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South Shore Suit Won By Citizens

City Ordered Not To
Levy Assessments
On Property Owners

GRAND HAVEN — Circuit Court Judge Harold Van Domelen of Hart has ruled against the City of Holland in the South Shore Dr. paving suit.

In an opinion filed Monday in Ottawa County Circuit Court, Van Domelen ordered the City of Holland not to levy an assessment for the proposed widening and paving of South Shore Dr. from Plasman Ave. to Old Orchard Rd.

The judge authorized an injunction against the city that they not levy an assessment for the improvement.

Plaintiff attorney James W. Bussard said he was "pleased with the outcome" and felt "that was the way it should have come out."

Plaintiffs had claimed the street improvement was not necessary and would have no benefit to the residents.

The offices of city attorney Jack Marquis, who represented the city in the two-day trial in July, said they had not received a copy of opinion from Judge Van Domelen.

Council To Appeal South Shore Ruling

Holland City Council Wednesday voted unanimously to appeal an Ottawa County Circuit Court opinion enjoining the city from levying assessments on South Shore Drive property owners for street improvements.

Council directed the city attorney to process an appeal with the Michigan Court of Appeals.

Deputy City Attorney John R. Marquis, who handled the city's case in the Circuit Court trial in July, said it was hoped the appeal "will clarify the issues involved... and provide a definitive analysis of the factors that this and other political subdivisions can and must look to in establishing assessment districts for street improvements."

In a written statement today Marquis said he felt the opinion by visiting Judge Harold Van Domelen did not give the city "any guidance as to what expert advice, opinions or information an assessing body can rely upon in the future in establishing special assessment districts."

He said municipalities and other political subdivisions have had difficulty in determining under what circumstances special assessments can be levied for street improvements, especially since a 1970 Michigan Supreme Court decision.

Marquis said both Grand Haven and Wyoming have been restrained by courts from levying street improvement special assessments which those cities felt met the tests laid down in the 1970 decision.

He added that the South Shore Dr. case "is not clearly controlled by prior appellate court cases."

Marquis, in the written statement, added that "this is the only court case which we have heard of or have been able to find in Michigan in which the original street was not widened to double width (two lanes to four lanes)."

The city had proposed installation of storm sewers, curb and gutters and widening the road generally to 28 feet from Plasman Ave., to Myrtle Ave., except at intersections where the width would be 36 feet, and then to 36 feet from Myrtle Ave. to Old Orchard Rd. The present road is about 22 feet wide.

Property owners argued the improvements would be of little or no benefit to them and asked that the street be returned to its original condition after a sanitary sewer was installed.

A letter from Paul Wabeke, one of several South Shore residents bringing suit against the city, pointed to what he termed "fair and equitable" terms of Judge Van Domelen's opinion and asked that council move immediately to restore South Shore Dr. to the condition it was in before the road was broken up for utility lines. The letter was received and filed and there was no further comment by council.

City Council Meets For 45 Minutes

Several routine matters were processed at a 45-minute meeting of City Council Wednesday night, one of the shortest meetings in recent months. All Council members were present at the meeting over which Mayor L.W. Lamb Jr. presided.

Council accepted with pleasure a \$100,000 check for Herick Public Library from the estate of Ray W. Herick of Tecumseh. The money will be invested as suggested by the donor and Council voted to express its appreciation to members of the Herick family for the generous gift.

There was only brief discussion at a public hearing on a no-wake zone in Lake Macatawa from Myrtle to Grove Ave. in Central Park, the residents having met earlier and reaching agreement on the request. It appears that residents east and west of the area do not desire a no-wake zone but have no objection to a no-wake zone in that short distance. Mayor Lamb commented he wished more such groups would get together and reach agreement on problems of this sort. The request for the no-wake zone will be forwarded to the Department of Natural Resources.

Certifications were confirmed for Mayor Lamb, park, cemetery and engineering departments, \$709.46, and Councilman Peerbolt, Peerbolt's Inc., City Hall, \$20.

On the purchase of four new trucks for the street department, Council approved low bids of International Harvester for a 39,000 GVW with eductor, \$26,328.60, and R.E. Barber Ford for 10,000 GVW with tailgate lift, \$4,128. Since some bids on the other two trucks did not meet specifications, Council tabled action until the next meeting.

A city manager recommendation to transfer some accounts to First Michigan and Trust Co. of Zeeland was tabled until the next meeting. Since banks are named as depositories for several bonding accounts for the city, study will be made into legal implications.

A city clerk's report certified the official vote of the one-way street recall of Aug. 7, listing 3,187 votes in favor of one-way streets and 2,393 opposed. Council awarded bid for furniture for several offices in City Hall to Doubleday Bros. Inc. (Steelcase) for \$2,478.54. A total of three bids were received.

