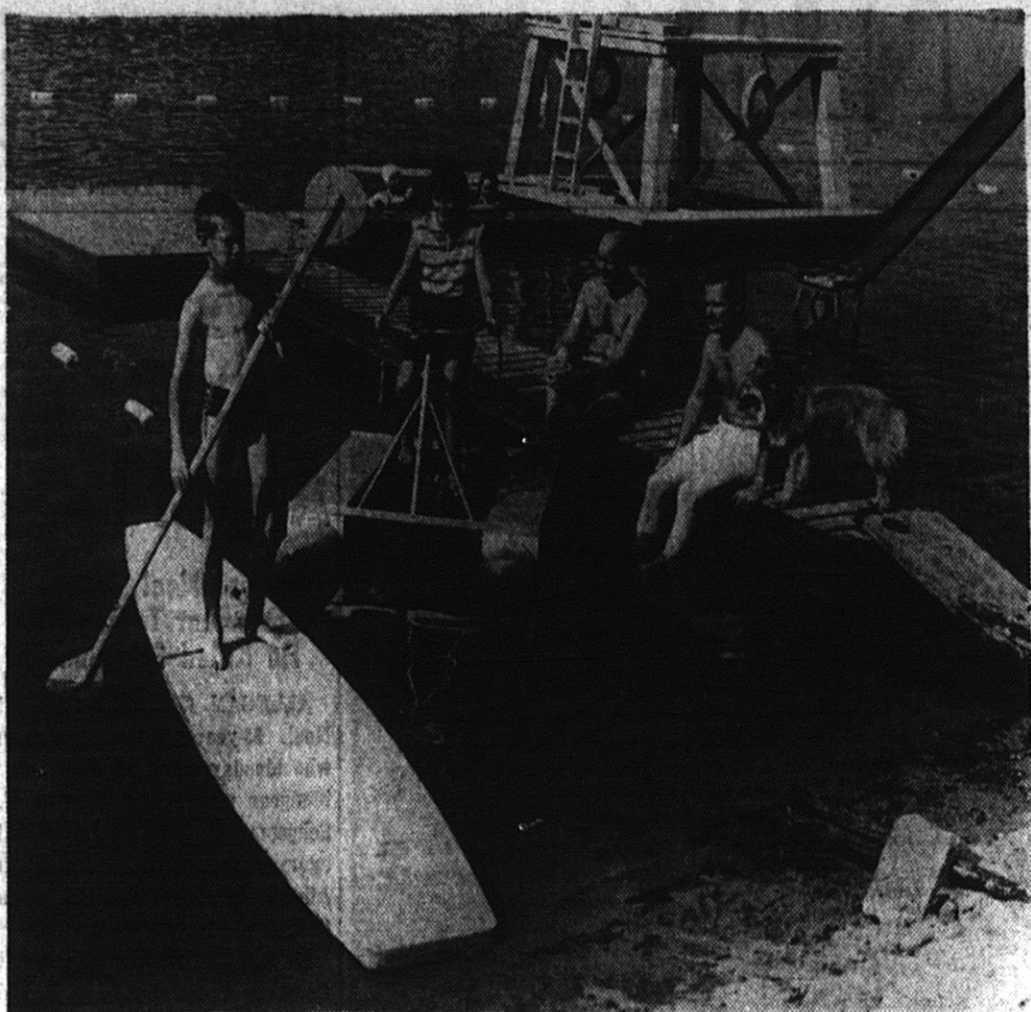

Zeeland Couple Takes 11-Day 900 Mile Bicycle Vacation

ZEELAND (Special)—A Zeeland couple went on a 900 mile vacation trip recently, but they weren't satisfied with making the journey by the usual modes of transportation as car, bus, train or airplane. Instead, ambitious Mr. and Mrs. Ben A. Steenwyk of 18 North Centennial Ave., pumped their bicycles on their 11-day jaunt to Niagara Falls and back to Zeeland.

