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Apartment Rezoning Defeated

Following a public hearing lasting an hour and 40 minutes, City Council at a special meeting Wednesday night turned down a Planning Commission recommendation to rezone a 16-acre area on Ottawa Ave. at 33rd St. from A-O residential to A-3 residential to allow garden apartments.

The vote was 6 to 2 favoring rezoning, but lacked the necessary three-fourth majority of the total body. Councilman Eugene Vande Vusse who had private interests in the apartment development was excused from voting.

Casting dissenting votes were Councilmen Morris Peerbolt and John Van Eerden. City Attorney Gordon Cunningham had ruled 7 votes were necessary for a three-quarter majority of a nine-member body. The three-quarter majority is necessary under charter when written opposition is filed.

Written objections Wednesday night came from Providence Christian Reformed Church and the Schools for Christian Education, both of them owning sizable sites near the site seeking rezoning.

A letter from Scott Bagby and Associates dated Aug. 5 but received Aug. 10 indicated Bagby would regard the proposal as spot zoning. Bagby had been retained by the Planning Commission to make a study of apartment sites in the city in mid-June after Council tabled a request for B-1 apartment rezoning for the site. At the June 15 meeting, Council devoted a full hour to discussion of the request.

It was at this meeting that Allen Ginsberg, representing Alco Construction Co. of Lansing, displayed a color layout of the planned development calling for 66 units of a semi-luxury type with its own swimming pool and community center.

As a result of further study, the Planning Commission unanimously recommended A-3 zoning which would permit smaller apartment buildings, and it was this recommendation which Council voted down Wednesday night.

Mayor Nelson Bosman who presided reviewed ground rules of public hearings, limiting presentations to a total of 10 minutes in two appearances by the same person. There were 45 persons in the audience but relatively few participated.

Among the speakers were Attorneys Donald Hann and Jerry Roper, representing Providence Christian Reformed Church; David Vande Vusse and Ginsberg, representing the developers; John Keuning and Carl Marcus, representing the Planning Commission; Fred Bertsch, engaged in other apartment developments, and Jack De Boe, who sought solutions free from pressure and outsiders.

In bringing some of the problems into focus, City Manager Herb Holt, at the request of Councilman Richard W. Smith, said city planning is always complicated, dynamic and involved when bringing the theoretical idealism of the professional planner into practical use. He said the building inspector has been faced with apartment problems for five years and the Planning Commission studied them for three years, and had come to the conclusion that local developers were not about to pay top prices for B-1 zoned property near commercial property, tear down old buildings and replace them with new apartments. He said this conclusion brought out the need for other apartment zoning, and the commission worked eight months with Alco Co.

John Keuning, chairman of the Planning Commission, said the commission had struggled with apartment zoning problems for three years and if it had yielded to individuals seeking to build apartments there would now be some 8 to 10 locations in the city. He was of the opinion that Holland definitely needed apartments and the commission had recommended the A-3 procedure as a solution. "We must look to the future. Do you have another solution? We don't," he said.

His statement indicated he had been subjected to pressures, particularly since he is a developer and the apartment situation could be detrimental to his own business. But he felt that meeting the overall need for the city was far more important. As for the Bagby statement on "spot zoning" he did not consider a 16-acre site spot zoning and was of the opinion that 75 per cent of the work of the Planning Commission would then be classed as spot zoning.

Fred Bertsch said there are many problems in developing apartment dwellings in Holland and some changes in regulations are needed. But he was willing to abide by the rules and was inclined to call "fool" when outsiders seek special consideration from Council in rezoning.

Dave Vande Vusse countered that "outsiders" are working with local interests and the conditional prices on the property are geared to prices under new zoning, not agricultural prices. Councilman Hollis Clark objected to Jack De Boe's criticism of outside interests and said, "I'm an outsider myself. Many of us are outsiders and we're not here because of the 'almighty dollar.' I've seen many insiders who are far more concerned over money, and you've touched a sensitive nerve." De Boe said he wasn't referring to people like Dr. Clark moving into Holland. In fact, he was happy to welcome them.

