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## Overisel Man Drowns In Pool

Had Been Living  
At Resthaven  
For Two Weeks

An Overisel man who had been living at Resthaven Home for the past two weeks drowned in a swimming pool near the home Tuesday afternoon.

The body of Gordon Nykerk, 67, was found in the pool at the Murvel Houting residence at 131 East 32nd St. about 5:15 p.m. by Houting. It was reported no one was at the Houting home at the time of the drowning. Mrs. Houting reported she left the home at 2:15 p.m.

Holland police said a neighbor noticed Nykerk at the residence about 2:25 p.m. He was reportedly carrying a towel.

Death was ruled accidental drowning by medical examiner Dr. William Westrate Jr. following a routine autopsy performed in Holland Hospital.

The pool is enclosed by a brick fence with a latch-lock gate which was closed when Mrs. Houting left the home.

Nykerk had been a resident at Resthaven at 49 East 32nd St. since July 17. His wife, Winnie, died Feb. 24, 1967.

Nykerk was a farmer in the Overisel area for many years, moving to Overisel village, 4686 142nd Ave., at his retirement. He was a member of Overisel Reformed Church and its men's Bible class and brotherhood.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. Robert (Phyllis) Nicol of Fillmore; one son, Jerry Nykerk of Fennville; three grandchildren; two brothers, Francis Nykerk of Overisel and Glenn Nykerk of Jenison; one sister, Mrs. Raymond Busscher of Overisel.

## Former Blind Broom Maker Dies at 80

WOODSTOCK, Ill. — Fred Ten Cate, 80, formerly of 29 East 18th St., Holland, died Tuesday afternoon at Memorial Hospital, Woodstock, Ill., following a short illness. He was born in East Saugatuck and had been a Holland resident for 45 years before going to Woodstock, Ill. He was a blind broom maker, having made and sold his brooms in this area for many years.

The Forrestal, now in Subic Bay, the Philippines, for repair, was damaged by fire near Saigon, Vietnam, on Saturday with a heavy loss of life.

The Ryzengas, who operate White Birch Park where their son worked before entering the service, had not received any word of their son's safety until they received the wire Wednesday. Young Ryzenga has been in the Navy for two years since graduating from West Ottawa High School.

## Guardman Wed After Long Delay

If you need Allen Teerman, 29-year-old National Guardsman of Holland, for any more riot duty, have him paged at Cape Cod, or at Expo 67.

Teerman, who is associated with his father in the hardware business here, married 19-year-old Mary Timmer, practical nurse at Holland Hospital, in a long delayed ceremony Wednesday night in Central Avenue Christian Reformed Church.

Teerman joined the Guards about a year ago but did not report immediately for the six-month training hitch. He and Mary had set their wedding date April 6, but 17 days earlier he was called to duty at Fort Lewis, Wash.

After several months there he joined the Guards at summer training July 15 at Camp Grayling. He was slated to complete that training July 29 and the couple accordingly set the new wedding date Aug. 2.

But along with other guards of Holland, Grand Haven, Muskegon and Grand Rapids, he was called out July 23 to riot duty in Detroit.

He sought a pass to keep the wedding date, but it was not until Tuesday that it came through. And he was to report back at 10 a.m. today in Detroit.

But the troops were defederalized Wednesday and he was informed at noon that he would not have to report back.

And so, Allen and Mary are on a 10-day honeymoon in the East with plans to visit New England, Cape Cod and Expo 67.

Then they will return to their home at 34 East 21st St. which Teerman acquired a year ago.

## Grand Rapids Youth Killed

JAMESTOWN — A Grand Rapids youth was killed and three others injured at 10:14 p.m. Wednesday when their car crashed through a road construction barricade into a pile of gravel on Byron Rd. just West of 16th Ave.

Dead on arrival at St. Mary's Hospital in Grand Rapids was Calvin Voetberg, 19, of 7157 Kalamazoo Ave., Grand Rapids. Two others were critically injured and a third in fair condition.

Voetberg's death marked the 12th traffic fatality for Ottawa county for 1967.

In critical condition are the driver, Brant Lanser, 18, of 223 68th Ave., Grand Rapids, who received multiple injuries, and Stewart Warsen, 19, of 6849 South Division, who received severe head injuries.

Jack Hulst, 18, of 281 68th Ave., Grand Rapids, was in fair condition with head and neck injuries.

Ottawa sheriff's officers are investigating.

## E. O. Feddick Succumbs at 60

Edwin O. Feddick, 60, of 2087 West 32nd St., was dead upon arrival at Holland Hospital Wednesday following a heart attack. He recently retired from General Electric where he had been employed in plant protection for 12 years since his retirement from the Coast Guard in 1955, after 25 years service. ## BPW Items Approved By Council

Several Board of Public Works recommendations were approved by City Council at its regular meeting Wednesday night in City Hall.

Two involved change orders in contracts. One was a change in the contract with Elzinga and Volkers in the pumping station on Waverly Rd. involving an additional cost of \$1,569, and the other was installing eight-inch gravity sewers paralleling force mains along South Shore Dr. at an additional cost of \$78,920. This contract is with Dykhouse-Bowen-Bullerton of Grand Haven.

Another clarified intent of determining charges for water and sewer connections under the alternate procedure. Owners of parcels in residential or agricultural zones with frontage in excess of twice the minimum lot width as prescribed by zoning ordinance desiring a single connection may exclude frontage abutting any surplus property which is unnecessary to provide a site for a residence, its accessory buildings and uses and required sideyards, but in no case shall the connection be for a lot of less width than prescribed as a minimum lot.