Ottawa County Farm News

Generally we have recommended several wheat varieties. The following is a report from the Crops Department of Michigan State University regarding yields on the various varieties. Five year averages for the white wheat in Michigan are as follows: Cornell 595 yield 45.5 bushels; Genesee, yield 46.9 bushels; Yorkwin, 41.5 bushels. The new variety Dawbul on a two year average yielded 45.5. The straw stiffness on Cornell, Genesee and Dawbul is good and on Yorkwin fair. They are all mid season maturing varieties. The Cornell and Genesee are resistant to blue smut and the Yorkwin and Dawbul are intermediate in susceptibility to blue smut. Anyone desiring a complete break down of all wheat varieties can have same by writing our office.

Seeing that Michigan is now a certified Brucellosis free state as of June 30, 1958 and Ottawa County having come to this stage earlier, it is important that we try to maintain our certification. Here are some suggestions you might be using to keep down this disease. First, get your calves vaccinated; second, raise your own replacements whenever possible; third, livestock auctions are a poor place to buy dairy cattle to go into the dairy herd; fourth, blood test each animal that goes into your herd even though it is permissible in a certified county to buy and sell cattle without a blood test provided the herd is not under quarantine. Fifth, do not let strangers walk in your feed area. Sixth, isolate cow at calving time. Sixth, if you are suspicious of Bangs in your herd, get in touch with your area veterinarian immediately.

Word has come to us from the American Cattle Club that two cows from the Harold Jensen herd of Jensen had made exceptionally high production records. Rush Creek Beauty produced 10,309 pounds milk and 524 pounds butterfat in a 305 day period, two times a day milking. Polly Acres Minnie a junior three year old produced 10,624 pounds of milk and 599 pounds of butterfat also in a 305 day period, two times a day milking.

One of the prices the dairy farmer has paid for stepped up milk production has been an increase in the prevalence or severity of certain diseases. One of these is mastitis.

Mastitis now costs the dairyman more than any other disease. The cost comes not only in the loss of milk production and cows, but in expensive antibiotics. As a result of the rather indiscriminate use of antibiotics to treat the disease, harder-hitting strains of the mastitis organisms have developed making the disease more difficult to control.

The best way to fight mastitis is with the aid of a veterinarian and through strict sanitation, proper milking procedures and good management practices. Don't pay the price of mastitis.

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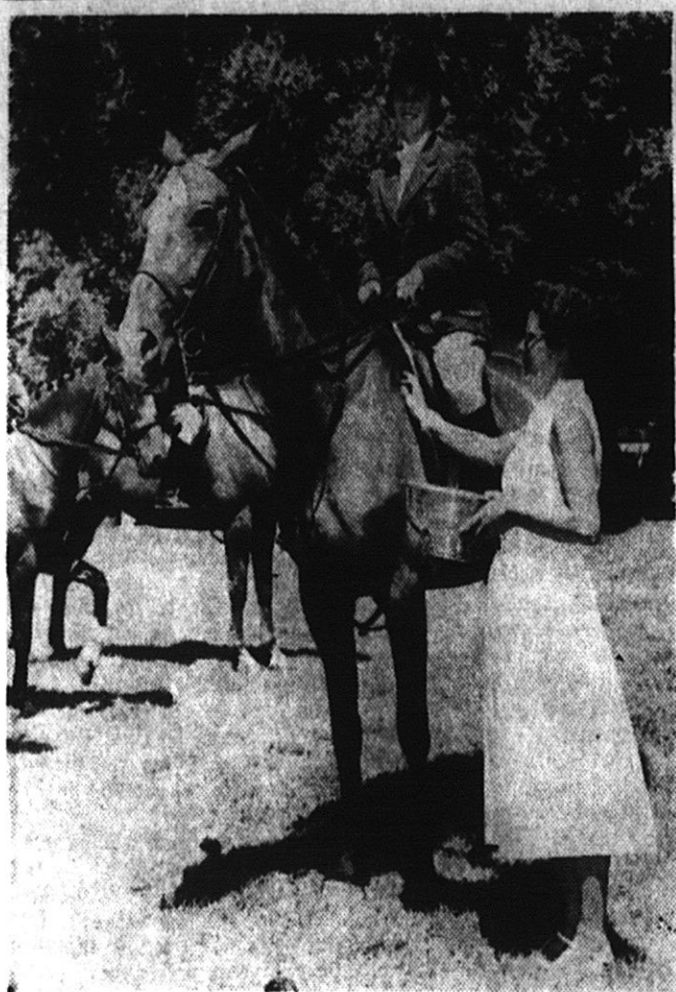

