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# Highway Is Open Prior to Schedule

## New Sewer Ordinance Under Study

A nine-mile stretch of four-lane, divided highway on US-31 between Holland and West Olive opened Monday afternoon as preliminary work began on a new, "semi-cloverleaf" bridge, to be built at the US-31, M-21 intersection.

The new stretch, extending to the Lakewood Blvd. underpass, was opened more than three months ahead of schedule. The contract originally called for completion by mid-November, and it was recently announced the highway would open on Aug. 15.

The job cost close to a million dollars. The old road is now the northbound lane and the new section to the west is the southbound lane. The divided highway now stretches north from Holland all the way to Muskegon.

Full-time work on the new intersection bridge at US-31 and M-21 should begin within three days, according to Ernest Malkewitz, bridge project engineer, of the State Highway Dept., who said workmen are only awaiting word from the State Highway Administrative Board.

The first step, Malkewitz announced, will be the construction of a blacktopped detour road on US-31 around the east side of the intersection. The 1,400 foot detour is scheduled to be completed in about a month.

Traffic on M-21, he said, will be rerouted around the intersection by way of Eighth St. and Waverly Rd.

Malkewitz explained that M-21 will be dropped down about 35 feet at the intersection. The completed bridge will be 188 feet in length, with four spans and a 14-foot clearance.

The entire job is scheduled for completion on Aug. 15, 1959, Malkewitz said. The contract was awarded to Cross and White Construction Co. of Grand Rapids.

In explaining the "semi-cloverleaf" design, Malkewitz said there will be a turning ramp leading off each of the four roads and terminating in a merging traffic lane.

For traffic going east from Holland on M-21 and wishing to go north, drivers will be directed around a circle south and back up to the bridge.

Traffic headed west on M-21 and wishing to make a left turn south will be directed around a circle north and back up to the bridge.

Owen, Ames and Kimball Construction Co. of Grand Rapids is awarded the sub-contract for the structural work, which is scheduled to be completed before winter so that steel workers can work through the winter on the bridge.

A claim for damage to a building at 205 River Ave. entered by Catherine Sermas was referred to the insurance company and city attorney. A personal claim injury entered by Mrs. Richard Solis on behalf of her son was referred to the liability company and the city attorney.

A letter from Hon. Gerald R. Ford, Jr., enclosing a copy of a resolution adopted by the committee to public works authorizing a review study of Holland Harbor was read and placed on file.

Two public hearings on alley and street closings were set for Sept. 17 at 7:30 p.m. One is a request to vacate an alley between 19th and 20th Sts. running from Michigan Ave. to the closed portion. The other involves vacating River Ave. between 27th and 29th Sts. The planning commission recommended that the alley be closed and said the River Ave. issue is of no planning significance. The public hearing on the latter was set up mainly to get the reaction of residents in that area.

A planning commission proposal to extend Holland's master plan into the newly annexed areas at a cost of \$10,000 to be shared by Holland city, 30 per cent; Board of Public Works, 30 per cent; Board of Education, 30 per cent; and Chamber of Commerce, 10 per cent, was discussed. The matter was delayed along with the supplementary budget.

City Clerk Clarence Greengood submitted a notice of delinquent light, power and water bills. These bills were ordered placed on the fall tax roll.

The special safety commission study committee reported it felt it was feasible to create a Traffic and Safety Commission for Holland and the city attorney drafted a proposed ordinance covering formation of such a commission. The ordinance was accepted for first reading and the committee was discharged.

Maplewood and Montello areas were represented by Henry Kleinhekel and Frank Meyer at Wednesday's meeting.

# Schools in Annexation Court Fight

**Local Board Okays  
Legal Counsel for  
Maplewood Litigation**

Although the Holland Board of Education is not involved in annexation litigation facing Holland city, the board Monday night voted to give the full weight of its backing to the city of Holland so that annexation may be fully effective at the earliest possible time.

Specifically, the board passed a resolution authorizing the president and others to employ legal counsel in the case brought by 71 property owners in Maplewood area seeking intervention through Allegan Circuit Court in annexation proceedings.

A bill of complaint and request for a temporary injunction restraining Holland city from exercising any control over the 4 1/2-mile area were filed in Allegan Circuit Court Aug. 1, but since Judge Raymond L. Smith was on vacation no action could be taken, and Maplewood area legally became part of the city on Aug. 3.

The Board of Education was mentioned prominently in the bill of complaint which charged that the city of Holland and other groups conspired among themselves and with the Holland School Board and other unknown organizations to force annexation on certain areas which did not want to annex to the city.

In its resolution, the Board of Education denies any conspiracy; on the contrary, it claims it has persistently over a long period of years sought the best possible solution to a critical school situation for Maplewood and other districts. It pointed out that Maplewood and other sending districts have for a long period been dependent on the Holland Board of Education for facilities of secondary education.

The resolution further points out that the school board had advised and independently announced its policy in conformity to the recommendations of the Citizens Annexation Advisory Committee and had determined that in order to effectively solve the critical secondary school problem in this area that annexation to the municipality precede any annexation to the school district.

The Aug. 1 complaint on behalf of John H. Schurman and others names as defendants the city of Holland, a municipal corporation; William Bouman, clerk of Fillmore township; the Maplewood Area Citizens Committee, Arthur P. Schwartz, chairman, and George Bishop, co-chairman; the Annexation Steering Committee, officers: Clarence Jalving, chairman; Raymond Koolstra, vice chairman; Henry Kleinhekel, secretary, and E.C. Brooks, treasurer. The bill of complaint as prepared by Allegan Atty. Leo W. Hoffman questions the constitutionality of the statute under which the June 3 election was carried out.

In that election, three school districts voted to annex to the city—Apple Ave., Montello Park and Maplewood. A similar election in Federal district failed to carry Apple Ave. and Montello Park became part of the city July 4. Maplewood area annexation became effective Aug. 3.

# Spring Lake Youth Found Hanged, Dead

**GRAND HAVEN (Special)**—A 13-year-old rural Spring Lake boy Monday evening was found dead, hanging from a hanger's noose in a tree back of his home.

The boy, Craig Alden Bradley, of 13727 Cleveland Ave., route 2, was found by his father, Rex, about 6:30 p.m.

