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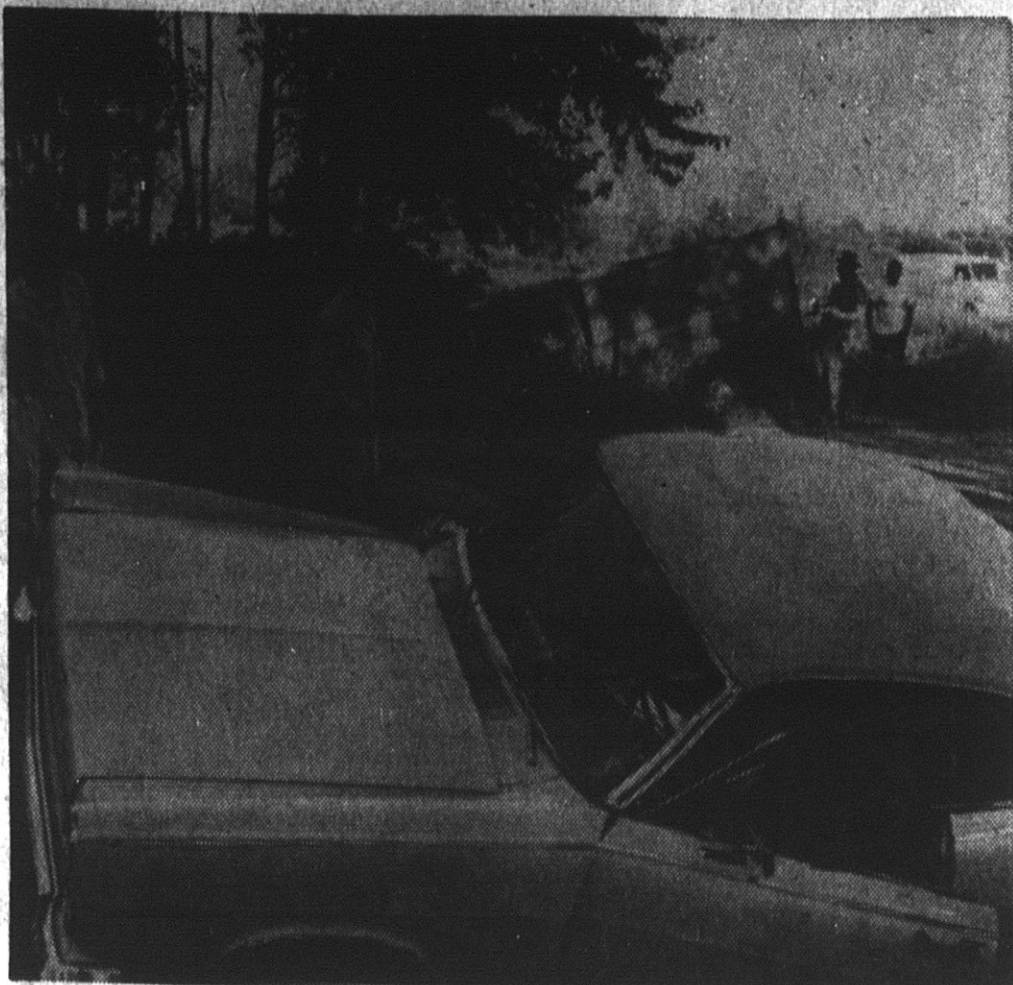

Car-Truck Accident Injures Six

Three of six persons injured in the collision of a car and a pickup truck Monday at 5:51 p.m. along 136th Ave. at New Holland St. were in good condition Tuesday in good condition.

Admitted to Holland Hospital were Jack Kievit, 32, of 390 Mayflower, Donna Kievit, 26, and Todd Kievit, 8, both of 3445 Butternut Drive, all passengers in a car driven by David Kievit, 21, of 390 Mayflower.

David and another passenger, Shelli Kievit, 5, of 3445 Butternut Drive, were treated and released from the hospital. The truck driver, Harold Bosma, 40, of 4734 152nd Ave., sought his own treatment.

Jack suffered multiple lacerations, Donna lacerations of the forehead and possible internal injuries. Todd scalp lacerations, Shelli lacerations of the knee and David, lacerations of the ear.

Ottawa County sheriff's deputies said both vehicles were northbound on 136th Ave. when Kievit attempted to pass the truck but observed a car coming from the opposite direction and struck the truck in the left rear.

The impact sent the vehicles off the opposite sides of the road. The truck was carrying some blueberries which spilled during the mishap.

Deputies continued their investigation.

West Ottawa Resolves Negotiations

Tentative agreement on a contract for West Ottawa teachers was reached at an extended meeting Tuesday night with Mediator Robert G. Mason of the State Labor Mediation Board.

The agreement on a salary schedule will be presented to the West Ottawa Education Association and the Board of Education for ratification. A few pending minor details, mostly concerning wording in the agreement, will be resolved by a joint committee in the next day or two.

Carl Schaftenaar served as chief negotiator for the board and Carl Jager for the WOE. Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte commented that both sides remained positive and constructive in their viewpoints during sessions that started last spring, and it was by mutual agreement to seek state mediation in an attempt to avoid unpleasant situations which might damage the relationship between board and teachers.

Forrest Lavoy Dies at Age 69

ALPENA — Forrest V. Lavoy, 69, of 2570 Ontario St., a former Holland resident, died early Tuesday in Alpena General Hospital.

Born in Chicago, he had lived in Alpena since 1944. He was a court officer for the Alpena Circuit Court and had been employed by the State Conservation Department and was also an Alpena County deputy sheriff.

His wife, the former Lila Gann, died in 1969. Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Iola Hekman of Kalamazoo and Mrs. David (Dorothea) John of Holland; nine grandchildren; seven great-grandchildren and three sisters, Mrs. Glenn Gorbey of Allegan, Mrs. Guy Teed and Mrs. Weldon Stoner, both of Grand Rapids.

City Tax Bills Ready for Mail

City summer tax bills will be in the mail Thursday or Friday. Total levy this year is \$4,655,119.38, listing \$2,896,200.43 for schools and \$1,758,918.95 for operating the city. Tax bills are late this summer because of problems in allocations, and property owners will be given until Sept. 24 to pay without penalty. Thereafter, a 6 per cent charge will be added. Bills are payable to the city treasurer.

