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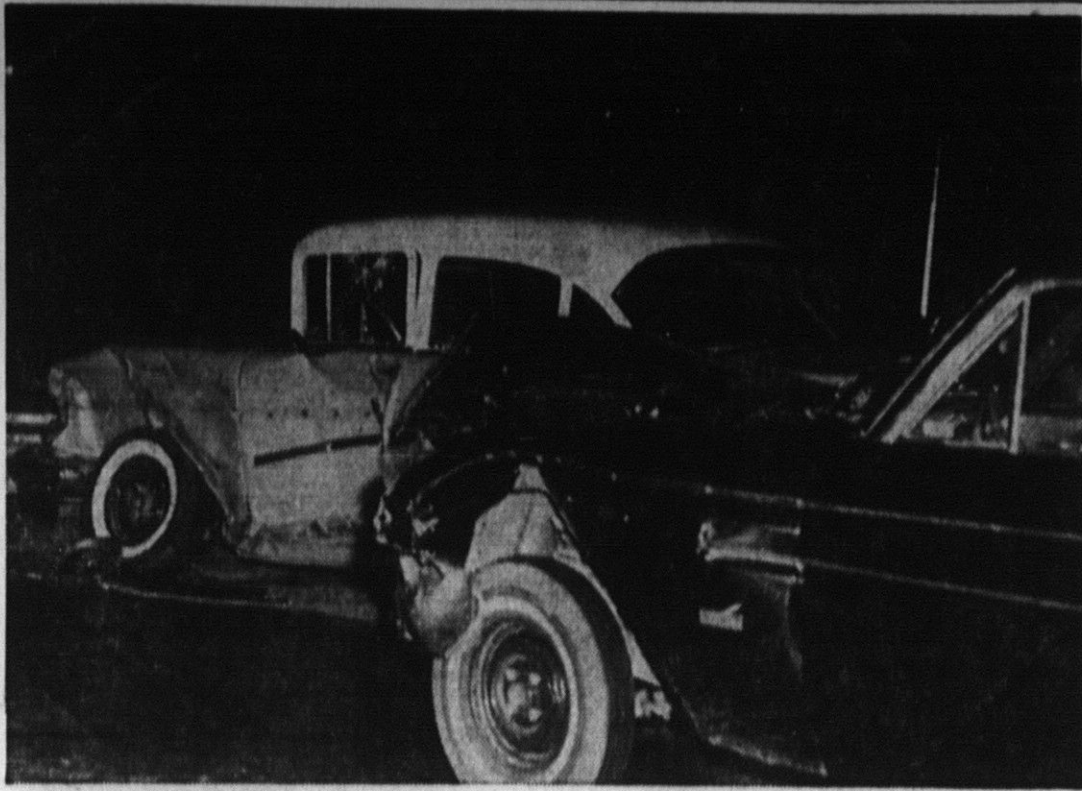

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FACIAL LACERATIONS — Allan John De Witt, 18, Cornelia, Ga., driver of the dark colored car, received severe facial lacerations when his car crashed broadside into another on M-21 at Eighth St. at 12:28 a.m. today. Frost Causes Heavy Damage

The earliest damaging frost in 35 years ravaged large parts of Ottawa County's corn and pickle crops Sunday night, and county agricultural agents were busy today trying to determine the amount of damage.

Officials said that 90 per cent of the pickle crop in the area of Quincy, New Holland and Van Buren Sts., near US-31 north of Holland, was destroyed by the sudden cold snap.

Corn in this area appeared to have survived the frost, but officials said as well as pickles had frozen in parts of Blendon Township near Borculo.

These areas are suppliers of pickles for the H.J. Heinz Co. of Holland and the Glaser-Crandell Co. of Grand Haven. Glaser-Crandell said some 150 acres of pickles had been destroyed in its contract area.

The Swanson Pickle Co. of Muskegon claimed it had lost about 250 acres of pickles in its northern Ottawa County and southern Muskegon County contract area.

The areas affected by the frost were dry, low-lying areas. Agricultural Extension Agent Richard Machiele said the crops had been destroyed by a combination of cold and dryness. Pickles that had been irrigated survived the cold, Machiele said.

According to Machiele, this summer's drought has caused considerably more damage from an economic standpoint than Sunday's frost. He said that corn in lighter soils in the county has been practically ruined by heat and drought. Today's rain has come in time to save corn on heavier soils, however, he said.

The Sunday cold snap which brought the damaging frost caused the mercury to dip to 36 degrees in Holland.

Machiele said the last time a frost had caused widespread damage on the same date in Ottawa County had been 35 years ago.

The body reposes at the Dykstra Chapel in Saugatuck where relatives and friends may meet the family Friday evening from 7 to 9. The Rosary will be recited at 8 p.m. Friday.

Five More Teachers Are Hired

Contracts for five more teachers for Holland public schools were approved by the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night in the high school library.

Florence Schwenk of Jackson who has had 28 years of teaching experience will teach second grade in Lincoln School. She received a B.S. degree from Western Michigan University in 1947 and an M.A. degree from the University of Michigan in 1954.