State Police, who investigated the case, said a search of his pockets disclosed no notes of any kind and there was no evidence of foul play.

Medical examiner Dr. John Kitchel of Grand Haven said death was accidental and caused by a dislocation of the neck. There was no strangulation, Dr. Kitchel said, and no evidence of a struggle.

Bradley told State Police he had last seen his son about 2 p.m. when he had been painting the barn. When Craig failed to come home for dinner, Bradley said, he went to look for him.

He found his son in a wooded area back of the Bradley home. It is believed the boy had been dead since 3 p.m.

Craig was born in Battle Creek and moved with his parents to the Nunica area from Kalamazoo about six years ago. He was an honor student at Spring Lake Junior High School and played the drums in the band.

He is survived by his parents; a sister, Dawn, 16; two brothers, Brent, 10, and Bryce, 7; and his grandmother, Mrs. Cassie Fosdick of Richland, Mich.

# Northside Area Filing Petitions

**13 Districts Obtain  
Sufficient Signatures  
For Reorganization**

Beechwood Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte and Chester Raak, chairman of the canvassing committee of the Suburban School Planning Committee, went to Grand Haven Monday to file petitions seeking reorganization of 13 school districts north of the city with Jennie M. Kaufman, superintendent of county schools.

These petitions which were circulated in the 13 school districts bear considerably more signatures than the 51 per cent of registered voters as required by law, Van Raalte said. To determine these numbers, township clerks certified to the county superintendent the number of voters in each district.

School districts involved in the reorganization are all located north of Black River. They are Beechwood, Lakewood, Waukazoo, Ventura, Robert, Harlem, Pine Creek, Waverly, North Holland, West Crisp, East Crisp, Noordeloos and West Olive.

Reorganization leaders have requested a vote early in October in which each district will vote on the program which aims to provide a new high school for the 13 districts.

If the vote passes at that time, all individual school boards will be wiped out and the county Board of Education will appoint a five-member board representative of the people in the enlarged district. This board will serve until a special election in January.

Van Raalte said the reorganization program is progressing according to schedule. After the consolidation election, the next step will be to float a bond issue for a new high school.

Meanwhile, plans are nearly complete for a ninth grade program for the 13 districts to be carried on in Beechwood School this fall. A total of 130 ninth graders are expected to register. This ninth grade program is a joint program for the 13 districts.

# Study Traffic Patterns Here

Motorists entering and leaving Holland city limits today found themselves halted by roadblocks set up by the Michigan State Highway Department, whose men are conducting a survey of traffic patterns in the area.

Drivers were handed a card on entering Holland and asked to fill it out and surrender it on leaving Holland. The cards required only three check marks to the questions, "Did you stop in town?", "Is this trip part of your vacation?" and "Were you unduly delayed by survey?"

The 24-man crew endeavored to cover every entrance and exit to the city, with a different-colored card for each roadblock, but there were necessarily a few leaks.

Most of the crew are college students. U of M student Robert Kyes and MSU student Gerry Walsh, working on North River Ave. near old US-31, said they have, during the summer, made their one-day stops at towns throughout Michigan, from the Indiana border to Ironwood, at the western end of the Upper Peninsula.

Walsh said the survey seeks to establish the travel patterns of a community, for the purpose of planning highway improvements in the future.

Holland, with a population of about 20,000 is about the largest size town the crews attempt to work by this method, Walsh said. For larger cities, he said, the crews station themselves along the highways and simply count up the cars, without stopping them.

Some motorists became irritated when stopped for the third or fourth time, the boys said, but it's all part of the job.

# Snake Causes 4-Car Crash

Alarmed by a snake which fell out of a jar, which he was carrying in the front seat of his car and began crawling on him, a Holland motorist Wednesday lost control of his car, causing a four-car accident resulting in estimated damages of \$1,625.

According to Holland and police, James J. Pranke, 31, of 94 East Ninth St., had just made a left turn onto Ninth St. from College Ave. at 2:37 p.m. when the snake made its bid for freedom—or revenge.

In attempting to thrust the snake away from him, police said, Pranke lost control and collided with a parked car belonging to Mrs. Kathryn M. Felker, 40, of 53 East 29th St.

The Felker car jumped ahead to strike a parked car belonging to Robert Rosendahl, 30, of 293 Arthur Ave., and Rosendahl's car moved ahead to hit a parked car belonging to Mrs. Patricia Hinkle, 31, of 17 East 28th St.

Officers ticketed Pranke for careless driving. Damage was estimated by police at \$600 to Pranke's 1953 model car, at \$800 to Mrs. Felker's 1957 model car, at \$200 to Rosendahl's 1953 model car and at \$25 to Mrs. Hinkle's 1956 model car.

# Snake Causes 4-Car Crash

**Scheele Pleads Innocent  
To Negligent Homicide**

**GRAND HAVEN (Special)**—Marinus Scheele, 48, Zeeland, the driver of a car that struck and fatally injured an elderly bicyclist rider Aug. 6, 1957 in Zeeland, today pleaded innocent to a negligent homicide charge when arraigned in Ottawa County circuit court.

Scheele, released on personal recognizance, will stand trial during the October term of Circuit Court for the traffic death of Gerrit Groot, 65, Zeeland.

# Co. D Busy At Grayling

**CAMP GRAYLING (Special)**—Except for a few colds and many aching muscles, the men of Holland's Co. D are in good spirits and health in their first week of field training at Camp Grayling.

The three commercial buses, carrying most of the troops, and the nine-truck convoy arrived without incident and on time at the camp on Saturday, and camp was quickly set up, despite a brief thundershower.

One major improvement this year which is greatly appreciated by the KP's is the new potato peeler, bought with funds donated by the Sergeant's Club. It is reported that the machine can peel 180 pounds of potatoes in three-quarters of an hour, a project which previously took three men much longer.

The men are busy this week with general basic training routines and firing weapons on the range. Men of the 126th Infantry Regiment are scheduled for a parade on Friday and on Saturday, all units will participate in the Division Review before Gov. G. Mennen Williams and assembled dignitaries, friends and families.

On Monday the men will begin their two-day and one-night field exercise in the "boondocks."

# Two Men Injured In Boating Mishap

Two persons were treated at Holland Hospital Wednesday afternoon for injuries received when the 14-foot runabout in which they were riding capsized in Lake Macatawa at 3:30 p.m.

