Historical Papers Are Catalogued

Anybody studying historical papers of Holland's early days or searching for old photographs will be able to find them easily these days.

The archives of the Netherlands Museum are in excellent shape, thanks to a summer-long stint by Dr. Elton J. Bruins, assistant professor of religion and Bible at Hope College, and Dr. Gerrit J. ten Zythoff, assistant professor of history at Ohio State University.

The two men have spent the summer sorting, cataloguing and translating historical papers in City Hall and placing them in acid free folders and in special archives boxes in the vault in what is now Mayor Nelson Bosman's office on the second floor of City Hall. Offices for the Netherlands Museum and Netherlands Information Service are on the third floor where the two men did most of the work.

Dr. Bruins, who also is archivist for Western Theological Seminary, found a wealth of material on Holland's early history on civic life, government, harbor and schools. There also is a fine collection of old photographs.

Since much of the material was in the Dutch language, translations were made by Dr. ten Zythoff, native of The Netherlands, who has spent considerable time in Holland in recent years continuing the work of the late P. T. Moerdijk and Dr. Seth Vander Werf on Holland's historical papers.

It was an energetic pair at work throughout the summer. Each did his own typing and Dr. Bruins cut the stencils for a 35-page catalogue entitled "A Guide to the Archives of The Netherlands Museum." The two men proved talents in other lines too, such as assembling cases and shelving for the vault. The guide is available without cost to libraries and researchers. The collection is available to any serious researcher who may make arrangements for study with the Netherlands Museum office in City Hall.

Both men are writing books. Dr. Bruins is compiling a history of Third Reformed Church which is celebrating its centennial this year. The title is "The Americanization of an Immigrant Congregation" and is slated to be published by the fall of the year.

Dr. ten Zythoff has completed "The Dutch in America," one volume in a series on "America and Its Ethnic Origin" published by Lerner Publications of Minneapolis. The book of 80 pages of text and 80 pages of illustrations will be out in October. It has been in the making two years.

Cataloguing Holland's historical papers and photographs has long been the aim of the Board of Trustees of the Netherlands Museum.

Featured in the event were tours of area nurseries, 72 indoor exhibit booths, 160 outdoor exhibit booths, demonstrations, displays, a chicken barbecue and a fresh trout fry.

Special bus tours took conventioners and their families to Windmill Island, the Wooden Shoe Factory and the Dutch Village.

Defeat Millage In Fennville

FENNVILLE — By a vote of 291 to 227, Fennville district voters defeated a proposed 2½-mill increase Monday.

The Board of Education is prepared to make drastic cuts in the educational program, particularly in art, music and physical education.

The board has delayed hiring teacher replacements for high school industrial arts, as well as art, music and physical education in junior high and elementary schools.

There are no plans for another election. The need for additional millage had been explained at a series of meetings with Fennville people.

12 Blueberry Boxes Are Reported Missing

A total of 12 blueberry boxes were reported taken from the Joe De Vries residence at 5803 144th Ave. sometime between 7:30 p.m. Tuesday and 7 a.m. Wednesday, according to Ottawa county sheriff's deputies who received the report Wednesday.

De Vries told deputies the boxes, used to carry berries from the field to the house where the berries are graded, were 12x4x7 inches and painted orange. The ¾ inch plywood boxes were valued at \$1 each.

Boat Launching Sites Needed If Coho Comes

Holland may possibly receive financial aid from the Michigan Department of Conservation for developing boat launching facilities.

Additional facilities would be a "must" in case the Coho or Chinook Salmon should come within fishing range of Holland.

Two sites are under study, the Georgian Bay property at Montello Park and the area adjoining Kollen Park to the west.

City Council has a \$90,000 option on the Georgian Bay property expiring the first week in October. No price was released for the lakefront property adjoining Kollen Park to the west, owned by the Sligh Co.

A communication to City Manager Herb Holt from Keith Wilson, director of the Michigan Waterways Commission, revealed that his staff has made several visits to Holland to study both sites, and points to the "prime difficulty in predicting the migration of Coho and Chinook salmon."

The letter continues: "We have conferred with the first division of the Department of Conservation on this matter and have learned that, although there is no certainty or guarantee offered by them, the probabilities are that the salmon will pursue a more or less northerly migration during the summer to their spawning grounds and that fishing pressures could be felt at Holland as a result of this migration."

"If the salmon should remain in your area for a period of a week or more, it is probable that as many as 400 to 500 fishing boats will be drawn to your area during the peak demand period. However, to attempt to construct launching facilities to meet this maximum peak demand is not considered feasible by this office and, instead, we suggest initial construction of new facilities to accommodate about 100 cars and trailers and use the next one or two years for experience before planning any additional such facilities."

The letter pointed out that the Georgian Bay site, if completely developed, could accommodate 115 cars and trailers, but added that commercial docks on the property are of no use for launching purposes or for any other recreational purpose, and would actually be a safety hazard if allowed to deteriorate.

The communication recommended that should the city acquire this property, these piers should be removed so that they do not present an attractive nuisance to children and others.

For proper development, the warehouse structure also would have to be removed to make the site suitable for developing launching facilities.

