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Grand Haven Car Hits Tree

Three Students Killed in Crash

GRAND HAVEN — Three Grand Haven high school seniors were killed Sunday night when their car ran off Dogwood Dr. in Spring Lake township and hit a tree. Their deaths boosted the Ottawa County traffic death toll for the year to 20.

The victims were identified as Ronald William Byl, 17, driver of the car, and passengers Rhonda Siewert, 17, and Jason Tripp, 17, all of Grand Haven.

State Police said the car was southbound on 180th Ave. where the road makes a left turn into Dogwood Dr. at 10:05 p.m. Sunday when it missed the curve and struck a tree.

Troopers said the victims were pinned in the wreckage.

Pronounced dead at the scene was Tripp.

Hamilton Girl Killed In Allegan Crash

ALLEGAN — A rural Hamilton girl was killed and her nine-month old daughter was among five persons injured when their convertible car went out of control and overturned in a ditch, Sunday.

Arrival of emergency vehicles was delayed when a passerby who reported the mishap gave the wrong location and deputies were forced to wait until the caller returned the call 40 minutes later with the correct location.

Dead on arrival at Allegan General Hospital was Brenda Kelly, 15, of route 5, Hamilton, a passenger in the car driven by Mark Edward English, 16, of Allegan.

Admitted to the hospital in "fair" condition were English and the Kelly girl's baby, Kimberly.

Deputies said the accident along 34th St. north of 128th Ave. in Monterey township was believed to have occurred between 5 and 5:30 p.m. Sunday but the victims and the car were not found by emergency vehicles until about 6:40 p.m. when a passerby with a winch on his truck was beginning to pull the overturned car off the body of Brenda Kelly.

Officers said all but one of the victims were pinned beneath the overturned car. Jeff Kelly, 10, was tossed from the car and began digging other victims free from the vehicle. All but the dead woman had been removed when the car was pulled away.

Others injured and taken to the hospital for treatment were Patrick English, 5, Glenda Kelly, 14, and Jeff.

Seven Injured In Collision Of Two Automobiles

Seven persons were injured, three seriously, in a two-car collision at 48th Ave. and Garfield in Polkton township Friday at 8:30 p.m.

Admitted to St. Mary's hospital in Grand Rapids were Kieft Lynn Holman, 21, of Grand Haven, driver of one car; and two passengers, Linda Potts, 21, of Coopersville, and Dorothy Lintjer, 22, also of Coopersville.

Ottawa County deputies said the Holman car was westbound on Garfield and pulled into the path of a car southbound on 48th and driven by Norman Lloyd Van Lengen, 41, of Jensen.

Van Lengen, his wife and two daughters were injured and were to seek their own treatment.

Deputies said Holman sustained back injuries while the Lintjer woman suffered internal injuries and was listed in critical condition. The Potts woman was treated for lacerations and contusions.

Cycle, Car Crash Injures Riders

ZEELAND — Danny Hasse and his mother, Phyllis Hassevoort, 19, of route 1, Zeeland, vooit, 39, were injured when the motorcycle they were riding and a car collided Sunday at 3:50 p.m. in front of 9717 Stanton St.

Zeeland Community Hospital Hassevoort was treated in and released while his mother was admitted with back injuries and her condition Monday was listed as "good."

Ottawa County deputies said the motorcycle struck a car operated by Vaughn Stegenga, 23, of route 4, Holland, backing in a driveway at the Stanton St. address and which pulled into the path of the motorcycle.

Affects Residential Setbacks Only

Parking Requiring Improved Surface

A new step in implementing a city ordinance on offstreet parking on residential property was explained Tuesday by Roger Stroh, head of the Environmental Health Department of the city.

"Everybody in the city is pretty well aware by now that nobody burns garbage in the back yard, but they are not aware of developing parking restrictions on private property," Stroh said.

He had called attention last April to willy-nilly crisscross parking in front yards which tend to downgrade neighborhoods. At that time he said a certain part of the ordinance passed by City Council at that time would become effective in August.

This part of the ordinance now requires that any parking done in areas of established setbacks must be on improved surfaces.

Stroh explained that since April, 82 such violations have been investigated, maintaining

County Aid Is Sought For Bridge

City Council Wednesday night approved a course of action by petitioning the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners and the Ottawa County Road Commission to share in costs of repairing and reconstructing the River Ave. bridge on the north limits of Holland city.

It was understood that the County Board of Commissioners has a policy of sharing up to 30 per cent in such ventures. It would appear that the city and the county would assume 35 per cent each. It was expected considerable study would take place before plans are resolved.

A letter from State Sen. Robert Vander Laan of Grand Rapids requesting Council to petition the legislature to rename I-196 the Gerald R. Ford Jr. Freeway in tribute to the new President was taken under advisement. Councilman Hazen Van Kampen said he held President Ford in high regard, but, thought Council should not act hastily in the matter.

Council approved applying to the federal government for a communications grant whereby Dr. Jack Hopkins of Hope College would develop a pilot project consisting of classes for public officials in the field of communications.

Council approved changes recommended by the FCC in the CATV agreement curbing certain local controls on programming prohibited by law, and clarifying the additional 2 per cent fees, allowable only if justifiable. This would be in addition to the allowable 3 per cent. The vote was 8-1, John Bloemendaal dissenting.

