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Seven Men Arrested in Drug Raids

Undercover Narcotics Agent Bought Drugs From Holland Men

Months of investigation by Holland police and Federal narcotics agents climaxed early Saturday evening with the arrest of seven persons and the seizure of an undisclosed amount of heroin and marijuana.

All of the men were arraigned before Municipal Judge John Galien Sunday afternoon and demanded examination. Examination was set for Aug. 13 in Holland Municipal Court.

Arrested were: Hector Ruiz, 31, of 144 West 21st St., sale of heroin, \$20,000 bond; Anthony Raffenaud, 22, of 118 West 15th St., sale of heroin, \$30,000 bond; Greg Rois Jr., 21, of 88½ East 16th St., illegal use of narcotics, \$5,000 bond, and Norberto Puenta, 28, of 168½ West 13th St., conspiracy to violate narcotic laws, \$20,000.

Also arrested were: Manuel Sanceda, 30, of 403 West 22nd St., sale of marijuana and conspiracy to violate narcotic laws, \$20,000; David Gonzales, 40, of Rockford, sale of heroin, \$20,000, and Carlos Everett, 27, of 216 West 14th St., illegal use of narcotics, \$5,000 bond.

Police also have a warrant for an eighth person and are presently looking for him.

Search warrants were issued by Judge Galien and police apprehended the men at a number of homes in Holland Saturday evening. One of the men was arrested at a local bar, police said.

Holland detectives have been conducting their investigation since early in May. The federal undercover agent was called in about three weeks ago when it was learned that the ring covered more than Michigan, detectives said.

Police said the undercover agent became acquainted with the local men and purchased both heroin and marijuana from several of the men. Besides the drugs that were purchased, an undisclosed amount was seized in the raids Saturday.

Police had been holding warrants for the men for quite some time before the arrests. "A couple of the men have been under surveillance for over a year," one detective said.

Two teams of detectives worked Saturday evening and they had the men in custody in a little over two hours.

After conferring with the county prosecutor, police have decided to dismiss all charges against Everett, police chief Leslie Van Beveren said.

All of the men have been charged under Michigan statutes, however, their is a possibility that some of the men will be charged under federal drug laws, police said.

Ottawa County Included in Storm Warning Area

Holland received .04 inch rain Tuesday, according to official weather observer Lynn Wheaton, when the county, along with portions of northern and central lower Michigan were included in a tornado watch and severe thunderstorms warning issued at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday.

A total of 22 counties were in the watch area, according to Civil Defense Director Glenn Timmer who reported the severest activity was in northern Kent county around 7:45 p.m. Tuesday with damaging winds and hail.

Timmer said a funnel was sighted at 8:20 p.m. and a tree was down at Harding and Eighth St., just north of Conklin. Ottawa sheriff's deputies reported a funnel sighted at Kenowa and Barry.

The all clear was issued at 9:40 p.m. Tuesday, Timmer said; however, at 3:30 a.m. the weather bureau issued a severe thunderstorm warning for a 10-county area until 5 a.m.

Timmer said the warning was later extended until 6 a.m. and included Ottawa and Ionia counties. Ottawa county had heavy rains, Timmer said, and there was some light hail at Coopersville and Jenison.

Allegan Okays New Water Plant

ALLEGAN — Allegan city voters approved a \$700,000 obligation bond issue in Tuesday's primary for a new water treatment plant and other water system improvements. The vote was 504 to 138.

Dorr township voters turned down a proposition calling for three mills for five years for improving roads. The vote was 165 to 140.

Extremely Light Vote Cast Here

A total of 2,671 voters in Holland city's 14 precincts went to the polls in Tuesday's primary election which was relatively free from controversial issues. This represents 23.5 per cent of the total registered vote of 11,329.

As expected, the vote was heavily Republican, in the Ottawa county portion where there were Republican contests for

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state representative and county prosecutor, the Republican - Democratic vote ran about 8-1. In the Allegan county portion where there were Republican contests for state representative, sheriff and drain commissioner, the ratio was even greater.

State Rep. Guy Vander Jagt led the ticket in the 12 precincts in Ottawa county with a vote of 1,667 and Sheriff Bernard Grysen followed with 1,647 votes.

The three state proposals carried in Holland city as they did in the state. City vote on proposal 1 (judicial tenure) was 1,109 to 603; proposal 2 (commission to determine compensation), 982 to 761; proposal 3 (appoint vacancies), 1,030 to 704.

Withdrawn a few days before the election was the school transportation proposition for the Holland school district because of pending litigation in state courts over the reorganization program. The issue had called for 1½ mills for three years to provide transportation for all students living designated distances from school in Holland district.

The litigation involves a challenge from plaintiffs in Federal and Harrington districts over the reorganization. The two districts were to be merged with Holland in the Ottawa county school reorganization program effective July 1.

