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Zeeland Man Admits Two Arson Jobs

ZEELAND — Marvin J. Schaafsma, 21, of Zeeland admitted to State Police Thursday that he set fire to two Zeeland industrial firms this month.

Not Guilty Plea Entered By Court for Schaafsma

GRAND HAVEN — Marvin J. Schaafsma, 21, of Zeeland, stood mute when arraigned on an arson charge in Circuit Court today, and a plea of not guilty was entered for him by the court.

Through his attorney, James E. Townsend of Holland, Schaafsma waived the reading of the information. Bond, which was not furnished, was continued at \$1,000. No trial date has been set.

Schaafsma was charged with setting the fire which caused an estimated \$10,000 damage to the apartment house in which he lived last April. He has also admitted setting two major industrial fires in Zeeland last month.

ed fires at Howard Miller Clock Co. Monday and at the Black River Lumber Co. July 13. He made the statements following a series of lie detector tests and questioning by Detective St. Karl Lutz at Rockford State Police headquarters.

Schaafsma has previously admitted setting a \$10,000 blaze in the apartment house where he lived and touching off a C & O railroad boxcar and attempting to set fire to his mother's home.

Added to the previous statement, along with the two industrial fires, was the admission that he had set his own car on fire last year, and also that he had taken about \$500 from a Zeeland oil station.

Officials did not link Schaafsma to the \$300,000 fire which swept the Conrad, Inc. plant in Holland July 17.

Detective William Cram, State Police Fire Marshal Division, met with Zeeland Police Chief Lawrence Veldheer and Fire Chief John Van Eden, late Thursday afternoon and brought Schaafsma to the scene of the two industrial fires.

Schaafsma told officials he set the lumber company fire by dropping lighted matches into a pile of sawdust and said he started the clockworks fire by touching off a pile of rags with a cigarette lighter.

Cram said Schaafsma had been awakened by a nightmare on the night of July 13, got out of bed and dressed, and walked from his home to the lumber company, where he set the \$10,000 fire that destroyed the mill section of the firm.

Cram said Schaafsma walked back to his home, about a half-mile away, and went back to bed. Both Schaafsma and his wife were awakened by the fire alarm and went to see the fire.

According to Veldheer, a cleaning woman was working in the offices of the Miller clock firm when Schaafsma entered the building and set off that fire.

Neither the woman, Mrs. John Kraai of 283 Peck St., nor Schaafsma apparently was aware that the other was in the building at 6:30 p.m. Monday.

Schaafsma said he went to the back of the factory and entered through the back door. He said he did not remember if the door had been open or if he had broken the glass.

After lighting a pile of rags, Schaafsma said he drove back home and picked up his wife and the two visited relatives in Holland. He said he had gone to the Miller factory on the pretext of going out to buy cigarettes.

Cram said Schaafsma did not remember setting the fire until he returned from Holland about 9:30 p.m. Monday and saw the smoke and fire trucks at the scene.

Miller company officials said Thursday the inventory on the fire loss was incomplete and that it was impossible to make an estimate of the loss.

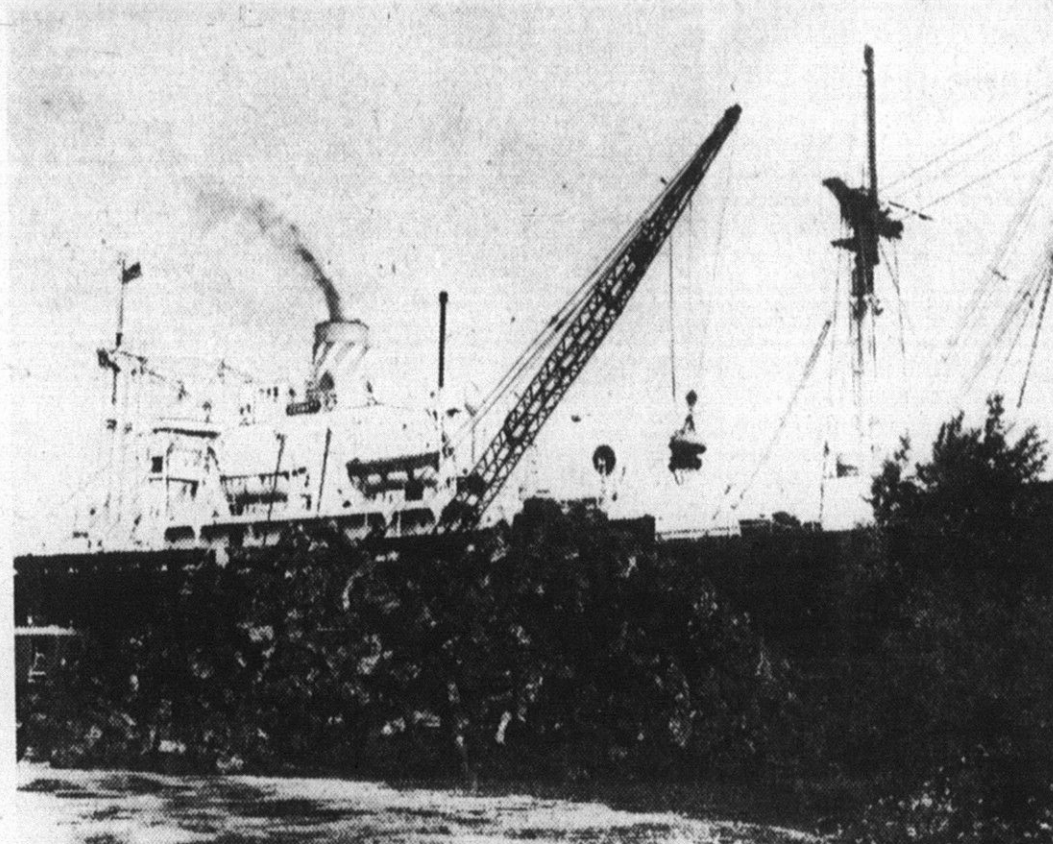

Greek Freighter Arrives Sunday

Round-the-clock loading operations began Monday aboard the Greek freighter Zermatt which entered Holland Harbor Sunday afternoon to take on 5,000 tons of scrap metal bound for Japan.

The loading of the ship began at midnight, and officials at the Harrington Fuel Co. docks on West Eighth St., where the vessel is tied up, said loading operations were expected to be completed by Friday.

Officials said two cranes working day and night are expected to load about 1,000 tons of metal per day. Most of the 5,000 tons of metal at the docks is from the Louis Padnos Iron and Metal Co. of Holland.

The Zermatt entered Holland Harbor about 2 p.m. Sunday and tied up at the Harrington docks at 3:30 p.m. The 530-foot freighter arrived off Holland Harbor from Chicago about 4 a.m. and tied up in Lake Michigan, about a half-mile off the breakwaters until 2 p.m.

Two tugs, the Indiana and the Samuel E. Bool from Chicago, arrived at 2 p.m. to guide the 12,000-ton vessel to the docks.

The Zermatt, a converted liberty ship of Panamapian registry, is the first ocean-going vessel to visit Holland since the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway to take on a cargo here for export.

The Zermatt's captain is 32 years old and hails from the island of Chios in Greece. The ship has a crew of 30 men, most of Greek extraction. Her home port is Piraeus, a seaport of Eastern Greece.

The Zermatt had previously taken on 2,500 tons of scrap in Chicago before coming to Holland. She is scheduled to take on another 3,000 tons of scrap iron in Quebec before sailing for Japan.

Capt. Andreas Petinakis came to Holland last week by car from Chicago to survey the city's harbor facilities.

