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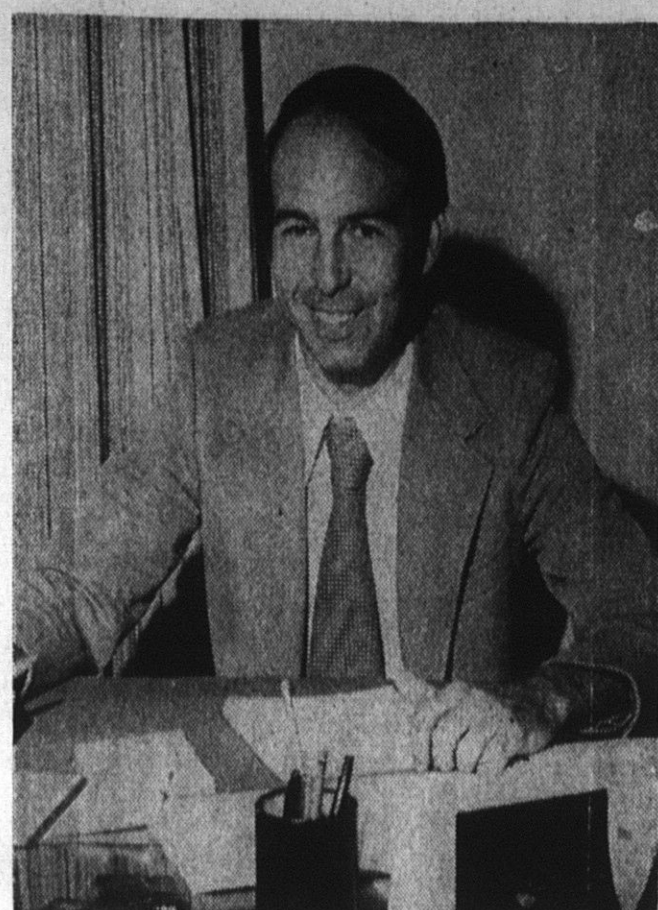

Dr. George F. Jacob Will Head Allegan's Mental Health Dept.

ALLEGAN — Allegan county's Community Mental Health Services department has a director for the first time since the resignation last September of Dr. Marlot Williams.

Named to the post by the county mental health board was George F. Jacob, of Holland, who holds a Ph.D. in educational administration, received this month from Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill.

For the past seven months Verne Van Houten, a member of the department's professional staff, has been serving as acting director.

Dr. Jacob is no stranger to Allegan county. From 1967 to June, 1969, he was special education teacher in the Saugatuck Public Schools where he also served as director of summer special education for elementary and secondary students, taught a course in psychology for college-bound students and introduced a credit-earning social studies course for high school seniors interested in working with exceptional children.

Before accepting the mental health directorship here he was director of special education at Niles Township High Schools, Morton Grove, Ill., with a staff of 43. Prior to that he served for a year as assistant director

Four Juveniles Apprehended In Check Forgeries

Four Holland juveniles, aged 14 and 15, were apprehended today in connection with forged checks that were cashed in the Holland area. The three boys and one girl were referred to juvenile court, Holland police said.

Officers said eight checks, among several reported stolen from the Federal school, 176 Walnut Ave., were cashed for a total value of \$781.35.

Police alerted merchants to the possibility of more of the stolen checks being cashed. Officers said they did not know how many of the checks were taken from the school.

All the checks were worthless and drawn against the old Federal school before it became part of the Holland Public school system. The worthless checks bear the markings of Ottawa County District, Fourth Class, No. 27.

Police said the eight checks cashed were typed with the name of one of the juveniles and forged with the name of the school principal.

The Hope College English department recently added to its departmental library a two-volume edition of the Oxford English Dictionary and a half dozen tape cassettes of contemporary poets reading their works.

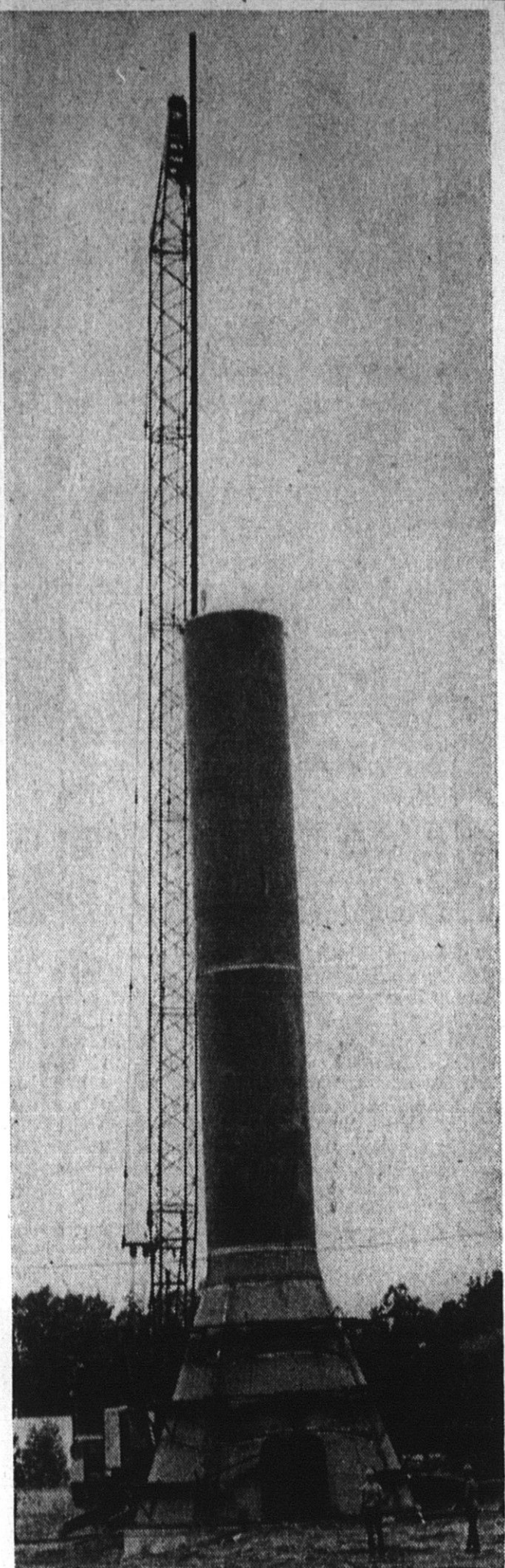
The purchase was made possible by a gift from Mr. and Mrs. Frank Witzel of Spring Valley, N.Y. in memory of their son John who was a Hope College student.

Plunges 70 Feet Down Tube

Water Tank Installed For Holland Township Water Supply System

John Carlisle Jolly Jr., 44, of Ashburn, Ga., was killed Tuesday when scaffolding from which he was working let loose and he plunged 70 feet down the inside of a water tower under construction along Lakewood Blvd., west of River Ave.

Jolly was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital of massive head injuries. He was employed by the Pittsburgh Des Moines Steel Co. of Pittsburgh, contractors for the 500,000 gallon water storage tank.

Ottawa County deputies said Jolly was on scaffolding near the top of the tower helping to guide an 8-inch water pipe being lowered into the tower by a crane when brackets welded

to the inside of the tower holding the scaffolding apparently let loose.

Jolly fell the 70 feet down the inside of the tower and struck a concrete floor at the bottom. The mishap occurred at 8:33 a.m.

The water tower and tank is part of a \$1.3 million township water distribution system under construction. PDM was the low bidder on the water storage tank with a cost of \$179,000.

Jolly's death was the first fatality reported in the water system construction.

Kiwanis Kamp Vandalized

Vandals broke into Kiwanis Kamp off Lakewood Blvd. and Lake Shore St., Sunday and smashed virtually every piece of chinaware in the building and flooded the floor by leaving a water faucet turned on, Ottawa County deputies said today.

