Mrs. Hettinger said deadline for filing nominating petitions for the Probate Judge office is Sept. 1, at 4 p.m.

Regulations require that nominees be qualified electors of Allegan County, licensed to practice law in Michigan, and under the age of 70.

Step Taken In Agency For Children

City Council Wednesday night authorized City Manager Herb Holt and City Attorney Gordon Inary studies in connection with implementing the No. 1 recommendation of the Jaycees Study on Juvenile Problems in Holland in setting up a child protective agency in Holland with legal power to act.

Councilman Hollis H. Clark presented the resolution calling for further studies in connection with the extensive report the Jaycee committee had compiled under the chairmanship of Roger J. MacLeod. All survey work was under the direction of Earl E. Hall of Hope College.

On suggestion of Councilman Morris Peerbolt, Mayor Nelson Bosman was authorized to appoint a committee to expedite plans for a new police and fire headquarters which likely will involve a vote on a bond issue at some future date.

Council held first reading on an ordinance to amend the fee schedule for heating and ventilating permits and for plumbing permits. Final reading and passage are scheduled for the Sept. 1 meeting.

Utility bills remaining unpaid as of July 31 were ordered placed on the fall tax rolls. Councilman Eugene Vandevosse asked that the Board of Public Works review its method of collection, pointing to cases in which such bills often hit tax bills long after property has changed hands and new owners are faced with unexpected charges.

Councilman Richard Smith asked whether something could be done about the new car wash at 32nd and State Sts., stating he had received several complaints of noise, lights, etc. The city attorney explained the law as it affects public and private nuisances. Smith felt a reduction of hours in the 24-hour operation could be a solution.

Mayor Bosman presided at the meeting which lasted just over an hour and a half. All Councilmen were present. Invocation was given by the Rev. J. Herbert Brink of Sixteenth Street Christian Reformed Church.

Police said the building was entered by ripping a screen on the front door. Over \$300 in cash was taken in the break-in.

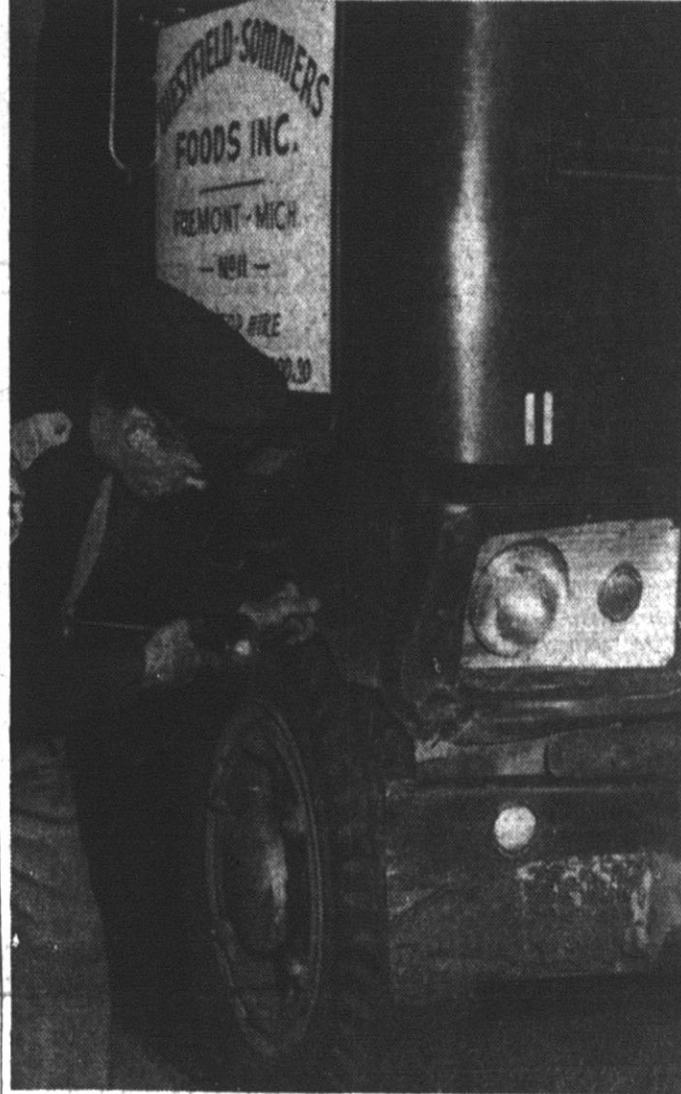
Man Wounded

Holland Man, 46, Dies in Crash

A rural Holland man was killed at 12:10 a.m. Tuesday when his pick-up truck was struck in the rear by a semi on U.S.-31 near Van Buren St., bringing the county death toll to 11.

Eugene Cass Denny, 46, of 4144 136th Ave., was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital. Death was due to head injuries.

Ottawa sheriff's deputies identified the driver of the semi which struck Denny's vehicle as Steven Norman LaMie, 37, of Hesperia. LaMie was not injured.

Deputies said both vehicles were southbound on the highway when LaMie apparently attempted to pass Denny.

LaMie told deputies he was about to overtake the Denny vehicle when he noticed his head for the left lane. LaMie said he slowed up and stayed on the right because he thought Denny was going to turn left.

"I started on the right and flashed my lights and then Denny drove to the right and I tried to get over to the left but didn't have time to stop," LaMie said. LaMie's truck struck the pickup off the left rear section.

The pickup truck left the roadway 66 feet from the point of impact. It traveled another 26 feet off the roadway and rolled over, pinning Denny beneath the wreckage.

Sheriff's deputies with the assistance of passing motorists lifted the truck and pulled Denny out.

The accident was discovered by sheriff's deputies on routine patrol. Investigation is continuing. LaMie was not held.

Denny was born in Holland and has lived here all of his life. He was a veteran of World War II, a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Elks Club, Eagles Lodge.

Surviving are his wife, Lorraine; one brother, Raymond Denny of Holland; and two sisters, Mrs. John (Virginia) Van Kley of Holland, and Mrs. Joseph (Leona) Clark of Grand Haven.

Airport Gets \$10,000 Gift

ALLEGAN — Rockwell-Standard, Allegan's largest single employer, has donated \$10,000 to the Allegan Airport Fund.

Financing of Padgham field improvements is being shared by industry and the city. Construction awaits final approval of a \$60,000 federal grant and \$30,000 in state funds. Total cost of airport expansion has been set at \$120,000.

Carl Goodwin and Sons, Allegan contractors have been notified by the State Department of Aeronautics that its firm is low bidder for airport construction.

The Allegan division of Rockwell-Standard manufactures universal joints. Nationally the company manufactures a complete line of aircraft ranging from the new jet Commander to the Aero Commander 100, a four-place single engine plane. The company's private planes will be using Allegan airport extensively, according to Donald Wilber, local division manager.