Earlier this season, plans were made to issue bills without allocated school millage, but the allocation problem was resolved and full summer tax bills are being issued.

Total tax rate this year is \$44.43, listing \$16.75 per \$1,000 state equalized valuation for the city and \$27.68 for schools. This is a \$3.62 increase over the 1969 rate of \$40.81, according to City Assessor Robert Nienhuis.

The city tax rate of \$16.75 is unchanged from last year, according to City Manager William L. Bopf. The school tax lists \$10.37 on allocated millage for operations, \$10 voted previously, \$3.75 voted this year, \$5.50 for the swimming pool and \$3.06 for school debt.

Tax rates this year are the same for the Allegan and Ottawa portions of the city. Ottawa county property owners will find an increase on their assessments of approximately 8 per cent, prompted by the Ottawa County Equalization Department on the basis of sales values.

State equalized valuations for the city are listed at \$105,047,716 and for the school district \$104,641,975. A few areas in the city lie in Hamilton and Zeeland districts.

Bopf explained that the city has authorized a professional reappraisal at a cost of \$72,500 over a period of two years. This program will complete reappraisals begun the past year in which commercial and industrial properties in the Allegan county portion of the city were reappraised.

School taxes for residents in Federal and Harrington districts will be billed in the fall through township operations.

Included with tax bills is a statement on the breakdown of the city tax rate for city services, health, police protection, streets and the like.

County GOP Okays Huber By 2-1 Vote

GRAND HAVEN — Much of the 4½-hour convention of Ottawa county Republicans in the county building Monday night was devoted to a series of resolutions, chief among them was one asking Gov. William G. Milliken to reconsider his choice for lieutenant governor and support Sen. Robert Huber for the post.

The convention also named 38 delegates and 38 alternates for the state GOP convention in Detroit Oct. 28 and 29. It is at this convention that a lieutenant governor will be nominated along with others for the supreme court and several state boards.

Well over 100 persons attended the convention, and the vote on Huber was estimated at 2 to 1 by Convention Chairman Jacob Shoemaker. Some delegates objected to Huber because of his negative stand on the environmental pollution bill but County Chairman Joel Verplank noted that Huber practices anti-pollution measures in his plating businesses, and Verplank plumped for what he called "a balanced ticket" for Republicans in November.

Keith Van Koeveering of Zeeland, chairman of the resolutions committee, in submitting a sheaf of over a dozen resolutions, explained that they were the result of three previous meetings on resolutions, plus a mock election last week. Discussion was limited to three speakers pro and con for each resolution, each speech not to exceed three minutes.

A resolution on campus unrest was struck in favor of a longer resolution drafted by Sen. Gary Byker on law and order outlining democratic processes to be invoked on preserving law and order and apprehending and convicting lawbreakers, which passed.

Resolutions which passed favored John R. Dethmers of Holland and Edward S. Piggins of Detroit as nominees for the Supreme Court, supporting the ABM system, favoring contiguous states legislation for firearms, opposing a new bill on a state construction act, exemption of municipalities of 5,000 or less from required audits, and removing trade restrictions with Rhodesia.

Faced with confusing amendments on a Vietnam resolution supporting President Nixon's program for systematic withdrawal of troops, the convention tabled this resolution along with a somewhat confusing resolution on the Middle East in view of the current truce. A resolution to repeal the century-old abortion law as well as guaranteeing a woman to "the right to control her own reproductive life" lost.

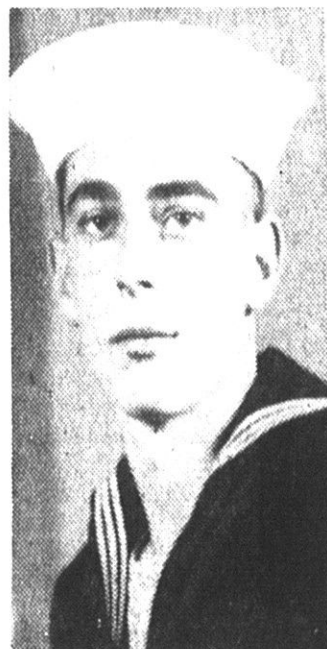

Local Man Killed In Nevada Crash

FERNLEY, Nev.—A Holland, Mich., sailor was killed Friday in a two-car collision on Alternate US-95 four miles east of here. The accident also claimed the life of the driver of the other car.

The victims were identified as AES/3 Ronald J. Coe, 20,

to the nearby Fallon Naval Auxiliary Air Station, and John Kirchner, of Riverside, Calif. The latter's wife and 15-year-old son, John, were injured.

The accident remained under investigation, police said.

Coe's body will be taken to Holland for burial with Dykstra funeral home making arrangements. Coe, a Holland High School graduate, would have been 21 years old Wednesday.

Coe, who was expected home in Holland on leave Sunday entered the service in December, 1968, and received training at the Aviation Mechanical Fundamentals School at the Naval Air Technical Training Center in Memphis, Tenn., and at Millington Naval Air Base before going to Fallon Naval Auxiliary Air Station in Nevada.

Coe's parents visited him in Nevada last month.

Besides the parents, he is survived by two sisters, Mrs. David Van Dyke of Holland and Lee Ann at home; a brother, Thomas at home, and the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard McPherson of Largo, Fla., currently in Holland for the summer, and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Coe of Flint.

Car Strikes Two Brothers Walking Along Roadway

Two brothers struck by a car while walking along 56th St. in Allegan County's Fillmore Township Sunday at 8:25 p.m. remain in Holland Hospital Monday where one was listed in serious condition.

Admitted to the hospital were Edward Becksvort, 62, and his brother, Herman, 66, both of route 5, Holland. Edward was listed in serious condition with multiple severe head lacerations and multiple broken bones. Herman, in good condition, was suffering from a fractured left leg.

South Haven State Police said the brothers were walking south along 56th St. near 138th Ave. when a car driven north by Luis Ramirez, 29, of 241 West 18th St., ran off the east side of 56th St. and struck the brothers.

Police cited Ramirez for careless driving. Neither the driver or his two passengers were injured.