The destruction was found Monday afternoon and reported to deputies at 5:30 p.m. The break-in was believed to have occurred after 3:30 p.m. Sunday.

Deputies said a door was kicked in and once inside vandals smashed the dishes on the floor, broke 11 windows, smashed fluorescent lighting fixtures, splashed paint on the walls, pianos and tables, torn down curtains, ripped a coffee urn apart and turned on the water faucet.

Deputies said nothing appeared missing from the building and no damage was reported to the exterior of the building.

Damage estimates were not available.

Fire Levels Home In Allegan County

ALLEGAN — An Allegan County family of six children escaped injuries when fire swept their two-story wood frame house north of Allegan early today. Allegan firemen said the house was burned to the ground. Damage estimates were not available.

The house was occupied by the Leo Mitchell family at 32nd St. and 120th Ave. about 1/4 miles north of Allegan. The cause was listed as a faulty electric dryer.

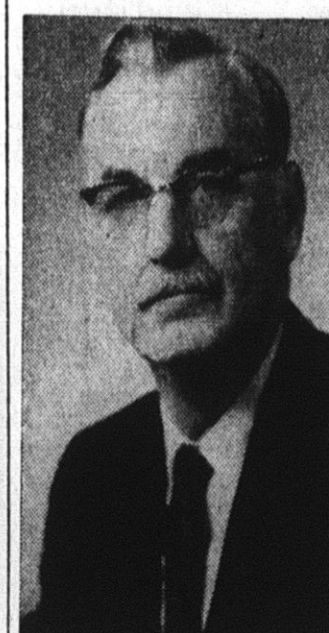
Grysen Easily Wins Sheriff's Contest In Ottawa County

GRAND HAVEN — Out of a field of six candidates, Riemer Van Til of Holland won the Republican nomination for Ottawa county treasurer by polling 4,927 votes in Tuesday's primary election.

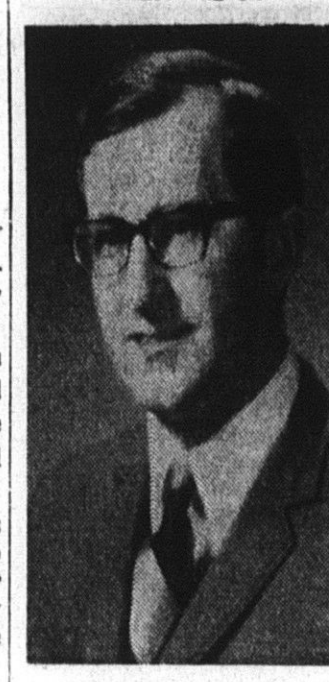
A close contender was Edgar Hall of Grand Haven who polled 4,516 votes. Running third was Franklin Schmidt of Coopersville with 3,103 votes. Other Republican candidates were Judith P. Clapp of Grand Haven, 660; A Lawson Craven of Spring Lake, 817, and William J. Klempel of Spring Lake, 1,212.

In the November election Van Til will face Mary Lou Priebe of Spring Lake who narrowly won the Democratic nomination by polling 1,033 votes over Dolores Dillinger of Grand Haven who received 990 votes. Van Til formerly served as state representative from Ottawa county for several years.

Bosman of Grand Haven defeated Wesley J. Nykamp of West Olive, 9,182 to 5,791. The Democratic candidate, Rhonda Rivera of Spring Lake received 2,005.

Sheriff Bernard J. Grysen easily won over his Republican opponent, Ronald Van Haven of Coopersville, 12,615 to 3,157. The Democratic candidate, Melbourne E. Glockzin of Grand Haven, received 1,910 votes.

Ottawa county voters in 69 precincts voted 2 to 1 on the state proposal to allow juries of less than 12 persons for misdemeanors. The vote was 8,938 to 4,387.

State Rep. James Farnsworth (54th district) won 3 to 1 in Ottawa county, polling 3,477 to 1,116 for his Republican opponent, Mark Ver Hulst of Holland. The Democratic candidate, David A. Blok, received 371 votes.

State Rep. Melvin De Stigter (95th district) won over Eric Van Horsen of Grand Haven, 5,953 to 2,193, for the Republican nomination. In the Democratic race, Albert J. Russell of Hudsonville defeated Irene Collings of Jenison, 645 to 521.

U.S. Sen. Robert P. Griffin led the Republican ticket in Ottawa county, receiving 14,066 votes to 2,240 for Democrat Frank J. Kelley.

U.S. Rep. Guy Vander Jagt received 13,720 votes to 1,789 for his Democratic opponent, Larry H. Olson.

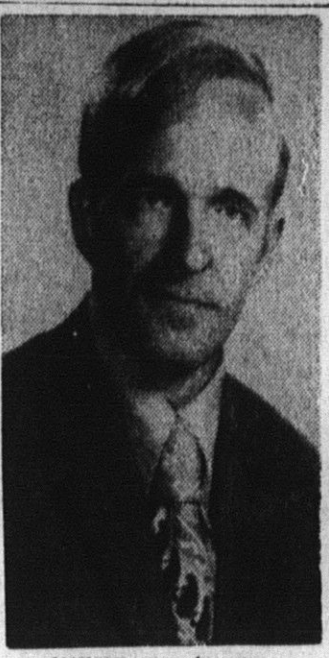

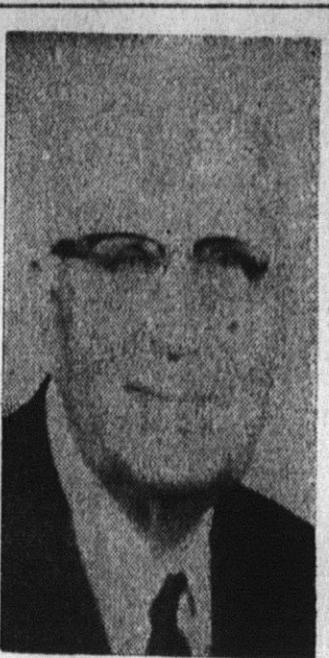

Ottawa Commission Race

James Dressel Defeats Four City Incumbents

A 28-year-old Holland man who challenged four incumbents in a county commissioner race was the decisive winner in Tuesday's primary election in Ottawa county.

James K. Dressel, who returned home last year after nearly five years with the Air Force serving on four continents, defeated his more experienced opponents by the simple device of knocking on every door on Holland city's district 11 which covers half of the city.

Dressel polled 703 votes for the Republican nomination. Thomas O. De Pree received 446, Alvin Geerlings 235, Robert Visscher 423, and Donald K. Williams 356. The unopposed Democratic candidate, Raymond V. Bush, received 200 votes.

Ottawa County was cut to 11 districts from 21. There had been some murmuring of gerrymandering leaving four incumbents in a single district but no formal challenges were registered.

In district 6 (most of Holland township and Zeeland city), Herbert, (Kelly) Wybenga, who is retiring as Zeeland's street superintendent after 12 years, defeated incumbent Bert Schuitema for the Republican nomination, 889 to 405. It was Wybenga's first foray into politics. Wybenga, a native of Holland, was with the water department of the Board of Public Works for 28 years before moving to Zeeland. There was no Democratic candidate.

In district 9, consisting of Park and Port Sheldon townships and a small part of Holland township, incumbent William Winstrom won over incumbent Kenneth Raak, 789 to 682, for the Republican nomination.

Another Republican candidate, Reinard J. Surink, polled 71 votes. The Democratic candidate,

Pat Nordhof, received 297 votes. In district 4, Grand Haven Robinson area, Democratic incumbent Bernard J. Schultz won over William Fischer, 217 to 134, for the nomination. William A. Kieft Jr. won the Republican nomination polling 834 votes to 296 for Gordon Storm and 111 for Michale Tummino Jr.