Council accepted sole bid of Bert Reimink for installing a new boiler and related equipment in Netherlands museum. Specifications had been sent to 12 heating contractors but the Reimink bid was the only one received. It listed \$3,675.

Tabled until next regular meeting was the city manager's recommendation that the first four parking meters on the south side of 10th St. west of River Ave., to be moved and that a "left turn only" lane be created for eastbound traffic on 10th St. at River Ave.

Council granted a request from the superintendent of utilities for a month's extension of the BPW budget submittal date. The previous date was Feb. 15. The city manager added that proposed personnel requests should be submitted by Dec. 1.

The city manager reported that the fire department will accept the labor mediator's recommendation for employment agreement applicable to all fulltime fire department personnel with the exception of the chief and his deputy. The agreement includes a 4 per cent general increase and a longevity pay plan.

Council approved a city manager recommendation to obtain an option from the owner of the Reed Tire Shop property on West Seventh St. for additional offstreet parking.

Approval was given requests from Sid Koster for water service to a new duplex he is constructing at 368-370 Lane Ave., off East 16th St. in Holland township, and sanitary sewer service to 339 East 16th St., also in Holland township. Both are subject to provisions whereby the owner pays an amount equal to city taxes, plus 100 per cent of the water service charge and construction charges.

Council retained the services of the law firm of Dickinson, Wright, McKean and Cudlip as bond counsel to act on behalf of the city with respect to a number of sanitary sewer, water and paving projects.

Approval was given the following bids for microfilm equipment: Commercial Equipment Co., dual lens reader for engineering applications, \$435, also 13,000 microfilm jackets, \$1,323.50; Commercial Equipment Co., SM 703 reader/printer for police department, \$1,275, and security cabinets and attendant accessories, not to exceed \$1,650.

Hospital Rates Up in Holland

Effective at midnight Monday, rate increases went into effect at Holland Hospital calling generally for a boost of \$3.50 to \$4.50 per day.

Rate increases had been approved by board action previously but could not be implemented as of July 1 because of the price freeze on phase III. These restrictions have now been lifted.

Holland Hospital has many categories and rates for various services. Rate in medical-surgical west wing wards is up from the current \$53.50 to \$57 a day,

with semis in west unit up from \$56 to \$59.50 and private rooms \$62 to \$65.50.

Emergency rates are up 50 cents for the first 30 minutes, from \$15.75 to \$16.25.

Intensive care is up \$6.25 a day from \$129.75 to \$136, based on eight-hour units. Costs on all cases are broken into hourly components on billings.

Hospital Director Frederick S. Burd said the new rates are on a par with Grand Rapids hospitals and less than Grand Haven or Muskegon.

Two Holland Men Sentenced to Jail In Circuit Court

GRAND HAVEN — Two Holland men were sentenced to jail Monday and several others appeared in Ottawa County Circuit Court for arraignments.

Wesley Wayne Risselada, 18, charged with possession with intent to deliver marijuana, was placed on probation for two years and was sentenced to 120 days in jail with review after 60 days.

Scott Strieby, 18, charged with breaking and entering at a Holland township home March 21, was placed on two year probation and ordered to serve six months in jail and pay costs of \$100.

Frank Walker, 17, of Holland, pleaded guilty to a charge of felonious assault with a shotgun in a Holland restaurant June 6 while David Eischens, 19, of Holland, pleaded guilty to a charge of possession of marijuana. Both are to return Sept. 10 for sentencing.

Pleading innocent to charges of assault and battery were Michael Westrate, 20, William Westrate, 17, and Raymond Ver Hey, 19, all of Holland.

Incidence of Runaways Reported Higher

Responding to the situation in Houston where the bodies of at least 25 missing or runaway boys have been found and where some were missing for as long as three years, Holland police said only one per cent of the 81 runaways listed in 1972 in Holland remained at large for one week or longer.

Detective Russell Hopkins, who is assigned to the juvenile department and investigates all runaway complaints involving juveniles under 17 years, said he becomes more concerned when persons fail to report contacts with runaways for longer than a month.

He said regular contacts with family and friends of the runaway are made by police and the file remains open until the runaway is located or the person becomes 17 when the court assumes responsibility.

Hopkins said the number of reported runaways has increased in Holland to 61 this year compared to 81 for 1972. The average runaway in Holland is a 15 year old female, Hopkins said.

Of the 61 reported runaways this year all but four have been accounted for. Of the four outstanding, three are repeaters.

Persons classified as being a runaway are under 17 who are "evading a person or proper authority having legal custody," Hopkins explained.

A person knowingly harboring a runaway can be arrested and charged with a misdemeanor and Hopkins said when he makes contacts with friends of the runaway he impresses the person that if the runaway is found in the contact's home at a later date, the contact could be charged.

After the runaway complaint has been filed with police, Hopkins begins his investigation for information and identification of the runaway. Other police agen-

Junior High Vote Slated For Dec. 17

Holland school district will vote again on building two junior high schools Dec. 17.