In contrast to Holland city's turnout, Fillmore township had a total vote of 529, or 62 per cent of the registered vote of 854. Main issue was the supervisor contest with Fillmore incumbent Milton Timmerman winning the Republican nomination over Nicholas Yonker, 334 to 150. Fillmore and Laketown townships form district 18 with a total vote of 525 for Timmerman and 282 for Yonker. There was no Democratic candidate.

There was no opposition in district 17 covering the two Allegan county precincts of Holland city. Republican Gerald Van Noord polled 264 votes.

Farnsworth Wins Easily

PLAINWELL — State Rep. James S. Farnsworth (55th district) easily won Republican nomination in Tuesday's primary by polling substantial majorities in his district which lies in Ottawa, Allegan and Barry counties.

Farnsworth's vote totaled 5,083 while his Republican opponent, Ronald Layton, polled 1,549. The unopposed Democratic candidate, Glenn E. Mapes Jr., received 971.

Ottawa county's 14 precincts covering Holland city, the townships of Jamestown and Zeeland plus a small part of Zeeland city gave 1,876 votes to Farnsworth, 296 for Layton and 211 for Mapes.

The 21 precincts in Allegan county in the 55th district gave 2,704 votes to Farnsworth, 1,136 to Layton and 548 to Mapes.

Barry County's eight precincts gave 514 to Farnsworth, 117 to Layton and 212 to Mapes.

GVSC Is Approved Teacher Training Institution

ALLEDALE — Grand Valley State College has received full approval as an elementary and secondary teacher education institution from the State of Michigan Board of Education, Arthur C. Hills, GVSC associate dean for academic affairs announced today. Hills has served as coordinator of the teacher preparation program since 1965 stated.

"This means Grand Valley can now recommend its own candidates for state teaching certification. GVSC has been working through a cooperative arrangement with Michigan State University."

To date, certification has been granted 174 GVSC graduates: 97 elementary teaching certificates and 77 secondary teaching certificates.

Approval as a teacher education institution followed North Central Association accreditation of Grand Valley March 27, 1968. The State Board of Education appointed an examining board headed by Dr. Edward Plau which reviewed the GVSC teacher preparation program, over-all academic program, record keeping, library collection, and physical facilities and presented a report to the Bureau of Higher Education. The Bureau in turn placed its recommendations before the State Board which met July 30 and 31 in Lansing.

The GVSC special education program was given probationary approval for its development period by the State Board. Final approval will be contingent upon a review in 1971.

July Wet And Cool In Holland

July was wet and relatively cool with an average temperature of 67.7 degrees, a full 4 degrees under normal, the July weather report for Holland as compiled by Lynn P. Wheaton revealed today.

The mercury hit 90 on only one occasion on July 17, although there were six occasions that temperatures were in the upper 80's. The minimum was 43 on July 3, the day the maximum was 67.

Rainfall totaled 3.13 inches or .62 above normal. The precipitation was relatively well separated, leaving lawns and crops beautifully green for the hottest month of the year.

Heaviest rainfall during a 24-hour period was 1.41 inches on July 24.

Maximum was 90, compared with 85 in 1967, 92 in 1966, 93 in 1965 and 94 in 1964. Minimum was 43, compared with 48 in 1967, 47 in 1966, 43 in 1965 and 51 in 1964.

Average temperature was 67.7, compared with 67.4 in 1967, 71.6 in 1966, 70 in 1965 and 71.8 in 1964. Average maximum was 80.7 in 1968, 77.2 in 1967, 82.6 in 1966, 80.2 in 1965 and 83.6 in 1964. Average minimum was 58 in 1968, 57.7 in 1967, 60.6 in 1966, 55.9 in 1965 and 70 in 1964.

Precipitation measured 3.13 inches in 1968, 4.12 inches in 1967, 2.49 inches in 1966, 2.10 inches in 1965 and 2.01 inches in 1964. Precipitation fell on 11 days in 1968, 14 days in 1967, 9 days in 1966, 11 days in 1965 and 10 days in 1964.

Greatest precipitation in a 24-hour period was 1.41 inches in 1968, 1.80 inches in 1967, 1.19 inches in 1966, .58 inch in 1965 and 1.35 inches in 1964.

Okay Bond Issue For Home Furnace

City Council Wednesday night approved a resolution of intent to issue revenue bonds for a new plant of the Home Furnace division of Lear Siegler Inc. in Holland's industrial park.

No figures were mentioned in the request for the bond issue, but Clarence J. Becker, Home Furnace president, expects the new development on an L-shaped 22-acre site not far from 7-Up and Slicker Boat Co. in the industrial park will approach \$2½ million.

Since recent state legislation limits tax free revenue bonds for industrial development to \$1,000,000, the local issue may run \$1 million to \$2 million.