In district 7, incumbent Raymond Vander Laan of Hudsonville defeated incumbent Harris Schipper of Zeeland, 848 to 677. There was no Democratic candidate.

In district 2 (Crockery and parts of Spring Lake and Polkton) incumbent Eunice Braham with 714 votes won over Robert F. Soule who received 177 and Roger Holmes, 358, for the Republican nomination. Democrat E. Albert Lindberg of Coopersville was unopposed. He received 346 votes.

Ten Arrested On Marijuana Counts

Ten persons, including two juveniles, were arrested by Ottawa county deputies in a raid in Park township Saturday at 11 p.m. on marijuana charges. The juveniles were released to their parents.

Members of the sheriff's department vice squad and Holland police officers carried search warrants as they made the raid on a cottage along Ottawa Beach Rd. near Holland State Park.

Deputies said they recovered a quantity of LSD and marijuana.

Arrested and charged with frequenting a place of an illegal activity were Hilde Nies, 17, of 677 Concord Dr.; Karen Gayle Kalkman, 17, of 659 Brookside;

Vicki Lynn Kragt, 17, of 1201 Wintergreen, and Brian Patrick Darcy, 19, of 1126 Euna Vista. All pleaded guilty to the charge at arraignment this morning in Grand Haven district court and were sentenced to pay \$25 in fine and \$54 in costs each.

Miss Kragt and Darcy paid the fines and costs.

Arrested and charged with possession of marijuana were Jenny Inez Von Ins, 17, of 168 Reed Ave.; Richard Eenigenburg, 19, of 18 Cherry St., and Scott Teifer Maentz, 17, of 567 Lavndale Ct. All pleaded innocent at their District Court arraignments. Eenigenburg and Maentz posted \$100 bond.

be called for reservations. The musical deals with the Dutch in New York in the days of Peter Stuyvesant.

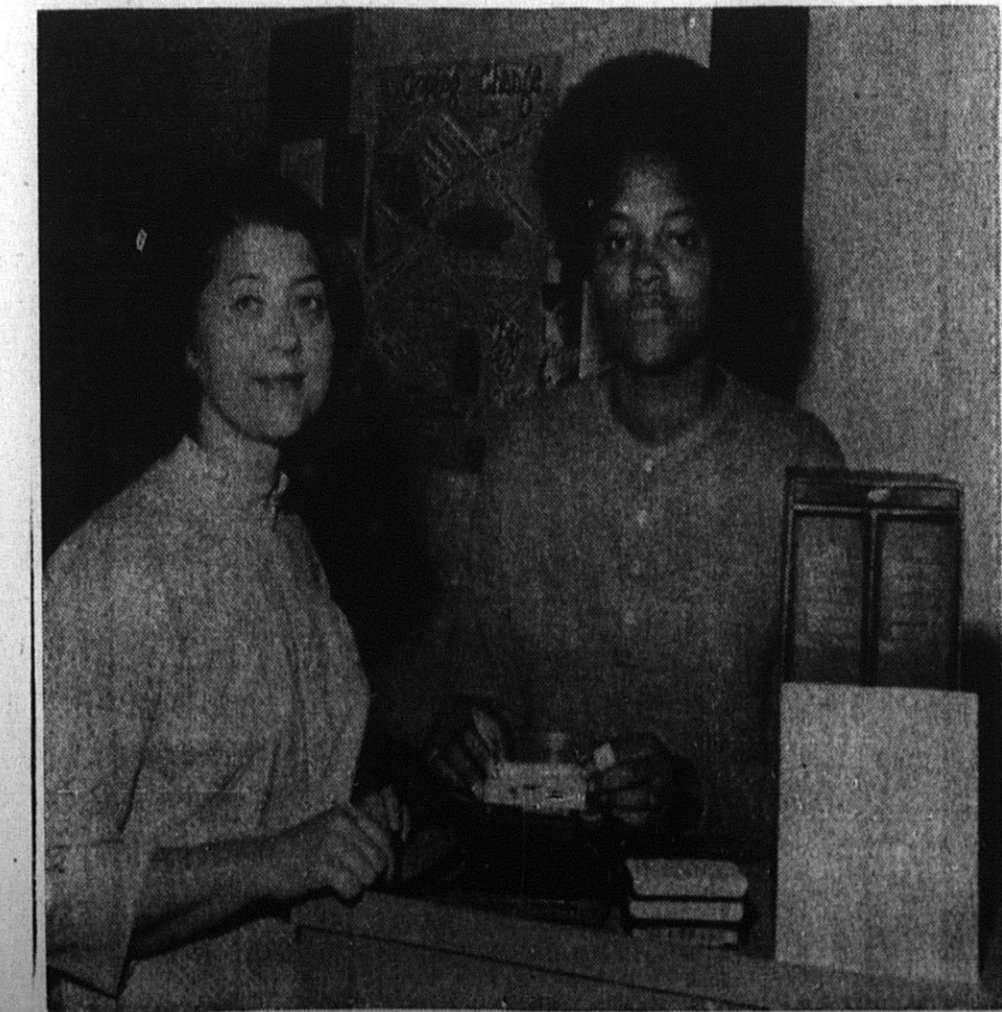
Shuffleboard contests will be held all week at the 22nd St. courts.

Head Start Program Concludes its 7th Year

Holland's Head Start program closed last week after seven weeks of new experiences for incoming kindergarteners, funded by the Office of Economic Opportunity under the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

It was the seventh year the program has been held in Lincoln School under the direction of Ivan Compagner. Holland's program serves a maximum of 85, four, five and six-year-olds who will enter kindergarten in the fall. The program started June 19 and closed Aug. 4. It was carried on in five classrooms with 15 to 17 per room.

Each classroom had one teacher, one teacher's aide and volunteers from the community.

Approximately one-fifth of incoming kindergarteners receive this service, selected on academic, economic, cultural and social needs. The income of the family must fit rigid federal guidelines. Selection is based on referrals from the Ottawa County Health Department, Department of Social Welfare, school psychologist, elementary principals and Holland Day Care Center.

Head Start was designed to widen the cultural, social and academic horizons of the children through classroom experiences, community orientation and field trips.

Basic kindergarten skills such as cutting, tracing, writing, primary colors, numbers 1 through 10, sequence, shapes and sizes are taught. At all times, parents at home are involved.

Services given are hearing and vision screening, psychological testing, blood tests, urinalysis and fluoride treatments.

Medical clinics are sponsored for physical examinations and immunizations. Pediatricians such as Dr. Vernon L. Boersma, Dr. William H. Bremer and Dr. James K. Chamness participate. Throughout the program, there has been close cooperation with the Ottawa County Health Department.

Dental exams and x-rays have been given by local dentists, and medical and dental follow-ups continue into the school year until March 31 of the following year.

Head Start in Holland is operated at a cost of approximately \$24,000 with federal funding providing 75 per cent or \$18,000.

The remaining 25 per cent is an in-kind contribution from Holland Public Schools which includes building use, equipment use, instructional supplies, playground equipment, etc.

The majority of teachers and teacher aides are from the Holland public school system. Teachers must be certified and teacher aides are para-professionals with non-certification.

This year's staff had the following teachers: Dennis Van Hattisma, Wayne Klompars, Carole Mouw, Mrs. Catherine Green and Mrs. Nancy Clark. Teacher's aides were Mrs. Helen Duffy, Diane Trujillo, Pat Grissen, Beth Plaggemars and Mrs. Irma Arzamezom.