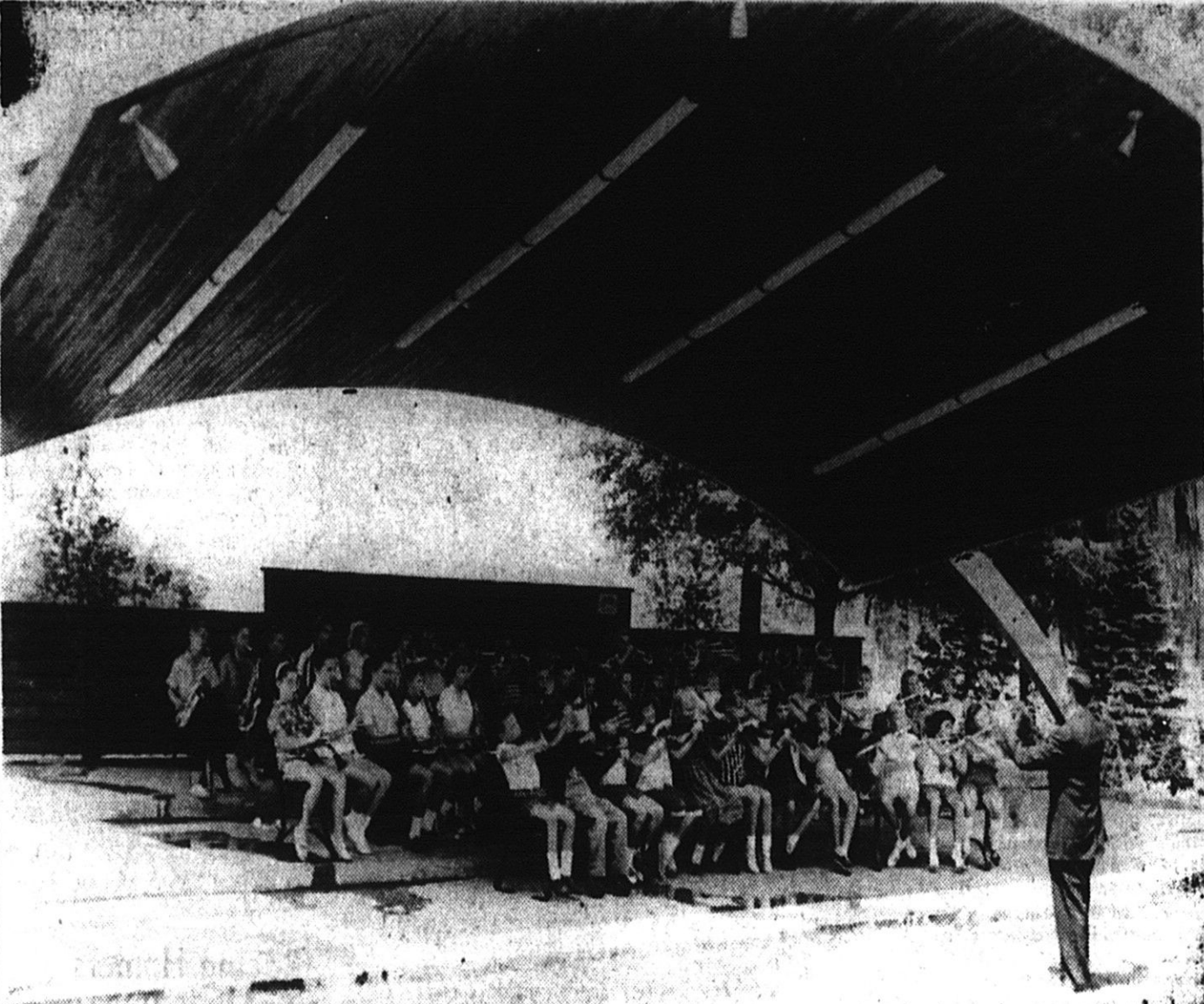

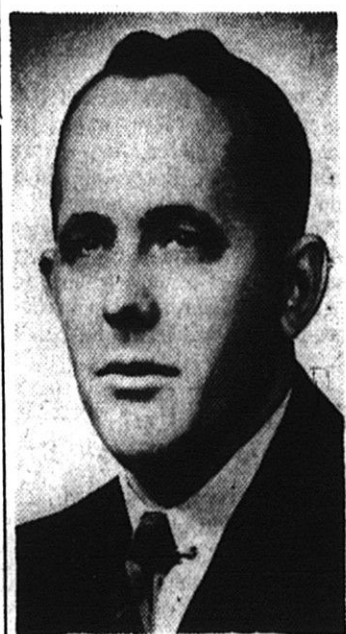

"I was helpless . . . I was so weak, I thought I was done for." That's how Pfc. Ivan De Graaf, in a letter to his parents Mr. and Mrs. Jacob De Graaf of 28 East 20th St., described a harrowing experience that he would just as soon forget, but probably never will.

The 21-year-old Holland soldier stationed at Yakima, Wash., Firing Center was swimming in the Yakima River last week Friday when another swimmer, John Jonas, 17, of Yakima was drowned, and De Graaf almost drowned in attempting to save him.

De Graaf told his parents he was swimming alone when Jonas, swimming near the center of the river, cried for help. The young soldier said he managed to grab hold of Jonas, but while attempting to get to shore, the wildly struggling high school senior repeatedly pulled both of them under water.

The rapid current swept the two downstream and into the still faster Naches River. The pair went under again, and De Graaf said that's when Jonas slipped from his grasp. De Graaf said he made it safely to shore farther down stream by grabbing a low hanging cable.

