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Heart Attack Proves Fatal To Ex-Mayor Harrington

Co. D Will Train In New Army's Atom War Methods

Holland's National Guard Company D will leave for field training at Camp Grayling Saturday morning, Aug. 10, at 6:30 a.m.

The intensive training scheduled for this year will stress the new Army concepts for atomic war, mobility and independence of units. Along with some 45 other units from throughout the state, Co. D will put the new theories into practice during the three-day and two-night bivouac problem. The exercise, dubbed "Operation Beachcomber," will be run Aug. 20 through 22.

The first unit of three men left Wednesday morning for Grayling to attend a preparatory cook's school. They were followed by a truck this morning carrying the bulk of the equipment needed for the two-week encampment.

Most of the 140 men and six officers will make the trip in three commercial buses. A few men will take their own cars, and the company's nine trucks of various size will also go.

The men are scheduled to arrive at Camp Grayling at 10:30 a.m. The rest of the day will be spent in setting up the tents and the messhall.

Approximately 10,000 men will attend the National Guard training in the fifth, final and largest encampment at Grayling this year.

On Saturday, August 17, Governor Williams is scheduled to review the massed troops of the 46th Division, Sunday morning, Aug. 18, he will deliver the principal address as the troops pause to pay tribute to National Guardsmen of the past in their traditional memorial services.

A full schedule of movies, tournaments in volleyball, softball, bowling and archery, and the usual Lake Margrethe swimming are on the entertainment and recreation program.

Holland is again in the running for the Loveland Award, given yearly to the most outstanding and proficient company-sized unit. Last year Co. D missed winning the award by only one or two points.

Visiting days will be Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 17 and 18. Sunday noon, visitors will be fed in the company messhall. The boys are scheduled to return Saturday, Aug. 24, about 11 a.m.

Former Mayor Honored by Board

The Ottawa County Board of Supervisors Wednesday passed the following resolution submitted by Howard W. Fant, chairman of the Rules and Legislation committee:

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors for the County of Ottawa in special session assembled has been informed of the unexpected and untimely death of Harry Harrington, member of this Board from the City of Holland, and

Whereas, Harry Harrington did devote his time, talents and services to the public for many years both as a valued member of this Board, as a former mayor of the City of Holland and in numerous other public activities;

Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the Board of Supervisors for the County of Ottawa officially records with great sorrow and a profound sense of loss the untimely passing of its fellow member, Harry Harrington; and

Be it further resolved that during his service on this Board Harry Harrington's devotion to the obligations and duties of his office as member of this Board and his thorough grasp and understanding of the problems relating to public affairs of the County of Ottawa reflected a great credit upon himself and rendered a valuable service to the people of this county and to the Citizens of Holland whom he represented.

Be it further resolved that this resolution be spread upon the records of this Board and that the Clerk be directed to forward a copy thereof to the family of Harry Harrington.

Uninjured as Car Rolls

Juan S. Vasquez, 33, of 183 East 16th St., was uninjured when his car left the road and rolled over at the intersection of 136th Ave. and Quincy St. Saturday about 3:30 p.m. His 1953 model car received about \$350 damage, Ottawa County deputies estimated. Van Dyke Rites Set

The Rev. J. T. Hoogstra will officiate at funeral services Saturday at 2 p.m. at Ver Lee Funeral Home for Mrs. Fannie Van Dyke, 88, of 502 State St., who died Wednesday morning at Pine Rest. The body is at the funeral home where friends may call Friday from 7 to 9 p.m.

Harry Harrington, 67, Holland's mayor from 1949 to 1955, died unexpectedly Tuesday night of a heart attack at his home, 237 Van Raalte Ave., while sitting in the living room with his wife.

Harrington was appointed Holland mayor April 6, 1949 to succeed Bernard De Pree who resigned to accept a position on the west coast.

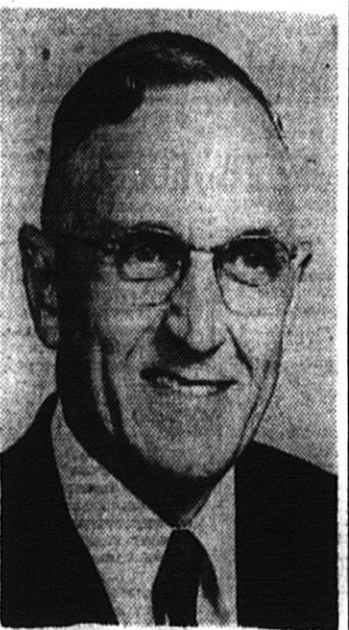
In his brief response, Harrington asked the council and city officials for co-operation. "Since life is awfully short and at best we can only serve our city a short time."

He concluded, "With God's guidance we will march on."

To accept the Mayor's post, Harrington had to resign his position as first ward alderman, a post he held for four years. He was appointed first ward alderman May 3, 1945, to succeed L. Phillip Van Hartsvelt who moved from the ward.

Harrington was elected to a three-year term as mayor in 1952. While Mayor, Harrington was responsible for many contributions to civic service. He was in office when Holland changed over to the city charter and worked out many of its intricate details.

He established parking meters here, helped in getting the General Electric Co., to build a plant

here, worked on the clarification and revision of city ordinances and was instrumental in the building of Holland's Civic Center.

Harrington's street paving program involved one-quarter of Holland's street, and he was also instrumental in the sewage plant improvement, the water supply program and hospital addition, including plans and construction.

Harrington was also a member of the Greater Holland Community Foundation.

After his decision not to run for re-election, his successor, Mayor Robert Visscher, appointed Harrington to the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors, in April, 1955 and he held the position until his death. He served on the Welfare and Good Roads Committee of the Board.

Councilman Raymond Holwerda said at the final meeting presided over by Harrington, "Holland is a better place in which to live because of the leadership and activities of Holland's elder statesman—Mayor Harry Harrington."

Harrington was born in Holland to the late Mr. and Mrs. Austin Harrington and lived in the community most of his life. He was a partner with his brother, Carl in the Harrington Fuel Co., founded by his father in 1890.

For several years, Harrington headed the city's harbor board, a post held previously by his father. He was a member of the First Methodist Church, of Unity Lodge No. 191 F and AM, the Saladin Temple Shrine and the Holland Shrine Club.

Surviving are his wife, Gertrude; one son Phillip of New York City; a brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Harrington of Holland and two nieces, Carol and Garnet Harrington of Holland.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 p.m. at the First Methodist Church with the Rev. John O. Hagans officiating. Burial will be in Pilgrim Home Cemetery. Friends may meet the family at the Nibbelink-Notter Funeral Chapel from 3 to 5 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. Thursday. Contributions may be sent to the organ fund at First Methodist Church in Harrington's memory.

Youth Slightly Injured When Car Turns Over

Charles E. Sherill, 19, of Coolidge Ave., Holland, was slightly injured Sunday about 6:15 a.m. when his car turned over on East Eighth St. just west of the US-31 bypass. He was treated by a local physician for head lacerations and released.