The Zermatt, originally scheduled to arrive in Holland about the middle of last week, was held up by negotiations for a pilot and tugs to guide the ship into her docks.

The captain said the pilot and tugs were necessary to bring the ship up Lake Macatawa because of currents along the five-mile course from Lake Michigan to the Harrington docks.

The Zermatt is Capt. Petinakis' second command. He has been in command of the Zermatt for about six months, and is slated to return to his home following the voyage to Japan. After some time at home he will return to work aboard the Zermatt or a new vessel.

State police rushed blood from Holland Hospital to Douglas for transfusions. Police said Anson had apparently been lying on the floor of his home for nearly a half-hour before the mishap was discovered.

Considerable routine business was processed by City Council at a regular meeting Wednesday night.

The oft-presented report of City Manager Herb Holt recommending 12 additional parking meters on Central Ave. between 10th St. and Graves Pl. was tabled indefinitely.

A communication from the Michigan State Water Resources Commission advising that the deadline for filing application for construction grants for sewage treatment plants was Sept. 15 was referred to the Board of Public Works. Also included in the letter was information for applying for and qualifying for said grants which are to come from this year's appropriation.

A petition for a water main in 37th St. from Columbia Ave. west to the dead end was referred to the city manager for report.

A damage claim from Insurance Company of North America on behalf of Ford Motor Credit Co. for damages resulting from an accident with a city owned vehicle April 28 was referred to the city attorney and insurance carrier.

An application for a permit from Robinson Cartage Co. to move a house from 987 Woodbridge to 1049 96th Ave. outside the city was granted subject to prescribed route.

The city auditor presented a report together with a list of all delinquent utility bills remaining unpaid as of July 31. Council ordered said unpaid bills placed on the fall tax roll of 1961.

Council approved the annual contract with the State Highway Department for maintenance of state trunklines inside the city.

Council also approved a recommendation of the city manager to purchase four gross (576) small sized flags at a cost not to exceed \$100 to be used to decorate veterans graves on Memorial Day. Request for new flags had come from the flag chairman of the Memorial Day committee.

Visitors to City Council Given Lots of Answers

City Council zipped through the items on the regular agenda in record time Wednesday night but devoted considerable time to items brought up by visitors in the audience.

Council devoted a full 15 minutes to objections from neighbors on the grade elevation of a house under construction at 18 West 38th St. The initial letter opposing the grade height came from Bernard Kuipers, and was accompanied by a petition signed by other property owners in the locality.

In the discussion, Herschel Kuipers, who said he was in the contracting business, pointed out that previous cases on grades had been resolved by the building inspector who he said has the authority to enforce "good building practices."

City Manager Herb Holt said the building code lists no grade requirements, and there probably is a misunderstanding on whether the inspector was enforcing the code or following general practices.

City Attorney James E. Townsend said contours of the land sometimes made grade regulations difficult in building codes. Most Councilmen seemed to feel it would be a good idea for the owner to jack up the house to conform with the levels of other homes in the block.

Councilmen Henry Steffens felt the owner should have an opportunity to voice his side of the story. Finally, Council referred the matter to the city manager and building inspector with authority to act, depending on legal interpretation.

A less time consuming matter was a petition for a sidewalk on the east side of Graafschap Rd. from 22nd to 29th Sts. signed by 21 parents of Sandy Subdivision who listed 43 children of school age. The Planning Commission has had Montello Park traffic matters under study for several years, and recommended the sidewalk be constructed, something which could be done without necessitating removal of trees.

Council tabled the request for sidewalk, pending further study. Several parents expressed opinions and some residents of Graafschap Rd. also expressed opinions.

The situation seems to hinge on a group of parents requesting a sidewalk in another area, placing the costs on others.

John Tibbe, who said he pays taxes on property at 106 West 27th St. introduced several matters for study, implying that there were many things to be considered in this city besides studying swimming pools.

First off, he questioned two locations in the 27th St. area where sidewalks had not been installed.

Mail Truck Rolls Over; Driver Slightly Hurt

HUDSONVILLE — Ronald Dale Rutsema, 21, route 1, Zeeland, apparently fell asleep while driving a privately owned mail truck east on M-21 near 12th Ave. in Georgetown Township at 4:35 a.m. Monday.

The truck left the pavement, hit the median strip, struck an abutment and rolled over, resulting in extensive damage to the undercarriage of the truck.

Rutsema received minor bruises and was treated by a Zeeland physician. The truck which picks up mail at various points is owned by Laverne Cook and Roscoe DeVries of Holland. Sheriff's officers investigated.

38,350 Visit Ottawa Fair In Two Days

Children's Day and the first night of racing brought 20,850 persons to the Ottawa County Fair Wednesday and Fair officials expected the bright skies today to bring another large group to the Fair today.

With the record-breaking 17,500 persons at the Fair on opening day Tuesday and coupled with Wednesday's crowd, the two-day attendance total stands at 38,350.

Fair manager Cliff Steketee said. The Fair, hampered by rain last year, attracted 16,500 persons for the first two days.

Fair exhibits opened at 9 a.m. and will close tonight at midnight. The Fair hours are from 9 a.m. to 12 midnight daily.

Edward Zimmer of Lansing, agriculture commissioner for Michigan, visited the Fair Wednesday and said the livestock entries "are some of the best in Michigan."

The Ottawa Fair has more livestock entries than most of the county fairs in Michigan and pay out higher premiums than any of the other Michigan county fairs.

Colt stakes harness races are scheduled tonight at 8 p.m. with the two-year-old pace and trot and the three-year-old trot and pace slated. A purse of \$2,000 will be awarded for each race making a total in awards of \$8,000. Each race is two heats.

The largest 4-H horse show ever held in Ottawa County was staged in front of the grandstand Wednesday afternoon. A total of 51 entries competed from four Ottawa County 4-H clubs.

Zeeland Man Dies in Lake Near Newaygo

NEWAYGO — A 37-year-old Zeeland man died in a freak water skiing mishap late Wednesday afternoon at Hess Lake in Newaygo County.

An autopsy was ordered today by County Coroner George Kroeze in the death of Gerald Holstege of 756 Central Ave., Zeeland, who was pronounced dead at the scene after wading into deep water while preparing to go water skiing.

Kroeze said Holstege might have died from a heart attack or a stroke.

State police said Holstege was wearing a life belt when he waded from shore into deeper water at 4:30 p.m. as he prepared to mount his water skis.

Willis Schipper of Allendale, with whom Holstege was spending the day, was driving a boat and was preparing to pull Holstege on skis. Troopers said Holstege called for help when he entered deep water, and Schipper immediately went to his aid. The water at that spot was about seven feet deep.

Holstege started to pull Schipper under, troopers said, and a second man on shore rowed a boat to the two men and helped both to shore. Attempts to revive Holstege through artificial respiration failed.

Police said Holstege had been in no danger while wading.

Hess Lake is located about 1 1/2 miles southeast of Newaygo.

Holstege was a member of the First Reformed Church and a member of the Gilbert D. Karsten American Legion Post of which he was first vice commander elect. He was employed at Maycroft and Mac Eachron Motor Sales in Holland.

Surviving are his wife, Lilas (Lil); his mother, Mrs. Bert Holstege of Zeeland; one brother, John of Zeeland; three sisters, Mrs. Art Zorman of Graafschap, Mrs. Marvin Van Dyke of Holland, and Miss Ann Holstege of Zeeland; and one brother-in-law, Julius Piers of Graafschap.

Escanaba, the zone 8 winner, scored two runs in the first inning with two doubles and a walk. Three runs crossed in the third on four hits, including a double and a walk. Pitcher Kasitzki drove in two of the runs with a single and Jim Moses doubled, his second of the game.

