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3 Charged In Shooting Of Youth

Jesse Lopez Wounded
In Abdomen During
Argument Over Money

Three Holland young men were held Monday under heavy bond on charges in connection with the shooting and wounding Saturday of a companion in the wake of an argument allegedly concerning payment for beer.

Hospitalized in satisfactory condition with a bullet wound of the abdomen is Jesse Lopez, 18, of 177 East Fifth St.

Held in lieu of bonds were Jose Rameriz, 20, of 34 East 16th St., Francisco Cuevas, 19, of 344 East Sixth St. and Baldeemar Castrita, 21, of 332 West 14th St. All demanded examination Sunday at their arraignment before District Court Judge Gerald Van Wyke.

Rameriz, charged with assault with intent to commit murder, was held in lieu of \$30,000. Cuevas, charged with aiding and abetting in assault with intent to commit murder, and Castrita, charged with felonious assault, were held under \$20,000 bond each.

Police said the trio and a fourth man, not charged, were apprehended at a road block at M-40 and M-89 in Allegan County about two hours after the shooting was reported at 5:30 p.m. Police said the four gave themselves up to Allegan County sheriff's deputies and Allegan police without resistance.

A .25-caliber automatic pistol and a .22-caliber rifle were recovered from the car, police said.

Holland police said Lopez had been wounded by a slug fired from a .25-caliber automatic pistol. A spent shell casing was recovered from the yard of a home at 27 West 17th St. where the shooting occurred during a party.

Police said an argument developed allegedly over payment for beer. About seven persons at the home were involved in the argument when Lopez, standing about ten feet from Rameriz, was wounded when a gun was discharged.

Officers said a neighbor moving his grass reported hearing voices and what sounded like a shot but thought the group was playing with a weapon firing blanks until he spotted a subject clutching his stomach.

Police said the neighbor reported seeing three subjects get into a car and speed away. Police said the car matched the description of the one stopped at the road block which was registered to and driven by Cuevas.

Court Cases Processed

GRAND HAVEN — Several persons appeared in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday for arraignment or disposition of their cases.

Gerald James Koning, 18, Grand Rapids, demanded examination on a charge of breaking and entering at a service station in Holland July 23. His \$3,000 bond was reduced to \$1,000.

James Schock Jr., Saugatuck, charged with carrying a concealed weapon at Holland State Park, was put on probation for three years and ordered to pay \$150 costs.

Roger Jay Sarver, 19, Grand Rapids, also charged with breaking into a service station at Holland, failed to appear. His \$1,000 bond was forfeited and a bench warrant authorized.

Marvin Wiersma, 42, of 244 College Ave., Holland, pleaded guilty to a charge of uttering and publishing. The alleged offense took place in Park township.

Leroy DuShane, 23, of 693 Ottawa Beach Rd., Holland, pleaded not guilty to a charge of larceny from a building in Park township May 11. Date for trial will be set later.

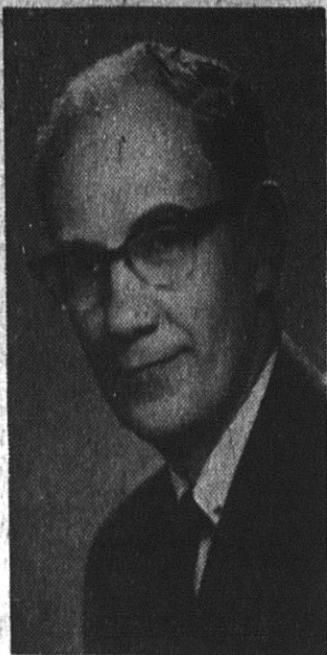
Glenn Man Is Injured

GLENN Charles Shiley 72, was critically injured Tuesday when he tried to ride in his cable car between his home on a 100-foot lake-side cliff and the Lake Michigan shore, the cable broke and the car crashed 50 feet to the beach.