Approval for such a date by the Ottawa County Elections Scheduling Commission was announced at a regular meeting of the Board of Education Monday night.

The issue lost by 211 votes in an election June 11 which also saw the re-election of two incumbent members to the Board of Education. The school proposition called for two schools costing a total of \$6½ million and a separate issue for two swimming pools for \$750,000.

The school vote lost 2,493 to 2,282. The swimming pool issue lost by a 2½ to 1 majority, 3,442 to 1,463.

Final determination on school proposition figures has not been made.

Plans call for new schools in the eastern and western areas of Holland where sites already have been obtained. The west site is in the vicinity of 24th St. west of the high school and the east site is on 24th St. near Apple Ave.

While living in Holland he had attended Harrington School and had open-heart surgery.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Thorpe; a sister, Yvonne and a brother, Stewart, all of Greenville and an aunt and uncle in Holland.

In 1972 all of the reported 81 runaways were accounted for and this week Hopkins said he closed a complaint dating back to 1971.

Statistics show that in Holland in 1972 39 per cent of the runaways were located within one day after the complaint was received, 25 per cent were located within two days and only one per cent were located after a week or longer.

Police Chief Charles Lindstrom said the increase in runaways could be attributed to peer group pressures, more mobility of the families and more pressure and strains in growing up.

City Ponders Next Move

South Shore Dr. Decision Studied

City officials Tuesday studied the opinion of Judge Harold Van Domelen restraining the city from levying a special assessment on South Shore Dr. property owners to improve the street.

City attorney John R. Marquis, who handled the city's presentation in the Ottawa County Circuit Court trial in July, said the city had at least two options, to accept the opinion and let the matter stand or to appeal the court decision.

Members of the city council were receiving copies of the opinion and the city manager's office said City Manager William L. Bopf had not had a chance to study the opinion with Marquis.

The suit was initiated by a group of property owners along South Shore Dr. who claimed the proposed improvements would be of little benefit to them and wanted the street repaired to city had installed a sanitary its original condition after the sewer.

In his opinion Judge Van Domelen concluded that "residents bordering on South Shore Drive will receive no special benefits from the proposed improvements to South Shore Drive over and above those conferred on the community in general. Therefore, a special assessment on adjacent land for such street improvements is illegal and should be restrained."

He added that South Shore Dr. was designated as a major street on the Revised Master Plan prepared for the city by its planning consultants and consultant Dr. Adrian Koert, the city's expert witness, classified South Shore Dr. as a collector or distributor street and not a local street.

"The proposed improvements will tend to increase traffic and its speed which will not be beneficial to abutting owners but will more likely be detrimental to residential property," Van Domelen said.

He ordered the city be "permanently enjoined from levying a special assessment" on property owners for the proposed improvements to South Shore Dr.

The city proposed to install storm sewers and add curb and gutters and resurface South Shore Dr. from Plasman Ave. to Old Orchard Rd. The street would be widened to 28 feet curb to curb with intersections flared to 36 feet to Myrtle Ave. and

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widen the street to 36 feet from Myrtle to Old Orchard.

The estimated cost of the project would be \$741,000 of which 23 per cent or \$170,900 would have been assessed against the property owners at \$10 per front foot.

The Ottawa County Circuit Court trial began July 2 in Holland District Court with plaintiffs presenting their case. The city argued its case when the trial resumed July 23.

Board Okays 13 Teachers For Holland

Contracts for 13 teachers for the 1973-74 school year were approved by the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night in the library of Holland High School.

With approval of the 13, and the return of two contracts not included in the 13, there remain only four posts to be filled for the coming school year. All are on the junior high level, one Latino counselor, one Spanish teacher, one music and one reading.

Five new teachers on the elementary level are Karen Brohman, B.A. Western Michigan, 1973, elementary librarian; Karen Hall, B.A. Purdue University 1973, Van Raalte School; Robert Haveman, B.A. Hope College 1971, two years' experience, physical education; Jan Maxwell, B.A. Hope College 1973, Longfellow School; Edwin Yonker, B.S. Grand Valley 1970 three years' experience, Harrington School.

On the secondary level are Janice Augustine, B.S. Central Michigan, 1972, no experience, junior high mathematics; Michael Bos, B.S. Hillsdale College 1973, junior and senior high boys physical ed; Virginia Borgman, B.S. Eastern Michigan 1943, 10 years experience, junior and senior high girls physical ed; William Fodor, B.S. Ferris State College 1973, junior high mathematics; Brian LeRoque, B.A. Michigan State University 1971, one year's experience, high school social studies.

Others on the secondary level are Saturnino Diaz, B.A. Central Michigan 1973, high school; James Holland, B.S. Michigan State University 1960, 10 years' experience, trade-industrial coordinator; Marilyn Young, B.A. Luther College 1973, high school girls physical ed.

