Potluck Dinner to Honor Drs. Fleming of India

Doctors Robert and Bethel Fleming of Katmandu, Nepal, will be guest speakers at a potluck dinner at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday in the Social Room of the First United Methodist Church in Holland.

Dr. Bethel, a medical doctor, and Dr. Bob, an ornithologist and teacher, spent 25 years in India before embarking on a 25 year career as the first Christian missionaries in Nepal. This small isolated country was virtually closed to foreign visitors before 1951, but in 1949 Dr. Bob was able to enter on a bird-hunting expedition for the Chicago Natural History Museum. While there he witnessed the desperate need of many sick people for modern medical help.

Five years later the Flemings returned as medical missionaries and in 1956 they opened the first modern hospital in Nepal. The United Medical Mission to Nepal now operates four large city hospitals as well as numer-

ous clinics in cities and mountain villages throughout the country. The Flemings and their work were the subjects of a book written by Grace Nies Fletcher in 1964, entitled "The Fabulous Flemings of Katmandu."

Dr. Bob was a resident of Holland during his high school years from 1919-1923, when his father was the minister at the Methodist Church. Friends and those interested in missionary work are invited to bring their table service and a dish to pass, and greet these remarkable people, who have just retired after 50 years in India and Nepal. The Flemings are guests in the home of Dr. and Mrs. Jack De Valois, 766 West 24th St. Dr. Bob will be speaking to the Holland Rotary Club on Thursday noon.

Doctors Robert and Bethel Fleming each received an honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from Albion College in May 1972. In October they will return to Nepal for active "retirement."

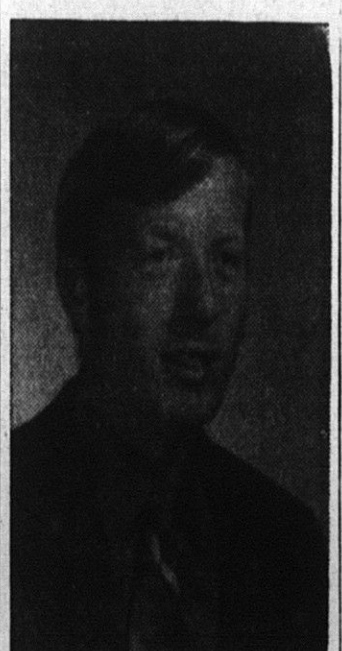
Local Chapter To Organize

Harry Wetter, 73, of 1224 Waukazoo Dr., died Tuesday in Ferguson Hospital in Grand Rapids where he had been a patient for the past week.

Born in Iowa, he came to Waukazoo in the early 1930's, one of the first to make his year-round home in the

Battle Creek Boy Drowns on Outing At Tunnel Park

James Harvey Hubbard Jr., 17, of Battle Creek, on a church outing with other children from the Battle Creek Christian Reformed Church, drowned Saturday while bathing in Lake Michigan at Tunnel Park.

Ottawa County deputies said the youth was about 100 feet off shore and was returning to shore when he began crying for help. Two companions, David Vitvugt and John Buffinger, attempted to reach the stricken youth but were unsuccessful.

Deputies were called at 2:29 p.m. and members of the sheriff's Marine Patrol recovered the body at 3:22 p.m. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Dr. Ata Zahed of Zeeland.