A BPW recommendation asking Council to oppose legislation that would place municipal water supplies under regulation of the Michigan Public Service Commission was referred to the city attorney with power to act. City Attorney Gordon Cunningham said he was not familiar with the current bill on the subject but that the city on previous occasions has opposed similar legislation.

Council abandoned proposed plans for constructing a sidewalk on the north side of 40th St. from Columbia to Pine Aves. after a report by the city manager which incorporated a report by Traffic Consultant Adrian Koert that there were several other safe routes for children living south of 40th St. walking to the new Maplewood school.

Approval was given a city manager's recommendation, based on a request of the chief of police, to eliminate parking by removing meters on the north side of Eighth St. between River Ave. and the new parking lot east of the police station.

Referred to Traffic Consultant Koert for study was the matter of traffic flow on River Ave. north of Eighth St. and the possibility of eliminating parking in some areas. This subject was introduced by Councilman Morris Peerbolt.

Councilman William Lamb also asked about parking congestion on 11th St. near Kollen Park in the vicinity of shuffle board courts. This matter also will be studied.

The following gifts for Herk Public Library were announced: a number of medical and other miscellaneous books from Pearl Hart; a microfilm and transcribed copy of the 1820 census of three townships in Ottawa county for the genealogical collection from Violet Hansen, and three films from Consumers Power Co. They were accepted with thanks.

Council accepted a plat designated as Euna Vista addition No. 1, filed by Mr. and Mrs. John Keuning.

A claim against the city filed by John Dannenberg, 287 West 19th St., was referred to the city insurance carrier.

Council approved certifications for Councilman Dyk, Holland Litho Service, engineering department, \$2,400; Councilman Lamb of Lamb, Inc., fire, park, police and cemetery departments, \$17.68.

A letter from Lucille Donivan declining her appointment to the Board of Appeals was read and placed on file.

Oaths of office were filed for George H. Dalman, panel of space heating examiners, and Richard W. Smith, Board of Appeals.

## Local Attorney Uncovers Error

A Holland attorney has uncovered a "bug" in the state income tax program that should be acted on in the fall session of the Michigan legislature.

Attorney Donald Hann, State Legal Counsel for the Jaycees, discovered Monday that service clubs are subject to taxation under the present state income tax program.

Hann notified State Senator Harold Volkema, R-Holland, and Rep. James S. Farnsworth, R-55th district, both of whom gave assurances this was incorrect, but promised to introduce an amendment to the state tax bill if it were true.

A state revenue department official got out the books and verified Hann's finding, notifying Hann today.

Hann said the legislators promised to sponsor the amendment when the State Legislature convenes in the fall. Service clubs, under the present tax bill, would be taxed, effective Jan. 1.

Council awarded low bid of West Shore Construction Co. for the 1967 paving program for \$228,939.20, lowest of three bids submitted. Later in the meeting Council adopted a resolution calling for all paving requests to be submitted by the second meeting of October for the following year. In introducing the resolution, Councilman William Lamb cited merit of a cutoff date to get full benefit of early bids.

Contract for the city's winter supply of calcium chloride in 100-pound bags went to Haviland Products Co. for \$42 per ton. Haviland was one of four bidders citing identical bids and the order was placed with this company, based on past delivery experience. A fifth bid listed \$42.90 a ton.

Council accepted low bid of Vander Hulst and Branderhorst for construction a 150 by 150 foot all-purpose play area at Holland Heights School. It was the lower of two bids.

## Several Bids Okayed By Council

City Council approved four bids and rejected one at its regular meeting Wednesday night.

The one rejected involved the winter's supply of rock salt. Council had been inclined to favor a quotation of Diamond Crystal Salt Co. of \$13.40 a ton picking up the salt at its depot in Holland. But a representative of Morton Salt Co. protested because such service was not specifically included in the specifications, and the Morton bid of \$14.20 was lower than the regular Diamond Crystal bid of \$14.40.

So the city will readvertise for bids, specifying additional quotations on FOB warehouse and FOB supplier's depot.

Council approved low bid of Nath-Sol Refining Co. for approximately 26,000 gallons of No. 5 fuel oil for Civic Center of \$0.874 per gallon. There were three other identical bids of \$0.875 per gallon.

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On request of all persons in-

involved, Council withdrew plans for installing pavement and sidewalks on East 24th St. from Lincoln to Apple Aves. because bids were higher than original estimates.

With no objections voiced at public hearings, Council approved construction of a water main and sanitary sewer in 40th St. from Ottawa Ave. 660 feet west, and paving the same distance.

A petition for water service in 48th St. in the vicinity of Central Ave. was referred to the city manager.

A petition requesting that the roadway of 24th St. be continued between Homestead and Ottawa Aves. was referred to the Planning Commission.

Council scheduled a public hearing Sept. 13 on vacating the west 200 feet of 37th St. between Pine and Washington Aves., provided an adequate turnaround is established.

Council ordered all delinquent utility bills remaining unpaid as of July 31, 1967, placed on the fall tax rolls.