Donna Locke of Lansing, who attended St. Francis Xavier High School and Aquinas College, receiving an A.B. degree in 1948, will teach French and English in senior high school. She has had five years of teaching experience.

Gary R. Engelgau of Ann Arbor who received an A.B. degree in 1959 and an M.A. degree this year, both from the University of Michigan, will be a counselor in the senior high school. After his A.B. degree, he joined the U.S. Air Force and the next year he accepted a position in the personnel office of the Stauffer Corp. in Chicago. Since receiving further education, he spent a year and a half in the admissions office of the University of Michigan. He is married.

Paul D. Berta of Highland, Ind., who received a B.S. degree from Culver-Stout College in 1962, will teach elementary physical education. This position previously had been offered to Robert Van Dyke, formerly of Holland, who declined since no teaching position was available locally for his wife. Berta has an interest in coaching baseball and also is interested in football. He is married.

Lois Schoon Gaiowski of 1086 West 27th St., will work as a second speech therapist in the local school system and her services also will be made available to other schools. She is a graduate of Holland High School, attended Stephens College and received an A.B. degree from Colorado College in 1950. She has had three years of teaching experience, working as a speech and hearing consultant for the Iowa State Department of Public Instruction, and is not certified in Michigan. Her salary is reimbursed through the County Intermediate School district.

\$2,000 Cash, Checks Taken In Breakin

GRAND HAVEN — City police are investigating a break-in at Plumb's branch market at 1101 Beacon Blvd. where culprits chiseled a 24 by 24 inch hole on the south side, cracked the safe and escaped with about \$2,000 in cash and about \$900 in checks. The loss was discovered at 7:25 a.m. today.

Police Chief Richard Klempel believes it to be a professional job with at least three individuals involved.

He pointed to similarities in another Plumb's break-in in 1959 when the building was entered through the roof.

In the latest break-in, an acetylene torch was used to cut the door off the safe which is located in the front part of the store but obscured by large display signs in the window. Two inner compartments were opened, one by poundin' g and another by torch.

A tin tray was taken from the meat cooler for the hot cylinder from the inner part of the safe removed by torch. The back door of the store remained padlocked and it is believed the thieves escaped through the entrance route. Footprints may be of some assistance in the investigation.

City Has Collected 66 Per Cent of Taxes

A total of \$161,851.32 in city and school taxes was collected Wednesday at the treasurer's office for the biggest day of collections since tax bills were mailed in July.

City Treasurer Jack Leenhouts said this brings the total amount collected to \$1,518,092.96, about 66 per cent of the total assessment of \$2,310,165.02.

Leenhouts reminds taxpayers that there are just two days left before the two per cent penalty is added to the bills. The treasurer's offices will be open Saturday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. for the convenience of the taxpayers.

County Sets TB, Diabetes Test Clinics

Residents of Ottawa County who are 30 years of age and over will be offered x-ray and blood tests at a series of clinics to be held at various centers beginning Sept. 9 through Oct. 9.

The tests take only a few minutes to perform and are successful in discovering unsuspected cases of tuberculosis. The blood test will detect diabetes. However, Dr. Ralph Ten Haven, Ottawa County Health Director emphasized that the tests are no substitute for a physical examination in a doctor's office.

The clinics are conducted by the Ottawa County Health Department in cooperation with the Ottawa County Medical Society, Michigan Department of Health, Michigan Diabetes Association and pharmacists of Ottawa County.

The clinic in Holland will be held in the Civic Center beginning Sept. 9, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 to 6 p.m.; Sept. 10, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 to 6 p.m.; Sept. 11, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 to 4 p.m.

It will also be held in Holland Sept. 14 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 to 6 p.m.; Sept. 15, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 to 6 p.m.; Sept. 16, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 to 6 p.m.; Sept. 17, 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 4 to 8 p.m. and Sept. 18, 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 4 to 6 p.m.

The clinic in Zeeland will be set up in the City Hall and will operate Sept. 21 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 to 5 p.m.; Sept. 22, 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 4 to 8 p.m. and Sept. 23, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and 3 to 7 p.m.

West Olive Post Office Bids Sought

WEST OLIVE—The Post Office department is seeking competitive bids to build and lease a new post office at West Olive, according to Postmaster General John A. Gronowski who explained that the purpose of competitive bidding is to encourage the most attractive and economical offer to the government in line with President Johnson's economy program.

The successful bidder will construct the building according to departmental specifications and lease it to the Post Office department for a basic period of five years, with options to renew the lease for an additional 10 years.

The department's capital investment will be limited substantially to postal equipment. The building will remain under private ownership with the owner paying local real estate taxes.

Cable Hurls Onlookers Through Air

Terry Wierenga, 12, Maynard Vander Wal Die in Freak Mishap

JENISON — A 58-year old man and a 12-year old boy were killed Tuesday when they were struck by a whiplashing cable and thrown 40 feet through the air at a Jenison residence.