Bertsch clarified his previous point which was not directed against outsiders but on abiding by the rules. Then Ginsberg mentioned such firms as General Electric, Beech-Nut, Parke-Davis and others establishing plants in Holland, offering jobs to people, resulting in more people, more homes, more prosperity, more stores, more schools, more colleges.

At that point, Councilman Henry Steffens who is treasurer of Hope College, said "Not more colleges!" which brought the one and only solid laugh of the evening.

Council then went in a committee of the whole for another 20 minutes.

In casting a "no" vote, Van Eerden felt apartments should be built near the downtown to replace deteriorating buildings, but had no solutions when it was pointed out the city had followed this policy on B-1 zoning in downtown areas for seven years, with little or no results.

Peerbolt who also dissented expressed the hope that apartment zoning would be provided before developers ask for it, rather than rezoning for specific individuals or companies.

Pollution Legislation Is Sought

GRAND HAVEN — Resolutions calling for strong laws for enforcement of water and air pollution protection and an adequate motor vehicle inspection law headed the list of resolutions adopted by Ottawa county Democrats at their county convention Wednesday night in the county building.

The vehicle inspection law called for top priority. Other resolutions called for fiscal reform and relief from burdensome property taxes, recommending enactment of an income tax, more education legislation to prevent school dropouts, and action to control campaign expenditures "lest office-holding become the prerogative of the wealthy or their lackeys."

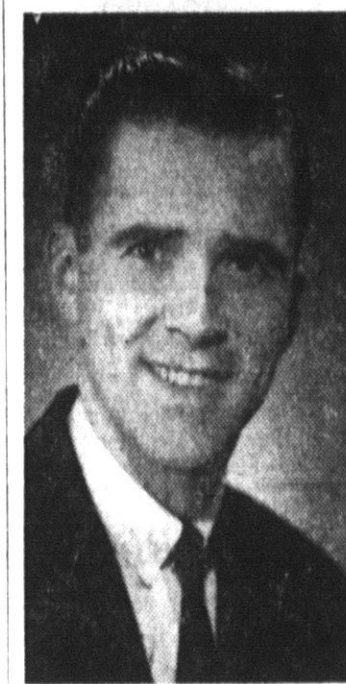

An elderly Zeeland man was killed Tuesday at 3:18 p.m. when he was struck by an oil tank truck while crossing U.S.-31 at Eighth St.

Gerrit H. Mast, 78, of 218 West Washington Ave., was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland hospital by medical examiner Dr. William Rotteschaefer, who listed cause of death as multiple fractures.

Ottawa sheriff's deputies said Mast was struck by a tank truck operated by Paul E. Boeve, 32, of 106 West 11th St. The truck is owned by the Boeve Oil Company of Holland.

The truck, which was loaded with 42,000 pounds of oil, was south bound on U.S.-31 and Mast was crossing the highway toward the east.

Boeve told deputies that he saw the man in the right lane of the road and that he applied his brakes and headed for the median. At the last minute the man started running and ran directly into the path of the truck, deputies said.

Deputies said there were 223 feet of skid marks before the truck struck Mast and another 161 feet of marks after the impact. The tanker came to rest upright in the median, south of the intersection.

This was the 20th traffic fatality in Ottawa County this year compared to eight at this time in 1965.

Mast was a member of the First Christian Reformed Church of Zeeland, a veteran of World War I, a member of the Veterans of World War I barracks of Zeeland and the disabled veterans organization. He had been employed at the Black River Lumber Co. of Zeeland until he retired about eight years ago.

Allegan Solves Shock Situation

ALLEGAN — Allegan City Manager Ken Bollinger learned today that electrical department profits were literally "going down the drain."

A complaint received at City Hall from Mr. and Mrs. Larry Brower revealed a "shocking situation" at their Cypress St. residence in Allegan's Highland Park addition.

It seems the Browners not only had hot and cold water, but, of all things — electricity — flowing from their kitchen and bathroom faucets. Each time they touched a faucet they got a jolt.

Water department workers discovered a defective hot water heater in a neighboring residence. According to Bollinger, the heater somehow got grounded and fed electricity back through the water lines, affecting several homes in the area.

When the "juice" was completely turned off, workers said faucets still gave off 70-80 volts of electricity.

"We've had all kinds of complaints about Allegan's drinking water" Bollinger remarked, "but this one was ridiculous."