Two Charged In Shooting Bound

Jose Rameriz, 20, of 34 East 16th St., and Baldemar Castruita, 21, of 332 West 14th St., charged in the Aug. 8 shooting and wounding of Jesse Lopez, 18, were bound over to Ottawa Circuit Court following their District Court hearing Tuesday.

Rameriz was charged with assault with intent to commit murder and his bond of \$30,000 was continued. Castruita, charged with felonious assault, had his \$20,000 bond reduced to \$2,000. Both men were held at the Ottawa County jail in lieu of bonds.

Charges against Francisco Cuevas, 19, of 344 East Sixth St., were being reduced from aiding and abetting in assault with intent to commit murder to carrying an uncased gun in a car. He pleaded guilty to the reduced charge and a reduced bond of \$100 was furnished.

Lopez was wounded in the abdomen by a slug fired from a .25 - caliber automatic pistol. Holland police alleged the shooting occurred during an argument in the yard of a home at 27 West 17th St.

Rameriz, Castruita and Cuevas were apprehended after their car was stopped at an Allegan County roadblock hours after the shooting.

Four Injured In Two-Car Collision

Four persons injured slightly in a two-car crash Saturday at 10:40 a.m. at U.S.-31 and James St. sought their own treatment.

Ottawa County sheriff's deputies said cars driven by Oriente Ricci, 19, of Chicago, and Chris Klopfenstein, 69, of Battle Creek, collided at the intersection. Ricci and a passenger, Emil Le Donne, 15, of Rivergrove, Ill. were injured as were William and Helene Klenekopel, both 66, of Battle Creek, riding in the other car.

Deputies cited Klopfenstein, eastbound on James St., for failure to yield the right of way to the Ricci auto, southbound on U.S.-31.

Thieves Break Into BPW Service Building

Thieves entered a Board of Public Works service building at 115 East Fifth St. Wednesday night and made off with loot valued at between \$80 and \$80, including two 6-volt lanterns, a transistor radio, a 50 foot measuring tape and a fire extinguisher.

Holland police said entry was gained through a window on the west side of the building. The break-in was reported to police Thursday.

W. Zaagman Drowns Near Grand Haven

GRAND HAVEN — William Zaagman, 75, father of State Sen. Milton Zaagman and a Grand Rapids funeral director, drowned Saturday while bathing in Lake Michigan off Stickney Ridge.

The body was recovered about 75 yards from shore and Zaagman was pronounced dead at the scene.

Zaagman, with a summer home in Holcomb Hills, was swimming with two friends from Muskegon who said they were tiring of the rough waters and were going ashore. They said Zaagman told them he would be in shortly.

Moments later the pair said they heard Zaagman cry for help and they launched a boat from shore to aid him but lost sight of Zaagman in the rough waters.

Zaagman is survived by his widow, Henrietta; four sons, Milton, Kenneth, Robert and Philip, partners in the funeral home; a sister and 12 grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Zaagman was the fourth drowning victim of the year in Ottawa County.

West Ottawa Negotiations In Mediation

The West Ottawa Board of Education met Monday night.

The board also approved three new teachers, Phyllis Parker, elementary; Carla Huiting, elementary art, and William Shields, junior high art. Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte said the teaching staff was complete except for one replacement.

He also gave an analysis of the ramifications of the State Supreme Court decision on having school districts provide textbooks and supplies. He is awaiting guidelines currently being prepared by the State Department of Public Instruction and the Attorney General's office on fringe areas. Meanwhile, all course requirements at West Ottawa will be reevaluated and the administration will keep detailed records. Van Raalte said the decision places a major strain on the West Ottawa budget.

The board accepted with regret the resignation of Mrs. Nelva Elenbaas who established and directed the hot lunch program at the high school and the Woodside central kitchen. Mrs. Elenbaas started when the high school went into operation in 1960 and the Woodside school in 1965. The central kitchen serves Lakewood, Glerum, North Holland, Sheldon Woods, Ventura and Robart. The administration is seeking a replacement coordinator for both kitchens.

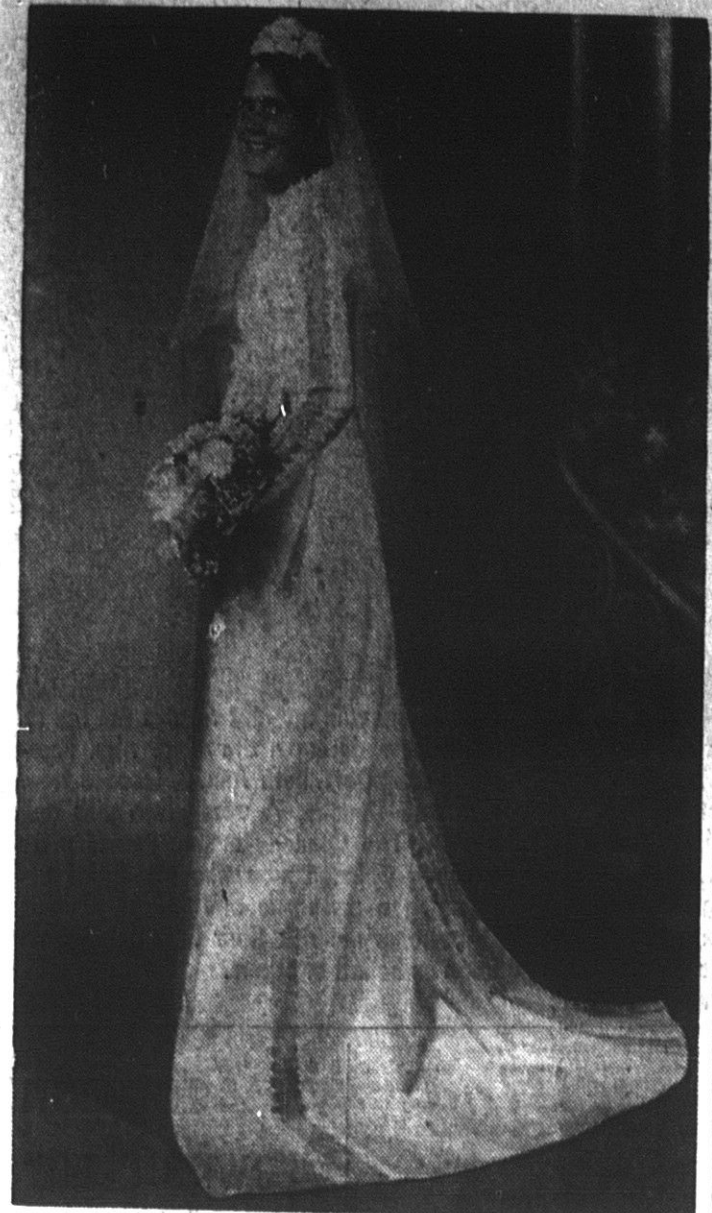
Repair and resurfacing of two drives at North Holland and the junior high school were authorized at a cost of \$4,409, low bid entered by West Shore Construction.