The board also approved "in principle" recommendations resulting from the junior high school summer workshop conducted by Dr. Philip Schoo but asked further study on some aspects of implementation. For the present, a 45-minute noon hour is recommended, and work will be done towards two 30-minute periods, but such a change will affect bus schedules which are drawn for the entire school district. The junior high school day calls for 8:15 a.m. to 3:20 p.m. Some 20 members of the junior high faculty attended the meeting.

The board granted permission to continue opening the high school library one evening a week for the use of students and adult education students. The library was opened an evening a week for 30 weeks the past year.

A letter from the Human Relations Commission expressed sincere appreciation for efforts made by the Board of Education in hiring certified bilingual teachers and arranging for a lunch program. The letter was signed by Alfredo Gonzales, executive secretary of the commission.

School Supt. Donald L. Ihrman through Detroit attorneys presented a \$50,000 check, a bequest from the late Ray W. Herick for the Hazel Forney Herick Art Center at the high school. In his will, Herick suggested but did not insist that the money be held in trust and only the net income used for maintenance and operations of the art center. The board voted to abide by the suggestions in the will and to thank the executors of the estate for the gift.

In his financial report, Charles Bradford announced that he and Robert Gosselar and John Amaya will be serving on the finance committee this year.

Bids were presented on high school site improvement, but action was delayed until another meeting of the board next week.

All members were present except John Weber. The invocation was given by Dr. James Prins. The meeting lasted an hour and 40 minutes.

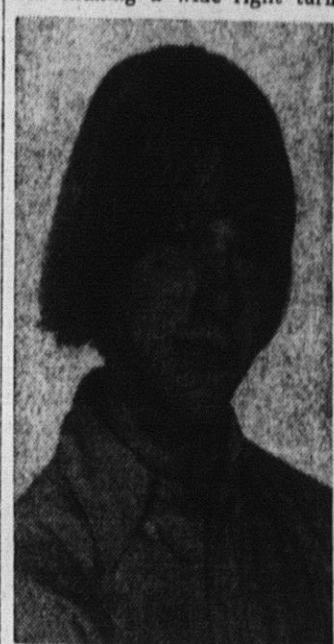
Youth Dies In Crash Of Two Autos

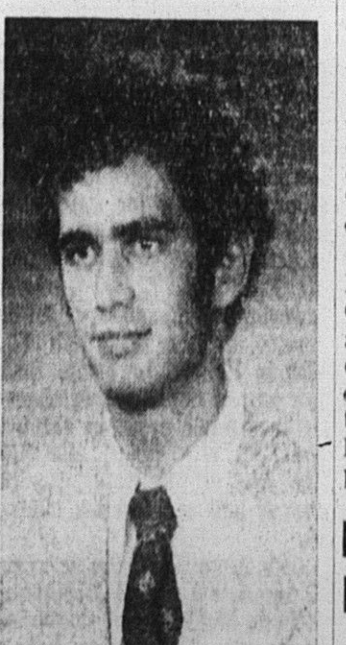

Supplemental Aid Program Announced

The social security office in Holland is taking applications for a supplemental security income program scheduled to begin next January and which is designed to establish an income floor for persons in financial need.

To be eligible persons must be 65 or older, blind or disabled and meet certain income requirements, according to M. Robert Black, manager of the local social security office.

Persons already getting state old age assistance or state aid because of blindness or disability need not apply because they will be getting more information later, Black said.

The federal supplemental security income payments will be made by the social security administration but will be financed by federal general revenues. The program is to provide supplemental payments to assure a basic cash income of at least \$130 monthly for one person and \$195 monthly for a couple.

The amount of the payment depends on how much other income the persons has, Black added. Eligibility depends not only on the amount of income but on the value of their assets. Single persons or married persons living alone can own things valued at up to \$1,500 and will get the federal payments. A couple may own things up to \$2,250 value and be eligible.

Black said a home of reasonable value will not be counted as an asset. Personal effects and household goods won't count in most cases. The value of insurance policies and cars may affect the eligibility.

Certain income will be disregarded and the first \$20 monthly income generally won't affect the payments.

Persons working part time will have the first \$65 monthly earnings exempted and only half of the rest of their additional earnings will be counted.

Other income above the first \$20 monthly generally will reduce the federal payment. Included are social security checks, veterans payments, workmen's compensation, pensions, annuities and gifts.

Persons needing more information or wishing to apply may write or visit the social security office at 595 East 16th St.

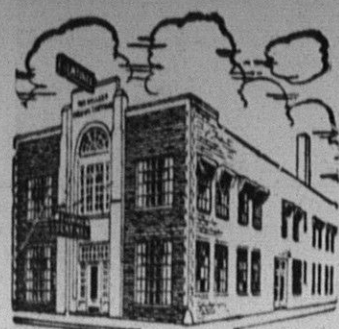

Nations all over the world are clamoring for our food supplies, a situation which caused Premier Tanaka of Japan to suggest to his American audience that we allow our farmers to produce all they want.