## Local Guard Unit Back In Holland

Unit Returns to City  
After 11 Days of Riot  
Patrol Duty in Detroit

Holland's national guardsmen from Company B, 3rd Brigade, 126th Inf. SRF, returned to Holland Armory today after spending 11 days in riot-torn Detroit. The local guardsmen started arriving in Holland around 10 a.m. today with the remainder coming in an hour later. The local men, who were called out July 23, were federalized July 24, and defederalized Wednesday. Back on state status, according to 1st Sgt. Ray Naber, the local Company men were released today.

Naber said the 173 enlisted men and three officers left Detroit at 7:10 a.m. today with the majority of them travelling in buses and the others following in Army trucks.

The Holland guardsmen had been headquartered in Detroit's Central High School with about 2,800 other national guardsmen, operating as a unit.

No sickness nor injury was reported to Holland men who were using live ammunition while stationed in Detroit.

Naber said the morale of the Holland men was tremendously high for the duration of the 11-day ordeal. He added he was "real pleased with the way the men operated. They did an outstanding job."

"Discipline was good and the men put to excellent use the training they had received," Naber stated.

Commenting on the present Detroit situation, Naber said some troops remain in the area; however, the majority are being released. "It had been very, very quiet during the last several days," Naber reported, "with only minor flareups, but everything is in pretty good shape."

The local guardsmen now resume regular operation and training. Naber pointed out their next weekend drill is scheduled Aug. 12-13 at Fort Custer and "ironically enough they'll be undergoing riot control training."

## Record Crowds Attend Opening Of County Fair

The Ninth Annual Ottawa County Fair had record opening day attendance Monday with an estimated 10,972 persons attending.

The new grandstand which increased seating capacity to 4,000 was filled to capacity for two performances of Dan Fleenor's Hurricane Hell Drivers. This is the first year the fair has featured a free grandstand policy.

The fair, located at the fairgrounds on Ottawa Beach Rd., set several records this year according to Fair manager Cliff Steketee of Holland. This year's Fair has the largest midway ever with thrill rides for the old and young alike. There are a record number of exhibits this year and the largest number of entries for the harness racing.

The Fair is open daily from 9 a.m. until midnight. Saturday is the final day of the event.

And so, Council approved the recommendation to discontinue the sign.