It added that the property at Kollen Park does not present this type of problem, but being limited in size is suitable only for accommodating 40 cars and trailers. This site is exposed to winds from the westerly quadrant and will not be usable when winds of more than 15 miles per hour from this direction are being experienced.

The letter also expressed the opinion that the docks at the Georgian Bay property should be removed by the present property owner, and should the city acquire either or both sites, the Waterways Commission might consider them eligible for grants equal to 90 per cent of the cost of developing launching and parking facilities.

For estimating purposes, the commission lists development on the Georgian Bay site at \$1,000 per car and trailer or \$115,000, while the Kollen Park property could be developed to handle 40 cars and trailers for about \$30,000 since no rest rooms are involved and the site is relatively clean.

The letter also mentioned that aid in acquiring property might be available from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation under the U. S. Department of Commerce.

The letter was presented to City Council at its regular meeting Wednesday night and was filed for information, with contents to be brought to the attention of the Georgian Bay Co. This company maintained docks in Holland as winter quarters for luxury ships for over 40 years. The company no longer operates a summer schedule of cruises.

Conservatives Take Over Ottawa GOP

GRAND HAVEN — A conservative element of the Republican party wrested control from the old guard at the Ottawa County Republican convention Wednesday in the county building, but after 5½ hours of parliamentary wrangling the two groups joined forces in the interests of unity and decided to work together to elect Republicans in the November election.

Joel Verplank of Holland, who moved here some years ago from Livonia, was elected convention chairman. He was nominated by Charles R. Sligh Jr. who asked a roll call vote. Ray Vander Laan of Hudsonville was the other nominee and Verplank won easily by a 2 to 1 majority. Most of the county delegates elected at the primary election Aug. 6 were present. A few delegates were seated for vacancies to round out the 139-member complement. Their credentials were carefully scrutinized. Sligh's motion for a roll call vote for convention chairman set off a trend of many other roll call votes, particularly in the parliamentary entanglements on convention resolutions.

Longtime party workers objected to what they called overly strong language of resolutions submitted by a committee newly appointed by Verplank, once he chaired the convention. Generating the most steam was a proposed resolution on the Vietnam war calling for the convention to "demand that Congress amend all foreign aid acts to exclude all Communist countries and all allied and neutral countries engaged in helping the Viet Cong and the Hanoi regime in any matter whatsoever...and that all trade agreements with Communist countries be immediately nullified."

About 1 a.m. Sligh proposed a compromise throwing out the Vietnam resolution, but adopting a Supreme Court resolution supporting Sen. Robert Griffin in his opposition to elevating Abraham Fortas to chief justice, and opposing graduated income tax for Michigan. Together with the usual commendatory resolution recognizing efforts of Republican officials, and supporting the GOP platform adopted in Miami Beach, this constituted resolutions adopted.

Control by conservative elements was effected mainly through electing new delegates. Further strategy was laid at a meeting of 70 such delegates the previous night, and the new majority was identified by red stickers on lapels stating something to the effect of getting it in the hospital pharmacy. In a burst of unity near 1:30 a.m. delegates removed the red stickers.

Although Verplank named all new committees for convention work, he yielded on convention officers and Hanes Meyers Jr. remained as parliamentary and Fred Den Herder as convention secretary.

County Chairman Joyce Hatton presided and Vice Chairman Tom De Pree gave the keynote address. Main purpose of the convention was to name 38 delegates and 38 alternates to the state Republican convention in Grand Rapids Aug. 23 and 24.

Terry Meyer Killed in Viet

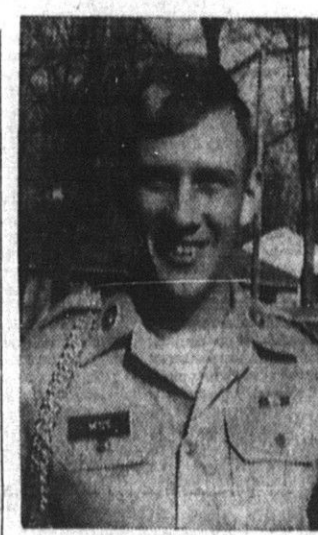

Library Named For Zumberge

ALLEDALE — Grand Valley State College said good-bye to its pioneer president, Dr. James H. Zumberge, at farewell ceremonies Tuesday afternoon. Then in a surprise move, it named its new library currently under construction "The James H. Zumberge Library."

Dr. Zumberge, who was appointed Grand Valley's first president in February, 1962, will leave this week for Tucson, Ariz., where he will be director of the school of Earth Science and professor of geology at the University of Arizona.

In the presence of some 300 well wishers, William Seidman, chairman of the college's Board of Control, announced the decision to name the new library after Zumberge while a temporary sign was unveiled on the steps of Lake Superior Hall where the ceremonies were held.

The new library is a five-floor building with a mechanical penthouse. Four floors are assigned exclusively to library services, and the fifth will contain the GVSC administrative offices, non-public library operations and mechanical space.

The new library costing approximately \$2,250,000 was begun June 21, 1967.

