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Alternative Education Program Set

An alternative education proposal, aimed at spotting potential dropouts, was approved by the Holland Board of Education at a regular meeting Monday night in the administration office on Apple Ave. The proposal calls for appointing an advisory council of 11 members to establish policies for the program. This committee will include parents, community and organization representatives.

The proposal also calls for applying for available grants. It is hoped the first class of some 15 students will be implemented by Nov. 1 and a second class the same size no later than Jan. 26. The alternative program had been discussed in detail at the July 21 meeting.

A contract for William L. Lawton, a 1975 graduate of Hope College, to teach sixth grade at Lincoln School was approved.

Gordon Buitendorp, architect for the high school athletic development, gave a progress report on activities on the complex, stating that basic earth work has been completed and nearly all top soil placed. Drainage with storm water retention and runoff is near completion and some preliminary work has been done on sprinkling.

The base course has been laid for tennis courts and basic work on the running track is nearing completion. Equipment such as goal posts has been delivered and work on fencing started Monday. A storage building has been completed except for painting, plumbing and doors.

Work is a little behind schedule, but some concepts have been changed such as laying pipe mechanically, and it is expected work will be completed by Sept. 1 or shortly thereafter. Total cost of the complex development is \$350,000.

The Junior High Sites bond issue was reviewed, but action on a recommendation to use \$42,000 of the \$89,945 balance to pay sewer and water assessments for the two sites was tabled until the first meeting in September.

A detailed report from High School Principal Fred Bertsch on usage of the Xerox 7000 reduction duplicator revealed normal usage can be maintained in a range of 80,000 to 90,000 copies a month and recommended that the machine be retained for 1975-76. It was referred back for further study.

In answer to a request from Ernest Fleming last month on a bus to transport children from Meadow Lanes and 40th West, the board shared his concern for safety of children in this area and other areas throughout Holland district. Supt. Donald L. Ihman cited other instances of traffic hazards.

Adhering to transportation policies, the board suggested Fleming (who had asked for a bus for \$1, or approximately one-half of the market value) submit a bid when three 10-year-old school buses are offered for sale in the near future. Carroll Norlin, former principal of Jefferson School where children of Meadow Lanes and 40th West attend, expressed concern for traffic hazards and asked that transportation policies be reviewed.

Katherine MacKenzie expressed concern over 31 per cent of the Holland High senior class entering the labor market this summer, and called attention to advantages offered in a skill center program. The Ottawa-Allegan Intermediate District will vote Sept. 29 on a skill center.

President Charles Bradford presided at the meeting which lasted an hour and 20 minutes. The invocation was given by Deanna De Pree. All members were present.

The Holland American Legion Band, Henry Vander Linde director, will provide music. The downtown will be decked with flags.

The merchants association will have as special guests members of the original board of directors of the Holland Downtown Development Corp. which originated in February, 1969. Six Others Injured, Four Seriously

Illinois Girl, 9, Fatally Injured in 3-Car Crash

One person was killed and six others injured, four seriously, in a three-car collision Saturday at 5:47 p.m. at Chicago Dr. and Walnut Ave. in Holland township.

Fatally injured was Christine Marie Greer, 9, daughter of Curtis and Margaret Greer of Mackinaw, Ill., who were traveling through Holland with their family. She was the 11th traffic fatality in Ottawa County this year.

Ottawa County deputies said a car driven by Christine De Weerd, 18, of 16078 Polk St., West Olive, westbound along M-21 or Chicago Dr., skidded out of control on wet pavement and crossed into the eastbound traffic lanes and was struck broadside by the Greer car and one operated by Eugene Kowalski, 44, of Royal Oak. Kowalski was not reported injured.

The accident was reported at 5:47 p.m. Saturday and the Greer girl was taken first to Holland Hospital and transferred to Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids where she died at 8:48 p.m. of a skull fracture and internal injuries.

Injured and admitted to the intensive care unit at Holland Hospital were Kevin Greer, 14; Curtis Greer, 36, and Kimberly Greer, 12, and Christine De Weerd.

Treated in Holland Hospital and released were Margaret Greer, 36, and Virginia Kowalski, 43.

Kevin sustained a broken jaw and broken leg; Curtis a skull fracture and leg injuries; Kimberly a skull fracture and multiple broken bones and the De Weerd woman a broken arm and internal injuries.