The Canadian visitor had added reason for interest. He revisited Vinkel a year ago and was present when the old mill with its black tar paper covering was dismantled. He had several snapshots with him similar to pictures the Sentinel has run from time to time over the past year.

Several Bids Okayed By Council

City Council took action on bids Wednesday night involving the sale of rock salt, calcium chloride and No. 5 fuel oil for Holland Hospital and Civic Center.

Rock salt brought the most discussion and Council approved the bid of International Salt Co. at \$13.20 a ton, one of four identical bids submitted. The city manager had recommended an alternate bid of Diamond Crystal Salt Co. which quoted a price of \$12.70 a ton picked by city trucks at the salt depot at Brewer Coal Dock. A representative of International Salt Co. was present and pointed to excellent service his company had given last year when all other salt companies had run low on supplies.

When Mayor Nelson Bosman asked why salt bids are usually identical, the International Salt Co. representative said his firm in June announced in the Wall Street Journal that the price of salt at the mine would increase from \$6.40 to \$7.40 this year, and all other companies seemed to arrive at the same price. He added freight charges are determined by public service commissions.

is being tried again. He said that case has been tried and is being tried again. He said last year for the first time in years, salt quotations varied and there was more confusion over some customers paying a trifle more than others when prices were identical.

Council approved the city manager's recommendation to purchase approximately 200,000 gallons of No. 5 fuel oil from Naph-Sol Refining Co. at a cost of \$.0875 per gallon, as the best bid by 210 city. The Naph-Sol bid was the low bid but the city manager explained the small difference in price would not compensate for work needed to adjust equipment to a new type of oil. There were nine bids.

On calcium chloride, Council approved low bid of Haviland Products Co. in net amount of \$40.50 a ton delivered. There were four bids.

A three-page letter from Gerald Postma, 48 West 37th St., commended Council for its stand July 7 on Sunday elections but said Council was not consistent in regard to its stand on Sunday operation of Windmill Island. He stated he does not approve of Council's action allowing Sunday operations and expressed the hope that the federal government will heed the resolution of Council and not ignore the plea of citizens by simply filing the resolution for information. His letter was filed.

A petition by Randall M. Dekker, attorney in behalf of Rolland Lambers, requested vacating a portion of Country Club Rd. north of Legion Park Dr. The roadway north of the Lambers property already has been vacated. Council set a public hearing Oct. 6.

A communication from the C and O railway informed Council of plans for repair work to crossings on River Ave., Eighth St. and 22nd St. and Ottawa Ave.

A petition with 69 signatures requesting a traffic light at the corner of State and 32nd Sts. was referred to the Traffic and Safety Commission for study and report. Later in the meeting Councilman Richard Smith asked that similar study be given the intersection at 32nd St. and Michigan Ave.

Following public hearings, Council ordered construction of water mains in Heather Dr. and Bredaco Ct. No opposition had been voiced.

Council granted a permit to Don Brink Construction Co. to move a garage from 429 West 32nd St. to 397 Central Ave. The request had been tabled from two weeks ago.

Council also granted a permit to Walter Deitz to move a house from 563 East 32nd St. to 980 East 24th St. A letter from John Keuning who is having the house moved was accompanied by a statement signed by all property new location stating they have no objection to the proposed moving. The two-week waiting period was waived in view of the consent of the property owners and the fact that the Seven-Up Bottling Co. wants to start construction on the property at 568 East 32nd St. as soon as the house is removed.

A Board of Public Works report submitting a resolution in connection with the \$1,800,000 sewage disposal system bond issue was approved unanimously. This sewer expansion program was approved in an election last April 5.

A claim against the city from Earl J. Brown, 497 East Lakewood Blvd., was referred to the city attorney and the insurance carrier.