Ground will be broken for the new plant at 9:30 a.m. Friday.

Whitcomb Nominated In Allegan

ALLEGAN — Allegan county's primary election was highlighted by contests in the Republican nomination for sheriff and drain commissioner and 13 contests for nominations for new district supervisor's posts.

Incumbent Sheriff Robert Whitcomb turned back a second try for the nomination by Robert Schra, route 3, Holland. Whitcomb polled 4,003 votes to 2,859 votes for Schra.

Two members of the present board of supervisors sought the Republican nomination for drain commissioner. Walter E. Morris, Cheshire, defeated Jack Billman, Allegan township, 3,326 to 2,539. The incumbent drain commissioner, Oscar Zimmerman, did not seek reelection, but was involved in one of the 13 district supervisors' contests.

In another Republican contest, Allegan county voters gave State Rep. James Farnsworth a substantial boost to renomination. Farnsworth received 2,704 votes in the county compared to 1,136 for Ron Layton of Hopkins who was opposing him in the GOP primary for the second time.

There were 12 Republican contests for nominations for new district supervisor's posts.

In three districts there were three-way races. In District 5, Otsego township, David S. Carlson was the winner over Lindsey Dugan and Morrison D. Ismond. District 8, Wayland and Leighton, selected Ralph Sysma over Charles L. Fisher and David Morren.

In District 11, Allegan township, Louis Ter Avest was the winner in a close contest with Paul Armintrout and Darl R. Jennings.

Other Republican winners in the supervisor's contests Nick Leep over Ellis C. Wykstra, in District 6, Martin and Watson township, John L. Gurney over Earl M. Lanning, District 7, Wayland City; Reinder Hoeksema over Peter De Kraker in District 9, Dorr township.

Oscar Zimmerman, over Cleon Duryea, District 10, Monterey and Hopkins townships; Lawrence M. Morgan over Richard Ross, District 13, Allegan city, 2 and 3; Gerald Immink over Kenneth Rynbrandt, District 16, Overisel and Salem; Milton Timmerman over Nicholas A. Yonker, District 18, Laketown and Fillmore townships.

Robert E. Drew over Russell Sill, District 20, Ganges, Clyde and Fennville city; Earl Osman over Edwin Blakeslee in District 21, Casco and Lee townships.

In the only Democratic contest Charles Mlynarchek defeated Donald A. Sevigny in District 8, Wayland and Leighton townships.

315 Street Signs Placed in City

A total of 315 new street signs have been placed in the northeast portion of the city, City Engineer Harold Derks said Saturday.

The project, which began in April of this year, will extend over a four year period, one quarter of the city being covered each year. The northeast quarter, extending east from Central Ave. and north from 18th St., has been completed and the placement of the signs in the second quarter will begin either this fall or winter, Derks said.

The new green, reflectorized signs are replacing the old street signs in order to provide for additional safety and easier visibility, Derks said.

