Pipeline Connection Completed

ZEELAND — Final connections in Zeeland's new water pipeline were completed Wednesday and it is expected water from Holland's water system will be available to Zeeland water users by the end of next week.

Flushing probably will take place this weekend, followed by pressure tests, according to Martin Hietje, Board of Public Works superintendent. Water used in flushing will be diverted to a tributary of Black River near the "brickyard" hill. Detroit specialists will advise on chlorination, working with the Michigan Department of Health.

Zeeland is purchasing water from Holland under an agreement, whereby water will be pumped to Zeeland at offpeak periods. Besides building the pipeline, Zeeland is financing its own storage facilities and will continue to operate its own distribution system as well as billing its customers.

Meanwhile, work is progressing on a 1,250,000-gallon reservoir and pumping station on the north side of Chicago Dr. A few hundred yards from the present ground reservoir and elevated tank on Zeeland's west end.

As soon as the pipeline has been approved by health authorities, water will be brought into the city's underground reservoir on the south side of West Main Ave., and then pumped into the elevated tanks to provide local pressure.

It is expected the big reservoir on the north side of the city will be ready for use in mid-October. Final work on the pumping station and completion of the entire project will be completed sometime in December.

Until water from the Holland system is available, Zeeland's water supply is critically short. The sprinkling ban is still in effect, and all users are asked to conserve water wherever possible.

Large concrete cylinders at various points along the pipeline construction on Howard Ave. and along East Lakewood Blvd. are the walls for manholes that will serve as valves along the pipeline. The line is divided into stations with cutoff valves installed to shut off water in case repairs are needed. There also are air release valves at high points which can be opened to let air escape, thereby eliminating air locks in the transmission line.

An eight-point deer darted into the side of a truck driven by Cliff Cook, of 373 East 24th St., shortly before noon Monday at 11th St. and Van Raalte Ave.

The buck flipped over the cab and landed in the back of the truck where it lay as Cook brought the deer to the Holland police station.

A fawn was also reported running in the downtown area and on Hope campus about the same time. Police said they were unsure why the deer had entered a civic area, although they thought they might have been chased here.

Cook said he was driving north on Van Raalte Ave., when he saw a "flash"; he didn't know what hit the truck, he said, until he stopped and looked in back. The deer had crossed Van Raalte from the west, and in a leap, hit the small window on the left side of the truck, cracking it into an infinite number of pieces.

The body of the deer was to be turned over to the Ottawa County conservation department.

Crash Claims Bride-Elect Of Local Man

Jerry Joldersma's
Fiancee One of Five
Killed in Canada

The bride-elect of a Holland man was among five persons killed in a two-car crash Sunday near Edmonton, Alberta, Canada.

Miss Gladys Wierenga, 23, of Edmonton, who was to marry Jerry Joldersma, 26, of Holland, on Aug. 15, was killed along with her brother and sister-in-law, Andrew Wierenga, 26, and his wife, Carolyn, 23, plus two victims in another car.

Joldersma was injured in the crash and was in fair condition today in a hospital at Edmonton. He had met his wife-to-be while they were students at Calvin College in Grand Rapids. She was a member of a Dutch family which immigrated to Canada some years ago. Since graduating from Calvin, she had been teaching school in Edmonton.

Miss Wierenga's sister-in-law, Carolyn, was a former Grandville girl, a member of the Steenstra bakery family.

The other two killed were identified as Joseph Kowalchuk, 25, and Floyd Rauscher, 22. The head-on crash occurred on a straight stretch of gravel road near Vega, about 70 miles northwest of Edmonton.

Joldersma's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Garry Joldersma, and their daughter, Jean, of 483 Plasman Ave., had planned to leave Holland by train Monday for Edmonton to attend the wedding. They were informed of the tragedy Sunday night and arranged to catch a plane in Chicago early Monday to fly to Edmonton. Their sons, John, Dan and Ned took them to Chicago.

Joldersma's twin brother, Tom, who is employed at Long Island, N.Y., and his wife also arranged to fly to Edmonton.

Both twins, who graduated from Calvin College last year, were

awarded National Defense graduate fellowships, Jerry to the University of Kentucky in the field of international relations, and Tom to Ohio University in the field of physics. Jerry and his bride had planned to live in Lexington, Ky.

According to United Press International, two others were seriously injured in the crash. They were two cousins, 17-year-old Anita Molzan and 18-year-old Carol Molzan. They and the other two occupants of the car who were killed are all of the Vega district.

Noe Named Junior High Principal

Appointment of John Noe Jr. as principal of E. E. Fell Junior High School was approved unanimously by the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night. The appointment is for one year on a 42-week basis with plans to start one week early in the fall.

