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Petitioner Wants Safety

One-Way Street Plan Challenged

Zoning Bid Is Upheld By Council

City Council voted down a Planning Commission recommendation denying rezoning of a 41-acre area on the northwest corner of 32nd St. and the US-31 bypass by a 5 to 4 vote Wednesday night.

The request had come from Meyer Weiner Co. to rezone the plot from A-1 residential to A-3 residential and C-4 commercial to allow construction of a shopping center complex and apartment buffer.

Council's action sends the matter back to the Planning Commission for restudy and hearings. The Planning Commission had cited traffic concern and the fact that other areas nearby already had been rezoned, namely the Meijer property at 16th and Waverly and the Shubow Oliver property at M-21 and Waverly.

A Meyer Weiner attorney explained the company's holdings in Michigan and Illinois, its 20 years in commercial development, and its plans for development with proper concern for green belt and ecology. The area in question is diagonally across from Holiday Inn.

John Van Appledorn, representing property owners, said there was little or no opposition to the proposed development in the neighborhood.

A proposed no-left turn for northbound traffic at the corner was mentioned, but the Meyer Weiner attorney expressed hope that it would be a controlled left turn, not a prohibitive one.

Another Planning Commission report submitting a revision to the master plan for that area of the city lying south of 32nd St. and southeast of the US-31 bypass was accepted for consideration and referred to the city attorney for preparation for ordinance.

Councilman John Bloemendaal was appointed delegate and City Manager William L. Bopf alternate to the Michigan Municipal League annual meeting.

Council approved the attended parking lot ordinance requiring persons parking cars in an attended lot to leave the prescribed fee or charge in an envelope left on cars parked there after regular hours. Failure to pay fees will result in a summons.

A report from Gabriel, Roeder, Smith and Co., consulting actuaries, submitting results of the 27th annual actuarial valuation of the city in the Michigan Municipal Employees Retirement System was filed.

A petition requesting sanitary sewer service in 26th St. from Concord Dr. to Azalea Ave. was referred to the city manager for study.

Council granted licenses to solicit funds for the Disabled American Veterans for forget-me-not sales Aug. 17 and 18, and to the Greater Michigan chapter of the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation Sept. 10-15.

Announcement was made that the State Highway Department has changed its maintenance formula regarding the traffic flasher at 19th St. and M-40 and the state will pay 100 per cent of the cost of maintenance as opposed to the previous shared responsibility.

Council approved a revocable license agreement with owners of property at 246 River Ave. to construct a mansard type roof protruding into the city right of way.

It also okayed \$250 for a Human Services Fair Oct. 25 in Civic Center and authorized taking bids on a new boiler for Netherlands Museum.

Dryer Swerves, Hits House

ZEELAND — Herbert Jaeger, 29, of 9238 Bingham St., sustained fractured ribs and possible internal injuries Sunday at 12:29 a.m. when he swerved his car to avoid an animal and struck a house.

Jaeger was admitted to Zeeland Community Hospital where his condition Monday was listed as "fair."

Ottawa County deputies said Jaeger was westbound along Port Sheldon when he swerved to avoid the animal and went off the roadway, hitting the house of Arthur Marling, 5850 Port Sheldon. Occupants of the house were not injured. Damage to the structure was estimated at \$5,000.

Concern for traffic safety and the need for the full story on one-way streets for Holland prompted a petition drive to allow citizens to vote on one-way streets.

Mrs. William Westrate Jr., who spearheaded a petition drive in October 1972 that led to the public vote Tuesday, said she didn't believe the citizens were told the full story on one-way streets for Holland.

"I'm not against one-way streets per se but I don't think we have a need for them in Holland," she said.

"I don't feel there has been any east-west traffic problems. We need an additional bridge at the north end (River Ave.) Because there has been a change does not mean progress has been made," she added.

She claimed the one-way system was adversely affecting business establishments on the system and cited the closing of a service station on River Ave., a pizza store on Seventh St., a gift shop, a jewelry store and the moving of a paint store. She claimed other merchants in the downtown business district were experiencing losses.