Local Ox Roast Slated Sept. 20

Holland community's 10th annual Ox Roast will be held Saturday, Sept. 20, at Windmill Island, sponsored by the city and Hope College in a cooperative effort of town and gown.

Tickets will be limited to 4,000. They will be available later at several centers. Senior citizen tickets will be available at the city treasurer's office only. Serving hours will be 2 to 6:30 p.m.

Aug. 15 Deadline For City Taxes

Holland taxpayers have until Aug. 15 to pay their summer taxes without a penalty, city treasurer Jack Leenhouts reminded today.

After Aug. 15, taxes unpaid will carry a 2 per cent penalty fee until Sept. 10 when the penalty and interest is increased to six per cent.

Senior citizens and eligible servicemen, widows, handicapped and blind, with income of \$10,000 or less, were reminded that application for deferred payment of summer taxes without penalty until next Feb. 15 should be made in the treasurer's office by Aug. 15.

The homestead tax postponement is not automatic and can only be granted upon application, Leenhouts said.

Founded in 1951, the foundation is a community trust organization through which individuals, groups or organizations may establish or contribute to philanthropic projects for Holland community.

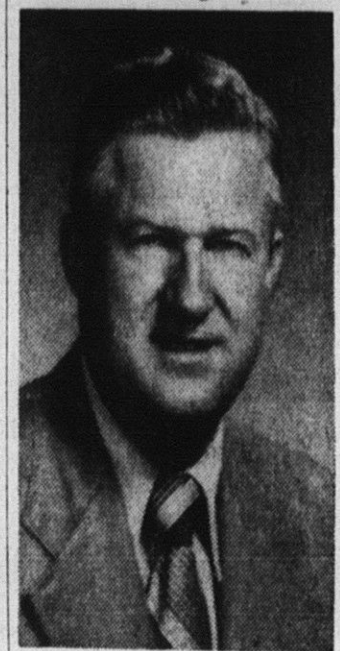
Fills James Dressel's Term

Donald K. Williams New Commissioner

GRAND HAVEN — Donald K. Williams, former Ottawa County Commissioner and owner of Williams Jewelry store in Holland, was appointed to fill the unexpired term of James K. Dressel as commissioner of the 11th District in Holland at a special meeting Monday.

Williams was one of five persons seeking the appointment for the term which expires Dec. 31, 1976. Dressel resigned at the July board meeting to become an active candidate for appointment as county treasurer.

Williams was defeated by Dressel in 1972 when the county board was changed from 21

members to the present 11 members.

Williams was appointed to the board on a seven to three vote with commissioner Marilyn Sherwood absent.

Williams will be sworn into office at the Tuesday meeting. He is a member of the board of health and served two terms as a county commissioner before 1972.

He is a native of Holland and has a degree in economics and business administration from Hope College. He is president of the Michigan Retail Jewelers Association and lives at 1032 Heather Dr.

Voting for Robert Visscher, another former commissioner defeated by Dressel in the 1972 election, were John Langeland, Herbert Wybenga and Kenneth Raak.

Other candidates were Mrs. Ronald (Jessie) Dalman, Ivan Munson and Earl Vanden Bosch.

Commissioners are expected to receive the resignation of Kieft at the Tuesday meeting. He has taken a position with Grand Haven township.

A total of 1,814 votes were cast including 39 absentee ballots. Total registered voters list 13,660.

Heavy Vote in Zeeland Primary

Vanden Brink Out Of Council Race

ZEELAND — Incumbent councilman Ted Vanden Brink, seeking his second term in office, was knocked out of the running in Tuesday's primary election which saw four candidates selected for the two vacancies on the November general election ballot.

A strong 40 per cent of the registered voters went to the polls and Clerk Leon Van Harn attributed the heavy turnout to strong political interests by special interest groups.

Incumbent councilman Ray Schaap and Howard Bouwens,

Dan Suman and Harvey Wierda were selected by primary voters. Suman was the top vote getter with 503. Bouwens received 414; Schaap 330 and Wierda 274.

Vanden Brink received 246 votes, Donald Disselkoen 244 and Mary Ann Kroll 81 votes.