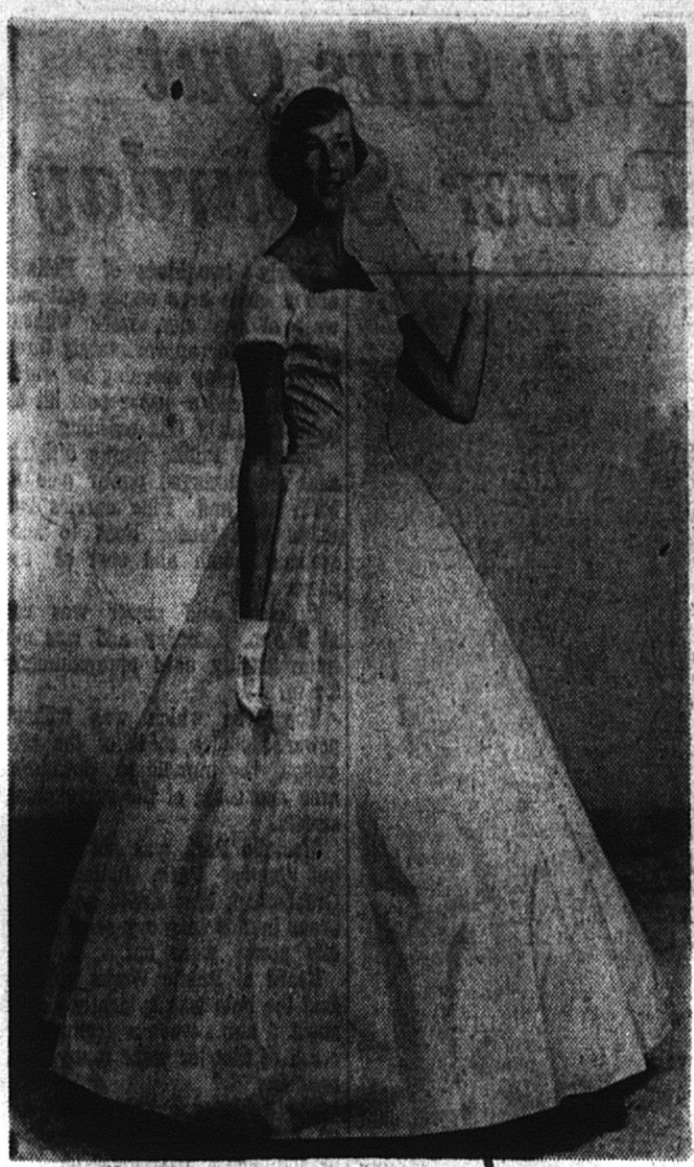

Al Eissens Pitches Softball Despite Loss of Right Leg

On March 5, 1955, Al Eissens had his right leg removed five inches below the hip joint.

There couldn't have been anything much more disheartening to a 20-year-old fellow who had been an outstanding high school athlete in Fulton, Ill., and had thoughts of continuing his athletic career at Hope College.

Gone were the opportunities to play football, basketball, baseball and track, the sports he had been awarded letters in high school.

Participation in these sports had resulted in an injury to Eissens which cost him his limb. As a high school sophomore, his right leg was bent backward out of joint and a calcium deposit formed and caused a growth of tissue at the end of the bone at the knee.

Eissens graduated from high school in 1953 and during the next two years he participated in independent basketball and baseball teams in Fulton.

The accumulation of the calcium during this time had caused a rare type of bone cancer, called teenage cancer. This diagnosis was made by a Rochester, Minn., specialist and five days later the leg was removed.

Eissens had also played softball for Fulton teams and thought possibly he could participate, despite the handicap. Since he couldn't run, the line position appeared to be pitcher and although he had played every spot in softball, he had never pitched.

While waiting three months for his leg to heal so as to have the wooden leg fitted, Eissens began to throw a softball. It was difficult but Eissens kept throwing.

Last summer he pitched for the Sixth Church — Gra — Bell team in the Holland Sportsman softball League. He developed throughout the summer, but reported he had trouble with control.