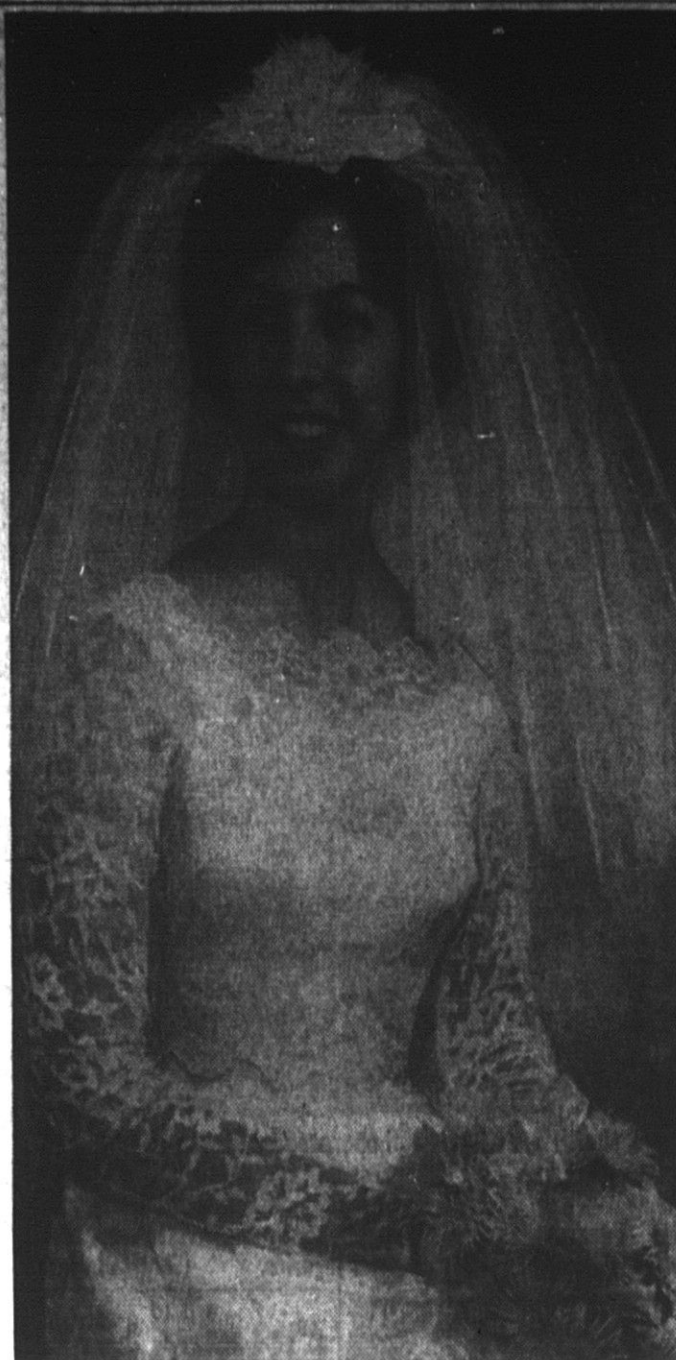

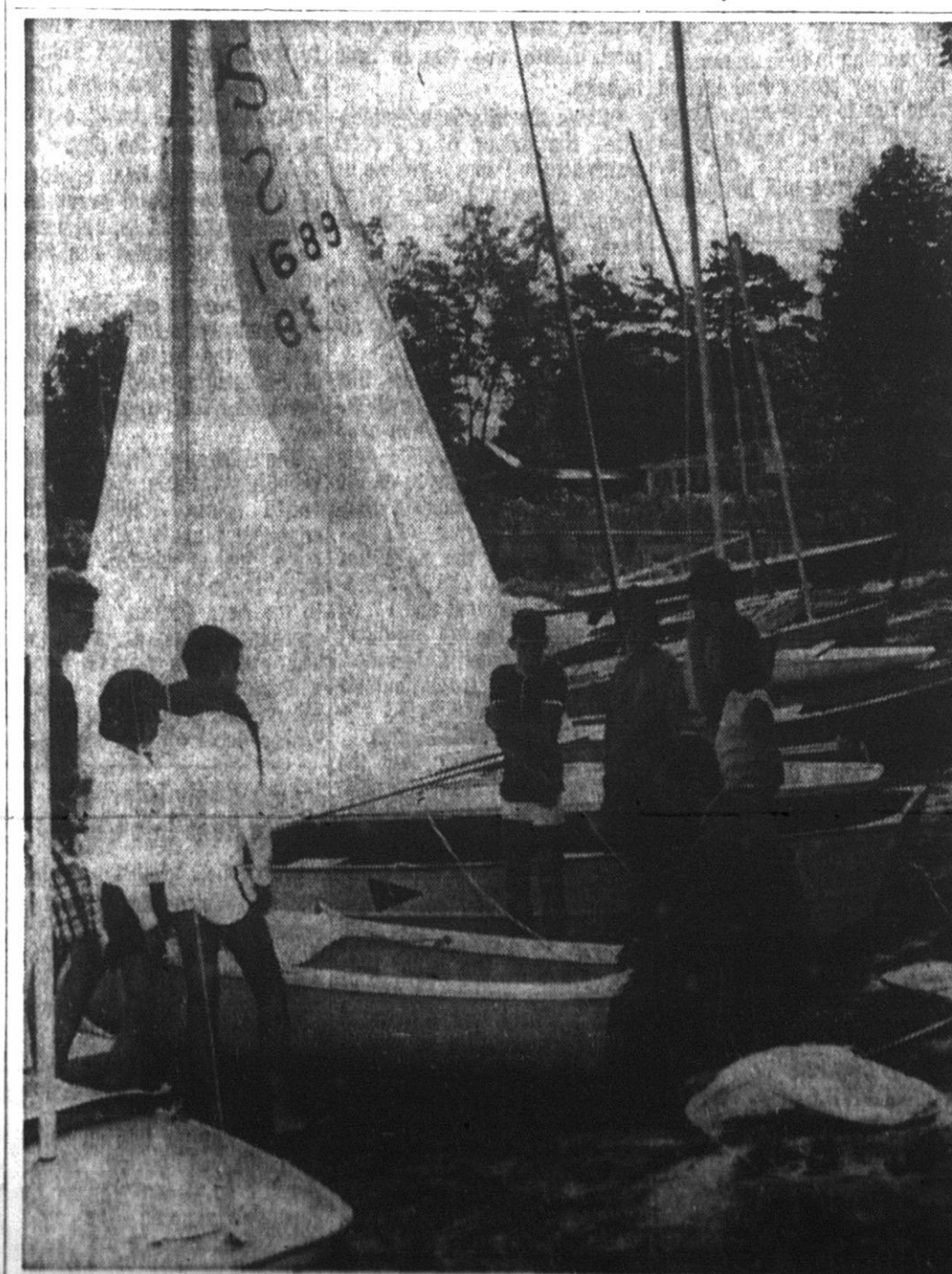

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Hope Given NSF Grant For Research

A \$10,500 undergraduate research participation grant has been awarded to Hope College's chemistry department, according to an announcement by Calvin A. Vander Werf, Hope president.

During the academic year of 1965-1966 and the summer of 1966, five students and five professors of chemistry will engage in a special project of physical, organic, inorganic or analytical chemistry.

The undergraduate research participation program of the National Science Foundation is designed to provide increased opportunities for the scholarly development of outstanding undergraduates with a view to raising individual competence of those students who will pursue careers in science.

Professor Jerry Mohrig, director of the independent research project, said that projects will begin in September and continue through August of 1966.

Various projects will be selected and each of the five students will consult with his faculty advisor as the exact nature and purpose of the project.

Mohrig stated, "The close relationship between the faculty advisor and student will include many conferences over problems of the project, but the student is essentially engaging in independent study as a part of his training for advanced study in the sciences."

"The students will do library work, develop the purpose of the project, try out their own ideas and student initiative is paramount in achieving success in such a program," Mohrig concluded.

Faculty members associated with the NSF projects include professors Irwin J. Brink, David H. Klein, Eugene C. Jekyl, Douglas C. Neckers and Jerry Mohrig, the director of the project.

The outstanding students will receive stipends for their research, three hours credit, \$300 during the regular academic year and \$600 for full time research in the summer.

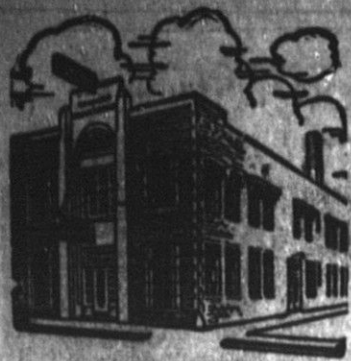
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AT LAST THE DAWN

Holland Park Improvements Are Planned

IRON RIVER — Holland State Park is among 20 state parks in Michigan sharing in a \$2 million program involving land acquisition and general improvements, according to action taken by the State Conservation Commission Friday.

Improvements for the Holland park include exercising the option for 90 acres (Michigan property) and for such general improvements as picnic grounds, camping and toilet facilities, beach development and laundry facilities for campers. Such improvements in individual parks will be decided at a later date.

Most parks sharing in the improvement program are in southern Michigan. Parks mentioned besides Holland were Van Buren, Silver Lake, Wells, Warren Dunes, Fort Wilkins and Sterling. Others are Pinkney, Island Lake, Brighton, Waterloo, Ortonville and Highland recreation areas.

A spokesman for the Conservation Commission said funds to finance the purchase of property to enlarge Holland State Park were included in the 1965-66 commission budget, and formal action by the commission was all that is needed to consummate the transfer.