Noe, who previously this summer had been offered the joint principalship for Lincoln and Washington Elementary Schools, has indicated his preference for the post in the secondary schools. He has had 11 years' experience as principal in Coopersville Schools, spanning a period of seven teachers for 230 pupils to 42 teachers with 1,286 pupils in three buildings.

The recommendation was presented by Harry F. Frissel, chairman of the personnel committee, who announced the committee also had considered 31 applicants for the Lincoln-Washington post and had narrowed the choice down to three applicants and should be able to come up with a recommendation within a few days. He suggested the matter be referred to the personnel committee and the superintendent with power to act.

President Harvey Buter who earlier in the meeting had announced he had added Arthur H. Seddon to the three-member personnel committee commented this referral would involve a quorum of the seven-member board.

Seddon, however, objected to having four members of the board act for the entire board and suggested such an appointment be left up to the superintendent. James O. Lamb, another member of the committee, objected to leaving this decision to the superintendent, whereupon Supt. Walter W. Scott offered a satisfactory compromise of calling a special meeting or an adjourned meeting of the board at 7:30 a.m. Wednesday for the entire board to act on the committee's recommendation. The meeting will be held in the administration office in the Junior High annex on 16th St. A special point was made to include press and radio representatives.

But later in the meeting, Albert Schaafsma, treasurer of the board and also a member of the personnel committee, posed the question that if Seddon is unwilling to delegate work to a committee and Lamb is unwilling to delegate a task to the superintendent, what happens if the rest of the board acts in like manner, causing roadblocks of all kinds.

Both Seddon and Lamb, who were elected to the board last June said their actions were not intended as roadblocks, and Seddon said his concern with only a portion of the board taking action was a legal question.

Schaafsma said a number of meetings have been held and it has been most difficult to make progress, adding that reluctance on the part of new members was a considerable disappointment.

Frissel asked how much progress could be made on a building program if the building committee brought every decision to the board, and Seddon said he was concerned only with the things that came before the board, one by one. He said his concern with restraint was not designed to hold up progress, but Schaafsma said although that may not be the intention, it certainly was the result.

President Buter brought an end to this interchange by saying the adjourned meeting would be held Wednesday morning and he hoped these differences on procedures would be resolved very soon.

At the close of the meeting Seddon presented a two-page summary of public school costs, comparing Holland's figures with national figures published by the American Institute of CPA's in 1963. Crux of the report was his figures on instruction and operations, pointing to a previous presentation last month in which he proposed to eliminate several custodians and hire more teachers. Buter said the figures for Holland on maintenance may be somewhat high since Holland is in the "cold" belt and the fuel costs are considerably higher than the national average.

Buter designated that the Seddon report be referred to the finance committee for study along with several other previous reports.

All members were present. William Gargano gave the invocation. The meeting adjourned after an hour and 20 minutes.

Galesburg Man, 53, Is Drowned

ALLEGAN—A 53-year-old Galesburg man drowned in Big Spec Lake about six miles north of here Thursday night, and his wife narrowly escaped drowning in an attempt to rescue him.

The body of Cassius Dunn, of 190 New St., Galesburg, was recovered this morning at 10:03 a.m. by Allegan County Sheriff's officers dragging the lake.

Deputies had dragged until 12:30 a.m. this morning after receiving the call at 7:50 p.m. Thursday, and resumed dragging operations this morning shortly before the body was found.

They said the body was located in about 15 feet of water.

Sheriff Robert Whitcomb said Dunn, who owned a cottage on the lake, was fishing with his wife Jane, 43, in a boat a short distance offshore of their cottage property.

Dunn apparently stood up in the boat and toppled backwards into the lake, Whitcomb said.

Mrs. Dunn, who apparently cannot swim, jumped into the water in an attempt to rescue her husband, Whitcomb said, and began struggling in the water.

Mrs. Dunn was pulled to safety by Bud Hough and Jim Blackman, two other cottagers, who spotted the couple struggling in the water. Whitcomb said Mrs. Dunn, who was closer to shore than her husband, was sinking into the muddy bottom when the pair reached her and pulled her into their boat.

She remained in a state of shock at Allegan Health Center, and officers have been unable to talk with her Friday.

Medical examiner Dr. James Mahan pronounced Dunn dead at the scene, due to accidental drowning, after the body was recovered Friday. The body was taken to the Moore Funeral Home in Allegan, and was expected to be taken to a Galesburg funeral home.





William O. Reed, 74, of 77 East 21st St., died in Holland Hospital early Friday after being hospitalized for two weeks.



University of Tennessee and Yale

Starting in the House in 1938 he
represented his home district for
10 years, then on to the Senate
being elected in 1944 and re-elected

A veteran of ten years in the

recognition. The Senate's Special
Crime Investigative Committee,
which he sponsored in the 81st
Congress and headed in a nation-
wide 1950 racket inquiry, helped
to spearhead the post-war cam-
paign that had people in crime run-
ning for their lives. The campaign
against crime reached into almost
every American city of any size.