The matter of removing the first three parking meters on the north side of Eighth St. east of College Ave. was tabled for another 45 days pending further study by the manager for the entire block.

Also tabled from last meeting was the matter of stop signs at 24th St. and Maple Ave. which were approved, with 24th St. stopping for Maple. A study of a similar situation at 26th St. evoked no changes at this time, and "yield" signs will remain. A protest from a 24th St. resident on parking and traffic movement in that area resulted in referring this to the city manager for study and report, along with a study of street parking in the general area.

In keeping with general policy, Council tabled for two weeks recommendations to eliminate parking in certain areas in the southeast quadrant at 32nd St. and Lincoln Ave., on the south side of 16th St. between Columbia and Lincoln Aves., and the west side of Central Ave. south of Ninth St.

A city manager report on new greenhouses at Windmill Island revealed that John Mulder, whose low bid of \$10,008.70 had been approved at the last meeting, found in reviewing his sketches that he had not included the price for erecting cold frame walls, and by written request he asked that his bid be withdrawn. Council approved the request and awarded the bid to next low bidder, Ken Beelen, at bid price of \$10,232.80 which had included the cold frame walls. A change order for additional poured walls along the storage shed building was agreed on for an additional \$400. The vote was 6-2, Elmer Wissing and John Bloemendaal dissenting. Beelen was allowed to abstain.

Council approved sidewalk replacement on 10th St. adjacent to Centennial Park in the next budget and instructed the Park department to experiment win sodding or seeding in areas on 10th St. and Central Ave.

Council approved an electrical ordinance updating minimum requirements for electrical installations.

Oaths of office were filed for Glenn M. Waddell and Harvey J. Baas, Human Relations Commission; and Reed Brown, Ronald Rainsdon, William L. Bopf, Helen Brockmeier, Donald Thirman and John Hopkins, CATV Advisory Commission.

Council set a public hearing Sept. 4 on an application from Deitz House Moving Engineers for a permit to move a house at 346 East 48th St. to the lot immediately north of 1272 Lincoln Ave.

The Greater Michigan chapter of the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation was granted a permit to solicit funds from residences Sept. 16-21.

A letter from Mrs. David Barkman expressing concern over traffic at Washington Ave. and 40th St. was referred to the city manager for study.

Council granted a revocable license agreement containing standard conditions to Kenneth Vos to construct a mansard roof at 250 River Ave. that would protrude into the right of way.

Trade-Off Used In BPW Talks

Board of Public Works General Manager Ronald L. Rainsdon conceded during testimony at an unfair labor practices hearing Tuesday that a trade-off was involved in not inviting city officials to join "preliminary discussions" with union representatives on a new employee contract.

Rainsdon said city personnel officer Jack Leenhouts was not kept from the discussions. "We just didn't invite him."

Rainsdon's testimony was heard during the afternoon session of the hearing in City Council Chambers on a suit brought by the city against Local 386, Service Employees International Union, AFL-CIO, which represents employees of the BPW.

Hearing Judge Joseph B. Bixler of the Michigan Employment Relations Commission in Detroit, allowed an amended motion from labor attorney William C. Marietti of Muskegon to include in the hearing a suit brought by the union against the BPW and to add the City of Holland.

The city claims it was not part of the bargaining process as it had been in the past years and council rejected a proposal reached between the BPW and the union.

Rainsdon testified Leenhouts, the city's labor attorney and the union's business agent were not invited to the preliminary bargaining sessions because "it would serve better for the discussions if the others did not attend."

He said it was the intent of the union bargainers and BPW representatives, who were Rainsdon and BPW personnel officer Ray Reidsma, to continue the preliminary discussions and to call in the others when "hard bargaining" was reached.

But Rainsdon conceded the plan got out of hand. He testified "we crossed that point into hard bargaining without realizing it and we were bargaining economics before we knew it."

Ron Kuite, secretary-treasurer of the local unit, said a member of the union bargaining team asked him at the first talks in January why Leenhouts was not at the meeting.

Kuite said he was told that Rainsdon had told Leenhouts to stay off the second floor of City Hall where the BPW offices are located.

Rainsdon testified he did not recall making such a statement to Leenhouts.

Rainsdon claimed he was delegated by the BPW to negotiate all issues and that the BPW attempted to obtain from the city some guidelines with which the city was negotiating but could not get the information.

He said he believed the city had not decided what it wanted to do.

On the question of longevity, Rainsdon said the union on April 1 asked for longevity or nothing. Rainsdon testified he said the issue would be tough to win BPW and council approval and left the meeting to confer with BPW president Charles Cooper.

After returning Rainsdon said it was agreed that if the union accepted the wage package, the BPW would fight for longevity.

It was then, Rainsdon said, that Mayor Lou Hallacy stopped by his office to tell Rainsdon he should not get into something he had no right and to clear such matters with the mayor before a final contract offer was agreed upon.

Rainsdon said he was never told by other city officials or the City Manager to stop the bargaining process. He said he did not give the impression to union bargainers that council action to the BPW recommendations was a formality and that the BPW was calling the shots in the bargaining.