Terry Wierenga, 12-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Wieringa, of Jenison, was killed instantly by the cable. Maynard Vander Wal, 58, also of Jenison, died enroute to St. Mary's Hospital in Grand Rapids.

Ottawa County sheriff's deputies said Vander Wal and the boy were watching workmen pull down a tree stump at the rear of the home of Dr. Norman Keller at 368 Baldwin Dr. when a previously slackened cable, one of two connected to the stump, suddenly sprang taut and broke, flinging the man and boy into the air as it whipped into them.

The force of the flying cable severed Vander Wal's left leg at the hip.

Workmen said the 40-foot tall, four-foot thick tree stump could not be pulled down by one cable hooked in tandem to two bulldozers. A second cable was then hooked to the tree from a winch-truck.

When the tree-stump had been pulled about half way to the ground, the second cable from the winch-truck was allowed to go slack and the bulldozer-winch continued to pull the stump nearly to the ground.

When the tree was only a few feet from the ground, a halt in operations was apparently called. Deputies said it was then the brake on the bulldozer-winch slipped.

The tree, no longer held by tension from the bulldozer-winch, sprang almost upright. The force of the tree stump's upward surge almost instantly tightened the previously slack winch-truck cable, which then snapped, whipping through the air into the two by-standers. The two apparently did not hear a frantic warning by workmen.

Besides his parents, Terry Wieringa is survived by a sister, Mrs. Henry (Judy) Vanden Schuur, of Jenison, and a brother, Allen Wieringa, at home. Vander Wal is survived by a son, Henry Vander Wal, of Hudsonville, and three daughters, Mrs. Donald (Lois) Van Dyke, of Bauer, Mrs. Jack Dood, of Jenison, and Ardith Vander Wal, at home.

Vienna Summer Students Tour "The New Vienna"

The sixty-one students attending the Hope College Vienna Summer School were given a tour of "The New Vienna" (Aug. 3) which was arranged and provided by the Lord Mayor of the County Council.

Because Vienna is noted for its historic palaces, museums, churches and buildings of great architectural fame, many of which date back to the 12th and 13th centuries, Council is interested in informing guests about the up-to-date features of the city.

The trip included a look at the rebuilt and restored Theater an der Wien which was damaged during World War II. The restoration has been done to retain the original style and yet incorporate modern features for stage production such as modern lighting, a revolving stage, and excellent acoustics.

During a stop at the Wiener Stadthalle (Vienna Stadium) the students saw ice skaters practicing for amateur competition on the modern rinks of which the citizens are very proud. The ultra-modern Stadthalle was built at a cost of \$10 million, opened five years ago, and has a seating capacity of 18,000. This building is opened several times a week for general playing use by the public. Formally it is used for lectures and rallies as well as athletic events.

Other facilities pointed out on the tour were a modern school hospital for training and treatment of children crippled by polio, a school and park for the blind, and the underground passages at main intersections to relieve traffic congestion. The city has eight such passages complete with restaurants, coffee houses, and shops. These give the city a modern look and modern traffic control.

The greatest project of the city, however, is housing, 120,000 apartment units having been completed since World War II on a program which will continue for ten to twenty years. This is the continuation of a project pioneered by the Viennese during the First Republic 1918-1938, when 65,000 units were constructed, owned and rented by the city in a revolutionary and unique step. The results of this early program became a sensation and admired by the whole world. The success has been continued from time to time to keep pace with the population increase and, of course, with destruction during World War II.

The afternoon-long tour was concluded at the WIG (World International Garden Show). Acres of prize flowers are growing on the site of a former slum area which has been converted during the past year into this beautiful exhibition. A feature of the development is a form of space needle containing a revolving restaurant, and coffee house at the top of the tower. Its modern appearance against the skyline graced by beautiful baroque towers and lacy church spires is the basis for why Viennese jokes such as "The best place to view the city from at night is the WIG tower for then you don't have to see it." This remark seems to say that the Viennese, while enjoying the modern facilities of the New Vienna, have retained their love for the grandeur and classic beauty of the past. The Lord Mayor and the Council are, however, keeping people such as the Hope students informed of the City's 20th Century projects.

Although it is commonly believed that jet aircraft were first used for military purposes during the Korean War, this is not true, according to Encyclopedia International. The Germans introduced a jet fighter, the Me-262, in the last days of World War II.

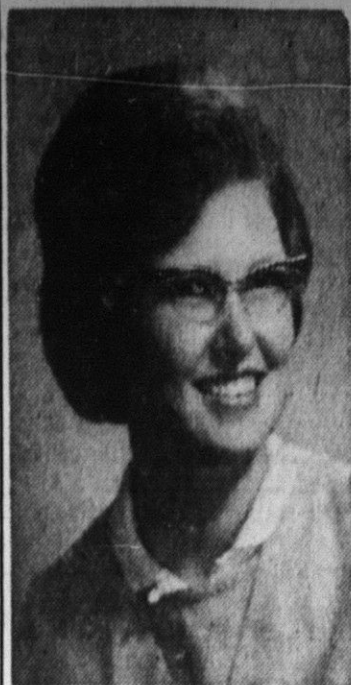

Student Ambassador Hears Nasser, Sees African Heads

The week of July 10-25 was a week of celebrations for Egypt. Our group of Community Ambassadors found ourselves very much involved and caught the spirit of the week. The week could be compared to celebrating Christmas and the Fourth of July with one day in between these two holidays.