We have lost another valuable
Congressman. Time and the stress
of government today takes its toll.
The Senator will be remembered
as a hard working man when the

We are all tested. Some are test-

tells the story of a man who was
greatly tested and won the victory.

I. God tests his people.
The King James Version uses
the word "tempt" while the new
version uses the better word—test.
Satan tempts people for the pur-
pose of making them do evil. God
tempts or tests in order to make
his people spiritually strong. Never
does God seek to induce people to
do evil.

One day God told Abraham to
offer up his only son, Isaac, for a
burnt offering on a mountain which
he would show him. All the prom-
ises that God made to Abraham
centered in his son Isaac, whom
he deeply loved. God promised that
he would make of him a great
people, give the land of Canaan to
his descendants, and cause him to
be a blessing to the world. How
could this happen if Isaac would
be offered up?

II. Obedience indicates faith.
What did Abraham do after re-
ceiving this strange command?
He did not argue, hesitate, debate,
but on the following day he rose
up early and began a three-day's
journey to the mountain. Abraham
did not sleep much that night. Pre-
parations had to be made and then
the journey.

How can we explain the obedi-
ence of Abraham? It was his faith
that made him obey. A strong
faith is not gained in a day. A
young man does not become an
athlete in a week. It takes time
to develop spiritual muscles.

Faith expresses itself in giving
that which is the most precious.
We all are called upon to present
offerings to God. Too many people
give only the cheap and the best
they keep for themselves. The
greater faith we have the more
willing we are to offer our best—
the best time, the best treasures,
the best gifts to the Lord who gave
himself in presenting his Son.

III. Faith triumphs.
When Abraham and the servants
and Isaac reached the top of the
mountain, the lad said, "Behold
the fire and the wood: but where
is the lamb for a burnt offering?"
The father said, "God will pro-
vide."

And God did. Just when Abra-
ham was about to kill his son an
angel of the Lord called and stop-
ped him. As Abraham looked, he
saw a ram caught in the thicket
and he took him and offered him
instead of the son.

Abraham pleased God by his
faith. Do we please God by a
great faith?

Sirrine and Roy Ashley, ends;
Wendell Helfrick and Hub Ingham,
tackles; Henry Boeve and Clifford
Kaiser, guards; Coxy Smith, quar-
terback; Lovell McClellan, full-
back; John Whelen and George
Smith, halfbacks; and Bernard
Bosman, center.

The year was 1912 and the Hol-
land High football team that year
was composed of these men plus
two other guards Edward Haan
and Herb Cook, substitute Eddie
(Red) Hansen and Coach Cubby
Drew. The team of '12 compiled a
7-1 record.

The team held its fourth annual
reunion Wednesday at the home
of "Bunk" Bosman, 1731 West
32nd St. where six remaining mem-
bers and two guests talked of old
games with the victories of those
years still fresh in their minds.

Smith, Ashley, Ingham, Sirrine,
Cook, Bosman, Spriggs Te Roller
and Simon Den Uyl spoke fondly of
that first Holland High football
team which the late Cubby Drew
coached.

The team played their home
games on the old 19th St. field
which had no yard markers or
boundary lines. The game fea-
tured 30 minute halves and team
members supplied their own uni-
forms. And as the players now
proudly recall there was no sub-
stitution as marks the game today.
Instead every player played his
position throughout the whole
contest.

Schools that Holland High still
play such as Grand Haven, Mus-
kegon, Grand Rapids Union and

Central were foes of the old "11".
Hope College was also played in
the year 1912 and as the team
members now recall, "we beat
them twice."

During the three years the team
played together they won all their
games with the exception of the
one they lost in their first season.
Such victories as beating Sparta
107-0 and Grand Haven 67-0 are
among the most vivid in their
minds.

Also vivid is shoveling the snow
off the football field before they
could play on late fall evenings and
the variety of uniforms the play-
ers wore. "Bunk" Bosman proudly
recalls how his football shoes were
the most like official ones.

The year 1912 was important for
the high school as the student gov-
ernment was started and the first
Boomerang published. Simon Den
Uyl was president of the graduat-
ing class of 1914 of which most of
the players were members.

Jack Schouten, who acted as
trainer for the group, was unable
to attend this year's reunion al-
though he was at the first three.
Roy Ashley promoted the idea of
the reunions in 1960. Spriggs Te
Roller attends as a representative
of the baseball teams of that era
where he acted as catcher for the
Central and Old State Leagues.

Many of the team members still
live in the Holland area today
with the exception of Hub Ingham
from Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. and
Coxy Smith from San Clemente,
Calif.

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

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