Kuite and Ray Weller, president of the local unit, said they believed they had a valid contract after the BPW voted to accept the proposal based on past experiences with council approving BPW recommendations.

"We assumed that if we reached agreement with the BPW we had a contract," said Kuite. "My understanding was that when we received the offer from the BPW we had an agreement."

When asked by attorney Henry Guikema, representing the city, whether he would bargain with the city, Kuite replied "we have a contract signed and if the membership tells me to bargain again I will."

Judge Bixler took the four hours of testimony under advisement and allowed the attorneys to file briefs. He said a ruling was expected in about five or six weeks.

Four Weeks of Disturbances

Zeeland Council Acts on Traffic

ZEELAND — City Council Monday took steps aimed at curbing the Sunday night disturbances by motorists in the downtown area.

Acting on recommendations of Mayor Edward Nagelkirk and Police Chief Lawrence Veldheer, council authorized the sending of a letter to the registered owners of cars whose license numbers were noted while the cars were in Zeeland during the disturbance Sunday.

The letter urged the owner not to be a part of the "scene" in Zeeland and to stay away from the noisy event which has occurred the past four Sunday evenings.

Veldheer said his seven-man police force has attempted to maintain a "low key" enforcement the past four Sundays but fears it apparently has not worked.

"We cannot allow this congestion downtown again," said Mayor Nagelkirk referring to the gathering of motorists and spectators along Main St.

Veldheer said about 250 license numbers were recorded Sunday night and the registered owners would be sent letters.

In other action council authorized the filing for a

City Council Processes Many Items

City Council processed many matters of a routine nature at its regular meeting Wednesday night.

Bid of Lakewood Construction Co. for maintenance and painting of Paw Paw Dr. bridge for \$19,270 was approved. It was the only bid submitted. A previous survey revealed that the bridge was structurally safe.

Holland township was granted permission to construct a water main in the Waverly Rd. right-of-way, provided the installation is below the storm sewer crossing at US-31 and Eighth St. Councilman John Bloemendaal questioned possible duplication of services on the water trunkline to Zeeland.

A city manager report on constructing a magic square at Washington School stated that the total cost of \$21,439 will be shared between the city and the public school system. Plans had called for funds to come from federal revenue sharing but because of technicalities Council voted to allocate the city's share to \$12,000 from the capital improvement fund.

By a 7-2 vote, Council rejected installation of emergency telephone service involving 26 telephones at strategic locations in the city connected to the police switchboard. The program had called for an initial \$805 from the city, plus about \$3,900 annually in line charges thereafter. State and federal funds up to \$15,295 are available for the system. Voting were Mayor Hallacy and Robert Dykstra.

On recommendation of the city manager, Council approved a building permit to remodel the Standard Oil station at Eighth St. and Paw Paw Dr.

Sept. 18 was set as date for hearing following first reading of an ordinance on application of the L. W. Lamb Co. to rezone a parcel at South Shore Dr. and East End Dr.

Council approved a proposition for the November election earmarking 1/2 mill for Dial-A-Ride operations starting in 1975.

Special assessment rolls on three sanitary sewer projects were tabled for two weeks pending a study on interest rates by the city attorney. The projects listed were Locust Ave., Heather Dr. and Old Orchard Rd. and Hope Ave.

Claims against the city from Jennie Dykhuis, route 3, and Floyd Michael Durham, 319 West 24th St., were referred to the city attorney and insurance carrier.

A city manager report on a request from Hollander Hotel, 234 East Eighth St., for upgrading its hotel liquor license advised that a complete inspection of the premises revealed that substantial electrical work, structural corrections and housing improvements are needed, as well as consideration in its restaurant operations. It was stated that the owner will be expected to comply with applicable codes and ordinances. The report was filed.

The city manager reported that Council's 5-3 vote two weeks ago on authorizing overtime for administrative personnel did not carry since six positive votes are needed. No further action was taken.

Council tabled for two weeks a report on sewer assessments for 151 and 152 Birchwood. Owners had requested that their double assessments be reduced to single assessments. The administrative report revealed differences of opinion and Mayor Hallacy asked Councilmen to visit the premises within the next two weeks when action is scheduled.

Mrs. Brickley Talks on Alcoholism

Marianne E. Brickley, wife of Michigan's lieutenant governor, was in Holland Friday to help launch a year-long program on "The Woman Alcoholic." She visited the staff of the Chester A. Ray Center on East Ninth St., a halfway house for men operated by Ottagan Alcoholic Rehabilitation Inc.

The local halfway house has been in operation since February and can accommodate up to eight men. The census runs between four and eight, with an average of six, according to Robert Klein, executive director.

Mrs. Brickley, who has been active in Gov. Milliken's Advisory Commission on Substance Abuse Services for three years, would like to see more halfway houses for women alcoholics. There are only three in Michigan, compared with many times that number for men.

More Halfway Houses Are Sought for Women

"There always has been a stigma on alcoholism in women," Mrs. Brickley said. "Women with this problem were supposed to keep it well hidden at home."

An admitted alcoholic, Mrs. Brickley said she was in an acute stage of alcoholism for two years before she sought help. Recently she was elected president of the National Council of Alcoholism, Michigan district.