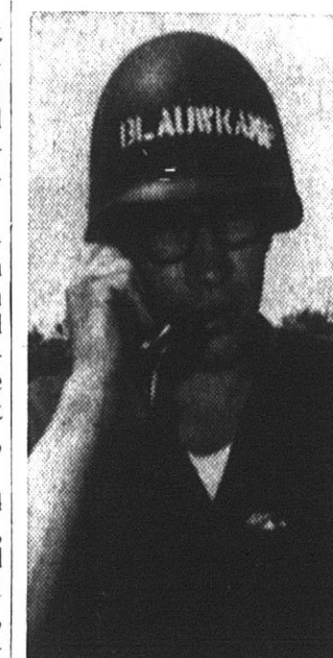

Henry Vander Linde is the present conductor of the Legion Band. Tuesday's night's program will be an all-request program.

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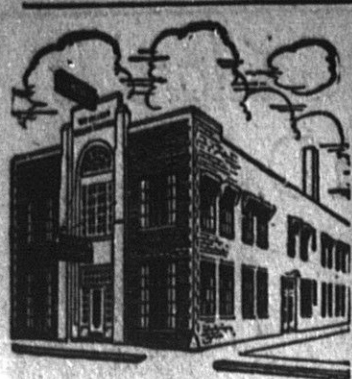

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DO WE NEED THIS MONEY?

The President's veto of the education bill has brought so many cries of anguish that one would suspect that the entire educational system was about to go down the drain. Congress ought to realize that in hundreds of communities in our country voters have turned down bond issues and millage requests for school systems. And the voters are about as grass root as one can get. The notion, put into print by one congressman, that the nation was shocked, is pure rhetoric.

Education is as much of a boondoggle as any other branch of government. The Michigan Department of Education has \$580,000 to train teachers for the year 1970-1971. We will spend this money knowing that we have an oversupply of teachers. We recently say a list of some 400 possible educational grants, the finest list available for educators to get on some gravy train.

The trouble with government appropriations is that we have to judge the bills by loaded words, education, defense, welfare, farm parity and what have you. If we could skip the connotations that have grown up around the words, and if we could prune the spending down to that which is necessary, we could save ourselves billions, and do a better job.

One can only imagine the horrible bureaucracy behind 400 educational grants, to say nothing of the thousands of educators thinking up new schemes to milk the government, and ultimately the taxpayer. Whose fault is all this? Congress, of course. They are the people who pass the bills, appropriate the money, and pass on the taxes. One might argue that the administration is at fault. This simply is trying to escape responsibility.

Next time you note a drastic cut in some bill, don't be too quick with your tears. In most instances a deep cut will get you just as much or more for your money.

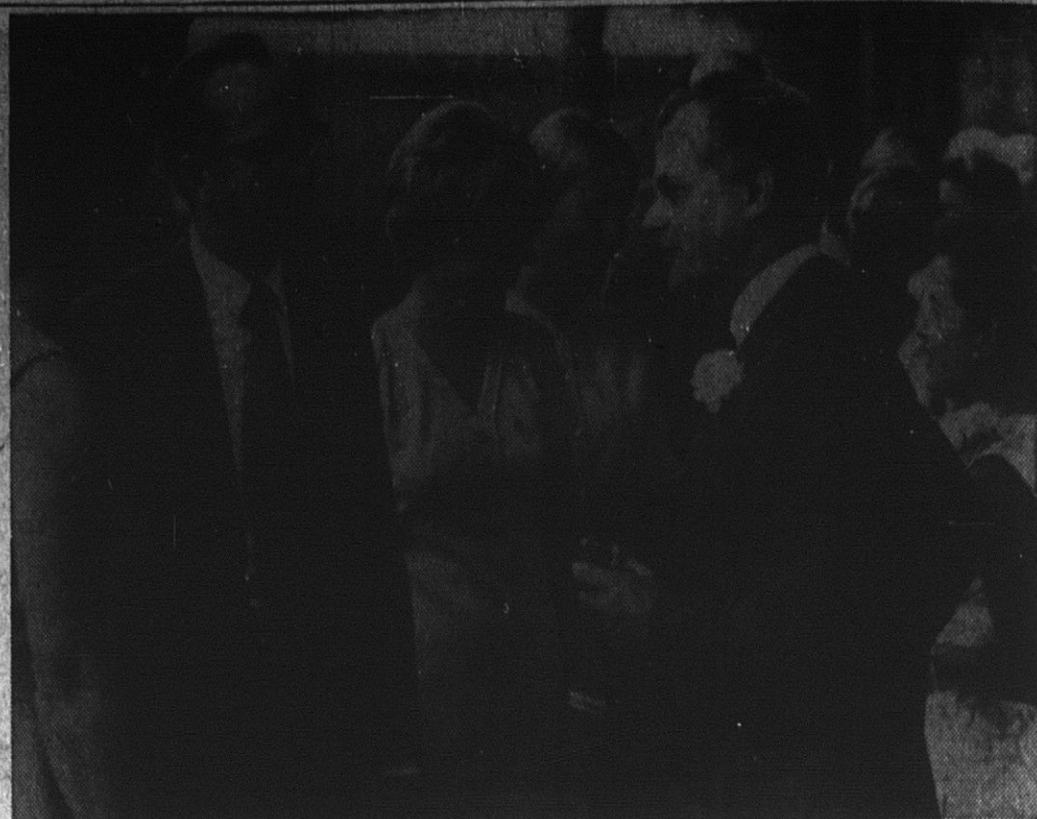

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Aug. 23
Adventuring Faith
Genesis 12:1-3, 7; 22:1-8
By C. P. Dame

The Bible contains the names of many people. Of the many, a few stand out. The name of Abraham appears many times in the Bible. He is known by his faith, and is called the

father of all believers. Abraham showed great willingness to venture forth in faith.