In the total improvement program, some of the \$2.1 million in federal funds granted on a matching basis might also be used.

Holland Has Power Loss

A tube failure in the largest boiler at the city's power plant on West Third St. left about 1,800 homes, businesses and industries on the east side of Holland without power for between one and two hours Monday.

Guy Bell, superintendent of public utilities, said the area involved was bounded roughly by Central Ave. on the west, the Black River on the north, the east city limits on the east, and 17th St. on the south. Some feeder lines running south of 17th St. and west of Central Ave. were also affected.

Bell said the large boiler went out about 7:25 a.m. Power was restored gradually working east as the standby boilers were activated. All the power was restored by about 9:25 a.m.

Without power were a portion of the Eighth St. shopping area, Hart and Cooley Manufacturing Co., Western Foundry Co., National Biscuit Co., Home Furnace Co., Donnelly Mirrors plant and other businesses and industries on the east side. Police directed traffic at Eighth St. and College Ave., Eighth St. and Columbia Ave. and 17th St. and River Ave. where traffic lights were out.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, August 22
The Passions of the Flesh
Galatians 5:19-26

By C. P. Dame

Jesus saves completely—that is the truth Paul tried to make clear to the Galatian churches which he had founded. Jewish agitators had come into these new churches and had taught that no one could be saved unless he observed circumcision and the Jewish ceremonies. Paul contended that we are saved through faith in Christ—that is enough. Some modern agitators do much harm in the church.

1. Christians are meant to be free for they have been called unto liberty. Jewish agitators tried to enslave new converts to the laws of Moses. Freedom however must be handled right—just as a car. Some of these new Christians turned freedom into license. They gave full sway to their passions and emotions. To this Paul objected, telling them that a Christian is free not so that he may sin but that he may be free not to sin. Absolute freedom becomes a curse and leads to ruin.

Freedom must not be used for self-indulgence but for the benefit of others. By love Christians should serve each other. People who love their neighbors gladly give up their rights, serve them, ward off dangers from them. On the other hand those who fight each other destroy each other.

II. Christians are engaged in a warfare between the flesh and the spirit. The reason is that the flesh and the spirit are in constant conflict with each other—the flesh makes its demands and so does the spirit. Paul knew the works of the flesh and mentions them, citing three groups of sins—sins of lust, sins of superstition and social sins. Sexual sins were common in Paul's day and they are also in this sex-saturated age. Chastity is a distinct Christian virtue.

There is much more superstition today than most people realize. "Idolatry and witchcraft" are common even now. And then there are the social sins, "hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies," and we know that, "Envyings, murders, drunkenness, revellings"—sins of the flesh and of the spirit, still thrive. The devil tempts people to the kind of sins to which they most easily yield.

III. The fruit of the spirit enriches believers. Marked indeed is the contrast between the works of the flesh and the fruit of the spirit. Note the nine Christian virtues Paul mentions: "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance"—and overlook not the words, "against such there is no law." A law is not necessary where love prevails.

People who are led by the spirit do the will of God by choice. On the other hand the people who refuse to be led by God's spirit permit the flesh to dominate in their lives. Evil comes from the flesh, the good from the spirit. It is much easier to live with people who are led by the spirit than to be thrown in contact with people who are ruled by the flesh.

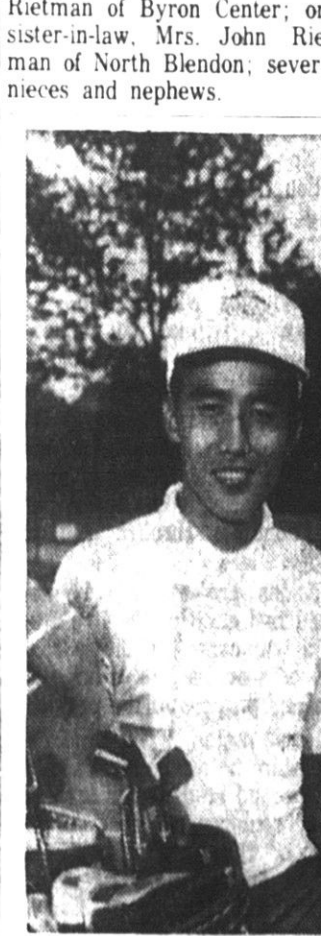
Mrs. Albert Slagh Succumbs at 62

In the evening there was another 50-minute interruption due to a power failure in the city affecting the same area where the tower is located.