All Moslems celebrated the birthday of the prophet Mohammed on Tuesday, July 21. The celebration for this day consists mainly of a one-day holiday from work, but is also used as a kickoff day for the Revolution celebrations.

On that day I attended, along with my Egyptian brother, the Youth Festival in the new Cairo stadium. It was a massive parade of various groups to show the many facets of Egyptian life.

The program began with a massive fireworks display which was a welcome to the African leaders and President Nasser. Because the Organization for African Unity was in the middle of its sessions, the theme of the demonstrations centered about African unity.

The evening of July 25 was very special to all of our group in Cairo. We attended President Nasser's annual speech in honor of the July 23 Revolution of 1952. We were fortunate in obtaining tickets to the foreign correspondents' press box.

What made the program so unforgettable was that we saw and heard many of the African leaders. There are very few Americans who have ever witnessed this very special group of world leaders together.

First to speak was his imperial majesty, Haile Selassie, King of Ethiopia. He was followed by Sekou Toure of Guinea, Ben Bella of Algeria, Jomo Kenyatta of Kenya, Dr. Bandi from Malawi, the prime minister of Iraq and the remaining leaders of the 32 nations of Africa were introduced.

Of course we were thrilled by their presence, but were very much impressed by the almost godlike reverence with which President Nasser is respected

and praised. His speech was one of continued disappointment with the colonial powers and of a bitter hate against Israel.

The next morning, July 23, I watched the military parade on television. Egypt has come a long way in being able to supply her own military needs, but receives some jet fighters from Russia.

The desert fighting equipment was very impressive ranging all the way from caterpillar tractors to a camel division.

My Egyptian family tells of the time when the military parade consisted of perhaps one or two pieces of equipment and only a few men. They too were impressed by this massive display of power which surely must be only a fraction of Egypt's military strength.

I hope in the next few letters to tell about the beaches at Alexandria and Merga Matruh, a little of home life, perhaps a recipe of Egyptian food using vegetables now available in Michigan, the place of women in this society and of course something about the many antiquities.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, August 16
Numbers 14:23, 26-33, 36-38

The struggle between belief and unbelief has been going on for a long time and it is continuing unceasingly. This lesson, which tells us about a past event, can teach us a timely truth—we daily need faith.

I. Unbelief often leads people to grumbling. "And all the children of Israel murmured against Moses and against Aaron." Why? The children of Israel had come to the borders of the Promised Land. Moses had sent out twelve men to spy out the land, every one of the twelve was a leader.

After spying for forty days the men came back to report. They brought with them a single cluster of grapes "and they carried it on a pole between two of them" because it was so big.

The twelve gave a majority and a minority report. All agreed that the land flowed with milk and honey, that the people were strong, the cities were large and fortified, and there were giants in the land.

Ten of the twelve said they could not take the country and they were responsible for the murmuring of the people. Caleb and Joshua brought in a minority report. The ten saw the grapes and the giants, and overlooked the promise of God. They said that they seemed like grasshoppers in the sight of those giants. The two, Caleb and Joshua, trusted God and urged the people to go and possess the land.

II. Unbelief is costly. The people listened to the pessimists and unbelieving and resolved to go back to Egypt. God punished the murmuring nation for all "from twenty years and upward, who have murmured against Me, not one shall come into the land where I swore that I would make you dwell, except Caleb, the son of Jephunneh, and Joshua the son of Nun" so spoke God to the grumblers.

The people wandered in the wilderness for forty years — a year for every day the spies were in Canaan. The ten who brought in the evil report "died by plague before the Lord." They were punished especially because of their special sin—that of unbelief.

Today there are leaders who spread unbelief, some are teachers in state colleges and universities and according to reports, some teach in church-related colleges. This is a terrible sin.

Unbelief robs people of life's best.

III. Faith is rewarded. The two believing spies, Caleb and Joshua, the two who dared to stand alone and show faith in God, were promised life and the privilege of going into Canaan.

Today millions of people have no courage in the presence of pressure to stand alone. It is so easy to conform and that is the reason why many go along with the crowd. "They all do it"—and that is the sole reason why many do it. God calls upon people to stand for the right, to believe His promises and to act according to His will.

In church and state there is a great need for men of the faith of Caleb and Joshua.

Christian Schools Name 2 Principals

Preliminary plans for the opening of the Holland Christian schools were announced this week by Supt. Mark Vander Ark.

He reported that the first general meeting of all teachers will be held on Tuesday Sept. 8 at 9 a.m. in the high school building. This meeting will be followed by group meetings of each staff with its principal. The rest of the day will be spent in preparing for the opening of school, he said.

On Tuesday night, Sept. 8, the annual board-personnel social will be held with new teachers scheduled to be introduced. School is scheduled to open on Wednesday Sept. 9, with an early dismissal time in the afternoon, Vander Ark said.

