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West Ottawa Board Mulls Finances

School finances were discussed at the monthly meeting of the West Ottawa Board of Education Monday night, ranging from deficits to possible implications of President Nixon's wage freeze.

Treasurer Gordon Scheerhorn reported that the school year opened July 1 with a deficit of \$28,735, of which \$24,000 resulted from the governor's executive order in April reducing state aid two per cent. The balance covered some 10 minor items.

He said July receipts made it possible for the district to meet all obligations and payrolls on time without borrowing. He did add, however, that the district would have to borrow up to \$300,000 to finance early operations before tax income is received in January. Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte said some other districts collect taxes early and also collect interest while some districts like West Ottawa collect taxes late and pay interest.

The administration is consulting attorneys on possible effects of Nixon's wage-price freeze on school operations. All contracts and salaries were determined well before July 1, and the school district has been operating its summer program under the 1971-72 year.

West Ottawa board expects to adopt its 1971-72 budget in October after final enrollment figures and state aid are determined. Meanwhile, it is operating on a guideline budget adopted last May to determine millage needs and the like.

Contracts were approved for four teachers, Helen Norlin, Phyllis Bocks, Judi Hansen, all elementary, and Nancy Orr, secondary.

The board approved low bid of Bareman's Dairy at a cost of \$6.069 per half pint. Next low bid was Dairy Maid at \$6.061.

After second reading, the board adopted a suspension-expulsion policy, the result of two years of study by staff and attorneys. The policy provides for a short term suspension up to three days, a long term suspension to 10 days and permanent expulsion. Long time suspensions may be appealed to the superintendent. The policy also provides for a procedure for appealing expulsions to the Board of Education.

Supt. Van Raalte pointed out that the suspension-expulsion policy is not to be confused with the school code of conduct. The complete policy plus a code of conduct will be made available to all students in handbooks.

High School Principal Duane Hooker reported on remodeling in the high school and installation of equipment in the type-writing room which allows up to 60 students to learn typing at their own speed under the direction of one teacher and an aide. Other remodeling includes accommodations for a pilot program for some 150 sixth, seventh and eighth graders, for use when the new middle school is completed. This includes some 40 sixth graders from Pine Creek School which is overcrowded.

The school year opens Tuesday, Sept. 7, with a full day in all schools. Supt. Van Raalte said he is asking all newcomers to the district and those who have moved to new locations in the district to call the administrative office immediately so that plans may be made for transportation.

A three-day teacher orientation starts Tuesday, Aug. 31.


Miss Patricia Young Is Engaged to Gordon De Roo

GVSC Study Continues On River Basin

ALLENDALE — The mastodon and giant elk once roamed the area, hunters with fluted point arrows camped on its river banks, and the climate was perhaps more like that of James Bay, Canada. The environment, topography, and cultures dating back 12,000 years or more are now known only through sparse remaining clues.

While there's still time—before man further levels the river's terraces for construction and roads, before more kettle holes and rolling hills fall to housing developments—Grand Valley State College professors and students are attempting to reconstruct the rich past in hopes of creating documented keys to the future of the Grand River Basin.

This summer is no exception to work in the long process of reconstruction. Twenty-three GVSC anthropology, environmental science and sociology majors are enrolled in a new five-week "Environments and Cultures of the Grand River Basin" course taught jointly by College of Arts and Sciences professors Frederick Bevis, biological and environmental sciences department, and Dr. Richard Flanders, anthropology.

Soil samples are examined in laboratories; discussions, research and field trips from Owasco to Grand Haven center in glacial history, climatic changes and vegetation succession; ecological changes in the river itself are traced through clam shells brought from the bottom; and, bits of pottery and bone from archaeological "digs" are forming a montage of the life of earlier inhabitants of the river's banks.

The broad search for clues continues and in the fall such specific documentations as a full land - form evaluation of the Grand River Basin in Kent and Ottawa counties, and the first complete record of cultural occupation of the river banks will add further chapters to man's knowledge and future planning in his western Michigan environment.

New Parking Plan Gets Council Nod

City Council was briefed Wednesday night on recent developments on the proposed downtown parking program following two meetings with the Downtown Merchants Association and property owners and tenants in the central business district. The program involves validated parking at attendant lots and some revision in parking rates.