1. God called Abraham and he obeyed. Genesis 1 to 11 deals with the race, Genesis 12 to 50 tells about Abraham and his descendants. Abraham is the first of the patriarchs. He was living in Ur of Chaldaea when God said to him, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land I will show you." This was a big order—to leave his native country and his relatives and move to an unknown land.

God made a three-in-one promise to Abraham. First, He would make him a great nation, which meant many descendants. Second, God promised to give Canaan to his descendants. Third, He promised to make him a blessing to all nations. Abraham, with his wife, and his father Terah, and his nephew Lot went to Haran in Mesopotamia. After the death of Terah, God spoke again to Abraham, and he obeyed and journeyed to Palestine which was inhabited by idolaters. At Shechem, Abraham built an altar to his God and worshipped in the midst of idolatrous people. Abraham had the good habit of building altars. We too should give proof of our faith in God no matter where we are. Some church members go on vacation and forget all about God and the church and some when on vacation look up a church and worship God whom they love and serve.

In this day of changes, Christians honor God when they show an adventurous faith. The Bible teaches that God in times past challenged believers to do great things for Him. God has not changed. There are great tasks awaiting the church.

II. God tests His people. Have you ever noted how some of the great men and women of the Bible were tested? Recall how God tested Moses, Joseph, Ezekiel, David, Elijah and others. Abraham waited a long time for the birth of the promised son. And when the boy finally had come and after he was a lad God told Abraham to offer his only son Isaac whom he loved and through whom the fulfillment of the Covenant was to come—to offer him as a sacrifice. Abraham lived in an age when human sacrifices were made and hence he was not morally shocked but he was emotionally upset. Abraham obeyed; for three days, he and his servants and Isaac, his beloved son, for whom he had waited twenty-five years, travelled to Mt. Moriah. What agonizing three days they must have been! The question of Isaac about the lamb was a stab in Abraham's heart—his answer revealed his faith.

God stopped Abraham and praised him for his faith and provided a ram for the sacrifice. God still tests His people. Blessed are all the tested who show the spirit and faith of Abraham! And of course we will bear in mind as we read about the ram which God provided that the New Testament tells about the sacrificial death of Jesus, God's Son, who made atonement for man's sin.

V-J Day 25 Years Ago

Twenty-five years ago Friday Holland joined the nation and world in wildly celebrating the close of World War II.

It was 6 p.m. (Holland time) Aug. 14, 1945, that President Truman announced Japan's agreement to unconditional surrender less than four years after the assault on Pearl Harbor.

The V-J Day announcement signaled Holland people to converge on the downtown with horns blowing, cow bells ringing, paper scattering and shooting off hoarded fireworks.

Double lines of traffic in a parade that went nowhere continued for hours and the streets were soon littered with tissue paper, streamers, newspapers, shredded paper, dairy invoices and whatnot.

City leaders speculated that

more gas was burned and more gears shifted in the happy celebration than at any corresponding Tulip Time crowd. Gasoline rationing ended the next day.

Churches opened for services the night of Aug. 14 and the following night. Virtually all business in Holland was suspended for two days. Even the post office suspended deliveries for two days. City Hall closed too.

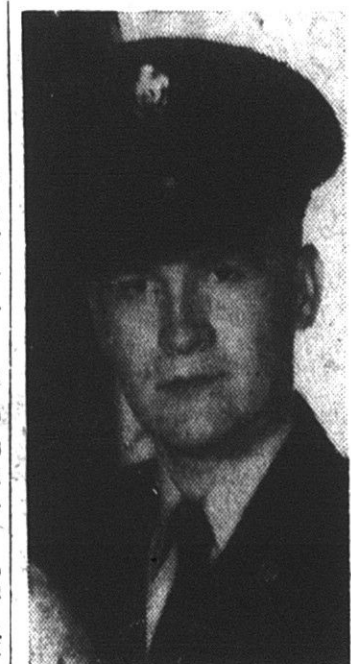
By Aug. 15, citizens gathered at 1 p.m. for a Victory parade which led to Kollen Park for a program with Charles E. Drew, E. D. Hanson, Clarence Jalving, James H. Klomparsens, Clarence Lokker and Cornelius Vander Meulen participating. About 10,000 were present for the afternoon program, and another 5,000 gathered at night for a free movie. Later in the eve-

ning there was street dancing in front of the Temple building including square dancing, an innovation at the time.

The end of World War II brought an end to rationing of gasoline, fuel oil, canned fruits and vegetables. But rationing of meats, fats and oils, butter, sugar, shoes, tires and other commodities continued for some time.

State Rep. Henry Geerlings pointed out the need for tin can salvage would continue long after the declaration of peace, emphasizing that the U.S. has virtually no native tin ore.

Crowds also gathered in Zeeland where merchants hastily put out street flags. Factory whistles competed with car horns in a noisy celebration much like the one in Holland.