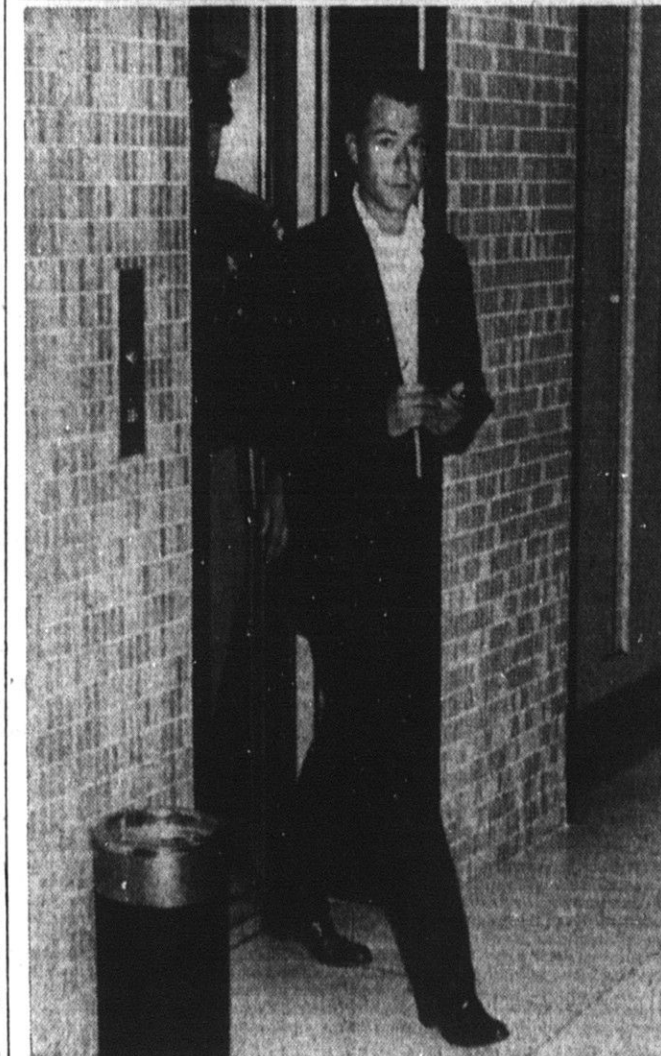
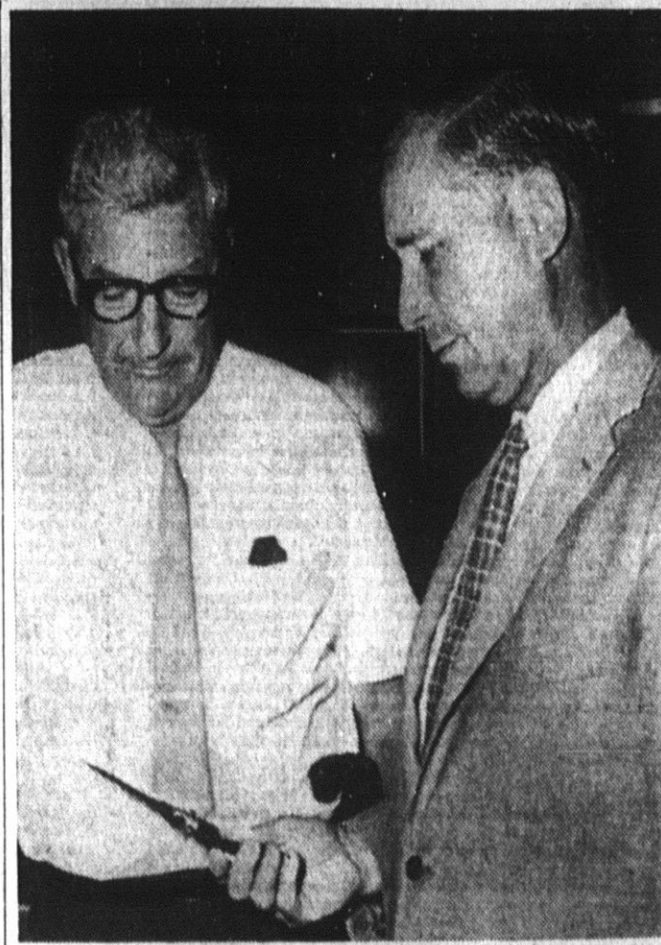
Okay Bond Issue For Home Furnace

The new plant will replace in part the present on East Sixth St. which was hit by a \$3 million fire June 15.

The procedure of issuing revenue bonds for the new plant is similar to council action a year and a half ago in issuing \$12½ million revenue bonds for the Holland Beech-Nut plant, also located in the industrial park. Only recently the amount of tax free revenue bonds was limited to \$1 million.

The resolution Council approved Wednesday night was drawn up by the Detroit firm of Dickinson, Wright, McKean and Cudlip, bond attorneys. Lear Siegler pays all costs.

Lear Siegler operates some 50 plants in the United States, nine of them in Michigan.

Guzman Awaits Court Decision

GRAND HAVEN — Defense attorney John Hoffman of Allegan asked that a self defense ruling be handed down in favor of his client Rudolph Guzman, 30, of Austin, Tex., who is charged with the murder of Felipe Sanchez, 26, of 143 East 16th St., at a hearing held before Holland Municipal Judge John Galien in circuit court chambers Tuesday afternoon.

The motion came after a knife, which was apparently used by Sanchez in the scuffle with Guzman at the Seaway Bar, 100 West Seventh St., the night he was shot, was turned over to authorities by a man who picked it up at the scene of the shooting.

Eduardo Ramirez, of 81 West Eighth St., gave the knife to authorities while he was testifying in the case. In a dramatic move, Ramirez pulled the knife from his pocket while he was on the witness stand.

Ramirez said that he picked the knife up from the floor of the bar immediately after the shooting. He said that he had been afraid to tell police that he had the knife.

Holland police detectives had questioned Ramirez previously after they had received word that he had the knife but Ramirez denied it.

In other testimony, it was revealed that Sanchez had a knife in his hand and had made motions towards Guzman before Guzman fired the fatal shots.

Dr. Robert Gamble, of Grand Haven, testified that wounds Guzman had on his right thumb, left hand and abdomen could have been inflicted by a knife.

Following testimony, Hoffman argued that Guzman's actions should be found to be "excusable homicide based on self defense." He said that "Guzman had been attacked by Sanchez who was holding a knife and that he had done the shooting in self defense."

Ottawa county prosecutor James Bussard, however, stated that it was not the responsibility of the municipal judge to dismiss the charges.

