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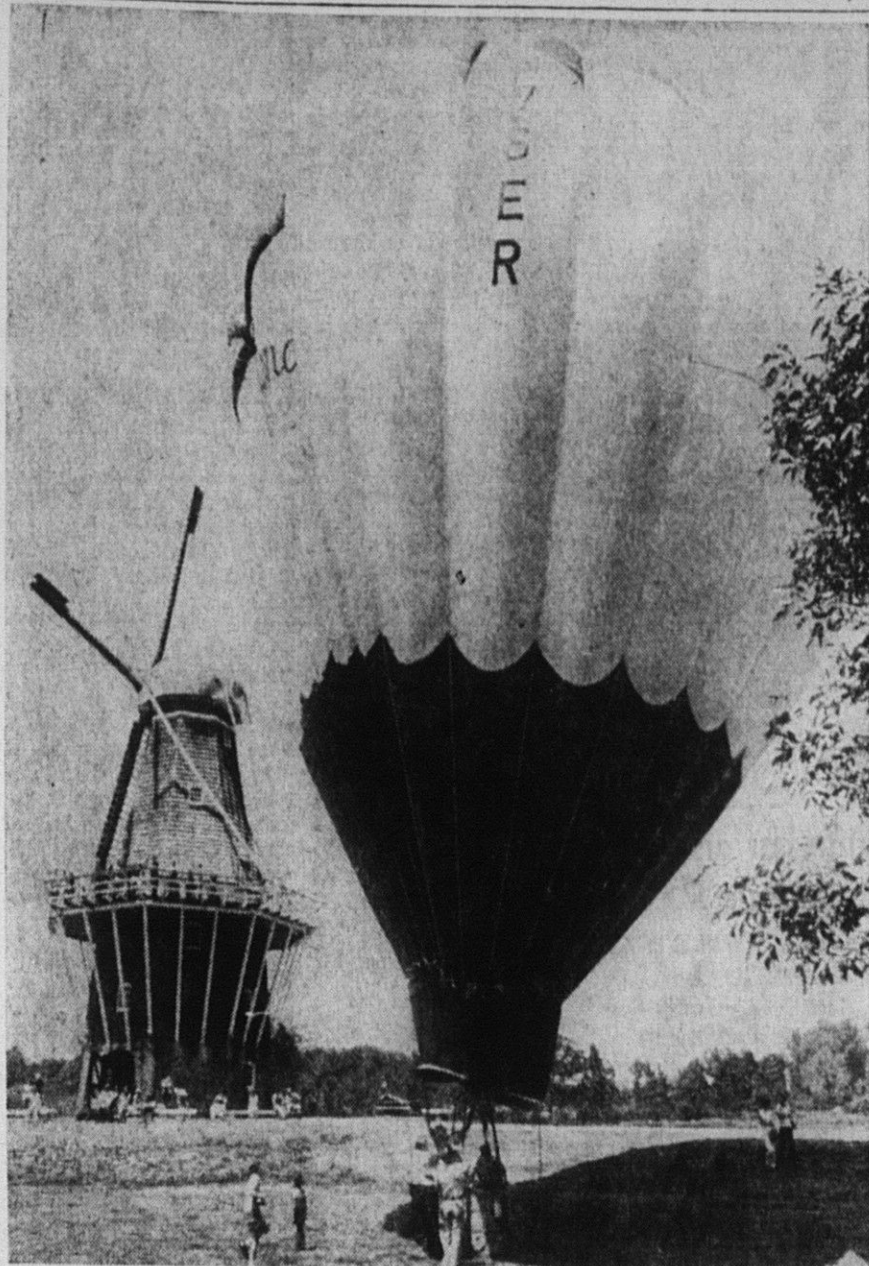

Lightning Hits Boat On Lake

Burns Radio Antenna; Four Persons on Board Not Reported Injured

Lightning struck a radio antenna of a boat in Lake Macatawa as the occupants approached a Kollen Park launching site during a storm Friday night that knocked out electrical service to portions of Holland for a few minutes.

Holland police said Ken Wierenga of 1391 Woodland Dr., Jenison, was bringing his boat toward a launching site near 10th St. and Van Raalte Ave. when the antenna was hit by lightning at 9:34 p.m.

The antenna was burned but police said the boat was not damaged. Neither Wierenga nor his three passengers were reported injured. Holland firemen were called to stand by.

The Board of Public Works said lightning caused a power outage in the western regions of the city for a few minutes during the storm.

The power outage affected the Holland High School Performing Arts Center where visiting German students at Hope College were holding a German night performance and the entertainment was interrupted when the lights went out.

Lightning was blamed for damages to a mobile home at 10842 Ottagan St. where Allegan County deputies said a bolt struck near a barn a short distance from the mobile home and touched off a small fire.

Deputies said damage to the 12 by 40 foot mobile home owned by Lewn Glatz was not determined. No injuries were reported.

Winds ripped down some tree limbs and branches in Holland and peeled a sign from the side of the Model Drug Store along River Ave. at Eighth St.