She charged the accident rate on the one-way streets increased to a rate that prompted police to launch a safety campaign. She said the accident rate declined during the campaign but increased later.

Mrs. Westrate believes the citizens should have been told of the master street plan which she says calls for making 16th and 17th Sts. one way east and west and Pine and River Aves. one way north and south.

She charged that residents of Ninth St. were "given no consideration whatsoever" when the one-way system was implemented.

She challenged statistics and costs being used by a citizens committee favoring one-way streets. She took issue with a figure purporting to be the cost of reconstruction. She claimed more than half of the \$735,000 figure represents money the State Highway Department had earmarked for improvements to Seventh and Ninth Sts. in the next ten years.

"The day was ideal and the sale was very successful," Mrs. Diekema said.

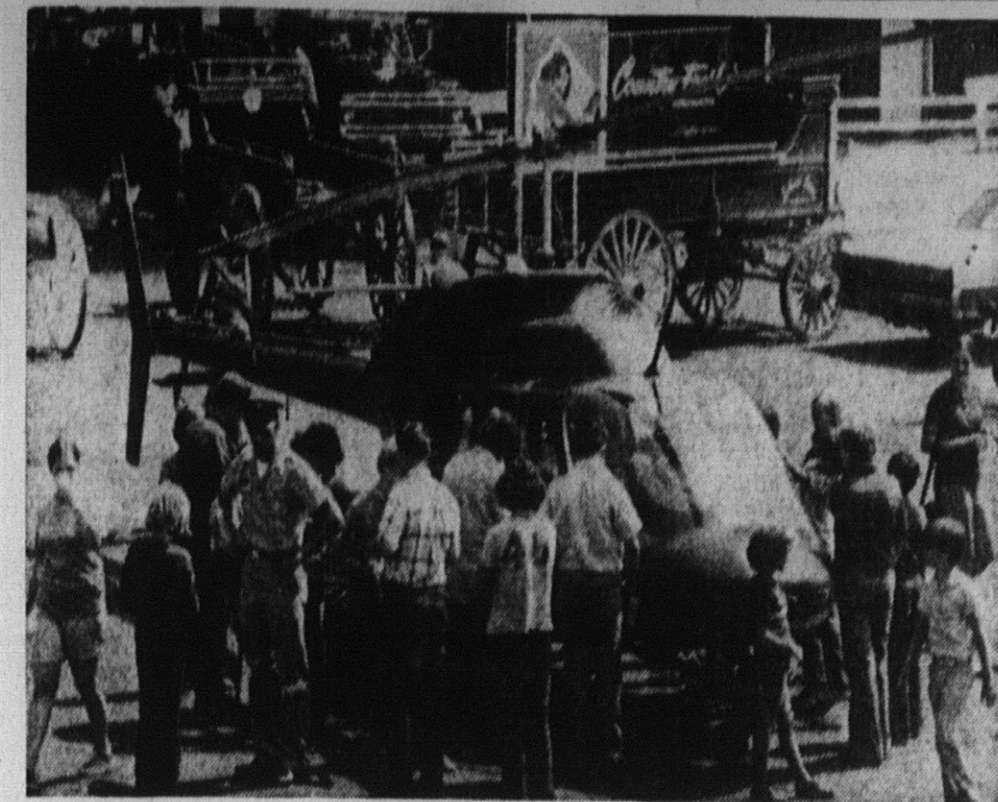

Council Unanimously Urges 'Yes' Vote

Wants to Retain One-Way Streets

By a unanimous 9-0 vote, City Council Wednesday night adopted a resolution urging Holland citizens to vote yes to continue the one-way street system in the Aug. 7 vote.

The resolution, read by Councilman John Bloemendaal, listed nine specific reasons for continuing the system which has been in operation almost two years.

The resolution also acknowledged work done by the Citizens for Progress committee and others and pointed out that the plan was studied for years, thoroughly reviewed, and implemented after several months of additional public notice, and that the plan received no opposition until it became effective.