But now take a look at Congress, that august body that hasn't heard any of these things, or at least doesn't show that it has. It has just completed work on a farm bill that continues much of the bad in previous farm legislation and which will cost the taxpayers of this country billions of dollars in the next four years. What could one call this but a most confused situation.

If we would let our farmers produce without subsidies and without controls, our farmers might well turn around our serious imbalance of trade and get matters in some perspective. But who is going to tell Congress the facts of life? We might suggest the voter write his congressman to educate him on what has happened in the last year. Someone has to clear up the confusion.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Aug. 19
The Undisciplined Person
Proverbs 23:19-21, 29-35;
I Corinthians 10:12-13

Although many warnings are not heeded, they should continue to be given. Not all the warnings along our streets and highways are obeyed but that is no reason why they should be removed. Alcohol, drugs and sex create problems, permissiveness adds to them, hence warnings are essential so that discipline may rule.

I The undisciplined create problems. A passage from the book of Proverbs from the Old Testament and a passage from I Corinthians constitute the lesson text. Proverbs belongs to the wisdom literature of the Old Testament. Proverbs teaches that there is one God, and it is true wisdom to obey His will. A proverb is "a short pithy saying in frequent and widespread use, expressing a well-known truth."

The text portrays a father teaching his son. He may have been a teacher giving instruction to a scholar. Proverbs speaks of wisdom, and portrays it as common sense. Note the warning given, "Be not among winebibbers; among riotous eaters of flesh." Drunkenness and gluttony damage the body and hurt society. It is tragic that we here in America waste food while hunger abounds in certain parts of the world. The wise person disciplines himself and enriches his own life.

II. Liquor ensnares people. The misuse of liquor brings woe, sorrow, contentions, babbings, wounds without cause, redness of eyes and many other miseries. More than half of the 50,000 people killed on the highways die due to liquor and many others are maimed. Liquor is skillfully advertised. Usually a happy family, or a young smiling couple appear. If some one would paint a picture of bleeding persons lying alongside, the whole truth would be told.

A person does not become an alcoholic overnight. Gradually the habit enslaves. The text portrays a man tossing in the sea or trying to keep his balance on the top of a mast of a ship. Although the drinker gets hurt, when he sobers up he turns right back again to the bottle. Confusion grips him in spite of his hurts. Liquor, tobacco, marijuana, drugs, promise thrills which often end in tragedies.

III. Self-discipline pays good dividends. Paul wrote a letter to the church in Corinth, the most wicked city of Paul's time. The church was composed of people who for the most part had come from paganism. The temptation to return to the pagan mode of life was strong. A sense of false security is dangerous. Reliance upon God is essential. It was in Paul's day, it is in these days when people have more leisure, more money, more years of retirement, more playthings, more ways of recreation, more temptations, therefore the need of strength from God is greater than ever.