Gorno Again President Of Tulip Time

Mike Gorno was reelected president of Holland Tulip Time Festival Inc. at a meeting of the board of directors Tuesday afternoon.

Others elected are Burton Borr, first vice president; Don Stoltz, second vice president; Roscoe Giles, treasurer, and Roger M. Stroh, secretary.

Board members again expressed appreciation to Dwight Ferris, festival manager since 1969, who announced his resignation last week, and sought his cooperation in preliminary plans for the 1977 festival (May 11-14) as well as aiding in selecting a successor.

Gorno said plans already are under way for the 1977 festival with its usual popular features of fine tulips, klompen dancing, parades, a flower show, etc. The board hopes to have brochures ready for distribution before the first of the year.

Other members of the board are Jacob De Graaf, Betty Dick, Ivan Compagner, William Smolenski and Robert De Young.

Tire Fire Damages Two Buildings

Two buildings at Washington Square were damaged when a pile of tires between the buildings was set on fire by children Sunday at 5:34 p.m. but no injuries were reported.

Fire officials said the tires were between Slik's Square 66 station, 208 West 18th St. and Washington Square Beverage, 439 Washington Ave. Damage to the service station was estimated at \$200 and to the beverage store at \$500.

Firemen said the fire was so hot that the inside of window casings in the second floor apartment of the beverage building began to smoke and blister.

A graduate of St. John's University, Dr. Hartwig holds the Ph.D. in biology from the University of Notre Dame.

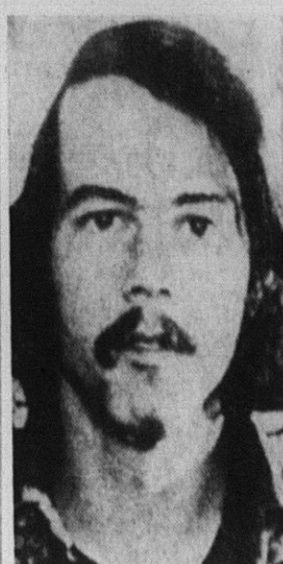
Police Seek Man, 21, In Tavern Slaying

One man was held under \$10,000 bond today and another was sought by Holland police in connection with Tuesday's fatal shooting of Mac Arthur Blanton, 24, in a downtown Holland tavern.

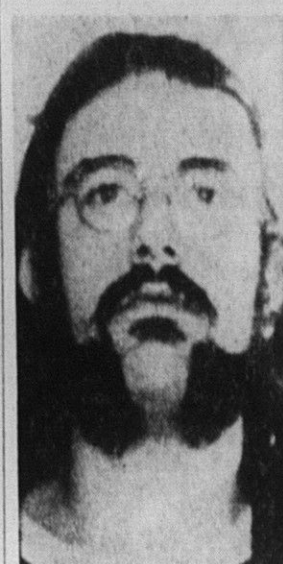
Arraigned in District Court Wednesday where he demanded examination to a charge of assault with intent to do great bodily harm less than murder was John Charles Fuller, 23, of 136 Fairbanks Ave. He was held in lieu of bond.

Sought by police was Theodore William Krystekski, 21, of the Holland and Fennville areas. He was named in a warrant on an open murder charge in the slaying of Blanton.

Blanton was struck in the abdomen by a slug fired from a hand gun while sitting at the bar of Eddie's Bar, 129 East Eighth St. Police were called at 10:08 p.m. Tuesday and Blanton died at 4 a.m. Wednesday in Holland Hospital while undergoing emergency surgery. Police said the shooting occurred during a brawl in the bar but Blanton was not involved in the brawl.

Officers said Fuller apparently got into an argument with

another bar patron which led to a brawl during which Fuller apparently pulled a switchblade knife. Krystekski apparently entered

the brawl and allegedly pulled a hand gun which discharged, striking Blanton who was sitting ten feet away.

Officers said Fuller and Krystekski fled the bar before police arrived, and apparently drove away in Fuller's car. Krystekski was taken to Saugatuck.

Wednesday morning Fuller and another man were taken into police custody at their homes and questioned by police. Fuller was charged with assault while the other man was released.

A warrant was issued for the arrest of Krystekski.

Police said Krystekski's last known address was in Holland but a more permanent address was believed in the Fennville area.

He was believed to have been in the Holland area the past few years and is a native of Illinois. Officers said he also was believed to have friends in the Milwaukee area.

For Physical Education Center

Kresge Gives Hope \$300,000

The Trustees of The Kresge Foundation of Troy, Mich. have awarded a \$300,000 challenge grant to Hope College toward the construction of a new physical education and health center.

The grant was announced by William H. Baldwin, President of The Kresge Foundation, to Hope College President Gordon J. Van Wylen.

The grant brings construction of the \$3.2 million center closer to reality. The College has received \$2.8 million in gifts and pledges for the building which will replace Carnegie - Schouten gymnasium, a facility built in 1906 when Hope College had an enrollment of 400 students. Enrollment at Hope last year was 2,275.