Sherill told Ottawa County deputies that his brakes locked, throwing his car out of control and over. Deputies described his 1946 model car as a total loss.

Vandals Steal Globes

Gerrit Alderink, of 60 East 12th St., reported to Holland police the theft of two colored globes taken from pedestals in his yard. One has been recovered by detectives investigating the case, who believe that youngsters are responsible for the vandalism. Persons with knowledge of the missing globe are asked to contact Holland police headquarters.

Council Receives Large Number Of Requests

Council disposed of a number of routine matters at its meeting Wednesday night. It received a communication from Catherine A. and Joseph Lepo filing a claim for damages amounting to \$2,500. The claim is for injuries sustained by Mrs. Lepo June 12 when a section of the sidewalk in front of the Kresge Store collapsed while she was walking on it. The claim was referred to the Michigan Mutual Liability Co. and the City Attorney.

A letter was presented from the Missouri State Board of Registration for Architects and Professional Engineers giving information submitted by Harold C. McClintock as his experience record while City Manager of Holland. Council moved to confirm the statement presented.

The question of the 1957-58 Municipal Maintenance contract with the Michigan State Highway Department was tabled and referred to the Michigan Municipal League.

Council also tabled the matter of the offer of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Co. of a steam locomotive.

A communication from Ralph F. Teerman and Ray B. Knooihuizen requesting the paving of 31st St. between Columbia Ave. and State St. was referred to the City Manager. Also referred to the City Manager was an application from the Gulf Oil Corp. for a permit to build a gasoline station at the southwest corner of 16th St. and Central Ave.

Council approved an application from the Disabled American Veterans for a license to solicit funds by a sale of forget-me-nots on Aug. 23 and 24. An application was okayed from the Sixteenth Street Christian Reformed Church "Religion for Today" group for a license to solicit funds at Kollen Park on Aug. 11. Also approved was an application for a license to solicit funds in Prospect Park in behalf of the Christian Reformed Church Mission Festival Wednesday.

Approval was given to the Board of Public Works payroll and claims totaling \$72,924.38, to the BPW's final change order on the Getman Bros. contract on the Low Service Station, and the request for the removal of the Assistant Superintendent of the Board of Public Works from the classified group under the personnel plan adopted by the city. Council denied a request from the BPW to build a \$4,000 storage building because the plans did not meet building restrictions. Council approved a request from the Hospital Board that Arthur Read be allowed to continue working with the Board in an advisory capacity.

Bids were received for a gas waterheater and conversion burner for the grandstand at Riverview Park and the bid was awarded to the Michigan Gas and Electric Co. at \$553.41. A check for \$182.57 was received from the Greater Holland Community Foundation as trustees of donations to Fairbanks Park. The money is to be used for shuffleboard and badminton facilities at Fairbanks Park. A communication was received from the City Auditor stating that \$20,000 set up in the general fund budget had been transferred to the hospital fund. The City Auditor's quarterly financial report for the period June 30, 1957 was received.

Council recommended final payment of \$11,695.53 be paid to the West Shore Construction Co. for the 1957 paving program. A letter was received protesting the fact that owners of corner lots must pay for connecting sidewalk links where the front and side property lines meet. Although this custom has prevailed for over 50 years, Council recommended that the connecting link be considered general city cost as are approaches to streets.

Mayor Visscher presided at the meeting and Councilman Beltman led devotions. The meeting adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

Council Approves Sidewalk Between 26th and 27th St.

Accepts Resignation Of Mrs. Helena Winter From Board of Appeals

A resolution providing for a sidewalk between 26th and 27th Sts. at College Ave. was passed by City Council Wednesday night.

The measure calls for the sidewalk to extend 28 feet east at the northeast corner of 27th St. and College Ave. The walkway will then turn north and run through to 26th St. Plans call for the walk to be six feet wide with four feet on each side. It will be parallel to the east property lines of the Myron Van Ark and Cora Van Ark homes.

Gerald Van Wyke, who previously had represented Donald Cook who was an interested property owner, spoke Wednesday night as a taxpayer. He said that it was inconceivable to construct this sidewalk simply as a safety measure. He felt that it was farfetched to use this reason for having the sidewalk and that it was suggested purely as a short cut for school children. Van Wyke said it would be nice to have such a short cut, but that it was rather an expensive proposition.

James Hallan, who was one of the 146 residents who signed a petition requesting an access between 26th and 27th Sts., stressed the importance of having some access to break up the long block. He felt that safety was not a major factor, but that it should be considered.

Councilman Robert Kouw moved that the council pass the resolution and it was seconded by Heeringa. Those approving the proposal were Councilmen Steffens, Phillips, Heeringa, Beltman and Kouw and Mayor Visscher. Councilmen Van Eerden and Holwerda voted against it. Bosman was not present at the meeting.

In other, Council approved the vacating of one half of south 19th St. between Cleveland and Ottawa Aves. and also the vacating of the alley between 21st and 22nd Sts. from Van Raalte to Harrison Ave. A motion was passed that three members of the Council and three members of the Board of Education be appointed to recommend expenditures for recreational purposes. The council and Board of Education have each allotted \$10,000 for city recreation.

A letter was received from Mrs. Helena Winter asking the Council to accept her resignation from the Board of Appeals and the Planning Commission. The Council accepted her resignation with its sincere regrets and expressed its deep appreciation for her fine work. A resolution was also passed in memory of the late former Mayor Harry Harrington, expressing a deep sense of loss at his death.

Robert Kouw chairman of the board shell advisory committee, reported that the committee met with the citizens committee to choose a new site at Kollen Park which would be less expensive than the previous site. He said that the architect will resubmit plans and that bids are expected in about three weeks.

Court Verdict Appealed

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — The Attorney General's office is appealing a Circuit Court jury verdict of no cause for action in the case of the Wright township against Edward Stevens. The case was tried before a jury July 17, 1957, and the verdict was rendered after 15 minutes deliberation. The township, of which Stevens was treasurer, sought to recover \$500 after the township had approved appropriating the money for an audit. The township dispute arose two years ago over an alleged shortage while Stevens was treasurer.

Damage to both cars was minor, deputies said.

County Building Closed Wednesday

In other Board action, the Board authorized the closing of county building Wednesday, Aug. 14 for the county picnic. A resolution from the good roads committee was passed. It was reported changes and improvements at the county infirmary at Eastmanville totaled \$6,000 instead of \$9,000.

Supervisors were invited on a road tour Sept. 24 of the work done on Ottawa county roads by Hendrick Stafeth of the county road commission. The Smith Petroleum Co. was granted oil rights on 50 acres of land in Robinson Township, at \$50 a year.

The Conservation Committee of the Board was instructed to negotiate with the Muskegon Pipe Line Corp. on a right-of-way to put in a pipe line running across school property in Robinson township.