City Manager William L. Bopf presented the following courses of action which council approved:

1. Authorization to expend up to \$750 from parking meter fund for parking meter tokens.
2. Begin negotiations to purchase a storage type parking lot north of Seventh St. east of Central Ave.
3. Convert city-owned lot on south side of Seventh St. east of River Ave. into an attendant lot.

4. Negotiate with owners of several leased lots toward establishing second attendant parking lot.
5. Amend parking meter ordinance to provide for revising parking meter charges to five cents for half hour and 10 cents per hour on all metered lots; establish rate of 10 cents for each hour for first two hours in attended lots and 20 cents for each hour thereafter; eliminate all penny parking meters with exception of the post office; effective July 1, 1972, eliminate all non-revenue parking lots from parking meter fund; establish charge of 50 cents for all-day parking in city's storage lot; revise parking fine to \$1, with Council appropriating an amount equal to parking fines to the Parking Meter Fund.

Bopf recommended that the steps be taken immediately but that parking meter increases and fine charges be deferred until the President's general wage and price freeze is lifted.

In a separate report, Bopf cited four instances where city personnel have saved considerable money for the taxpayers the last three months in connection with the parking study report, fire department model, financial prospectus for bond sales, and demolition of sub-standard houses.

On recommendation of the city manager, Council granted permission to the Vogelzang Co. to construct a cedar shake facade on the former John Good building on West Eighth St. which will protrude four feet into the right of way well above pedestrian height. The permission is in the form of a revocable license.

Council set Sept. 8 as date for public hearing on a water main in Dartmouth Ave. from Harvard Dr. to Paw Paw Dr. Estimated cost was listed at \$3,733.63.

Cost agreements with the State Highway Commission for revised signalization and in some instances new signals in connection with the one-way street system in the central business district were authorized.

This affects signals at Eighth and Columbia, Seventh and College, Seventh and River, Ninth and River, Ninth and Pine, and Seventh and Pine. The proposed one-way system also contains revisions for one-way west on Seventh from Pine Ave. to Mill St. and one-way south on Pine Ave. from Ninth to 10th Sts.

The recommendation also includes improvements for signals on US-31 bypass at 16th St. where cables have been sagging. Improvements also will involve repositioning of some poles. The city will pay 25 per cent, the county 25 per cent and the state 50 per cent.

Councilman John Bloemendaal was appointed delegate and Al Kleis Jr. alternate delegate to the Michigan Municipal League convention Sept. 24 at Mackinac Island. Councilman Donald D. Oosterbaan also will be attending. City Manager Bopf who will attend appointed Roger Stroh of the Environmental Health Department to function as acting city manager in his absence.

Bopf also reported on an agreement with the State Highway Department granting the city permission to allow flow of city emanated storm water into the Washington Ave. storm drain originally designed for US-31 storm water purposes. Permission will be temporary and the city is obligated to remove its storm water, should additional capacity be needed by the highway department.

Called to Grass Fire

Holland firemen were summoned to a grass fire along 48th St. near the industrial park area at 9:06 p.m. Wednesday. No damage was reported.

Car Rolls Into Drainage Ditch Injuring Driver

James J. Kornoele, 29, of 1500 West Lakewood Blvd., suffered multiple bumps and bruises when the car he was driving north along Blue Star Highway went out of control 250 feet south of Washington Ave. at 1 a.m. today and rolled over.

Kornoele was treated at Holland Hospital and released.

Holland police said the car left the edge of the roadway, entered a drainage ditch and rolled onto its top and skidded until it struck a ditch at Washington Ave.

The car spun around and rolled again, crossing southbound Washington Ave. striking a stop sign and coming to rest in a field.

The car traveled a total distance of 236 feet 11 inches.

Kornoele told police a dog ran into the path of his car.

GVSC Names Theater For 'Satchmo'

GLEN LAKE — Grand Valley State College's Board of Control met here Friday and honored the memory of one of America's most admired goodwill ambassadors and greatest musicians in naming the studio theater of GVSC's new Fine Arts Center the "Louis Armstrong Theatre." The building, and its 500-seat theater are scheduled for completion in September.

In other action, the Board approved appointment of Harold M. Kolenbrander of Jenison as assistant to the president. Kolenbrander holds the BA degree from Central College, Pella, Iowa, and the PhD degree from the University of Iowa. Prior to joining GVSC's administrative staff he was professor of chemistry at Central College.