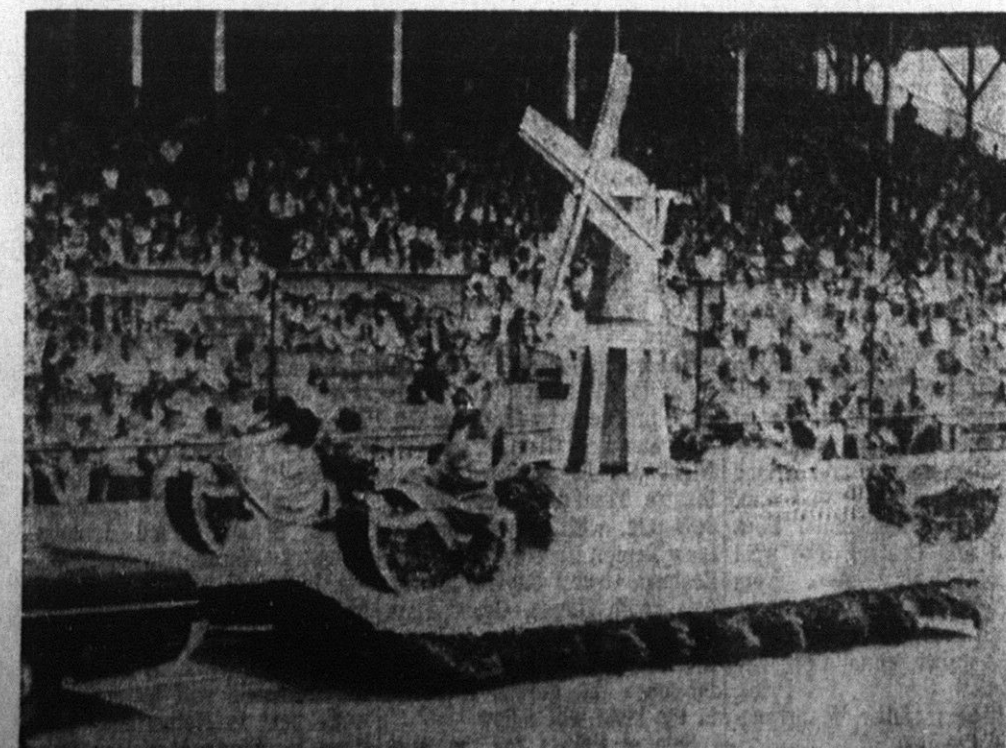

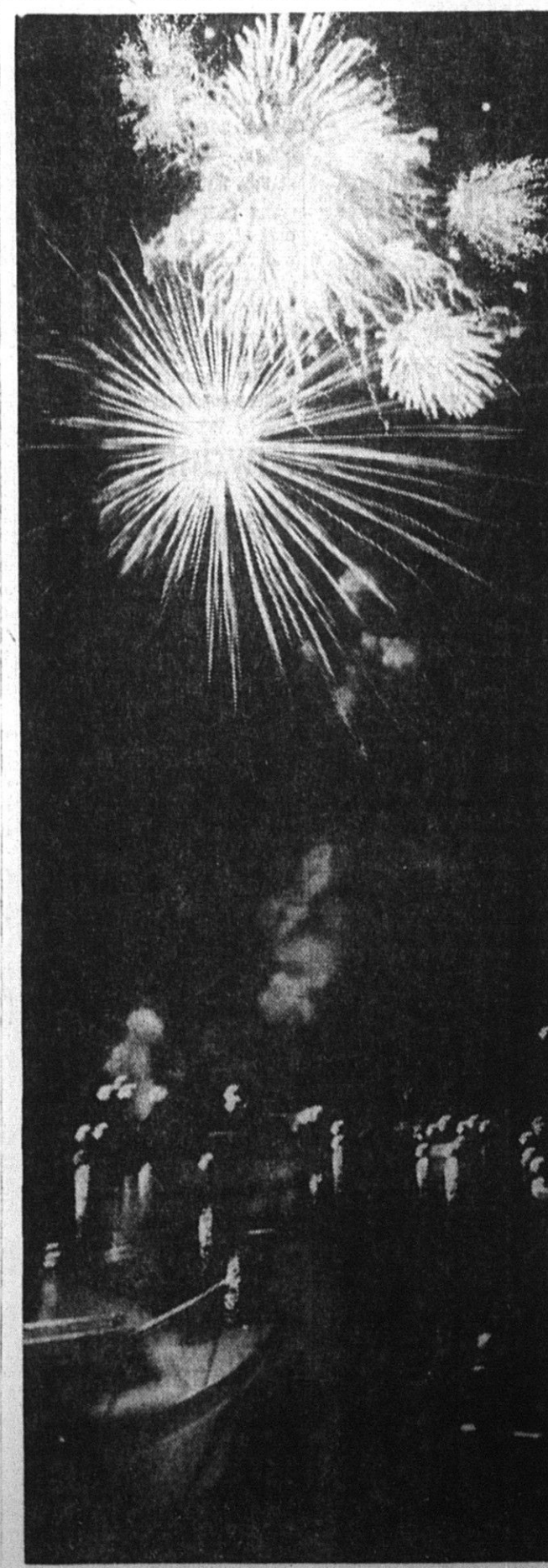

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NO ROMANTIC SOLUTIONS

The United States government is a political entity, and those who don't take that fact seriously are similar to a man walking down a busy street with blinkers. He's going to get into trouble.

The latest example of the above is the vote on the McGovern amendment to slash \$4 billion from the military appropriations bill. The Senate has a Democratic majority, the matter of cutting the military budget was loudly espoused at the recent convention, and the leader of the party introduced the amendment. When everything had been said the Senate voted down the amendment by a vote of 55 to 33, an indication that the Senate was by no means interested in cutting the budget.

The politician, and we don't think this is a bad word either, must ask himself what can be done, granted the diverse gains which are the interest of individual senators. These funds involve jobs, patronage, favors, certain philosophies, and honest differences of opinion.

We think there must be cuts in the budget, and pretty sizeable ones, but we are also quite sure that this will come about, not by some romantic meandering, but by hard work that will accept at least a start in cutting, hoping and working to get more cuts the next time around. That's the realism of political life. And a 55 to 33 vote says something about that realism.

Sunday, Aug. 13
Worshiping in the Family
Deuteronomy 6:1-9; II Timothy 1:3-7

Family life is important. The influence of the family is waning and this hurts the nation. Family worship blesses families and builds society. Families that obey God get rewards.

I. God holds parents responsible. When the Israelites were about to enter the Promised Land, Moses faced this new generation and gave the people the solemn charge to obey God's commandments and to remember their covenant with God. They were told to fear God, that is reverence Him and do His will and thus become a great nation.

Only Israel believed in one God, a truth stated in "The Shema" which sets forth the unity of God. Every Jewish child committed this confession of faith to memory and it was recited at the beginning of every service in the synagogue. Jesus, in Matthew 22:36, mentioned this confession and added, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself" (Leviticus 19:18).

The only way for the nation to keep God's commandment was to teach it to the children and hence the parents were ordered to teach the children diligently — mornings and evenings. Jews wore "frontlets" which became phylacteries or containers in which they placed verses of scripture. They were worn on the forehead and on the left wrist at prayer time or placed on doorposts. The intent was to fix the truth in the heart and express it in daily life. When Christ dwells in the heart, conduct reveals it. Today's parents have great responsibilities to teach children about God and His will.

II. Parental teaching gets results. The second part of the text is from II Timothy 1:1-7, in which Paul states that his spiritual son, Timothy, had been well trained by his grandmother, Lois, and his mother, Eunice. In these days of drugs, social drinking and sex the young need Christian training and teaching and family devotions can contribute much. The reading of the Bible in the presence of the whole family and the prayers of parents and children contribute to the building of Christian character.

Many young people, when they get out in the world, recall the family devotions and what had been said or stressed at those devotions. This is an excuse-making age with everybody too busy, even though people work fewer hours, travel faster and have more leisure time, but let's put first things first.