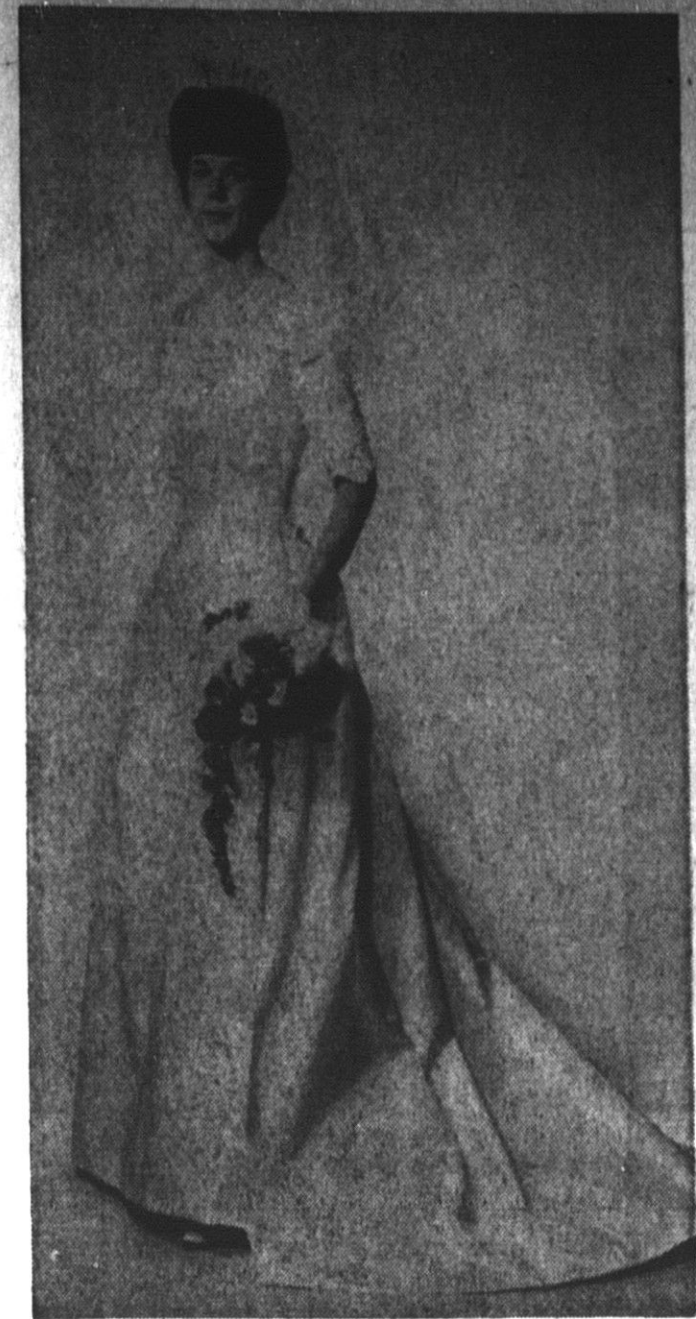

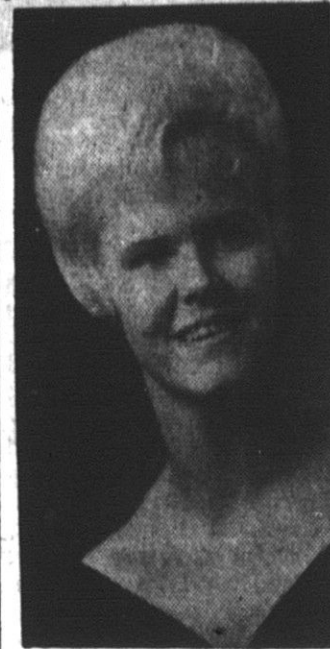

Council Asks BPW Study on Water

Water turned out to be the main subject of discussion at a regular meeting of City Council Wednesday night.

With little or no discussion, Council referred a communication from Holland township board asking for a definite commitment on the sale of bulk water by Oct. 1 to the Board of Public Works for study.

The township communication was in the form of a resolution the board adopted Aug. 5 stating that unless City Council came up with an acceptable policy on the sale of bulk water, the township would develop and pursue plans to purchase water in bulk from the Wyoming pipeline.

Then by a vote of 5 to 4, Council tabled again a Board of Public Works recommendation on a proposed water policy for Federal district which lies in Holland township. Two weeks ago Council referred back for further study the BPW recommendation to extend water services into this area charging rates double that paid in the city, plus hook-

up fees similar to those paid in the city.

In its restudy, the BPW indicated as a protection on delinquent bills, the city ordinance authorizes collection of deposits up to two times the quarterly bill. It was also indicated that any new installations done by the township at property owner's expense would be considered part of the city system if annexation of the area occurred.

Opposing tabling the recommendation were Councilmen Bertal Slagh, Hollis Clark, Eugene Vande Vusse and Mayor Nelson Bosman.

Later during communications from the audience, Paul Danielson, a resident of Federal district, said he lives on a street that has a six-inch main and he needs water in his home badly. He scored Council for tabling action, stating that such action was long overdue. He said all areas should work together for the welfare of the entire community, adding he had worked hard for annexation on two occasions and had been subjected to considerable abuse.

On another subject of water service, Council voted 5 to 4 to delete a section from a resolution adopted June 2 making hookup charges for outside industrial users retroactive to 1956.

Opposing the deletion were Henry Steffens, Morris Peerbolt, Richard Smith and Donald D. Oosterbaan.

Hollis Clark introduced the measure, stating that after reflection it appeared to him Council was unfair in imposing hookup charge on installations dating back eight or nine years.

Peerbolt said he had received only one call from an industry and after explaining the situation he said most of the objections were gone. He was inclined to justify the charge in view of a continuing service which sometime must be replaced.

Eugene Vande Vusse who said he was not on Council at the time water service was extended to some outside industries was inclined to regard such an arrangement as a contractual service and any change at this date could be

interpreted as Holland going back on its word. Peerbolt said he felt the least inequity to all concerned would be to ask the people to pay belatedly. He added it never was his intention to make it a court case.

City Attorney Gordon Cunningham spoke in general terms of contractual obligations, varying policies and said legal and moral obligations are often confused.

Another water matter also was tabled. This was in connection with a request of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond A. Miles, 521 East Eighth St. (Federal district) for sanitary sewer service. The Board of Public Works said such service would not be available until probably 1967 and recommended that the service be permitted when the sewer is ready, with applicant paying double the city rate, plus the regular established connection fee of \$140 for the first 50 feet and \$2.50 per foot for all frontage over 50 feet. A substitute motion to succeed in tabling the request awaiting policies now under study.

Zeeland Mulls Improvements Of Street

ZEELAND — City Council Monday passed another resolution in connection with the proposed improvements of Washington Ave.

Approved was a resolution calling for a public hearing on special assessments for the project. No date was set for the hearing.

The Washington Ave. proposal calls for improving the street from the West city limits to Carleton St. Proposed improvements included widening the street by about 12 feet, installing storm sewers, building curbs and gutters and resurfacing of the entire street. The proposed project would be financed through a \$170,600 bond issue.

Council still has not taken the final step in bringing about the project. The last step would be general approval of the project. If the final step is taken it would presumably come after the hearing on special assessments.

The council finally agreed to end the drive for a public swimming pool because of lack of public support. The committee of private citizens headed by Nelson Van Koeveering collected pledges for \$30,000 in the drive, but could not reach the goal of \$50,000. The pledges will now be dropped.

A public hearing on a new zoning plan for the city will be held the first week in November Council decided. The plan which has been under consideration by a committee for over a year will be presented for public study in October.

In other action the council: Voted to name the intersection of Church St. and Central Ave. where there are three parks Van De Luyster Square.

Approved an increase in city employee hospital benefit plans amounting to an increase from \$20 to \$23 in daily room benefits and other proportional increases in other benefits.