The architectural firm of Alden B. Dow Associates, Inc. of Midland, Michigan is preparing working drawings so the contracts can be awarded this fall and construction started before the end of the year. Completion is tentatively scheduled for February, 1978.

The Foundation, one of the largest in the United States in size of assets and appropriations, was created in 1924 solely through the gifts of the late Sebastian S. Kresge, founder of the S. S. Kresge Company. However, the company and the foundation are not related in any way.

As a young man, Kresge had been taught to serve his church, to work hard, to save a good share of what he earned and to help his fellow men. He never doubted the high quality of these simple, abiding rules of conduct and they were observed by him with the same devotion at the end of his ninety-nine years as they had been in his youth. For him, gathering of money was a means to the end of giving it away since he deeply believed that helping his fellow men was a natural response to his material success. The foundation strives to perpetuate Kresge's deep concern for the betterment of human conditions.

"The purpose on which The Kresge Foundation was founded and continues to serve parallels the challenge which Hope College is seeking to meet," said President Van Wylen. "Our basic purpose is to offer programs of excellence in liberal arts education at the undergraduate level. Of utmost importance in fulfilling the mission is the establishment of a learning environment in which students will develop their full range of potential and abilities. The new physical education center will enhance quality programs already in existence and give us the opportunity to develop new programs."

During the past 53 years, The Kresge Foundation has made appropriations of more than \$260 million to institutions in the fields of higher education, health services, the arts, social welfare, and the care of the young and the aging. Construction and major renovation of facilities is the Foundation's primary concern, and grants are usually made on a challenge basis to encourage further fund-raising efforts.

The Kresge Foundation has made three previous major gifts

to Hope College. In 1960 the foundation awarded a \$50,000 grant toward the construction of the college's physics - mathematics building and in 1968 presented a \$25,000 gift for the DeWitt Student and Cultural Center. A \$500,000 challenge grant in 1970 spearheaded a campaign to raise funds to build the Peale Science Center.

The new physical education center will be located on the southeast perimeter of the campus. It will be bounded by 13th and 14th Streets, Columbia Avenue and the C & O railroad tracks.

The building will have a gross area of approximately 80,000 square feet. It will consist of a gymnasium with three courts, swimming pool, conditioning and exercise areas, a dance studio, handball courts, wrestling and multi-purpose room, classrooms and health clinic.

Drugs Taken In Entry at Store

A quantity of drugs was reported missing in a break-in at Dykstra Drug Store, 149 North River Ave., discovered at 4:14 a.m. today by a delivery man. The break-in is the third reported at the drug store in the past eight months.

Ottawa County deputies said entry to the building was gained by smashing the glass in a rear door. The drugs were taken from cabinets in the pharmacy section of the store.

The missing drugs were valued at between \$100 and \$200 but the total was not determined. Also missing was a \$5 bill from a cash register.

Holland Man Charged In Shooting Case

A Holland man faced arraignment in District Court today in connection with an alleged shooting incident Saturday during which a rear window of a car was shot out but none of the car's occupants was injured.

Police said two Grand Rapids men told them they met a man in a local take-out store who invited them to his house. They said the shooting began as they were in the driveway of the residence of Fidencio Gomez, 491 Lincoln Ave.

Officers said the men told them they were in the car in the driveway when Gomez came from a garage carrying a rifle and the subjects drove from the driveway as shots were heard.

Police said a rear window of the car was shot out and some of the car's upholstery damaged by what appeared metal fragments from slugs.

The men drove to the police department and made the report at 11:13 p.m. Saturday.

Officers said the two Grand Rapids men told them they heard three shots. Police said they recovered six spent shells and a 22-caliber rifle with the apprehension of Gomez.

The Grand Rapids men were identified as Pedro Candellario Ayala and Frank Gonzales.

Soldering Iron Causes Fire in Radio Station

A small fire started in a basement workroom by an electric soldering iron at radio station WHTC, 87 Central Ave., caused an estimated \$200 damage at 11:13 p.m. Tuesday.

Firemen were called to railroad tracks in the area of 27th St. at 8:15 a.m. today where a railroad tie was reported on fire. Damage was confined to the railroad tie.

Girl, 10, Is Fatally Injured

A ten-year-old girl was fatally injured in a truck-motorcycle collision at 112th Ave. and Polk St. in Olive township Wednesday at 5:48 p.m. that critically injured the operator of the cycle.

Bonita Bartels of 8600 116th Ave., West Olive, died at 8:40 a.m. today in St. Mary's hospital in Grand Rapids of injuries suffered in the accident. She was riding on the motorcycle operated by Chester L. Bartels, 34, of the same address.

Bartels was admitted to the intensive care unit at Zeeland Community hospital with extensive leg injuries and a broken pelvis.

Ottawa County deputies said the motorcycle was eastbound on Polk St. and was struck broadside by a truck heading south on 112th Ave. and driven by Richard L. Schotenboer, 18, of 7135 New Holland St. He was not reported injured.

The collision occurred in the middle of the open intersection, deputies said.