Walter De Vries, 29, of 77 East 31st St., owner and operator of the craft, received cuts on his hand and legs. One of his passengers, Edgar Mosher, 31, of 269 West 28th St., also had a cut on his right hand. Children of the two men, Phil De Vries, 7, and David Mosher, 8, who were also riding in the boat, were not injured.

The Coast Guard reported that the boat apparently hit a large wave and tipped over. The accident occurred west of the Red Cross swimming area. Passengers in a passing boat began helping the four out of the water. They hailed the nearby Coast Guard boat which took the men to Kollen Park. From there, a Holland city police cruiser took them to the hospital.

# Many Sight Rocket Carrier

Many Holland residents reported seeing the rocket carrier of Sputnik III on its three passes over the Holland area Wednesday night. Giving off a pulsating light effect as it tumbled end over end through the heavens, the rocket carrier passed over Holland at 8:11, 9:55 and 11:36 p.m. It was visible for about three or four minutes each time.

Mr. and Mrs. Louis Damstra, Mrs. Ruth Jacobs, Mrs. H. De Young, Harold De Young and Dan Kadwell said they saw the carrier from the back yard of the Kadwell residence, 16 East 19th St., when it passed over Holland about 9:55 p.m.

The Rev. and Mrs. Paul Rowgo, Milton Lower and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Konze reported they saw Sputnik's carrier about 9:55 from the Rowgo home at 283 West 30th St. Marla Schreier, 7, of 73 West 30th St. also said she saw the rocket as it passed over the city. The Leonard Mulder family reported seeing the rocket at 9:55 and again at the later hour. They live at 358 Arthur Ave.

# Unusual Objects Spotted Over City

A bright light in the sky was reported seen Monday night by Robert Jaehning and his son Frank and Calvin Lamoreaux at the Jaehning home at 333 West 17th St. and at the same time the same object was seen by Calvin's mother, Mrs. Claude Lamoreaux, at 173 South Division.

The group reported the object was seen for about two minutes and it moved from the southeast into the north. They thought it might be the Sputnik.

Unidentified flying objects were also reported near Muskegon, alternately flashing red and green lights. The Muskegon Coast Guard station reported one of the objects, at a high altitude, moved east from Muskegon shortly before midnight.

Personnel at the U.S. Weather Bureau in Muskegon said the objects moved too slowly for a plane, but may have been a balloon. The objects didn't register on the radar screen of the bureau's tornado tracking radar set, but men manning the station reported spotting one of the objects hovering over the area for 2 1/2 hours.

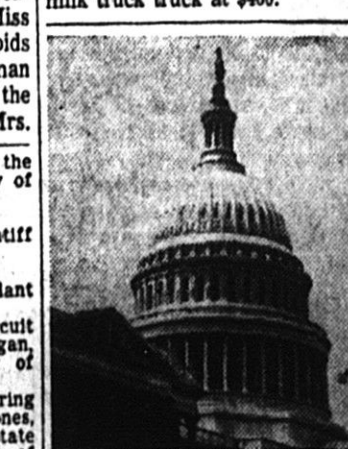

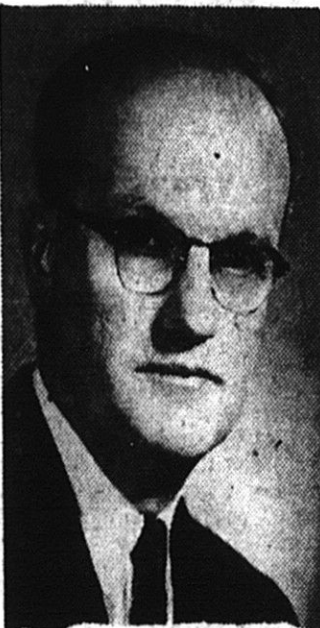

The body reposes at the Kinke-ma Funeral Home where services will be held at 3:30 p.m. Monday.

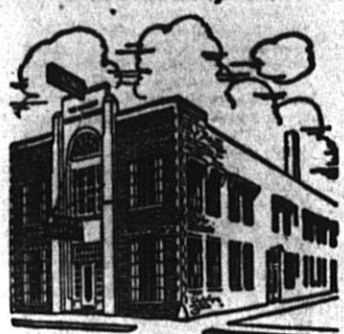

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ADLAI STEVENSON  
LOOKS AT RUSSIA

The Russian statesmen he talked  
with in Moscow are sure they  
are right and that all the rest of  
the world, especially the U. S.,  
is wrong. Adlai Stevenson reported  
in a broadcast. Their attitude  
is that it is the duty of the American  
opposition party, of which he  
is the nominal head, to set America  
right.

In the Soviet vocabulary, that  
means that it is the duty of the  
opposition party in American to  
convert America into a communist  
state.

There was a time when Adlai  
Stevenson was highly critical of the  
administration because it did not  
meet the Russians boldly and openly  
in international debate. Now that  
he has had a first-hand look at  
Russian officialdom, he appears to  
be less sanguine about the results  
of such a policy.

The whole history of Russian -  
Western relations ever since the  
second World War makes the fact  
painfully clear that there is no  
basis of compromise, from the  
Russian angle. Their demand has  
always been, and is today, that  
the West shall adopt the Russian  
ideology. A flat and permanent veto  
is all that the West can oppose to  
such an attitude, and that means  
that the free world will have to  
be reconciled to many, many  
years of armament building to de-  
fend its freedom.

The demand of Moscow official-  
dom that Stevenson and his op-  
position party "correct" the "mis-  
taken" ideology of the administra-  
tion is characteristic. It means that  
the Soviet statesmen are demand-  
ing that America abandon the two-  
party system and change over to a  
single party such as all Commu-  
nist countries must of necessity  
have.

Moscow can't so much as un-  
derstand that there can be an op-  
position party in America. To Moscow  
an opposition means that the party  
in power is fatally in the wrong  
and should be suppressed. It is  
the duty of the opposition party  
to suppress the criminal party in  
power and, if necessary, "liqui-  
date" its leaders or at the very  
least drive them into exile, the  
way Marshal Zuhof and Mr.  
Molotov were treated in Russia. It  
is beyond comprehension that two  
parties can be partly right and  
partly wrong, that an election can  
be a choice between probabilities.

