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Verne J. Smith Turns Himself In To Local Officers

Wanted in Indiana For Armed Robbery: Stole Auto in Holland

Verne J. Smith, 21, of Allegan, wanted in Holland on stolen car charges and in Indiana for armed robbery, turned himself in to Holland police at 5:20 a.m. Monday. Police said that he drove a stolen car to the police station to surrender.

Smith has been identified as the pistol-waving man who tried to force a Michigan City, Ind., pastor at gunpoint to drive him to Michigan.

The pastor, the Rev. Christian Kocher, of the First Methodist Church, said that Smith entered early in the morning while he was preparing his sermon, and demanded that the pastor drive him to Michigan. Smith, who Rev. Kocher said appeared very nervous, told Rev. Kocher that he was "so deeply involved in crime that he was going to shoot his way to freedom."

When the minister refused to provide the youth safe conduct to Michigan, the ex-convict pulled a gun and threatened him. Said Rev. Kocher later, "I told him I was going to deliver my sermon on time, and that if he took a delight in shooting to go ahead."

Smith threatened and pleaded with the minister for an hour, but was unable to move him. He finally took the keys to Rev. Kocher's car and told him he would leave it in Chicago. The car was found later in Chicago.

Rev. Kocher delivered his sermon on schedule.

Holland detectives said that Smith admitted trying to force Kocher to drive him to Michigan.

After intensive questioning Smith told detectives that he held up five gas stations in the Chicago area and one grocery store.

The first stickup took place July 22 and the last one Aug. 13. On the last date he held up a Chicago liquor store including several customers.

Authorities said Smith told them he threw the .32 caliber revolver used in all the holdups in the Kalamazoo River near Saugatuck on the way in to surrender to Holland police Monday.

Detectives said they believe they have just scratched the surface and will continue to question him. He drove in with a car he had stolen from United Motor Sales Aug. 13.

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Verne J. Smith, 21, the Allegan ex-convict charged with breaking and entering and car theft, was back in his Ottawa county jail cell today after an unsuccessful suicide attempt Wednesday night.

Sheriff's officers said Smith slashed his arm between the wrist and elbow, and was taken to Municipal Hospital where the wound required 10 stitches.

Deputies Keith Averill of Coopersville and John Hempel of Holland who happened to be at headquarters to admit another prisoner took Smith to the hospital.

Smith said he cut himself with a razor but all attempts to locate such a razor were fruitless and Sheriff Jerry Vanderbeek believes he may have flushed it down the toilet.

The mountains of paper work that always accompany an army are taken care of by first Sergeant Jerry Kline, administrative assistant to St. Raymond Naber, Sp. /3 Roger Rottschaefer and Pfc. Sherwin Broersma.

On Friday more than 2,500 tents of all sizes will be taken down and put away for the year - if the weather is favorable. Rain, of course, would delay the striking of tents, but it is hoped that all will be ready for the pre-dawn move home early Saturday.

More than \$900,000 in pay and allowances will be distributed to the men Friday, so they shouldn't come home empty-handed. The men are due to arrive about 10:30 a.m. at the Army Saturday.

Council Approves Cash to Complete Hospital Building

City Council Wednesday night authorized expenditures requested by the hospital Board totaling about \$70,000 to complete renovations in the old section of Holland Hospital which was built about 30 years ago. These renovations are a part of the total hospital construction program which will cost in excess of \$1,400,000.

A good share of the renovation already has been completed. The entire new addition of the hospital has been in use for several months. The third floor of the old hospital building, formerly operating rooms and laboratories, has been turned into patient's rooms and is now in use. A good share of the second floor of the old building is now awaiting renovation. The old first floor will be done later.

City Council met with the Hospital Board Tuesday night and toured the entire hospital. In requesting authorization for final completion, the Hospital Board said sufficient assets are available in cash and pledges to cover the request.

Work had halted on the renovation some weeks ago after there was a question on numerous change orders and mounting costs of remodeling. The services of Arthur Read, public school building consultant, were obtained to determine the status of the renovation program and Read presented a 116-page report to the joint bodies earlier this week. Hospital Board President Clarence J. Becker presided at Tuesday's meeting.

Council approved the expenditures subject to establishing acceptable procedures on contract modifications as to work not yet done. Specific authorizations follow:

1. For contract modifications processed for completed work, \$14,470.25.

2. Work already completed for which contract modifications are to be immediately processed, \$18,000.

3. For work necessary to adequately renovate the remaining floors, together with other miscellaneous repairs and improvements, an estimated \$37,821.