State police said a 1961 pickup truck driven by Helen Bolender, 60, Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, hit a shoulder after passing another vehicle, causing the truck to go out of control in the median and roll over.

The driver and her husband, Howard, 73, were taken by ambulance to Municipal Hospital in Grand Haven and were released after treatment for multiple bruises and abrasions.

Tax Collections At 90 Per Cent

Car-Truck Crash Fatal to Woman

Dorothy May De Witt, 78, of 17667 Dogwood Dr., Spring Lake, was killed Wednesday afternoon when her car was struck by a semi-truck on U.S.-31 at James St., at 2:29 p.m.

She was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland hospital by medical examiner Dr. William Weststrate Jr. Cause of death was listed as a crushed chest and fractured skull.

Deputies said Mrs. De Witt's car was struck by a semi operated by Ronald J. Gentry, 33, of St. Louis, Mo. The truck was loaded with 42,000 pounds of wire.

Deputies said that both vehicles were southbound on U.S.-31 at the time of the crash. The semi was starting to pass the De Witt auto when Mrs. De Witt attempted a left turn onto James Street into the path of the semi.

Gaye Diane De Witt, 17, of Lake Odessa, a passenger in the car operated by her grandmother, was treated at the hospital for a minor laceration of the right hand. Another passenger, Sandra Hampshire, 18, of Ionia was not injured.

Ottawa County sheriff's deputies, who investigated the accident, said that this is the 21st traffic fatality this year.

Mrs. De Witt was born in Ft. Atkinson, Wis., and was brought up in Chicago and moved to Norton township in Muskegon County.

Her husband, Harvey De Witt, died June 13 of this year. A son, LaVerne, was killed in an automobile accident in Wilmington, Calif., on March 26, also this year.

She was a member of Spring Lake Baptist Church.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Edward Burkette of Wilmington, Calif.; a son, the Rev. Harold De Witt of Lake Odessa; a sister, Mrs. Grace Shelley of Glendale Calif.; two brothers, Robert Brayley of Lawndale, Calif., and John C. Brayley of Kansas City, Mo., and eight grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Saturday from Spring Lake Baptist Church with the Rev. Ronald MacDonald officiating. Burial will be in Spring Lake cemetery. The body reposes at the Barbier Funeral home in Spring Lake.

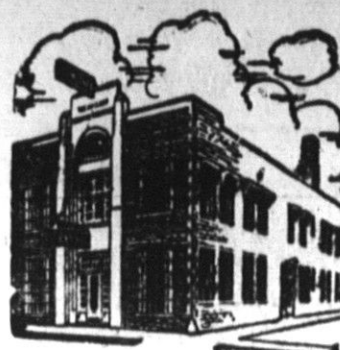

As the New York Central pointed out, airlines can make the distance from New York City to Albany in 25 minutes. But the actual time for a passenger is nearer to two hours. Traveling to and from airports takes time. The New York Central says it can carry passengers from midtown to midtown, New York to Albany, in better time than the airlines.

It is quite conceivable that highspeed trains will give the airlines new competition on the short haul, and over 75 per cent of travel is on that short haul of 200 miles. This would give new life to passenger service on the rails.

As the new service goes into operation, the old days of the sleeper and dining car will be ended. This may be somewhat of a nostalgic note to old timers, but it simply points up the changes that have taken place in transportation. Few people want to spend two or three days on a train, when a matter of hours will do the job, and do it in greater comfort. But a fast trip, without the inconvenience of a trip to the airport, is another matter, and the New York Central feels it can compete at this point.

We can be sure that there will be delays as the Interstate Commerce Commission reviews the request. But when an era has ended, and new ways of transportation have come into reality, economics and a new generation will insist that the old give way to the new. All change raises problems. The answer is not in remaining static, but in moving forward.

Sunday School Lesson

Respect for Human Life
Exodus 20:13; Matthew 5:21-24; 43-44; 1 John 3:15-18; 4:20-21

Newspapers tell us that there is a great need for the law in the Decalogue which protects human life. Deliberate killing and thoughtless killing goes on day after day.