State Rep. Melvin De Stigter in whose district the college lies presented a resolution of the Michigan legislature recognizing Zumberge's achievements during his six years as head of the new college which expects an enrollment of over 2,100 this fall. John Hackenberg, president of the United Collegiate Organization, spoke for the students, and George T. Potter, vice president for academic affairs, gave the farewell from the faculty and staff.

Dr. Zumberge, a native of Minnesota, served on the faculty of the University of Michigan for 12 years before heading GVSC. A famed geologist, he organized and accompanied two Antarctic expeditions in 1957 and 1959 in connection with the International Geophysical Year studies, and directed two subsequent Antarctic expeditions in 1962-63 and 1965-66 for additional studies. A mountain in the Antarctic continent is named in his honor.

Todd Hamlin, 6, of 691 Goldenrod Ave., riding in the Lamberts car, was released from Holland Hospital after treatment of minor bruises.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies said the Lamberts car collided with a car driven by Phyllis Blain, 27, of Grand Rapids at the open, unmarked intersection as the Blain car was headed west on Lake St. and the Lamberts car was headed north on Division.

Mrs. Blain and six persons riding in her car were all released from Holland Hospital after treatment of minor injuries.

Deputies who are continuing their investigation said the impact caused the Blain car to damage a fence and shrubbery on the P. T. Cheff property at 679 Wisteria and a gas vent pipe owned by Wolverine Pipeline Co.

Kidnaping Case In Second Day

GRAND HAVEN — Testimony was completed this morning in the second day of a two-day trial in Ottawa Circuit Court in which four Holland men are charged with kidnaping a 19-year-old girl April 20 in Holland. The four are faced with rape charges in Allegan Circuit Court.

Arguments to the jury were scheduled after lunch today before the case goes to the jury. Charged in the case are Frank Martinez, 22, Oscar Garcia Ramirez, 17, Celestino Garza, 20, and Pedro Vigil, 19.

M. Freestones Accept Son's Silver Star

Sp4 Spencer S. Freestone of Holland, who was killed as the result of Viet combat, has been named recipient of the Silver Star and the Purple Heart and the Good Conduct Medal.

Presentation of the medals will be made posthumously to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin D. Freestone of 626 Central Ave., at the U.S. Army Reserve Center in Grand Rapids at 7 p.m. on Aug. 28.

The Silver Star citation is made "for gallantry in action against a hostile force" after being wounded three times while on a search and destroy operation south of Ben Cat. The citation points out Freestone assumed command of his platoon that came under intensive hostile fire from a Viet Cong force while moving through a dense jungle.

"With complete disregard for his personal safety, he exposed himself to the intensive hostile fire as he guided his men into position and directed their fire...and drove the Viet Cong back."

During the action, the citation reads, "he was wounded in the leg. Refusing evacuation, he continued to direct the friendly force...Seeing a comrade who had been wounded, he rushed to his aid and was again wounded, this time in the arm."

"He nevertheless kept moving until he reached his comrade, then gave him first aid. While treating the man, he was wounded a third time. At this time he was evacuated to a hospital."

The action took place on Feb. 12 and Freestone died Feb. 15.

More Rooms Needed for Junior High

Because of an expected high enrollment at E.E. Fell Junior High School in September, the Board of Education Monday night arranged for the rental of four classrooms in the Christian school elementary building on Central Ave. The four rooms on the ground floor will accommodate eighth grade classes.

The lease agreement with the Society of Christian Education calls for a \$2,000 rental for one year, the Holland district to provide maintenance, utilities and fire insurance.

Supt. Donald L. Ihman explained that census and projected enrollment figures point to a peak in enrollment this year and possibly the next two or three years in junior high ages. Member Harvey Buter expressed concern with using the temporary arrangement for more than a year and said consideration probably should be given to moving the administrative offices to a suitable location and use these offices on the second floor of the junior high annex for classrooms as in the past.

A communication from City Clerk D.W. Schipper informed the board that proposed vacating of College Ave. at the new Maplewood School has failed to carry 4-4. The board discussed possible further action in view of the fact that both the planning Commission and traffic consultant had recommended an area of College Ave. be closed, but for a temporary measure decided to ask City Council for safety signs, etc., not installed.

The treasurer's report revealed that the school district started out the year July 1 with an operating balance of \$9,941.86 and since then has collected \$228,921.63 in city taxes.

A progress report on summer maintenance by Ed Prins, superintendent of buildings and grounds, revealed such improvements as painting, woodwork refinishing, auditorium floor rebuilt and covered with linoleum and wider sidewalks at the south entrance at E.E. Fell Junior High, one of the major areas of work.

Other improvements listed Apple Avenue, painted and light improvements; Holland Heights new grounds equipment room within a week; Lincoln School, ground improvements scheduled; Van Raalte School, resurfaced play area; Longfellow, added playground surface in a few weeks; Washington, state removed from gym and ceiling contracted in top hall; Montello Park, underground conduit for drainage; Lakeview, grounds leveled for gravel and drainage.

Buter explained his work with representatives of other school districts in Ottawa county in seeking fixed school millage for the county in an effort to stabilize the tax picture.