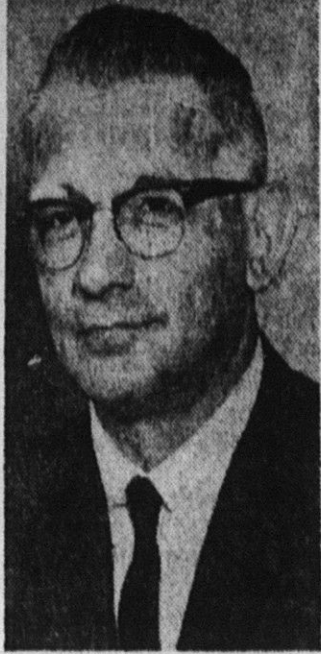

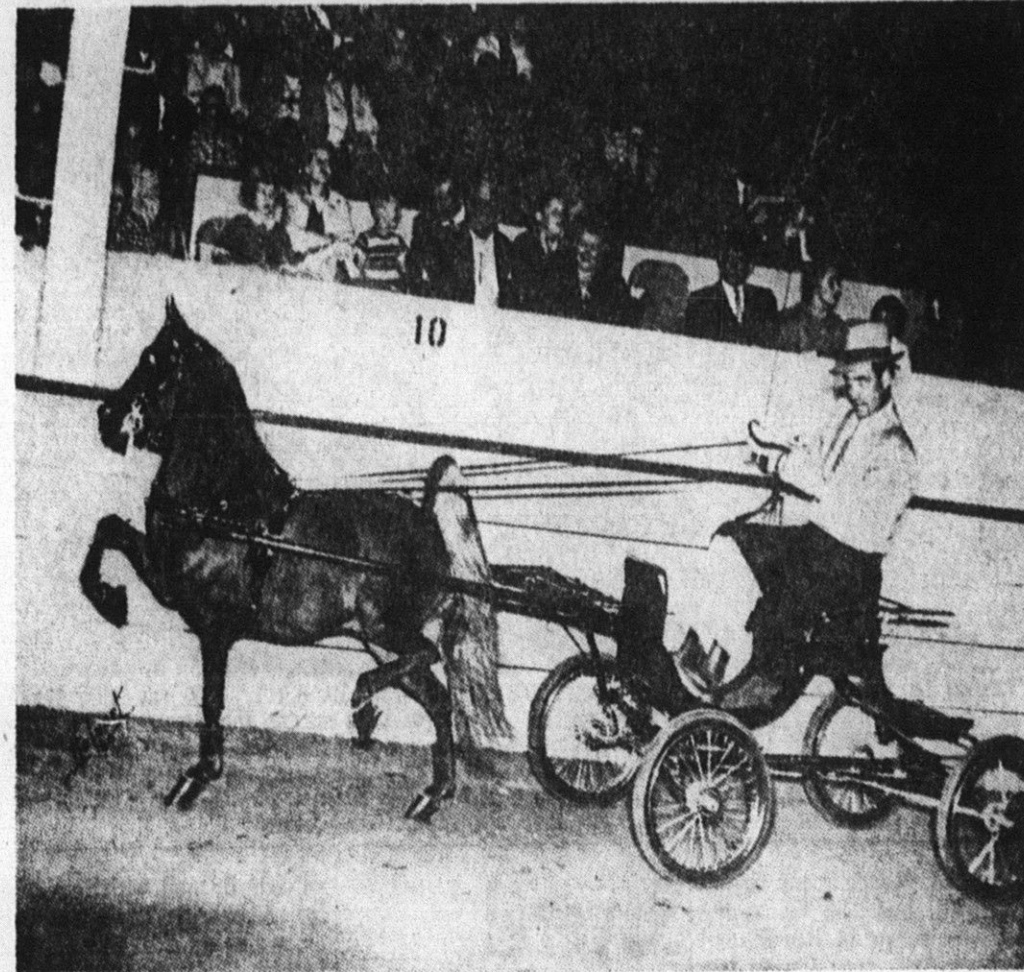

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#### A LAW WE NEEDED

This column has on several occasions called attention to statistics that tell us that in excess of fifty per cent of fatalities on the road are caused by drinking. Secretary of State Hare had made it his business to get this information to the public, hoping that it might stimulate some action. Now the Governor has signed the implied consent legislation giving the state a new weapon against inebriated drivers.

In signing the bill, Governor Romney called attention to the statistics we have often quoted, and voiced the hope that the new legislation would "cut into the loss of life, limb, and property."

We commend the legislature for this action, though we are at a loss to understand why the action was so long in coming. Secretary of State James M. Hare has pushed for an implied consent law for seven years. And as chairman of the State Traffic Safety Commission, he was in a position to know the seriousness of the slaughter on the road.

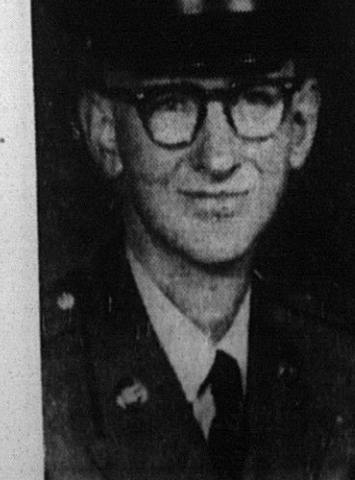
We want our law enforcement officers to do a good job and to cut the fatality rate, but we have been amiss in giving them the legislation that would help them to do the job. The implied consent law is a step in the right direction. And this ought not to be the place to stop. We need to update our legislation relating to traffic and all violations.

We miss the point that laws are related to the economy, and this is certainly true of fines imposed for infractions of the law. If the penalty is going to be a deterrent, then the punishment in dollars ought to reflect the value of that dollar in our present economy. Otherwise we will have to admit that we have actually weakened our laws. Law enforcement officials need our help, and that includes strong legislation to deal with problems of today and every day.

## Sunday School Wed in Afternoon Rites

### Lesson

Sunday, Aug. 6  
The One True God  
Acts 17:22-31  
By C. P. Dame  
Today we are told that the modern man differs from the men who loved and lived in times past. In our study in Acts we meet some very familiar types—people very much like the people we meet daily now. This lesson tells us how Paul met and preached to intellectuals—well we have our intellectuals today, all kinds and types. The gospel is for them. They need it.

I. Christian workers ought to get stirred up more. Civil authorities led Paul and Silas out of jail in Philippi because Paul stood up for his rights as a Roman citizen. From Philippi the missionaries went to Thessalonica where Paul preached three sabbaths and won converts. From Thessalonica the missionaries went to Berea — Paul was forced to leave both places. Athens was next.

Paul walked about the city and saw many idols which showed that the city was religious. Those idols troubled Paul who spoke in the synagogue to Jews and the devout Gentiles. In the market place Paul contacted the Greek intellectuals, the Epicureans and the Stoics. These curious men brought Paul before the Areopagus, which is the Greek for Mars' hill, where he preached to a court composed of thirty members.

II. The intellectuals of every age need the gospel. When Paul preached to the Jews he used the Old Testament, when he spoke to the Gentiles he talked about natural religion. In the opening of his address Paul referred to the statue of the unknown god which he had seen, Paul said he had come to tell about him, asserting that this God whom he knew is the Creator, the Sustainer and the Judge, citing his relation to the world and to mankind.

Paul contradicted materialism, pantheism, polytheism, atheism, which indicated that he also rejected modern communism. In addition Paul also spoke of man's relationship to God. Mankind is one in origin, he is God's offspring, which their own poets taught. Paul talked about sin as being an offense against a personal Judge who summons all to repentance. We will all be judged by Jesus Christ who was raised from the dead. The Athenian intellectuals heard the gospel which modern intellectuals also need.

III. There were various responses to the gospel, — three kinds. Some mocked and we still have mockers today. And some postponed the matter saying, "We will hear thee concerning this yet again," and some people today say, "Tomorrow" just what the devil wants them to say. Some however believed "among them was Dionysius, the Areopagite, and a woman named Damaris, and others with them."

Did Paul fail in Athens? Look at the words "certain men" and "others" and you have the answer — Paul won converts and that means success, not failure. May your congregation win as many converts Sunday as Paul won at Athens—and even more! Perhaps you can invite a non-church member to go to church next Sunday and expose him to the gospel.

## Ottawa County Farm News

This past few weeks we have had reports from many homeowners regarding their raspberry plants. The difficulty is dying canes about the time the berries start ripening. This condition might be caused by two different diseases—one, Anthracnose; the other Spur Blight. Fortunately, both can be treated the same way.