Councilman Raymond Holwerda summed up sentiments of Council at the conclusion of Wednesday's meeting when he said that there have been a lot of unhappy and groundless stories circulating about the hospital construction program and Council's action indicated full confidence in the Hospital Board, plus a desire for speedy completion of the project. "The Hospital Board is to be complimented on a job well done," he said. He added that the meeting Council had had with the Hospital Board the previous evening was a highly informative session and the tour of the new and old facilities was particularly interesting. He pointed to future plans when the public will share in a hospital open house and be truly proud of this fine establishment.

Council also accepted with thanks two television sets for the hospital. According to a Hospital board communication, one television set and stand came from the Double Dozen Horizon Girls and the other from Automotive Replacement Parts. One set is in the pediatrics playroom, a great attraction for children.

Also delayed was Council's appointment to the appeal board, also caused by Mrs. Winter's resignation.

In other business, Council by a vote of 5 to 3 denied an application of the Gulf Refining Co. to build a gasoline station at the southwest corner of 16th St. and Central Ave. on the basis of public safety. A lengthy discussion on the subject involved presentations by Atty. Peter S. Boter representing the Gulf Co., William De Roo, local realtor, and a Gulf representative. Boter's arguments involved similar permits granted for stations at 24th and College, and at 18th and Washington. Casting dissenting votes are Councilmen William Heeringa, Henry Steffens and Nelson Bosman.

Council accepted for first reading a zoning ordinance which has been under study by the Holland Planning Commission for about four years. Before taking action, Council will meet with the Planning Commission to study the zoning pattern for the city and will call public hearings before action is taken.

Each Councilman received a large map showing all zoning for the city. Several changes have been made in the zoning pattern since the city plan was presented about four years ago.

Council approved a recommendation to terminate all rights if any, that the Pieper Jewelry store may have beneath the public sidewalk area abutting the store building on Eighth St., and instructed the city engineer to proceed to fill the vault and construct a standard sidewalk. This action is in connection with action Council recommended some months ago in replacing downtown sidewalks which were questionable as to public safety. The city manager said all owners whose sidewalks were in question have indicated their preference on type of construction ex-

Fence Required For Locomotive

Plans are progressing for displacing an old C and O steam locomotive in Kollen Park. City Council was informed Wednesday night.

Arnold Fox and William Wood said plans call for concrete base, a fence and the necessary track to move the locomotive to the site. Wood said the organization would like to undertake the project in this way if agreeable to Council.

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Final Construction Involves Renovation Of Oldest Section

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Mayor Appoints New Supervisor And Planning Commission Member

Arnold W. Hertel of Holland, a local insurance operator and former Councilman, was appointed to the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors by Mayor Robert Visscher at a regular meeting of City Council Wednesday night. Hertel will fill the unexpired term of the late Harry Harrington. He will be one of the city's five representatives on the county board.

Council approved a recommendation of Mayor Visscher to have the city attorney represent the city at a public hearing of the Holland Township Board of Appeals tonight in which Albert Hyma is seeking to establish a trailer court on Fairbanks Ave. in the vicinity of the city-owned Fairbanks Ave. park and Pilgrim Home Cemetery.

City Attorney James E. Townsend reported on attending several hearings of the Michigan Bell Telephone Co. in connection with rate increases. He said the increases sought and those finally granted amount to a savings of some \$81,000 a year for telephone customers in Holland area. Costs to the city of Holland for representation at the hearings amounted to about \$500.

Several bids were received at the meeting. Council approved a contract for approximately 14,303 square feet of four-inch sidewalk for Gerrit Israels who submitted the lowest bid of five bids at 24 cents per square foot. Council placed an order for 25 tons of flake calcium chloride with Solvay Sales Division at \$29 per ton, lowest of four bids. Duplicate bids for 200 tons of rock saltin bulk and 25 tons of rock salt in 100-pound moisture proof bags were placed by two firms at \$14.70 per ton for bulk and \$21.20 per ton in bags. Council placed the order with International Salt Co. in view of previous satisfactory service by the company.

City Clerk Clarence Greengood read two letters from the Michigan Office of Civil Defense, informing the city manager that the city is presently ineligible to participate in federal contributions and surplus supply programs. Future participation would be dependent upon the creation of an active civil defense program at the city.