State Police said he suffered a skull fracture, facial fractures, lacerations and possible chest injuries. He was in critical condition in South Haven Hospital.

State Police said the cable car was traveling about 60-70 miles an hour when it reached the ground.

State Police said Shiley had been repairing a water pump and was about half way up the hill when the cable snapped, sending the car back down.

White said some of the migrants were living in their cars. He said the Aid to Dependent Children (ADC) caseload was about 150 higher now than in January and direct relief assistance was about 125 higher than last year.

JAMESTOWN — Barbara Ten Have, 21, of 2474 Riley St., Jamestown, was fatally injured in a single car accident at 6:36 a.m. Friday in front of 1814 Van Buren Road, Georgetown Township.

The 20th traffic fatality in Ottawa County this year, Miss Ten Have died of massive internal injuries about two hours after being taken to Butterworth Hospital, Grand Rapids, where she was employed as a technician working with respiratory and cardiac patients.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies said Miss Ten Have alone in the car, was traveling east on Van Buren when the vehicle went off the roadway, came back onto the roadway and went off again, hitting a tree. Deputies said she was thrown from the vehicle which traveled 600 feet from the time it first left the road until it struck the tree.

A family spokesman said Miss Ten Have was enroute to work at the hospital when the mishap occurred.

She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hollis Ten Have of Jamestown and a graduate of Hudsonville High School. She attended Central Michigan University.

Survivors include the parents and a brother, Louis, and sister Nancy, at home.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Aug. 16
Pride and Arrogance
Genesis 11:1-9
By C. P. Dame

In times past man was proud and showed it. Pride is still here and does much hurt in our world. Have you noted that the Bible highly exalts humility? This lesson teaches the truth that pride separates a man from God and from his fellow men.

1. Disobedience is an old sin. Adam and Eve disobeyed God and He drove them from the garden. God told Adam and Eve to "multiply and replenish the earth and subdue it;" and after the flood God told Noah's family to be "fruitful, and multiply; bring forth abundantly in the earth and multiply therein." Instead of scattering, the people wanted to congregate and live together and pool their resources.

The people then talked the same language. This suggests that they were descendants of one couple. When the people came to Shinar, which is another name for Babylonia, they resolved to settle there. First they built houses for themselves. Since stones were scarce in that part of the country they made bricks from the white clay which abounded in that region. After they had built their own houses they planned to do something novel and big. They were ambitious.

"And they said, Go to, let us build a city and a tower— they had aims. Today we live in an urban culture. People move from rural communities into cities and sometimes after that back to the city again. The people planned to build a tower "whose top may reach unto heaven." Why? They wanted to make a name for themselves. Pride ruled their hearts. Now pride can be a lovely thing but it can also be a base. We can be justly proud of our heritage, our freedom, of young people who love the Lord, and of noble achievements wrought for God's glory. The Pharisee whom Jesus portrayed was proud in the wrong way.

In all their planning they ignored God. Today we talk about secularism. This story shows that long ago people were secularly minded. God's will did not count in the lives of the tower builders of the past and at present God is ignored wholly in the lives of millions.

"I. God sometimes steps in. And the Lord came down to see the city and the tower which the children of men had built." He disliked it. God is interested in what people are doing. God saw the mad ambition of the people who were united in race, language and purpose and were capable of doing bigger things. God determined to stop them in their planning and building. God said, "Come, let us go down, and there confuse their language, that they may not understand one another's speech." The people could not communicate for they could not understand each other. All cooperation ended. One of the problems of our time is the inability of people to communicate with each other. Christ unites people. Our world needs Him.

