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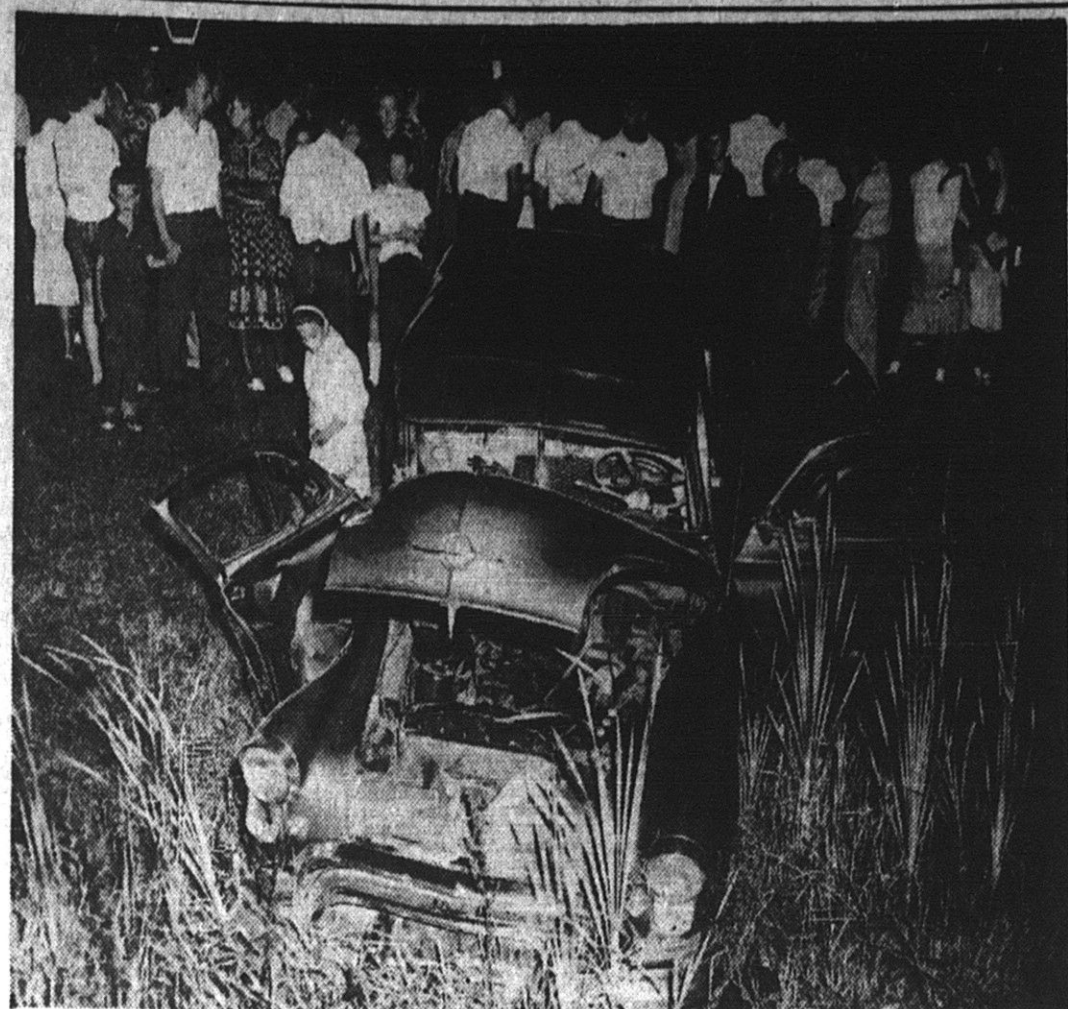


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THREE HURT IN CRASH — Three persons were rushed to Holland Hospital Sunday night when this car, driven by Benjamin D. Rowan, 41, of 115 East 25th St., and a car driven by 67-year-old Lester B. Wells of route 2, Fennville, collided at the intersection of the US-31 bypass and M-40 at 7:35 p.m. The Wells car is obscured by the large crowd which gathered at the accident scene. Wells

and his wife, Leona, 57, were reported in good condition by hospital officials. Both suffered multiple bruises. Rowan was released after treatment for minor bruises and a laceration of the head. Holland police cited Rowan for reckless driving. Police said Rowan, headed north on the bypass, turned left across the median and southbound lane into the path of the Wells car.

Council Seeks Federal Funds

City Council, at its special meeting Wednesday night, took action on two matters in addition to its lengthy discussion of the proposed zoning ordinance.

Council authorized application for federal funds to be used for the sewer improvement facilities. Dan McKean of Black and Veatch, consulting engineers, explained the nature of the available grant. He said if the grant is approved, the city could receive as much as \$250,000 which would be used for the new sewer treatment plant.

In line with its decision to seek the grant, Council agreed to submit its construction plans and specifications for the sewer plant to the state health committee for approval on or before Dec. 1, 1960. It also stated that contracts should be given out by May 1, 1961.

In additional business, Council okayed application from the Keith Heavy Movers to move a house from 50 East 10th St. to 240 East Ninth St.