Competitive Bids on Salt Submitted

For the first time in several years, competitive bids on rock salt were considered by City Council Wednesday night and Council awarded the contract to the low bidder, International Salt Co., at a price of \$13.20 a ton.

Previously, salt bids had been identical and Council usually placed orders with firms which previously demonstrated good service.

But on bids for flake calcium chloride, Council ran into four identical bids, all \$32 a ton, and placed the order with Solvay Process Division, based on past experience.

The rock salt bid of the International Salt Co. was \$1.50 per ton less than last year's bid price of \$14.70. A representative of International Salt Co. said two weeks ago the price was lower in Detroit, and Holland's low quotation was likely associated with that.

When Council questioned possible "price fixing" in previous bids, the representative said it would be quite possible two weeks hence for Holland to have identical low bids since prices fluctuate among the competition within days, and sometimes hours and minutes.

City Manager Herb Holt felt a case could be made to fight suspected price fixing by awarding business year after year with the same firm, thereby forcing other firms to better the price if they wanted to increase business.

Some months ago, several indictments for price fixing among salt companies were made.

The rock salt bids follow: International Salt Co., \$13.20 per ton; Morton Salt Co., \$13.40 per ton; Diamond Crystal Salt Co., \$14.70 per ton; Dow Chemical Co., \$14.10 per ton; Hardy Salt Co., \$14.70 per ton. All bids were f.o.b., Holland.

The identical \$32 per ton quotations for flake calcium chloride in 100-pound moisture proof bags were received from Solvay Process Division, Wyandotte Chemicals Co., Haviland Products Co. and Dow Chemical Co. All bids were f.o.b. shipping point with freight equalized with Midland.

Holt explained that rock salt is used for ice control when temperatures are over 20 degrees. When temperatures are lower, the street department uses a mixture of calcium chloride and sand.

The street department used 662 tons of rock salt and 108 tons of calcium chloride during the 1960-61 winter season.

Remove Plane At City Park

Removal of the jet plane in Smallerburg Park was to be completed today by a team of four airplane mechanics from the Michigan Air National Guard unit stationed at Kellogg Field in Battle Creek.

The four men, Senior MSgt Paul McArthur, MSgt James Lininger, MSgt Robert Derado and SSgt Dennis Shaub of the 172nd Tactical Reconnaissance Squadron began dismantling the plane Wednesday, taking the smaller parts back to the base with them at night. They were to return today with a large truck to pick up the fuselage and wings of the 1951 model jet which has been on display for the past two years.

The plane is being removed at the city's request after frequent vandalism attacks damaged the plane considerably. Members of Beta Sigma Phi sorority were instrumental in getting the plane here as an attraction to the park shortly after its dedication two years ago. They agreed with the city that the plane should be removed.

MSgt McArthur said that the obsolete Starfighter F-94C would be partially re-assembled and used for rescue and firefighting demonstrations at the airbase.

Weather Near Normal During July

The weather in Holland during July was close to normal with both temperature and rainfall just under average, according to statistics compiled by Weather Observer William De Boer.

Average temperature for July was 71.1 degrees or .6 degree below normal. The rainfall totaled 2.22 inches, or .29 inch below normal. Most of the rain fell on a single weekend July 15 and 16 measuring 1.24 inches, and on the last four days of the month.

There was thunder and lightning on four occasions and fog on three days.

Maximum for the month was 90 degrees, registered on two occasions, July 1 and July 27. Minimum was 46 degrees registered on July 9.

Average temperature was 71.1 degrees compared with 69.6 in 1960, 72.5 in 1959, 71.1 in 1958 and 73.3 in 1957. Maximum was 90, compared with 89 in 1960, 92 in 1959, 90 in 1958 and 94 in 1957. Minimum was 46, compared with 47 in 1960, 50 in 1959, 50 in 1958 and 52 in 1957.

Average maximum was 81.8, compared with 81.4 in 1960, 80.8 in 1958, 84.3 in 1957. Average minimum was 60.3, compared with 57.8 in 1960, 60.8 in 1959, 61.3 in 1958 and 62.3 in 1957.

Precipitation totaled 2.22 inches, compared with 4.54 inches in 1960, 1.80 inches in 1959, 2.66 inches in 1958 and 2.68 inches in 1957. Precipitation fell on 12 days, compared with 11 days in 1960, 11 days in 1959, 8 days in 1958 and 6 days in 1957.

Greatest amount of precipitation in a 24-hour period was 1.24 inches, compared with 1.55 inches in 1960, .39 inch in 1959, 1.36 inches in 1958 and 1.07 inches in 1957.

Bob Connell, Holland High boys counselor, succeeded Weiss but stepped down after the 1959 season to accept the counseling post.

The selection of the 49-year-old Weiss conforms with the resolution passed last month by the

Weiss coached Holland High basketball teams for 22 years, including 12 years as varsity coach. Weiss coached the reserve teams during the 40's and was assistant to Malcolm Mackay when the Dutch won the state Class A crown in 1946.

During his seven seasons prior to retiring, Weiss compiled a 64-55 record. His 1951-52 team enjoyed a 16-4 record and lost in the semi-finals of the state tournament while his 1952-53 teams was 17-2 and lost by one point in the quarter-finals of the state tourney.

The other loss was also by one point. His 1952-53 team set a Holland record of 13 straight wins. While he was co-coach with Chapman, the Dutch won two southwestern Conference championships and lost in the state finals to Muskegon in 1937.

Weiss graduated from Kalamazoo College in 1935 and was an All-MIAA basketball forward. He is a world history teacher. During the past four years he assisted Connell and Noyd with scouting many of the Holland boys.

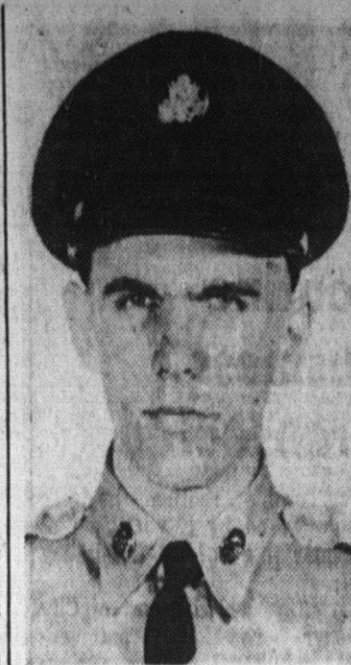

Con Con Won't Be Matter Of Partisanship: Hare

Secretary of State James M. Hare addressed about 50 persons in the Woman's Literary Club Thursday night on the coming Constitutional Convention, stating that the chief business would be to attempt to provide a government and particularly a senate which would enable parties to accept party responsibility for programs. This would be helpful for both parties, he said.

Hare said essentially the control at the convention would not be a matter of partisanship. Thus with eight or nine Republicans already elected whose philosophic approach to government problems are strongly akin to that of Democrats, he said it would be a mistake to believe a very good constitution could not be worked out since enough delegates would think of Michigan first. He said Democrats prevail even though Democrats did not win the seven additional seats numerically necessary to give them partisan control.

One of the main areas of argument at the convention, Hare believes, will be how to present the final results to the people — in one piece or in section. He feared the new constitution might be doomed if submitted in one piece because that would have the effect of uniting those whose special privileges might be threatened.