The Board appointed Sheriff Gerald Vanderbeek the agent for the county to purchase merchandise and equipment from the Civilian Defense depots in Jackson.

The Court House flag was flown at half mast in memory of Harrington and George Swart paid tribute to him in the invocation. Chairman Martin Boon said "we all hope that when we go we will have the reputation to match that of Mr. Harrington." The board will attend the Harrington funeral Friday in a body.

Mrs. Ema Werden, 87, Dies at Daughter's Home

Mrs. Ema Besley Werden, 87, died Friday evening at the home of her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Stevenson, of 1441 South Shore Dr.

Mrs. Werden came to make her home with the Stevensons two years ago having been a resident of Evanston, Ill. She was a member of Grace Episcopal Church.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. R. I. Barney, of Evanston and Mrs. L. J. Stevenson; two grandchildren, John R. Barney of Glenview, Ill., and Mrs. Donald F. Urban of Royal Oak, Mich.; two great grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. William G. Strong of Champaign, Ill.

Her brother, the late Frederic Atwood, a noted surgeon, founded the Waukegan Besley Clinic and served as president of the American College of Surgeons in 1938.

Mrs. Besley resided at the Nibbelink-Notter Funeral Chapel until Tuesday morning when she was taken to the Oakwood Cemetery in Waukegan for services at 11 a.m.

Cool Weather, High Winds Lower Park Attendance

Attendance at Holland State Park is still running about 10 percent ahead of 1956 but cool weather and high winds kept the attendance comparatively low during the weekend.

Only 33,800 persons visited the park Friday, Saturday and Sunday to raise the year's attendance to 1,050,904. Attendance Sunday was 15,000 and Saturday, 15,000. Approximately 66,100 came to the park during the week.

A total of 430 camping permits were issued last week, the second highest weekly total this year. The year's total is now 3,049.

Fires Destroy Two Motel Cabins South of City

A fire which caused an estimated \$15,000 to \$18,000 damage broke out about 9:30 p.m. Wednesday in a six-room duplex cabin at the White Village Inn, on US-31 a half-mile south of Holland. The building was gutted before the Graafschap Fire Department could put out the blaze, believed to be out at 11 p.m.

At 5:30 a.m. this morning, fire leaped up again in the ruins, burned down the walls, and spread to a three-room cabin beside it, destroying that structure also.

No one was hurt in either of the fires. Mr. and Mrs. D.W. Race and their three-year-old daughter, Marinda, of Arkansas, staying in the second cabin, were awakened by the smell of smoke and got out safely, but lost some personal possessions.

The White Village Inn is owned by Harry Yutts of Holland, who said that the buildings were insured. Yutts said the damage estimate included the furnishings and appliances.

One apartment of the duplex was unoccupied, and the woman staying in the apartment in which the fire started was not home at the time. She was identified as Miss Ila Jennings of Saugatuck, and Yutts said that she lost all her personal belongings.

The fire was discovered Wednesday night by Yutts' grandson, Robert Stull, 16. The Graafschap Fire Department answered the call with two engines and about 12 men, and Fire Chief Dave Schripsema said that the fire appeared to be out at 11 p.m.

When the spot was checked at 5 a.m. this morning, Schripsema said, everything seemed to be all right, but at 6 a.m. the fire was again burning hard. Schripsema reported this fire out by 8:30 a.m.

Schripsema said he believed gas leakage to be the cause, since the firemen smelled gas and found several gas leaks while fighting the fire.

New Generator Set For Operation Friday

ZEELAND (Special) — The new 2,000 kilowatt diesel engine and generator installed at the municipal power plant is expected to go into operation Friday, according to City Superintendent Leon Sears.

The engine will add almost 50 per cent to the generating capacity of the plant and raise the kilowatt potential from 4,486 to 6,486. The project cost an estimated \$400,000 and is the fourth expansion program since the plant began operations in 1937.

Guests Again Report Thefts at Warm Friend

Holland detectives are investigating two cases of theft reported at the Warm Friend Tavern Sunday morning by guests.

John W. Seabury of Winnetka, Ill., reported that \$100 to \$115 was taken from his billfold while he slept. Norman Landis, of 448 Maple Ave., Holland, staying at the hotel, told the same story, reporting a loss of \$30 to \$35.

This is the second occurrence of this type in the past month. On July 12, thefts of \$18 and \$40 were reported by guests while they slept.

Reject 11th St. Lot for County Branch Building

Edifice to Be Located In Triangle at Manley And Butternut Drive

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — The long-time battle for an Ottawa County branch building in Holland apparently ended Wednesday afternoon when the Board of Supervisors voted to erect the building north of Holland.

The resolution, calling for the erection of the branch building in Holland township, passed 20-8 in the special session and came after a substitute motion asking that the building be located on the 11th St. parking lot next to the Holland City Hall and presented by James Townsend, Holland City attorney, was turned down, 19-9.

The building will be constructed off old US-31, just north of the intersection of Butternut Drive and Manley St., about one-quarter of a mile north of Holland.

Plans were in progress today to have the title of the proposed property examined and cleared so the county can exercise its option.

This property was suggested in the resolution by the Building and Grounds and Ways and Means committees of the Boards of Supervisors with Townsend not signing as a member of the committee. The property will be purchased for \$12,600.

The architectural firm of Vander Meiden and Koteles have been authorized to proceed with the detailed plans for the building on the property.

Considerable discussion followed Townsend's substitute motion asking for the Holland 11th St. site. Mayor Robert Visscher, making an appeal for the area, pointed out that the fundamental purpose of the building is to serve the people in the Holland area, not only the city of Holland, and that all governmental buildings in the area are being built in the Centennial Park area.

He added that Holland was contemplating a new library which would be adjacent to the park and "that all governmental functions should be in a square, or central area, rather than in some remote location, even though the parcel of land at some time may be a part of Holland, through annexation."

The Holland mayor felt the Board had a "moral obligation" to go along with the request of the Holland city council. Visscher said it had been a personal project of the late Harry Harrington, who died Tuesday night, and Harrington would have been able to "speak much better on the subject than I could."

Commenting on parking spaces in the 11th St. site, Mayor Visscher reported there were 16 empty places in the 20-space lot at 5 p.m. Tuesday.

Lawrence Beukema, Holland attorney, opposed the 11th St. location "because Holland can't take the burden of the county to supply a parking lot."

Henry Slaughter of Tallmadge Township, chairman of the Ways and Means committee, felt south end Ottawa County residents didn't want the building in Holland and said the majority of people would "like to have it close to the people but not close to me."

Dick Nieuwma of Park Township and chairman of the Building and Grounds committee, said the county would save approximately \$10,000 through the construction outside the city, which is across from a bowling alley. One of the architects of the firm of Vander Meiden and Koteles estimated the saving would be between \$7,000 and \$10,000.

Zeeland mayor D. C. Bloemendaal again said Zeeland would be happy to have the building and had a space of 350-foot frontage available.