It was stipulated that the applicant deposit with the Board of Public Works \$225 to cover the cost of disconnecting utility services along the moving route, and that the cost of any other services required by the operation also be paid to the city upon request.

A Western Michigan Record Collectors Society is being organized and plans will be discussed at its first meeting to be held Wednesday from 7 to 9 p.m. at the Chamber of Commerce Building in Grand Haven.

Warren Karp of Grand Haven has announced that all persons, 18 and over interested in the 78 rpm, recordings or those who would like to start a collection of old-time recordings are invited to the meeting.

Besides talks by Karp and a representative from Grand Rapids who will give the history of the making of the old time records, there will be a business meeting including election of officers. Karp also will have a tape recording of several records from his collection of 500.

Representatives are expected from the Muskegon, Holland, Grand Rapids and Grand Haven areas.

Sky-Watchers Offered Chances to Spot Echo

The U. S. satellite Echo can be seen as a bright star moving across the horizon six times tonight.

Holland sky watchers will be able to see the huge 10-story balloon at 5:15, 7:25, 9:32 and 11:37 p.m. and 1:44 and 3:55 a.m. The satellite can be spotted in the low south moving to northeast at 5:15 p.m.; at 7:25 p.m. it will travel from the high south to northeast; at 9:32 p.m. from the high north to the northeast, and at 11:37 p.m. Echo can be seen moving from the high north to southeast.

For the nighthawks Echo will be visible in the medium north corner of the sky moving to the southeast portions at 1:44 a.m. and at 3:55 a.m. it will be appearing in the low south moving to the southeast.

Local Policemen On Shooting Team

Three Holland policemen qualified Wednesday for the 20-man team to represent the Western District in the annual statewide police pistol shoot to be held next Thursday at Jackson.

Sgt. Ralph Woldring fired a 541 out of a possible 600 to lead Holland shooters. Patrolmen Paul Nieboer with a 525 and Gene Geib with a 524 also qualified for the team. The qualification round was held at the Kent County shooting range northeast of Grand Rapids.

The Western District is made up of police departments from Kalamazoo, Lansing, Muskegon, Wyoming, Holland, Grand Rapids, Grand Haven, Grand Haven State Police, and sheriffs' departments from Muskegon, Kalamazoo, Kent and Ottawa counties.

There will be four other districts competing in the shoot sponsored by the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police. The Governor's Trophy shoot will also be held in Jackson a week later.

Council Refuses To Reach Decision On Zoning Plan

Will Consider Objections To New Plan

Okay Three Requests For Changes During Long Special Session

The Holland City Council granted three requests for changes in the proposed new zoning ordinance of the city and denied five others during a special meeting Wednesday evening.

Council postponed a ruling on the ordinance as a whole and proceeded to effect the changes while meeting as a committee of the whole. It is expected that the group will now go ahead and study the other petitions which it has received in regard to the ordinance.

This action was taken despite a request made by Willard C. Wichers, chairman of the Holland Planning Commission, that the Council pass the proposed ordinance without debating at the present time over requests for specific changes in the plan. He asked that amendments be added if necessary after the ordinance has been passed and has gone into effect.

Council members, however, voted to set up an added industrial area as suggested by the Chamber of Commerce. The section is bounded by 24th St. on the north, 40th St. on the south, 120th Ave. on the east and the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad tracks on the west. The city stipulated, in passing the request, that it not be forced to provide water and sewer services until economically feasible.

It was also decided to keep the west side of River Ave., between 13th and 14th Sts., in a neighborhood commercial zone rather than change it to an apartment zone as listed in the proposed ordinance.

Ray Kolk's request for industrial zoning on his property south of the US-31 bypass and west of Central Ave. was granted. Under the proposed new zoning scheme Kolk's factory, Mechanical Transplanter, would lie in an agricultural zone.

Mayor Robert Visscher promised merchants representing the Maplewood shopping center that the planning commission and the Council would restudy the proposed zoning of the area as residential. The request to retain its present commercial status was denied after much discussion, with the agreement that the neighborhood commercial zoning in the Lincoln Ave. and 32nd St. shopping area also be given residential status. A suggestion was made by Earl Vander Kolk that the Maplewood and Lincoln Ave. shopping centers and the land between be zoned commercial.

The proposed apartment zoning on the east side of River Ave. between 13th and 14th Sts. was upheld by the Council when it denied a request to make the area commercial.

Tibor Hollo and David Shubow were denied a request to remove the residential buffer zone on their property bounded by 120th Ave., Eighth St. and M-21. The owners previously had been granted authority by the Holland Township Board of Appeals to use this property for a shopping center.

Paul J. Baker, who owns a grocery store at 19th St. and Van Raalte Ave., was denied a request to remain in commercial zoning. If the new proposed zoning plan passes the store will be in a residential zone.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Deur's farm at 325 East 24th St. will be zoned industrial under the proposed plan rather than agricultural as they requested.

A notice of land use was received from Chester Van Tongeren concerning his property located east of the US-31 bypass and south of 16th St. He asked that the property be maintained for commercial and industrial purposes granted him by the township board of appeals.