Other areas of argument will be reapportionment, civil service and

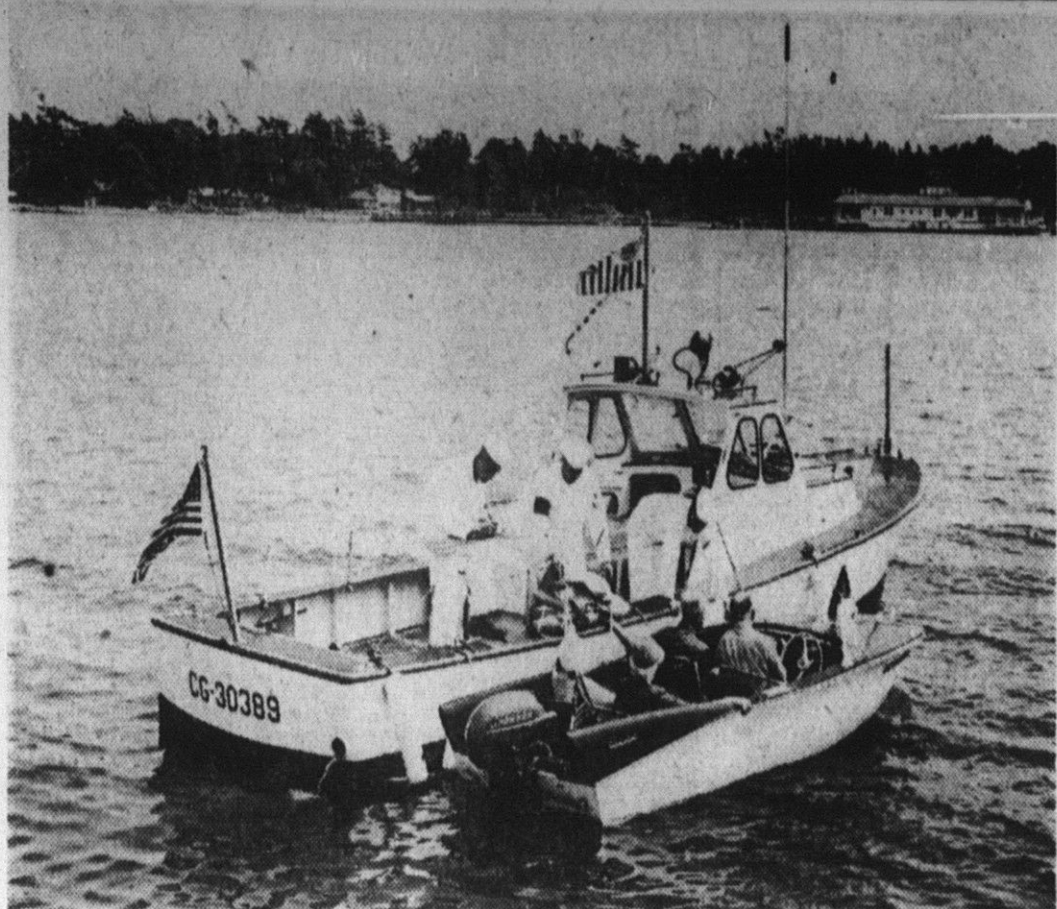

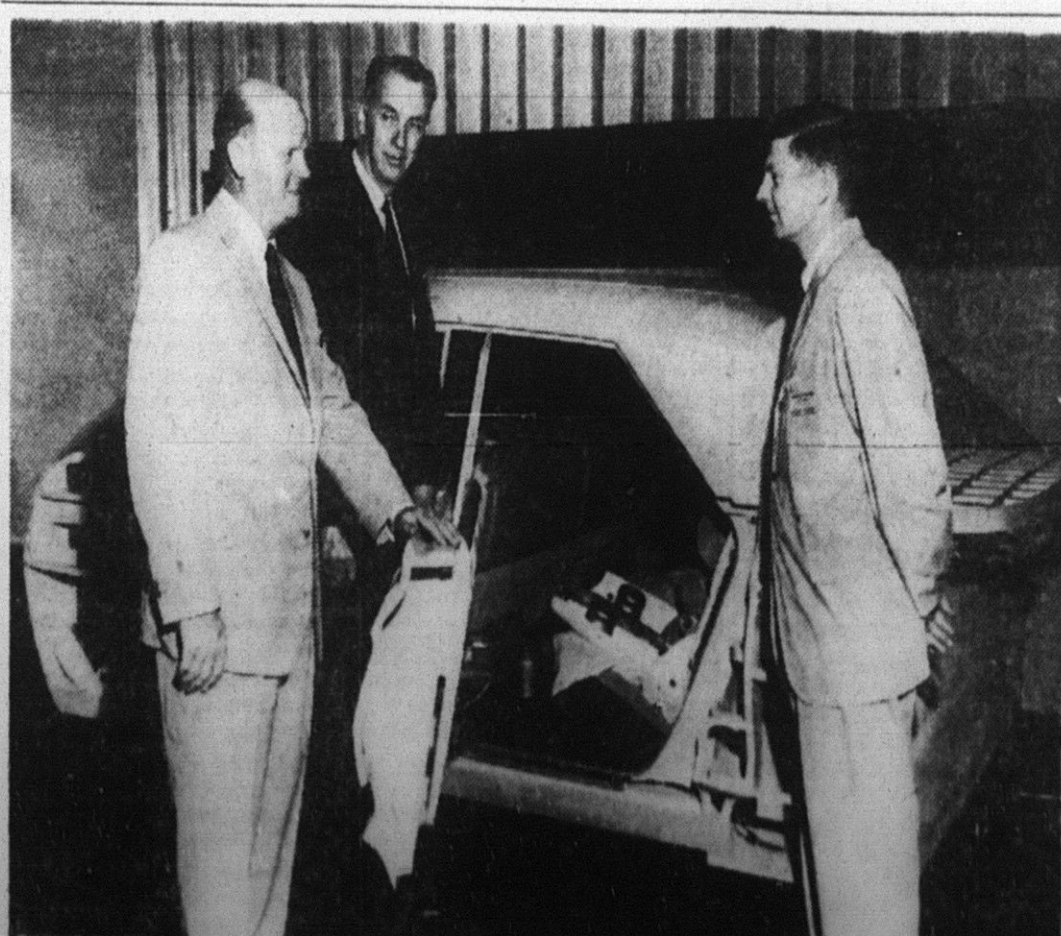

Coast Guard Unit Conducts Safety Check

Holland Coast Guardsmen are currently in the middle of a big summer-long safety campaign directed toward promoting safety on area waters.

The real meat of the safety push by the local Coast Guard station is the inspection of pleasure boats to insure that these craft comply with basic water safety measures.

To date, Coast Guardsmen have inspected 774 boats on local waters for compliance with boating laws and water safety practices.

Out of the total number of boats checked, 326 have been in-validated violation notices.

Inspection of small outboard driven boats is concentrated mainly on determining whether there are adequate Coast Guard approved life-saving devices aboard.

Boats with enclosed engine compartments must also be equipped with fire extinguishers, although Chief Paul Divida, commanding officer of the Holland station recommends that all boats have fire extinguishers.

Boats are also checked for proper numbering, and owners are required to show a certificate of registration.

Larger boats, those 40-feet and over, must be equipped with life-

saving jackets. Small boats may be equipped with jackets, vests, ring buoys or buoyant cushions.

In case of a violation, the violator has two weeks in which to correct the violation. He must write to the Ninth District Commander of the Coast Guard and tell the steps taken to correct the offense.

A second offense or failure to take corrective steps may result in a fine.

Divida estimates that many lives are saved each year through Coast Guard inspections. One of the biggest mishaps involving owners of small boats is capsizing. Divida said, and with proper approved life-saving equipment occupants of a capsized boat can stay afloat long enough for help to arrive.