James Van Volkenburgh, director of the Ottawa county bureau of social welfare received \$1,500 in additional funds which is to be taken from the contingent account of the general fund.

Van Volkenburgh said the Michigan Welfare Department's decision not to pay the county the 50 per cent split on direct relief commitments and the increase in the case load were the reasons for the extra money.

The Board also approved area in Nieuwma's Resubdivision for the extension of Holland State Park. The property will be administered by the Michigan Conservation Department and will be used for general park purposes of picnicking and bathing and no commercial ventures or trailer camp sites.

The two Michigan flankers are really enjoying the experience of being members of the College All-Star team and wouldn't miss it for anything. A total of 49 players are included on the roster, representing the cream of college football talent in the nation.

"Perfection" is the word which sums up the first three weeks of practice, Maentz and Kramer said.

"These pro coaches are working all the time to perfect what you're doing," Kramer said. "It's a continuation of college, it seems, because these pro coaches pick right up where the college coaches left off in teaching new ways of doing things and executing plays," Maentz added.

Both had a lot of respect for the astute football knowledge of

Jim Podoley, the Central Michigan backfield whiz, received plaudits from the two ends. "He should make a good pro back," Maentz said. They were also impressed with Jerry Tubbs, Oklahoma center. Tubbs was also drafted by the Cardinals and will be playing with Maentz this fall.

The starting lineup hasn't been decided by Lambeau but it's a pretty sure thing that one or the other of both of the Michigan flankers will start in the spectacle.

Each should receive kind of a tingle when they are introduced Friday night, and run through goal posts, spotlighted, toward the middle of the field. Maentz will be wearing No. 85 and Kramer, No. 87.

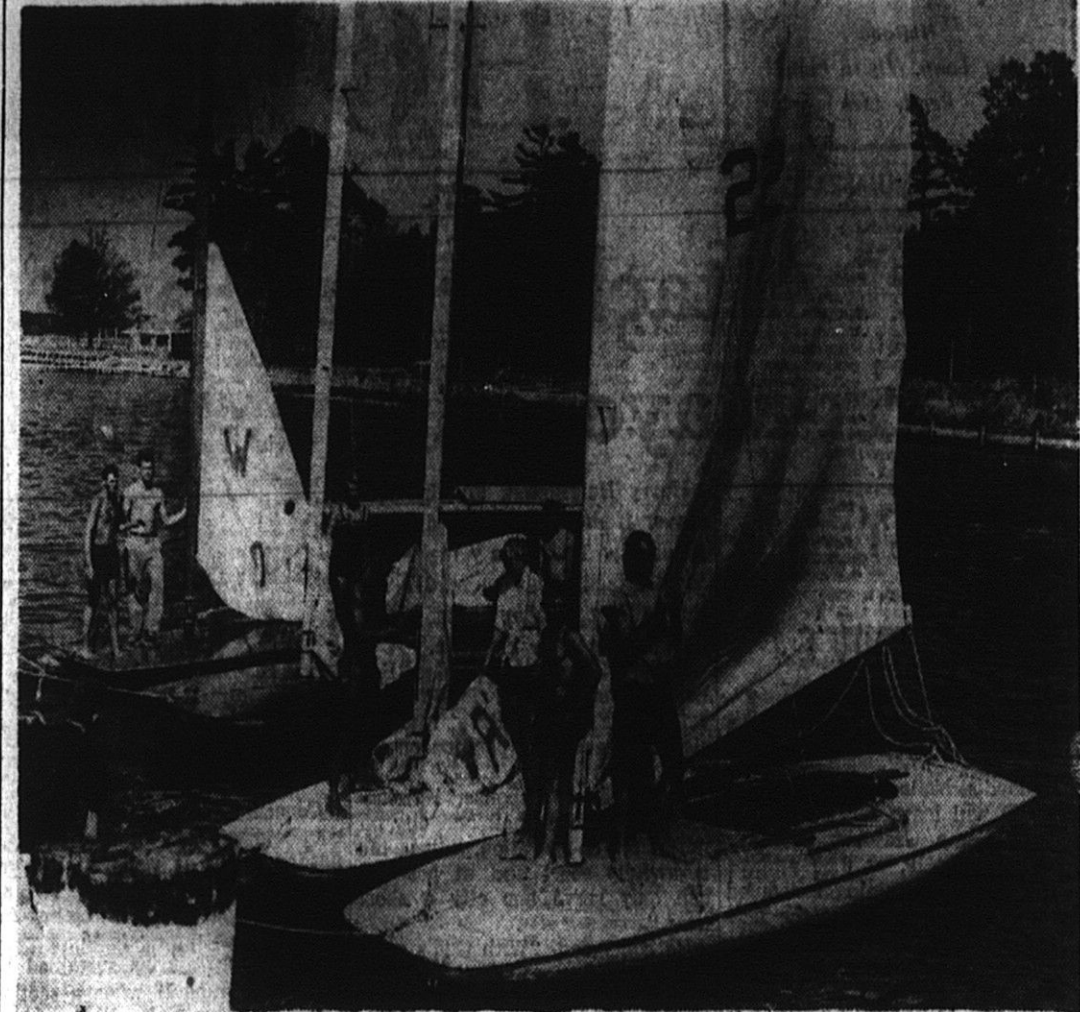

Holland Youngsters Earn Vacation Pocket Money Picking Blueberries

When a deal is found that's mutually beneficial to parents, children and local berry growers, a lot of problems in the community have been solved. That's the situation out at Palm's Blueberry Farm on 152nd Ave., operated by Mr. and Mrs. Henry Palmboos of Holland.

The Palm's 12-acre blueberry patch is one of the few in the Holland area that is harvested entirely by local workers. And the berry pickers are mostly Holland youngsters, filling in the long vacation weeks by earning their own spending money out in the sun and fresh air.

The youngsters are paid seven cents a pound for picking, and Paul Nykamp, 21, of route 2, Zeeland, field manager at Palm's, says that a worker can pick from 50 to 100 pounds a day. At that rate, a youngster could earn the price of a brand new bicycle in about two weeks.

Picking began about two weeks ago and should continue till school starts around the middle of September. The children are off the streets doing something constructive, the parents have a breather, and the Palmboos don't have to worry about housing and feeding transient workers.

They conduct their own pickup and delivery service, too. At 7:30 each weekday morning Nykamp stops with a truck at the Palmboos' home, 96 West 21st St., and picks up a load of kids, each equipped with a noon lunch. Other stops are made at the corners of Pine and 15th St., Pine and 15th St., and Lakewood and River Aves. The kids are brought back at about 4:30 each day.

Any youngster of 13 years or older is taken, and younger ones are accepted if accompanied by a parent. There is a good crop of big berries, helped by plenty of rain this year, and many more pickers are needed, Nykamp said.