She currently is collecting material for an article on alcoholism among women for "Monday in Michigan," a publication of the National Council of Alcoholism in Michigan.

The lieutenant governor is not seeking reelection this year.

On BPW Electrical, Sewer Boosts

Mayor Proposes Public Hearing

City Council took no action Wednesday night on requests of the Board of Public Works to raise electrical rates and waste treatment service charges.

Instead, Council unanimously adopted Mayor Lou Hallacy's suggestion that the BPW conduct a public hearing on the rate increase with the hearing to be well advertised in advance. Hallacy said he at-

tempted to contact BPW Chairman Charles Cooper several times but the latter is on vacation. He is asking that the hearing be conducted fairly soon so that results can be given to City Council no later than Sept. 18.

The BPW had recommended a 13 per cent increase in electrical rates effective Nov. 1, with the present 10 per cent customer discount for prompt payment be reduced to 5 per cent beginning with bills due Dec. 8.

Requests also called for increasing waste treatment rates 24 per cent retroactive to July 15. Even though such increases would be retroactive, bills at the proposed new rate would not be mailed until Nov. 20 and would not be due until Dec. 1.

Hallacy said Council recognizes the needs of the Board of Public Works but also recognizes that the magnitude of the proposed increases may invoke a hardship on a substantial number of Holland citizens. Council also is retaining the city's independent auditor to conduct a special review of rates and costs to provide added assurance increases are absolutely essential.

"Upon completion of the public hearing, the special study and ample opportunity for the public to become fully apprised of the board's needs, City Council will then feel confident to work with the board to approve the rate structures that will enable the citizens to continue to receive high quality, economical services that have been the tradition of the Board of Public Works over its entire history," the mayor said.

The BPW also had recommended that the 5 1/2 per cent of gross revenues for determining the BPW payment to the city in lieu of taxes be discontinued effective July 1 and be replaced by multiplying the kilowatt hour sales to retail customers by \$0.00118 per kilowatt hour with the 1974-75 payment not to exceed \$264,000. After this period the factor would be determined by dividing \$264,000 by the actual kilowatt hour sales, and that factor applied in following years. No action was taken.

A BPW recommendation approving low bid of Sloothaak and Myaard for installing an eight-inch water main in East 24th St. from Apple Ave. was approved.

A BPW report concerning possible establishment of a local port district (authority) under a revised port act was referred to the city manager for study and report.

Also referred to the city manager was a Hospital Board communication expressing concern that there appear to be no current plans to enlarge the storm sewer capacity on Maple Ave. which serves the hospital area.

Deputies said Bolhuis was operating a state truck eastbound in the left lane of M-21 and failed to observe a dump truck ahead operated by Lewis Tousignant, 48, of Ada, signaling for a left turn and struck the dump truck from behind.

The impact sent the Tousignant truck into the intersection where it collided with a car westbound on M-21 and driven by Roger Frykholm, 31, of Grand Rapids.

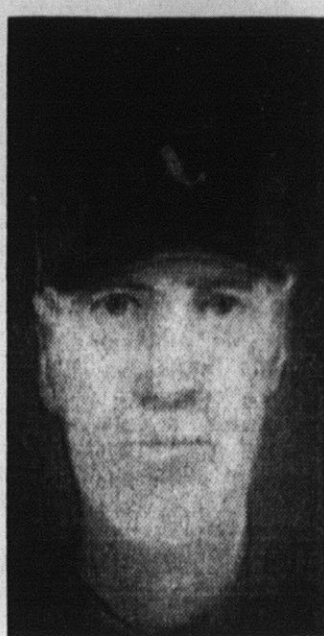

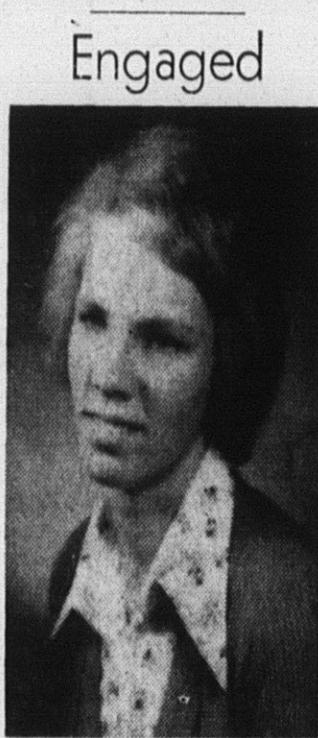

Hope Picked to Repeat As MIAA Football King

ALMA — Defending MIAA football champion Hope College is the choice of league coaches to repeat as the crown bearer this fall.

Coach Ray Smith's Flying Dutchmen were picked as the pre-season favorite by coaches yesterday during the MIAA's seventh annual football press day at Alma College.

Hope, which enjoyed its first unbeaten league schedule ever last fall, received first place ballots from all but one coach.

Next in the voting was Olivet while Albion and Alma tied for third place and Kalamazoo and Adrian were deadlocked for fifth.

Hope's championship campaign a year ago was the college's first in a decade. With 34 returning lettermen including five all-MIAA players coach Smith looks to the nine game schedule with enthusiasm.