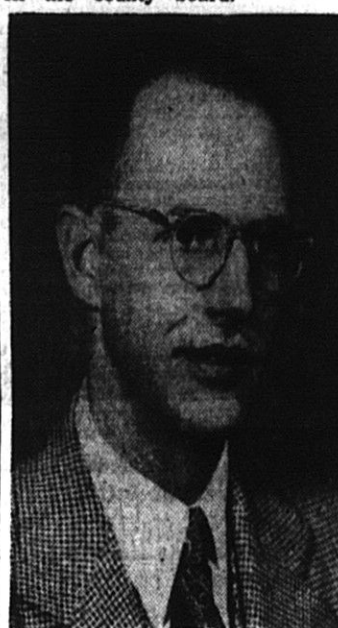

Body of Drowning Victim Recovered Just Before Noon

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — The body of Bernard Brown, 52, of 719 Lincoln Ave., NW, Grand Rapids, was recovered at 11:30 a.m. Monday from Crocker Lake in Chester township where the man was drowned about 3:40 p.m. Sunday.

Brown was in a 16-foot outboard motorboat with his wife and brother-in-law, pulling a 10-year-old water skier when the tow line became entangled in the propeller. Brown sought to free the rope but lost his balance and fell into water 55 feet deep at that point.

His brother-in-law, Leonard Van Single, tossed him a life preserver and then dived in to save the man. Brown, apparently in a panic, fought Van Single tearing off all the buttons from his shirt, and then sank.

Dragging operations continued until dark Monday. State Police Sgt. Milton Swingle, Sheriff Jerry Vanderbeek and Under-sheriff Harris Nieuwma returned to continue dragging along with others.

Four skin divers including two from Kent county and two state police troopers also attempted to locate the body Monday but the 55-foot depth made it too dark and they soon abandoned such efforts. The troopers were Richard Coleman of Grand Haven and Clifford Ellis of Rockford.

The body was brought to the surface at 11:30 a.m. Monday by Kent Hastings, Coopersville justice of the peace, and Norbert Denhof, Conklin deputy, who were dragging from a small boat.

Dr. Eugene Timmermans of Coopersville served as medical examiner.

The boating party was on the lake pulling 10-year-old Craig Van Single on water skis. In the boat were Brown, his wife, Van Single, and Van Single's 16-year-old daughter. The boat is owned by Brown's son, Jack, of Grand Rapids.

Brown's death marked the second drowning on Crocker lake this month. On Aug. 8 Stanley Krolewicz, 73, also of Grand Rapids, was drowned.