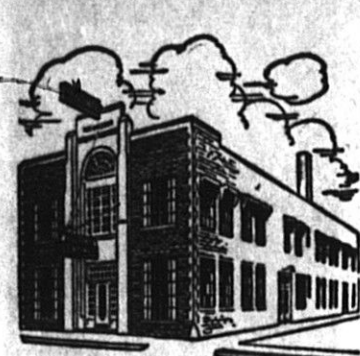

Hannah, a Woman Who Kept Her Promise
I Samuel 1:9-11; I Samuel 1:20-28

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Most people make promises rather readily but not all people keep the promises which they have made. Some people make promises to their fellow men and break them while others make and keep them. And some make promises to God and keep them while others break them. In this lesson we can learn anew the truth that promises are sacred and should be kept.

I. It is good to present our problems to the Lord. This is what Hannah did. Hannah was an unhappy wife and a member of an unhappy home. Ekanah, the head of the home of which Hannah was a member, had two wives. These two wives did not agree. We do not know whom Ekanah married first, Hannah or Peninnah. It is probable that he married Hannah first and when she bore him no children he married a younger woman. It was the habit of this family to go to Shiloh once a year to worship in the sanctuary where a priest named Eli officiated. At one of these annual visits Peninnah sorely provoked Hannah so that she wept and could not eat. Her husband who loved her tried to comfort her but all to no avail — she longed to become the mother of a son and it was her rival's twitting for being childless that grieved her.

Hannah was wise in taking her problem to the Lord. She went to the sanctuary and prayed and promised the Lord that if she would become a mother of a son she would dedicate him to the Lord. Eli, the priest saw her and rashly concluded she was drunk and reproved her. Hannah told the priest she was not drunk and told him what she was doing and expressed the hope that God might grant her the desire of her heart.

II. People with character keep their vows. Hannah's prayer was heard and she gave birth to a son and called him Samuel which means, "asked of God."

This name reminded the mother of the vow she had made. Hannah took good care of her son but she brought him to the sanctuary after he was weaned which took place when he was about three years old. Today too many mothers turn their young children over to others instead of nurturing them themselves. When Hannah brought Samuel to the sanctuary she told Eli the priest that she was the woman who had been there and prayed for the child and the Lord had granted her the desire of her heart. It cost her something to bring the child to the sanctuary and leave him there but she kept her vow even though it involved a sacrifice on her part.

Some people are very ready to make a vow when they want something badly or when they are in trouble but when it comes to keeping the vow they make excuses. Many people take vows lightly, some unite with a church and solemnly promise to attend and then do as they please.

Hannah gave Samuel to the Lord for service. Today there are many openings for full time Christian service. Every denomination needs more ministers. There are parents who try to keep their sons and daughters from going into the ministry or missionary service. It is strange but true that some mothers who are active members of a missionary society will do all they can to keep a son or a daughter from going into full-time Christian service at home or abroad. There is much need for workers. From where will they come? They must come from Christian homes. And who will influence them to go and serve? No one is better fitted than a Christian mother. We need more mothers like Hannah and then we will gain more workers like Samuel.

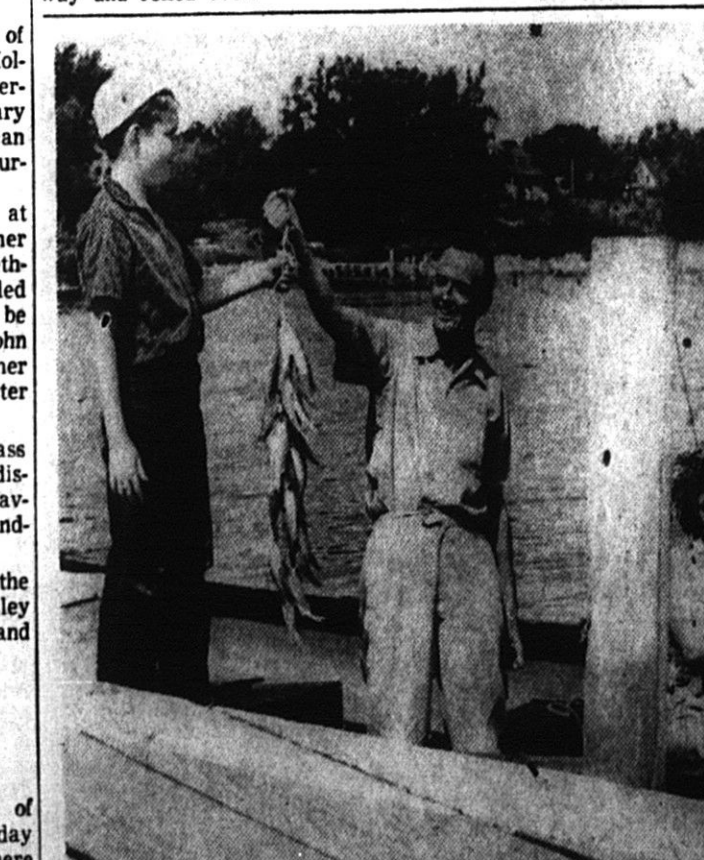

Approves Transfer Of City Property To Ottawa County

City Council, by a vote of 6-3, Tuesday afternoon passed a resolution approving the transfer of the city owned 11th St. parking lot to Ottawa County as a possible site for the proposed county branch building.

The resolution is subject to the conditions that the county in turn conveys the property at 57 West 12th St. and reconveys the property at 53 West 12th St. to the City of Holland. Council also agreed, in the resolution, to fulfill off street parking requirements set down by the Board of Appeals.

On Aug. 1 the Appeals Board approved the site with the stipulations that the sheriff's office be restricted to administrative acts, and that additional off street parking be provided in the ratio of at least one square foot for each square foot of office space in the county building.

The council's vote followed a one-hour special council meeting at 5 p.m. Tuesday. The motion to adopt the resolution was made by Councilman John Van Eerden and seconded by Councilman John Beltman.

There was a detailed discussion between City Attorney James Townsend and Lawrence Beukema, attorney for Mrs. John Kramer of 62 West 11th St. The discussion involved the legality of the transfer of the Wagner property (53 West 12th St.) from the city to the county. Beukema said, that according to law, no city can transfer property which is not to be used for public service for the city. He cited several court cases which upheld this ruling. Beukema stated that the City of Holland cannot give property to Ottawa County, because the property must be under the city's care and for its use only.

Townsend said that the deed to the Wagner property provides that the land may be transferred as long as certain county bureaus are maintained in Holland. If the departments of Health, Welfare, etc., are moved from the city, the property then reverts to the city.

Councilman Holwerda was interested in the question of providing off street parking as required by the Board of Appeals. He expressed the opinion that if it is necessary to provide additional parking space for workers in the county building, it might be wise to put some control on the parking spaces, although it would be a public parking lot.

He said that if the businessmen get to the parking spaces before the county employees, there would still be a parking problem. Holwerda reminded the Council that when the 12th St. property was being considered as the county building site, there was no demand for additional parking space.

Mayor Visscher explained that the desire of the Board of Appeals, as he understands it, is not necessarily to provide additional space, but simply to replace the original 11th St. parking lot.