Don Gebraad, director of vocational education, presented his annual report on the vocational program in the local schools listing 191 co-op students divided as follows: Holland, 80; West Ottawa, 66; Zeeland, 31; Holland Christian, 12; Hamilton, 2. Of the total, 77 were in trade and industry, 49 in retail and 65 in offices.

The report discussed educational policies as affected by state and federal programs, and stated Holland is still anxiously awaiting decision on the proposed community college for Ottawa county, and "if response is not received in reasonable time, it is recommended that we start planning a vocational center for our high school youth, adults and dropouts, omitting the community college aspect."

The report also pointed to the nursery school conducted by the home economics department for children 3 to 5 during the last six weeks of the school year, operating Tuesday and Thursday of each week from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Activities include arrival and taking of coats, free play, organized games, walks and outdoor play, story time, cleanup and departure.

Consideration is being given to the feasibility of adding a course in food preparation and waitress training at West Ottawa. The objective would be to prepare students for employment in the restaurant field. Desire also was expressed to expand the physical facilities of the auto mechanics shop.

The conclusion stated that vocational and technical education must be an integral part of the total system and that youth should be introduced to the world of work along with the world of professions. It added that vocational education is not a cure-all for all educational problems, but since the world is experiencing a tremendous revolution in technology and automation, training programs must be provided to prepare people for the changing demands of industry.

Stately Home Has Few Changes in its 95 Years

The Cappon home at 299 West Ninth St. is one of several fine old residences in Holland that have changed but little from the early years.

This stately old home at the Southeast corner of Washington Blvd. and Ninth St. was built by Isaac Cappon in 1873, only two years after the disastrous fire of 1871 which destroyed nearly all of Holland. It is still occupied by the Cappon family.

Isaac Cappon, co-founder of the Cappon-Bertsch Leather Co., was Holland's first mayor and served four separate terms. He was born in the Netherlands of French descent and came to Holland in his youth.

The Cappon-Bertsch Leather Co., one of the leading industries in the early days of Holland, was first located where Harrington Coal Co. now stands on West Eighth St. Then it occupied the entire block where Civic Center is located and also had an operation on the north side where the Parke, Davis & Co. plant now stands.

There have been few changes in the Cappon home now occupied by two sisters, Miss Lavina Cappon and Mrs. Marvin De Vries. It still retains its 12½-foot ceilings, carved woodwork and molded plaster designs.

An ornamental fence has replaced the picket fence of yesteryear, and an enclosed porch provided a delightful sun room for the family. A kitchen at the south end of the house was changed into a garage in the 1920's. This led the way for a more modern kitchen in what used to be the dining room and moving the dining room into one of two living rooms. In the early days, the living rooms were called the sitting room and the parlor.

Advent of electricity and modern plumbing brought some changes, removing a huge built-in bath tub lined with tin. Electrical fixtures of an earlier period blend well, and old pieces of furniture usually are reupholstered. Central heating also was installed years ago after a period of stoves and fireplaces. For years the furnace fuel was coal, then oil and at present

natural gas.

The original homesite extended south to 10th St. but eventually the carriage house, ice house and woodshed were removed to make way for the Austin Harrington home, still owned by the Carl Harringtons. A barn still remains at the east end of the Cappon property and is used as a garage.

The Cappon home recalls the days of dirt roads and wooden walks in early Holland. It also had a fountain in the front yard designed with a small boy holding aloft a fish which spouted water to basins on two levels. This fountain had to be painted every year.

The current occupants have two sisters, Mrs. E. Paul McLean of Castle Park and Mrs.

Several older buildings in Holland have taken on new interest since Third Reformed Church has been restored. Buildings usually associated with early Holland are the two main survivors of the 1871 fire, Ninth Street Christian Reformed Church known as the Pillar Church and Van Vleck Hall on Hope College campus. There are several homes and buildings of that era which could provide interesting reading.

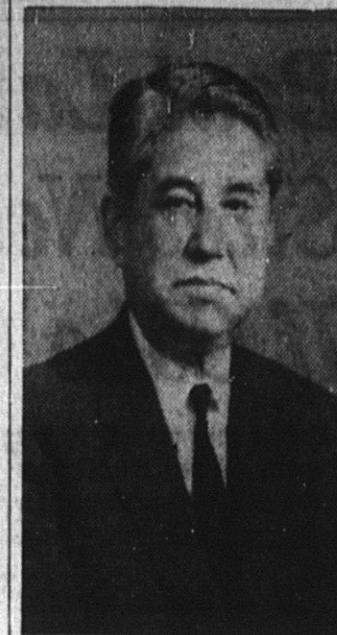

New Testament Visiting Prof Named at WTS

Professor Masaichi Takemori, Chairman of the Department of New Testament Studies at Tokyo Union Seminary in Japan, has been named as visiting professor of New Testament at the Western Theological Seminary in Holland, Michigan for the first academic quarter of the 1968-69 year, President Herman J. Ridder has announced.

Dr. Takemori will serve as a first quarter replacement for Dr. Richard C. Oudersluys of Western's faculty who will undertake a year of sabbatical studies overseas.