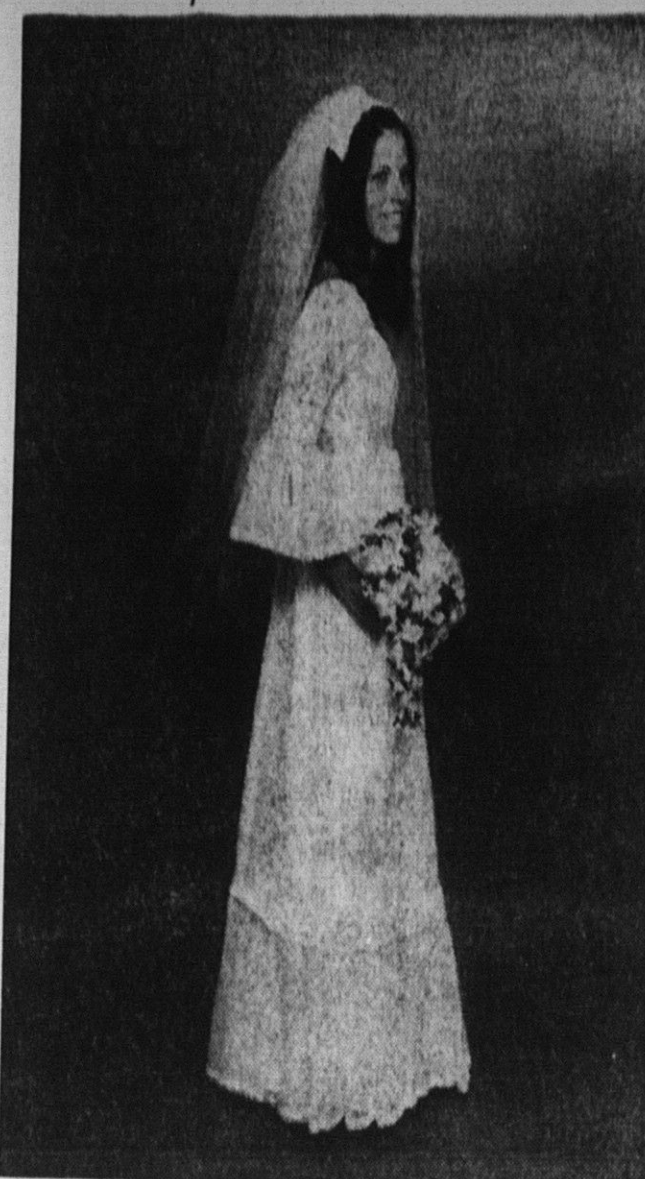

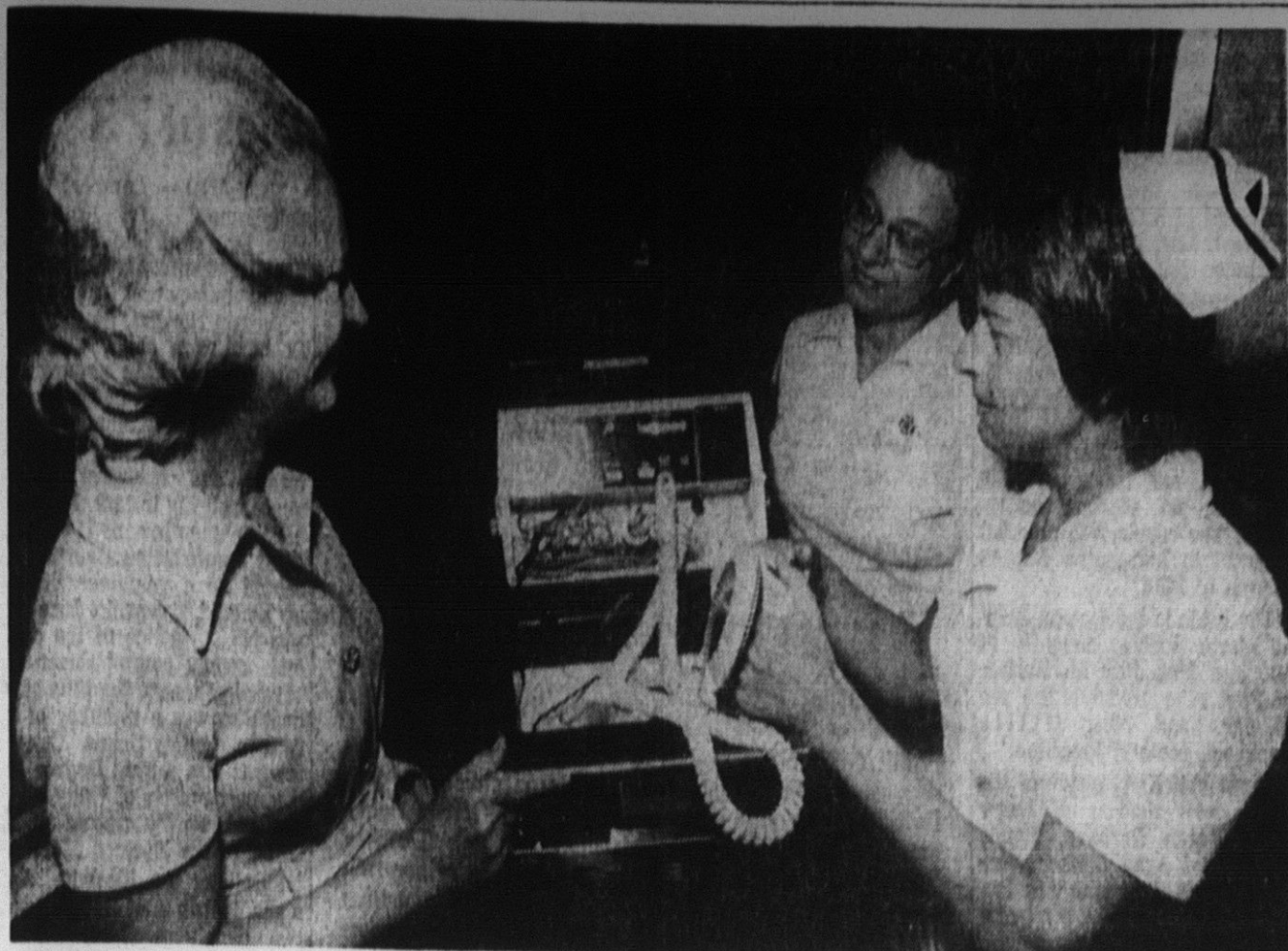

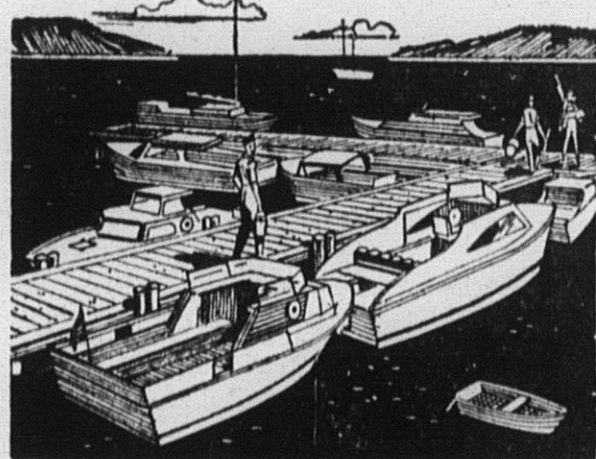
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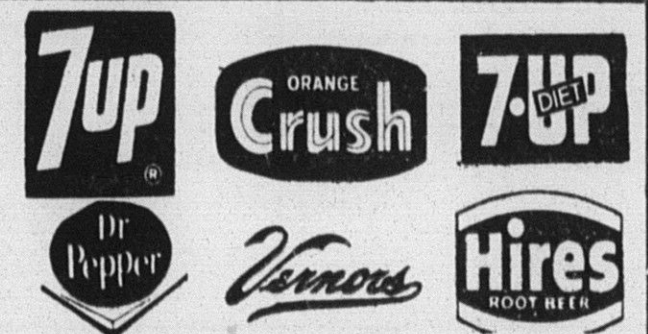


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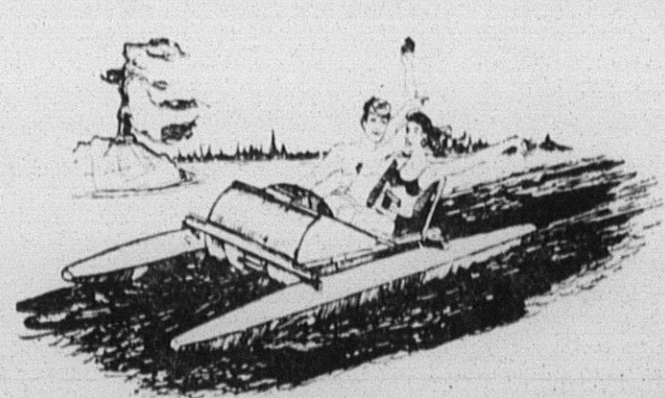
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Phone Call Beckoned New Trust Head Into Banking

A 6:30 a.m. phone call early in the summer of '42 thrust a Hope College senior into a prestigious career, cresting to date with the vice presidency of First National Bank in Holland and head of the bank's new trust department.

That the student, Corinne Pool, is a woman is purely incidental to her solid success as a banker.

That unexpected early morning caller, Dr. Edward Dimmett, head of Hope's economics dept., requested Corinne to report to the bank at 9 that morning for, unknown to her, pre-arranged employment: the position-substitute teller; the purpose-practical experience on a part time basis.

Following a five-minute interview with Henry Maentz, President of the bank, Corinne began her distinguished career.

"And the practical was far different than the theoretical," she recalls of her \$60 a month teller job.

The year following Corinne's

Corinne Pool stepped in.

As bookkeeper she worked closely with people whose accounts were overdrawn. Did she ever make a mistake? "You better believe it," she resolutely replies.

Promotions continued: assistant cashier in 1950; auditor in 1958; desk officer in 1957; vice president in 1967.

The desk officer position afforded her the opportunity to open new accounts, handle customer complaints and assist in training young employees. Having hired most of the present employees in the bank is a particular point of pride with Miss Pool.

To the frequently asked question concerning her success and consistent promotion, she modestly replies, "Because I was there."

A response to "Why Corinne?" more compatible with the truth would be her obvious enthusiasm, competence, reliability and preparation.

Throughout her years in banking, Miss Pool has maintained the intermittent status of student: as a graduate of Stonier Graduate School of Banking at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, N.J., where she was one of the 20 women first graduated from the institution and as a participant in numerous day or week long banking seminars throughout the country; and most recently as a student at the National Trust School at Northwestern University which she is attending for a two week comprehensive course beginning Aug. 12.

Despite the career length side-track from her original plans (to become a certified public accountant), she has never felt a single regret about her career, eagerly challenged by each new progression including her recent appointment as head trust officer of First National's Trust Department.

"I had to give it a great deal of thought," admitted the fifth

woman to head a trust dept., in the state.

Though the 88th in the state, the trust department is the first in Holland requiring the head to organize and administer the extensive department including financial and estate planning, acting as custodian or agent of assets, as executor and administrator of estates, as guardian of the estates of minors and incompetents, and as trustee for personal trusts, both under wills and living trusts.