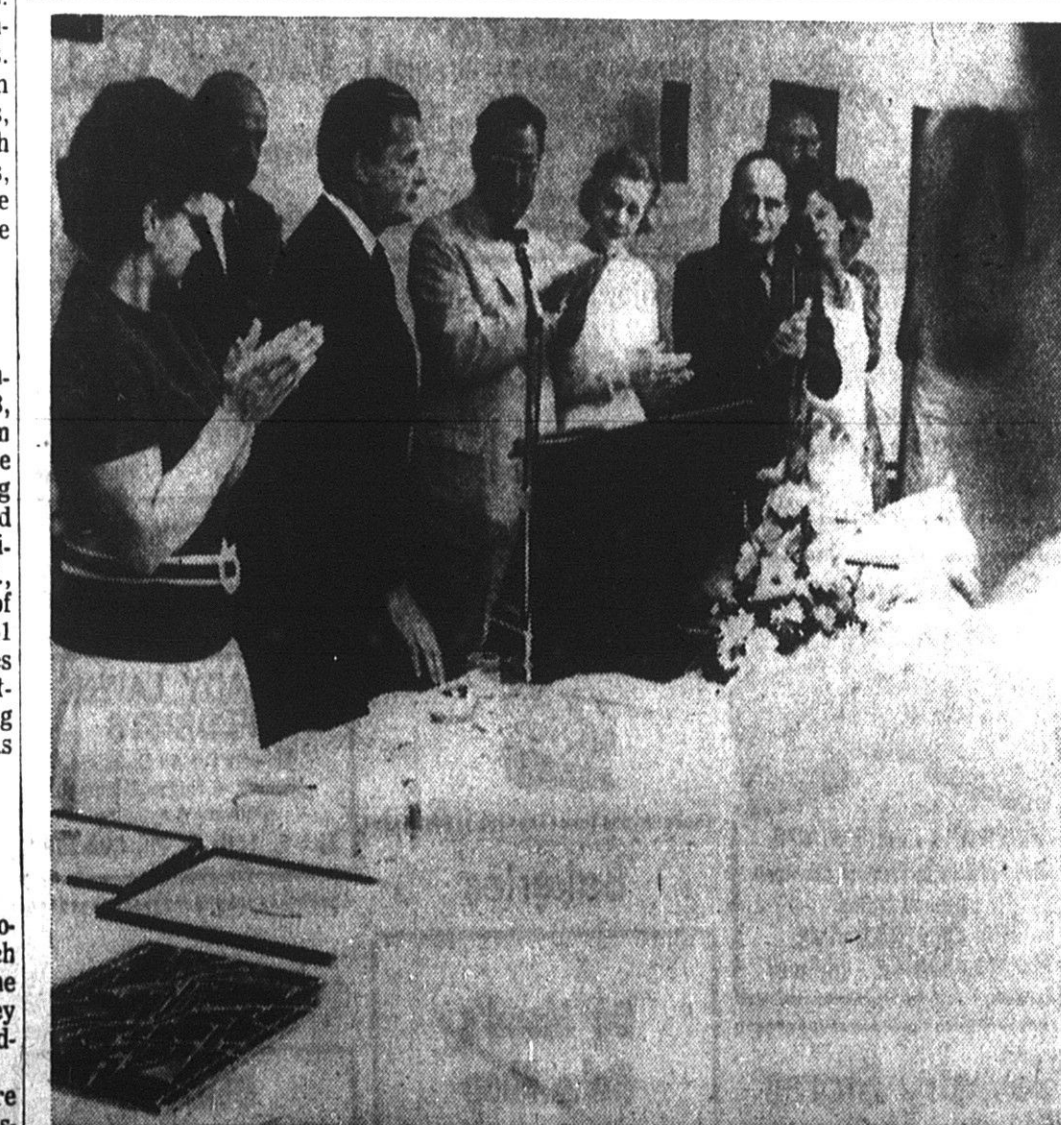

College and Civic Thank-You Given To Vander Werfs

Tribute in words and token marked a recognition dinner honoring Dr. and Mrs. Calvin A. Vander Werf Thursday night in Phelps Hall on Hope College campus.

Last June 17 Dr. Vander Werf announced his resignation as president of Hope College effective July 31 after seven years as head of the institution.

Resolutions recognizing Dr. Vander Werf's contribution to Hope College and the community came from the Michigan Senate as presented by State Sen. Gary Byker and from Holland City by Jack Leenhouts, a Hope alumnus and city treasurer, representing Mayor Nelson Bosman.

Commemorative tribute from the college was evidenced in the programs which carried quotes from Dr. Vander Werf's speeches and pictures of such highlights as breaking ground for new buildings and with such celebrities as Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands, Dr. Christian Barnard and Gov. George Romney.

Dr. Vander Werf who quipped that his wife, his housekeeper and his secretary might be missed more than he, said the role of the college president has changed drastically in the last few years, in expressing deep appreciation for a superb faculty and administrative team, a great alumni, a fine student body and the cooperation of a truly fine community.

He spoke of the forces that threaten to undermine and corrode society and the confusion on goals, but concluded that brain power and character were compatible partners, that with each supporting the other through teaching and example "even a little college in Holland, Mich., can help to lead the way."

He singled out the faculty, administrative team, alumni, church, women's league, the Second Century Club, his staff, the food services and buildings and grounds people for appreciation and beyond that the great friends in the community, and state and national levels, and the local press in his special thanks. "all working together with great cooperation for a noble institution."

Willard C. Wichers, board secretary, reviewed some significant accomplishments during Vander Werf's seven-year tenure: the unprecedented growth in enrollment for a 31 per cent increase; a faculty of 147 full time instructors for a 79 per cent growth; an increased budget reaching \$5½ million; gifts that provided Dykstra Hall, the De Witt Cultural Center, additions to other buildings, a new dormitory, a Kresge gift for an academic science center, the gift of Marigold Lodge, in all amounting to some \$6 million including government grants. Tributes came from students

in a telegram, from Dr. Irwin Brink representing the faculty, John Schrier and Muskegon representing the Alumni Association. Jack Leenhouts for the community, Dr. L. K. Kuyper (president of General Synod) for the Reformed Church, and Hugh De Pree for the Board of Trustees.

De Pree spoke of Vander Werf's dedication to the cause of education, his new ideas and tremendous drive, his understanding of student problems, and overall his feeling for excellence which provided the just-right touch to many an important occasion always aided by Vander Werf's wife Rachel who shared in all accolades at Thursday's dinner.

Among the gifts was a stained-glass panel from the faculty depicting the college's "Anchor of Hope."