The Dutchmen report for their first drills next Wednesday. The season opens Sept. 14 at home against Anderson, Ind., in the traditional Ox Roast Classic.

Hope will carry a six game winning streak into their season opener, the school's longest since the 1958-59 campaign. The team's fourth victory of the season will be a milestone 200th for Hope football since the sport was initiated in 1905.

The Flying Dutchmen dominated the league statistically last fall outscoring their foes 133-31 while leading the conference in both defense and offense. The team's rushing performance (258 yards a game) was ranked among the nation's top 10 small colleges.

The team's strength this season will rest in its defense

according to Smith. The offensive line has six regulars returning, but the backfield, especially tailback, is a pre-season questionmark.

Hope's offense in recent years has featured a nationally ranked tailback, but Smith claims there is no clearcut candidate for the position this fall.

The nucleus of the team revolves around five returning all-leaguers on offense are sophomore end Dave Teater of Columbus, Ohio and senior fullback Chuck Brooks of Glen Burnie, Md. All-leaguer back on defense include junior tackle Craig Van Tuinen of Grand Rapids, junior end Bob Lees of Pompton Lakes, N.J. and junior middle guard Dave Yeiter of Lowell.

Olivet will build its squad around 31 returning lettermen, mostly sophomores and juniors. The offense has 10 returning regulars but the defensive line must be rebuilt at six of seven positions.

The Comets have three returning all-leaguers in junior center Bob Bacon of Bay City, junior tailback Tom Creighton of Southgate and sophomore defensive back Jim Crocker of Battle Creek. Olivet's offense is led by senior quarterback Bill Ziem of Waterford who owns nearly all of the school's passing records.

Alma will be seeking to recover from its worst season since 1964. The Scott roster includes nine seniors who have lettered every year since they were freshmen and an astounding 61 freshmen prospects.

Outstanding Scott returnees include senior end Doug Fillmore of Hope, senior defensive tackle Keith Froelich of Portage,

senior linebacker Steve Schiecher of Grosse Pointe Woods and senior defensive end Keith Wilson of Clawson. Fillmore and Froelich were all-MIAA performers last fall while Schiecher and Wilson earned the honor in 1972.

Albion used the 1973 season to rebuild its football program and the result is 41 returning lettermen in camp this fall.

The Britons have returnees at nearly every position including 1972 all-league offensive end Bob Basselman, a senior from Stevensville.

Kalamazoo could feature the league's most balanced offense. The Hornets feature fullback Dennis Kane, a senior from Muskegon who rushed for 360 yards last fall, wingback Matt Thompson and Mike Holmes who combined for 579 yards rushing and another 351 in pass catches and wide receiver Pat Walters who is approaching the school's alltime reception record with 1,305 yards over the past three seasons. Kane and Walters were all-MIAA picks in 1972.

Adrian will be attempting to rebound from a winless '73 league record. The Bulldogs feature junior Jim Allshouse of Grass Lake who was the nation's second leading small college punter last fall averaging 42.9 yards a boot. Talented senior quarterback Angelo Antonucci returns after missing last season with injuries. The Bulldogs defense is led by senior middle guard Steve Vargo of Hubbard, Ohio, who was an all-league choice in 1972.

Non-league action will dominate the itineraries of all schools until Oct. 5 when the five week conference schedule begins.



Ever since Jerry Ford ascended to the Presidency, the stories have been making the rounds of his many visits to Holland while he was 5th district Congressman, even afterwards.

Indeed, his visits were so frequent that the powers in Grand Rapids often questioned the time he spent in Ottawa county. But then, the Ottawa county Republicans (other parties too) were always intensely loyal to the man who defeated Bartel Jonkman in 1948, and Jerry never forgot it.

He wasn't out to scrub the streets during Tulip Time (that prerogative belonged to the governor, spurred by a demonstration by the late Kim Sigler back in the 40s. But Jerry served as honorary marshal for the Saturday Tulip Time parade in 1967, three years after Ottawa county left the 5th district to become part of the 9th. The 5th district now includes Ionia county.

It was during those years in Ford's district that the Holland Chamber of Commerce inaugurated annual "Breakfasts With Jerry" which in turn became the "Breakfast With Bob" for Bob Griffin, now U.S. Senator, and the "Breakfast With Guy" for incumbent Guy Vander Jagt.

Jerry each year brought his trailer to Holland and other parts of Ottawa county so that area residents could speak personally with their

Congressman on any and all subjects.

The courtesies of his administrative assistant, the late Frank Meyer of Grand Haven, are well remembered.

And there was many a visit to county conventions, local fairs and for rap sessions with the political science students at Hope College.

One well known visit to Hope College's Village Square stands out in memories. He was always surrounded with people and mixed easily in crowds. And he was easy to spot — a big man who never lost his image as the center of the line for the University of Michigan football team. Informality was his forte, and chance conversations were likely to be much more interesting than his prepared speeches.

When Ottawa county was in the 5th district, The Sentinel's correspondent in Washington, Esther Van Wagoner Tufty, had an annual date or lunch to prepare a story for the Tulip Time edition. There is less partisanship in Washington than most people believe, and Mrs. Tufty, a Democrat who is a sister of former Michigan Gov. Murray D. (Pat) Van Wagoner, always enjoyed these assignments, much as she did later with Robert Griffin and Guy Vander Jagt.