Gerrit and John Butth helped us in selecting two classes of Holstein cows for our members to judge and we did one class of Guernsey cows at the Henry Modderman farm. Cliff Allen acted as our official judge and instructor. Cliff is a 4-H leader of the Star 4-H Club and has been conducting the dairy program this summer. From the 20 members present when we met last week, we are now inviting seven to participate in another contest Aug. 17 to select four members to represent Ottawa County as our dairy judging team to the state. The next big event on the schedule for 4-H members, parents and leaders will be the Hudsonville fair. This will be held the week of Aug. 24 to 29. They left Tuesday, 40 Japanese students, who for ten day have enlivened the homes of as nearly as many local families. Laden with Dionne Warwick records, Hope College sweatshirts and other mementoes of life in the United States, they boarded buses this morning for the West Coast where they will leave by plane for Japan on Aug. 30.

They left behind memories of soft voices and polite phrases and infectious giggles. Living neatly and compactly out of suitcases, they confessed to the universal adolescent trait, messy rooms at home.

Most of them bravely ate what was put before them, and some expressed enthusiasm for "Sugah Creep" and other breakfast foods. They were initiated into the American rite of the backyard barbecue and shopping in the supermarket.

They also left many gifts. Bright origami (paper folding) birds, animals and other figures in metallic paper and gifts of Japanese origin, including souvenirs of Expo '70 in Osaka.

But the most precious gift was their rapt attention and intelligent questions which caused many to pause and think about themselves, their lives and what they stand for in the world.

Because they asked questions about the primary election, many hosts took time to go and vote, and even thought a little about why and for whom they were voting.

An anniversary passed while they were here, the 25th year since the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Most of them weren't born yet, nor were the children in the homes here with whom they seemed to have so much in common.

To many who remember the state of the world 25 years ago, their presence in their homes was a triumph of the human spirit over all that divides, or seeks to divide the world.

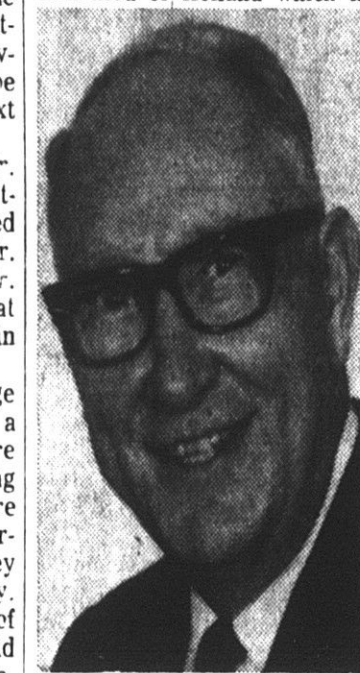

Grassland, Trees Blackened by Fire

Fire Monday blackened an estimated 200 acres of grassland and trees between Stanton and Fillmore streets in what Port Sheldon Township fire chief Wells Penna said was the worst grass fire in five years.

Firemen were called back Tuesday when sparks in dry grass and pine needles flared south of Fillmore St. near the western edge of the fire damaged area.

Penna said sparks from a passing train along C & O Railway tracks apparently touched

off the blaze Monday and winds carried the flames westward over a small hill and into grassland and stands of pine trees. Firemen from several departments responded to the fire call shortly before 2 p.m. and remained on the scene for about five hours. Men and equipment from the townships of Port Sheldon, Holland, Grand Haven and Olive Blenden were aided by units from Grand Haven city and the Department of Natural Resources.

The DNR sent two bulldozers for use in cutting fire breaks

and two four-wheeled drive trucks.

Penna said winds sent flames high into some of the tinder-dry pine trees where crown fires leaped from tree-top to tree-top.

A fire break in a small clearing aided firemen in containing the flames. No injuries were reported and no buildings were on the property damaged by fire.

Penna said plat books showed the land owned by the U.S. Government and three private parties.

Area residents joined firemen in battling the grass and tree fire while others kept the fire fighters supplied with cool drinks.

Arrangements are being made for garbage and refuse pickup and for having a frontend loader to move the roasted steer to the rotisserie.