During the meeting, Wichers warned the Council that it should be careful not to make "haphazard decisions" on the petitions for changes. He said he was surprised by the Council's quick action in making changes in the ordinance which had been prepared by the planning commission only after many years of study.

Wichers said that if the Council is to take such action before adopting the ordinance, it should first embark on an intensive study of background information.

In answer to Wichers' criticism, Mayor Visscher and Councilman Henry Steffens protested that they did not believe the Council should act as a "rubber stamp organiza-

tion for any city commission. Visscher said it was the Council's responsibility to take the problems presented and to act on them.

He pointed out that the matter involving the zoning of River Ave. between 13th and 14th Sts. has been a hot issue for a long time. He said the issue was "down to the wire now" and that it was time for Council to take a stand.

In discussing the request by the economic and planning committee of the Chamber of Commerce for expanded industrial area, Wichers said that the planning commission saw no reason for a large section of such property and that it was attempting to keep industry controlled so that property values will not be blighted.

Visscher said that he had opposed an additional industrial section, but that he would support the Chamber's request if the city would not be asked to provide services for the industries. He also stipulated that there be a buffer strip of agriculturally zoned land 132 feet deep along the west side of 120th Ave.

With Council approving the Chamber's proposal, this meant a large area of potential industrial sites could be added to the 95-acre industrial park already designated in the zoning ordinance. The park takes in the Deur orchards between Lincoln Ave. and the US-31 bypass.

In deciding to keep the west side of River Ave. between 13th and 14th Sts. as neighborhood commercial rather than changing it to residential, Council was concerned with the question of changing areas in which businesses are already established. Although the planning commission felt it was preferable to steer away from spot zoning, the Council decided to allow the block to remain commercial.

Council granted Ray Kolk's request that his property south of the US-31 bypass be industrially zoned, after Kolk explained his apprehension that, if the areas were termed agricultural, he might not be allowed to expand his factory in the future.

During the session of the committee of the whole, Mayor Visscher turned over the chair to Mayor Pro Tem John Heitman. The meeting, which began at 7:30 p.m., was adjourned at 11:16.

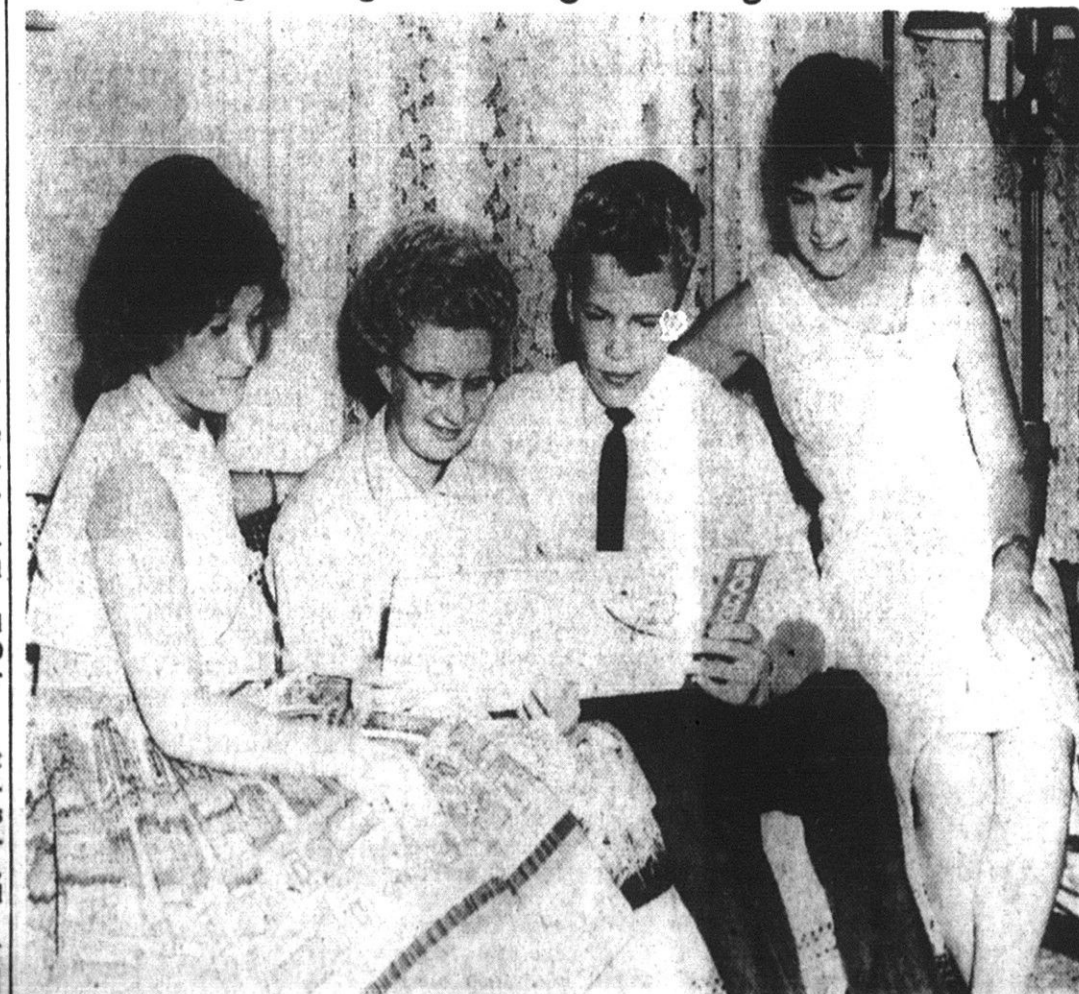
The meeting is open to all volunteer workers including Bible school personnel, thrift and teenage helpers, migrant center and Sunday service personnel as well as staff members and committee.