All in all, Holland like Washington will find it hard not to call him Jerry. For now it's Mr. President or The President.

A particularly interesting comment on Ford came from Maury De Jonge, Grand Rapids Press writer who was in Washington for the swearing in of Washington for the swearing in of another Michiganian, Maury East regarding western

Michigan as so very, very conservative.

Maury commented that to the East, God in His infinite wisdom had seen fit to put all the intellectual people on the East Coast with a few escaping to the West Coast, and a vast wasteland or wilderness in between.

He discussed it with Chief Justice Warren Burger who admitted this attitude prevails. But Burger spoke of some midwest giants, Sen. Arthur Vandenberg, Sen. Robert Taft and Sen. Everett Dirksen. "And if you want to go back further, there's Abraham Lincoln," he said. "That's a good place to start any time."

Henry Vander Linde of Holland Christian band fame recalls that when the Christian High Band went to Washington in 1968 to march in the inaugural parade, one of the selections was "Hail to the Victors," the fight song of the University of Michigan, as a salute to Jerry Ford.

In the Capitol, Jerry Ford was about the first person Vander Linde saw, and the two men had quite a chat. It ended up with making Ford a honorary member of the band.

On other fronts, it was a lot of fun to join in Marge Tatreau Day in Grand Rapids a couple of weeks ago, a salute to a hard worker and gentle soul who gets so much done behind the scenes. On the Red Cross front, she was a volunteer for many, many years and a staff member for 18, and it was the Red Cross that planned the party in Pantland Hotel.

Some years back, Marge was the hard-working business manager of Grand Rapids Civic Theatre and all theatre lovers know what a job that is!

Ivan Compagner, principal of Lincoln School, and his son John shared a rare adventure a few weeks ago when they joined four other fathers and eight children in a bike hike from Cumberland, Md., to Washington, D.C.

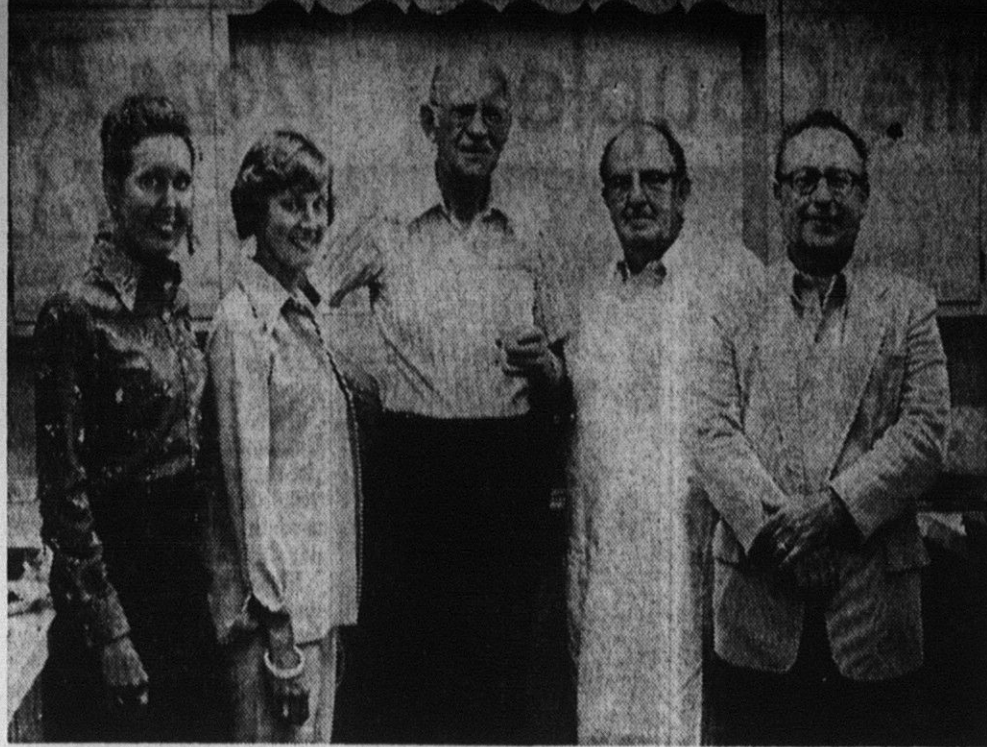

To emphasize board accommodations in providing all possible information on millage questions, attention was given to the board's Action Line in the superintendent's office, a 24-hour service in which persons calling leave names, addresses and telephone numbers, together with their questions. Calls will be returned. The special Action Line number is listed in the telephone book under West Ottawa Public Schools.