Parked Car Struck Shoves Trailer, Boat Into Garage

A car operated by Scott Van Beek, 20, of 2299 Auburn St., went out of control at Douglas Ave. and Van Dyke at 3:40 a.m. Saturday struck a parked car and a house but when the dust settled a boat and trailer had been shoved into a garage, too.

Ottawa County deputies said Van Beek was eastbound on Douglas and failed to negotiate a curve. The car jumped a curb, ran through some bushes, crossed Van Dyke, went into a driveway at 11 Van Dyke, hit a car parked in the driveway and hit a porch and a gas meter on the house of Richard Viedveld.

The parked car, however, was shoved into a 14-foot boat and trailer which was shoved into a garage door. Damage estimates were not immediately available. Van Beek was not reported injured.

Allegan Farmer, 50 Falls Into Baler

ALLEGAN — Earl Wiers, 50, an Allegan County farmer, broke his leg in several places Thursday after he apparently slipped and fell into a hay baler on his farm at 1542 146th Ave. and became caught.

Allegan County deputies said the man was working alone on the hay baler and apparently stopped the machine and was working on the unit when he slipped and fell into it.

Deputies said the call was received at 6:55 p.m. Thursday and rescuers worked for some time to free Wiers. He was taken to St. Mary's hospital in Grand Rapids where his condition today was listed as "fair."

Holland police said \$44 in cash was reported missing from various locations in the residence of Edward Wellwood, 489 West 23rd St., Tuesday at 11:20 p.m. while the family was away. Police said entry to the home was gained through a rear door.

BPW Acts On Studies For Power

The Board of Public Works Monday moved further in its quest for additional electric power supplies in the future by recommending two contracts with consulting engineer firms.

R. W. Beck and Associates was recommended for a \$14,000 contract for studies in connection with electrical interconnections between Holland and Consumers Power Co. and a \$4,000 contract with Stanley Consultants of Muscatine, Iowa, to study the potential to modify units 1 and 2 at the James De Young power plant.

BPW General Manager Frank C. Whitney said an updated interconnect would be necessary whether the BPW purchases into Consumers Power Co. or decides to construct a new generation plant at a location outside the city.

Such an interconnect was part of a Black & Veatch engineering study and estimated to cost \$2½ million Black & Veatch has been the city's consulting engineers.

A study of the two units at the power plant was recommended by R. W. Beck to determine whether they were capable of continued production but the BPW recommended hiring Stanley to learn how well the Stanley firm can work and produce reports. The Stanley bid was \$1,000 under the Beck bid.

The recommendations will go to council for its approval.

Whitney said BPW staff members would be meeting in Lansing Wednesday to study lobby action for approval of a joint participation and joint action bill in the legislature. Passage of such legislation would allow municipal power companies, such as Holland, to purchase part of Consumer's generating facilities and power supply.

And Whitney said the BPW coal supplier, Energy Engineering, whose boat loading facilities in Chicago were destroyed by fire earlier this month, was able to supply Holland with a load of West Virginia coal shipped from Toledo to keep up with the Holland BPW coal demands. Most of the coal for Holland is shipped from Chicago.

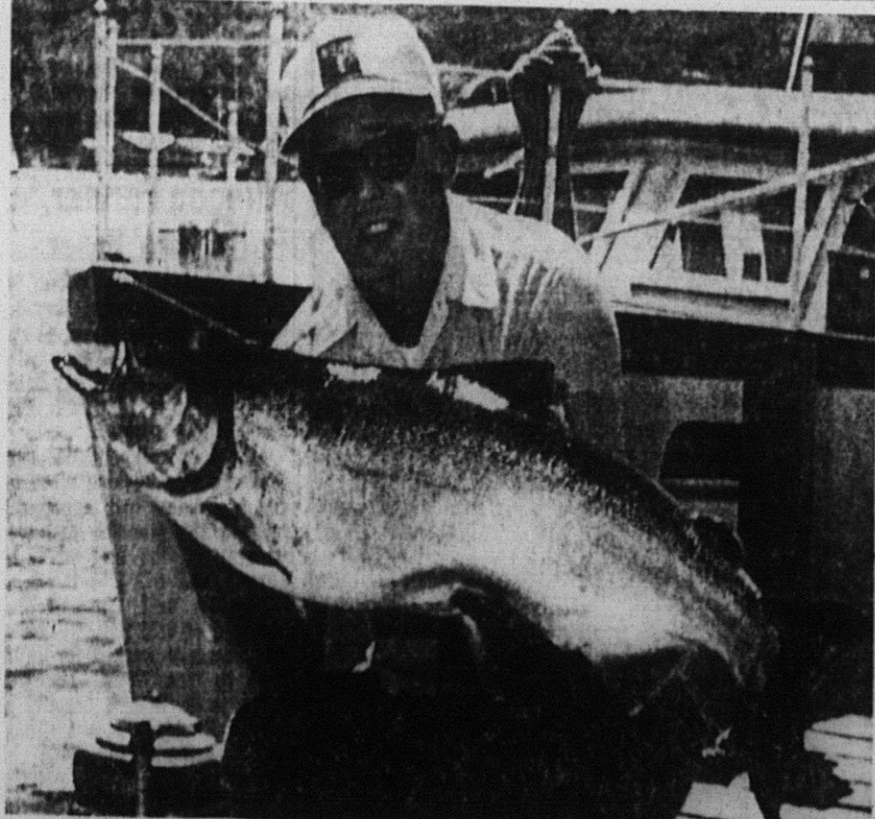

Americans In 'Farewell' To German Visitors

Between the covers of song Friday night, the 32 German students who have been studying for the past four weeks at Hope College, presented to an eager audience, bits of their culture and homeland.