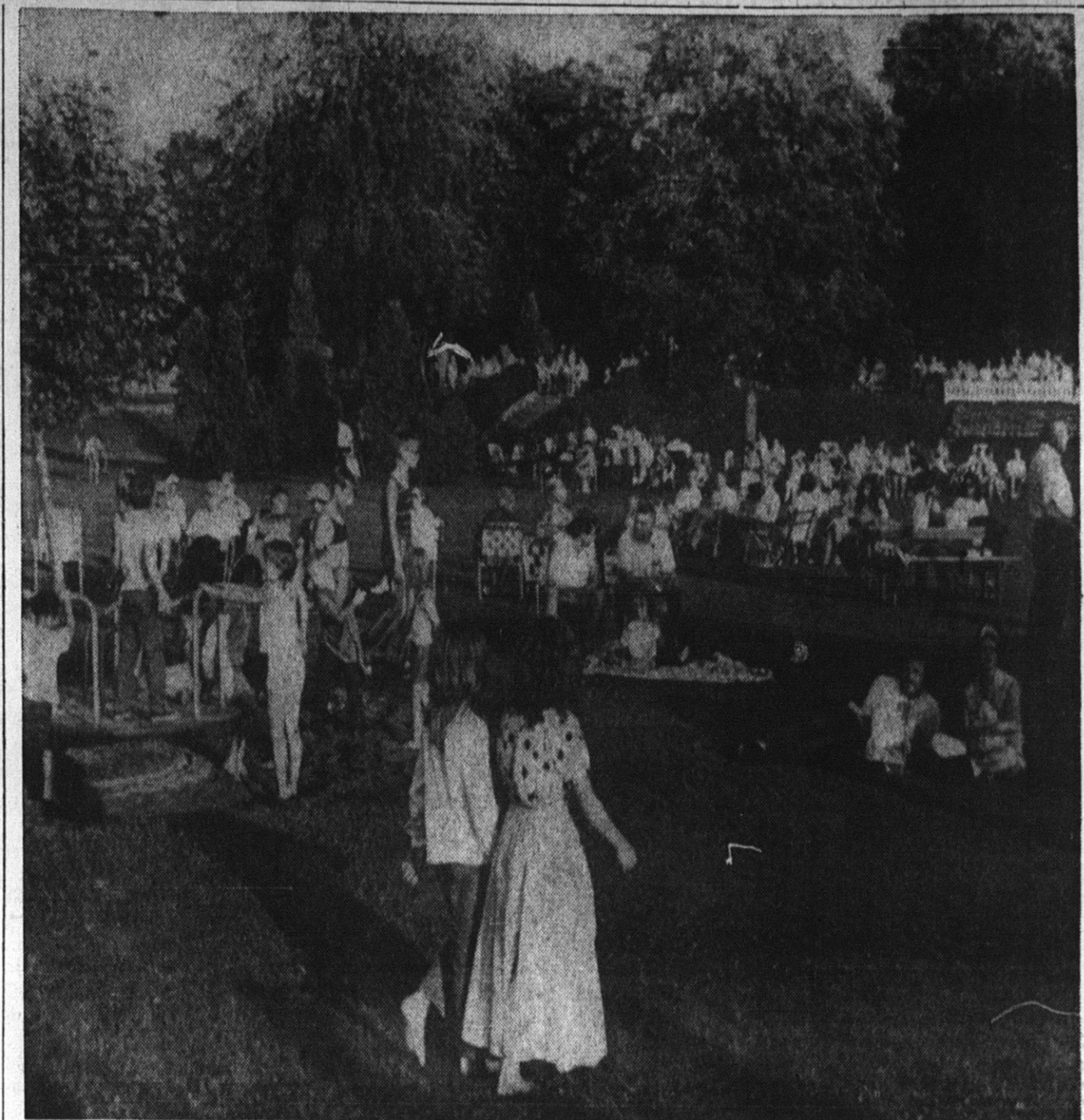
When in Holland, Brown worked for the Gas Company.