He also announced the appointment of two new principals for the Holland Christian School system. Wendell Rooks has been named principal of the South Side school, succeeding Robert Strabbing, who accepted a similar position in the Zealand Christian School system. He has been a member of the Central Ave. school staff for 11 years. He is a graduate of Hope college and has done some graduate work at the University of Michigan.

Named to the new East Side Christian school as principal is Phillip Vander Velde, also a teacher at the Central Ave. school for the past year. Prior to coming to Holland, he taught intermediate grades at the Mt. Vernon, Washington Christian School. He is a graduate of Calvin College and is currently doing graduate study at Michigan State University.

Vander Ark also reported on a school survey conducted for the local system by Western Michigan University. He said that the survey concludes that Holland Christian has a very critical high school space problem, and an almost equally critical need for improving the junior high program. He said the survey recommends as a first choice the option of building a whole new high school and of relocating the junior high grades in the present high school plant.

To try to take care of a very pressing high school space and enrollment problem, the board recently approved a recommendation to erect a 32-48 all-metal relocatable building. The new building is expected to be used mainly by the bands and orchestra. The present band room will then be converted into two classrooms.

It was reported that if it were not for the new building, the gym would have to be used for study halls, eliminating all chapel exercises and physical education.

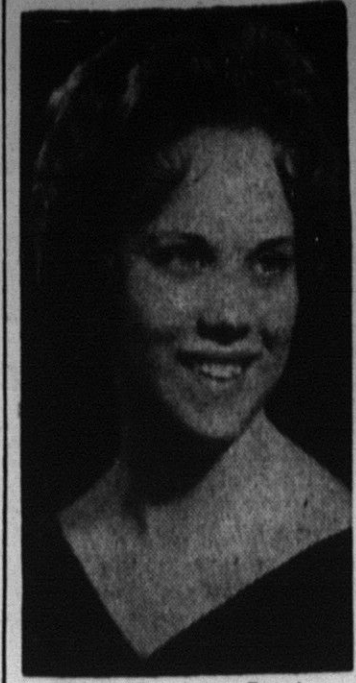

School Vote Is Scheduled In Hamilton

HAMILTON—A special school election to vote 5 mills for 5 years for elementary school improvements will be held in Hamilton High School Thursday, Aug. 27, from 1 to 8 p.m.

The program calls initially for a six-room addition to Hamilton Elementary School. A 45-member citizens committee which has been studying elementary needs has recommended a further study by an independent source on meeting other elementary needs in the district involving selection of sites, etc.

Harrington Court Case Ruling Given

GRAND HAVEN — Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith has filed an opinion ruling in favor of the defendant in a case brought by Phillip Harrington charging fraud and misrepresentation or concealment of certain assets in settlements affecting the Harrington estate. Carl Harrington was named as defendant.

Complaint dealt mainly with five parcels of real estate, referred to as the Washington Ave. property, marina property, lot 63 or the oil tank property, and two bayou properties.

The Washington Ave. property, the old family homestead, had been conveyed to Carl Harrington by the late Harry Harrington (father of plaintiff) in consideration for an expenditure of partnership assets on a cottage owned by Harry, and despite a deed recording technicality, Carl Harrington was declared the legal owner.

The other four parcels were acquired by a partnership consisting of Lucia Harrington, mother of Harry and Carl, and the two sons. Carl Harrington, as surviving partner and under the partnership agreement, was entitled to them as assets of the partnership.

The court also ruled in favor of Carl Harrington in a counterclaim for the sum of \$1,448.09, alleging that Phillip Harrington had failed to pay his full share of federal estate taxes. Accordingly, the court found that Phillip Harrington owes Carl Harrington this sum with appropriate interest from the date tax was paid by Carl Harrington. Defendant also may have costs.

Antlerless Deer Plan Approved

HIGGINS LAKE — The State Conservation Commission today approved hunting plans designed to harvest part of the surplus of the record-sized deer herd.

With just a minor exception or splitting area one in the extreme western Upper Peninsula into two parts to better regulate hunters, the commission okayed the Conservation Department proposals outlined by P. H. Bartlett Thursday.

They included a take of 130,000 deer by firearms including 66,000 antlerless deer.

The herd for Michigan is now estimated at 800,000 animals, with a huntable surplus of about 150,000 deer, Bartlett told the commission.

The season would include antlerless deer hunting in nine southern Michigan areas where the herd has damaged farm crops, endangered auto traffic and injured horticultural growth. Most of Ottawa County is included in the area approved by the Commission.

Areas included in Ottawa County are sections 56 and 57, the Michigan Department of Conservation said today.

Boundaries in section 56 are from the intersection of M-57 and M-37 south to Three-Mile road, west 4½ miles to Wilson Ave., at the northside of section 7, south along the Grand River to Grandville, then west downstream along the Grand River to its confluence with the Spring Lake outlet in Grand Haven, north along the shore of Spring Lake to the southerly line of Muskegon County, east and north 26 miles along the line to junction with 17-Mile Road, east one and three-quarter miles on 17-Mile Road to the junction of M-37 and M-57.