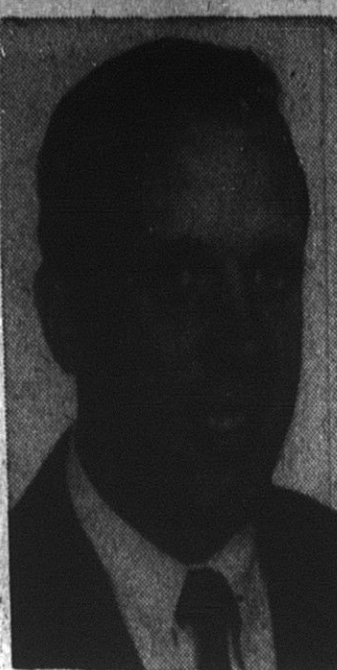

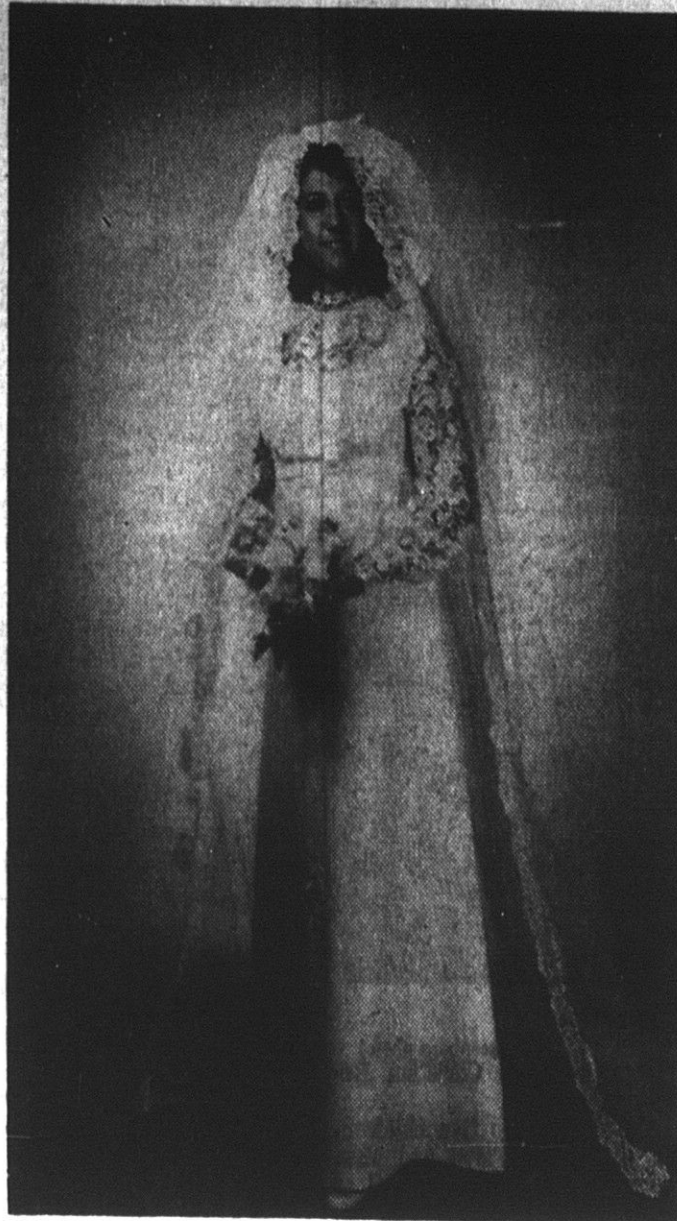

Seek to Save Beauty Of Our County Roads

At a meeting of the Michigan Nature Association held Saturday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. William O. Swett of 3153 Lake Shore Ave., efforts to designate certain local county roads in Michigan as natural beauty roads were described by Miss Bertha Daubendiek of Saginaw, executive secretary-treasurer, and Dick Holzman, president.

The meeting was well-attended by year-round and summer residents interested in obtaining the protected status of a new classification of roads voted by the Michigan legislature under PA 1970, No. 150, effective August 1, 1970.