The program, appropriately called "German Night," opened with a charming folk song from the Friesian Islands. No matter that only a few at best in the audience could understand the words, the message was carried clear to the ears of all present. As Dr. Rolf Italiaander, director of the program and producer of the show, put it, the students were there last night to build a bridge between the peoples.

And a musical bridge it was. For the better part of two and a half hours, the auditorium at Holland High was filled with the ringing of voices and instruments. And what better way to communicate the spirit of friendship but by this medium, which is as universally understood as a smile?

Throughout the evening several of the students performed beautifully on the piano, organ, guitar, and of course, in song.

Nor were the finer points of communication ignored. Dr. Walter Reimers, himself a native Schleswig-Holsteiner, offered a few interesting words in explanation of the lingual bond between the English-speaking peoples, and those of that area of northern Germany, where the dialect so resembles our own mother tongue.

Two short works from the pens of Theodor Storm and Joachim Ringelnatz, poets also from the north of Germany, touched the mind and heart of the audience. They were recited first in English, then in the dialects in which they were written, by Angela Taubitz. Though not of recent vintage, the poems illustrated verbally the students' native land by the North Sea.

Dr. Italiaander also offered some of his poetic efforts to the audience. Three of his favorite poems written in the Americas, the works describe both the author's commitment to better race relations, and his impressions of the United States. They were read from a collection of his, called "Always When I'm Travelling."

Let us forget the freedom on which America was built, the group presented a film describing the changes brought about "Along the Eastern Border of Lower Saxony," by the retreat of East Germany from the free

Before the silver screen was raised, four of the students took the audience on a slide tour of their respective homes. Sabine Knauer and Alfred Muller lead willing "tourists" through Hamburg, and Dietrich Landmann and Axel Unterschütz presented the North Sea island where they make their homes.

The audience was also treated to a condensed version of the German television film which described the 1975 German-American program at Hope. Last night's version was, however, wittily narrated by Dr. Italiaander, due to technical differences between German and American projectors.

The bridge seemed truly completed by the finale, when German and American students joined their voices in "Let Us Sing a Joyful Hallelujah." Dr. Italiaander himself composed the lyrics to fit Olaf Skald's melody. The singers were conducted by Mr. Johnson Hsu of Malaysia.

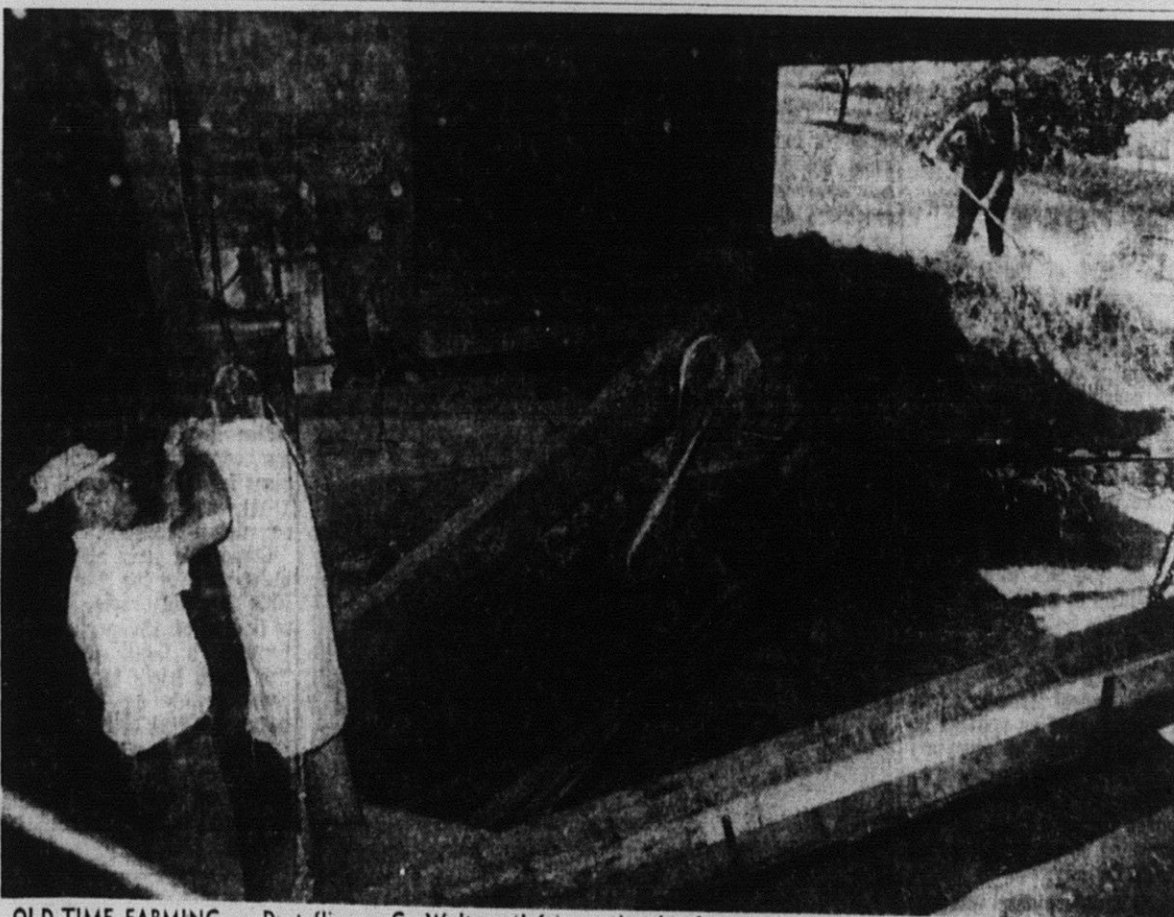
Finally, as the performers marched in a circle around the stage to the organ beat of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic," the audience was inspired to clap with the marchers in time, and wave "aufwiedersehen" to the Germans who depart Sunday for Hamburg and home.