There was some question as to whether the county building would be a government function. Townsend said that, in his opinion, it would be, and would therefore not be subject to zoning requirements which demand off street parking, but the parking requirements have been set down by the Appeals Board.

In concluding the discussion, Councilman Steffens said that "this is our last opportunity to get out of, what is, in my opinion, an uncomfortable situation. It would be poor business to give away property which belongs to the city for purposes outside of city government."

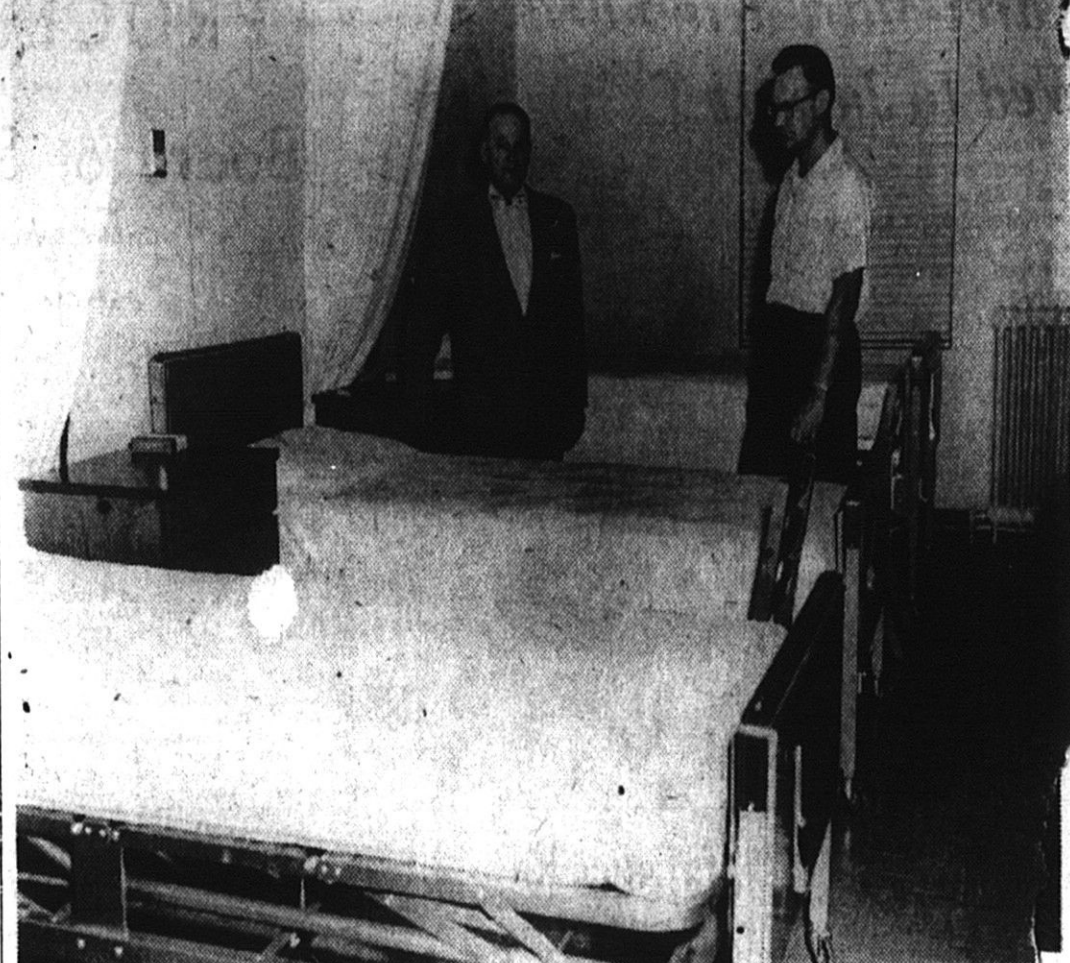

Prof. Brown isn't the only one in the family to go to summer schools. Daughter Sarabeth is taking a course in Art and Design at the Michigan State University. "That shows we are broad-minded," he says.

To get a real feeling of being a student, Prof. Brown lives in a dormitory normally reserved for undergrads. Seeing most U. of Michigan students bicycle, Prof. Brown bought one. Several Hope College students in Ann Arbor can hardly believe their eyes when they see Prof. Brown bicycling around.

"But I am enjoying it." Professor Brown is also enjoying living in a dorm. He is living in a single room. But many students are living in nearby rooms. Some Jesuit priests are studying new methods of teaching Latin, and there are some school administrators. "How about the dorm food, Prof. Brown?" "It is quite good. I like it."

Mr. Vernon Ten Cate, Attorney from the City of Holland appeared before the Board in the interest of certain property owners involving a parcel of land known as the We-Que-Nau-Bing Subdivision near Jensen Park and presented the following Resolution:

RESOLUTION
RE: We-Que-Nau-Bing Park Subdivision

WHEREAS, the Plat of We-Que-Nau-Bing Park was dedicated and recorded in Liber 7 of Plats, page 21, on May 24, 1923, which said plat contains forty-eight private building lots, and

WHEREAS, there is on said plat a designated area called "Park", on which is located a lagoon, which has been used and maintained by the property owners in said plat, and

WHEREAS, there is a legal question involving the interests of many of the County of Ottawa in the said area, and

WHEREAS, it is the petition of the property owners in said subdivision to divide said area and to dredge, clean and improve the said lagoon, and

WHEREAS, the public has not now, nor has in the past made any use of the said property, and there appearing to be no general public benefit in said property;

Thunder was noted on six occasions, and it rained on six days, a total of 2.68 inches.

The two heat waves were from the 18th through the 21st and the 27th through the 31st, when the temperature each day hit 86 degrees or above. The month's high, hit on July 20 and 29 was 94, compared with 89 in 1956, 96 in 1955, 91 in 1954 and 93 in 1953. The low mark, recorded on July 24 was 51, compared with 48 in 1956, 55 in 1955, 47 in 1954 and 48 in 1953.

Average temperature was 73.3, compared with 70.4 in 1956, 78.3 in 1955, 70.9 in 1954 and 73.6 in 1953. Average maximum was 84.3 compared with 79.8 in 1956, 90 in 1955, 81.9 in 1954 and 84.6 in 1953. Average minimum was 62.3, compared with 69.9 in 1956, 66.5 in 1955, 59.9 in 1954 and 62.5 in 1953.

Precipitation measured 2.68 inches, compared with 3.38 inches in 1956, 4.37 inches in 1955, 3.45 inches in 1954 and 2.6 inches in 1953. Precipitation fell on six days compared with 15 days in 1956, nine days in 1955, eight days in 1954 and 10 days in 1953.

Largest amount of rain in a 24-hour period was 1.07 inches, compared with 1.67 inches in 1956, 2.88 inches in 1955, 1.37 inches in 1954 and .94 inch in 1953.