1. Murder is forbidden by God. Murder is unjustified killing. It is an old sin. The first son born upon this earth, Cain, killed his brother Abel. The government has the right to put killers to death but no man has the right to take the law in his own hands. This law of God does not forbid capital punishment, nor self-defense, nor does it outlaw war, but it does forbid all manner of unjustified killing.

All manner of interference with human life is wrong and therefore abortion is sinful and so is suicide. Careless driving, most of it done by drunken drivers, disregarding safety measures and gambling with life—all of these things are sinful. The Surgeon General of our nation says that cigarette smoking is a "health hazard of sufficient importance to warrant appropriate remedial action." In spite of this warning many church members continue to smoke and some foolish young people begin a costly habit which will at least cost them \$5,000 and slavery and may shorten their lives. Dissipation, gluttony, immoral and careless living endanger health and life. Sometimes domineering people stunt the lives of weaker folks. Man is God's image bearer. Christ died for man. The killer flouts the doctrine of creation and redemption.

2. Jesus taught that anger is sinful. There are two kinds of anger, the one is the explosive kind which quickly subsides, the other is the settled anger which lasts and is more dangerous. Anger may lead to murder and hence the warning, Jesus spoke of three stages of offenses and of three courts—the last is God's court. Today this court is overlooked by millions.

Jesus points out sins we overlook. According to the law when a Jew brought a gift to the temple he was required to confess his sins first and then bring it to the priest as an offering. Jesus told his followers that when they prayed and worshipped and should recall that some one had ill feelings against them should first become reconciled to the brother and then bring the gift.

3. Love covers a multitude of sins. The Apostle John who, although his heart was full of love could use blunt language. He says that the man who hates his brother is a murderer. Taking another man's life is wicked, laying down our lives for the brethren is commendable. Love is active, especially where there is a need.

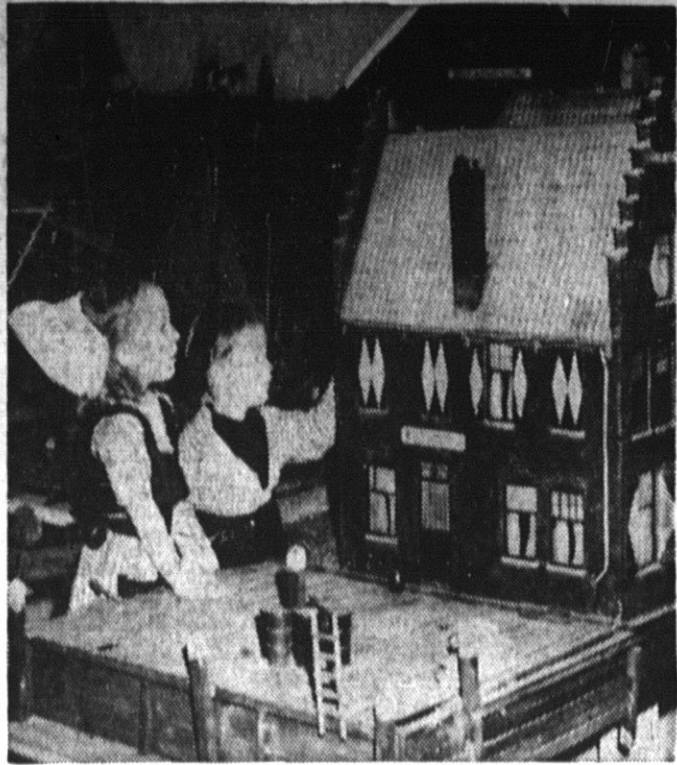
Former Resident's Son In Disneyland Concert