During 1969-70, he was visiting scientist in biochemistry at Case Western Reserve University. He is author of numerous scientific papers and is a member of professional societies including the American Chemical Society and Sigma Xi.

GVSC assistant to the president, Bruce A. Loessin, is currently on leave from the college, continuing work toward the PhD degree at the University of Michigan.

Grand Valley's Board of Control also approved a number of promotions at the college including David H. Doebel of Spring Lake from acting director to director of audio-video services; Kenneth Fridsma, Allendale, from director of financial aid and placement to director of financial aid and placement and coordinator of student services; Merle Hoyte, Allendale, to counselor I, counseling and mental health services; David Lorenz, Hudsonville, from assistant to associate dean of student life and director of housing; and Dr. Robert H. Response Slow in New Counseling

Response has not been overwhelming during the first month of operation in the Holland office of Credit Counseling Centers Inc., but Kerry Thayer of the Grand Rapids CCC branch explained to the advisory committee at a luncheon Thursday in Hotel Warm Friend that "people in trouble" usually are unfamiliar with a counseling and debt management organization that is nonprofit and community supported.

The new nonprofit community service was established earlier this summer by Holland Jaycees and provides counseling, debt management and rehabilitation to families in financial difficulty. An office has been established above the Model Drug Store at 33-35 West Eighth St., and Thayer is available Thursdays on an appointment basis. Appointments may be made by calling the counseling office on Thursdays or Community Action House at any time.

Thayer told the advisory committee that in the few cases which had been processed creditors involved were most cooperative after the new program had been explained.

Jack Van Lierie was named chairman of the advisory committee. Other members are Lamont R. Fineout of First Michigan Bank and Trust Co., John J. Slenk of Holland Central Credit Union, Lawrence Hildore of the Department of Social Services, the Rev. Darwin R. Salisbury of First United Methodist Church, William Clay of Louis Padnos Iron and Metal Co. and William Coupe, Attorney. Irwin Korterling was named vice chairman.

The counseling service is presently on a one-day basis in Holland for a six-month period and Jaycees are financing the service for this period. Thayer expressed hopes that other organizations would support the program and eventually it could become self supporting.

He defined Credit Counseling Centers Inc. as "a nonprofit organization concerned with financial service of the family." The fee is determined by counselors in accordance with the debtor's ability to pay, in no case running over \$3.55 a week. The counseling service itself is free with these costs absorbed by the community. As a nonprofit corporation, contributions are tax exempt. Thayer said the primary objective is "not necessarily to get people out of debt but to teach them to handle money."

CCC with headquarters in Southfield was started in 1968 to meet social economic problems of the family in financial distress due to indebtedness and poor money management. There are branches in Muskegon and Grand Rapids.

Child Injured In Car-Bike Mishap



City to Abide By Executive Wage Freeze

The city of Holland will abide by the wage-price freeze during the period covered by the Aug. 15 Presidential announcement, City Council was informed Wednesday night.

City Manager William L. Bopf said administrative personnel of the four operating divisions of the city have met to review the scope of purpose of the executive order.

A statement signed by City Manager Bopf, Hospital Director Frederick S. Burd, BPW Supt. Guy E. Bell and Library Director Roger Walcott, states "The freeze on wages will apply to all wages with no exceptions, including but not limited to merit increases, seniority increases, probationary increases, etc. Work performance will continue to be reviewed, but wage increases will be held in abeyance until such time as the wage and price freeze is terminated and will not be retroactive to a prior date."

"Rates for city services will be maintained at present levels during the period of the executive order and all purchases of materials and services by the city of Holland are to be critically reviewed for compliance with the price freeze order."

Model on Display

The model of the city's downtown district which fire department employees spent two months making was placed today in the city treasurer's office on the first floor of City Hall for public viewing. The model was presented to City Council Wednesday night by John Du Mez, representing city firemen.

Howard William Mammen, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Mammen, of Holland, has been granted a Master of Science degree in physics from Wichita State University, Wichita, Kans.