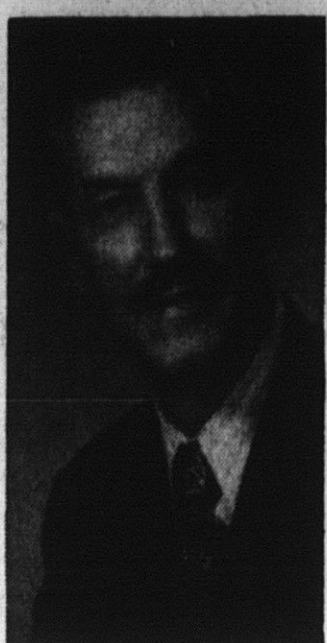
Vogelzang Victor In Three-Way Race

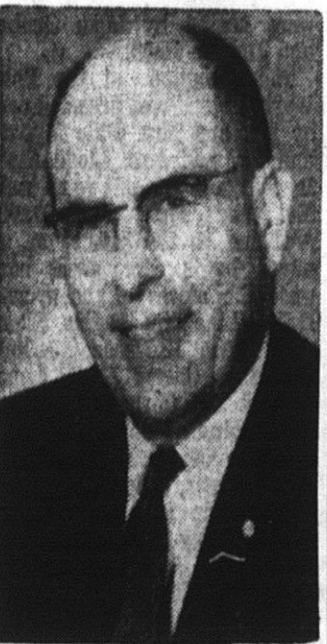

Prosecutor Is Defeated In Allegan

ALLEGAN (UPI)—Incumbent George Greig was defeated by Gary Stewart of Otsego in Tuesday's Republican primary for Allegan County prosecutor, 4,818 to 3,382.

Stewart formerly practiced law in Kalamazoo. There were no candidates for the Democratic nomination.

Sheriff Robert Whitcomb polled 4,327 votes to win the GOP nomination for another term. Donald Gurn had 3,293 votes and Alfred Carter, 2,061. Thomas Zick, the Democratic candidate, had no opposition.

A puzzling Allegan County development was the defeat by the narrow margin of 4,466 to 4,423 yes votes of a proposal for expansion of the county's medical care facility. Last spring, the proposal was defeated, but a proposal for funding the expansion was approved. The Tuesday ballot proposal was an attempt to clarify the issue.

Voters in the city of Allegan approved, 371 to 348, a proposal to use up to \$90,000 of the city's capital reserve sinking fund for the acquisition, development and promotion of an industrial park within the city.

County commissioners from 12 districts were nominated as follows: District 1, Vernon Sill; District 2, Jerry Lohman; District 3, Phillip Quade; District 4, John Vogelzang; District 5, Kenneth Rynbrandt; District 6, Louis Ter Avest; District 7, James Rolfe; District 8, Dennis W. Nickels; District 9, Ralph B. Sytsema; District 10, Anthony Wykstra; District 11, Allen C. Cooper; and District 12, Fred G. Edgerton.

Allegan Township voters also approved a proposal to levy a half-mill for a subsidy for ambulance service in the township. This was approved by a 322 yes vote against 213 no.

New Adventures In Migrant Life

A 20 - minute recess can bring many new adventures for children who have never been exposed to a school playground or a classroom experience.

A slide can seem like a mountain when you have never been on one and smiles show the enjoyment of being able to climb, crawl and examine all parts of a slide.

A game of house and dressing a real doll can be enjoyable to a little girl who has never held a doll in her hands before or had clothes with which to dress it.

Having never been in a

classroom, a look of amazement crosses many faces and a child can be attentive if he wants in the new atmosphere.

Along with these experiences, the children are taken on field trips to John Ball Park, the Ottawa County Fair and a real picnic at the beach.

The Migrant Youth Education Program which is being held at Woodside School is designed to give these children a taste of what it is like outside of camps and to help them communicate so they can succeed in this world.

On July 10, approximately 160 children ranging in age from two - and - a - half to 16 years old piled into Woodside school for the Migrant Youth Education Program being held for the seventh summer.

The program is being directed by Peter Roon and supervised by Norman Bredeweg. The Federally funded program has been in operation since 1966 with the funds coming from the U. S. Office of Education in Washington, D. C. and distributed through the state of Michigan. There is no cost to the district for the Migrant programs.

Bredeweg reported that this year there has been about a 50 per cent increase in the number of children coming into the program and all of the children attending this year are Latinos.

As in past years, the atmosphere around Woodside is informal and lots of love is shown to all the children. Each child is treated as an individual and is given much attention.

When the child first enters the program at Woodside, a physical is given and hearing and vision screening tests are administered and a complete record is kept of each child.

Also on the health note, personal hygiene is taught in the classroom by use of films and materials. A tooth brush is given to each child and each morning they brush their teeth. Fluoride treatments are also administered to each child to each child and each morning they brush their teeth. Fluoride treatments are also administered to each child and blood tests are taken with TB tests.

First aid is administered when the emergency arises and Mrs. Karen Dekker, R. N. is the nurse on hand. She has been with the program two years. The children are also inoculated and follow - up programs are started on a child when needed.

The three R's are the basic items taught with the emphasis on communication. The children are divided into seven classes, based on age, ability and size of the classes.

Barbara Esther teaches the 2½ to 4 year - olds; Luis Destefano, 5-6, Spanish speaking; Shelia Sosa, 5-6; Mary Miller, 7-8; Dale Conklin, 8-9; Sandy Stack, 10-11 and Sandy Mendez, 12-16.

Gilberto Garcia is the recruiter and social worker for the program and is from Rio Grande City, Texas. Sue Mooy is resource teacher assisted by Valerie Bakker. Cooks this year include Bea Alderink, Ruth Hoffman, M. Socorro Ruiz and Rosa Perez.

Teacher aides this year are Nancy Locker, Estelita Saucedo, Frances Garcia, Yolanda Gonzalez, Nina Nunez, Linda Quintanilla, Nilda Valdes, Gloria Schultz, Lucy Silva, Mike Bredeweg and Ed Sosa.

Also Wanda Schutt, Martin Trevino, Ralph Hansen, Margie Arispe, Kris Kalkman, Imelinda Alegria, Pat Briggs, Jane Harvey, Frances Maldonado, and Eugene La Combe, secretary for the program.

A Chalupa (Mexican Bingo) night is planned with prizes of food and clothing for the parents and a special treat for the children. Work displays of the children will be on hand for parents to view and get acquainted with the teachers.

New this year is the feeding of the children. In their classrooms instead of all together in the gym. Menus this year consist of chili, tacos, soup, crackers, milk, etc. By serving the children in the classroom, the atmosphere is more like a regular school day and then the gym can be used by the teachers for other purposes.

Also being taught in the classrooms are music, art, science and of course a recess is needed.

There is no set curriculum in the Migrant Youth Education program, so the teachers must find their own methods of teaching and supply their own materials. This year a laminating machine was purchased so materials used can be saved and used in future years.

The teachers design their own games to teach the children and make flash cards and sets of games from which children can learn. One teacher in the program had some of her older children make their own games, initial them and she laminated them so they could be used over. This also gives the child a feeling of accomplishment for his game he created can be used and will be used to help teach other children.

On the last day, Aug. 18, pinatas will be broken by the children for their finale to the program. The pinatas are gaily decorated and will contain many goodies for the children to scramble after.

As Bredeweg concluded "We love our kids, we care, it is not just a job."

Japanese Students Tell of Impressions

Seven Japanese students of the 38 attending the Hope College Summer Study Program (through the Council on International Educational Exchange) recently sat and talked of their impressions, depressions, insights and hindights of the United States, her people, policies, customs and beliefs.

Those participating were Ako Tominaga, assistant leader of the group, 28, of the Overseas Technical Cooperative Agency; Chizuko Fukuoka, 21, and English and American literature major at the Aoyama Gakuin University, Tokyo; Yasuko Nakamura, 23, a social work major at Meiji Gakuin University; Akihito Ohta, 22, a commerce major at Meiji Gakuin University; Yoshie Someya, 21, an English literature student at Meiji Gakuin University; Takehiro Tokuda, 20, a mathematics major at Tokyo Institute of Technology; Kiyokazu Furukawa, 21, studying economics at Meiji Gakuin University.