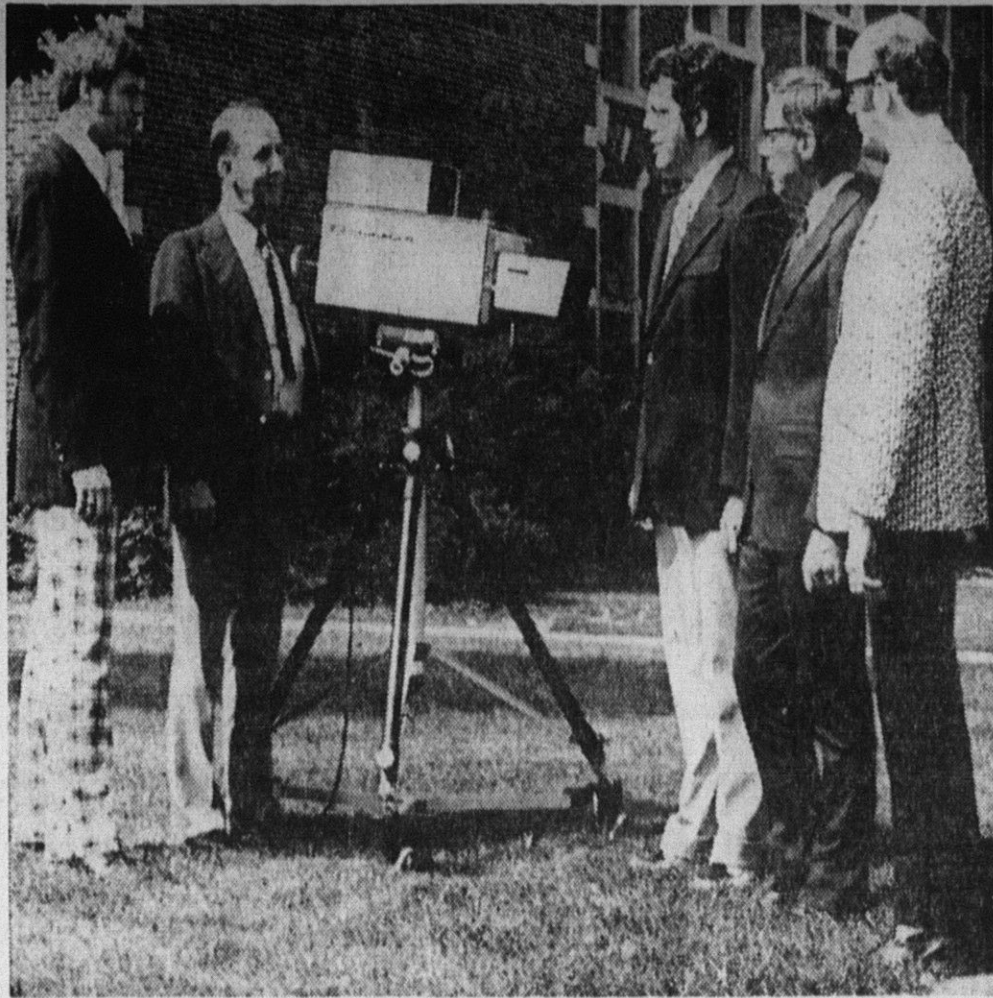
Van Raalte said organized efforts are being made to get out the vote next Monday utilizing PTO and booster clubs and person-to-person contacts through administration personnel.

In other business, announcement was made that the Holland City School District and South Ottawa Christian school have contracted with West Ottawa to provide hot lunches in elementary schools. Van Raalte said expansion costs are reflected in quoted prices, resulting in no additional costs to West Ottawa taxpayers. He said West Ottawa schools will begin the year at the 35-cent charge and reiterated that the West Ottawa program is self-supporting and that no local tax monies are used.

Big Dutchman Chief Gives Poultry Talk

NEW ORLEANS — Controlled feeding and caging systems have doubled the production of chicken and boosted egg production from 174 per layer to about 225 in the past 23 years, the president of Big Dutchman said at a meeting here Monday.

Joseph M. Reed addressed company distributors prior to the grand opening of the 15th World Poultry Congress. Big Dutchman is a world leader in the design and manufacture of poultry and livestock equipment.

Reed said American producers now get as many eggs with 20 per cent less feed and even with inflation a dozen large eggs today costs about 54 cents per dozen, the same price as ten years ago.

Chicken consumption per person averaged about 38 pounds of dressed meat last year and eggs consumed by the same person came to about 300.

Reed said the world's largest single-site automated caged poultry complex equipped by Big Dutchman opens this month in South Carolina. It will contain about 1 million laying hens and nearly 500,000 replacement pullets in rearing cages.

More than 5,000 poultry scientists and producers are ex-

pected to attend the World Poultry Congress. Seminars on new techniques in poultry production are being held at the congress which is held every four years.

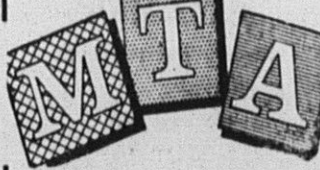
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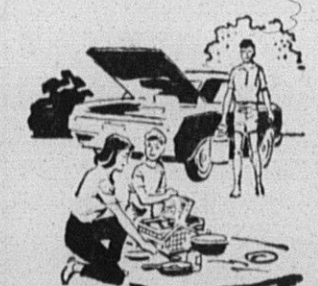
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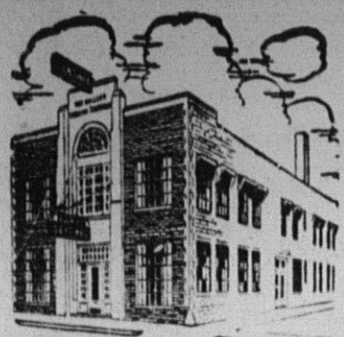
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THE SENSIBLE MOVE ON TIME

The object of various kinds of time is to arrange the day so that the period of greatest activity falls during daylight hours. This is the point of daylight saving time. There is no good reason why people should sleep into daylight and burn artificial light for their productive activities.