standing. Teenage Exchange Program. Eight families are offering hospitality to foreign exchange students for their senior year in high school, seven coming from Brazil and one from the Netherlands.

The Council participated in World Refugee Year by supporting Crusade for Freedom, in distributing Truth Broadcast Program materials and in the Feed-A-Family Christmas Card project, which provided food packages for hungry families overseas.

Through the Madonna Plan, the Council helped supply destitute mothers and babies with food, milk, vitamins and clinical care. At the annual convention held in Muskegon in May, council members donated new layette articles for overseas.

They also participated in Operation China Doll, which brought relief to destitute women and children in Hong Kong. All parishes in the council also supported the Catholic Bishops' Relief Fund and donated tons of new and used clothing for the needy overseas.

Ottawa County Farm News

By Richard Machiele

A lush, green lawn just doesn't happen as anyone who has ever tried to start a new lawn knows. A lawn, like any other landscaping feature, requires planning and preparation. The best time to start a new lawn is from Aug. 15 to Sept. 1 in the Lower Peninsula and from Aug. 10 to 25 in the Upper Peninsula. Late fall and early spring plantings can give good results, but mid-summer seedings are not always successful.

In preparing to plant a new lawn, grading, drainage and the type of soil in which the grass seed will be planted are important points to consider, Michigan State University soil scientists say. A good grade slopes away from buildings in all directions. These keeps water drained away from basements and structures. A gentle slope is also easiest to maintain and gives a more pleasing landscape effect. Terraces and steep slopes make it difficult to get a lawn started, besides making the upkeep a more difficult chore. Grass roots can't live in waterlogged soil, so the subsoil should be well drained to depth of about two feet to give roots a chance to develop. Where the soil is clay or swampy, it may be necessary to install a tile drainage system to drain off excess water. Fine textured soils such as clay usually aren't good surface soils since they hold excess water. Sandy soils present another problem since water that grasses need drains away too quickly.

The ideal surface soils for lawns are the dark colored loams and sandy loams. Granular clay loams and silt loams are also good grass growing soils. Organic matter, which is responsible for the dark coloring of these soils, is an important part of the surface soil. Green plant material or well-rotted barnyard manure can be used to supply organic matter to soils that lack them. Peat and muck soils which aren't good lawn soils can be mixed with clay or loams to supply organic matter.

A good surface soil for a lawn can be prepared by mixing a bushel of peat or muck with one bushel of clay soil and one bushel of course sandy soil. Clay loam used in the same proportions with sandy and organic soils gives a satisfactory mixture.

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OUR LEGISLATURE AND NEW LAWS

Recently we noticed that nearly 100 bills became law 90 days after the close of the session of the Michigan Legislature.

The lawmakers voted a pay hike of \$1,000 in salary and \$250 in expenses for the Legislature that will be elected next November 8. With the state wondering where they are going to get the money to meet many of the expenses we wonder just how high we can go with some of these money bills. If this increase in salary and expense will help encourage better members of the legislature then the cost may be worth it to the taxpayers. They, we hope, will have the answer to some of our financial problems. Then, we notice that the Supreme Court justices received pay hikes of \$7,000 bringing the salary to \$25,000.

It seems to us that with the general election a little more than two months away that it is a good time to ask some of the elected officials just what they are going to do to reduce some of the expenses instead of increasing them? We are going to need to come to the reality some day that we cannot spend ourselves out of debt.

Next month the schools will be getting ready to open and there are going to be a lot of schools that will be asking the Municipal Finance Commission to approve requests for tax anticipation notes, to help with the cost of operation.

Lesson

Sunday, August 28
The Danger of Military Alliances
Isaiah 30:1-3; 30:15-18
By C. P. Dame

Isaiah is one of the five major prophets and he is rightly considered one of the greatest of all the prophets of Israel. He not only revealed God's will to the people but he also counseled and reproved kings. It was the aim of Isaiah to make the nation see the folly of making military alliances and the wisdom of trusting God.

I. It is unwise to ignore God. This is what Israel did in times past and this is what many people and most nations are doing at the present time. Our lesson text begins with the word "woe." This word was spoken not to pagan people but to God's covenant nation. God's people are called "rebellious children." And why? Because they disobeyed God and followed their own ideas.

Palestine was situated between Assyria and Egypt. King Ahaz of Judah had made an alliance with Assyria. This really meant that it had been made a satellite of Assyria. The nation resented this situation. After the death of Sargon II, king of Assyria, the smaller nations thought that it was most opportune to throw off the Assyrian yoke. Judah joined in with this plan. In Judah there was a strong Egyptian party. This party sent a delegation to Egypt for the purpose of making an alliance with that nation. It was more or less a secret move on the part of this faction.