Under this act, 25 land owners in a township can petition the Ottawa County Road Commission (or any road commission in the state) to designate any county local road, or portion of one, as a natural beauty road of Michigan. This will protect the road from cutting down of trees, widening, spraying of wild flowers, bushes, etc. After the designation, no changes can be made along the road without a public hearing being held in advance.

Miss Daubendiek said that petitions are already under way in ten counties of the state. In one township in Oakland county, north of Rochester, a township association is attempting to have their roads set aside under the protected status, and others are petitioning for roads in Presque Isle, Alpena, Jackson, St. Clair, Macomb, and other southern counties. It is expected many sand trail roads in the north will receive the special designation upon request of owners who wish to retain their unique qualities.

As a result of interest shown at the Holland meeting, Ottawa county may be one of the first counties in this part of the State to get started on the designations.

A number of roads were discussed as possibilities.

It was suggested by a member of Michigan Nature Association, in designating these roads, that the Association should meet with the Ottawa County Planning Committee which has had

a land use study made for Ottawa County for recreation, bicycle trails, low speed roads, and the preservation of the ecological character of the county.

Cited was the recent cutting of trees at the end of Riley Street, etc. This road and others leading to public frontage on Lake Michigan will be petitioned for, and the Riley destruction of trees and shrubs will be asked to be restored. This designation does not mean that the roads will be closed to the public. It is for the preservation of trees and natural beauty.

Next day, members and friends of the Michigan Nature Association toured Ottawa county and proved that there is still much natural beauty left along its roads. They especially commended the Ottawa County Road Commission for leaving a portion of M-21 north of Hudsonville untouched by mowing.

"This road, which because of power lines and other scenic pollution, we nominate for the ugliest road in Michigan, was considerably brightened by the presence of a profusion of colorful autumn flowers, growing naturally between the railroad and the west edge of M-21, and spared by the mower. Jewel weed, Joe Pye weed and many others flourish luxuriantly and create the best and least maintenance free cover and add a spark of color to an otherwise drab roadside."

One road slated to be petitioned a natural beauty road, was found to have been recently ditched, wild roses destroyed, and cardinal flower uprooted, with two plants bravely still in full bloom at the gravel edge of the road. On the other side, a cardinal flower produced a riot of color, while a goldfinch only feet away was a real showstopper as it perched, picking thistleseed from a thistle on our roadside stage.

Petition forms and suggestions for designating of roads, as well as a copy of the law, may be obtained from Mrs. Swett, 3153 Lake Shore Ave., who will coordinate the roads in Ottawa County.