The nine points follow:

1. The one-way street system has resulted in a reduction in accidents in the Central Business District by 20 per cent.
2. The present one-way street system is accomplishing this reduction in traffic accidents while handling an increase in traffic of approximately 8 per cent over 1971.

Long-Range Hospital Plan Lists Two-Stage Expansion

City Council Wednesday night took under advisement a long-range plan for Holland City Hospital which calls for a two-stage expansion program covering a 10-year period.

The expansion plan calls for an addition to the south side of the present hospital building to provide new, expanded emergency, outpatient and laboratory facilities. It would permit relocation of the main entrance, lobby and business office and more efficient patient access from the parking area.

The first stage construction, recommended for completion in 1978, would increase hospital bed capacity from 198 to 226 by adding three floors to the 1969 west wing.

The second stage of the development would include completely new surgery, intensive and coronary care units, expanded radiology department, additional beds for psychiatric and limited care patients and expanded facilities for parking. These elements would be completed by 1983 and raise the total bed capacity to 250.

The 300-page report, drafted by TriBrook Group Inc., Management Consultants of Illinois after more than six months of in-depth study, lists total capital requirement for construction and modernization in 1978 at \$6.7 million including estimated cost of continued inflation. Stage two construction scheduled for completion in 1983 would cost an additional \$4.5 million. TriBrook associates conducted more than 130 interviews in Holland for the study.

Board Approves Lunch Program

At a special meeting Monday night, the Board of Education authorized a pilot type A cold lunch program for elementary schools which will meet or exceed all U.S. Department of Agriculture requirements.

The program will start as soon as possible after the opening of schools in September.

The board authorized a contractual relationship with ARA, a national vending firm which has an outlet in Grand Rapids serving Grand Rapids schools. It also services Muskegon Heights schools and is adding Muskegon schools in September. It also services industrial plants including Parke Davis in Holland.

A type A cold lunch specifies a balanced meal of a half pint milk; two ounces of meat, fish or cheese; ¾ cup vegetables or fruits, one slice bread and a teaspoon of butter or fortified margarine.

A lunch program for elementary schools has been under study for more than a year by the board. Considerable concern has been expressed by a number of individual parents.

There will be no change in the present hot lunch program in Lakeview and Harrington schools which are sponsored by the PTO.

Careful study will continue through the 60-day pilot period, and starting the second semester the board will name a committee to study an overall lunch program.

In the study, the board has

given consideration to supervision costs, transportation, garbage disposal and other necessary subjects. Cost to the students has not been determined. There will be some state and federal reimbursement.

No action has been taken to date on changing lunch hours. Most elementary students live within reasonable walking distance from their homes and a considerable number are expected to have lunch at home.

The board authorized hiring Lee Van Aelst of Grandville as business manager for the school district. Van Aelst, 31, presently business manager of Comstock Park public schools, was formerly branch manager for Old Kent Bank. He is married and has three children and is coming to Holland in mid-September. He is a member of Zion Reformed Church in Grandville. His new duties will be a consolidation of buildings and grounds, business and finance. His training included study at Albion College, the University of Michigan and Aquinas College.

Fire in Blower System

Fire of undetermined cause swept through a sawdust blower system at Modern Partitions Inc., 545 East 32nd St., Friday at 10:30 a.m. Fire damage was confined to the blower system, firemen said. Fire fighters remained at the scene about 2½ hours. No injuries were reported and damage estimates were not immediately available.

Many Items Get Council Attention

A wide variety of subjects vied for attention of City Council at its regular meeting Wednesday night in City Hall. Mayor L. W. Lamb Jr. presided at the meeting which lasted an hour and 40 minutes.

Considerable discussion was held on a petition bearing nine signatures of Central Park residents requesting Council to set up a no-wake zone in Lake Macatawa between Myrtle and Grove Aves.