God was not consulted at all about this alliance as the words, "that take counsel but not of me" reveal. Once God had delivered Israel from the bondage of Egypt and He had forbidden the nation to have any dealings with Egypt. It seems that the lure of Egypt was always present. By going to Egypt the delegation showed that they did not care about God's will. It seemed good politics to get help from Egypt. However, God disagreed. Egypt was known to make great promises but it often failed to keep them. Note the words, "and to trust in the shadow of Egypt." What good is a shadow? History proved that Egypt failed to help Judah. Assyria defeated the Egyptians in battle.

It is foolish to disagree with God. Isaiah told the nation what not to do and what to do. It is important that a nation consider the Holy God—Isaiah speaks of the "Holy One of Israel." To trust in Him is essential. The prophet told the nation to return to God in penitence and that meant to stop looking to Egypt. Secondly he urged the nation to rest in the Lord and rely upon Him and not upon foreign military equipment. The third thing to do was to cultivate quietness of mind—to empty the mind of all anxiety and fear and fill it with assurance. The fourth step to take was to trust God who is the Sovereign Ruler of all nations. The formula which the prophet prescribed for Israel is good for us also. Alas, the people refused to heed as the words, "and ye would not" indicate.

The people said they would "speed upon horses" against the enemy but the prophet said that they would speed away from the enemy in shameful defeat. The people said that they would "ride upon swift steeds" but the prophet replied that their "pursuers shall be swift" and overtake them, and destroy them.

The prophet predicted that the nation would be defeated and they would be "left as a beacon upon the top of a mountain and as an ensign on an hill." In spite of the stubbornness of the people God was still waiting for them to return so that He might show them mercy. We too have to do with a waiting God. In this day when the destructive weapons are terrible it is urgent that we turn to God.

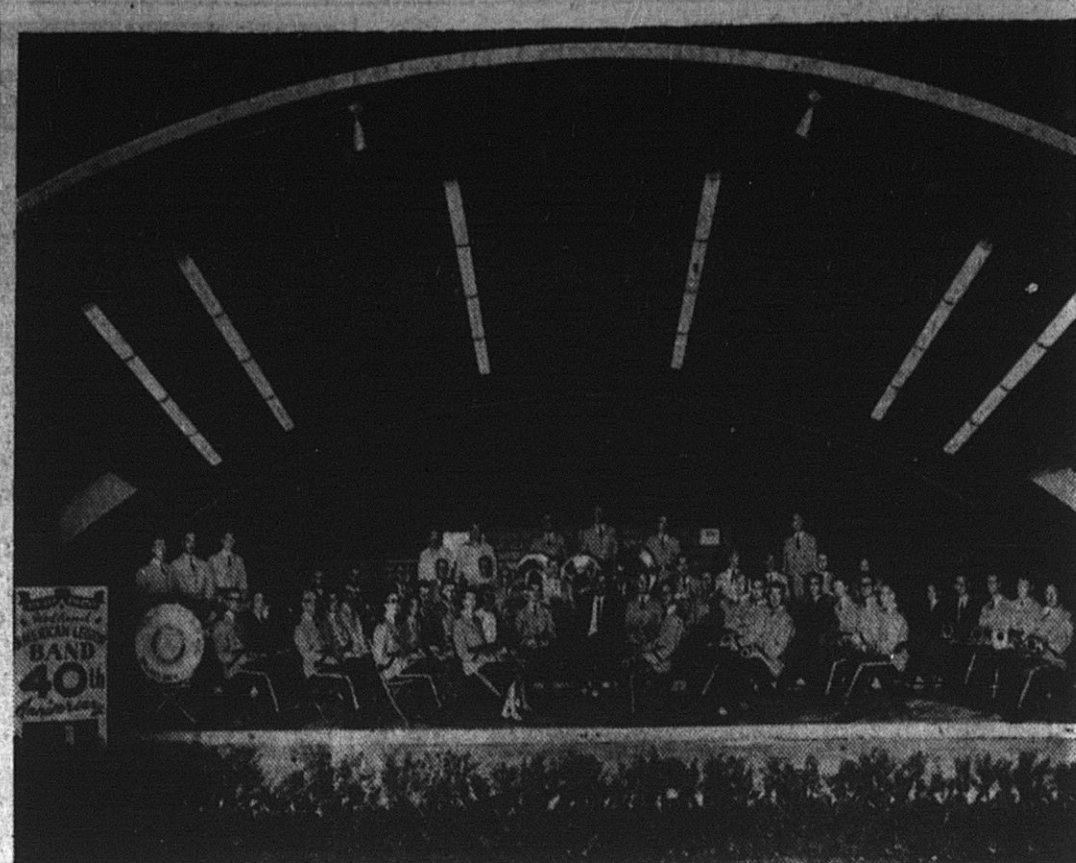

Several Items Receive Action From Council

ALLEGAN (Special) — City Council Monday night placed a "public nuisance ordinance" on first reading, gave its unanimous approval to the Griswold Memorial Building schedule of charges and voted down two proposed changes in the city charter.