The students toured New York City, Washington, D. C. and Niagara Falls before bus-ing to Holland to begin their five-week stay which has included a two-week home stay with families throughout the Holland area.

Perhaps the most startling impression was the unanimous agreement American children are raised with far more discipline and regimen than their Japanese counterparts. "I am amazed to see young boys helping their mothers," said one student. And even more surprising was their belief the "generation gap" is far greater in their native country.

The women students spoke in amazement of all the kitchen "machines" the American housewife has available to her, but were dismayed with the array of frozen and convenience foods. "In Japan, we have frozen foods, but we use them as a base for a dish, rather than the complete dish itself. Also, Americans have colorful dishes while in Japan, we have dishes of many different shapes and devote time making the food look beautiful."

The Japanese have been in the country long enough to have felt the American "openness and informality" but see these qualities as superficial but well meaning. "We are a reserved and rather formal people. We tend not to meet people as easily or as quickly. But in Japan, when a friendship develops, it is a very deep and lasting one."

Speaking of the things that depressed them about the United States, the students all were dismayed with the apparent lack of concern and interest the country displays for its senior citizens. One student in particular spoke with emotion as he described old people sitting in park benches in New York's Central Park with no obvious place to go, thing to do, or person to talk to.

The other most prevalent "discouraging word" was the gulf they observed between rich and poor, majorities and minorities. They described the luxury in New York and Washington as "surface with the poverty and eroding it at an increasing rate."

On returning to Japan, the students all felt they would look upon their country with new and deeper appreciation which is, after all, the most valuable souvenir a traveler can acquire in his journeys.

The student group will bus across country with stops in such cities as Denver and San Francisco, before flying back to Japan later this month. They will leave Holland Thursday.

Laura Hettinga received two write-in votes for Democratic nomination as treasurer.

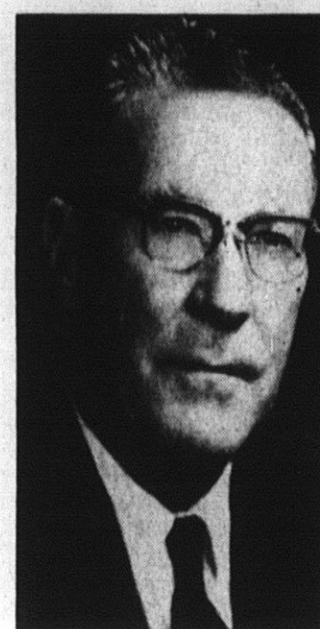

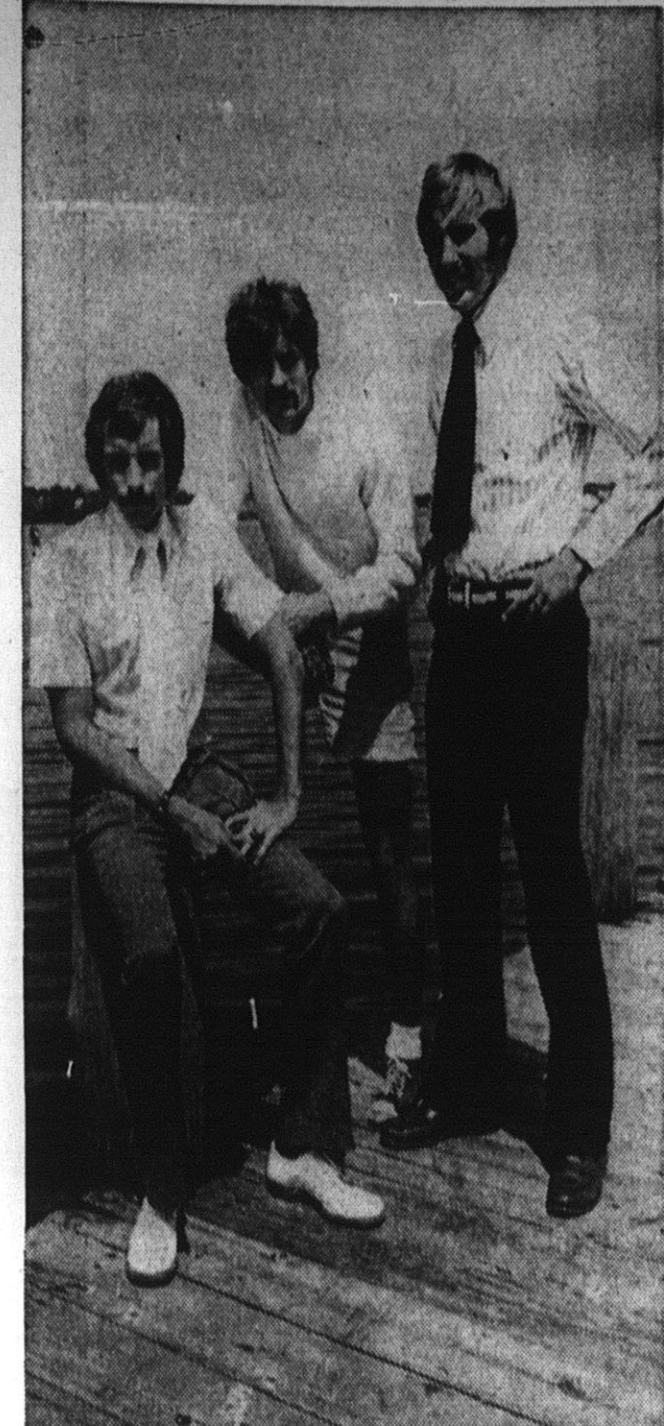

'Klomp' Are Unique, Useful and Decorative

The manufacturing of wooden shoe is in itself a fascinating feat, but the unlimited possibilities of decorating and utilizing the finished product hold an even greater fascination especially to those who think that shoes are only made for walking.

Poplar wood from the forests of Michigan is used by De Klomp Wooden Shoe Factory for the actual wooden shoes because of its easy workability yet toughness, and its attractive white coloring, compared with the more grayish shade of the poplar secured in the Netherlands.

Each block of poplar wood is divided into four quarters, which makes two pairs of shoes. Shoes are made while the wood is wet to prevent splintering.

The blocks are then placed on a "shaper" machine, which forms the outer shape of the shoes, a pair at a time.

Next a drilling machine is used to carve the inside of the pair of shoes. The drilling pattern of the two new shoes follows the set shape of the model shoe, the same basic procedure that was used in shaping.

Wooden shoe making is an exacting process and the accuracy of perhaps a thousand shoes depends upon the accuracy of the beechwood or oak model shoe. To insure achieving an exact size, the model is partially hand-carved, and is made of the hard woods mentioned for durability.

Following these steps, the shoes are dried in storage for

a week in a room where temperature and humidity are carefully controlled.

Sanding is the final step, with various types of sanders used for the different parts of the shoe.

Although plain wooden shoes are in greater demand because many people like to decorate their own, De Klomp offers varnished and decorated shoes for those who doubt their own creative talents.

De Klomp designs its own decoration patterns and also gives visitors some unique and unusual examples of various ways to self-decorate their own wooden shoes. They sell five different styles of shoes from child's size six to adult size 12.

Whether painted with psychedelic colors or merely varnished with delicate wood-burned designs, a pair of wooden shoes is practical for wear while gardening, warm, good for the arches, long-lasting and economical. This type of footwear can also double as planters, bookends, wall decorations or almost anything the imagination will allow.

John Vink and Martin Cleypool, co-owners of De Klomp Wooden Shoe Factory, are veterans in wooden shoe making and importing, respectively. Both make annual trips to the Netherlands, enabling them to stock much exclusive merchandise in their souvenir shop.