Professor Takemori is a member of the Nihon Kirisuto Kyokai, the Reformed Presbyterian Church of Japan. Born in Manchuria, he received his B.A. degree from the Manchuria Teachers' College in Mukden, China. He did his B. D. studies at the Nihon Shingakko (Seminary) in Tokyo, Japan. In 1950 he received the S. T. M. degree from Union Theological Seminary in New York.

Since 1936, Professor Takemori has served pastorates in Japan, first at the Shirogane Church in Tokyo, and since 1940 at the famous Kichijoji Church. In 1946 he was appointed Professor of New Testament at Tokyo Union Seminary, the position he now holds. Since 1965 he has been the chairman of the Department. In addition to his professional duties, Mr. Takemori serves as Chairman of the Japan Calvin Translation Society and as editor of the biblical journal, Seisho Zasshi.

Professor Takemori has a number of literary works to his credit including books in his field of New Testament studies, a three volume collection of expository sermons, and a history of missions in Manchuria. He has also translated numerous works into the Japanese language, including a set of sermons by John Calvin and a version of the Heidelberg Catechism.

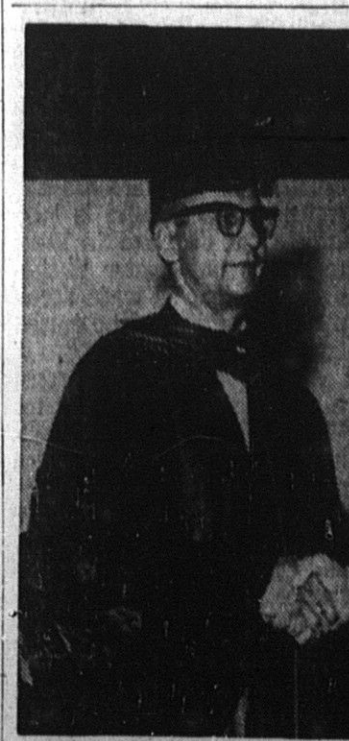

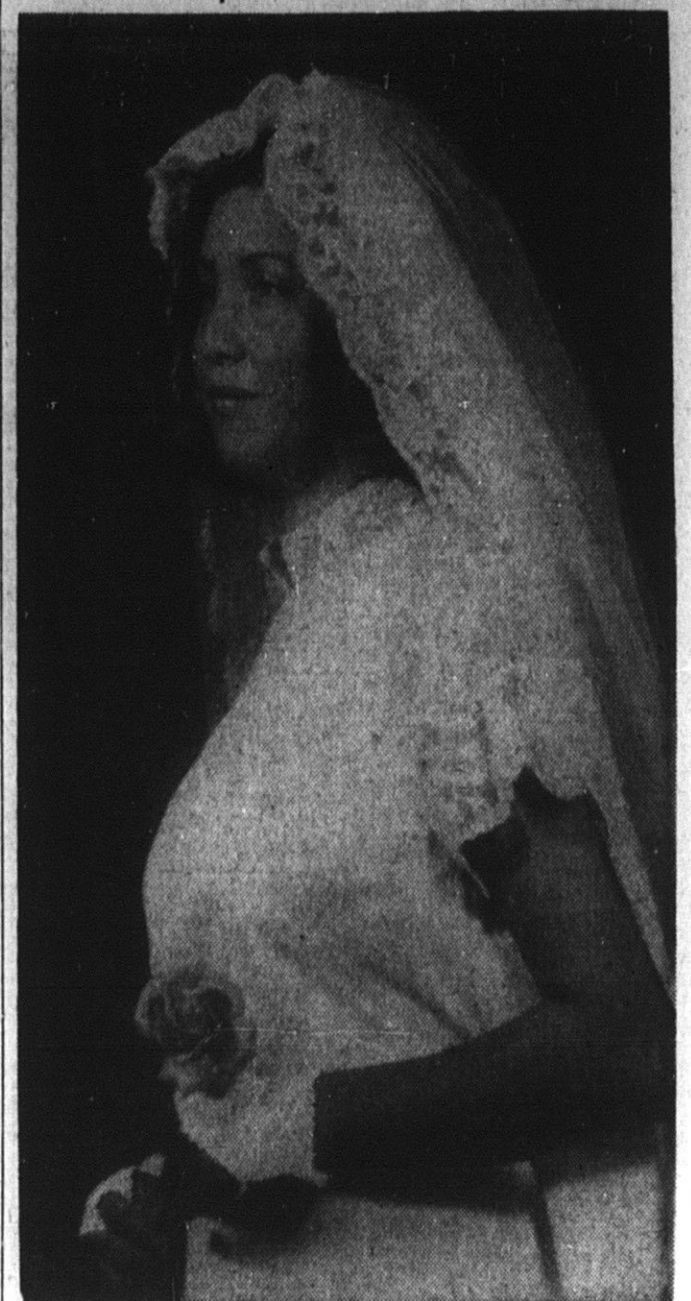

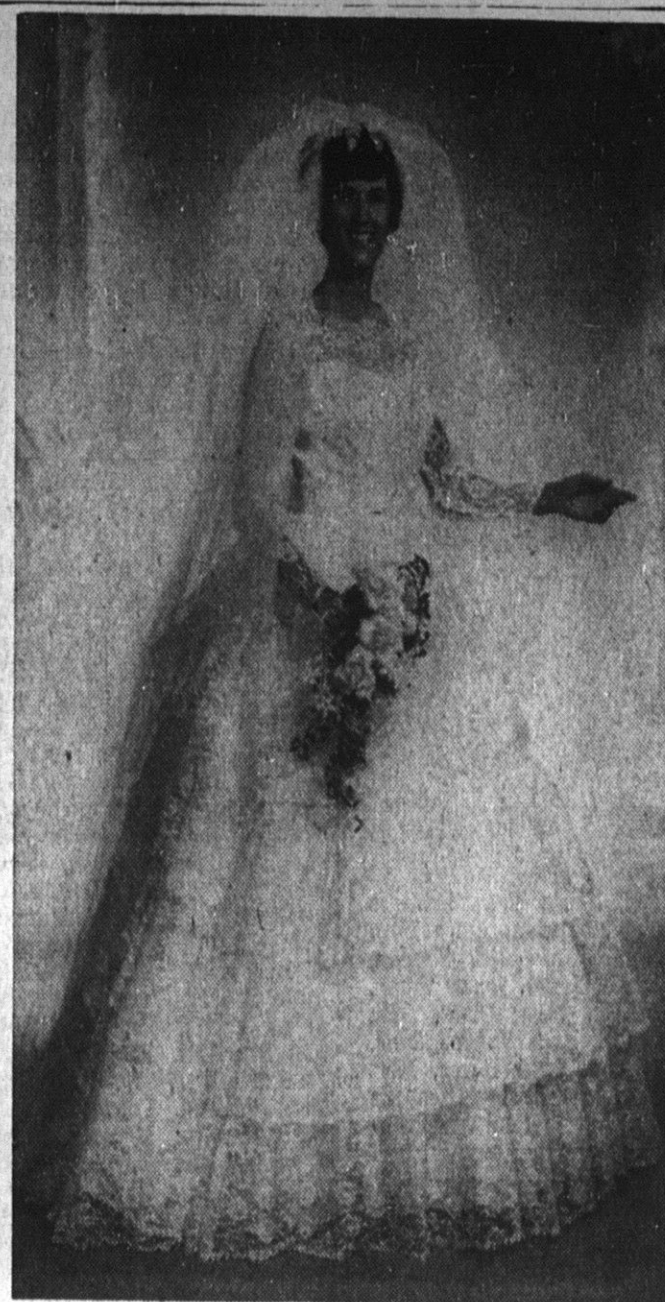

Conservation Proposal Limits Goose Hunting

ALLEGAN — Goose restrictions for the Allegan County and Fennville area are being recommended by Allegan State Game Refuge director Charles Friley and other conservation

officers with the backing of State Conservation director Ralph MacMullan.

Friley and others support the slashing of the season from 40 to 24 days and limiting the daily bag limit from two geese to only one goose. "We will not

know the bag limit conformation or the date for the opening and the closing of duck season until the federal government confirms it," Friley said.

The goose kill last year was recorded at 936 from the previous season's 551. Hopes are

for a higher goose kill this season.

The restricting of the goose season, the bag limits and the closing of goose hunting after 3 p.m. each day hopefully will result in the reducing of gunning pressure which should

heighten the use of Allegan County for duck hunting, conservationists noted.

Friley says that the opening of the hunting season a little later this year will give the geese a chance to get settled before the shooting starts and the early closing of the season should give a bigger winter flock.

The department of conservation also proposed that the opening of duck season begin on a weekday in the afternoon.