The nuisance ordinance cited obnoxious odors, loud and excessive noises, littering public places, planting shrubs in parkways where they obscure the view of oncoming traffic, and planting box elder trees. Under the new regulations, no household could keep more than two dogs of licensable age or allow any dog or other domestic animal, except a cat, to run at large, and any person allowing a dog to remain about or on his premises would be deemed the owner.

Reporting on results of a canvass of city employees regarding the council's proposal to raise wages in lieu of furnishing clean uniforms, City Manager P. H. Beauvais said department heads indicated workers were unanimously in favor of the present plan.

As if to give added weight to their opinions, at the same time the council was in session, hourly rated employees of city electric, street and sewer departments were meeting in a private home to further organization of a local of the AFL-CIO Municipal Employees union. Organizational efforts started after a portion of the council indicated opposition to certain fringe benefits presently received by city workers, including the uniform service, and to the holding of outside part-time jobs.

In approving the rental schedule presently in effect at the Griswold building, the council also expressed its appreciation for the work done by Chairman Glen Overton and other members of the board of trustees.

Three bids, ranging upward from \$2,187, were received on a new street department truck, and a committee made up of Mayor Marvin Hays, Tom Surprise and Dan Conroy was named to study the bids and award a contract.

Two proposed amendments to the city charter, offered in hopes they could be voted on at the November election, were disapproved by a 3-2 vote. The proposed changes would have reduced the term of office for a councilman from four to two years and increased the charter limitations on purchases authorized by the city manager from \$200 to \$400.

The council also authorized purchase of a new bookkeeping machine for the utility billing department.

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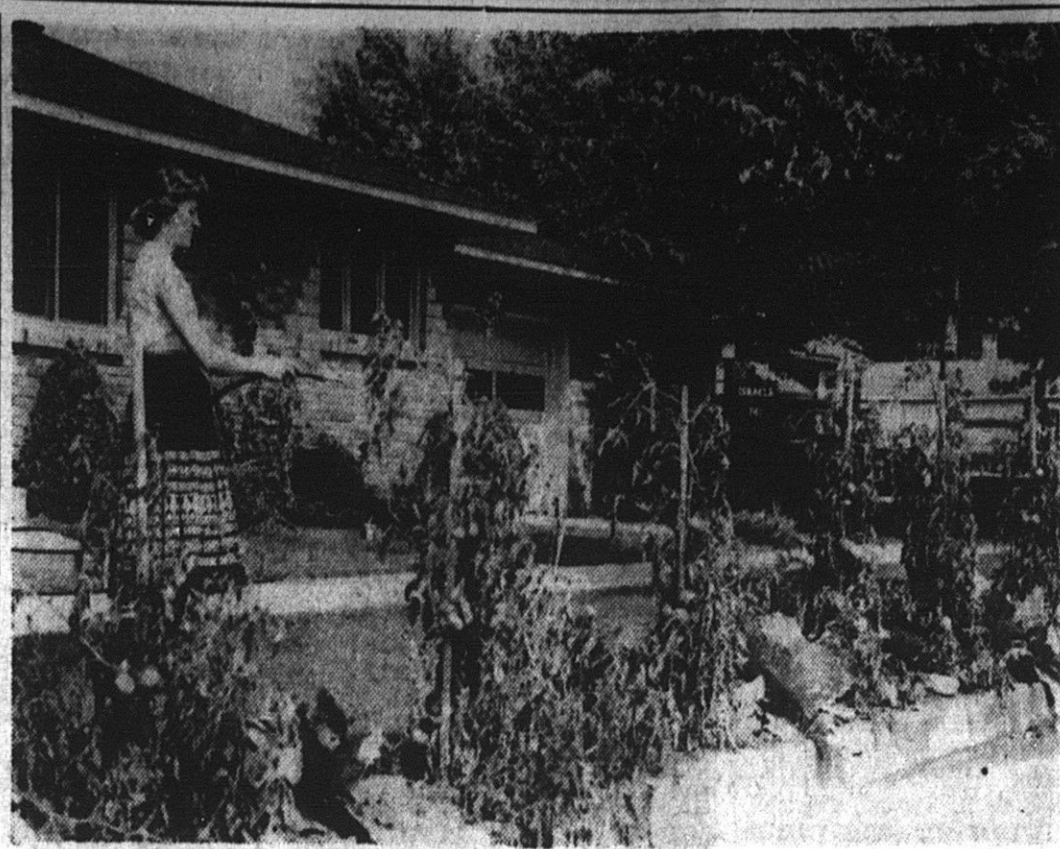