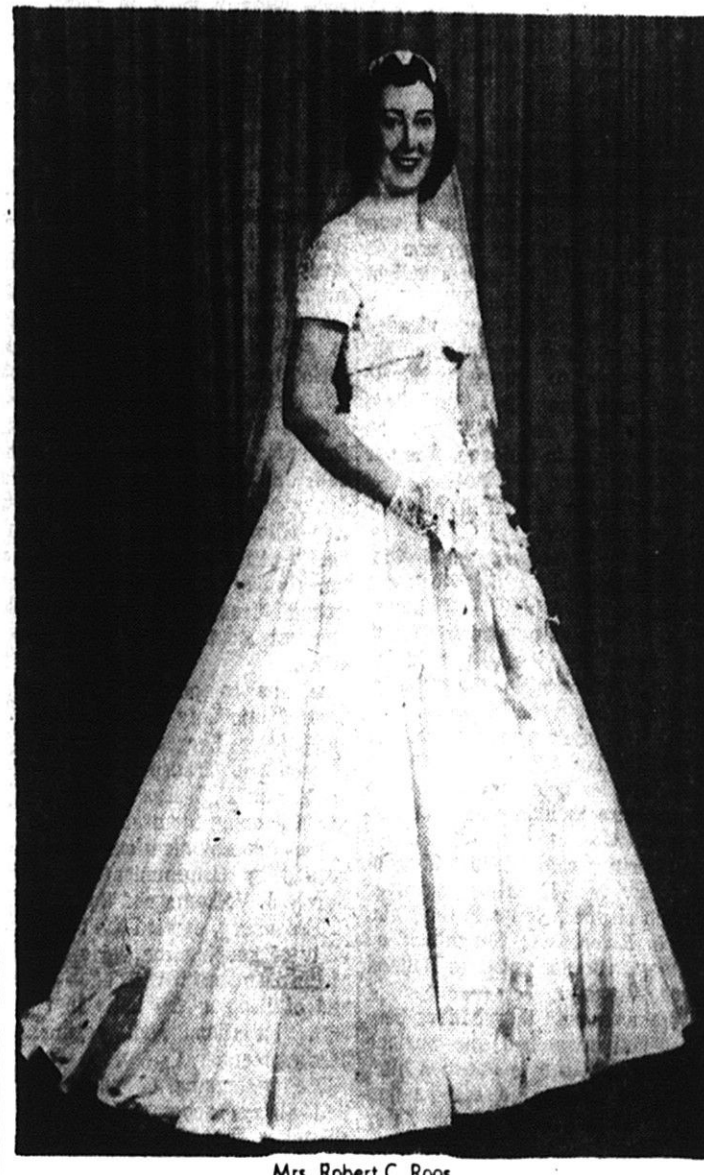

Library Shrub of Week Is Russian Olive Tree

Shrub of the week at the Holland Public Library this week is the Russian Olive or Elaeagnus Angustifolia.

This small tree has outstanding gray foliage and in this area is planted primarily for this feature. The foliage and texture emphasizes distance and the tree can be used for this purpose by placing it in the background of the border or in a far corner of the yard.

It grows in dry soils, needs sun. In the prairie states it is sometimes used as a windbreak.

The silvery berries are fleshy receptacles which enclose the true fruit, a single dry nut in the center. These so-called nuts are decorative and may be used in flower arranging.

Last fall the junior high girls in special education at Jefferson School glycerized several varieties of shrubs and tree branches containing berries or fruits as an experiment and they found that the Russian Olive was the only one to retain its true color. It was used in dry arrangements.