Judge Galien then decided that he would withhold any decision until after he had a chance to carefully go over a statement that Guzman had made to police concerning the shooting. The statement had been entered as evidence.

The hearing was held in Grand Haven after police learned that Guzman's safety was in danger. Guzman was escorted from the county jail to the courtroom under armed guard.

All of the doors into the courtroom were locked and only those persons who submitted to a search of their person were admitted into the proceedings.

Guzman was returned to the county jail, where he is being held without bond, to await Judge Galien's decision.

Marcia Oney, 21, of 1055 Lincoln Ave., lot 32, was treated at Holland hospital for first and second degree burns. Holland police said Mrs. Oney received first degree burns of the cheek and lips, and second degree burns of the right arm.

Police said Mrs. Oney told them that she was attempting to light a stove in her mobile home when it exploded. Police said there was no damage to the mobile home.

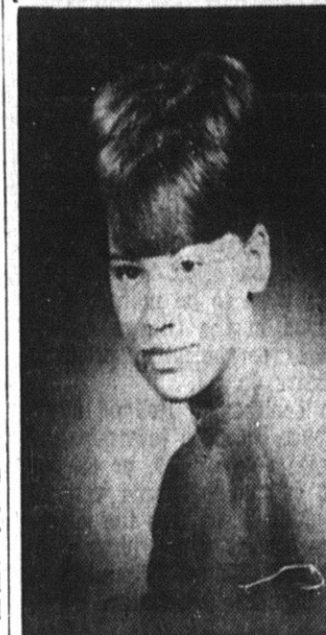

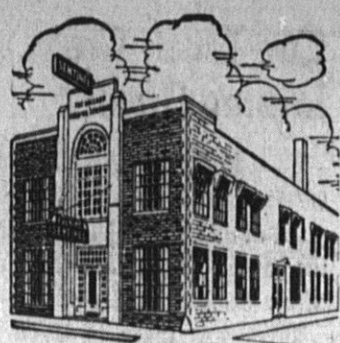

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Aug. 11
EXILES RETURN HOME
Ezra 1:1-4; 2:68-69; 3:1-13
By C. P. Dame

After having been in exile for years due to the sins of the nation, the Jews were given an opportunity to return home again and many used the opportunity offered them. This lesson tells us of another promise that God fulfilled.

I. God uses all kinds of people. Ezra is known as the "first scribe in Israel" and in addition he was a great student, a keen statesman, a son of the captivity for he was born in Babylon. This scholar tells us how God stirred up Cyrus, king of Persia, a pagan who was much praised by ancient writers, to let conquered nations, the Jews among them, go back again to their own lands. This decree was issued in 538 B. C.

The Lord used this heathen ruler to make it possible for the Jews to return to their native land. Ezra reports that thousands responded and returned. Some did not want to go back. They were content to remain in Babylon where they worked and some were in business. The religious people returned. Cyrus suggested that those who did not go back could help financially. This movement to return was of God. Today there are various kinds of movements on foot—some are of God, some are not. Let's test.

II. Worship got first attention in this movement. Worship deserves first place. Before the foundation of the new temple was laid the leaders built an altar and offered sacrifices. One step followed another. Some of those who returned recalled Solomon's beautiful temple and wanted to build another. The returned exiles found the old site of the former temple. The large ornate stones were still there. Those ruins spoke to the exiles of the sins of the nation which had caused the exiles.

It takes money to build. Leadership is important in any project. The leaders set a fine example, for they "offered freely for the house of God" and "they gave after their ability." The Bible commends proportionate giving. For that reason tithing is commendable.

III. Success ought to stir us up to praise God. As soon as the workmen had the material they laid the foundation of the temple, in 520 B. C. In another lesson we shall learn about the completion of the temple. After the foundation was laid there was a great celebration. It was a most joyful event. Music and song and shouting expressed the joy of leaders and followers. Two groups were present. Some were the older people who recalled the glorious temple of Solomon. To them it seemed as if the new temple would not match the former one. The younger people had no such recollections and so they made a lot of noise but some of the older people wept because they not only remembered the former temple but also realized why it was destroyed and why they had gone into exile. Some of the group looked backward, some looked forward. We do well to do both.