Boundaries of section 57 is the area bounded by Lake Michigan and lines from the confluence of the Grand River at Grand Haven east upstream along the Grand River to Ottawa-Kent

County line near Grandville, south along the county line (Kenowa Ave.) about 3½ miles to the southeast corner of section 36, then west along Jackson and New Holland Streets, approximately 22 miles to Lake Michigan.

The take for southern Michigan would be about 1,800; and another 15,400 would be harvested in the Upper Peninsula while 49,000 antlerless deer would be taken from northern Lower Michigan.

Boating Law Turned Down

A boating control ordinance for Lake Macatawa was turned down Thursday night by the Park Township Board.

The ordinance, as approved by the Michigan Boating Control Committee, proposed to set up three zones on the lake where boating and water skiing restrictions would be enforced.

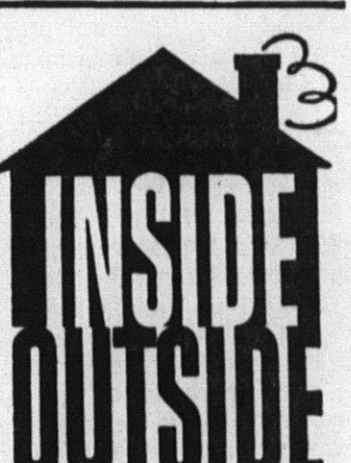
The township board requested, along with its rejection of the proposed ordinance, that the State Boating Control Committee conduct another hearing in order to arrive at a more realistic plan.

The board decided to ask the city of Holland to rescind its action in adopting the ordinance, and both the city and Holland Township will be asked to concur in the request for a new hearing.

The ordinance would have to be adopted by Holland City, Holland Township and Park Township in order to become effective.

In deciding to reject the proposal, the board pointed out that the original hearing was held in the middle of winter when many lakefront property owners were not able to be present to represent their interests.

Legislative Group Holds Hearing Here

While workmen's compensation benefits have stayed about the same or even decreased in Michigan, the insurance rates to employers have almost doubled since 1957.

This is one of the main problems in the workman's compensation program according to Rep. Riemer Van Til of Holland. Van Til, chairman of the interim legislative study committee on workmen's compensation, points out that this problem can adversely effect both management and labor and the whole climate for industry in Michigan. In many cases benefits are lower and rates are higher than in other states in the area.

Some of the problems of workmen's compensation were aired Tuesday afternoon in a public hearing of the interim legislative study committee on workmen's compensation in the Tulip Room of the Hotel Warm Friend. Six persons testified at the hearing.

The hearing is one of a series that the interim committee is holding around the state while the legislature is not in session. Van Til said that they hope to make recommendations to the legislature by next January. He said that these recommendations would probably lead to legislation in this area.

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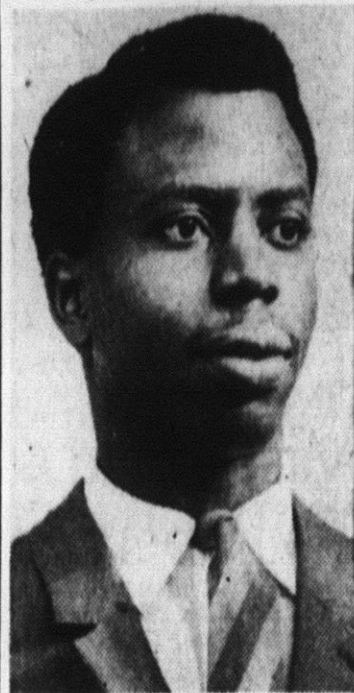