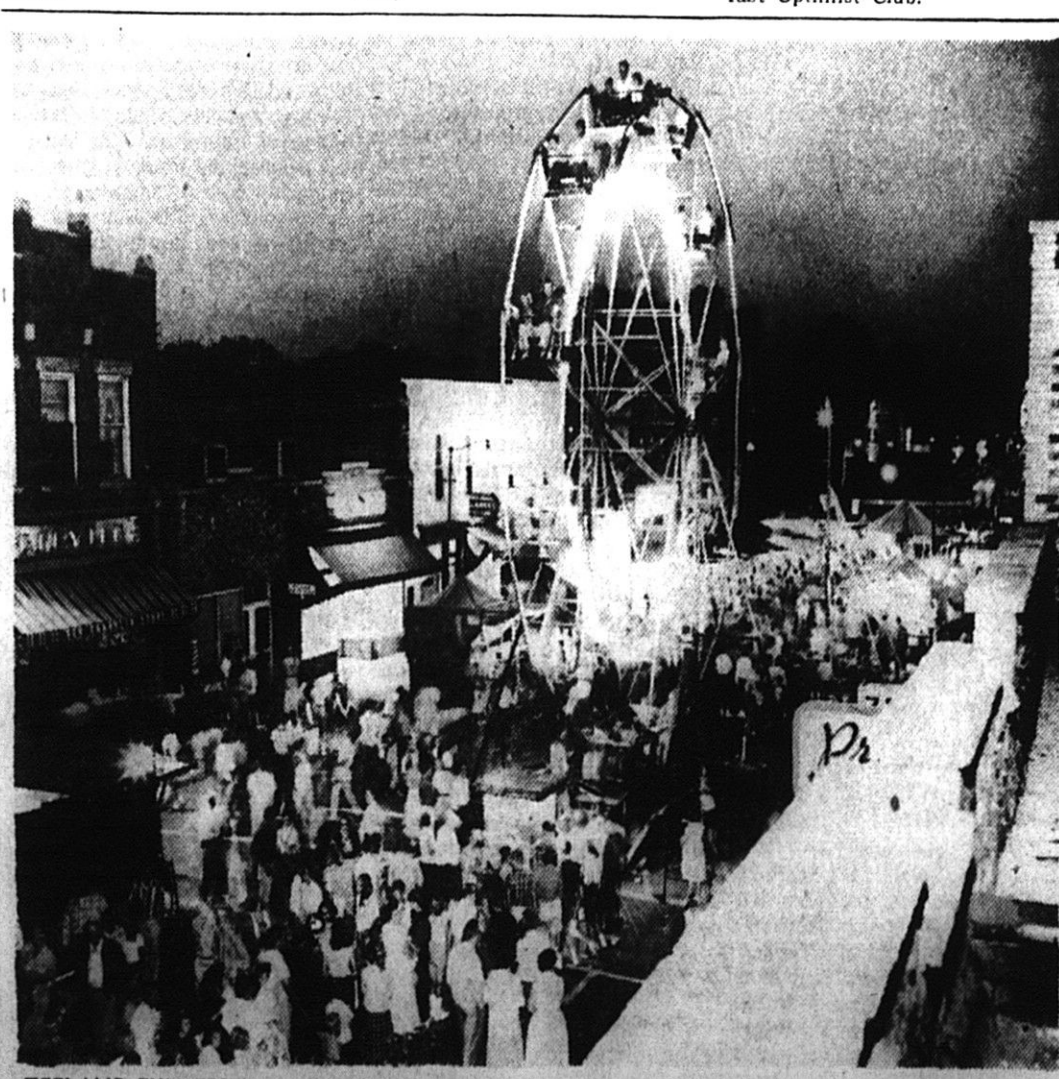

Burglars Fail To Open Safe At Local Co-op

Safe burglars hit twice Saturday looting the Dykstra Drug store, 149 North River Ave. of \$1,100 in cash and gaining nothing from the Holland Cooperative at 86 East Seventh St.

Entry to the drug store was gained by forcing the rear door or smashing a lock and steel bar across the door.

A bag containing \$618.33 and additional cash was taken from the safe. Three checks and a supply of narcotics kept in the safe were not touched.

Store owner Henry Dykstra said he did not know if the safe had been locked for the night or not. Ottawa County deputies said there were no pry marks on the safe.

Three cash registers in the store were also looted of petty cash. One of the cash registers was smashed open and \$25 taken. Small change was littered across the floor.

The drug store also operated as a postal sub-station. It was not immediately known if any stamps were taken.

The breakin was discovered at 8:30 Saturday. Authorities said the burglary happened sometime after 10 p.m. when the store was closed for the night.

A neighbor reported hearing loud hammering at 3 a.m. and believed it to be coming from a nearby gas station. A stubborn safe failed to yield to burglars at the Holland Co-op and nothing was taken.

Holland detectives said a chisel and punch were used on the six-foot safe. The corners were peeled back but the doors were not opened.

The burglars broke through the casing of a dock door to get inside the building. Detectives believed the men were frightened away before they could open the safe.

Nothing was missing except for a small box of knives. The safe contained records and an undetermined amount of cash.

Detectives said the work on the safe appears to be identical to the safe burglaries in recent months throughout the Holland area.

Elsewhere in Western Michigan burglars were also busy as two lumber company offices in Grandville and one in Hudsonville were entered.

Police Chief Don Stratton said \$750 was taken from the safe at the Hudsonville Lumber Co. Saturday morning. The safe doors were peeled back indicating the work of professionals.

Stratton said the thieves jimmied a rear door and quickly went to work on the safe. The same building was burglarized a number of years ago.

In Grandville the Empire Lumber Co. and the Community Lumber Co. were entered. Both safes were opened but only \$10 was taken from the Empire Co. safe.