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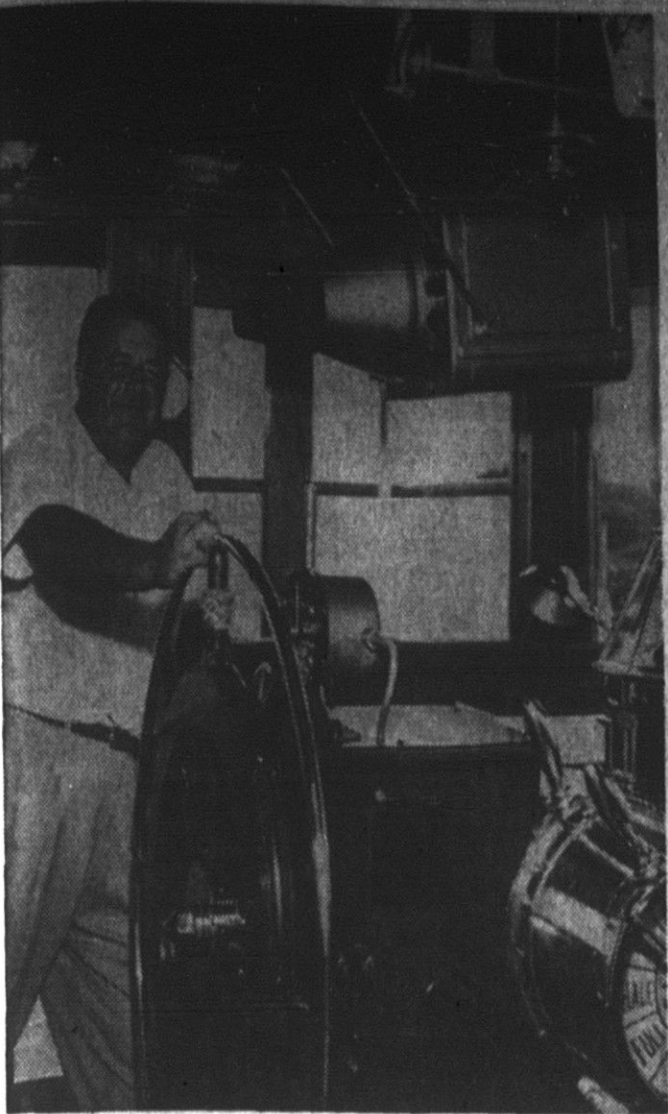

Indiana Town To Conduct Dutch Event

HOLLAND, Ind. — The first annual "Dutch Festival" sponsored by the community of Holland, Ind., located 45 miles northeast of Evansville, will be held on Saturday.

It is unlikely the festival will

present much competition for Holland's famed Tulip Time Festival since the town has a population of only 661. So far the Indiana festival has attracted only local interest but the community hopes to expand the events in the future, according to Mel Bolling, community clerk-treasurer and editor of the town's monthly paper, the Holland Hi-Lites.

Bolling visited Holland Sunday and Monday during his vacation to gather information on

Tulip Time and Holland City to aid in future planning of their own festival as well as do a story on the contrasts and comparisons of the two communities. Bolling expressed a desire to see Tulip Time next May because it "sounds like a fascinating festival."

For the "Dutch Festival," the town plans a chicken barbecue dinner, basketball games and other activities. "Next year we wish to bring in more of a Dutch flavor and sometime in the future we hope to construct a windmill and plant several

more tulip beds than we now have," he explained.

Founded in 1859 by German Lutherans from Cincinnati the town now has a new \$40,000 medical center, a post office to be dedicated in September, and the largest independent dairy in the state of Indiana.

749,266. The year's total is still lower than that of last year at this time due to the bad weather at the beginning of the season.

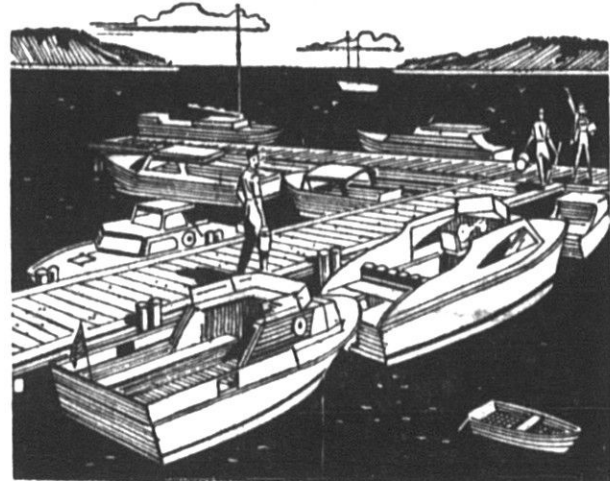
Weekly camp permits issued last week amounted to 441