Trail Guide Designed For Local Nature Center

Want to take a walk in the woods? Or follow a nature trail? A hankering to get back to nature? With the entire world concerned today over the quality of environment, people in the community may have an outdoor experience with emphasis on learning and personal enrichment by visiting the De Graaf Nature Center behind the split-rail fence on Graafschap Rd. near 26th St. This nature center which serves as an outdoor classroom for schools and community groups is a project of the Holland park department. Teacher - Naturalist Arthur

Wyma has prepared a fine trail guide for the nature center which starts at the site of an old pump (1) which was near old farm buildings since torn down. The trail continues to a pond (2) likely made by beavers, and a trickle of water (3) with the threat of becoming standing vegetation. There are ferns enough (4) to form the background for a wedding, and a bog, marsh or swamp (5) which provides wet, soggy ground for certain plants and animals, all associated with a relatively new branch of science called ecology. There are young elms (6) all approximately the same height which appear healthy while many stately old elms are dy-

ing off of Dutch Elm Disease. A creek drains water (7) from higher ground south of the park and leads north to Lake Macatawa, one small segment of a larger area known as the Lake Macatawa watershed. Then there is the invader's alley (8) which is a city sanitary sewer line installed in the summer of 1968. A treeless area indicates the path of heavy earthmoving equipment, but invader plants heal the scars left by man's machines. As for what lies in the pond (9) ponds are not all alike, differing in depth, type of bottom material, source of water, amount of flow, temperatures, dissolved chemicals, etc. This particular pond is shallow with a soft bottom and not the type one would like to wade in. The grass family (10) shows what might happen if one puts the lawn mower away for the summer, resulting in grass higher than your head, while up to the knees elsewhere. There are willows everywhere (11) but mostly in the wet areas. Many young trees (12) try to find growing room in a limited space and the competition becomes fierce with each one trying to grow straight and tall and fast in order to get a place in the sun. To the right is a sharp line of demarcation (13) between the willow thicket and the open hillside. The abrupt change in the vegetation above ground level is a clear reflection of abrupt physical factors of the environment. At the land slopes upward, the amount of moisture rapidly decreases and the soil texture changes from dark humus to light sand. On the hill to the left (14) stands a clump of large fruit trees with numerous offspring marching down the hill. An open field is not likely to stay an open field in this climate unless man or browsing animals keep it that way. The sandy hillside ahead is covered with dewberries, a type of bramble, along with raspberries, blackberries and roses. All brambles are of value in soil erosion control and wildlife management.

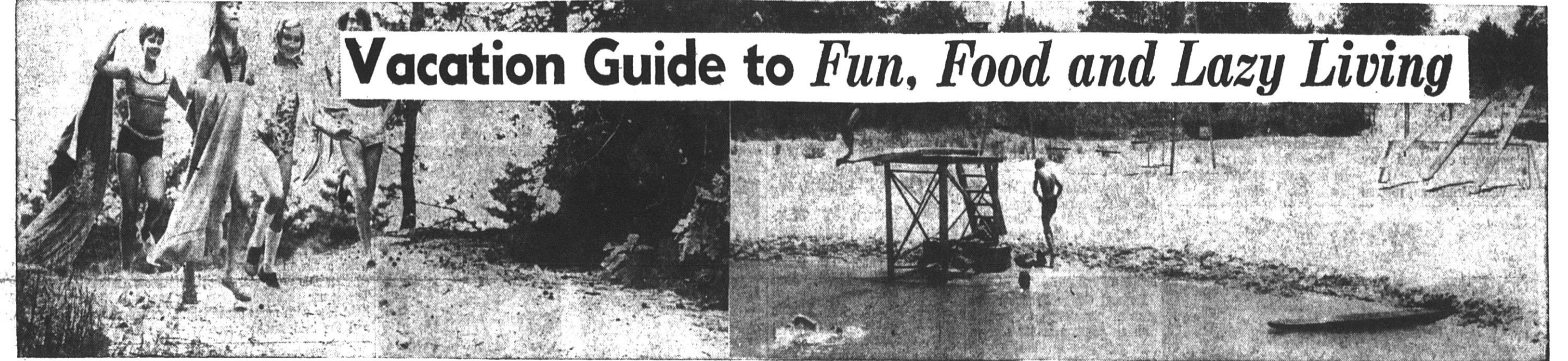
Then there are grapes (15) and a large silver maple in the middle of the willow grove (16), light and dark colored willows by the creek (17) and a cozy den (18) if you don't mind mosquitoes. The mound (19) is not an Indian mound, only a mound to hide a manhole cover over the sewer line. Then comes the old interurban right-of-way (20) and a place for sumac (21), a fallen giant Red Maple (22) which fell in 1963 but is not yet completely dead. Don't drink from the spring (23) although it may have been pure in the days of the Indians, and do jump on the spongy ground (24) because this area contains humus. Along the trail (25) were apples, grapes and mulberries and ahead were strawberries, elderberries and black raspberries. Then comes the crossroads (26) where one can see a wide variety of ecological communities converging to this point, and a cottonwood tree (27) which is over 100 feet tall and measures 12 feet around the trunk and the twin oaks (28) which form the root system of a Red Oak felled in 1963, and finally the dry sandy hill-top (29) which is the least appealing part of the trail. The eight-page trail guide is available without cost in a mailbox at the beginning of the 3/4-mile wood chipped trail. Personally guided tours are available by calling the office of the park superintendent. A 15-minute sound film also is available consisting of 100 35 millimeter slides with taped musical background and comments.