It's possible, though, that some of this rearrangement of time misses the objective. Daylight saving time during the winter months, for instance, results in getting up in the night and spending lots of early hours in blackness. It is particularly inconvenient for school children who must walk or catch their buses in darkness. This has resulted in many unnecessary accidents and fatalities.

So now the Senate and the House have moved to exempt part of the year — the winter months, November through February — from daylight saving time. It is in keeping with the objectives of time arranging and it avoids the inconveniences of dark winter mornings. It is a good move, one which many ordinary people have been advocating for some time.

Sunday School Couple Married 40 Years Lesson

Sunday, Aug. 25
Personal Relationships
in Christ
Colossians 3:12 to 4:1, 5-6
By C. P. Dame

The material of this lesson demands that we stress the essential truths strongly. Christians have received a new life—now they must manifest this in every area of life day by day.

I. Love is the church unites. It is essential. Christians are "God's chosen ones," and they should give proof of it in the church by practicing Christian virtues—verse 12 cites them. Good fellowship involves "forbearing" and the necessity of forgiving one another and "above all" to "put on love which binds everything together in perfect love." When it is absent things fall apart.

Love in the congregation reveals that the peace of Christ is present and thankfulness prevails which expresses itself in song and joyfulness, teaching and exhortation.

II. Family life involves obligations. The family is in trouble in our land. God established the family and gave orders regarding it which many ignore. The wife is important.

"Wives be subject to your husbands as is fitting in the Lord." Subjection is prompted by love and where the deepest love is present obedience responsibilities. Some feminists dislike the idea of a loving subjection and are untrue to their natural instincts. Marriage is not compulsory.

"Husbands, love your wives, and do not be harsh with them." Wives need love. Some modern wives complain because they have everything but love. The family needs a head, the husband holds that position. Children need discipline. Both parents have the responsibility of giving it but fathers are told that when they give it, not to irritate the children but to be reasonable, just, fair, impartial to praise as well as to reprimand.

III. Godliness promotes cooperation in society. Some Christians were slaves, some masters. Slavery is wrong. Eventually slavery was banished. Paul calls for obedience on the part of slaves, and fair and just treatment from the masters.

Observe that Paul relates everything in the home to God. Wives must submit "in the Lord"; children should obey "in the Lord"; slaves are to "fear the Lord"; and work as "unto the Lord," for they will receive a reward "from the Lord," and will "serve the Lord Christ" and masters are told they have "a Master in Heaven."

Christians have obligations to outsiders and hence they must pray and watch for opportunities to witness and this calls for gracious speech and conduct, which shows a knowledge of the Lord and of the faith.

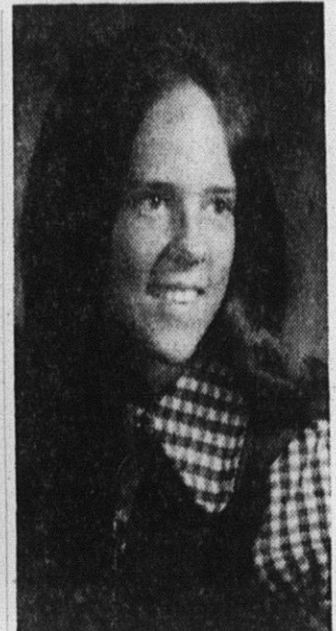

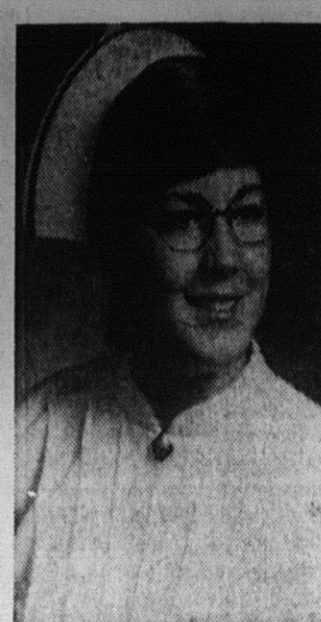

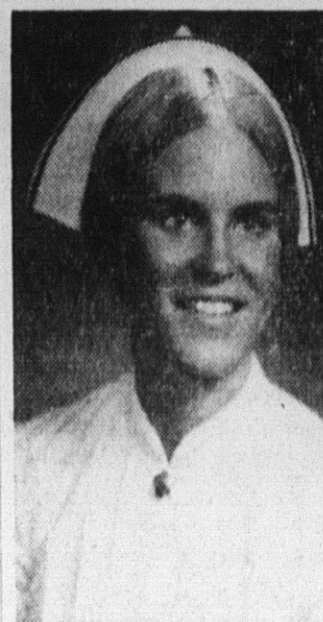