Whenever unusual problems arise, Miss Pool is free to draw on the advice of the staff of the First National Bank and Trust Co., in Kalamazoo, one of the members of the holding company.

As a trust officer, Corinne can turn more to dealing with the public, her forte and one of the reasons she was chosen for the demanding position.

Despite its little understood title a trust department is the most personalized segment of a bank, she says.

Citing a recent experience in Kalamazoo (where she travels weekly for training at the First National Bank and Trust Co., the largest trust department in a nine bank affiliation) Miss Pool described a young woman facing the sudden death of her mother together with the responsibilities of caring for a mentally incompetent father, a situation the daughter found almost incomprehensible.

"We spent several hours assuring her of our help and assistance," Miss Pool said.

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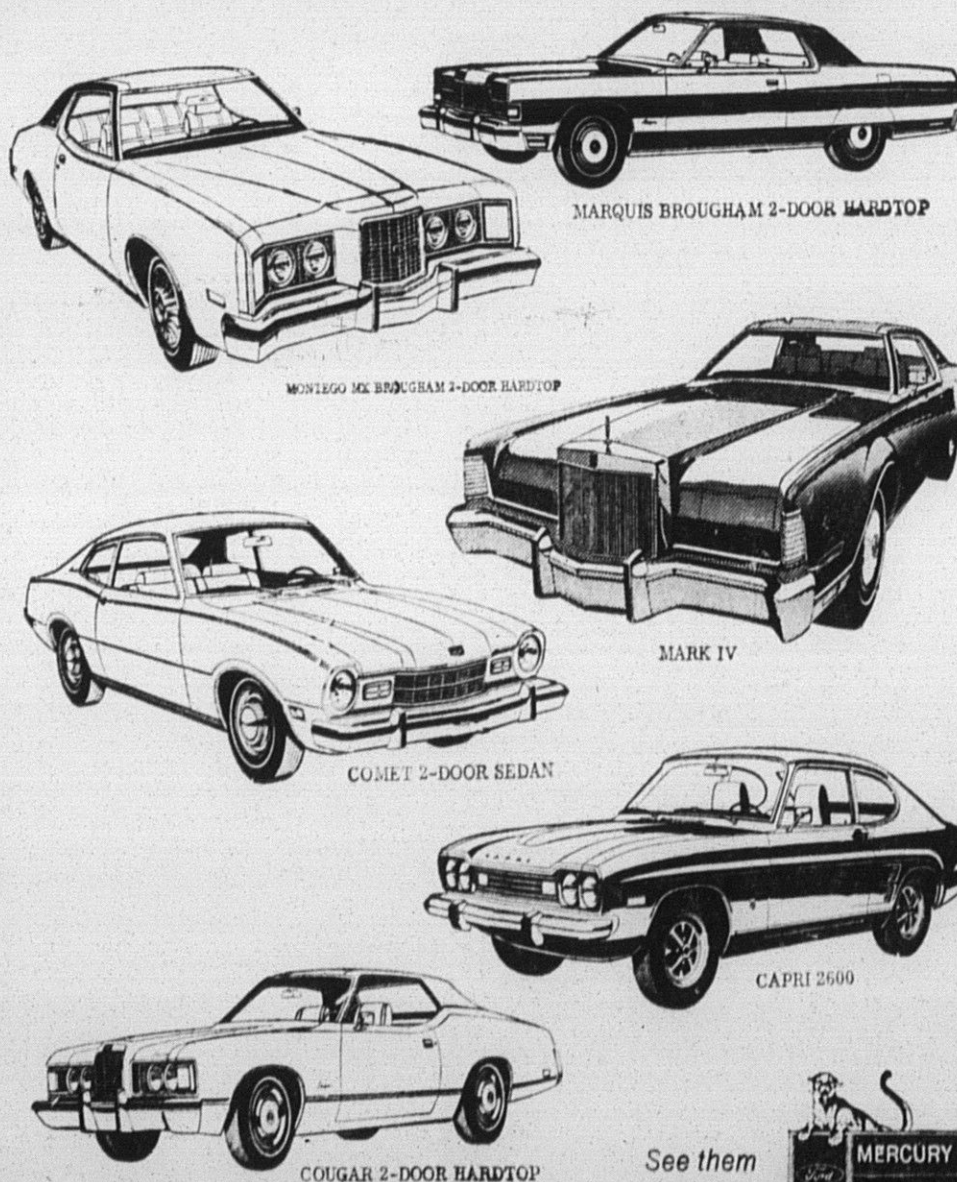
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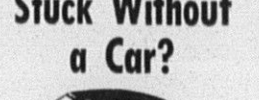

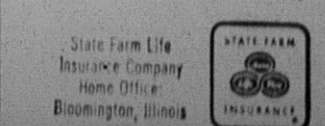