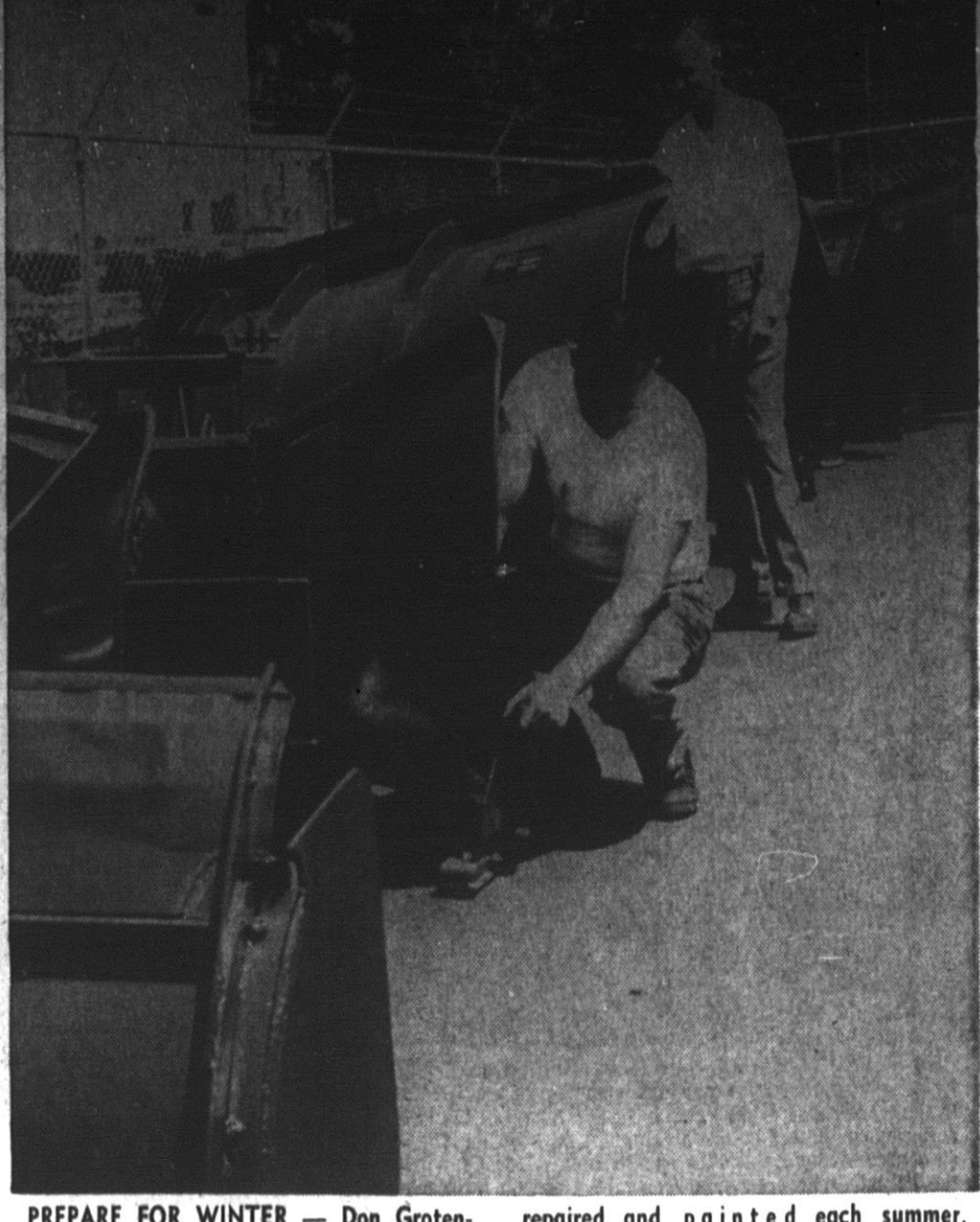

The snowplows, sanding equipment, snow loader, scraper trucks and other equipment have been checked and repaired. Workmen have put a fresh coat of paint on the plows and sanding devices to help protect them from the corrosion of salt.

Bids are being tabulated for calcium chloride, rock salt, blades for the scrapers and other equipment.

Heart Attack Fatal For Grand Haven Man

GRAND HAVEN — John (Bob) Goldberg, 52, of 15302 Robbins Rd., Grand Haven, suffered a heart attack at his home at 7:30 p.m. Friday and was dead on arrival at Grand Haven Municipal Hospital. He had worked as usual Friday at Oldberg Manufacturing Co. where he had been employed for 16 years.

He was born in Grand Haven township and in 1934 married the former Maxine Burghorn. He was a member of the Civil Defense unit in Grand Haven township.

Surviving are the wife; a daughter, Mrs. Nina Harris of Grand Haven township; two sons, John of Grand Haven township and Terry at home; a sister, Mrs. Belle Scheltema of Holland; a brother, Charles of Grand Haven township, and five grandchildren.

The snow removal operation in Holland is a big business costing more than \$100,000 each year and requiring a good deal of planning, according to Henry Terpstra, supervisor of streets. It takes 36 men to do the job of plowing, and removing snow from the streets and sidewalks.

Like any big business a wide variety of equipment is used in snow removal. Ten trucks and a grader plow the streets. The trucks use two types of plows. One type is attached to the bottom of the trucks, and is used for snow under four or five inches deep. When snow piles higher the front end plows are attached to the trucks. There are also two six-foot high V-plows which are used for cutting through deep snow and drifts.

The biggest weapon in the snow fighter's arsenal is an eight-foot high V-plow which can be attached to the grader. With this plow and a special side plow the grader can cut a 20-foot path through a wall of snow. Terpstra said the giant plow was used about three times last year for removing drifts.

Sidewalks are whisked clean by five tractors equipped with small V-plows.

Four trucks are equipped in winter with devices for spreading sand, rock salt and calcium chloride. They prepare the streets before scrapers can arrive. Calcium chloride is used to supplement the salt, Terpstra said, for especially cold temperatures or thick layers of ice and snow.

Two machines are used in picking up the snow. A high snow loader gobbles up piles of snow, carries the snow up like a conveyor belt and dumps it into a truck. Most of the snow is collected by this machine. A snow blower is also used in lifting the snow from the street to trucks. Four trucks carry the snow to the city dump.

Last winter, the city used 81 tons of calcium chloride, 1,313 tons of rock salt and large quantities of sand. It took about 200 sets of specially hardened steel blades for the scrapers. The blades last from about eight hours to three days depending on road conditions, according to Terpstra.

The many snowfalls spread over a long period necessitated more supplies than usual last year, Terpstra said. The total of 112.3 inches, however, did not cause the havoc of the record year of 1962-63 when 135.5 inches fell in Holland.

There is no sure way of predicting how bad a winter is coming, Terpstra said. He hasn't turned to measuring the thickness of animal's coats or any other home methods for gauging the amount of snowfall. He added, however, that they are concerned about being prepared for just about everything.

Although snow storms may be the last thing in mind today, this concern may be appreciated when December comes.

GRAND HAVEN — Grand Haven City Council is studying a proposal of Community Antenna Television (CATV) to erect a community television tower for area tv viewers.

Booth Broadcasting Co. of Detroit outlined plans for such a service at a meeting of City Council Monday night, stating the same company has applied for licensing in Muskegon, Muskegon Heights, North Muskegon and Roosevelt Park.

A \$5 per month change is planned for CATV service here. There also would be a connection fee of \$15 at the start and a \$5 hookup fee. It is estimated Grand Haven area would need 35 miles of cable that costs \$4,000 a mile to install.

Such service eliminates need for room antennas and sharpens the signals for color television, company representatives said. Twelve channels would be offered. The company is hopeful of signing up 50 per cent of area tv users.

Views From The Campus

The other night I went for a walk in my native costume of Yukata. My pair of getas or wooden sandals sounded clippety-clop on the hard pavement. Although the sound was familiar to me there was something different about it this time. It

seemed to accentuate that I was in a foreign country. It must have sounded even more strange to the children who began to scramble around me. They soon urged me to let them wear my geta. Some of them, waiting for their turn, showered me with all sorts of questions. Some of the questions were easy to answer, but some led to further contemplation — contemplation not so much on our differences, but rather on what the differences really signify.

A girl asked, "Can you see with those narrow eyes?" As you can well imagine this question took me off guard! Yes, we have observed many things in America, we have stored information in the assorted drawers of our minds, and we never doubted our eyes. We really can see with those "narrow eyes." If there is a difference between the eyes of peoples, this difference lies in the way we include our particular culture, tradition, religion, and taste in what we see. It occurred to me that what we bring to a visual experience because of our different backgrounds makes everyone observe with a "narrow" eye.

The other day one of the Japanese students hilariously declared that he had discovered why Americans like white cotton socks. "They can wash white socks together with other lines. If they wore black socks they would have to feed the 'coin eater' with twice as many coins. Their taste is color is based on economy. This taste starts from the bottom and then climbs up to the top."

Perhaps this student is just trying to be faithful to his teacher's counsel that one should build up one's philosophy from the bottom. Or he must have some unreasonable fear of the "coin-eating" washer that found its way even to a college dormitory. Or perhaps he was coincidentally the boy who learned in Reno that machines eat more coins than he felt like feeding them. Perhaps, or I might as well say probably, he was demonstrating a caricature of what we call criticism. Perhaps he tried to show how a judgment, firmly based upon the beliefs of one's own eye, leads to certain conclusions.

Japanese eyes see with six thousand years of cultural history behind them. Fortunately, during these years we have learned from our contacts with some entirely foreign civilizations that different scales of judgment exist. From this we have developed a sense of understanding and tolerance. No Japanese, for instance, will laugh at an American who cannot sit for a half hour with his legs bent at a tea ceremony.