Due to misunderstandings, several persons favoring a no-wake zone were not present at a hearing called by the Department of Natural Resources some weeks ago, and persons opposing the no-wake zone in that area were successful in removing that portion from the original recommendation.

The matter was referred to City Manager William L. Bopf who said he would contact the DNR which would probably set another public hearing, and efforts would be made to have all interested persons informed of the schedule. It was pointed out that the city's obligation in the matter is only advisory.

A request from Don White, representing interests seeking to erect a Pizza Hut on Columbia Ave. north of Eighth St., for permission to include the sale of beer as a beverage, but not to have a tap room, brought considerable discussion. It appeared that Council was sympathetic but was not inclined to make snap decisions. No action was taken, but plans were made to continue the discussion informally after adjournment.

On motion of Pool Committee Chairman Morris Peerbolt, Council approved a change order involving a total of \$500 to provide aluminum light poles instead of galvanized poles, and to provide colored mortar.

Also approved was a change order for the Board of Public Works to the contract of Enviro-Fab Inc. on fuel oil storage tanks at the Fifth St. peaking unit No. 6 involving an additional \$978.

Council approved a proposed amendment to an anesthesia department policies of Holland Hospital.

The following Hospital gifts were acknowledged: Otoloscope - Ophthalmoscope valued at \$117.45 and a Traction - a Go Cart valued at \$81.95 from the Tuesday Service Guild, and \$20 cash for three - south nursing unit and \$30 for two - west nursing unit from Arthur Schuchard.

Library board gifts acknowledged were a Norfolk Island pine from Mrs. Helene Wolters and Florence Dubbink; \$10 for a book in memory of Dean Walling from Mr. and Mrs. Harold Moore, and \$15 from Ruth De Wolfe for a book in memory of Maibelle Geiger.

Certifications were confirmed for Mayor Lamb, Lamb Inc., cemetery and street departments, \$895.64, and Councilman Peerbolt, Peerbolts Inc., City Hall, \$3,807.95. Council allowed Peerbolt to abstain from voting on the latter job which was given on competitive bids.

A claim against the city from Industrial Services, 234 Central Ave., was referred to the insurance carrier and city attorney.

Council granted a request from Jacobus's Refuse Service Co. for an increase in the monthly collection charge from \$2.50 to \$2.75. The city manager's report which recommended the increase emphasized that curbside pickups and storage of refuse materials in front yard areas of private residences are contrary to city ordinances.

Council approved installation of stop signs on Myrtle Ave. at Janice St., 27th St. and Floral, with all three stopping for Myrtle Ave.

Approval was given a city manager recommendation for the position of assistant recreation director with a view to filling the position by Dec. 1.

A city manager report recommended new rates for street cuts based on actual costs, suggesting the price be raised to \$12.60 per square yard and \$18.90 during winter months and then allowed on an emergency basis only. The ordinance would preclude open cuts for water and sewer services whenever jacking is a practical alternative. The measure was referred to the city attorney to be put in ordinance form, but inasmuch as this takes about a month, building trades representatives will have an opportunity to make further suggestions.

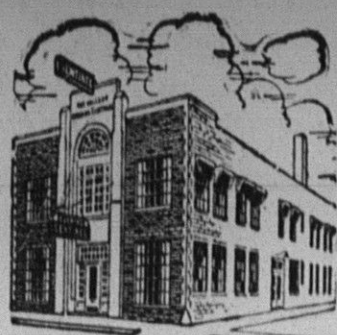

Sunday School Lesson

The Peril of Greed
Exodus 20:17; Luke 12:15-21;
1 Timothy 6:6-10

All the ten commandments are vital but the first and the last are the most important. This lesson is on the last commandment which forbids unlawfully desiring anything which is our neighbor's.