City Council Given Scale Model of City

At a one-hour meeting Wednesday night, City Council processed a substantial amount of business ranging from applications for rezoning to routine measures. Mayor Pro Tem Lou Hallacy presided in the absence of Mayor L. W. Lamb Jr. who is vacationing in Europe.

A particularly pleasant item was the presentation of a scale model of downtown Holland which had been designed and constructed by firemen in off hours the last two months. The presentation was made by John Du Mez and the model nearly filled the alcove in the elevated area of council chambers.

Du Mez said the effort represented approximately 300 man hours. Councilman Morris Peerbolt said newspaper pictures did not do the model justice and City Manager William L. Bopf said the flexibility of the model in that structures could be removed and replaced will prove particularly valuable to the Planning Commission. The model covers that area from Sixth to 10th Sts. running from Lincoln to Maple Aves.

Mayor Pro Tem Hallacy accepted the model on behalf of Council, stating the efforts of the firemen were greatly appreciated.

A letter from Holland township requesting a meeting between city staff and township engineers to discuss possibilities of the city providing wastewater treatment for the township was referred to the Board of Public Works.

A request from the GI Forum Club requesting permission to use a house at 245 East Ninth St. as a clubhouse was not approved since residential zoning does not permit such use, adding that the proposed use would be allowed in a commercially zoned district.

Council approved hospital board leases for the rental of property at 598 Maple Ave. to H. Edmund Matthews at \$125 a month and 168 West 24th St. to Rilliam Bremer for \$170 a month.

On recommendation of the Planning Commission, Council denied an application from Abe Severson and Hugh Harper to rezone adjoining parcels of 14.7 and 10.76 acres respectively on the east side of Graafschap Rd. just south of the city cemetery at 32nd St. from A-0 one-family residential to A-3 residential.

An application from T. G. Hudson for rezoning 4.6 acres of land at 1115 South Lincoln Ave. from agricultural to highway commercial was referred back to the Planning Commission after Hudson's attorney, Ron Dalman, presented new sketches of proposed operations which include gas pumps but not a filling station as such.

Council approved a revised proposal for rezoning some properties on the east side of Ottawa Ave. between 31st and 40th Sts. calling for A-1 one family residential to A-2 one and two family residential. The recommendation of the Planning Commission also included areas west of Ottawa Ave. but this area was removed when City Manager Bopf suggested more study on utility services. A public hearing on the modified proposal was set for Sept. 8.

Council approved low bid of R. E. Barber Inc. of \$3,343.83 for a police car to replace one recently demolished in a roadblock. City Manager Bopf said it is anticipated that the insurance company that represents the other driver will allow approximately \$2,200 for the damaged police car. There are sufficient funds in the budget to make up the difference, but it is expected that when bids are taken for 1972 police cars, a transfer of funds will be necessary.

Council approved a resolution on the city's intent to issue bonds on paving and sewer public improvements which were approved recently.

Council confirmed a certification from Mayor Lamb for purchases by cemetery, park and engineering departments from Lamb Inc. totaling \$236.38.

Claims against the city from Harold Hulsman, 315 West 125th St.; Ralph J. Oldenburger, 309 West 11th St., and Byrn Douma, 272 West 29th St., were referred to the insurance carrier.

A city clerk report on public sale of surplus items from police and fire departments consisting mainly of old beds and unclaimed bicycles resulted in nine bids for a total of \$66.55. On recommendation of the city manager, other items will be donated to a charitable organization serving needy persons in the community and non-acceptable items will be taken to the landfill.

The invocation was given by Councilman Peerbolt. All members were present except Mayor Lamb.

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GOP Leader Criticizes Milliken

Anthony J. Garofalo of Holland, who was elected chairman of the Ottawa County Republican Party last January, has written a letter to Gov. William Milliken in Lansing, criticizing his moderate stand on current issues and scoring him for lack of support for President Nixon on all issues except revenue sharing.

In the letter dated Aug. 13, Garofalo told the governor that Republicans in Ottawa county will gladly give money for local expenses but not to Lansing, mainly because of the campaign debt of Lenore Romney and other candidates which have been added to the already growing debt of the Republican party.

(Republican leadership in Ottawa county changed from moderate to conservative in January, 1969, when Joel Ver Plank of Holland succeeded Joyce Hatton of Grand Haven. Ver Plank served as chairman two years and Garofalo has been chairman the past eight months. In the three years, many so-called moderates have chosen to make contributions direct to candidates instead of through county channels.)