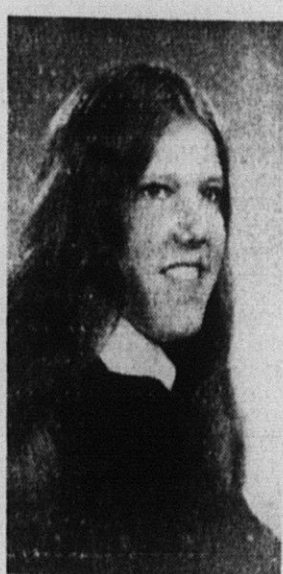

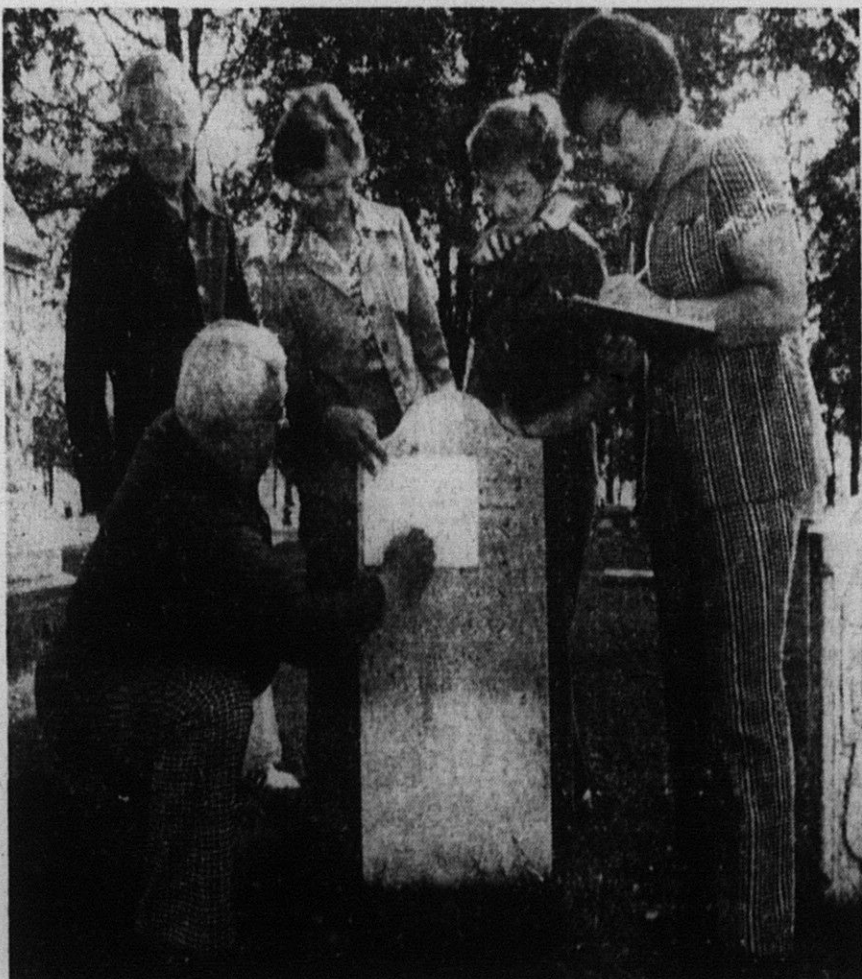

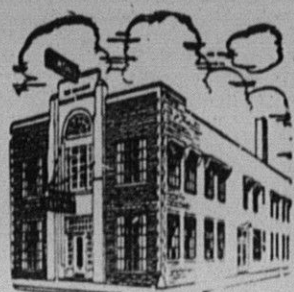

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DRAMATIC CONTRAST

Here's a nice little story that demonstrates why so many foreign people would like to live in America. Not long ago, Alexander Solzhenitsyn, the exiled Russian author of prison tales, was buzzing along a Kansas highway on his way from California to New England.