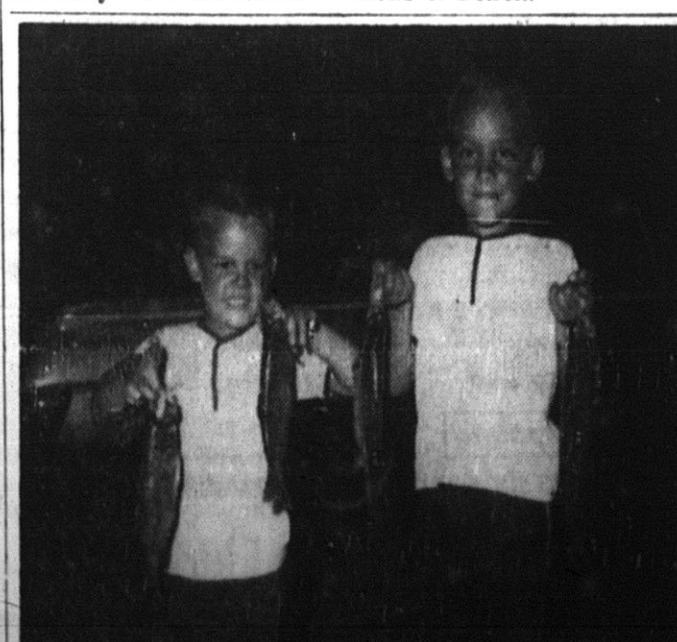

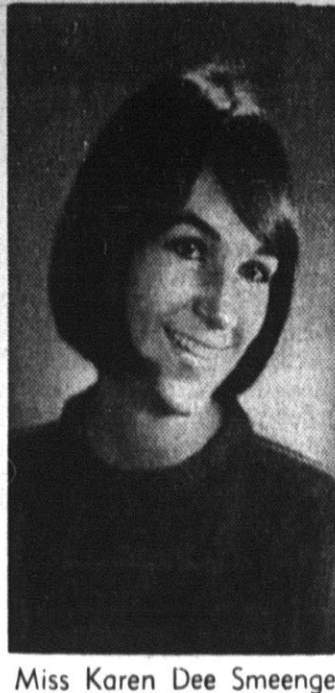

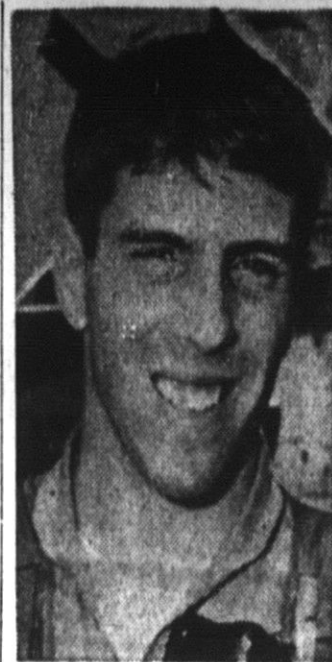

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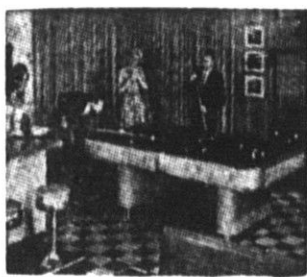
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Four More Teachers Are Hired