Excerpts from Garofalo's letter to Milliken:

"You have not supported President Nixon with the exception of revenue sharing. You have not supported Vice President Agnew at any time. Lt. Gov. Brickley has not supported Attorney General Mitchell, Vice President Agnew or President Nixon. I am not saying one should support a fellow Republican just because he is a Republican. What I am saying is President Nixon, Vice President Agnew, Senator Dole and Attorney General Mitchell can't be wrong every time they issue a policy statement. Conversely, you can't be right every time you issue a statement.

"Republicans in Ottawa county are hard-working, grass roots, loyal and understanding people. This is the type of person who has made Ottawa county such a Republican stronghold... We did support

Barry Goldwater; we did support Richard Nixon, we did carry Ottawa county for Lenore Romney and we will always support Republicans as long as they are true Republicans. I won't support Republicans who ask for increases in welfare payments; I won't support Republicans who increase taxes without a decrease in spending, and I will not support anyone who does not listen to the voters and members of his own party in the Senate and House.

"Your position on the graduated income tax is not a favorable one with the vast majority of Republicans. Even members of your own party in the House and Senate are against it. Your so-called 'ceiling' on property taxes would increase Ottawa county's tax by some four or five mills. All this to a graduated income tax and how can you say our taxes will be decreased."

Garofalo's letter also probed the background of the conservative element, particularly the impact of the conservative party on the 1972 senatorial race. He also was pleased with Mayor Lindsay's switch to the Democrats, crediting him for having the backbone to admit he is a Democrat because he cannot support President Nixon's policy.

In general, Garofalo's letter adds another note to the historical political picture of Ottawa county which in recent years has produced GOP majorities which were the envy of Republicans throughout the state.



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THE UNEXPECTED

The announcement of President Nixon setting forth broad changes in our economic policy has certainly caught the nation by surprise.

For some time columnists of all shades have been telling us that they understood the President so thoroughly that they could give us a blow by blow description of what was coming next. But things haven't worked out that way at all. And if one thing stands out, it is that the President is quite a pragmatist and hardly follows any particular line.

Contrary to what was expected, the President decided to open up conversations with Red China and to make a trip to talk things over with the Chinese. This certainly caught those who said they understood Mr. Nixon with their pens raised high and no ink.

In the last weeks there has been a constant barrage telling us that Mr. Nixon would make no changes on the economic front. Now he has scooped the whole country with changes that were far beyond what one would have expected from other candidates committed to wage and price controls, and new methods of combating inflation. Mr. Nixon has taken bold action, and doesn't seem to have given much thought to the notion that he should be consistent with past policies. He has shown himself unusually flexible and willing to change directions. It will be interesting to note how this new turn of events will be accepted by the nation, and what changes this will bring about in the economic affairs of the world. It might also be interesting to note whether some of our columnists will be more careful in telling us that they understand Mr. Nixon.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Aug. 22
Alcohol and Society
Amos 6:1-8

Alcoholism is a subject that ought to get much more attention than it is getting today in view of all the problems it creates in families, communities and the nation. The problem is old but it is more intense now than formerly, seeing that we live in a technical age. Alcoholism is one of the nation's gravest problems.

I. False security is dangerous. We studied about Amos a short time ago. Amos lived and made his living in Judah, but God sent him to preach in Israel. Through his travels he learned of Israel's condition. The leaders lived in Zion, that is Jerusalem, and in Samaria, both capital cities—one of Judah, the other of Israel—and they were a proud lot and felt real secure and lived in ease.

Poor leadership is costly both in church and in state. Assyria was growing in power and it was drawing nearer to Israel. Several cities near Israel had already fallen to the enemy, but the leaders of God's people saw no danger and kept on living in ease and in luxury.

Times were good. Some people made lots of money and they knew how to spend it. They slept on beds of ivory, followed the latest fashions, ate the best food, feasted on lambs and calves, sang frivolous songs, drank bowls full of wine and lived luxuriously. These leaders were proud of their position and social status.

II. Alcoholism promotes selfishness. These leaders who got the best of things for themselves had no social conscience. The words, "but they are not grieved for the affliction of Joseph"—that is of the nation—revealed their indifference. Leaders in various walks of life make decisions. It is not safe to give the power of making decisions to people whose minds are dulled by liquor and whose consciences are stifled by selfishness.