There you are. Adlai Stevenson  
has at least had an eyeful. He is  
a good American, and it may be  
expected that in future he will be  
less certain that there is a basis  
of discussion between Russia and  
the Western world.

Sunday School  
Lesson

Justice to Minorities  
Leviticus 19:33-34;  
Deuteronomy 24:14-15;  
Matthew 9:9-13; Galatians 3:28  
By C.P. Dame

We are living in a time of many  
problems. There are old problems  
to consider and there are some,  
a few, that are new. This lesson  
treats of an old problem which is  
receiving much attention in these  
times. We ought to be grateful that  
this problem is not slighted to-  
day.

I. The rights of minorities should  
be faced. God told the Jews that  
they should not vex the stranger in  
the land, but they should treat  
him "as one born among them  
and love him as they loved them-  
selves." After giving the order the  
reason was given—"for ye were  
strangers in the land of Egypt:  
I am the Lord your God."

The stranger in the land faced  
special problems and therefore he  
should be given special considera-  
tion. The stranger in Israel be-  
longed to a minority group. Those  
in power often exploit the help-  
less. God forbade Israel to oppress a  
hired servant whether he was a  
native or a stranger. Every em-  
ployer was commanded to give the  
hired servant his pay at the close  
of the day for he needed it. To  
refuse to give his pay to him was  
a sin.

There are many minority groups  
in our land. Some years ago many  
immigrants from Europe came  
here. Some of them were exploit-  
ed by the industrialists of that  
time. The descendants of these  
immigrants today are occupying  
places in every sphere of Ameri-  
can life. Most people in the nation  
are of immigrant stock. Today  
other groups belong to the minor-  
ities. In our time most minority  
groups do not hesitate to make  
demands—many are vocal. Some-  
times they try to take away some  
of the rights and privileges the  
majority has enjoyed for a long  
time.

Both the minority groups and the  
majority groups have their rights  
and neither should try to exploit  
the other but rather seek each  
other's good. In the past industrial-  
ists misused their power—today  
some labor unions think only of  
themselves. It is so easy to misuse  
power. Individuals and groups  
sometimes seek only their own  
rather than the welfare of all.

II. Jesus always showed con-  
cern for the neglected and out-  
casts. The religious leaders in the  
days of Jesus looked with con-  
tempt upon the publicans and sin-  
ners. Jesus called Matthew the  
publican to become his follower.  
Matthew had given up his social  
and religious standing in the com-  
munity in order to serve as a  
publican. It was his love for money  
which prompted him to do this.  
When Jesus called him he took  
another bold step which demand-  
ed sacrifice—he heeded the call of  
Jesus and followed him, leaving  
a good position and giving up a  
good income. His money failed to  
give him the things which he looked  
for.

So pleased was Matthew with his  
new life that he gave a banquet  
and invited Jesus and all his for-  
mer associates to this festive  
event. The Pharisees who did not  
like Jesus nor the publicans and  
sinners asked the disciples of  
Jesus, "Why eateth your Master  
with publicans and sinners?"  
Jesus saw to it that his critics  
heard the truth that those who are  
whole need no physician but they  
that are sick do. The concern that  
Jesus showed his disciples should  
be revealed in these times.

III. Jesus is the answer to the  
problem of the minorities. In  
Christ the distinctions which sepa-  
rate people are removed. In Christ  
there is neither Jew nor Greek  
—he removes the barrier of race;  
in Christ there is neither bond nor  
free; he removes the barrier of  
social standing; sex separates too  
but in Christ there is neither male  
nor female. Christ unified races,  
peoples, classes and all manner of  
peoples and moulds them into one  
family.

## Lake Michigan Level Still Low

Lake Michigan with an average July level of 579.02 feet remained nearly stable during the month as Lake Superior continued its seasonal rise at greater than average rate from June to July and Lake Erie continued to rise. Lake Ontario continued its seasonal decline at slightly above average rate.

Lake Michigan was .87 foot lower than during the same month last year and more than two feet below the average July level of 581.11 feet for the entire level.

Extreme low was 577.98 feet in 1934 and extreme high was 583.60 feet in 1876. The lake was only .52 foot above low water datum, the plane to which lake survey chart and federal navigation improvement depths are referred.

Lake Michigan rose .10 foot from June to July, compared with an average rise of .13 foot for the entire period. The change in level from July to August is .06 foot for the entire period. Probable August level will be 578.9 feet.

## Revoked License Count Brings Fine, 10 Days

**GRAND HAVEN (Special)** — Alvin Leslie Chapman, 54, Flint, pleaded guilty before Justice Lawrence DeWitt Friday afternoon to a charge of driving while his license was revoked, and was sentenced to pay \$25 fine, \$4.90 costs and serve 10 days in jail. If the fine and costs are not paid he will be required to serve an additional five days. Chapman's license was revoked in 1955 following a drunk driving conviction.

Chapman also promised the court that his nephew would come to Grand Haven after his car, take it back to Flint, where he would turn over the license plates to the State Police at Flint, where it would stay until the car was either sold or the owner would furnish financial responsibility.