De Klomp's wooden shoe lamps and candles are included in De Klomp's display of Dutch gifts. Nearly all of these items are imported from the Netherlands.

De Klomp's wooden shoe circulation has expanded since Tulip Time to include more western states and their wooden shoes are now shipped to local stores and shops nationwide.

The manufacturing process continues from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. year-round with the exception of Sundays. Tours are offered and admission is free.

De Klomp Shoe Factory officially opened May 3, 1972 but has been manufacturing shoes since November 1971. The factory produces 100 pairs of shoes daily.

Located east of Lincoln Ave. on 32nd St., De Klomp shows

Wilderness State Park Is Untouched

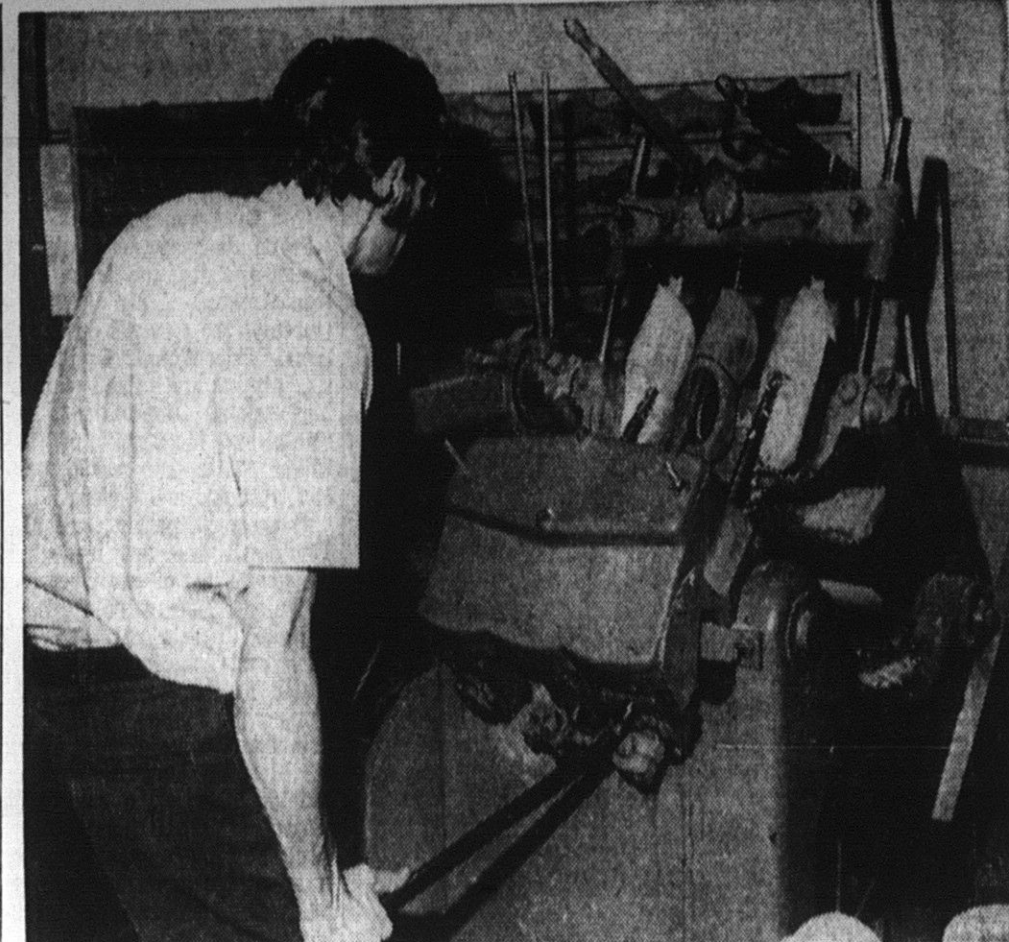
The park's top highlights are its varied topography and equally varied vegetation. A park of great natural beauty, with dense

The park has four campgrounds with 210 modern campsites. The main campground is along the straits where there are modern facilities, electricity, a disposal station for trailers, shade and ready access to the beach along the straits.

Another campground is in a

tract of stately pine, with good shade, some ground cover and ample privacy. Swimming is good and there also is playground equipment along the beach for children.

Foot trails wind through the park. At three points on the trails system are fireplaces, wells and toilets. There is a nature study center, and a park naturalist is available for evening programs and guided hikes.

Several inland lakes enhance the park's beauty. Fishing for smallmouth bass is off Waughoshance Point and deer, beaver and waterfowl are plentiful.

Other park features include a

boat launching site, outdoor center and library.

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Mackinac Bridge Walk Is Slated for Labor Day Morning

ST. IGNACE — Once again the world's greatest walking event will take place on Labor Day morning, when more than 20,000 persons are expected to stroll across the Mackinac Bridge from St. Ignace in Michigan's Upper Peninsula to Mackinaw City in the Lower Peninsula.

The general walk will commence at 7:30 a.m. Gov. William G. Milliken is expected to make a leisurely trip across the Bridge rather than walk for a record which he established last year at 46 minutes 50 seconds, knocking 10 seconds off the previous record for govern-

ors established by George Romney in 1968. The new record has been engraved on a plaque mounted on a stand supporting the coveted Governor's Glass limited to competition among governors, past and present, of any state in the Union.

The Mackinac Bridge, which is closed to pedestrian traffic except for Labor Day morning, first became the site of the annual Bridge Walk in connection with the Bridge dedication in 1958, when the International Walkers Association, some 65 strong, were led by then Gov. G. Mennen Williams (now Supreme Court Justice) on a fogbound, rainy morning, starting a tradition which has continued annually on Labor Day morning with a growing number of participants in each succeeding year.

Automobile traffic, both northbound, is maintained during the Bridge Walk. Severinsen Will Appear In Concert

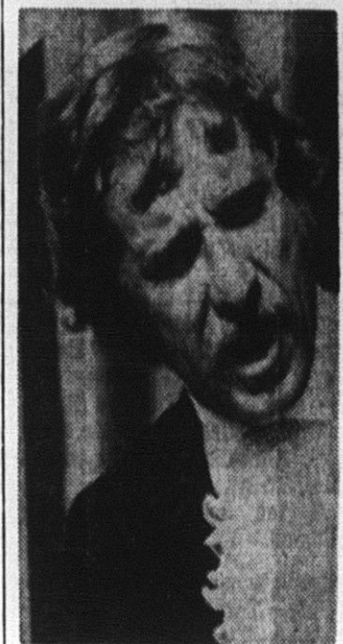

Increased Activity Keeps District Court Jumping

One of the busiest places in Holland these days is District Court in City Hall where the case load of traffic tickets, civil and criminal cases continues to mount.

The court, one of three district courts in the 58th district, (Ottawa county and that portion of Holland city which lies in Allegan county) handles a wide variety of cases in a jurisdiction which has changed drastically since district courts replaced municipal courts and justices of the peace in January, 1969.

In the old justice courts, JPs could handle civil suits up to \$300 and municipal courts up to \$1,500. District court now processes cases in which persons may sue up to \$10,000. Criminal cases carried maximum penalties of 90 days and \$100 fine, but district court now has jurisdiction over some high misdemeanors which can bring sentences of up to a year.

Emphasis of law and order on the local scene has left its mark on the local court. In October, 1971, a new traffic unit was added by the Holland Police Dept., and Holland traffic tickets jumped from 160 to 300 in one month!

Before district court reorganization, nearly every township had a justice of the peace. There were two municipal courts in the county. The 58th district operates three divisions — Holland, Grand Haven and Hudsonville, plus one magistrate in Coopersville who is on duty one night a week and Saturday morning.