Anthracnose will show up on new canes as a grey elongated spot. Spur Blight is not easy to detect among the new canes. However, there will be an infected area somewhere where the spur emerges from the cane. This could be whitish or greyish in color. If this condition exists all old cane should be removed from the planting immediately after fruiting. The plants could then be sprayed with a fungicide such as Captan or Ferbam, or any fungicide containing copper. This should be done repeatedly during the growth season.

Next spring an application of lime sulfur just as leaves are emerging, is a must. If this program is followed systematically over the years you will eliminate these two diseases.

What price leadership? For nearly 90 young Michigan farmers it means spending 14 weeks during a three-year period participating in the Kellogg Farmers' Study Program at Michigan State University.

The unique program is aimed at helping these young men become better leaders. The young farmers are taught practical application of economics, political science, philosophy, sociology and communications.

Agriculture is not being taught. Instead, we're telling these young farmers something about the forces that affect agriculture. In other words, we're trying to develop leaders who can help shape the future of Michigan's agriculture and rural communities. Participating from Ottawa County in this leadership training program are Ted Bosgraaf, who is completing his second year and Roger Holmes of Nunica, completing his first year.

The USDA has estimated the wheat crop at about 1.5 billion bushels, easily the largest crop ever produced in this country. The crop is nearly 20 per cent above last year. The wheat crop should be large enough to meet domestic and export requirements and allow some buildup in our inventory position from the present 400 million bushels by July 1, 1968.

Michigan wheat prices are particularly affected by the size of the crop in Europe because this is our major commercial export market for soft wheat.

The large crops at home and abroad will keep Michigan wheat prices under pressure. In late June, contracting prices on new crop wheat for July-August delivery were around \$1.35 in Southern Michigan. Wheat prices are not far above the loan rate, which is \$1.25. But more significantly, the USDA is apparently following a policy to keep market prices somewhat over the loan rate.

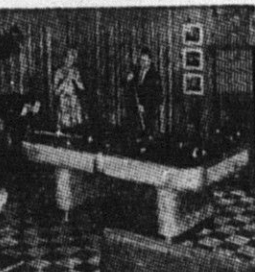

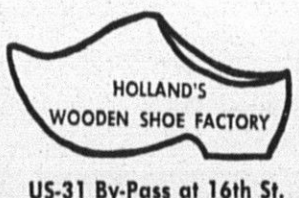

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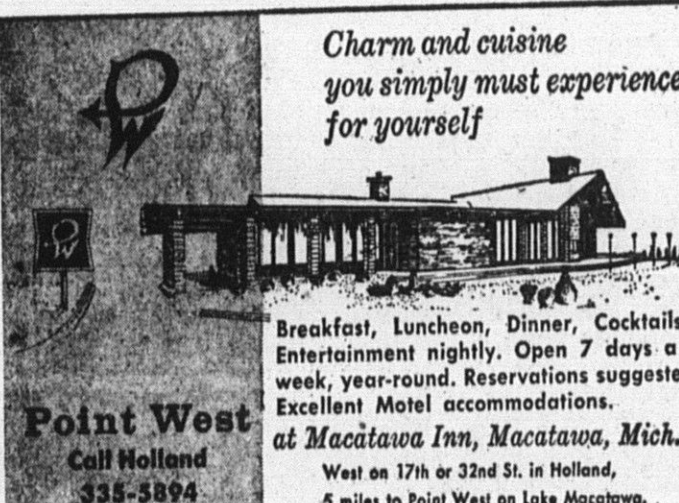

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## Sikkel's Note Tells of Riot In Detroit

Several sidelights in the recent riots in Detroit were reviewed in a letter received by The Sentinel from Lt. Col. Bill Sikkel of the Second Battalion, 126th Infantry, which is headquartered in Muskegon. The group includes two companies from Muskegon, and one each from Grand Haven and Big Rapids.

The Grand Haven company which has 30 men living in the Holland-Zeeland area, and Holland's Company B are located in Central High School in Detroit according to the letter which was written Wednesday afternoon. Sikkel's operations officer is Major John Schutten of the Holland-Suco Co.

The letter in part read "Thus far our experience has been fatiguing long hours, deployment of troops as the situation needs, plus heat, dust and makeshift quarters. The present finds the military machine running smoothly with food, rest, cleanliness and duty following a pattern. "My staff surgeon, Capt. William Harvey of Grand Haven, and I made a complete run and our area of responsibility this morning plus tracking down 17 men who had been trucked off to Hamtramck Sunday night. "My very first encounter at the Hamtramck police headquarters was with Inspector Jablowski who asked "Do you know Ernie Bear?" I gather that Lt. Bear and the inspector are officers in a Police Association and I was asked to "please send my regards."

"A humorous sidelight in light of all the paths was in one of the areas where business places and homes have been hastily marked "black," "half black" or "Soul Brother." This place was marked "we speak Polish." It was not damaged."

The obvious question, the letter continued was "when do we go home." Who knows. I feel that the worst is over. "To Capt. Bill Stuart of the Salvation Army and to his fellow Salvation Army Board members, Lt. Col. Sikkel said that their contributions to them had been above and beyond the call of duty. The men and women worked around the clock completely, committed to include no break in stride during periods of sniper fire."

The only good that can come out of all this waste is the hope that the stories and pictures will demonstrate that law and order must be respected and that violence, plunder and pillage proves nothing nor solves anything, Sikkel wrote. In many cases it has just backfired and resulted in the loss of personal property.