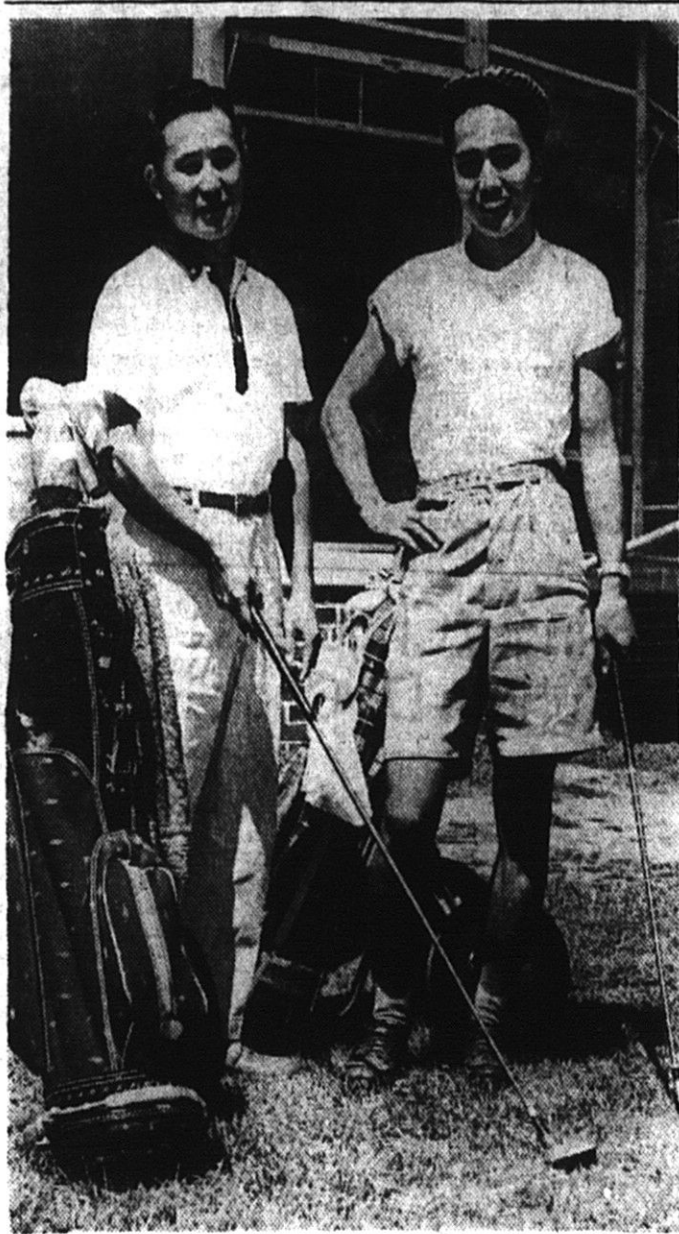

## New Budget Is Tabled By Council

City Council tabled the proposed supplemental budget until next meeting following a prolonged discussion at a regular meeting Wednesday night.

It was the date for a public hearing on the budget. No objections were voiced by citizens and none had been filed with the clerk's office. Councilman Henry Steffens moved that the budget be returned to the city manager for study. This motion was seconded by Raymond Holwerda, but lost 4 to 3 with Holwerda, Steffens and Nelson Bosman dissenting.

Then Ernest Phillips moved that the budget be adopted as presented, allowing for one change, reducing a \$5,000 item for the planning commission to \$3,000. This amendment carried, but during the discussion, Holwerda again protested that the budget was out of balance.

The budget, drawn up after conferences with all city boards and departments, called for an outlay of approximately \$102,000 to provide services in the newly annexed areas for the remainder of the fiscal year. Because no tax revenues will be available for some nine months and since contingencies did not provide the necessary funds, City Manager Herb Holt had proposed borrowing some funds from a capital outlay fund until adjustments in the new budget. It was this procedure that Holwerda and Steffens objected to.

Mayor Robert Visscher said he was perturbed when he first looked at the supplemental budget, but after studying it he could not see how it could be reduced to any appreciable degree. He came to the conclusion that it actually was a modest budget.

Holwerda was inclined to turn the whole matter of balancing the budget to the city manager and criticized Holt's staff as being too heavy with administrative personnel. He felt that the manager could do a bit of paring without reducing services.

The final vote was 4 to 3 in favor of the budget, but City Attorney James E. Townsend ruled that an affirmative vote of five members is necessary for such proceedings according to city charter. Then Council voted unanimously to table the budget until the next meeting Aug. 20. Councilmen Robert J. Kouw and John Van Eerden who were absent Wednesday night are expected to be present for the next meeting.

In other business, Council adopted an amendment governing policies on water main extension and assessment procedures. This amendment had been presented July 16 but was tabled at that time for further study. It provides for extending water mains across some sections where services are not used by abutting property owners.

Council considered requests for laying two water mains, one in Pine Ave. from 32nd St. to 40th St. branching both ways on 38th St., and the other on 24th St. east of Lincoln, requested by Michigan Bell Telephone Co., Bernard Meiste and Richard W. Smith. Both were referred to the city manager for report.

The city manager reported on three other water main projects, quoting figures on a water main on 12th Ave. near 16th St., one in Third St. from River Ave. west 153 feet to Pine Ave., and one in Thomas St. between Crescent Dr. and South Shore Dr. Public hearings were scheduled Sept. 3 in all three cases.

The city manager reported that the 1958 paving program was completed and Council approved final payment of \$5,496.31.

Council okayed bids for the winter supply of rock salt with the International Salt Co., bulk shipments at \$14.70 per ton with a minimum of 27 tons, and \$1.08 per 100-pound bag or \$21.60 per ton. A second bid was identical and representatives of both firms appeared. Council voted to remain with the firm with which it has done business for some years.

Also given an okay was a bid by the Solvay Process Division of Allied Chemical Corp. for the winter supply of flake calcium chloride at \$31 per ton. It was one of four identical bids.

On recommendation of the city manager, Council okayed parking restrictions on the north side of 16th St. between River and Pine Aves. but provided that restrictions were to be effective only during school hours. The block will be turned over for bus loading.

Two pickup trucks for the street and park departments and a two-ton dump truck for the park department have been purchased from R. E. Barber at a cost of \$2,862 for the pickups and \$3,196.99 for the dump truck. Council had been previously notified by telephone and the report was now given in the information.

Also approved were bids for two reversible underbody scrapers from the Root Spring Scraper Co. at a cost of \$3,059.56 and one cap from the same company at a cost of \$1,823.78.

Three contracts were okayed for the Fairbanks Park shelter. Contract for general construction goes to Harold Langejans at a net figure of \$7,994; plumbing, heating and ventilating to Southwood Plumbing and Heating at net bid of \$3,251; electrical trades contract to Parkway Electric Co. for \$350. A fourth contract on special wall finish and painting was not let. School Build-

ing Consultant Arthur Read explained details of contracts. All Councilmen were present except Kouw and Van Eerden. The meeting adjourned at 9:10 p.m.