In Holland, the court handles tickets and complaints from state police, Holland city police, Ottawa county sheriff, Department of Natural Resources (in-

cluding state park violations), township ordinances from this area, conservation department, Zeeland city, Michigan Public Service Commission (trucking violations), Michigan Department of Health (dairying etc.) and watercraft violations (usually sheriff's enforcement and Park township.)

Holland and Grand Haven courts are about the same in size and case load.

Judges from the three courts have made up a schedule for uniform fines, and the traffic clerk and other deputy clerks may take guilty pleas and collect fines within the framework of that schedule. Others must appear before the judge. All judges must be lawyers.

In every fine, \$4 goes to the State of Michigan as a judgment fee and is put into a state fund. As an example, a city traffic ticket bringing a \$15 fine and costs is divided as follows: \$4 to the state and of the balance of \$11, two-thirds goes to the county general fund and one-third to the city of Holland.

A state violation, namely a sheriff's ticket with a \$15 fine and costs, would be divided as follows: \$4 as a judgment fee to the state, \$3 costs to the county general fund and \$8 to the penal fund (library fund).

Judges in court may assess fines and costs as they see fit within the maximums. For instance, a drunk driving disposition of \$100 fine and \$35 costs under the Holland city ordinance, would send \$4 as judgment fee and the remaining \$131 divided 2/3 to the county and 1/3 to the city.

An assault and battery statute violation bringing a \$50 fine and \$50 costs would have a \$4 state judgment fee, \$46 to the county

general fund and \$50 to the penal (library) fund.

Parking violations are handled through police headquarters with only parking warrants through district court. In the few cases that are processed, no \$4 fee is sent to the state. The \$7 costs charged for parking violations at Holland State Park and the Ottawa County Fair go to the county general fund.

In June, the Holland court paid \$3,884 to the state for judgment fees.

Judges' salaries are paid by the state, with any supplements paid by the county. The county also pays rent and the salaries of court employees. The city pays witness fees which amount to about \$150 a month.

In June, 870 traffic cases were processed by court personnel and another 350 cases were handled by the judge.

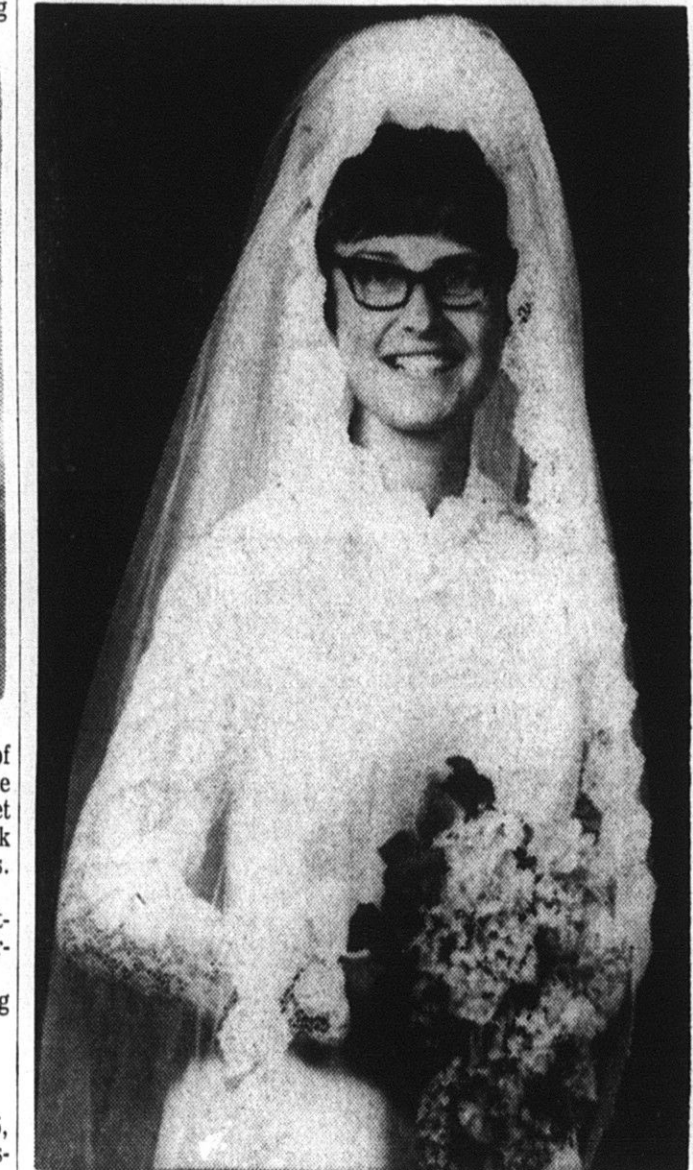
Also operating out of Holland district court is the probation department which employs two full time and three part time employees. The program also encompasses many volunteers. A recent innovation has been a defensive driving program, an Ottawa-Allegan Rehabilitation program and continuing developments on the drug program.

Judge John Galien heads the Holland court assisted by Judge Gerald Van Wyke who is assigned to the Hudsonville court and Judge Jacob Ponstein of Grand Haven.

On the staff of the Holland court are Lucile Kooyers, Evelyn Oosterbaan, Una Haut, Valdota Castillo and Joyce De Jonge.

The local staff is looking forward to moving to new quarters in the police-court complex on Eighth St. just west of River Ave. in mid-October. Open house is planned later.

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1st Michigan Announces 2 Appointments

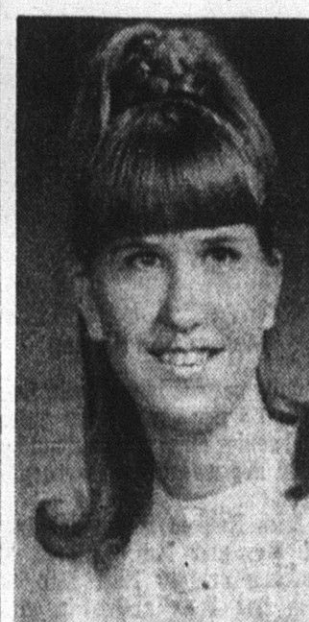

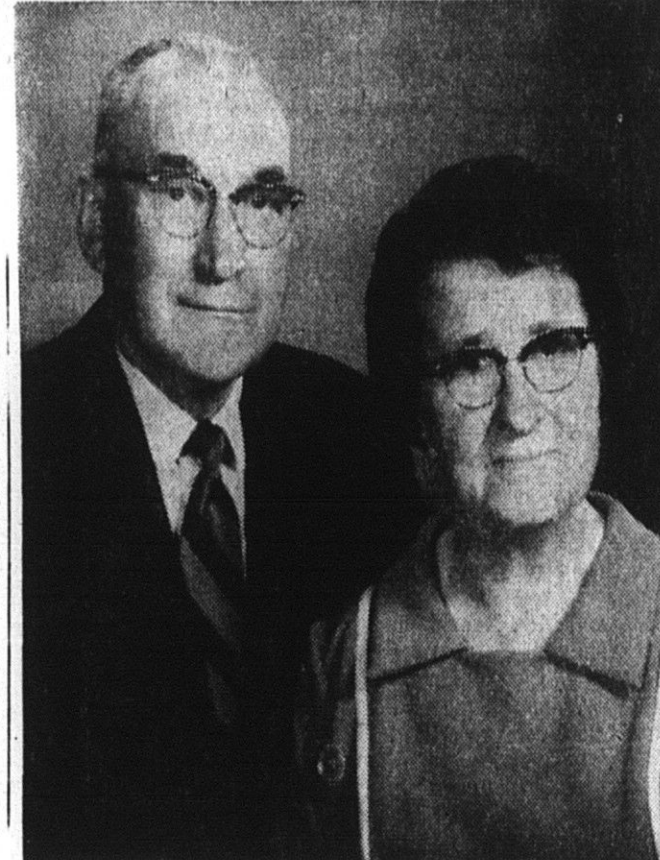