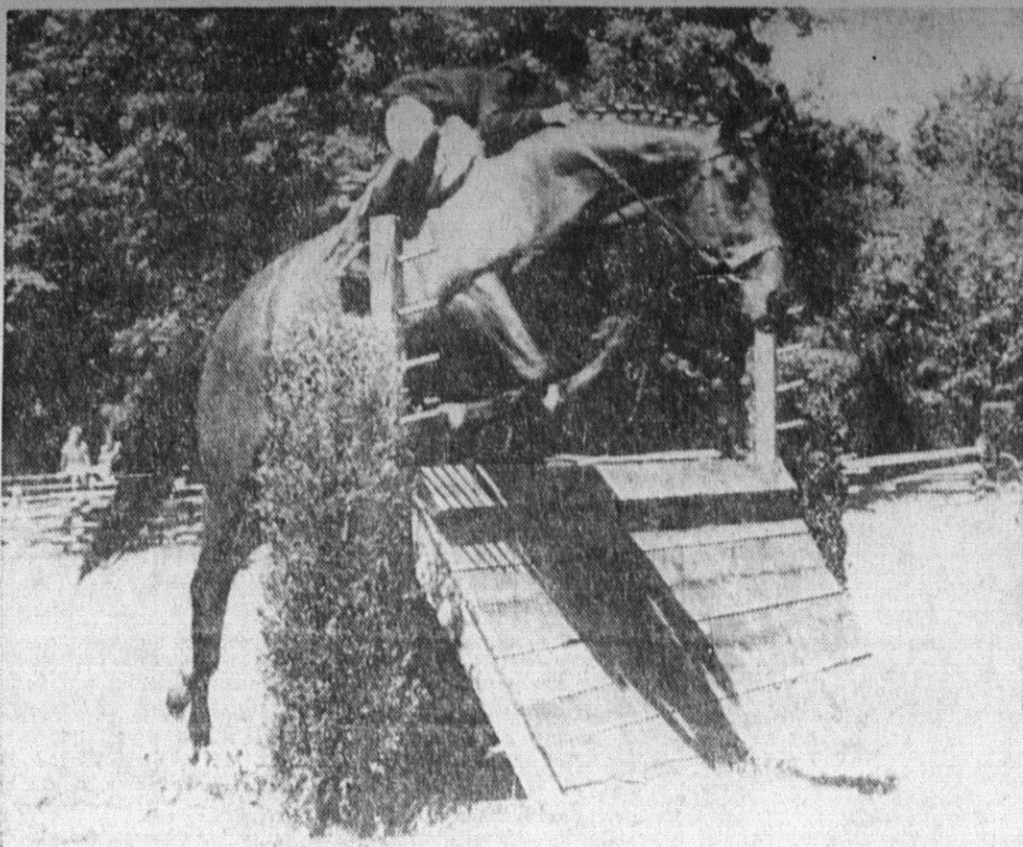

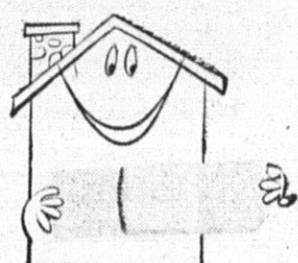

## Visitors Explain Karate, Flower Arranging, Dances

The visiting students from Japan staged "Japanese Night" Tuesday evening in the lounge of Phelps Hall at Hope College. The purpose of the program was to introduce some aspects of Japanese culture to their American families and Hope professors and students.

The walls of the room were hung with posters illustrating famous spots in Japan. Fans, dolls and woodblock prints which the students had brought with them were displayed around the lounge. Guests were able to sample ocha or green tea, Japanese cookies, and yokan which is a kind of bean jelly. Instruction was offered in the art of origami — birds and boxes made by folding a square piece of colored paper.

Master of ceremonies for the evening was Jui Chang Chou. The first part of the program was devoted to a demonstration of the tea ceremony, chanoyu, presented by Miss Mitsue Sakusa and Miss Atsumi Sato.

Miss Noriko Murabe, the narrator, explained how the tea ceremony originated in Kyoto over 400 years ago. The ceremonial ritual of preparing and drinking the tea in accordance with strict rules not only teaches correct manners but also brings peace of mind to the routine of everyday life. It is considered a prerequisite for well-bred and educated Japanese women, giving them grace and poise.

Following the tea ceremony, the group sang a couple of Japanese folk songs. They also taught their guests the song, Sakura Sakura, which tells of the beauty of cherry blossoms in springtime.

Miss Mitsuko Ota and Miss Kazuko Ishihara presented three traditional Japanese dances — Gionkouta, Sakura Sakura, and Umenoharu. The first takes its name from the famed Gion entertainment district in Kyoto while the latter depicts the beauties of spring. As Miss Ota explained, this classical form of dancing is practiced by only a few Japanese today. Like the tea ceremony, it teaches correct deportment and attempts to bring about an inner feeling of tranquility.

Miss Hiroko Tajima gave a demonstration of flower arranging while Miss Murabe interpreted. Every flower arrangement, she explained, has three main points representing heaven, man and earth. Flowers and foliage are then added to harmonize and balance these points. The art of flower arrangement or ikebana attempts to bring man into closer communion with nature and is considered an essential part of a young woman's education.

The highlight of the evening was a karate match between Masazo Maekawa and Kenji Saito. Although karate is usually thought of as a means of self-defense, its real purpose is to train the mind, they said.

Yutaka Suzuki entertained the guests by performing a comic dance, yasuki-bushi. The dance portrayed a fisherman trying to catch some slippery eels.