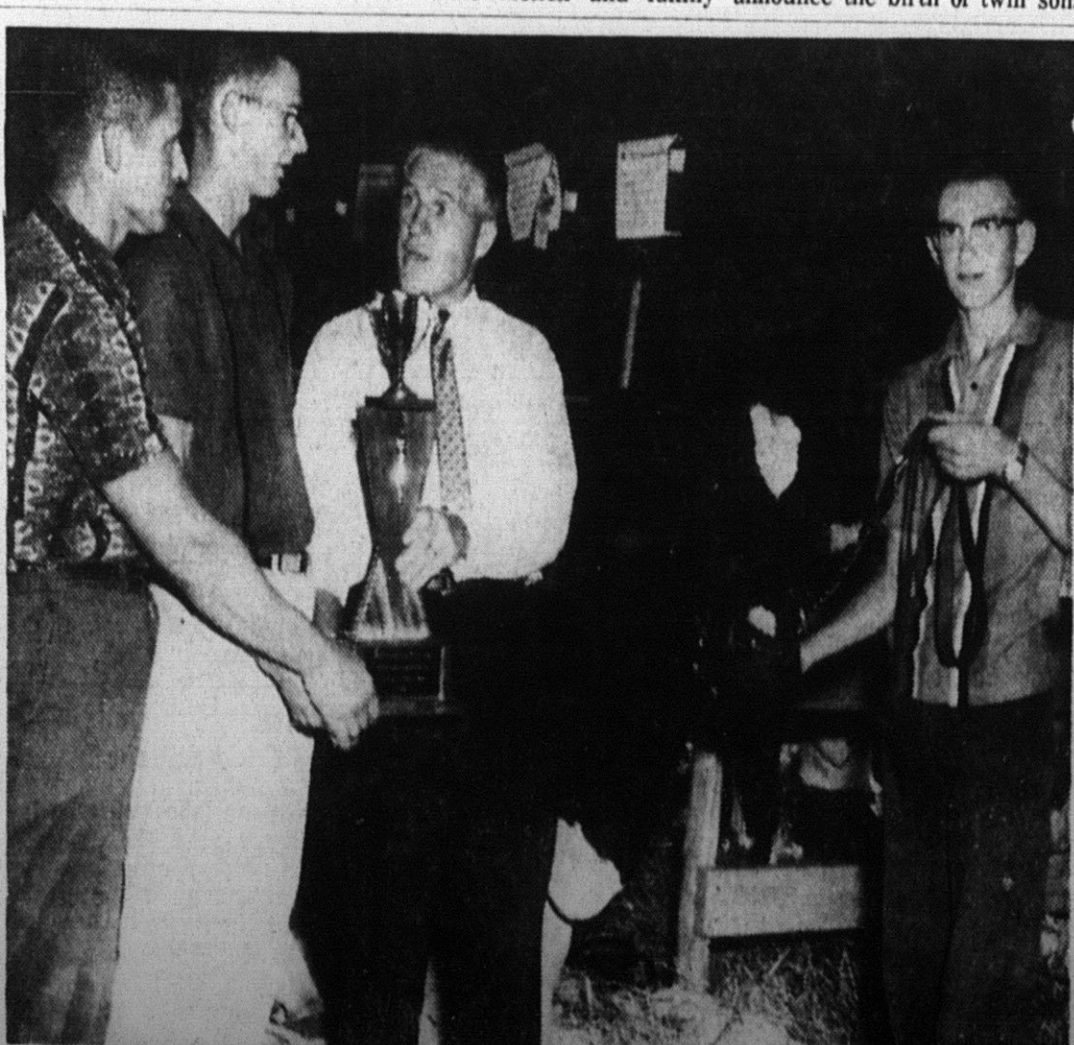

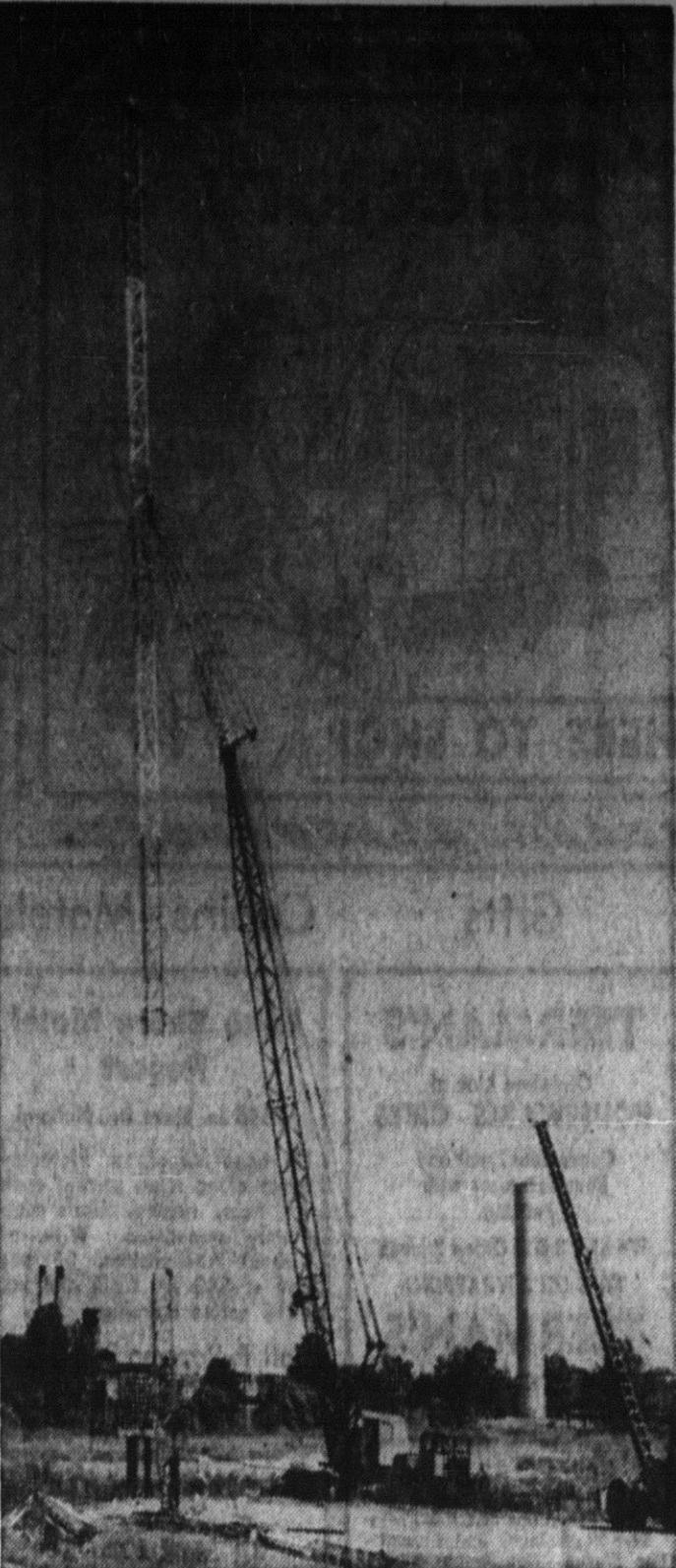
Frank Zant Sr. Succumbs at 66

New Tower Is Erected For WHTC

Radio station WHTC was operating on its normal 1,000 watts today following installation of a new 165-foot tower replacing one that "folded up" Aug. 1. The old tower had been in service for 16 years since the station opened in July, 1948.

The new tower is the same height as the old one but is 30 inches wide and welded whereas the old tower was 14 inches wide with all members bolted. It was installed Saturday and was put in use Sunday. In the interim the station had