Van Harn said a misinterpretation of the election codes informed voters to cast ballots for four candidates but he added the error was found before the election and voting machines were changed to allow votes for only two candidates.

For Aerospace Unit

Ex-Cell-O to Build New Zeeland Plant

ZEELAND — Plans for an \$800,000 facility for Ex-Cell-O Corp., aerospace unit in the Zeeland Industrial Park were announced by City Council at its regular meeting Monday.

Mayor Edward Nagelkirk said the plant will be used for manufacturing of gas turbine fuel distribution devices for the aerospace industry. The facility is expected to create an additional 100 jobs over a period of time.

The facility will include 31,500 square feet of space and construction was expected to begin in September with production expected to begin in May.

The Zeeland facility will be in addition to the existing plant in Holland, Zeeland superintendent David Rubinstein said.

In other action at the council meeting, it was announced that Ex-Cell-O and Howard Miller Clock Co., had applied for industrial facilities expansion tax credits under state statutes and a hearing on the matter would be scheduled in 60 days.

Following a wedding trip to New York and Maine, the couple will reside at 615 Douglas Ave.

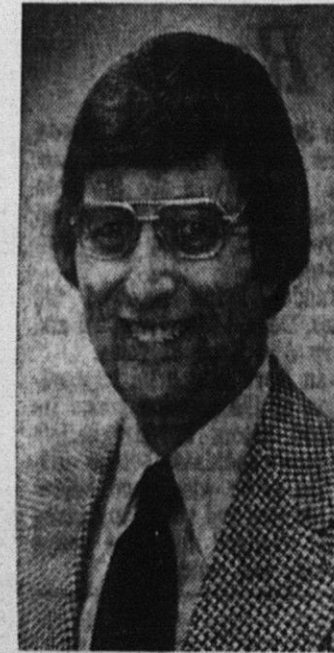

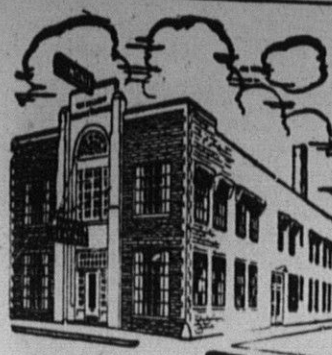

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SHRINKAGE IS STEALING

Retail merchants in this country are losing about \$5.8 billion a year through stealing in the way of shoplifting, both from customers and employees. In some instances such stealing runs to 5 per cent of gross sales.

This means that prices one pays on what is bought are automatically raised about 5 per cent for such stealing. If one buys a coat that sells at about \$100, five dollars will be to take care of the matter of stealing.

There have been instances that the stealing has become so great that retailers have been forced out of business. This is not difficult to understand, especially if the retailer doesn't have a good grasp of the amount that is being stolen, and doesn't raise his prices to take care of this stealing.

What can be done? The retailer might go back to the old ways of keeping everything behind the counter. But this would of course raise costs considerably. Another way is to hire guards, though it is also true that much of the stealing is an inside job. We are forced back to the hope that the moral climate of the country can be brought back into focus.

Workshops that teach that pilfering costs the consumer may be a noble attempt to do something about the problem, but the basic issue is the moral fiber of the community. And to raise this moral attitude is no easy task. It is doubtful whether anything less than this will have any lasting results.

In America many people have tensions. That is why the psychiatrists are busy. The practice of Christian teachings help people to overcome life's tensions and trials. Apply the truths in this lesson and the tensions will be conquered.

I. Dedicated believers are nonconformists. In the first mans Paul deals with doctrines. From chapter 12 through 16 he discusses the practical application of doctrines to daily life. Ever was Paul seeking the welfare of believers.

Paul appealed to Christians to present their bodies — their whole persons, body, mind and soul to the God who had been merciful to them. This self-sacrifice was to be a living, holy and acceptable to God, pleasing to Him, in accordance to His will. The early believers and we also are tempted to conform to the style of the world we live in. It takes convictions and courage to resist tv portrayal as the real life style. True Christian move against the stream. Sunday Christianity is not enough. Instead of being outwardly conformed.