The final portion of the program was a slide show of famous places in Kyoto, Nara,

and Tokyo. Zenro Genta served as narrator.

The evening was concluded by Toshiki Yamamoto who expressed the group's gratitude for the friendliness and hospitality they have experienced so far during their stay.

Wednesday the group travelled to Lansing to visit the Michigan Supreme Court and Michigan State University. Saturday they will begin a two-week stay with their American families.

Last Spring the Woodwind Quintet presented a series of student ensembles at schools throughout the Holland area.

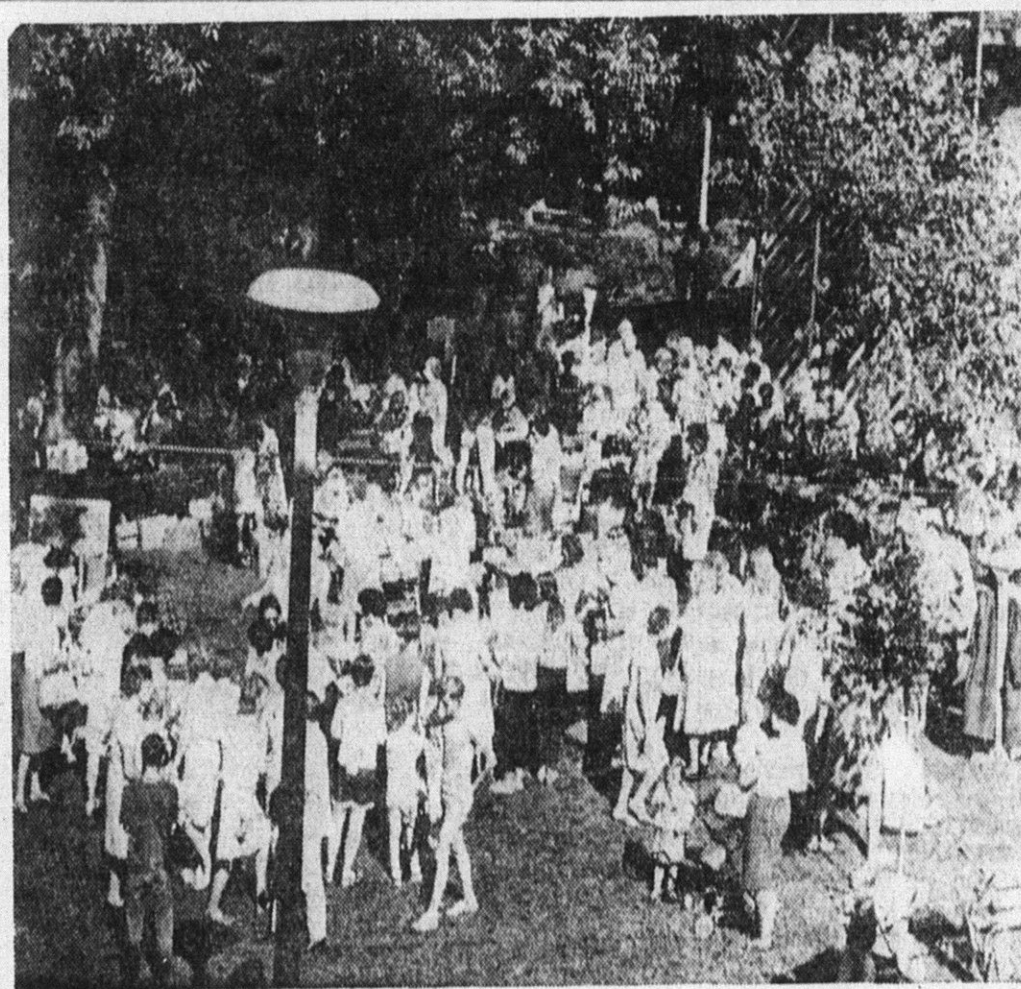

## Milk Prices Increased Cent a Quart

Milk prices in Holland generally went up a cent a quart and two cents a half-gallon Tuesday.

It was in keeping with an increase in the cost of raw milk from \$6.10 to \$6.40 a hundred-weight set by the Michigan Milk Producers Association (MMPA).

Elsewhere in Michigan, the increase in retail prices is about three cents a half gallon.

In Detroit, J. E. Stedman, head of the food industries division of the Greater Detroit Board of Commerce, said retail prices were boosted to cover increases in packaging and processing costs. This also affects prices of cottage cheese, ice cream and other dairy products.

Jack W. Barnes, general manager of the MMPA, said the increase will be an incentive for state farmers whose numbers have been decreasing.

The number of milk processing plants in Holland also has been steadily decreasing.

Harvey Scholten of Rivulet Hurst Dairy said the one-cent a quart increase does not cover all current increasing costs, but local retail suppliers were concerned with keeping milk prices as low as possible.