operated at 250 watts by means of a cable attached to a 40-foot crane placed 100 feet from the station.

The new installation required eight new 60-foot piles, two each for four supporting guy wires which hold the slender tower in place on its swamp site directly east of the station on Central Ave. at Fourth St.

Costs of the new installation will run several thousand dollars.

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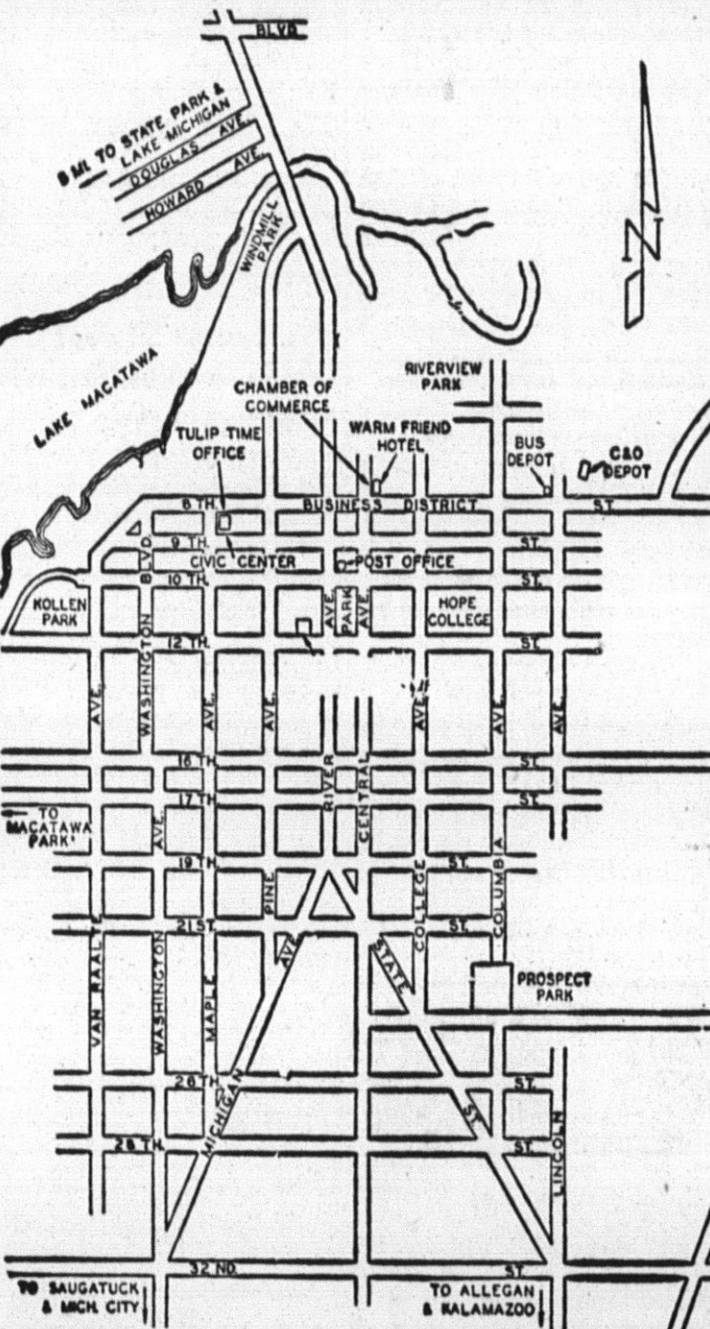
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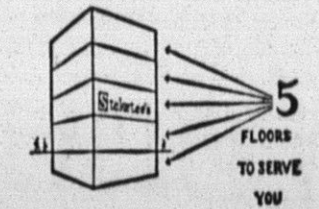
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