Boats to be inspected by Coast Guardsmen are picked at random. If a boat displays a current Coast Guard Auxiliary sticker or the owner has a yellow Coast Guard certificate, the boat is not inspected a second time unless observed in a violation.

The Coast Guard marine inspection program is an active attempt to make crowded Holland area waters safer for a growing number of boating enthusiasts.

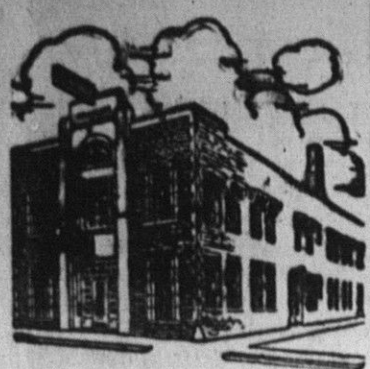
The date for next year's reunion was set for July 26 in the Overisel Grove with the same officers in charge.

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ELM TREES

More and more of our elm trees in the area are fast showing signs of Dutch Elm Disease. Many elms are dying both on public property along the curbs and on private property.

We wonder just how long it will be before the beautiful old elms will be gone. Removal of diseased trees has been in progress for several years, but we do not seem to be able to keep up with the work.

There are thousands of dead trees in the area. Does anyone have the answer for their removal? We had hoped that with continued spraying and feeding of the trees we would make some progress in saving some elms. State inspectors have been around and nurserymen have made recommendations on spraying and feeding. In many cases, this has helped, but with so many dead and dying elm trees in the area, we are wondering if trees can be saved.

Some parts of the state have done wonders with spraying programs, both from power equipment on trucks and from the air. Lansing has made strides with spraying from the air.

It appears the greater share of affected trees are on private property, often on vacant farms and woodlots. Research has been going on for years but we do not seem to have found the answer to the complete elimination of the beetles which are said to cause the fungus disease.

It may be that people who are interested in conservation should start a campaign to eliminate the dead trees. Does anyone have any idea how this can be done? Please write your opinions for publication, 300 words or less and please sign your name and address.

Lesson

Dorcas, a Woman of Good Works
Acts 9:36-43

By C. P. Dame
A minister once preached a sermon on Dorcas and gave it the topic: "A Woman with Famous Hands." We today know her as a seamstress who used her hands to make clothes for the poor widows in the congregation. Her name is still used by some Women's Organizations in the church.

I. People with warm hearts show it by their deeds. Joppa, now called Jaffa, is a seaport of Palestine. Recall that Jonah got a ship there to flee from God. In this city there was a Christian congregation. Who and how it was founded we do not know. The name of one of the members of that congregation has come down to us. She was known by two names—Tabitha (Aramaic) and Dorcas (Greek) and both names mean "Gazelle," an Oriental symbol of beauty. Not all church members are workers. We still have the "do-nothing" kind of members. Dorcas was "full of good works and almsdeeds which she did."

Today there are many Christian women who have reared their families and they are now doing volunteer service in hospitals, infirmaries and for cancer and tuberculosis societies. Since Dorcas had a warm heart she used her hands. People have all kinds of hands—open and closed, serving and selfish hands—and the hand advertises the heart, please remember this.

II. Good workers in a church also die. Some of us at times wonder why at times God takes a good worker away and leaves a chronic critic. To the sorrow of the widows, Dorcas died. At that time Peter was in Lydda, a village about nine miles from Joppa. Peter was asked to come which he did when Peter was in the room where Dorcas lay the widows stood in it weeping as they showed Peter their garments which Dorcas had made for them. Peter put all the mourners out of the room and then knelt and prayed and then called Dorcas by her Jewish name and she opened her eyes and sat up. The mourning was changed into gladness. God performed a miracle through Peter.

The early church believed in sharing, and in doing good works. Preaching and teaching were followed by loving service done by individual believers and congregations. Today there are many organizations which are promoting all manner of good for handicapped, poor and needy people. In our time the local, state and national governments are doing much for the welfare of people. There is still much room for the doing of personal charity.

This is one of the abiding duties of every Christian and of the Christian Church. When people love like Dorcas they will find some type of service to do for the many underprivileged people. If our hearts have been captured by the compassionate Christ our hands and purses will be used in ministering. Every Christian congregation should be "a Dorcas Society."

City Manager
Has Problem

ALLEGAN — New City Manager Kenneth Bollinger faced a thirty-year old problem — Kalamazoo River pollution—on his first day on the job Tuesday.

For years angry citizens have fought against the dead fish and ugly stench caused by dumping of refuse by the paper mills up the river.

Appointed July 10, Bollinger took over Tuesday after a training period under Acting Manager Clarence Wise. P. H. Beauvais resigned from the post May 1 to become an engineering consultant for a private business firm.

Before coming to Allegan in 1950 as a co-owner of Bollinger Motors automobile agency, Bollinger had been active in the civil engineering field since 1936.

Bollinger's first problem as city manager concerns what to do with the hundreds of dead carp lining the banks of the Kalamazoo River. The street maintenance crew cleaned up the river banks after the last big "fish kill" two years ago.

Consumers' Power Company began draining the Trowbridge Dam two weeks ago for repairs. Lowering the water level resulted in killing the fish.

Citizens who call city hall complaining about the dead fish are being requested to telephone or mail their complaints to the Water Resources Commission in Lansing.

Bollinger, attorney Leo Hoffman and Allegan conservationist Guy Teed attended a hearing before the commission July 26. At that time a paper mill consultant proposed that area paper mills construct a central processing plant for refuse.

Another approach to the old problem which has been suggested to the city is to bypass the state government and take the problem directly to the federal government.