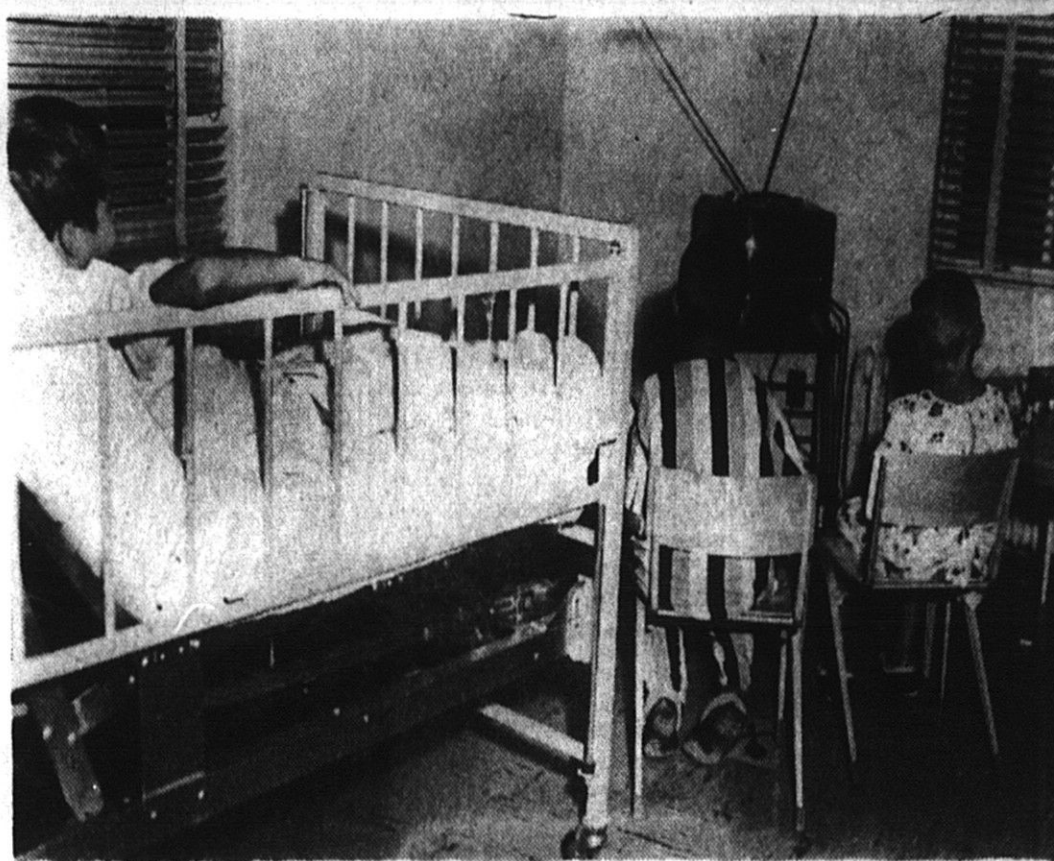
Traffic Crackdown Described as Success

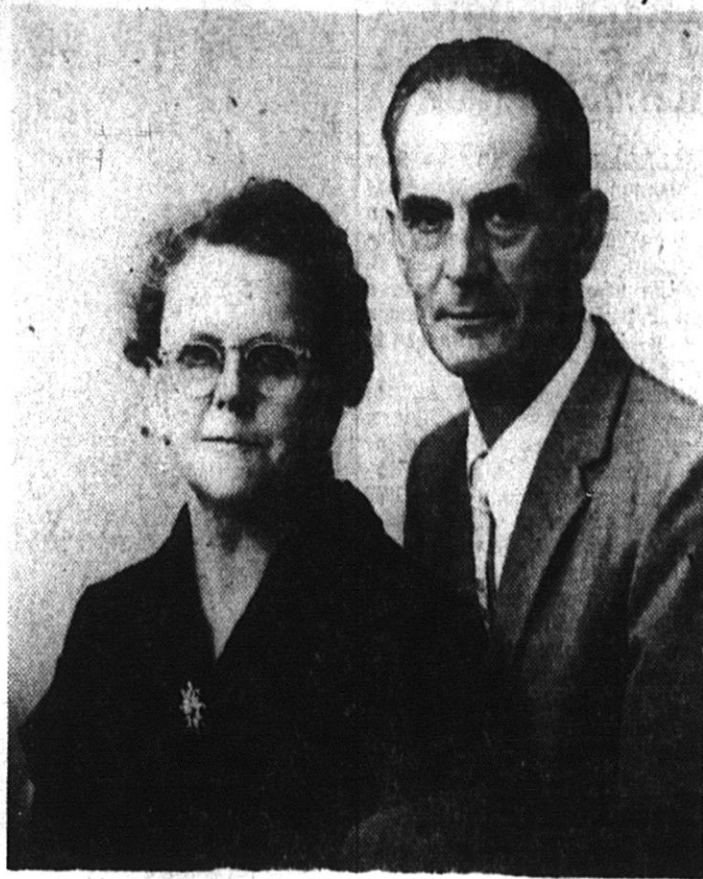

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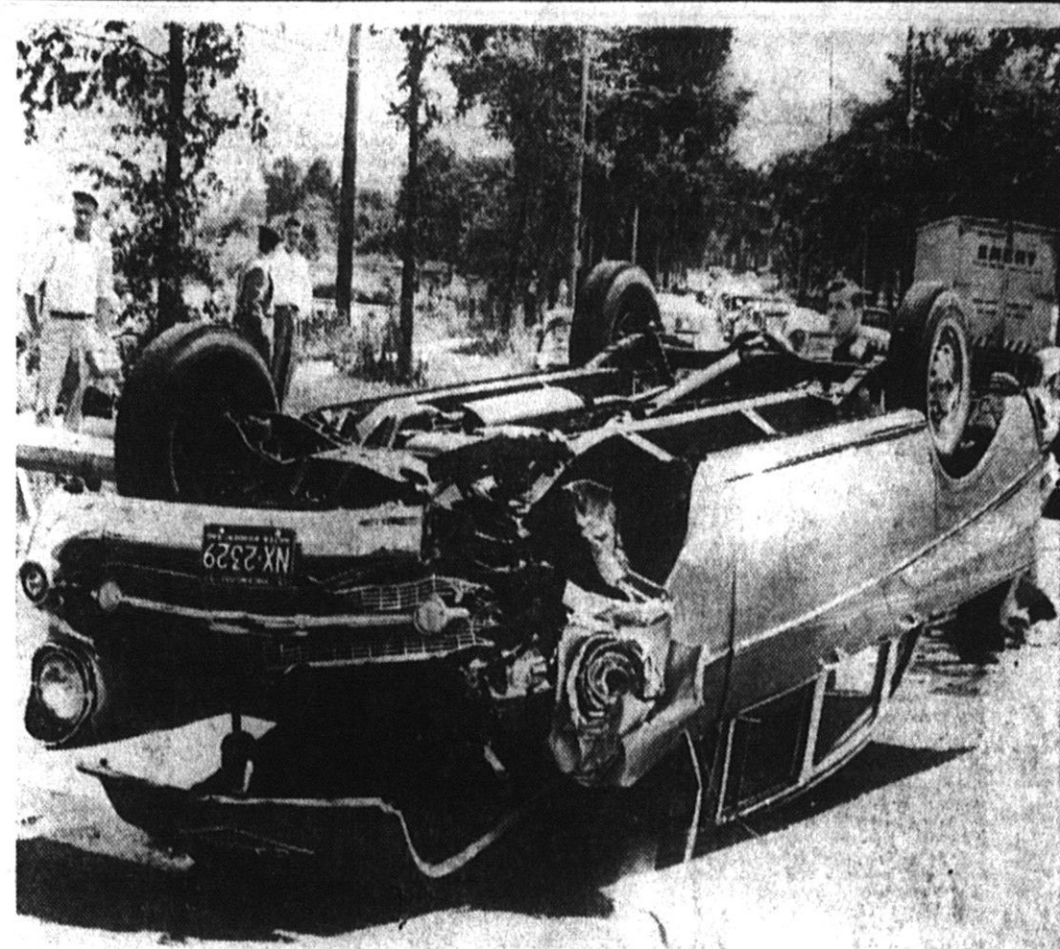

Holland Missionary Recounts 16 Months Under Chinese Reds

How is life under Communism? "Well, for one thing, they ask you all kinds of foolish questions," said the Rev. Walter de Velder, of 174 West 15th St., who spent 16 months in Communist China.

"They once asked me to write my life history for them. Other questions were: How did I spend my money? What were my thoughts toward the Chinese government 20 years ago? How was I connected with the United States government?"

"Life was very dull for us. We couldn't leave the city we were living in without their permission. And they never gave us their permission. We always had a terrible feeling of insecurity."

The Rev. de Velder, along with two other Americans, were in the city of Lungyien, 100 miles west of Amoy, as district pastors for the Reformed Church of America. The church had a hospital, a high school for girls, a primary school, and a church. There were 22 other churches and chapels.

There was no actual fighting and the Communists took over the city without resistance on Aug. 31, 1949. They were welcomed by many enthusiasts who were clamoring for a change. But soon disillusionment set in.

"We were told that we had freedom to travel but no passes were issued to us so we couldn't travel."

"We were told that there was complete religious freedom. But we were not allowed to hold meetings on streets or to preach in prisons — as we used to formerly."

"We were told that we had complete freedom of congregation. But on one pretext or another they 'borrowed' many of our churches, in some cases, to store rice. Out of the original 22, they borrowed 13. To the best of my knowledge, they haven't been returned yet."

"They didn't bother us, really. But they interfered with work."