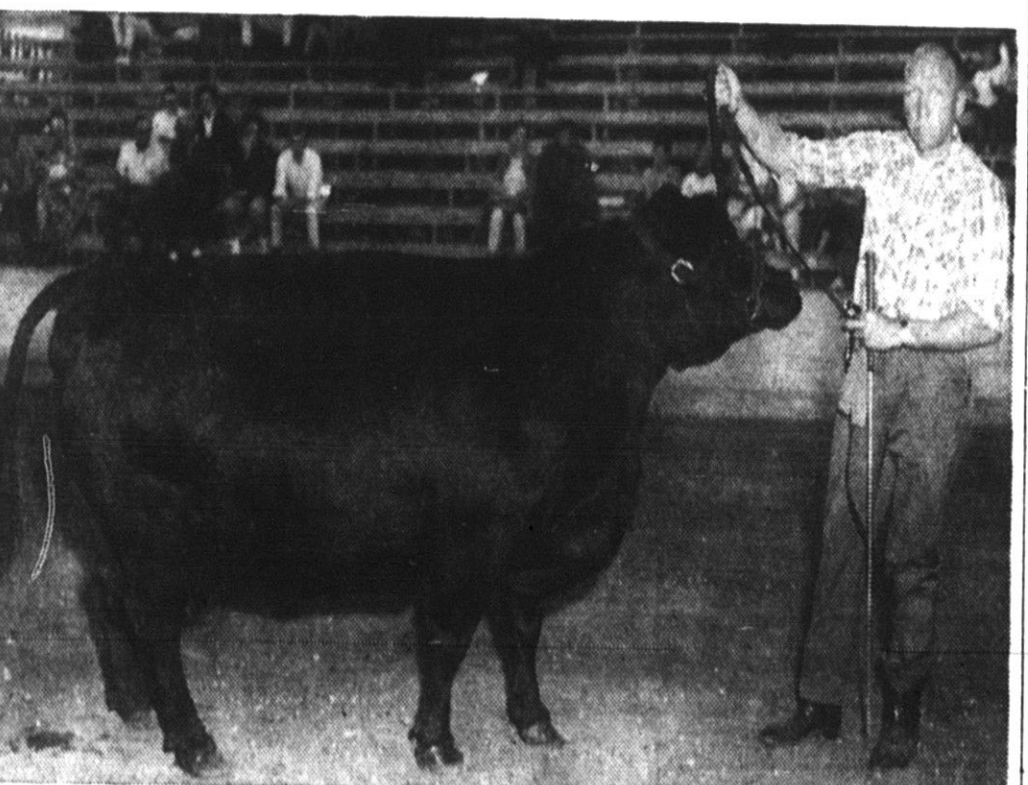

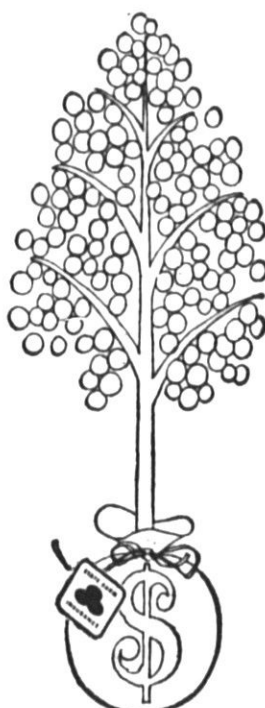