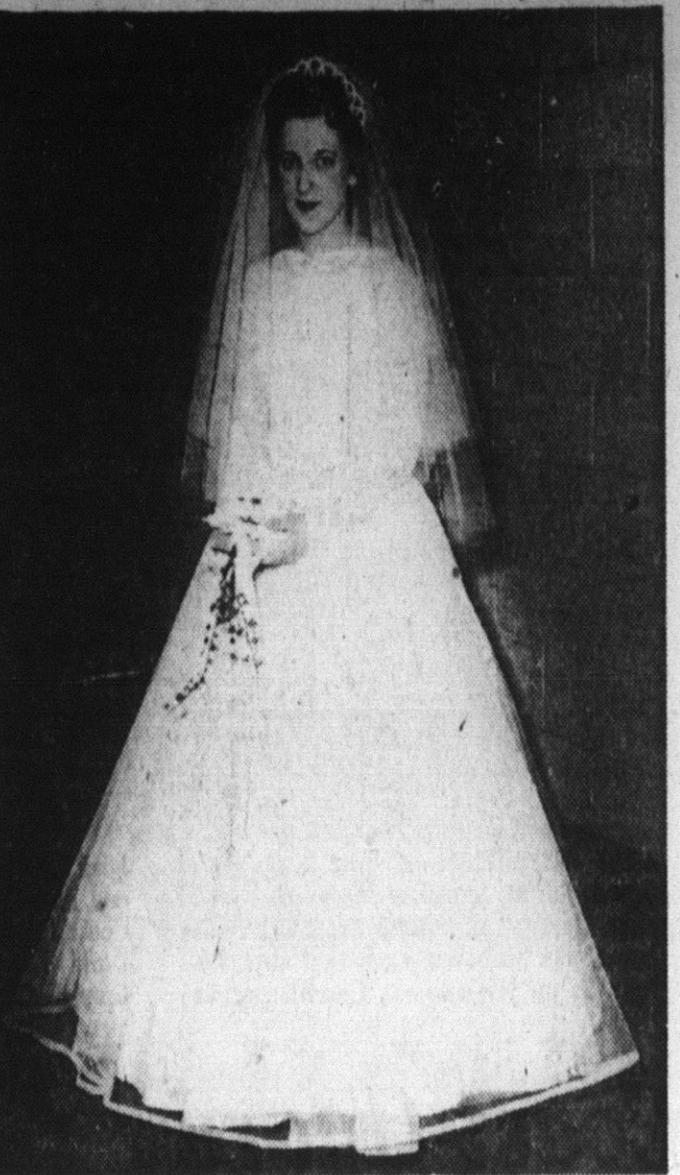

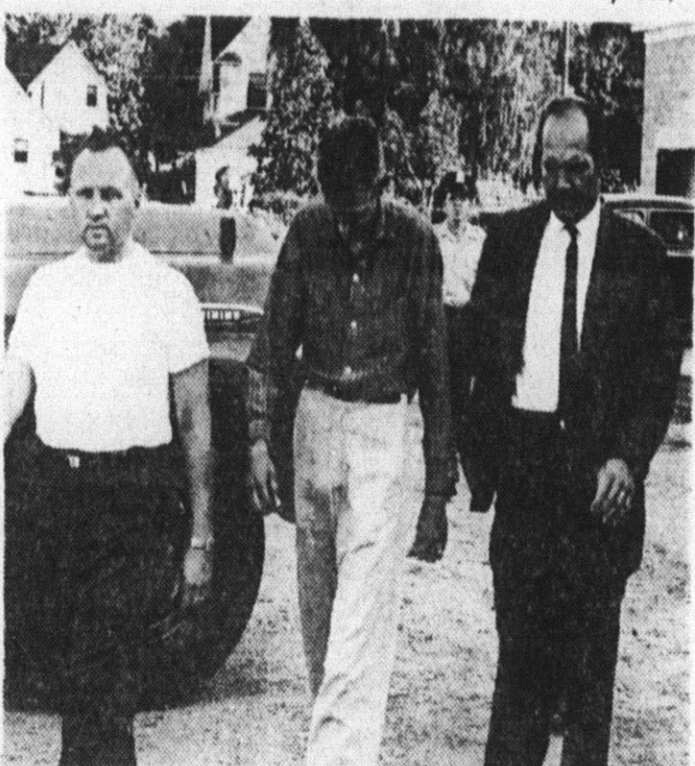

GOP Proud of '61 Record, Club Informed at Picnic

Brief talks by legislative representatives and Con Con delegates featured the program of the South Ottawa Women's Republican Club which gathered at Kollen Park Thursday afternoon for a picnic. "In spite of many criticisms, we are proud of the legislature's record this year," State Rep. Riemer Van Til said. "We kept the budget balanced, and when the nuisance taxes expired, they were not extended. This is one of the few cases when taxes ended when they were supposed to end."

Van Til said it is difficult to cut budgets, but the legislature was successful in "holding" budgets if not cutting them. In this way government waits for the economy to catch up and then increase and improve services for an increased population, he said.

Sen. Clyde H. Geerlings outlined the tax structure based on extra cent of sales tax, stating that fully \$75,000,000 of the anticipated \$120,000,000 goes for education on primary and secondary levels, and for higher education.

He deplored the light vote in the Con Con primaries, citing the chance for big upsets when the vote is light. "When the convention meets, 90 per cent of the people who will heap criticisms on the delegates will be people who did not vote. That shouldn't excuse it, but we have to live with it," he said.

Mrs. Ella Koeze of Grand Rapids, Republican national committeewoman and Con Con candidate in Kent County, said the most discouraging part of any campaign

is that so few people care. She said her district cast only 3,700 votes Tuesday out of 22,000. "We can't give up. It's a step by step fight for good government, and there's lots of work to do," she said. She called attention to a Republican gathering Sept. 21 and 22 in Benton Harbor with Texas Senator John Tower and National Chairman Bill Miller as speakers.

Robert Danhof of Muskegon, 23rd district Con Con candidate, spoke of Republican progress in a Democratic stronghold, pointing out Clyde Geerlings took Muskegon County for the first time last November by 700 votes. "The Constitutional Convention will be a partisan affair whether we like it that way or not," he said, and hoped for a 16,000 to 18,000 vote in Ottawa Sept. 12.

Henrik Stafseth, Ottawa candidate, felt there will be more interest in the general election in September, but urged a realistic approach. "Wherever you have people, you'll have politics regardless of party tickets," he said.

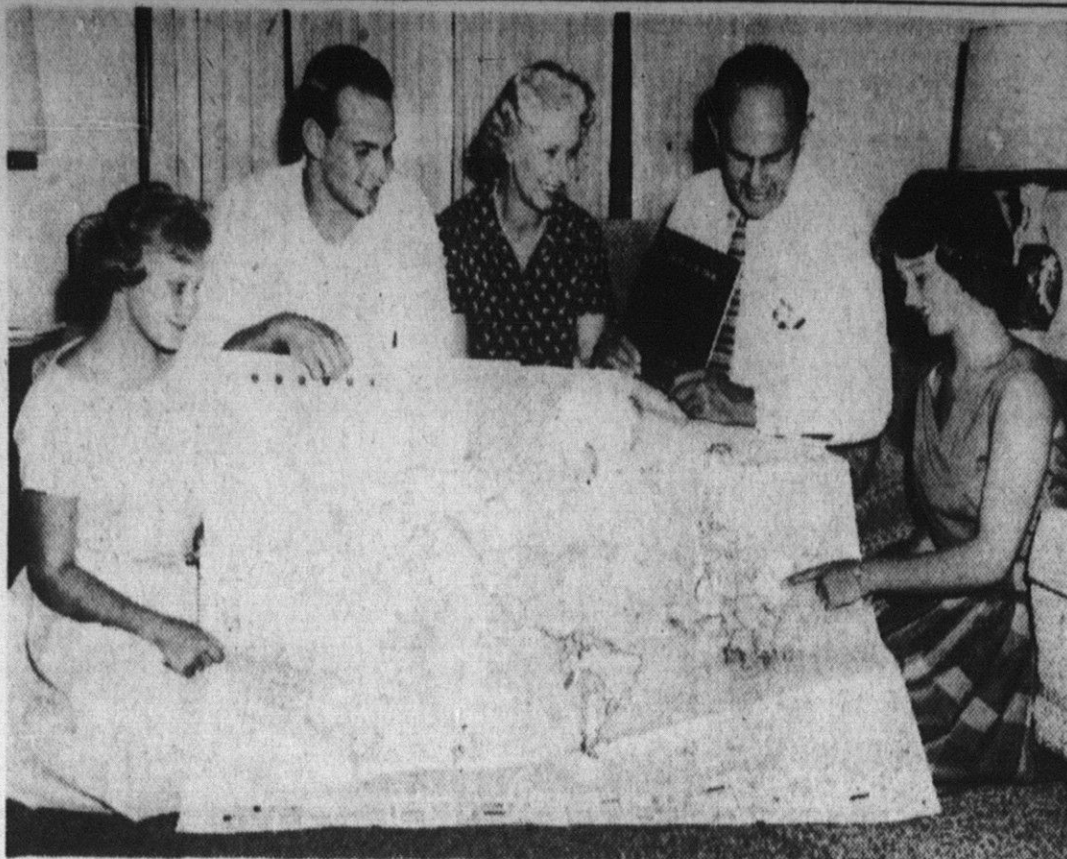

Holland Missionary Family Has Had Share of Adventure

After a 21,000 mile-two month trip including a 19,000 mile ocean voyage, the Dr. Gerald Nykerk family is once again "home" in Holland.