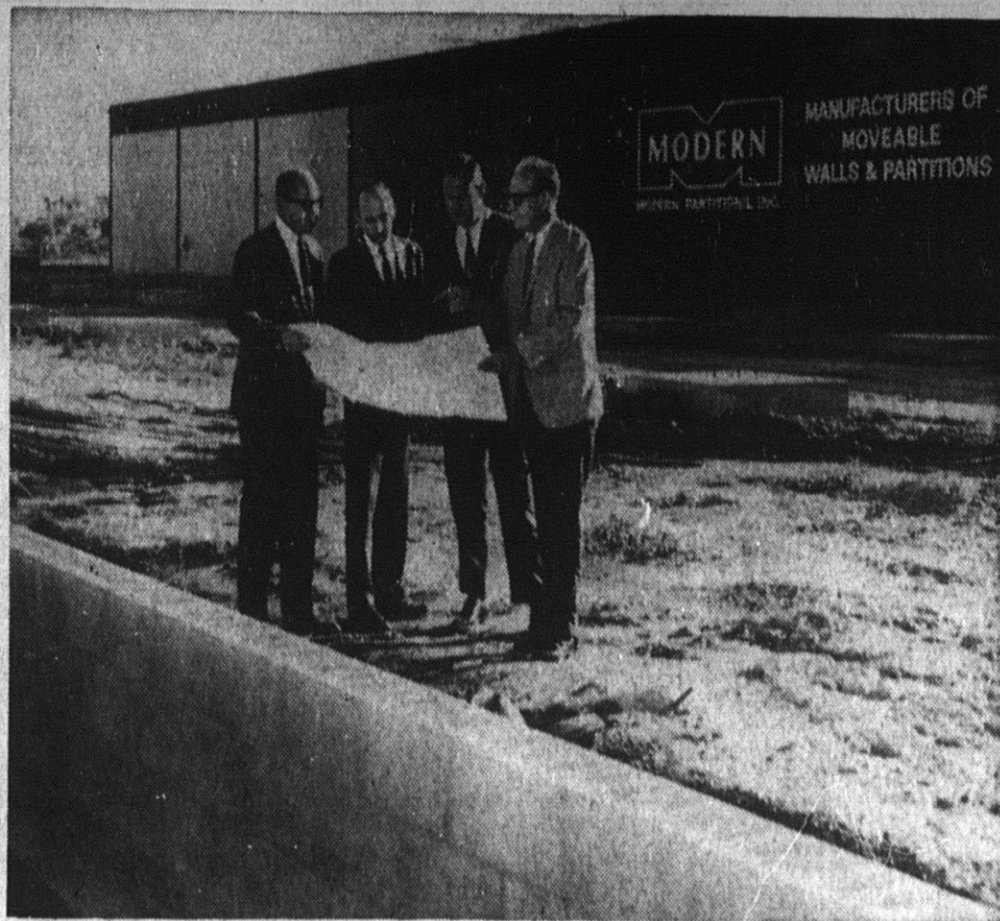

Downtown Plaza Plans Outlined

About 80 persons attended a second informational meeting on downtown redevelopment Monday in which further details of phase I were outlined.

Attending were member merchants of the Chamber of Commerce, landlords, the Community Betterment Committee and the Area Business Development Committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

Study will continue on downtown development, according to Kenneth Zuverink who presided in the absence of Dale Fris, chairman of the Downtown Development group.

Phase I calls for redevelopment of Eighth St. between River and College Aves. and Central Ave. from Seventh to Ninth Sts. Phase II in the future would extend this development.

Rodger Stroop of Kammeraad and Stroop told merchants he envisions the downtown as a plaza with large areas of grass, flower gardens and trees in a park-like setting. Plans call for a garden rest area, public rest rooms, a concrete sculptured fountain and water falls, a pond with fountain and footbridge, an open type timber pavilion for outdoor displays, two play areas for children, and several pieces of sculpture. Also proposed are balconies and a walk type overpass. Stroop submitted sketches of the proposed plaza.

Since plaza development would remove all parking on Eighth St., plans also call for developing 750 new parking spaces, and estimates determined that developing ground parking through removal of buildings was less expensive than constructing a ramp.

Store front remodeling and removal of overhead signs and utility wires also are considered. No action was taken Monday, but more meetings will be called as the study progresses.