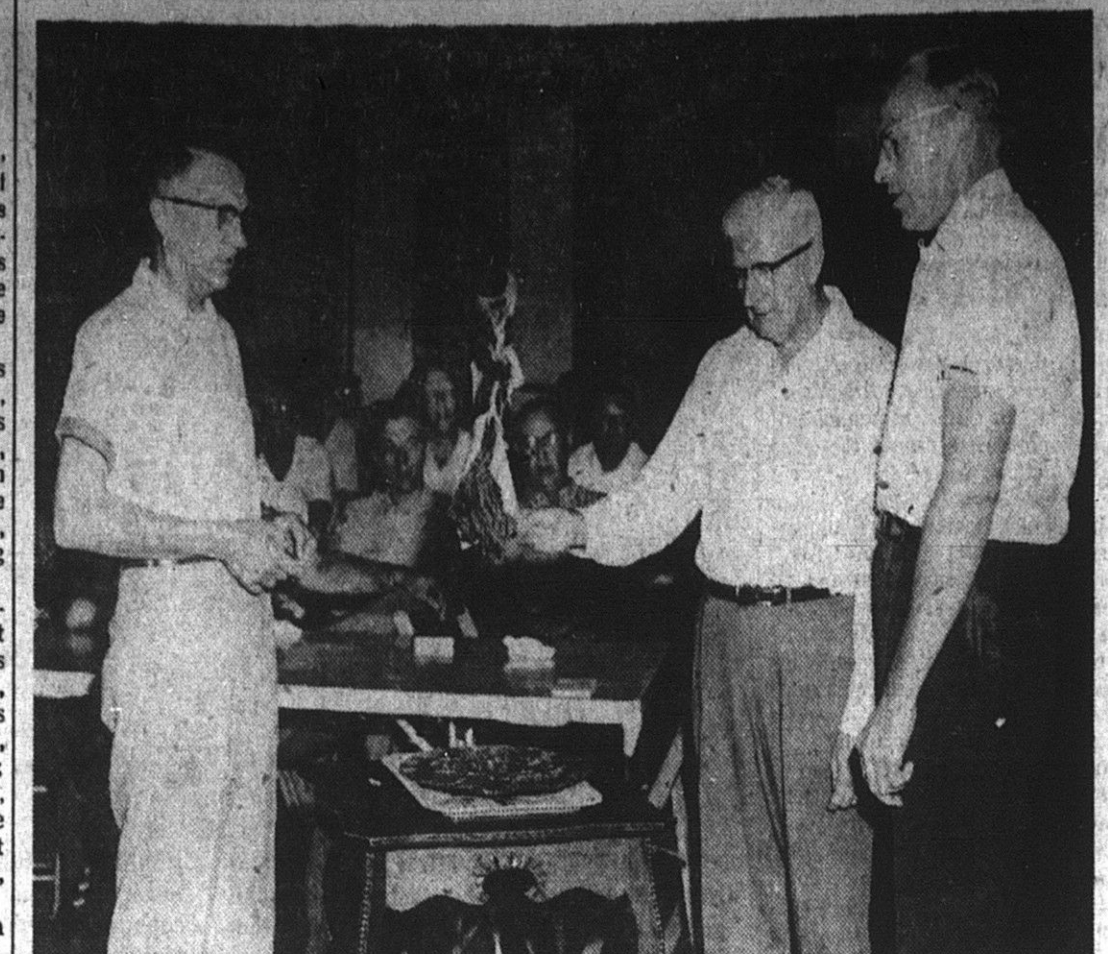

Local Bystanders Can Watch Light Plant's Construction

Sidewalk engineers have plenty to watch these days as structural steel is being put into place for the addition to the James De Young light plant on West Third St.

Across the river may be seen activity on a new building for Parke, Davis and Co.

The new \$5,400,000 addition to the light plant is expected to be in operation by June, 1961. It has dimensions of 70 by 120 feet and is 20 to 30 feet higher than the existing power plant. It will house a new 22,000 kilowatt turbo generator unit which will boost output from the present 31,500 kilowatts to 53,500 kilowatts.

Even with this boost in power, the Board of Public Works expects it will have to start planning for another addition in three or four years to meet the needs of an expanding economy in a growing community. To this end, present plans call for many installations that will be used in subsequent expansion programs. For instance,

the east wall will be of removable steel panels instead of a brick wall which would have to be torn out.

The steel work is expected to be finished around the latter part of September. Thereafter footings and walls will be erected and floors poured at various levels. The new General Electric turbo-generators will be installed sometime in October. The installation involves considerable heavy machinery, underground conduits and a 100-foot conveyor belt which will carry coal to the top of the new building.

To date, building has been practically on schedule or just a trifle behind, according to BPW Supt. Guy E. Bell.

Carl Tidd Describes Swedish Education, Sports, Religion

Holland's 'Community Ambassador' Having lived in Sweden for several weeks, during which I have visited schools, churches and sports events, I should like to acquaint you with Sweden's educational system, sports interests and religious institutions.

Compulsory schooling begins at the age of seven and may either last for seven years followed by a continuation course or extend for eight or nine years.

After the sixth grade (and sometimes after the fourth), the elementary school pupils can elect to leave for a secondary school known as "realskola" or for a special school. The American equivalent of the "realskola" is the junior high school.

From the junior high school, which lasts three or four years, the student may pass to the senior high school or "gymnasium" which prepares them for university studies.

The final examination of the "gymnasium" is very difficult and covers everything the student has learned previously. Anyone not passing the exam is disgraced, while those who succeed are given a huge celebration by their families and friends.