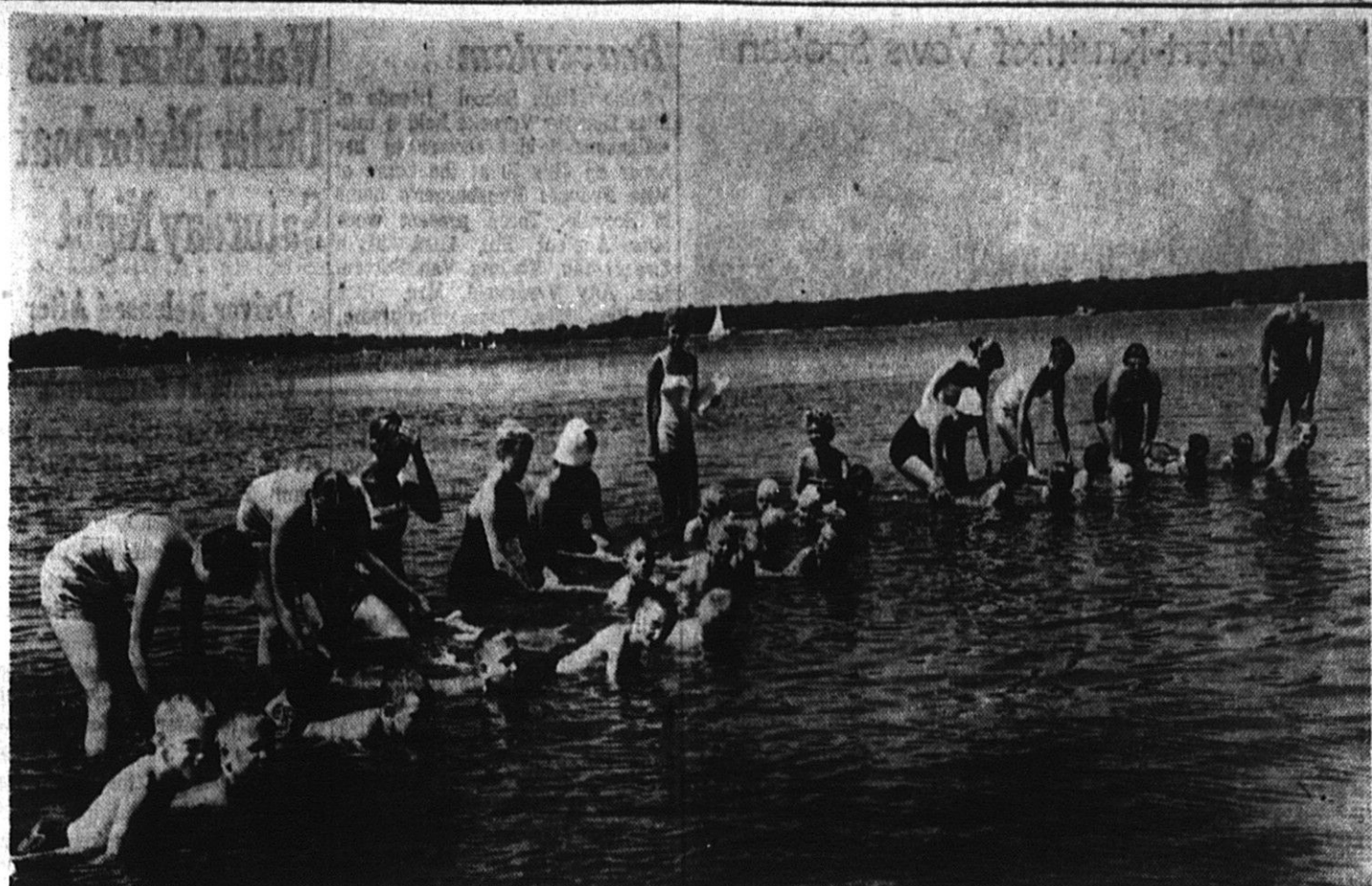

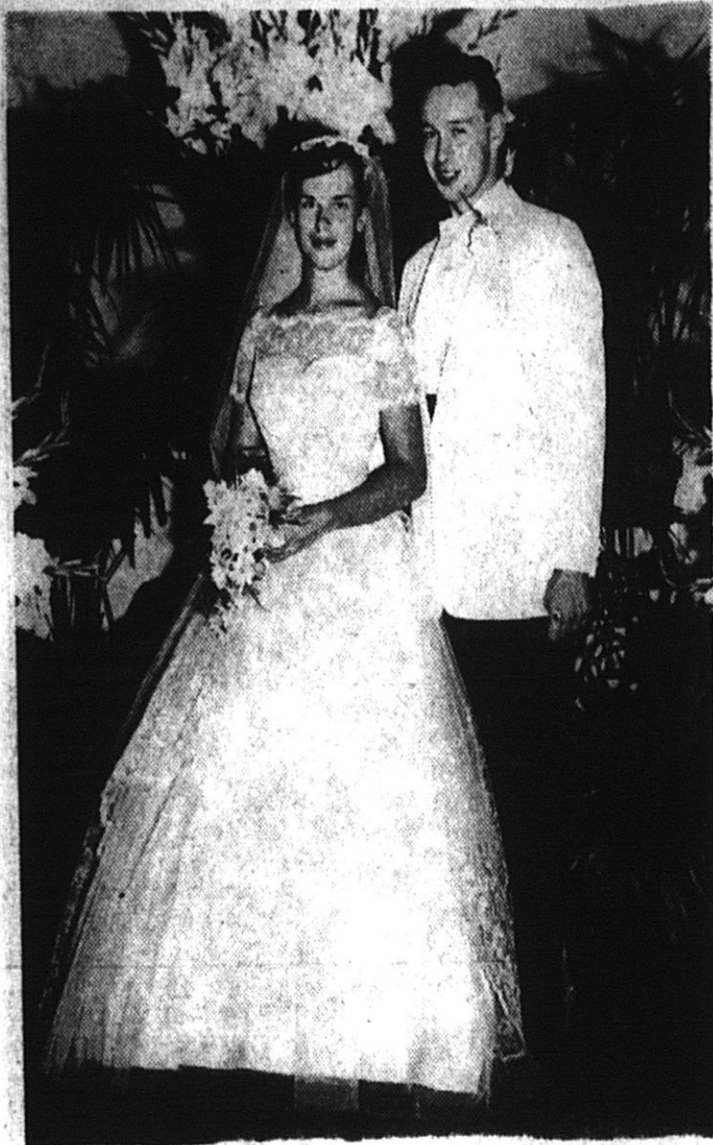

Water Skier Dies Under Motorboat Saturday Night

Driver Released After Questioning; Mishap Occurs at Saugatuck

SAUGATUCK (Special) — Robert C. Cohen, 19, of 3060 Cheltenham Place, Chicago, Ill., was killed Saturday about 6:30 p.m. when he was struck and run over by a 16-foot inboard motorboat while waterskiing in the Kalamazoo River at Saugatuck.