As spokesman for all the Japanese students who came to Holland this summer, I can safely say that we have learned a great deal. I asked myself, however, if the Hope program was supposed to function on a "give and take" basis what did we give in return? What will people think and talk about after we have left Holland? I sincerely hope that the final evaluation will be that we can show how two peoples with heterogeneous patterns of culture lived together in tolerance and understanding without losing faith in their respective cultures. But even if both sides had any bad impressions of each other, it can still be a profitable experience because it may become a good opportunity for both of us to start doubting our own "eye" to even for a short

Sheriff Seeks More Funds

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa Sheriff Bernard Gysen is requesting additional operating funds from the Board of Supervisors because of an increased work load.

In a letter addressed to Mayor Nelson Bosman of Holland, chairman of the county sheriff's committee, Gysen points to an all-time record of activity by his department during June and July, necessitating services of reserve deputies to do work normally performed by regular deputies.

Gysen appeared before the board in June to explain the need for additional funds, and it was hoped at that time that activity would not be substantially increased.

He wrote: "Without question, we still need additional funds in our general operating budget to continue to serve the residents of our county with the necessary services and enforcement. You can be assured that everything possible will be done to keep this amount to a minimum."

Enclosed statistical information revealed that complaints during June and July have increased 15 per cent over the same period last year. Criminal arrests have increased 44 per cent, traffic arrests 51 per cent, accidents up 22 per cent, prisoners booked at jail up 70 per cent, meals served at jail up 56 per cent and drivers' licenses up 30 per cent.

Gysen asked that three other urgent problems be studied by the committee before the October board session. Additional problems are increased pay scale so that experienced personnel can be retained; addition of a patrolman in the Jenison area, and an additional investigation officer so that patrol cars can work more traffic and not be assigned to investigations.

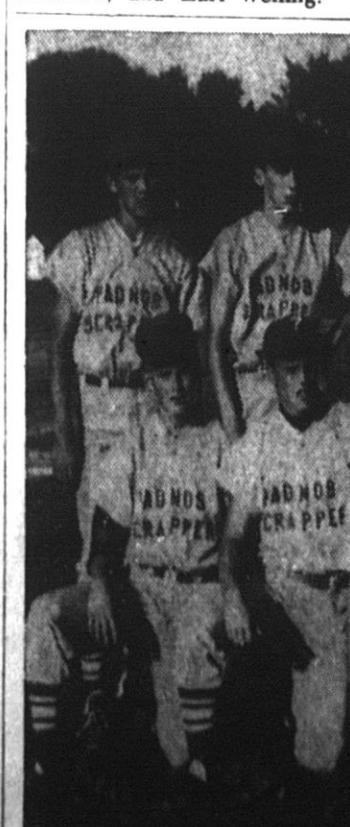

Park Appeals Allocation

GRAND HAVEN—Two members of the state tax commission were in Grand Haven Monday hearing an appeal from Park township, near Holland, on its 1965 tax allocation from county tax allocation board. Fred Den Herder is board chairman.

The county board held a special meeting to hear the appeal by Supervisor Herman Windemuller of Park, who based the appeal on the claim that the township should have been allocated 2 mills instead of 1.90 mills.

Final allocations gave Park 1.90 mills, the intermediate school district .13 mill, the county was allocated 4.10 mills and the school district 8.77 mills. This brought the total to 14.90 mills. .10 mills short of the 15 mill limit and Windemuller claimed that his township should be allocated the full 2 mills.

The county allocation board informed the state officials that Park received more millage than was needed, according to its budget request. The state officials will render a decision later. The hearing lasted an hour.

West Ottawa Staff Nearly Complete

Only two faculty openings remain for West Ottawa school district following action by the Board of Education Monday in approving contracts for four new teachers.

Ellen Frost of Muskegon will teach an elementary class, Paul Brower of Holland and Jean Klop, a recent Hope College graduate, will teach junior high mathematics, and Walter Garrison formerly of Indiana, will teach high school mathematics.

The two openings remaining are instructors for power mechanics and the general metals courses, previously taught by one teacher, Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte explained that enrollments have increased beyond the capacity of the shop.

Already 80 have enrolled for power mechanics requiring five sections. The general metals course has increased from two to four sections. Since nine classes are too much for one shop, the board approved a recommendation to set up the power mechanics department in Waverly School, currently not in use.

Waverly school in time will become a vocational school, adding other courses as the need arises. Next year the department expects to offer engine repair.

The board also approved a superintendent's recommendation for new elementary service area boundaries, providing a better classroom teacher ratio. If enrollment in September warrants other changes, further revisions will be made. Currently 327 are enrolled in kindergarten requiring 12 sections.

Louis Van Slooten, chairman of a committee studying the insurance program, said the committee concludes the present program is sound and recommends continuation until July 1, 1966. When the policies expire, the committee recommends that the board take bids from independent insurance association of the Greater Holland area for a blanket policy in one package.

Van Slooten said, "This will allow us to come up with the best price possible with the taxpayers' money."

Zeeland Okays Annexations

ZEELAND — Voters in Zeeland and Holland Township approved annexation of four areas of Holland Township to the City of Zeeland Monday.

The four areas covering about 90 acres are all west of the present city limits.

Added to the city by the four annexations will be all the area west of the present city limits between M-21 on the south, 104th Ave. on the west, Paw Paw Dr., Chicago Dr. and the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad tracks on the north except for a small section near M-21 and 104th Ave. In the northwest corner an area bounded by Jefferson St. on the west, Roosevelt Ave. on the north and the city limits on the east and south will also be added to Zeeland.

To pass each proposal had to receive a majority of votes in both the city and in the annexation area.

The four areas were designated the North Side, West End, South Side and Huizenga area. The breakdown of voting was: North Side (area around Jef-

erson St. and Roosevelt Ave.) — the proposal was approved 73-24 in the annexation area and 201-12 in Zeeland.

West End (large area south of Paw Paw Dr.) — Voters in this area approved the proposal 39-13, and Zeeland voted in favor by 203-13.

South Side (small area southeast of city) — Approved by voters 27-7 in the annexation area, and approved 200-13 by city voters.

Huizenga Area (narrow strip around Huizenga St.) — The proposal was passed by a narrow 38-29 margin in annexation area, and passed 201-14 in Zeeland.

About 800 persons reside in the areas to be annexed to Zeeland. The areas will officially become part of the city Sept. 30.

The new section of Zeeland covers about half of the territory involved in an annexation election April 5. The proposed annexation was defeated by 11 votes at that election. Zeeland annexed areas on the east side of the city about two years ago.