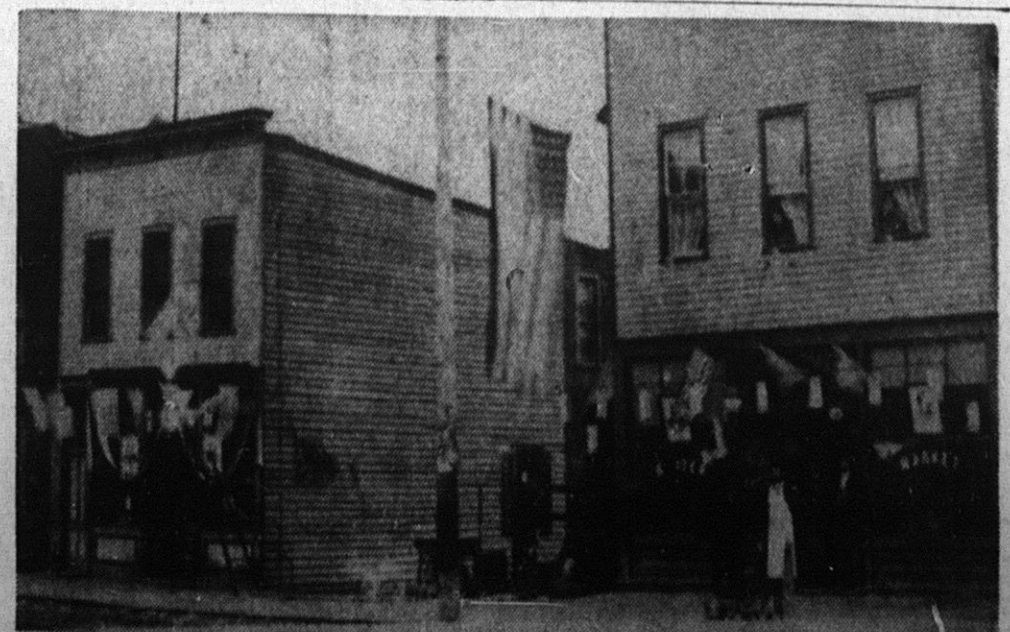

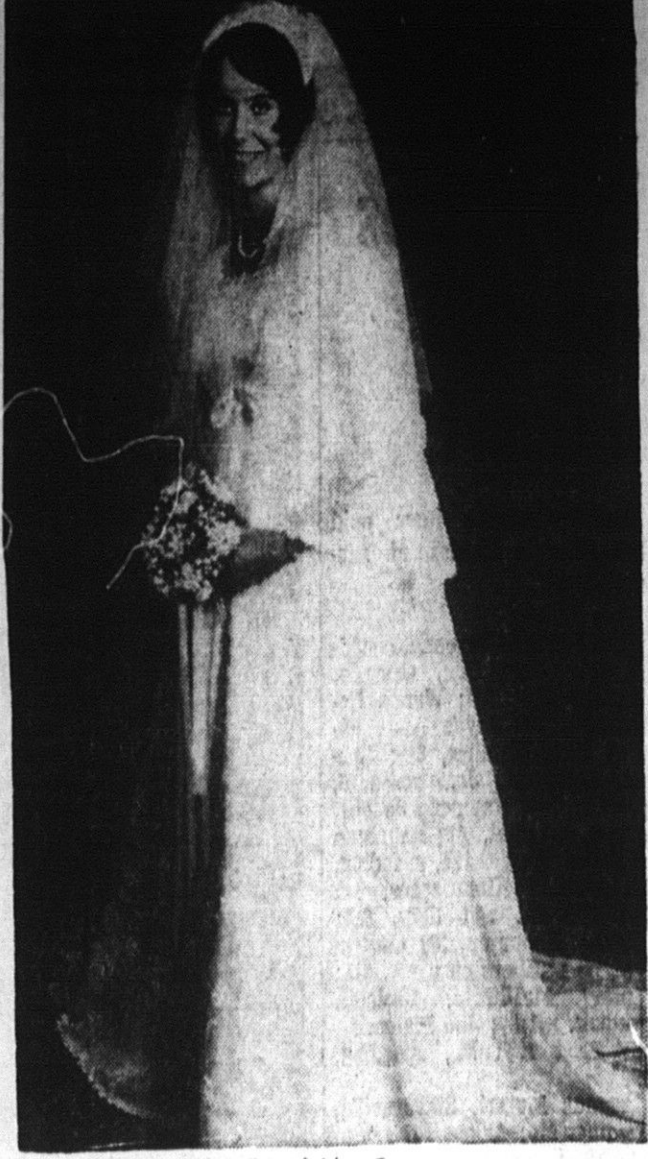
The candlelighters wore blue and white checked gingham jumpers with white eyelet blouses.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Aug. 27
Sharing Through Witness
Acts 4:13-21

By C. P. Dame

Just before Jesus returned to heaven, He told His disciples that they should be His witnesses. In a number of churches witnessing is taught and practiced by the members. May the study of this lesson inspire many to witness.

I. The early church witnessed. The lesson text tells about one of the miracles which the apostles performed. One day Peter and John, on the way to the temple to worship, healed a lame man. This drew a crowd of people and Peter preached to the people and told them that the man had been healed through the power of Jesus whom they had killed but whom God had raised from the dead. Peter admitted that they had done this in ignorance and if they would repent they would be forgiven. He then explained that through Christ's death and resurrection salvation was won. The early preachers proclaimed in season and out of season the death and resurrection of Jesus —this was their message. Does the church proclaim it now?

II. Witnessing met with opposition in the first century as it does today. The authorities arrested the preachers because they disliked the message about the resurrection of Jesus. The wealthy and materialistic Sadducees disbelieved and so the preachers were locked in jail.

On the next day, when the apostles were brought before the court, Peter, who was filled with the Holy Spirit, told the court that they had performed the miracle of healing in the name of Jesus Christ whom they had killed but whom God had raised from the dead.

Boldly Peter told the authorities that there "is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved." The authorities were surprised at the boldness of the apostles and noted that "they had been with Jesus."

III. Witnessing calls for courage when the apostles were ordered to stop preaching, they showed their courage. These men had two commands, one from the Lord, the other from the court, and they decided to obey the Lord's command and boldly told the court that they had to "speak the things which we have seen and heard" and they continued to witness.

From the court room they went to "their own company," and reported all that the chief priests and the elders had said unto them. The Holy Spirit, who filled the apostles, also filled the hearts of the group "and they spake the word of God with boldness." Modern Christians need this boldness.

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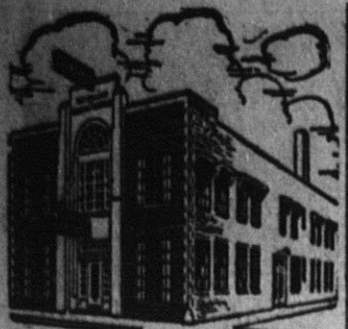

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AIRLINE SECURITY

The spate of recent airplane hijackings has moved the Federal Aviation Administration to ask for new methods to prevent weapons from being brought aboard planes.