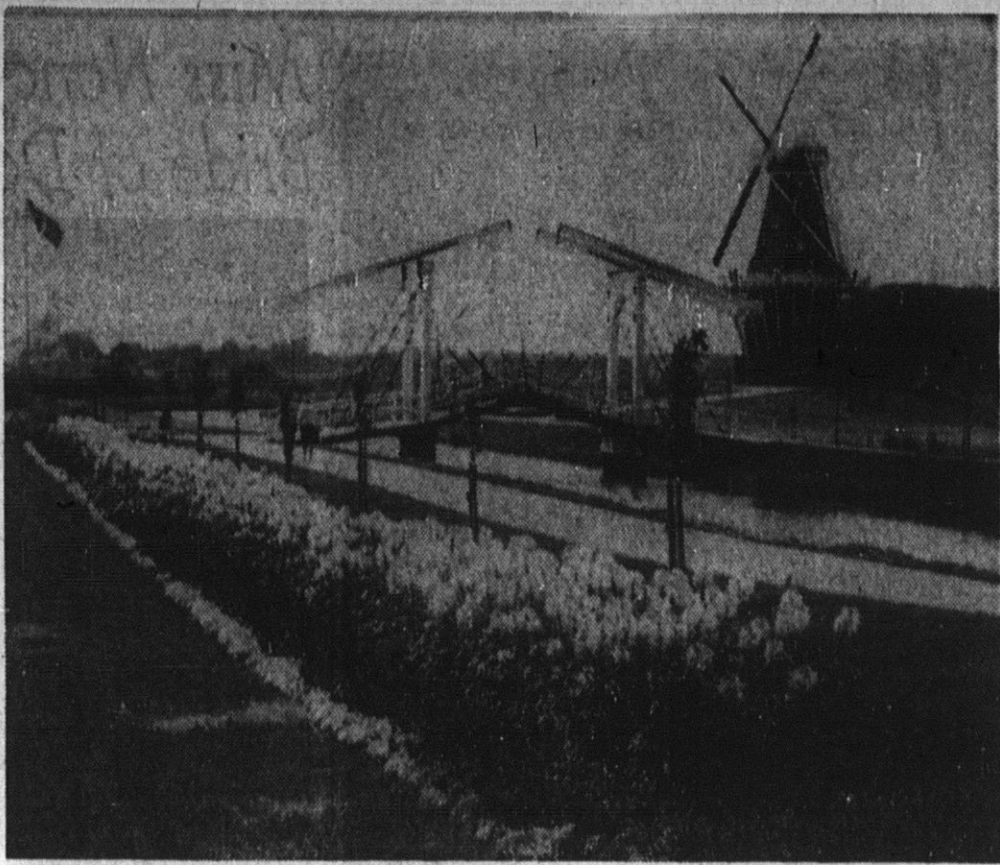

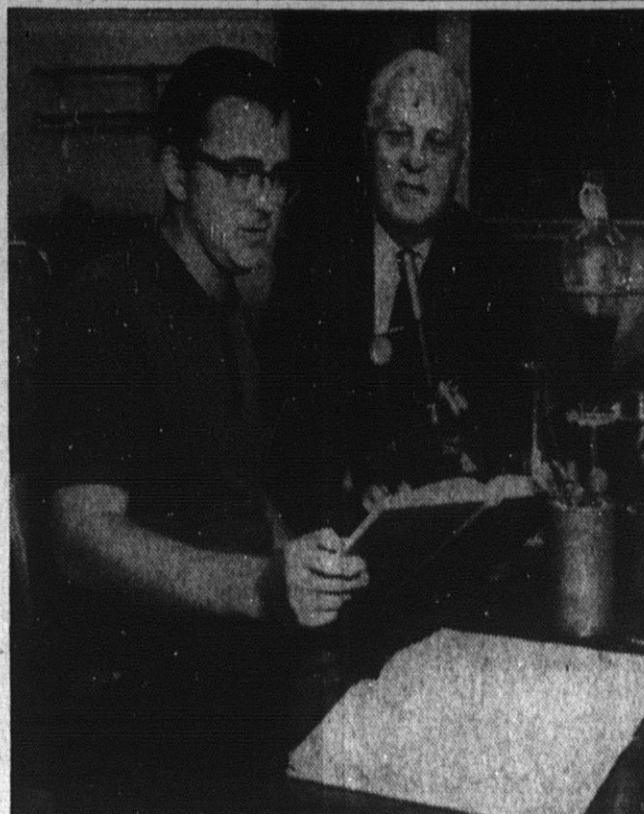

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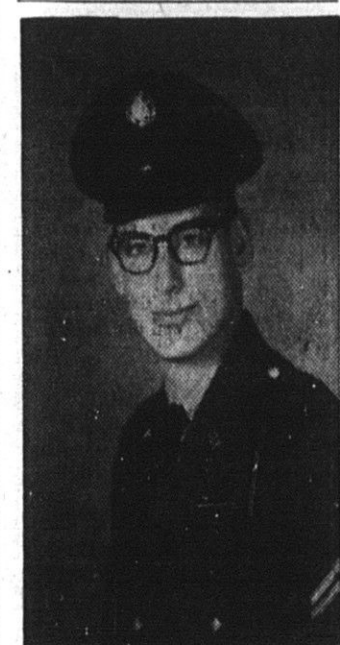
PAYING THE CAMPAIGN BILLS

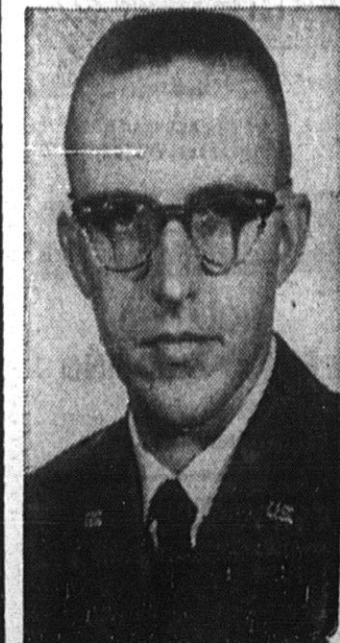

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Aug. 18
Protestors and Prophets
Haggai 1:1-9; Ezra 5:1-2
By C. P. Dame

All through the centuries God has been calling people to speak and work for Him. This lesson tells about a man who deserves to be known better because of what God did through him.