This summer, Eissens is hurling for Maplewood Church in the Wooden Shoe League and says his control is much better. He has developed four pitches and gets the best results from the low inside curve and the outside rise.

Since running the bases is out for Eissens, he bats and one of

The 6' 5" Eissens is entering his senior year at Hope College in the fall. Presently he is attending the summer session. He is a psychology major and plans to enter the seminary following his graduation.

Personable, the 23-year-old Eissens, has displayed his feeling toward being handicapped through his determination to achieve in softball.

"I hope other fellows who have handicaps won't let it get them down and will keep trying, whether it be in sports or something else," Eissens said.

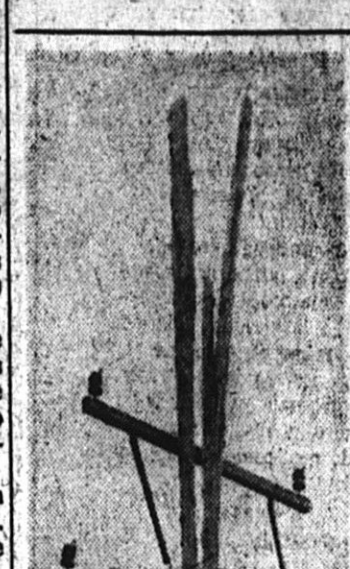

City Cuts Out Power Saturday



Nearly two-thirds of Holland and a large area south, east and west of the city, were without electricity for approximately three hours Saturday morning as workmen replaced a power pole hit by lightning early this morning.

Board of Public Works officials said the damaged power pole at Fifth St. and Pine carries two 12,500 volt feeder lines to substations south and east of the power plant.

Officials said power was cut at 2 a.m. Saturday and was out intermittently until approximately 5 a.m.

The area which was without power includes most of the city except the immediate downtown area and some of the surrounding streets.

Montello Park was not affected but Central Park, Indian Hills, Graafschap, Maplewood and other areas in this territory serviced by city power were cut.

Board of Public Works officials said the pole was evidently struck about 5 a.m., when a