His wife, Natalya, was driving their van and the writer was relaxing in the back of the van. A Kansas patrolman pulled them over for doing 76 miles per hour. A long conversation ensued between Natalya and the policeman, but they got nowhere because they couldn't understand each other. Finally Solzhenitsyn, convinced that he would be jailed for this breach of the law, emerged from the rear of the van. What happened then was the typically American thing. There was no talk of jail, but the mere delivery of a traffic ticket on the back of which the policeman was kind enough to write a note of explanation to the Russians' relatives in New York. A few days later a \$25 check was received by a Kansas court for the fine and court costs.

Maybe Solzhenitsyn is a bit sensitive when it comes to policemen, and he has a right to be, but this is a good example of the difference between our system and that which develops a Gulag archipelago. It's not a bad system. We can see why many would prefer it to the Russian system.

Hope Offers \$30,000 For More Tennis

By a 7-2 vote, City Council Wednesday night approved a concept whereby Hope College will spend up to \$30,000 for improving and constructing tennis facilities at Columbia Park on Columbia Ave. between 12th and 13th Sts., adjoining the campus.

The courts, which will remain the property of the city for both community and college use, are subject, to the following guidelines:

1. Hope College would design, bid and construct three new tennis courts at the northeast section of the existing park.

2. Included within the bid package will be an alternate for refurbishing four existing courts, with the cost-sharing ratio to be determined on receipt of firm quotations.

3. The college would use the facilities for instructional and competitive activities during daytime hours, Monday through Friday, when the college is in session.

4. All courts would be open to the community on a first-come, first-serve basis during evenings, weekends and days when the college is not in session.

5. The courts would be signed, clearly outlining times available for citizen use.

City Manager Terry L. Hofmeyer believes the expanded facilities will increase public use at the location and provide quality tennis courts for both the community and the college.

Casting dissenting votes were Bea Westrate and Hazen Van Kampen, both concerned over possible confusion over uses by the public and the college. Van Kampen was in favor of "selling" the property to the college, but was informed that property dedicated for park purposes would require a vote of the people for such a move.