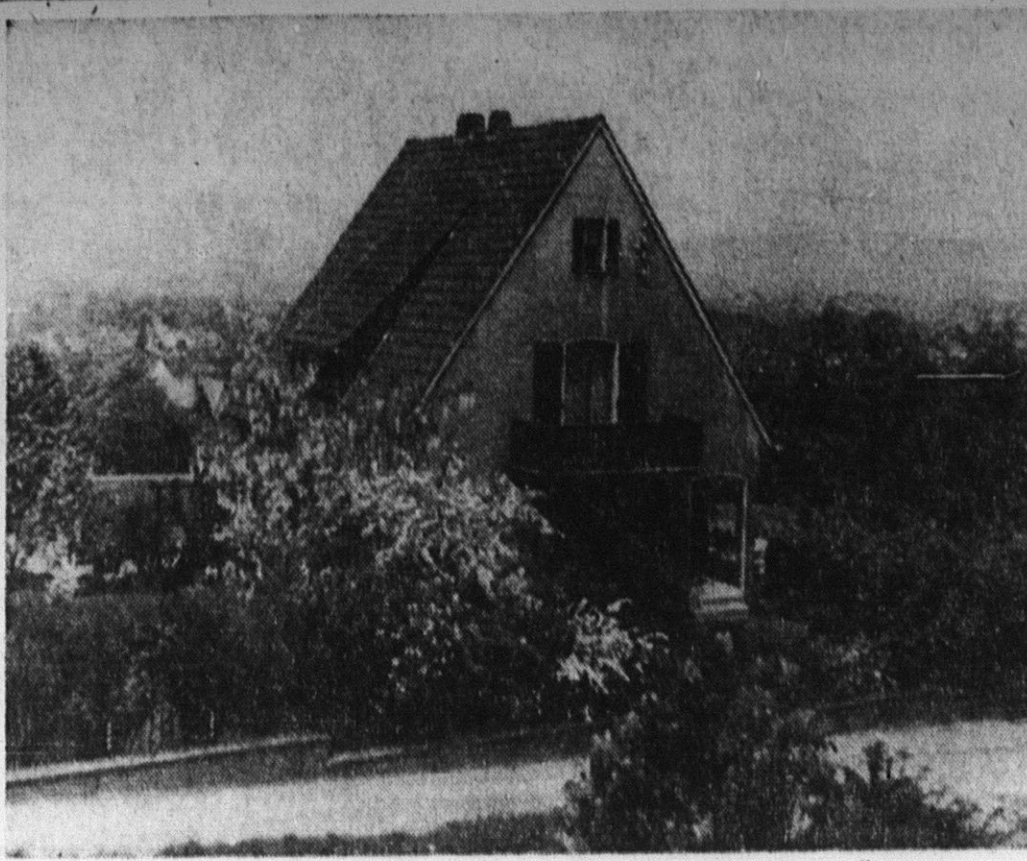

Dear Community,

So much has happened since the last time I wrote, that I hardly know where to begin. I guess it is best to start with the week-end of July 15th when Bad Oeynhausen held their 110 year old Shutzen Fest. The Shutzen Fest is a carnival with folk dancing, costumes, singing, rides and games for people of all ages. The last day of the Fest, the men all join in the sharp-shooting contest. The winner is crowned "King" and gets to pick his own "Queen." Together the king and queen reign over the ball held in their honor, and over the events of the next year, until a new king and queen are again crowned on the final day of the Fest.

On the 18th of July, the entire group of Americans and Germans traveled to the Teutoburger forest, in order to see Hermann's Denkmal. This is a memorial to Hermann the Cherusker, who defeated the Roman legions in the Teutoburger forest in the year 9 after Christ. The monument is 178 feet tall, and when you go up into it, you can see for miles, and it is very beautiful.

July 20, Thursday, the group toured the Eickmeyer Chocolate Factory in Herford. It was interesting to watch the many processes included in making chocolate, and the free samples at the end were delicious.

On Saturday, after living in Germany for two weeks, my family decided that I had eaten enough German food, and that it was my turn to cook an American meal. It proved very interesting to go to a German Store and attempt to find the same things we have at home. The entire meal was a success, however, and my family tried a little bit of everything, the same way I experiment with all of the foods here in Germany.

At this time, my sister, Gesela, and I are preparing for our trip which begins on July 29. It will take us through Köln, Würzburg, Backeralm, München, and Frankfurt. We will also take a boat trip down the Rhein River and stop at many other smaller, but interesting cities. During our trip I will attempt to send some postcards, keeping you informed about our activities.

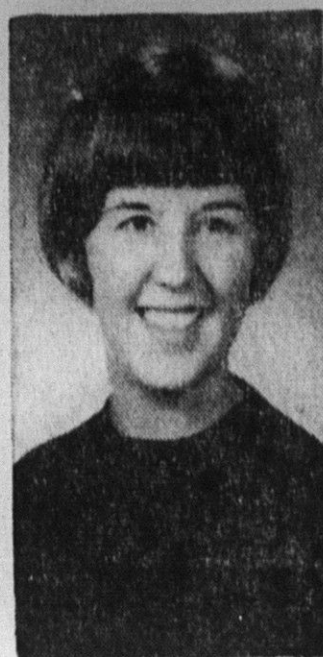

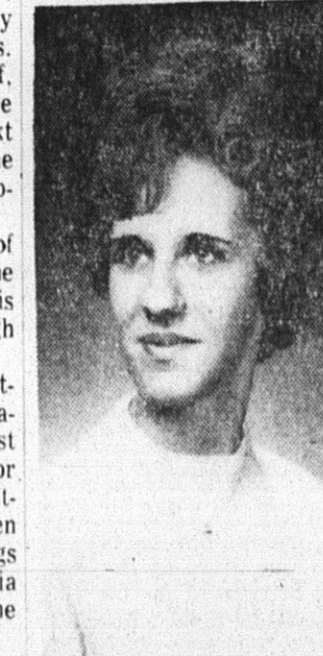