II. Trials and temptations produce character. When we realize their results, it is possible to consider them sources of real joy. Only dedicated Christians do this. James, the brother of Jesus, tells us that Christians are different. Believers think ahead. We do not belong to the now generation that considers only the present. God knows what testings can do. Abraham and Jacob were tested and became men of greater faith. Testings result in forbearance or patience, which quality is much needed and appreciated in society and in the church.

III. Prayer is profitable. How is it possible to benefit from trials and temptations? James has the answer. Realize you need what you don't have enough of — namely wisdom, the wisdom that is able to put your knowledge to work and then ask for it. How? Not in a half-hearted manner but in faith. No wonder God does not pay attention to some prayers uttered by God's people. The tried person is blessed here and will be greatly blessed hereafter. Tensions can get you down, you can down the trials and temptations through God's help.

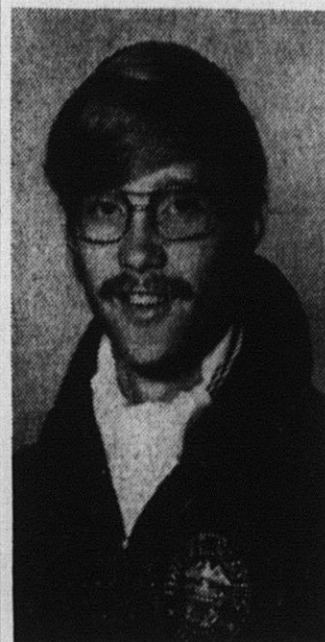

Of Its \$8,850,000 Goal

Build Hope Drive Hits 75 Per Cent

Build Hope, a multi-million dollar fund raising program to support capital, endowment and academic programs at Hope College, has reached 75 per cent of its \$8,850,000 goal.

James M. VerMeulen of Grand Rapids, Mich., national chairman of the Build Hope Fund, recently announced that \$6,692,944 has been contributed or pledged.

Several major projects of the Build Hope Fund have been completed. These include a new computer center and the renovation of the former science building into a center for the

humanities and social sciences. There has also been a significant number of gifts for the college's endowment fund including several endowed scholarships according to President Gordon J. Van Wyl.

Two remaining major projects include funding for the construction of a new \$3.2 million Physical Education Center and renovation of the former Voorhees residence hall to form an administrative center.

Commitments to Build Hope already represent the largest amount of money ever contributed to a Hope College fund drive.

Auction Set For Stolen Goods Here

A public auction of recovered stolen property, unclaimed evidence and excess items for disposition and public sale was approved by City Council Wednesday night.

The sale will be held the afternoon of Aug. 28 in the police building basement. In addition, there will be disposition of a number of bicycles and bicycle parts that have remained unclaimed for a period of 45 days. All materials will be available for public inspection an hour before auction time.

Approval was given a Library Board recommendation for the rental and purchase of existing collection of Zeeland Public Library in a three-year plan. In the first year, Zeeland will buy one-third of the books and rent two-thirds; the second year will buy one-third and rent one-third, and the third year will purchase the final third.

Purchase price would be \$1.19 per volume and the rental rate would be 50 cents per volume per year. All money received would be credited to the Holland Public Library. Plans also were made for an inventory of the existing collection.

In other library business, council approved fund transfers within the 1974-75 budget to be used toward repayment of a loan from the capital improvement fund for the purchase of property at 54 West 12th St. The total of \$14,833.34 will be paid by February, 1976. Gifts of several books also was acknowledged.

Council set a public hearing Aug. 20 on a rejuvenated application for funds under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The city had filed a pre-application for funds early in 1975 but a lack of funding for discretionary cities forced denial of the application. Subsequently, the city was informed that supplemental financing has received Congressional approval and a new application can now be processed. The three categories listed on the pre-application involved revolving housing rehabilitation, revolving spot demolition fund, and core city economic development fund HUD suggested a full application of the first two, listing an available fund level of \$135,000.

On recommendation of the city manager, Council approved a change order with Sloophaak and Myaard, currently under contract on local sewer projects, and provide sewer services on Hiawatha Dr. and Lincoln Ave., with costs listed as \$16,414.65 and \$17,982.56. Action was taken because of urgent need on the part of some users.

Council acknowledged with thanks a gift of \$150 to the fire department from the executive committee of Northern Fibre Products Co. The gift will be used to purchase additional equipment for the rescue truck.