Dr. and Mrs. Nykerk, missionaries for the Reformed Church of America on the tiny island of oil-rich Bahrain, and their children David, 19, Nancy, 17, and Laila, 15, arrived in Holland July 19, and are making their home at 270 College Ave. for the next year.

David and Nancy will be freshmen at Hope College in September while Laila will enter Holland High School as a sophomore. David and Nancy graduated in May from an interdenominational mission school in Kodai Kanal in southern India which all three children attended.

Dr. and Mrs. Nykerk were headed for the graduation ceremonies early in April aboard the British ship Dara when it caught fire and sank in the Persian Gulf on April 10. The Nykerks escaped injury in the tragedy but several friends of the family were lost in the disaster which claimed the lives of some 160 persons. Dr. Nykerk spent the whole day giving medical aid to the injured survivors before he and his wife were able to return to Bahrain.

The Nykerks said that about 250 people of all faiths and nationalities including Moslems, Arabs, Jews, English and Indians as well as Americans called on them the first two days that they were back in Bahrain after the fire which claimed all of their personal belongings including clothes and graduation gifts for the children.

"We had nearly everything we owned with us since we were heading back to the States for a furlough after the children graduated," said Mrs. Nykerk, the former Rose Witteveen of Holland.

Holland area residents got together at this point and under the leadership of Henry Kleinheksel and Paul Baker some 216 "Friends of the Nykerks" contributed \$1,476 to the family to be used for purchasing clothes and other personal things lost in the fire.

The Nykerks said that it was virtually impossible to write special "Thank You" notes to every one of the "Friends" but they said they wished to "thank every one of our friends for their kindness and generosity shown to us and our family during this time of need."

When asked about possible Communist activity in that area of the

world Dr. Nykerk could only say that "some of the events may be Communist inspired, but much of the activity results from nationalistic feelings on the part of the people in various sheikdoms."

He went on to say that "It would be hard to say to what degree the Communists are in action since their work is done 'underground' in an area which tends to be pro-west in its ideas about democracy."

Although Dr. Nykerk who received his medical degree from Marquette University following his graduation from Hope College works in all phases of medicine, his work of late has involved a lot of surgery for eye cataracts.

The Nykerks served continually since 1941 with a sort leave in 1945 in South India. A seige of tuberculosis brought both Dr. and Mrs. Nykerk back to the States in 1951.

They both spent nearly two years in a sanatorium in Grand Rapids while the children stayed in Holland with relatives. Finally in late December of 1954 they were able to depart once again for the mission field where they have been since.

The Nykerks are looking forward to their year in the United States but are also anxious to return to see the new men's hospital now under construction at the mission station. The hospital which is scheduled for completion in September is being built entirely by local funds despite the fact that the government has recently built a new hospital in the city.

"A great deal of progress has been made and we are looking forward to more years of work in this rewarding field," the Nykerks concluded with a certain note of personal emotion.