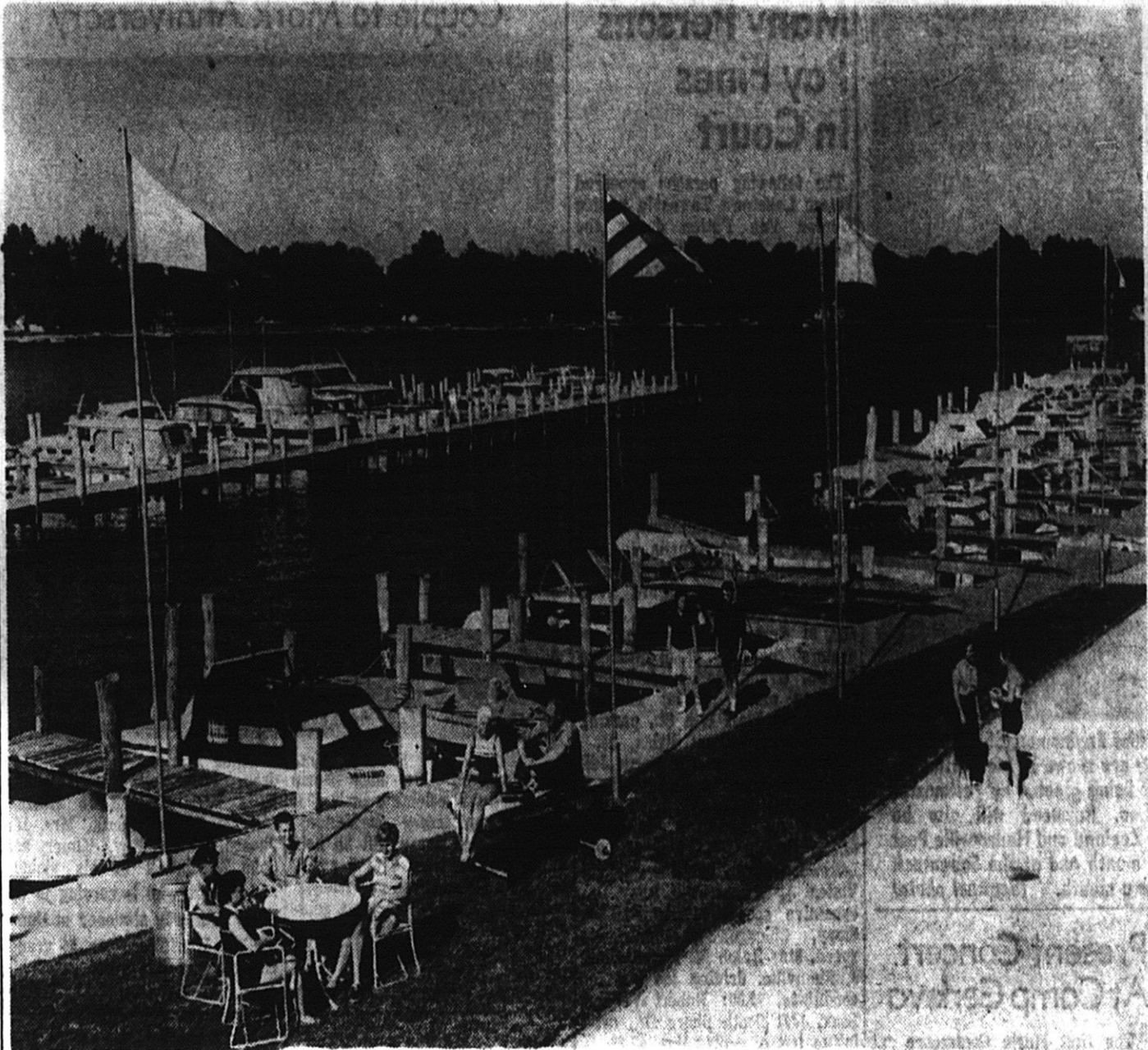

## Two Prison Terms for Sebastia

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — John Sebastia, Jr., who was returned to Holland from Santa Barbara, Calif., early in July, was sentenced to prison on two counts when he appeared in Circuit Court for disposition today.

On a charge of embezzlement, he was sentenced to serve one to two years at Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson, and on a charge of nighttime breaking and entering, he was sentenced to serve two to 15 years. Sentences will run concurrently. Judge Raymond L. Smith made no recommendation.

Sebastia pleaded guilty July 8 to the embezzlement charge and on July 22 pleaded guilty to nighttime breaking and entering after the court had appointed an attorney to represent him on the latter count. The embezzlement charge involved furniture valued at more than \$300 from a Holland furniture firm, and the breaking and entering charge involved a break-in at Brewer's City Coal Dock last March 28. Two companions in the latter job are currently serving prison terms.

Lloyd Jacobusse, 17, of 50 East 15th St., Holland, who pleaded guilty April 14 to a charge of soliciting to commit an act of gross indecency, was placed on probation for three years. The judge imposed no costs or supervision fees since all such funds would be needed for psychiatric care which is to continue until the psychiatrist informs the court that treatment is no longer necessary. Three court-appointed psychiatrists examined the youth and ruled he was not a criminal sexual psychopathic person. Treatment was recommended.

Mrs. Velma Beckett, 36, route 3, Rockford, who pleaded guilty July 22 to a negligent homicide charge, was put on probation 18 months. Conditions are that she pay \$100 costs, refrain from drinking, remain in the state and surrender her operator's license. Mrs. Beckett was the driver of a pickup truck involved in an accident in Crocker township May 7 resulting in the death of Mrs. Lillian Krause, a passenger in another car. Mrs. Beckett appeared in court today on crutches.

Vincent James Hardy, 17, of 286 1/2 West 14th St., who pleaded guilty July 22 to nighttime breaking and entering, was put on probation for 18 months and ordered to pay \$100 costs. He has made restitution in the case involving breaking into the B and G Drive-In July 15 in Holland.