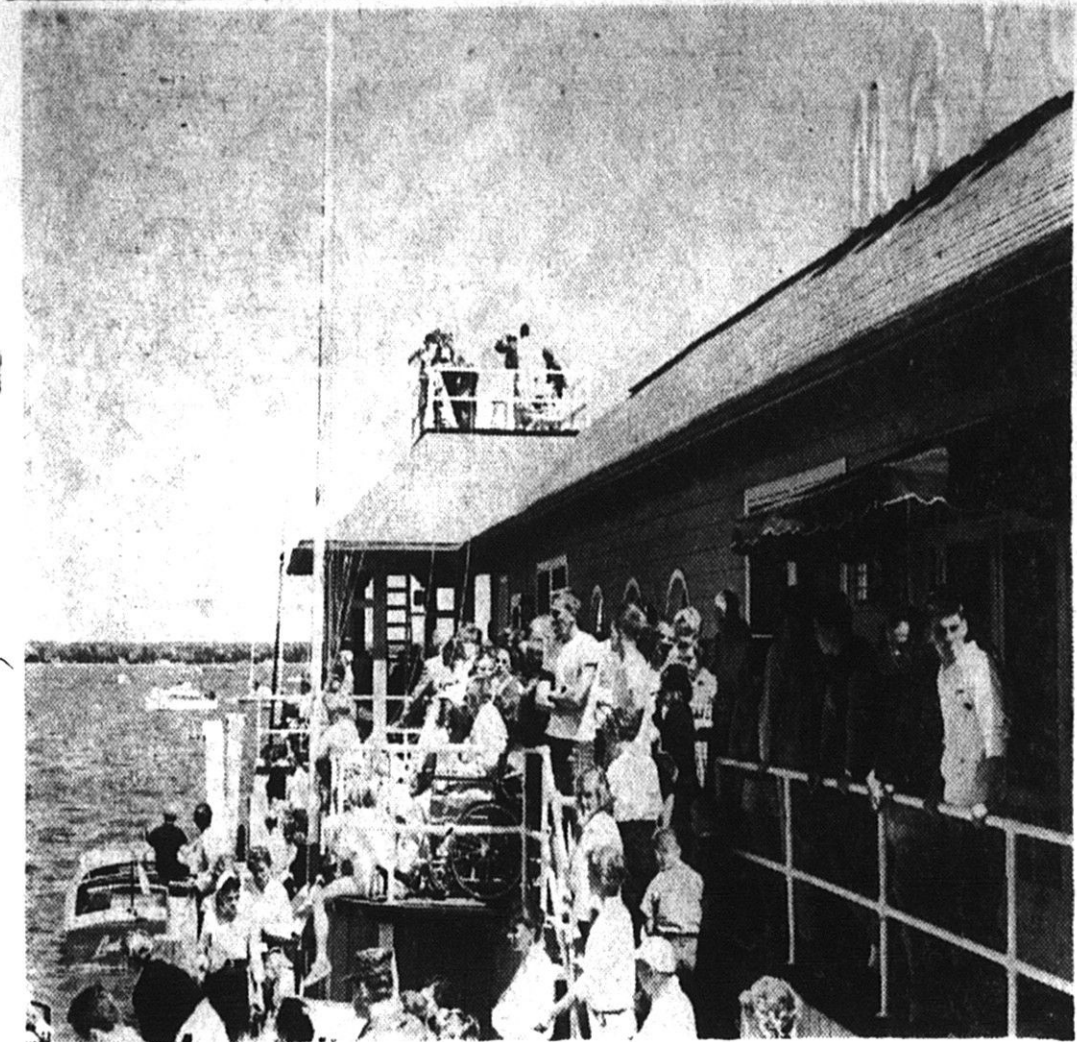
To Remaining Taxes

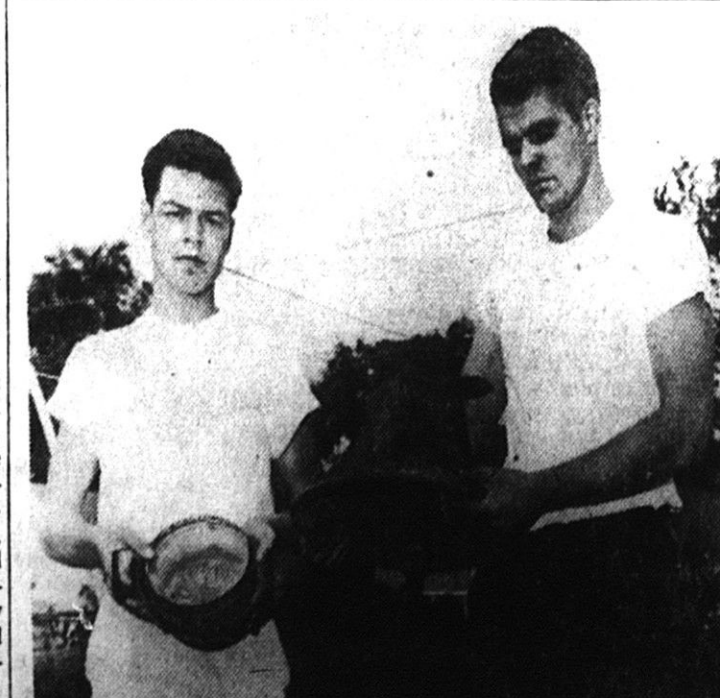
Dies Near Fennville