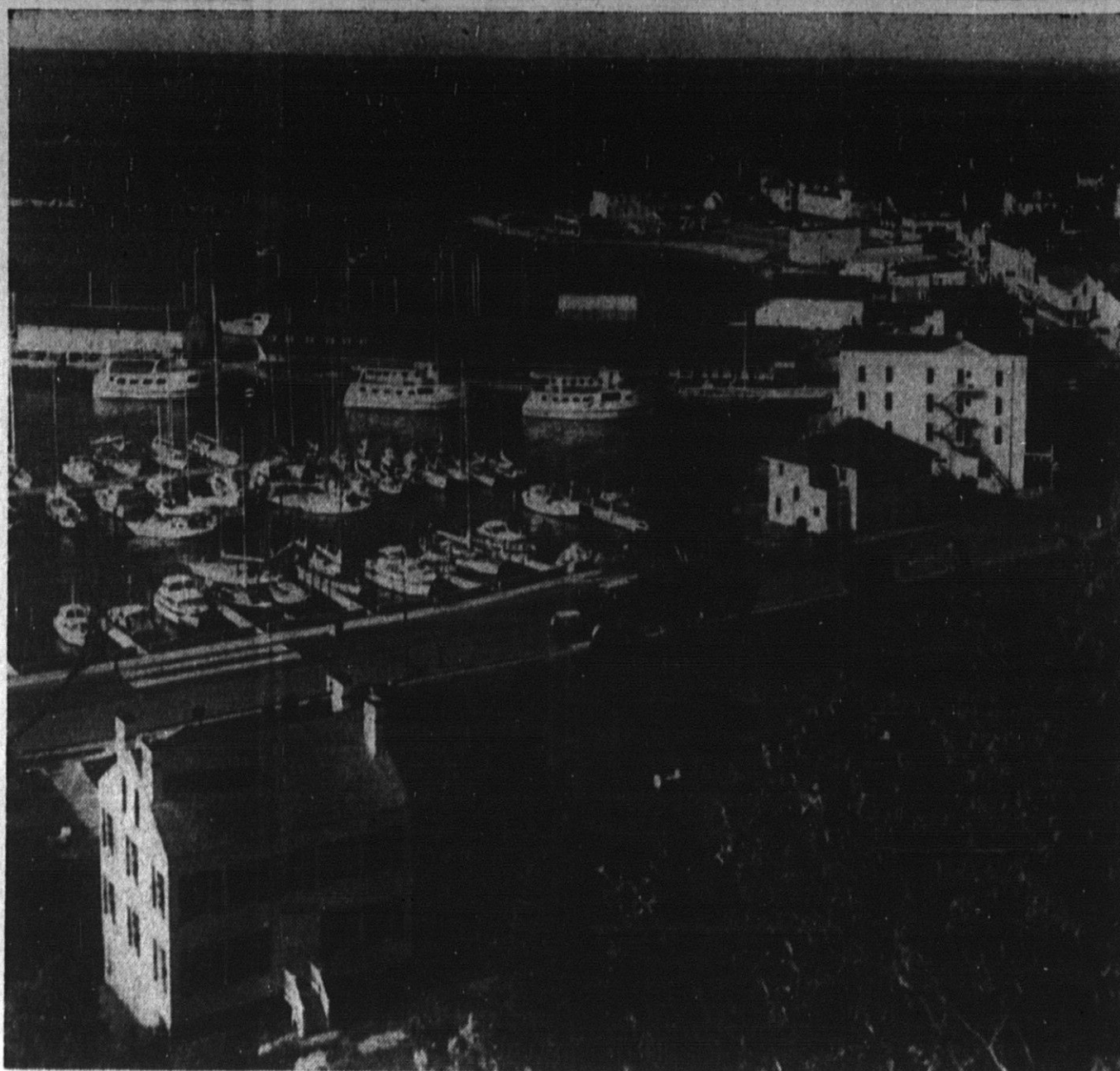