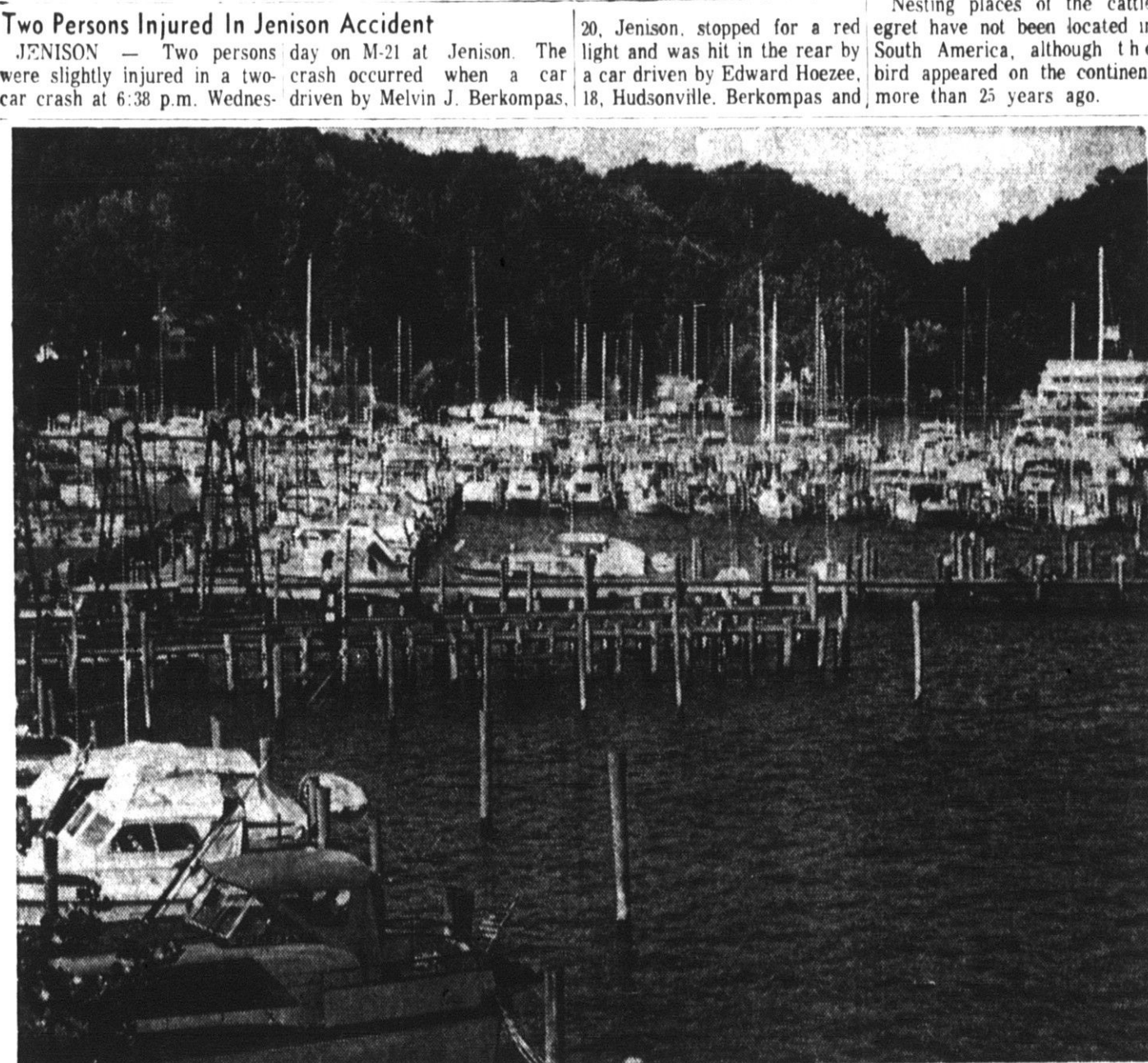