The pleasure - mad leaders were a danger to the nation. In addition the Assyrians were drawing nearer and nearer. The nation had two enemies, one from within, one from without. America also has two enemies, alcoholism and communism. This lesson directs our minds to alcoholism.

What does alcoholism do to the nation? It undermines the health of people, contributes much unhappiness to homes, promotes poverty, is a big factor in accidents on the highways of the nation, and is responsible for much absenteeism, tardiness, sick leaves in business and mismanagement.

Some families serve liquor moderately in their homes and some believe in total abstinence. The latter attitude is the safer. The millions of alcoholics began as social drinkers but they became alcoholics and created problems for themselves and their families.





Heekhuis and Henry Venema of Holland City, Nellie Zwemer of Graafschap, Ralph Bloemendaal of Cedar Grove, Wis., John De Bruyn of Rochester, N. Y., Austin Harrington of Fillmore, Edward Hofma of Vriesland, Simon Hogenboom of Clymer, N. Y., John Lamer of Jenisonville, Albert Van Den Berg of South Holland, Ill., and Peter Wayenberg of Orange City, Iowa.

The 1883 program lists the 18th commencement of Hope College. Eight orations were given, followed by a master's oration, "Our Age's Need - Men With Positive Religious Convictions," by Abraham Stegeman of New Groningen. Other orations were given by Jacob Dyk of Grandville, Albert Oltmans of Grand Rapids, John A. Otte of Grand Rapids and Evert J. Blekkink of Oostburg, Wis.

Bos also has a Hope College catalogue for the year 1881-82.

"As yet, no tuition fees have been charged at the college, but every student must pay to the treasurer in advance an "incidental" fee of \$5 per term. The graduation fee is \$5 and the cost of the diploma."

The concluding clincher: "For books, clothing, washing, fuel, light, travel, etc., those interested can best make the estimates. The entire expenses need not exceed \$200 per annum."



Firemen Construct Model of Holland

Holland city firemen turned model builders the past few weeks.

A three dimensional model of the central business district, complete with markings for streets, sidewalks and removable buildings has been completed.

The model, on a four by eight foot base, will be used in formulating plans for parking lots, one way streets, a possible mall and changes in building placements.

The buildings are built to scale and the tallest structure, the Hotel Warm Friend, stands three inches high on the model. Smaller homes adjoining the business district are built to a larger scale than the business district buildings.

The model includes property from Maple to Lincoln Avenues from the south side of Sixth St. to the north side of 11th St.

City Manager William Bopf said firemen volunteered to build the model during their off-call time at the fire stations after it was suggested such a model would be helpful in future planning of the business district. Work was done from scale drawings of the business district. Construction began July 28 and plans call for the model was presented to the City Council Wednesday.

Bopf said such a model could cost as much as \$3,000 to \$5,000 if done by professional model builders, but he estimated the cost at a few hundred dollars

with the firemen doing the work.

Buildings in the model are painted coral while streets are gray, parking lots cream and the grass green. Buildings are made of plywood and white pine.

Plans call for the completed model to be displayed in City Council chambers initially and later put on display in the library or business establishments for public viewing.

The model is to be used as a continuing tool in the planning of the central business district, Bopf said.

Work on the individual buildings was done at the East Eighth St. fire station while the base was constructed at the new fire station at Waverly Rd. and 32nd St.





These systems are said to allow drivers to monitor the motoring environment to the rear of the vehicle. Specifically,

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
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New sanitary facilities at Kamp Kiwanis



A decades-long tradition at the Holland police station ends next month when issuance of motor vehicle operators licenses is discontinued. The state plans to assume the functions of issuing the drivers licenses Sept. 13.

Holland police said the cost of operation was not being met by reimbursements from the state. The licensing office on the second floor of the police station is manned by one full time and two part time employees plus a police officer used for road tests.

Police said the cost of the office operations in 1970 was \$16,000 with reimbursements amounting to \$14,186.

Marvin Nyman, manager of Secretary of State's regional office in Grand Rapids, said attempts were being made to locate permanent facilities in the metropolitan Holland area for a licensing bureau to serve the greater Holland area.