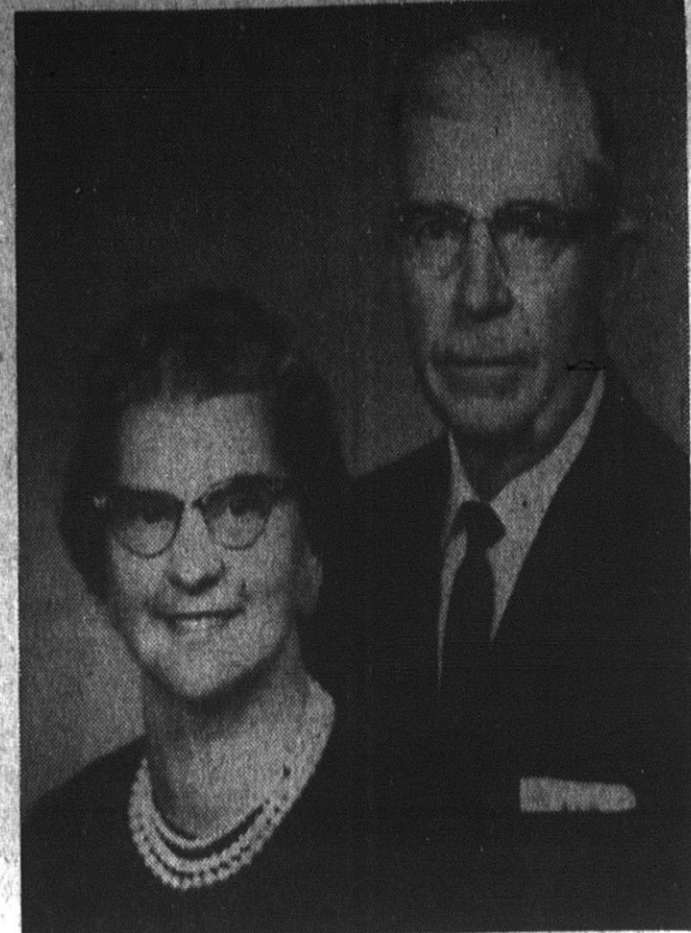

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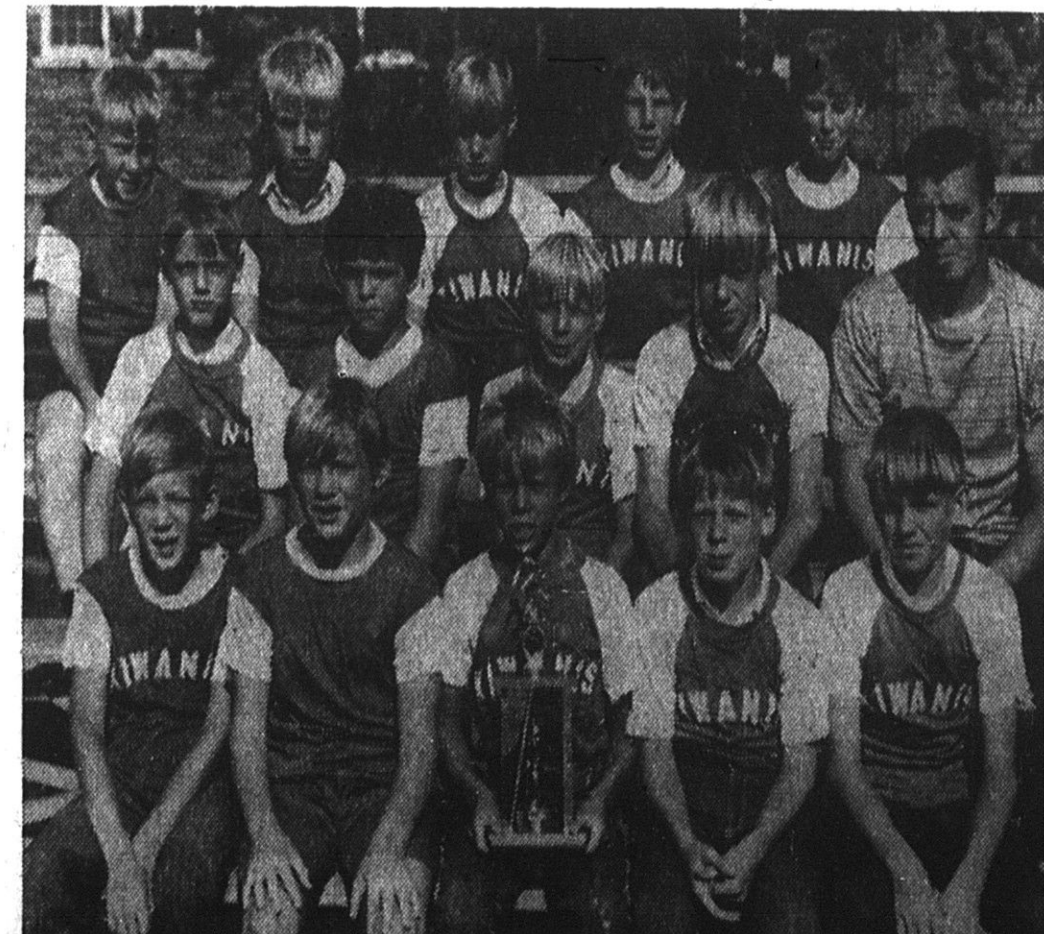