## Barn, Chicken Coop Destroyed by Fire

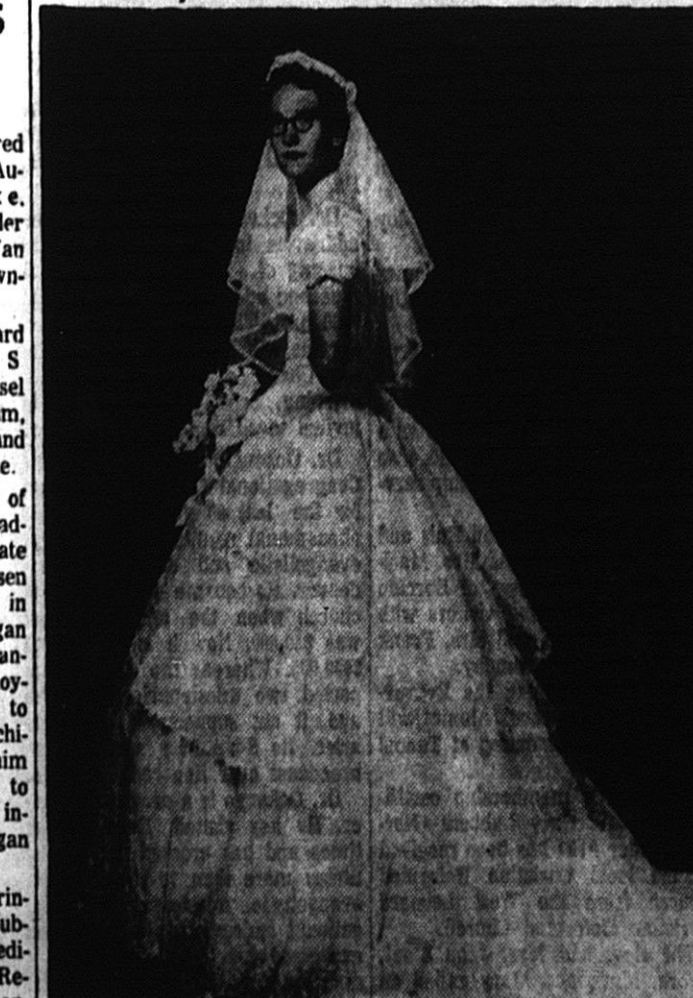

Dr. Ockenga, pastor of the Park Congregational Church in Boston for the last 20 years, has seen phenomenal results in missionary, evangelistic and educational endeavor. He became pastor of the church when the annual budget was \$20,000. Now it is more than \$450,000. Whereas the church supported two missionaries 19 years ago, it now supports 125 missionaries. Its Sunday services are broadcast over five radio stations.

Dr. Ockenga is a constant traveler. He has visited Europe nine times and has crossed the United States more than 70 times in his evangelistic, missionary and educational endeavors. He has often expressed his conviction that a man must maintain a strong local ministry and work if he is to earn a right to speak on Biblical and ecclesiastical subjects in the various institutions and organizations advancing the cause of Christ.

## Building Activity Boosted

## Two New Buildings Push Permits Over Quarter Million Mark

Two commercial and industrial permits for new buildings in Holland during July helped boost building permits in the city over the quarter-million dollar mark, according to Building Inspector William Layman.

One permit for a new building for Rooks Transfer accounted for \$110,000 and another permit called for a \$70,000 addition to Northern Fiore Products Co. These two permits accounted for \$180,000 of the \$296,841 total for the month, representing 48 permits.

In addition, permits were issued for six new houses, \$88,097; 12 garages or carports, \$10,706; 22 alterations to housekeeping units, \$10,038; eight alterations to other buildings, \$8,800. There also were four permits for demolition of houses and six for demolition of garages.

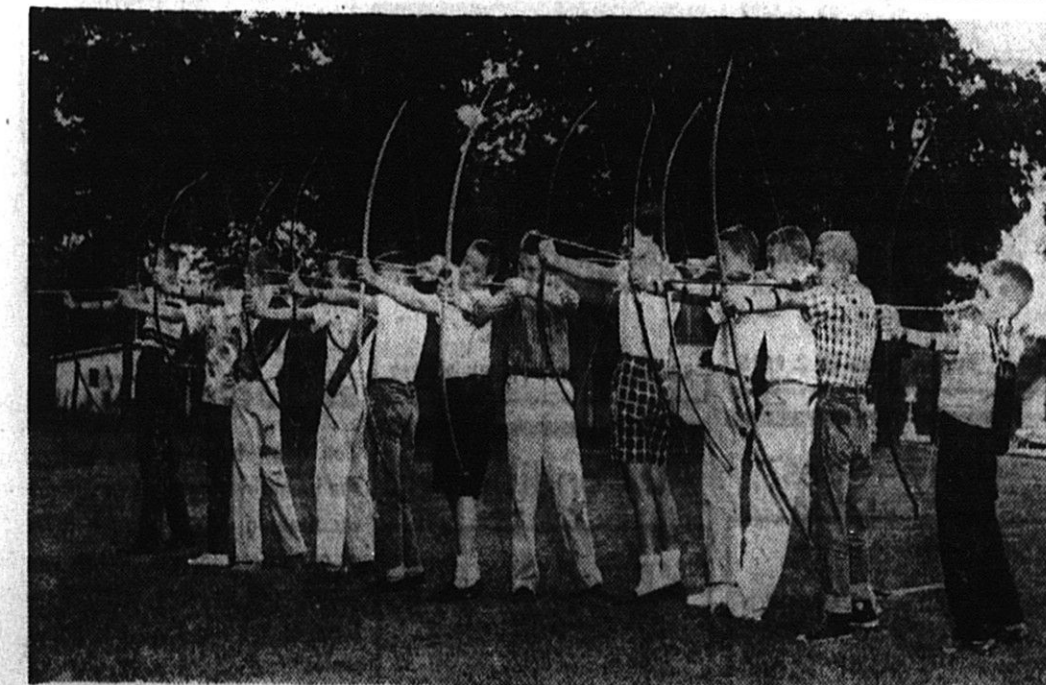

## HHS Groups To Present Big Musical

The Board of Education Monday night approved plans for the school music department to present the musical "Oklahoma," as a joint project of the orchestra and choir members during the first semester of the 1958 year.

In view of high expenses and royalty rights in producing such a musical the board pointed out that careful plans must be laid early for a vigorous ticket sales campaign. Royalty rights including vocal scores will run to nearly \$750 and rental of costumes, sets and Civic Center may amount to another \$400.

Arthur C. Hills of the instrumental department and Larrie Clark of the vocal department considered this American musical play after the school's experience two years ago in presenting the Gilbert and Sullivan H. M. S. Pinafore. Generally, the board felt that it is more difficult to call public attention to school orchestras than to school bands, and a musical of this type is a great challenge to young musicians.

The board also approved plans for a short summary of each board meeting to be broadcast over WHTC. Initial plans call for Vern Schipper of the adult education department to interview two board members on business conducted at the meeting. If meetings are adjourned by 10 p.m., the interview will take place that night. If meetings last longer, the taped interview will be broadcast on Tuesday evening about 7 p.m.