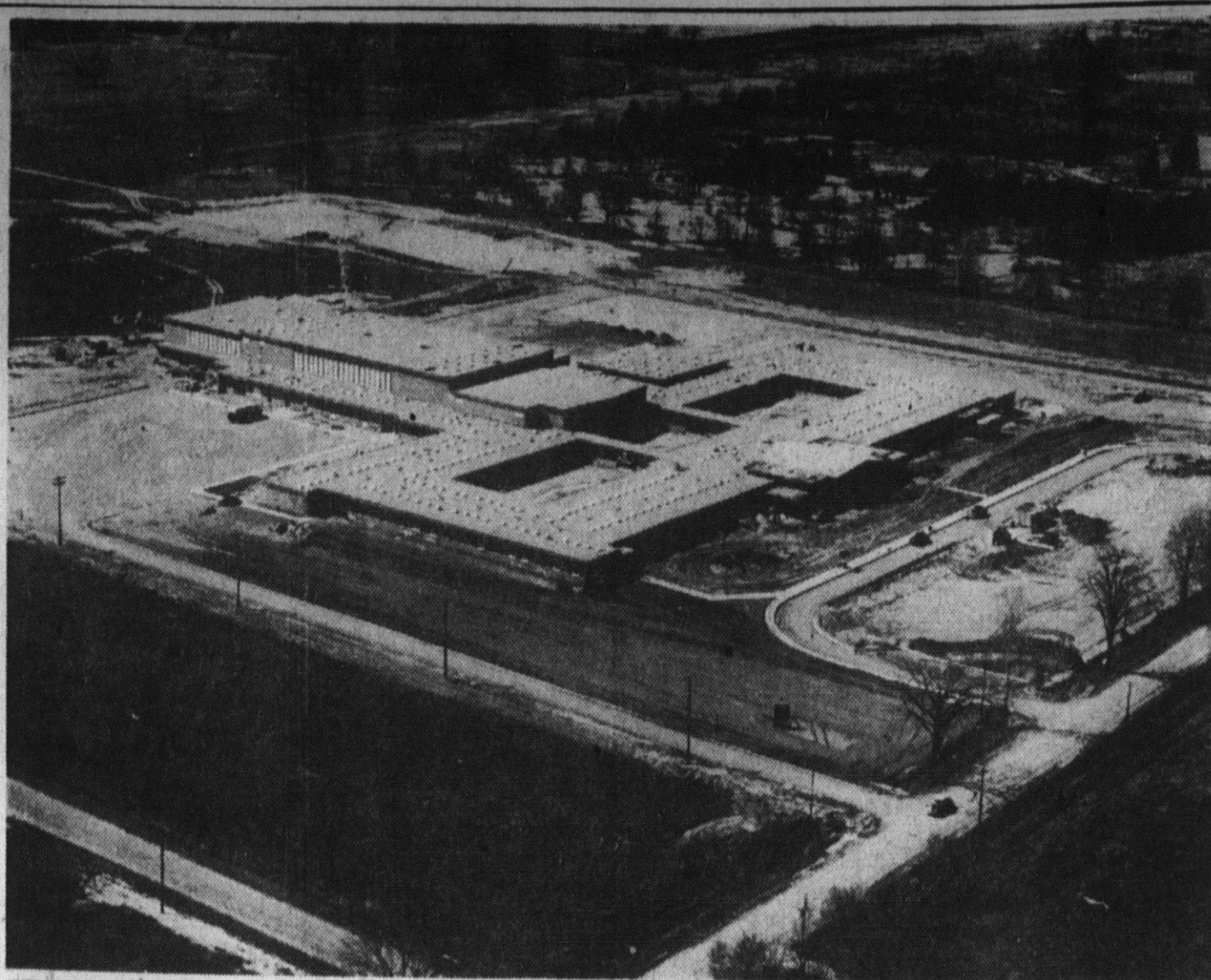

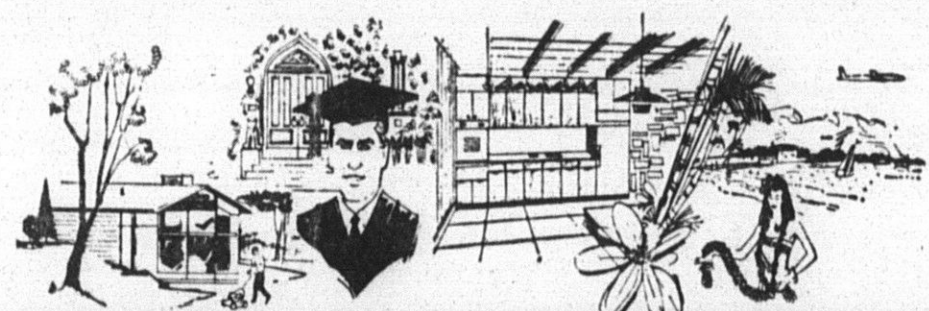

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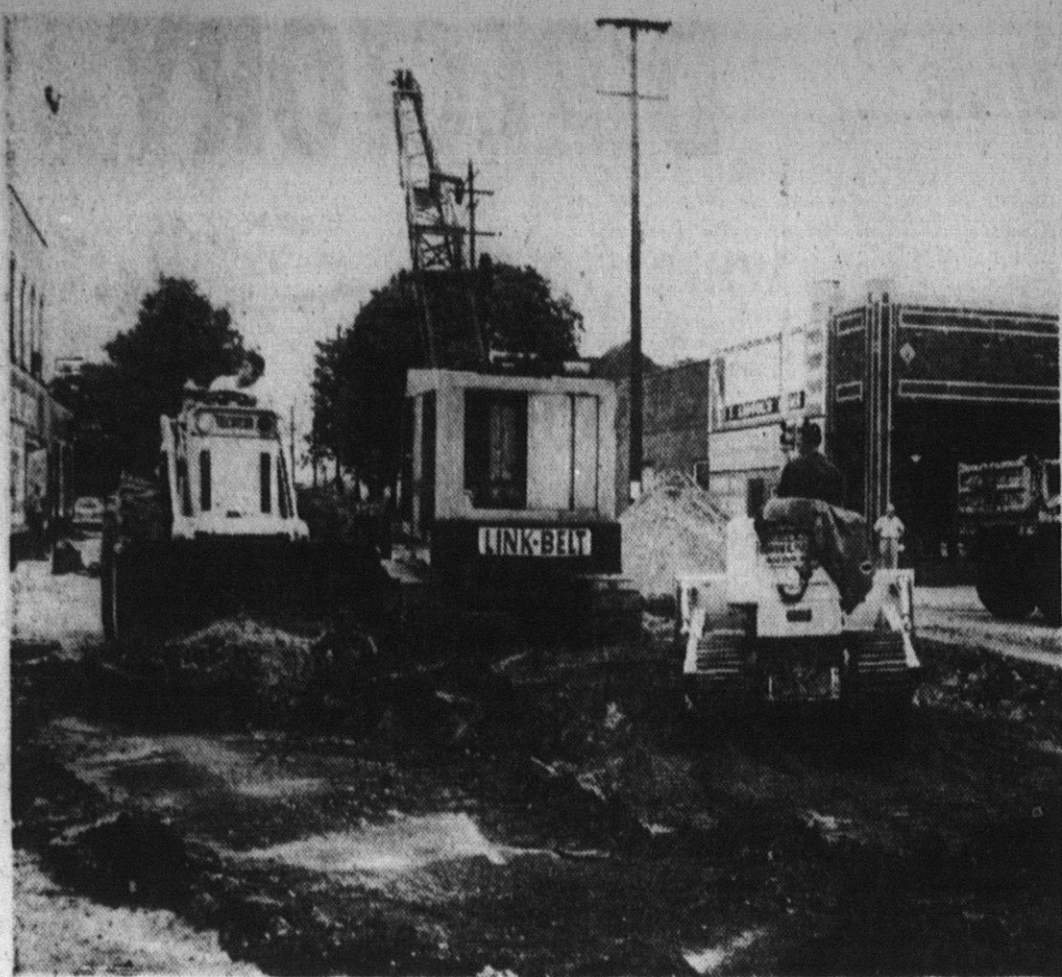

Close Portion Of Eighth Street

There will be no through traffic on Eighth St. for the remainder of the week, and possibly longer, as work crews lay both sanitary sewer and storm sewer pipe in College Ave. as part of Holland's new sewer program. Seventh St. is also closed to through traffic.

Five crews of Bowen-Fullerton-Dykhouse Co. of Grand Haven are digging trenches and laying huge pipe in various sections of the city, mostly on College Ave., and also on Central Ave. in the southern part of the city.

Crossing Eighth St. is a difficult job because of existing installations which include not only water and gas pipe, but electrical cables and traffic light cables. Because of these installations, crews could not use the "movable crib" which advances the work quite rapidly on other locations.

Plans call for laying sewer lines in College Ave. south to 16th St., then west to Central and south to 40th St. A line also will be laid in 32nd St. from Central east to Columbia, then south to 40th St. Sewer lines in the Montello Park area already have been completed. A new lift station is under construction in that part of the city.

All lines are expected to be laid this fall. Final date for completion of the entire \$1,600,000 sewer project is April 1, 1962.

In the Eighth St. area, the 36-inch sanitary sewer is laid at a depth of 14 feet, and the 30-inch storm sewer at a depth of four feet. Engineers said Ninth St. will not be closed until after Seventh St. is opened.

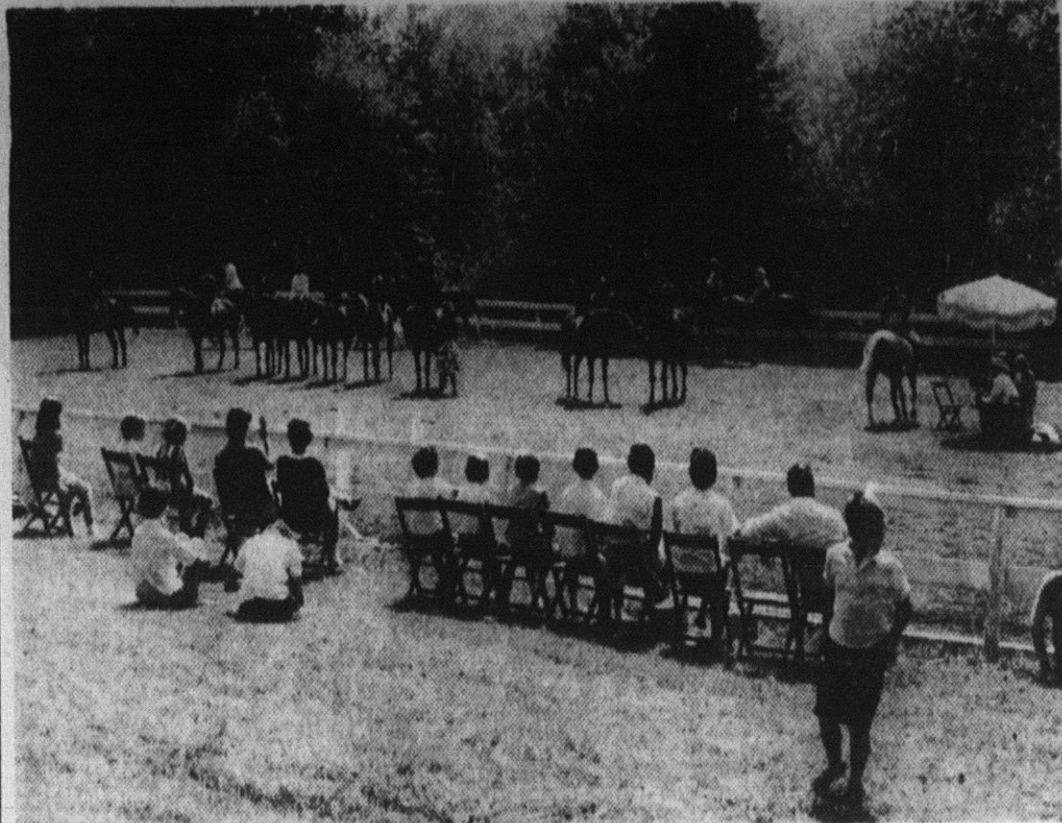