I. To covet is common. It causes other sins. God has put desires in us. Why then is it wrong to desire? It is wrong when we want that which belongs to a neighbor. Paul commends the right kind of coveting in the words, "Covet earnestly the best gifts." The 10th commandment forbids coveting the neighbor's house, wife, male or female servants, or work animals, in fact, "anything that is your neighbor's." In Deuteronomy the wife is mentioned before the house — that word refers to the whole family of which the father is the head. Coveting is the negative side of the commandment, "Thou shall love the Lord thy God with all thy heart and thy neighbor as thyself." When covetousness rules, love goes out. More love is essential.

II. Prosperity may be perilous, it may be a blessing. One day Jesus was interrupted while preaching. A hearer asked Jesus to tell his brother to divide his inheritance with him. Perhaps both were cheating. Jesus refused the man's request but told a parable for the good of all. A farmer had a bumper crop. His barns were too small and thy neighbor as thyself." larger and store away his crop for future use and enjoy himself for years to come eat, drink, be merry and take it easy. God one night called the man a fool and took him away from all his possessions.

Why did God call the man a fool? Very likely his world called him a success. He was a self-centered man, the pronouns "I" and "me" that he used showed it. Some people today talk only about "my business, my family, my friends, my plans." This man ignored God who owned all he had, forgot his responsibility to the poor and needy, sick, the reality of death and judgment to come. How useful this man might have become through his big crop to God and his fellowmen if he had done some solid thinking and praying!

III. The contented people appreciate their blessings. We came with nothing and we will leave this world with nothing. The covetous are unhappy, never content with what they have. The content rejoice having the necessities of life, the covetous are constantly looking for more and then still more and seem to become less and less happy. The more godliness increases the more contentment takes hold in the heart. In this secular age the sin of greed is threatening us all the time. Watch and pray and overcome!

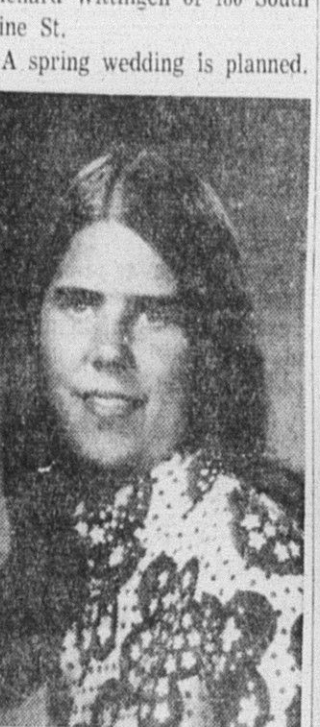

Dr. Hoffman Dies at 87

NORTH BRUNSWICK, N. J. — Dr. Milton J. Hoffman, 87, the first president of Central College, Pella, Iowa, former pastor of East Millstone N. J. Reformed Church and professor emeritus of New Brunswick Theological Seminary, died Friday in King James Nursing Home in Franklin Township.

His wife, the former Anna Viola McWhinnie, died in 1970. Born in Overisel, he was a descendant of the early Dutch settlers in Western Michigan. He entered Hope College in 1901 and was named a Rhodes Scholar in 1910, attending Oxford College.

Dr. Hoffman's long career as an educator began when he returned to Hope as head of the Latin department and in 1917, at age 30, was appointed the first president of Central College.

He resigned the presidency of Central in 1925 when the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America invited him to join the faculty at New Brunswick as professor of church history. He and his family lived on the seminary campus for 31 years until his retirement in 1956, when he moved to East Millstone.

Prior to and after his retirement, he was unofficial tour consultant for KLM Royal Dutch Airlines from 1947 to 1967. He also wrote travel columns for 48 American newspapers, particularly in areas where the Dutch had settled.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Lydia Moore of East Millstone and Mrs. Patricia Dykstra of Schenectady, N. Y.; five grandchildren; five great-grandchildren; and a sister, Mrs. Maurice Vander Haar of Holland.

Funeral services will be held Sunday at 2 p.m. in East Millstone Reformed Church with Dr. John Dean Dykstra, his son-in-law, officiating. Burial will be in Cedar Hill cemetery, East Millstone.

The college dedicated a men's dormitory to him in 1965.