On recommendation of the schools committee, three new German textbooks, one on physical science, one on general biology and five on physiology were approved. One of the German textbooks is published by the U. S. Army for use in schools, another is published in Munich and the third in Berlin.

Work is being continued on a written statement of policies for the school board. On recommendation of the superintendent four years ago, several chapters were prepared on educational philosophy, organizational structures, administrative and teaching services. A committee to be known as the School Board Policy Committee will begin work in September.

The committee announced that the 1959 commencement activities will start with baccalaureate Sunday afternoon, May 31, at 4 p.m. in Civic Center. There also will be an honors convocation and commencement will be Thursday, June 4, at 8 p.m. in Civic Center. No speakers have been selected.

The buildings and grounds committee reported that bids have been accepted on the two houses and garages at 120 and 128 West 11th St. The building consultant is preparing specifications for fencing at Thomas Jefferson School. Plans also are under consideration for a six-foot sidewalk on the west side of Maple Ave. between 22nd and 24th Sts.

The consultant also has informed the committee that trees on five elementary playgrounds are likely to die as a result of encircling them with an unnatural playground surface. To remedy this, it is recommended that a concrete curb or retaining wall be built approximately eight feet encircling the tree, cleaning out to a depth of 12 to 18 inches to be filled with stone or top soil and covered with myrtle. At a cost of an estimated \$60 per tree, an experimental program will be conducted on four trees on Lincoln playground this fall.

Mayor Robert Visser and Wilard C. Wichers, chairman of the Holland Planning Commission, explained plans for a new development plan for the enlarged city of

Holland. Estimated cost would be \$10,000 and proposals called for the City Council to pay \$3,000, the Board of Public Works \$3,000, the School Board \$3,000 and the Chamber of Commerce, \$1,000.

After considerable discussion, the board referred the request to the finance committee with power to act. There was a strong feeling committing the board to support the program, yet giving careful consideration to budgetary matters.

A question on accepting students in the ninth grade from areas within present school districts but just outside the areas recently annexed to the city was referred to the schools committee for clarification. It was generally felt that the few students involved should be accepted, but resolutions should protect such instances as accepting students from seemingly sparse areas which conceivably could be developed into residential areas posing a problem for greater numbers.

A request from the TOPS (Take Off Pounds Sensibly) club asking for meeting place in the school was referred to the adult education director.

## Bound Over To High Court

Culver, arrested July 10 for stealing a wheel and tire from a house trailer owned by Floyd Gordon, Allegan Township, was released from Allegan County jail July 14 on \$250 bond.

The preliminary exam, scheduled for Monday, of Grant Howard, 30, Route 1, Allegan, charged with negligent homicide, was canceled indefinitely. Howard is now in University Hospital, Ann Arbor, due to a previous illness. Howard was involved in an accident July 4 in which Ed Vandenberg, 5105 Meridian Road, Jackson, was killed.

Vandenberg was pronounced dead on arrival at the Allegan Health Center after his car was struck at the corner of M-89 and 24th Street by Howard, who had passed a car driven by Arthur Covalt, Otsego. ## Six New Teachers Hired Here

Dr. Ellert to Teach German in Seventh, Eighth, Ninth Grades

Contracts for six new teachers for the public school system were authorized at the monthly meeting of the Holland Board of Education in E. E. Fell Junior High School Monday night.

Mrs. Trina Kuyten of Paterson, N. J., a graduate of Calvin College in Grand Rapids will teach later elementary grade. Her husband will be attending Western Theological Seminary. Mrs. Kuyten has had four years' teaching experience.

Miss Marilyn Lou Poll of Grand Rapids, who received an A. B. degree from Calvin College in 1957, will teach early elementary grades. She has had a year's teaching experience.

Mrs. Doris Muller of Holland, who has had many years' experience with the local school system, will teach English in Holland High School. She holds degrees from Hope College and Northwestern University.

Mrs. Norma Longstreet of Holland, a graduate of Western Michigan University, will teach home economics in Junior High School for two hours daily. She is married and has four children. She has had one year's teaching experience.

Dr. Ernest Ellert of Holland, who was instrumental in introducing German classes into the elementary schools some years ago, will devote half time to teaching German in the seventh, eighth and ninth grades. Salary for his half-time efforts will be payable to Hope College where he is professor of German.

Mrs. Mary Ann Ridenour of South Zanesville, Ohio, will teach early elementary classes. She is married and has three children. She received a B. S. degree from Olivet Nazarene College in 1950.

The teachers' committee informed the board that the Teachers' handbook should be brought up to date. A committee to be known as the Personnel Policies committee will begin work as soon as school gets under way in September.

Supt. Walter W. Scott announced that the pre-school faculty conference this year will consist of one day only on Tuesday, Sept. 2, with sessions in the morning, afternoon and evening. Wednesday, Thursday and Friday in Holland High School will be given over to registration, short class periods and tests. Eugene Scholten, school psychologist, and High School Principal Jay W. Fornasma explained the local program of psychological - educational testing which has become an integral part of the education process of the Holland Public Schools. Supt. Scott also spoke briefly on new tests and emphasized that tests have their limitations... they point out the strengths and the weaknesses but do not give learning.

The board granted release from contracts for three teachers, Mrs. Alice Trumm and Florence Hilbrand who have been offered educational opportunities elsewhere and Mrs. Louise Krum who is moving to Kalamazoo.

Supt. Scott reported that a start will be made in the Holland Youth Development Project while a foundation grant is being sought. The first faculty workshop of the year will be held Saturday, Sept. 6, at 9 a.m. in Thomas Jefferson School.

The finance committee was authorized to transfer certain funds to make money available for debt retirement in the 1953 school bonds which become callable Sept. 1. The net result of calling these

bonds means that of the \$900,000 there will be \$470,000 paid off on Sept. 1, only five years after the election authorizing the issue.

The superintendent is working with the schools committee on an insurance program to cover football players as well as every pupil. Comparisons are being made between several policies for the every-pupil coverage which will be available at about \$1.50 to \$2 per pupil.

President Bernard Arendshorst presided at the session that lasted just over three hours. James Hallan gave the invocation. All members were present except Harry Frissel.