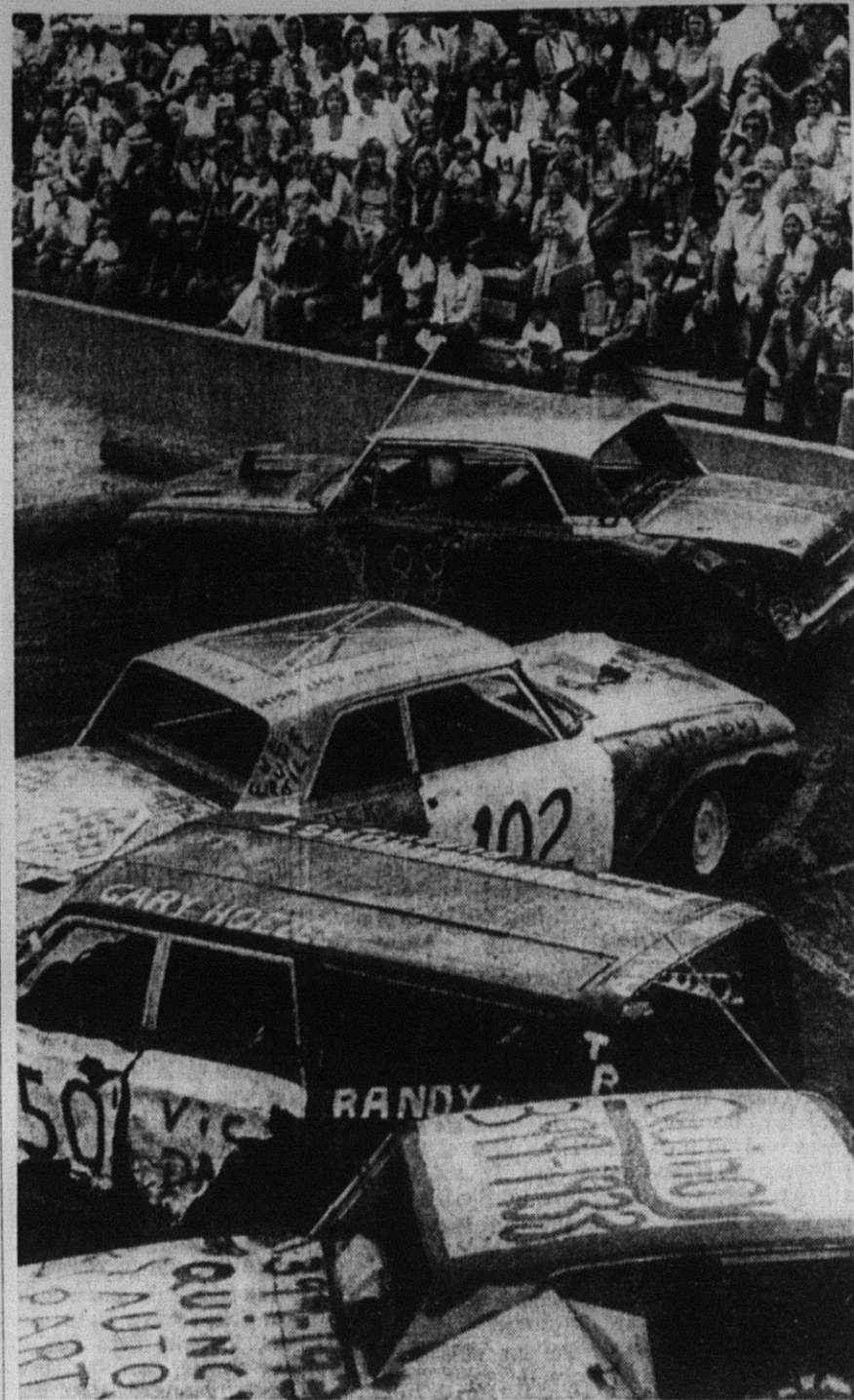

Council accepted lone bid of Boyd Berends of \$5,926 for city-owned property at the southwest corner of 32nd St. and Ottawa Ave.

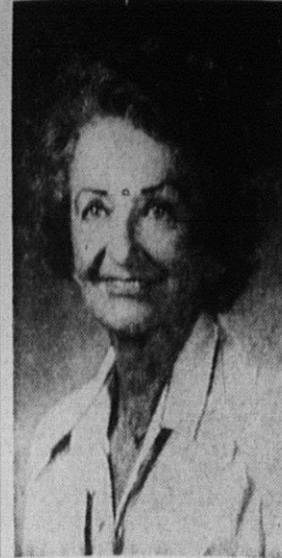
Council approved low bid of Dynatronics division of COFESCO of \$1,253 for additional security and fire alarm terminals in the communications room at the police department.

Holland Downtown Merchants received an okay from City Council Wednesday night to proceed with plans for their annual sidewalk sale July 30-31.

Eighth St. will be closed from River to College Aves. from 7:30 a.m. July 30 to 5:30 p.m. July 31.

In addition, Dial-a-Ride service will be provided free to and from downtown throughout the regular service area on July 30 from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. and July 31 from 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

The Merchants Association will assume costs relating to closing the street and Dial-a-Ride. A fire lane will be maintained at all times.

In other business, Council postponed action on new sanitary sewer and paving assessment policies, pending a study session. The city manager's report proposed an increase of \$300 in residential single benefit sanitary sewer charge placing it at \$1,500 from the current \$1,200, and proposed an increase of \$5 in front foot paving costs, placing it at \$15 a foot instead of \$10.

Approval was given a building permit for rehabilitation and an addition to a service station at 1144 South Shore Dr., subject to conditions outlined in the report.

Council tabled until the second meeting in August a recommendation to install a small air conditioning unit between the emergency operation center and the dispatch room in the police department at a cost \$2,300.

Also tabled for two weeks was a city manager proposal to prohibit parking on the west side of Lincoln Ave. in the vicinity of 36th St. to 38th St.

Ottawa County Fair was granted permission to place temporary directional signs within the city.

Councilman Hazen Van Kampen, who suggested two weeks ago that city residents be given preference over outsiders (all things equal) in hiring practices in the city, was assured that notices have been sent out to all boards and departments.

Council Member Bea Weststrate said she had received much favorable comment over the community Bicentennial picnic in Kollen Park and asked if such an event could be arranged regularly on July 4. Mayor Lou Hallacy said it would be a good subject for a Council study session.

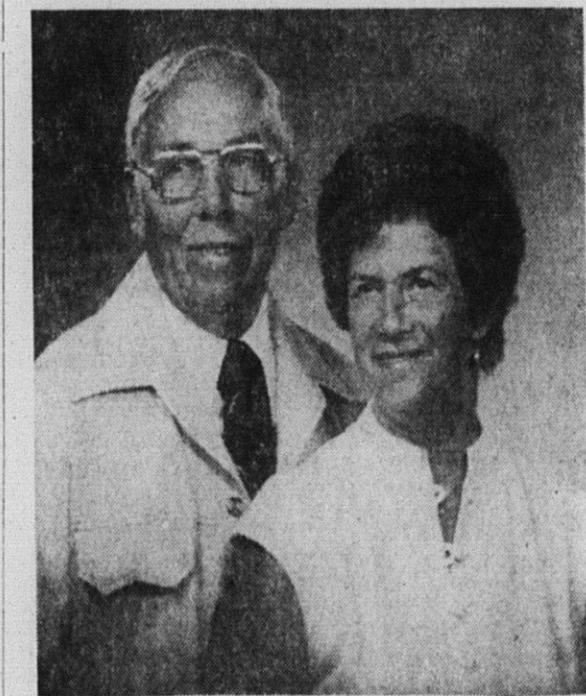