A formal resolution was approved amending the maintenance contract with the Department of State Highways and Transportation designating Gordon Heidenga as maintenance superintendent.

City Clerk D. W. Schipper was appointed acting city manager when the city manager is absent from the city through Nov. 30.

Council approved an application from HEDCOR to establish a new 90-acre industrial development district located on the south side of M-40 immediately east of the Chesapeake and Ohio mainline.

Approval also was given a proposed agreement between the city and Ottawa county continuing the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act program for fiscal year 1975-76.

Mayor Hallacy offered congratulations to Ray Reidsma of the Board of Public Works for receiving the Edward Dunbar service award for 25 or more years with the public water supply.

The mayor also reminded Council of the ceremonies Friday at 6 p.m. dedicating the downtown beautification project.

Councilman Al Kleis Jr., asking for a progress report on Central Ave. paving, was informed that concrete curbs were completed 10 days ago but that there have been diffraction and subcontractor on blacktopping, and the city has exercised options charging \$200 a day damages. It is expected paving will be completed soon.

The city manager said bids will be out soon on 64th St. improvements. All Councilmen were present except James Vande Poel. The invocation was given by the Rev. Earl P. Merz of Peace Lutheran Church. The meeting lasted an hour and 50 minutes.

Van Valkenburg of California for the 1976 reunion in San Diego. He is the son of Capt. Franklin Van Valkenburg, commander of the USS Arizona at the time it was sunk by the Japanese at Pearl Harbor in 1941.

More than 100 are expected at the Holland reunion which is open to all Van Valkenburg descendants, whether or not the name is Van Valkenburg.

A Van Valkenburg genealogy of some 500 pages listing nearly 10,000 members of the family is about ready to go to press.

A young American tourist named Mary Van Valkenburg recently arrived at Valkenburg in The Netherlands at the time a gathering of 1,000 Dutch Van Valkenburgs was held. She reported a most thrilling experience with the Dutch people who immediately accepted her as a member of the family.

The family is named for Valkenburg, a Dutch town not far from Aachen, Germany, which grew up around a fortress and hunting lodge founded by Charlemagne.

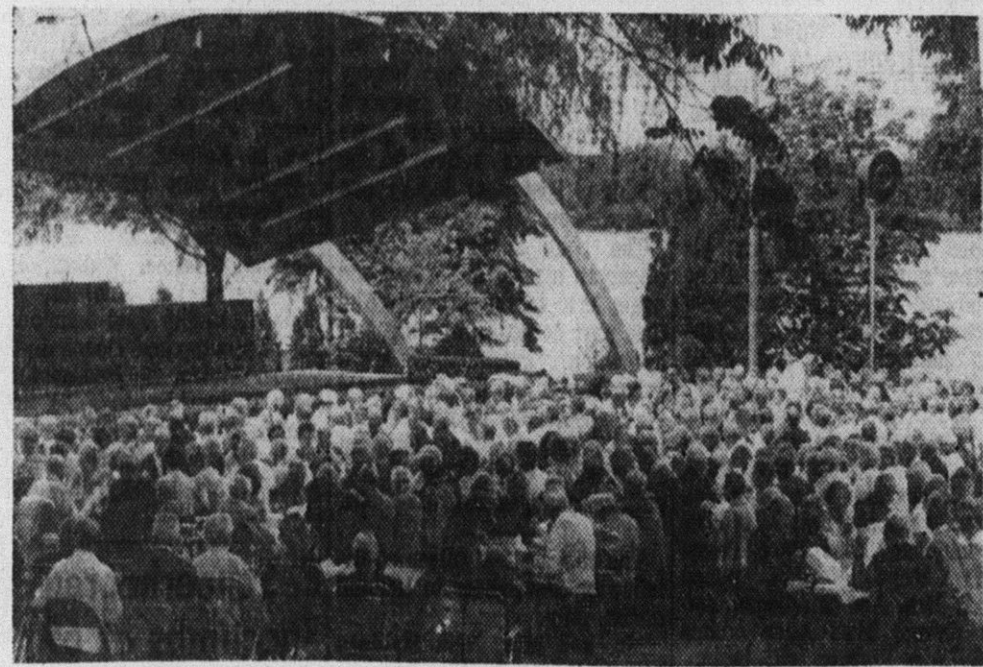