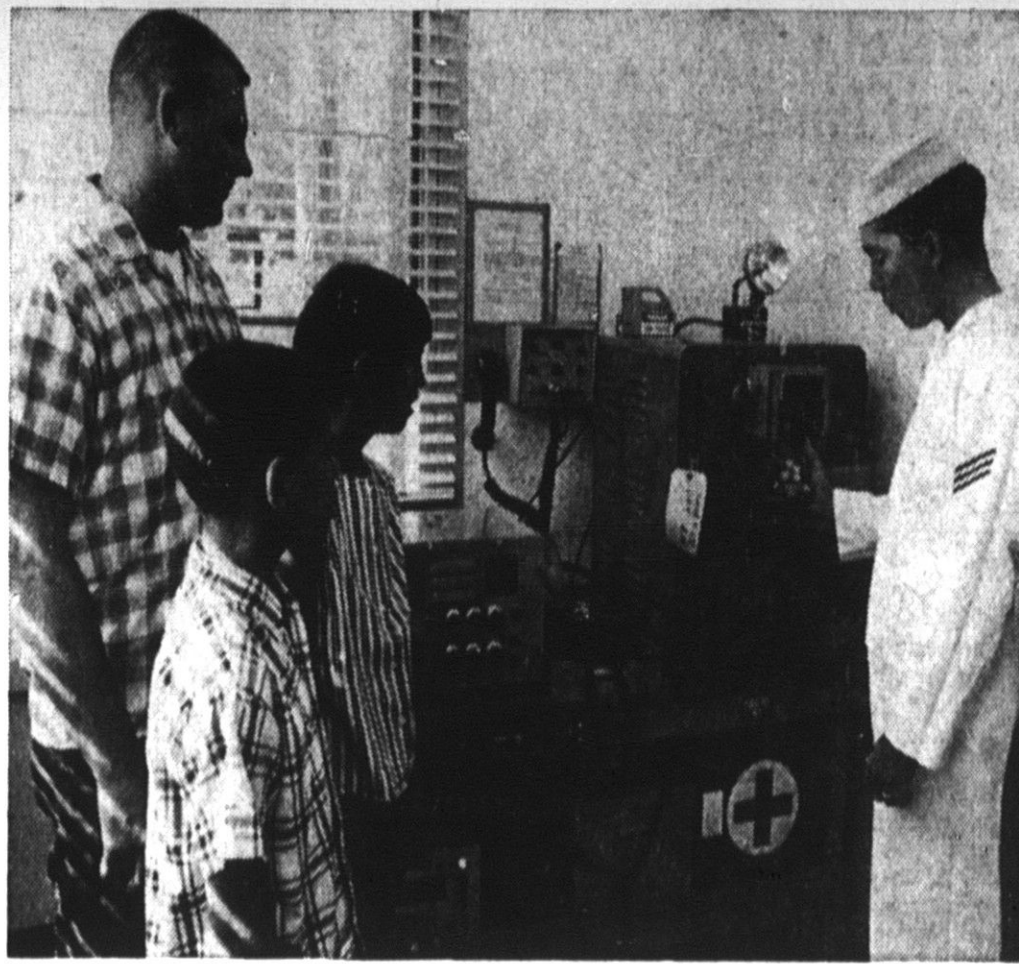

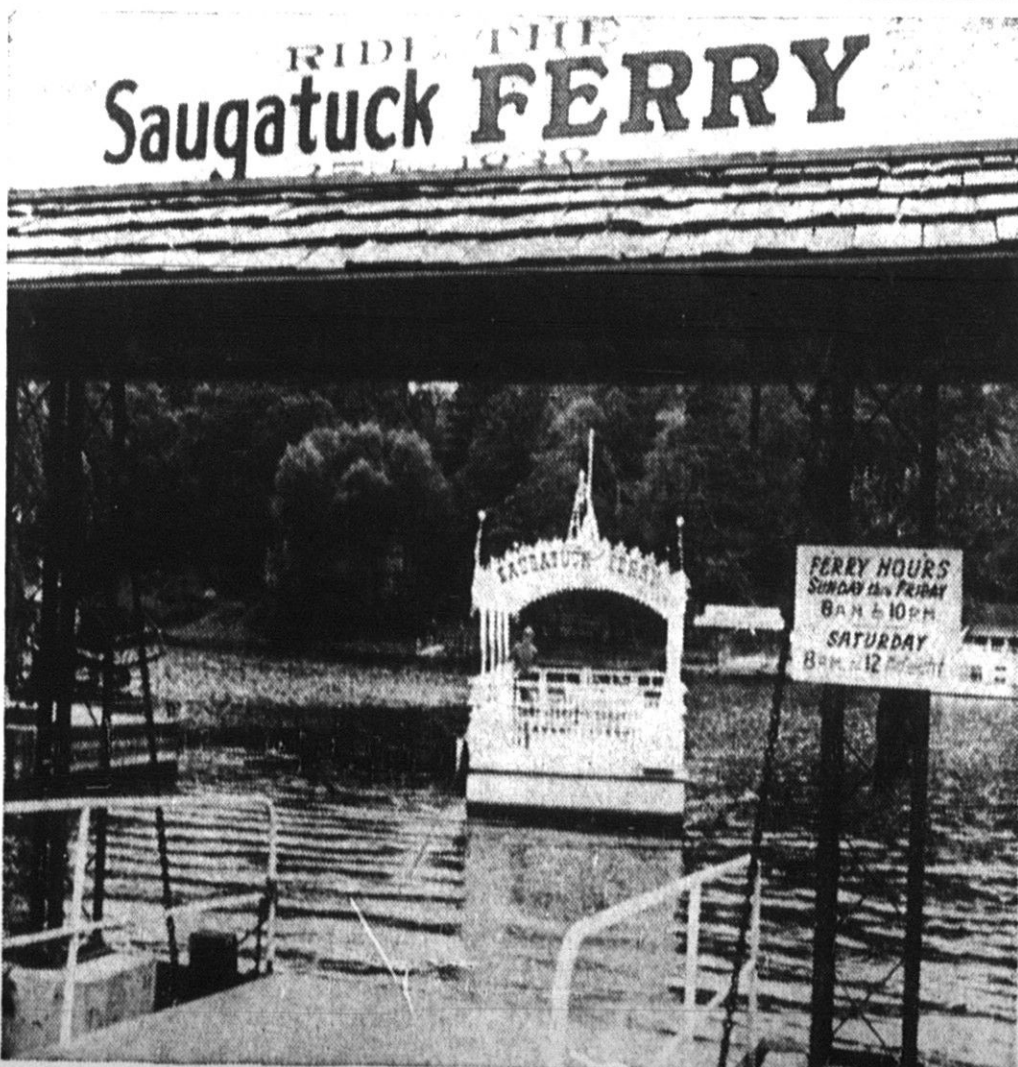