The body was recovered about three hours later by Allegan County Sheriff Walter Runkel. Medical examiner Dr. Kenneth C. Miller of Saugatuck said that death was instantaneous.

The victim was taken to the Dykstra Funeral Home in Holland, from where it was transferred to the Piser Funeral Home in Chicago. The youth was the son of Dr. and Mrs. Bernard Cohen of Chicago, and was reported to be visiting his grandfather in South Haven for a few days.

Cohen was skiing behind an 18-foot outboard motorboat operated by Ambrose C. Brown, of Chicago, according to South Haven State Police, who said Cohen was struck by a boat driven by Edward A. Iverson, 22, also of Chicago.

State police arrested Iverson on a charge of reckless operation of a motorboat and took him to Allegan County Jail. Allegan County Prosecutor Chester Ray released him after questioning.

Iverson told police and Coast Guard authorities that he was passing across the stern of a sailboat in front of him, and saw the boat, but not the towline of the skier until it was too late. He said he immediately cut sharply to the right and put the motor in neutral, but struck Cohen with the left front side of his boat.

The accident occurred about a hundred feet from shore between the Ed-Mar Hotel and the Butler Hotel, police said. Witnesses said the body went down immediately. A marine inspector will arrive at Saugatuck on Tuesday from Ludington to determine if there was any criminal negligence, according to Walter Sears, commander of the Holland station.

Cohen was a student at the University of Illinois. Burial will be in Oakwood Cemetery in Chicago.

Books Accompany 30 Hope Students Attending Summer School in Vienna

While thousands of American college students this summer are tramping over Europe armed with curiosity and cameras, at least 30 of this touring army have packed an additional item — their books.

The 30, all enrolled at Hope College, are placing study before travel in a novel summer school that has its headquarters in Vienna, some 5,000 miles from its regular U. S. campus. The six-week session that started July 8 and ends Aug. 17 is conducted by the Michigan college with the cooperation of the University of Vienna.

Students enrolled in the program take courses in European history and music taught by Austrian professors who present their lectures in English. A program of introductory, intermediate and advanced German also is available.

To give them a close and personal look at Europeans, students are not housed in the traditional dormitories, but live individually with Austrian families with whom they take part of their meals. Most weekends are spent on travel tours to neighboring countries or to Austrian points of historical and artistic interest. These weekends include a tour of Venice, Italy and two visits to Salzburg, Austria during the August music festival.

Before arriving in Vienna, the group was on a 16-day study travel trip through the Netherlands, Belgium, France and Germany. Special briefing sessions for the students were held in Bonn, the Hague and at the College of Europe, Bruges, Belgium. In Paris, the SHAPE headquarters (Supreme Allied Powers Europe) they hear the military experts outline current problems in the western defense of Europe.

In Austria they have been welcomed by government leaders. Only recently they were received by Dr. Felix Hurdus, president of the Austrian National Assembly, who expressed his gratitude to them for United States aid to his country in the post-war years.

After final examinations the students will have ten days to travel Europe on their own before meeting in Rotterdam Aug. 28 for the trip back to the United States. The cost of the program is \$645 and includes travel to and from the United States and in Europe, and room and board.

The summer school is directed by Dr. Paul G. Fried, associate professor of history at Hope College. Also on the staff is Mrs. Esther M. Snow, assistant professor of German at Hope, who is women's advisor. This is the first time that Hope College has taken its summer school to Europe.

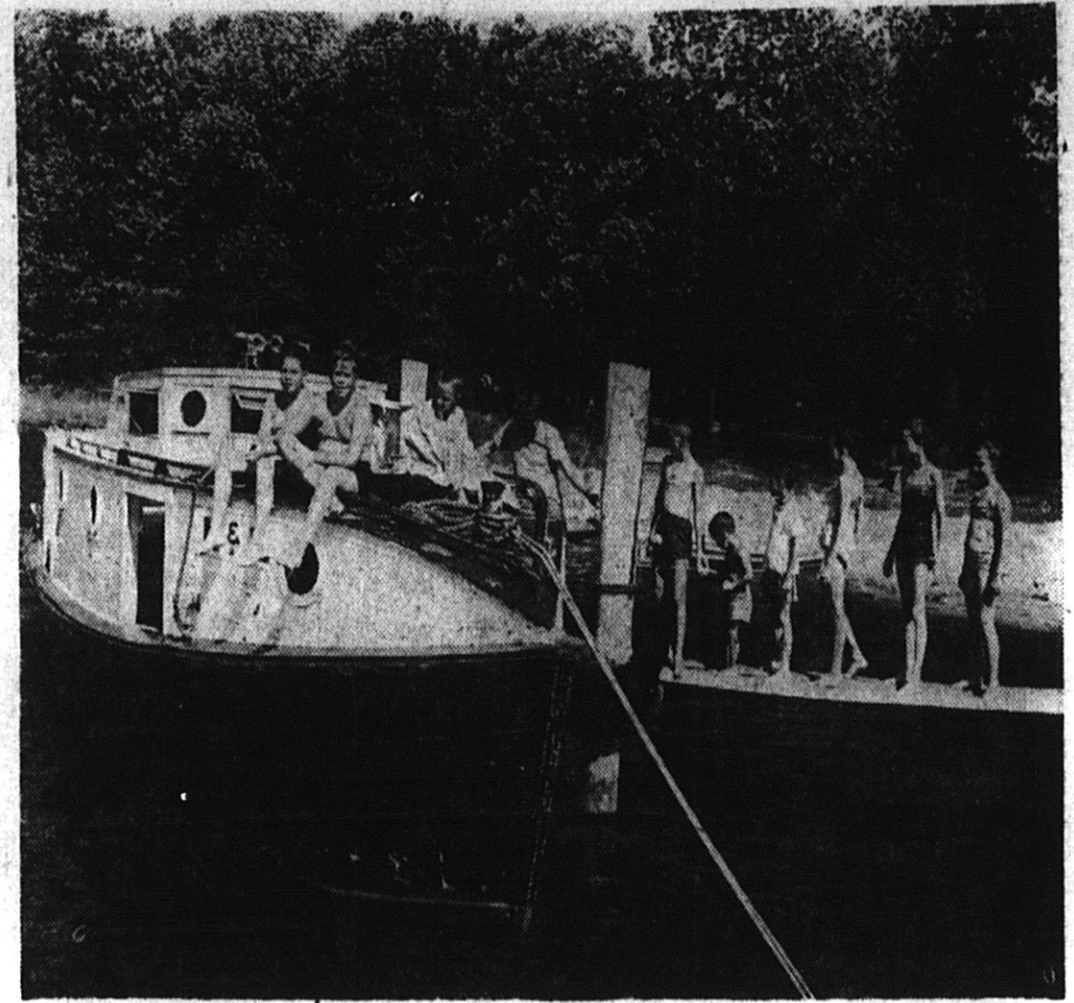