I. God knows how to pick the right kind of workers. All that we know about Haggai is told us in his book and in Ezra 5:1; 6:14. "In the second year of Darius the king, in the sixth month, in the first day of the month, came the word of the Lord by Haggai the prophet" — these words tell about an historical event. Haggai was not as great a prophet as Isaiah or Jeremiah but he was a real success. The foundation of the temple had been laid but for 16 or 17 years nothing had been done. We can easily imagine how it looked after so long a time of inactivity. God impressed upon Haggai that the people should get busy and he told the leaders of the people to get going.

II. God selects leaders and gives them messages. "Thus speaketh the Lord of hosts" — thus the prophet said to the people that he spoke for God. Haggai spoke with divine authority. Modern pulpits lose the note of authority when they speak on man's opinions and current topics. God gave Haggai His message. It was time to build the temple. For years the foundation had lain idle.

"The time is not come, the time that the Lord's house should be built," God disagreed. The prophet told the people what God thought about the situation. God knew how busy they were building their own houses while the temple lay in ruins. Note that they put self first. Now God does not want second place in any one's life. The prophet told them to consider their ways. They were not living right. Although they were busy, they were not getting anywhere — neither economically or spiritually. There was much general dissatisfaction. The prophet called upon the people to get to work and to, "Go up to the hills and bring wood and build the house."

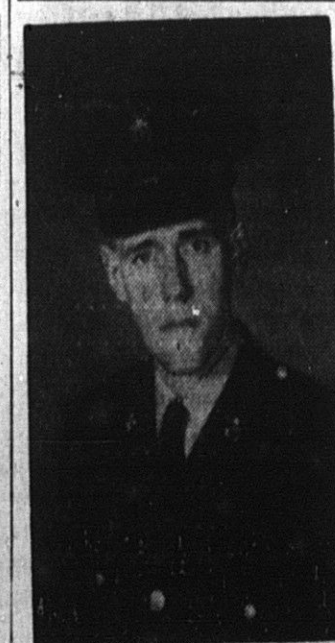
III. Preaching often gets results. It did this time. Both prophets, Haggai and Zechariah preached and first stirred up the religious leaders and they "arose and began to rebuild the house of God which is in Jerusalem; and with them were the prophets of God helping them." Note the fine cooperation — leaders, people and the prophets.

Again the work was stopped. The opponents reported the building of the temple to the authorities who called a halt. However upon investigation it was discovered that Cyrus had given permission to the Jews to build the temple and so the work was resumed and finally finished. The new temple was dedicated in 516 B.C., four and one-half years after the work was resumed. There were seventy years between the destruction of the first temple and the destruction of the second, in which Jesus later taught.

The enthusiastic and authoritative preaching of the prophets gets results. This kind of preaching is what is needed today. Instead of planning for and holding conferences for church mergers let us get busy and preach the gospel and then, instead of reporting losses and decreases, we will report gains in conversions and scholars in Sunday School and in giving for missions and evangelism. Let's build!

Deputies reported when they and Ten Brink returned to the car, they found the convertible top all cut up and there was a large cut across the rear window.

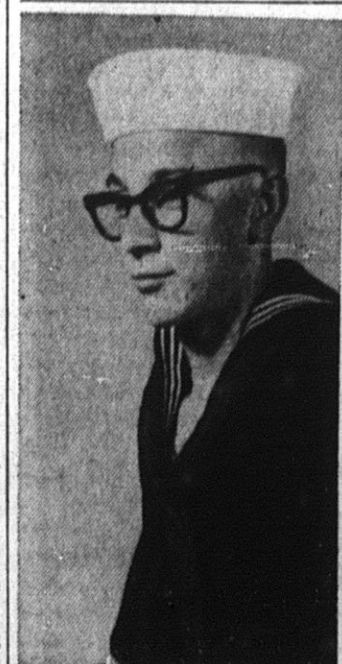

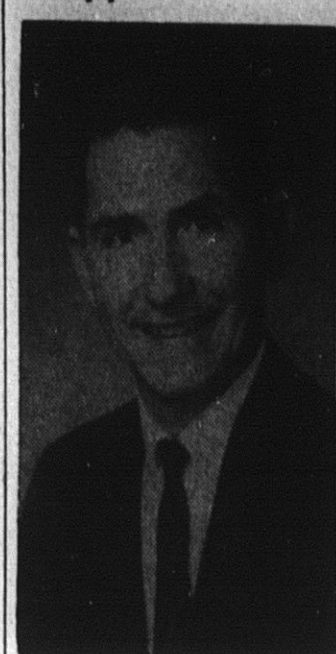

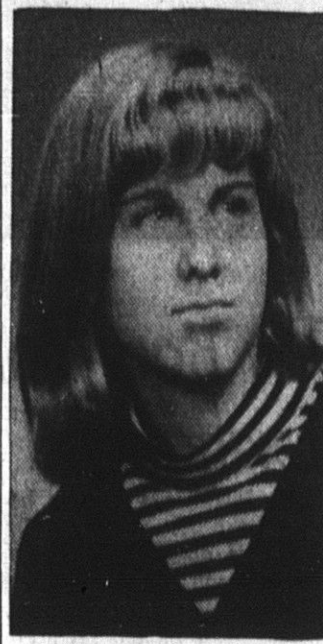