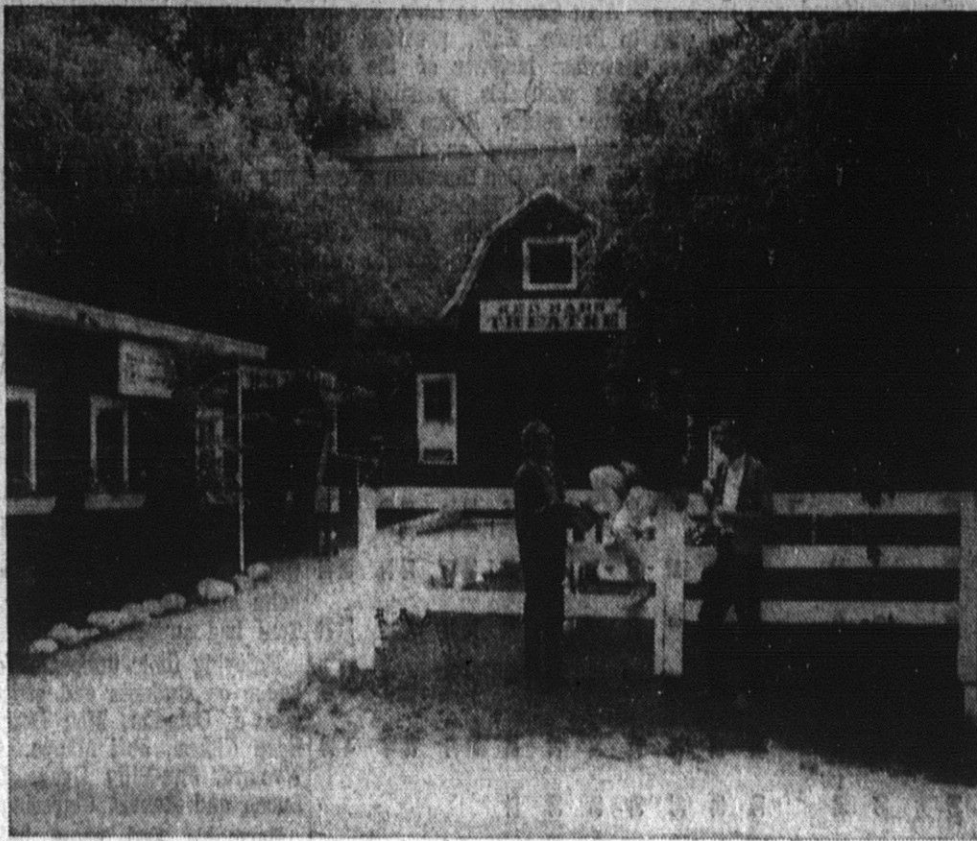

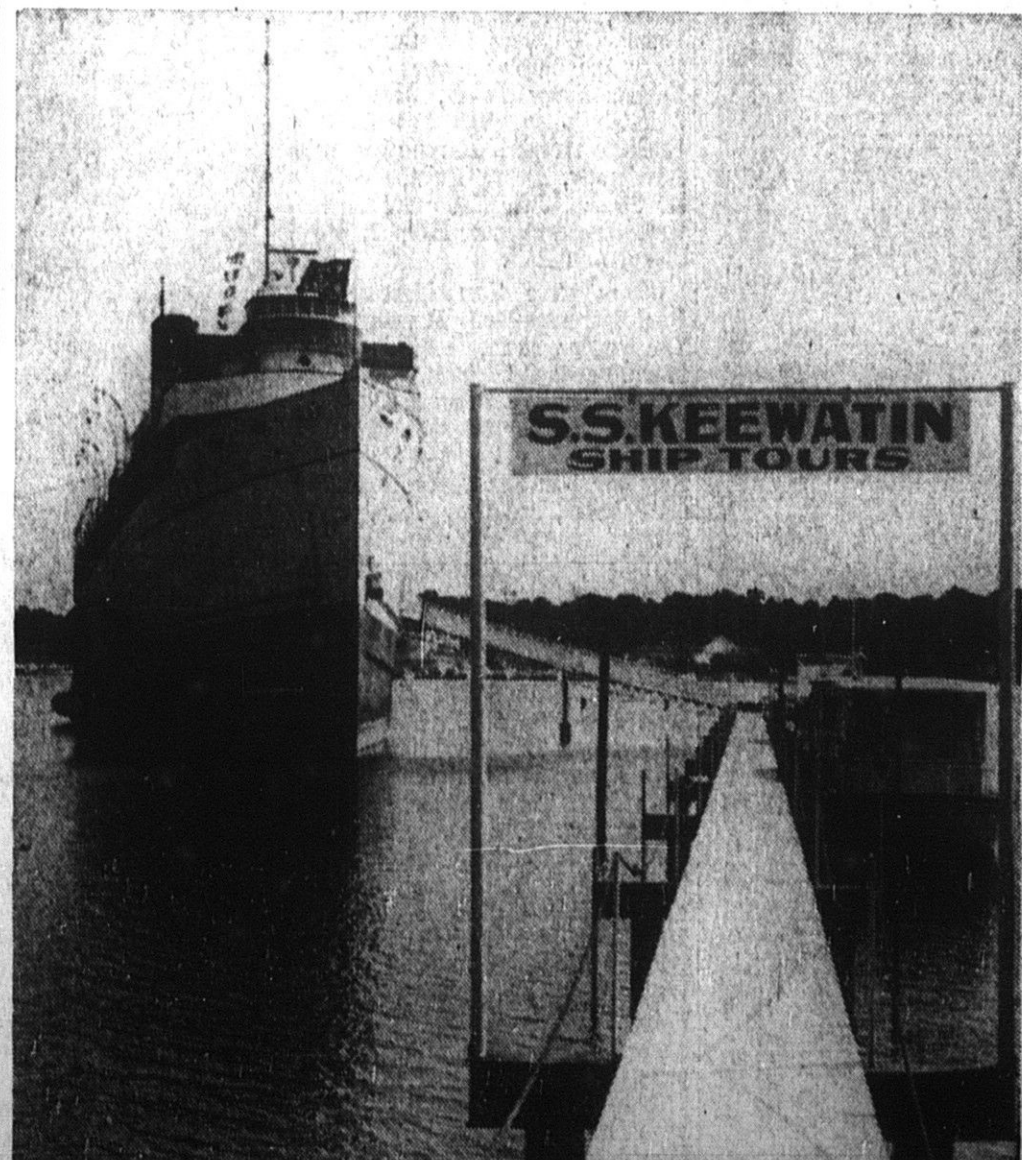