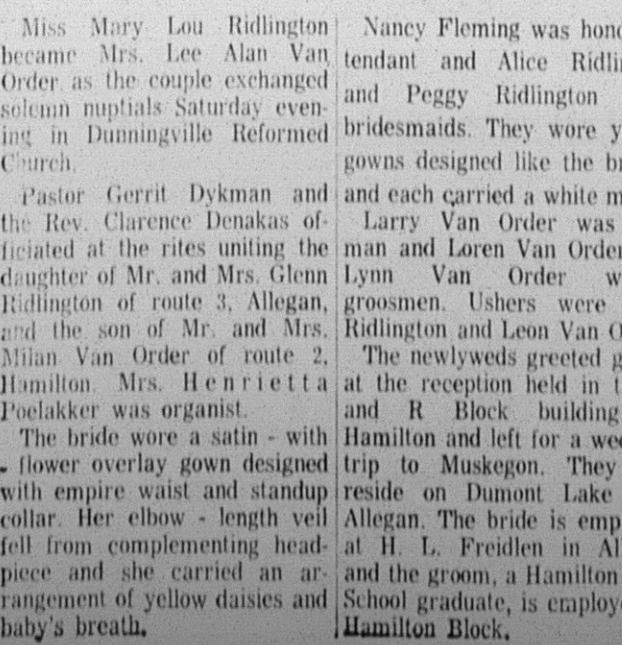

Sight Restored, She Radiates Joy

Her eyes are big, blue and expressive. Medically, they are not supposed to allow her to see. But for the past year she has been busy catching up with the sights that she had feared were gone forever, and rejoicing in the miracle of her restored sight.

As the wife of a young minister, the Rev. Acie Ford, pastor of First Baptist Church, Huttig, Ark., the former Marilyn Brink of Hamilton had reconciled herself to a life of darkness which had begun gradually when she was in high school.

Physicians at Mayo Clinic had told there that her eyes had deteriorated to a point which made her legally blind, but would not be any worse. She still had some vision and could perceive things dimly. Her eyes had not deteriorated visibly, and by carefully listening, she was able to present an apparently normal face to the world.

During this time she attended Tennessee Temple University and met and married Acie Ford, a fellow-student preparing for the ministry, settling in the South.

Soon after the birth of her daughter for no apparent reason, the little sight she had begun to fade and the young pastor's wife, began to attend a school for the blind in Little Rock, Ark., rearranging her life to accommodate the dark so rapidly closing in.

During this time she and her husband prayed together that her sight be restored, or that she be given the strength to bear the burden of blindness, with strong faith that they would accept what came.

It was while they were praying together again, on an August night in 1972, that the miracle happened. Her sight was fully restored.

Fearing that the restoration was only temporary, they returned to the doctor in Houston, Texas who had gently told her that blindness would be inevitable and total. He discovered that none of the damage to the

structure of her eyes has been restored, only her sight. He has no explanation except that it is physically impossible for her to see, but she sees.

Last fall the writer read her joyful, almost incoherent report to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Brink. Visiting with them in their farm home near Hamilton; hearing how she had accepted her burden with faith and determination to live a happy life of service to her God, sharing their joy in her recovery was a unique experience.

This week, the radiant and poised young wife and mother, here to tell her story at meetings, visited The Sentinel with her proud and happy husband and lively 5-year-old daughter.

Since she began the speaking engagements which she feels bound to accept, so that many may share her joy and faith, Dr. Norman Vincent Peale has asked her to tell her story through his magazine, "Guideposts." Her account will appear late this year or early in 1974.

After a visit with her parents and relatives in the area, the Fords will return to Arkansas, stopping in Illinois for several speaking engagements.

The recovery of her sight has made her anxious to assume the full responsibilities of a busy pastor's wife, and she expects to curtail some of her speaking activities. She is thrilled that she will reach so many more with her magazine account of the miracle.

Inspiring as her story is, the sight of her, eyes alight with the serenity of complete faith and the happiness of one blessed by God, is an unforgettable experience.