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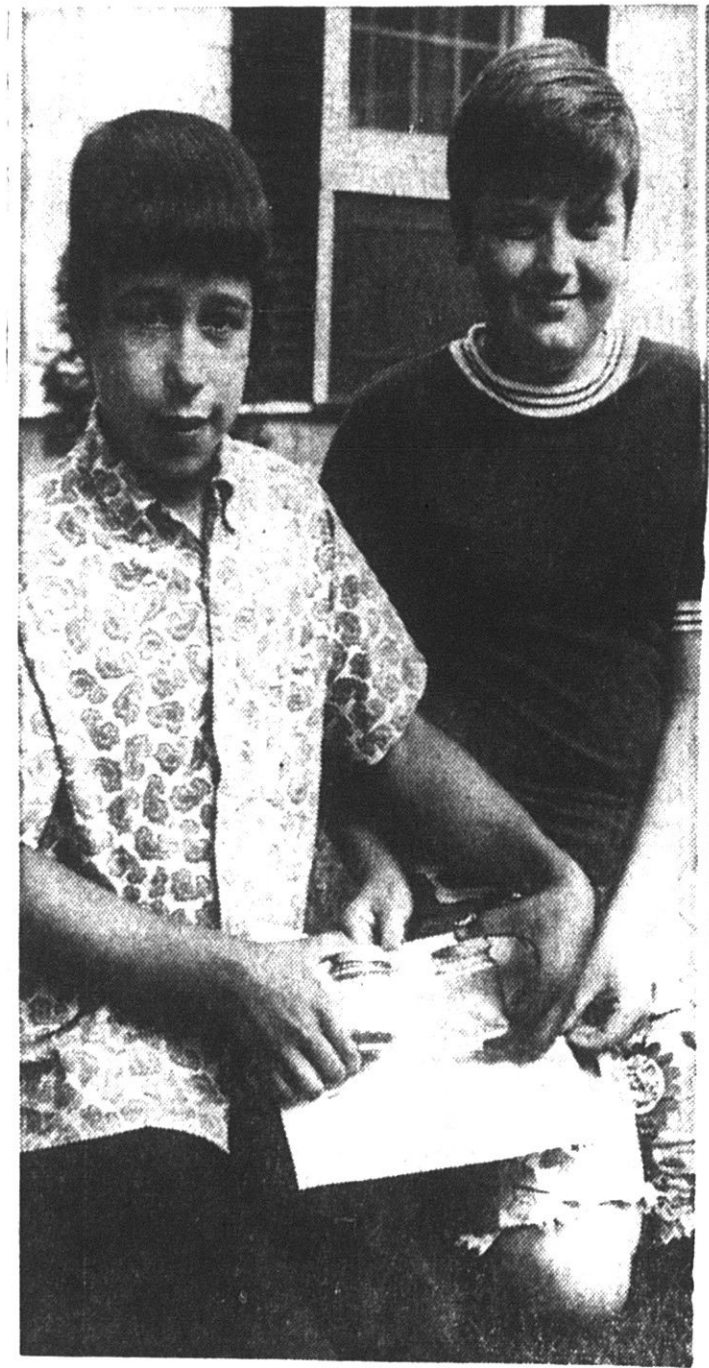

Dr. Eldon Greij of the Hope College Biology department said "Lake Macatawa supports large algae populations and the clear samples taken by the boys in 1969 does not necessarily mean that algae populations were absent that year."

Dr. Don Williams of Hope's Chemistry department said "Lake Macatawa has its good and bad days; rainy days can

cause the water to look messy and have more algae, than on sunny days."

The boys said they did some research on the clear water, with Todd's microscope but have not yet with the algae filled container. Both these boys will be sixth grade students at Waukazoo School in September.

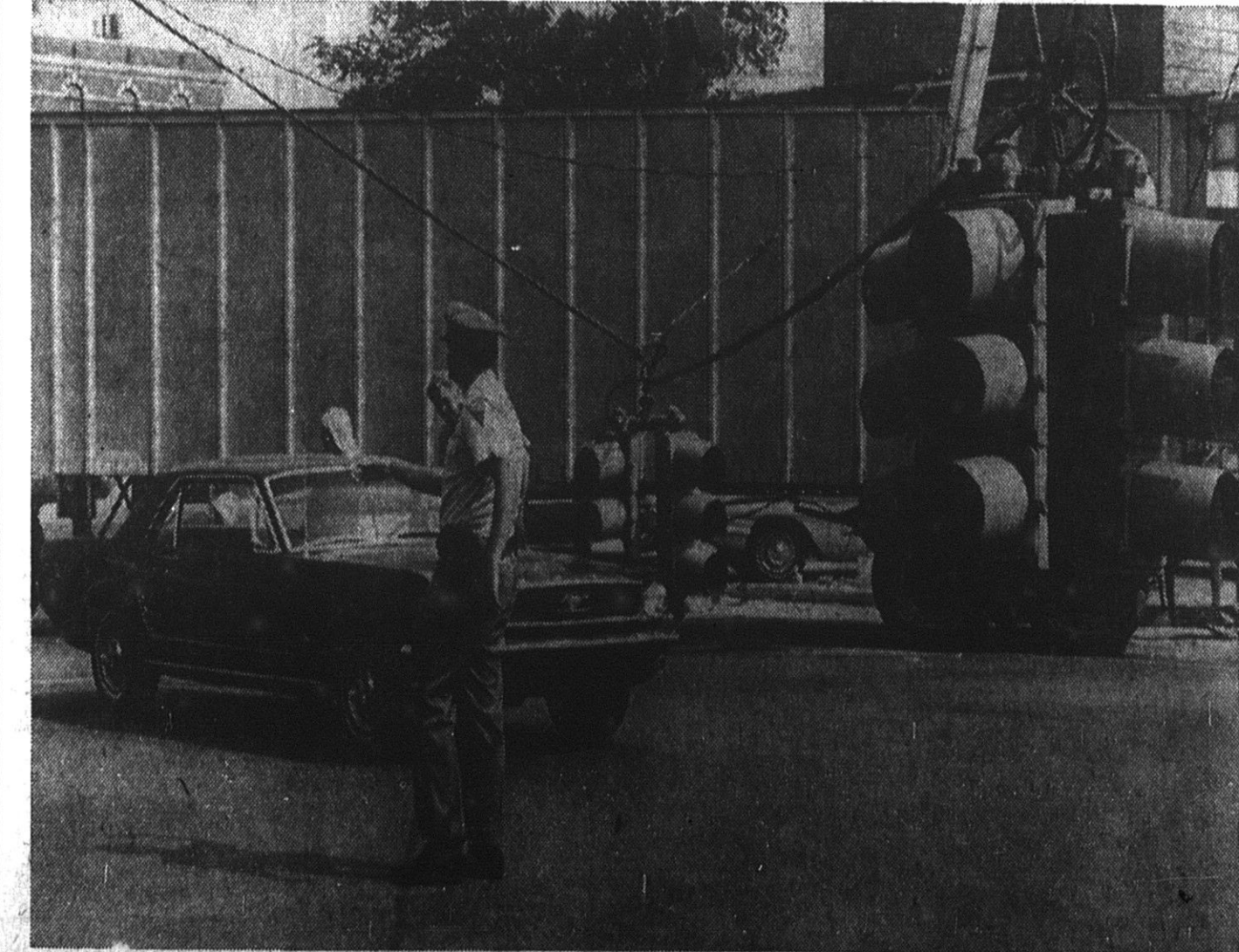