Sports and outdoor life play a dominating role in Swedish communities. It is estimated that six out of every 10 men between the ages of 15 and 50 engage in some sport. Swedish football is the most popular sport. It is the same as American soccer. Skiing ranks next in popularity, followed by track, swimming and field athletics.

Of course, boxing is also popular and the Swedes are very well informed. My youngest Swedish brother Hakan, aged 11, stayed up until 3 a.m. listening to the Johansson-Patterson fight. His first English words to me were, "Ingemar is a pig, too much girls. Floyd is best."

Most Swedes belong to the Established (Lutheran) Church. However, there are a few Baptists, Methodists and Roman Catholics. A Swede is born into the Established Church, but he has the right not to belong to any congregation. By law, Lutheranism

must be the faith of the King and Cabinet members dealing with church matters.

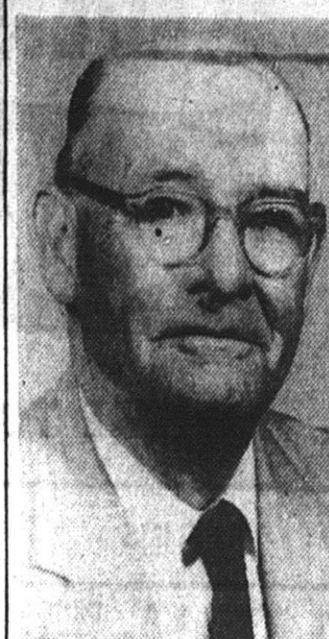

The varsity will draw equipment Friday, Aug. 26 at 8 a.m. and the reserves will draw gear Friday at 9:30 a.m. Practice for both teams will begin Monday, Aug. 29.

Freshmen prospects will have physicals Friday at 8 a.m. and will draw equipment Monday at 8 a.m. Don Piersma, former varsity backfield coach, will assist Ted Boeve with the fresh this fall. Ed Damson has retired from coaching after 24 years.

Hinga will have Jim Jebb as his line coach and Bob Weber as end coach. Both will be starting their second year while Tom Carey and Carl Selover will be handling the Holland reserve football team.

Looking over prospects, Hinga felt that the first string line would be as sound as any Holland line since the 1955 group which helped the Dutch compile a 5-3-1 record.

"Our line might be better than the '55 front line," Hinga said. "We should be able to move faster on the line, Hinga said, "but we won't have any depth."

Holland will have a letterman at every spot, except center, on the forward wall. Leading the group will be senior ends Ben Farabee and Jim De Vries, who have each won two letters.

Returning at tackles will be seniors John Stam and Chuck Kuipers while two-time letterman Bob Klaver and senior Buel Vanderbeek are veteran guards.

Paul Bast, who received a varsity reserve letter, is the top center candidate.

Senior Gary Smith, who lettered at guard, has been moved to the backfield and will be used as a wingback in Holland's winged-T offense. Smith played halfback on the reserve team two years ago.

He will be joined by three other lettermen in the other backfield spots. Quarterback Rog Buurma has been a two-year regular and Chuck Klomparsen played regular halfback some of the time last year.

Russ Kleinheksel, another senior, who played some last year, is the top fullback candidate while letterman senior Jim Borowski is backing up Buurma. Bob Elenbaas, who saw some service at halfback, is another senior letterman.

This gives Hinga a dozen lettermen he can count on this year and he has linemen Bob Fitch and Henry Yeomans and halfback Gary Teall, who has added size, back from the varsity reserve lettermen.

Hinga will rely heavily on the seniors, several who are playing their third year on the varsity. "We won't have much depth and we'll depend on inexperienced boys and competition for jobs to produce our bench strength," Hinga said.

With Buurma developing last year into a fine passer and with good receivers in Farabee and De Vries, Hinga indicated that the Dutch can be expected to have a concentrated aerial game again this year. Hinga thought the offense moved the ball well last year in the winged-T and he will stick with this offense. Holland had a 4-4-1 record last year.

Allegan Parks Need Money

ALLEGAN (Special) — A group of Allegan county supervisors will propose a plan for nearly tripling the current \$6,500-per-year budget for maintenance and improvement of county parks when the Board of Supervisors meets in October to set the 1961 budget.

Conditions at the county's three parks, located at West Gun Lake, Dumont Lake and on Lake Michigan in Ganges Township, have been reported as "very bad" this summer.

County Highway Commission Engineer-Manager Donald Ratigan estimates that proper maintenance of the parks could be provided with an annual budget of \$15,000 or less.

During the 10 weeks in which the parks are most frequently used, attendance has been estimated at more than 150,000 persons. Some supervisors believe that park users would not object to a moderate charge such as 25 cents per park to help provide funds for park improvements and expansion. However, it has been pointed out that both the Dumont and Lake Michigan parks are too small for this.

Ratigan said that the parks are presently being maintained by whatever highway crew is working in the areas on Monday. He feels that with an adequate budget the responsibility for the parks could be assigned to one man who could devote full time to the work of keeping them clean and properly maintained.