This does not seem to us a very great problem although the airlines have all kinds of objections. The only thing necessary is a thorough search of whatever baggage is being brought into the passenger compartment of the plane. Whatever goes into the baggage holds is of little concern.

It is surprising that there is little opposition from passengers. They are willing to take the inconvenience of personal search if it means real security once aboard. This is a sensible attitude.

The opposition comes, strangely enough, from the airlines themselves because they fear customer relations if inconveniences are imposed, but even more, because there is great expense connected with the search of each passenger.

Airlines make a contract with their passengers to transport them safely. If the search of each passenger is called for to fulfill that contract, and if the passengers don't object, that's the way to do it. The airlines ask, "Who will pay for it all?" The answer is an easy one. In the long run it will be the passenger. But that's better than death by hijacking.

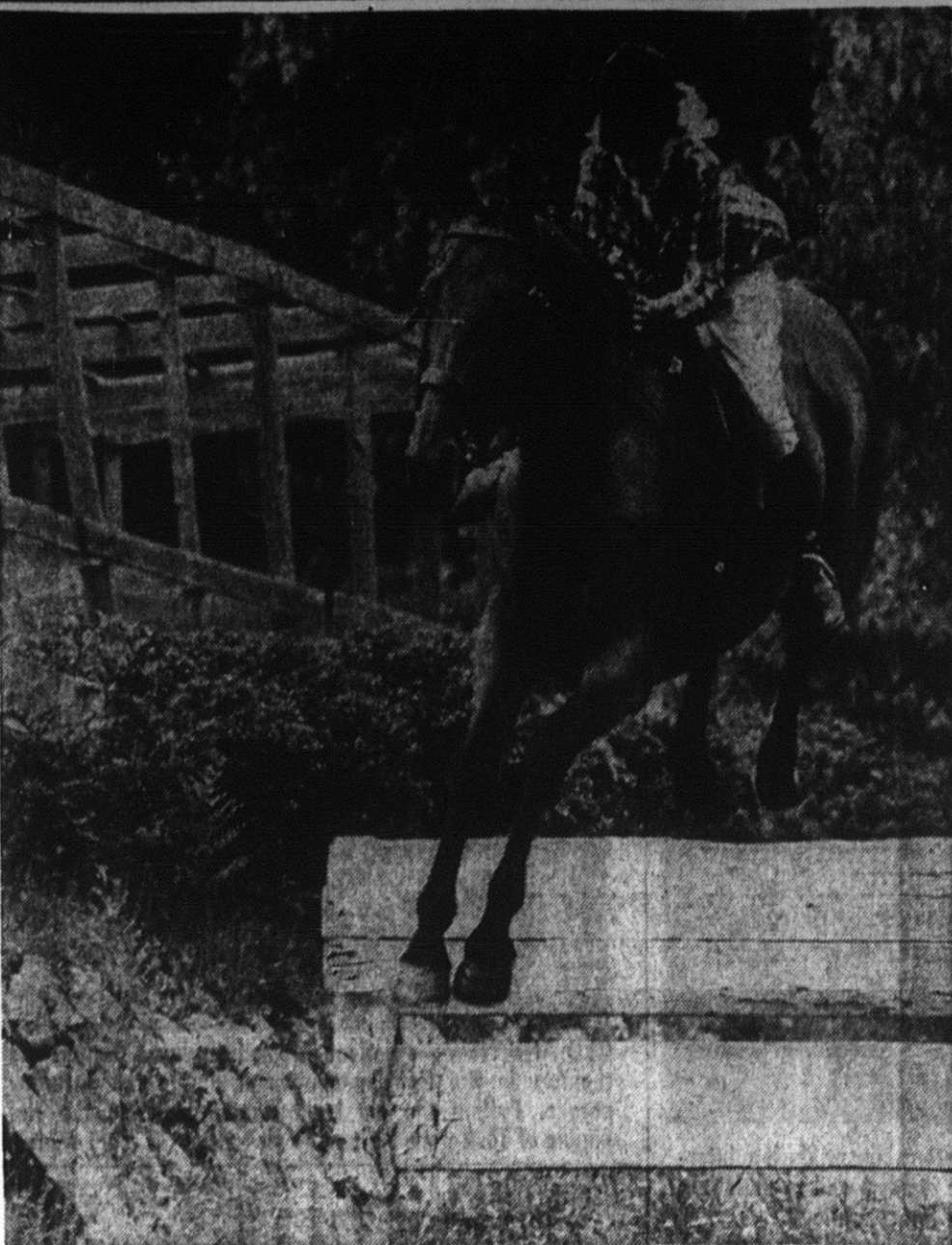

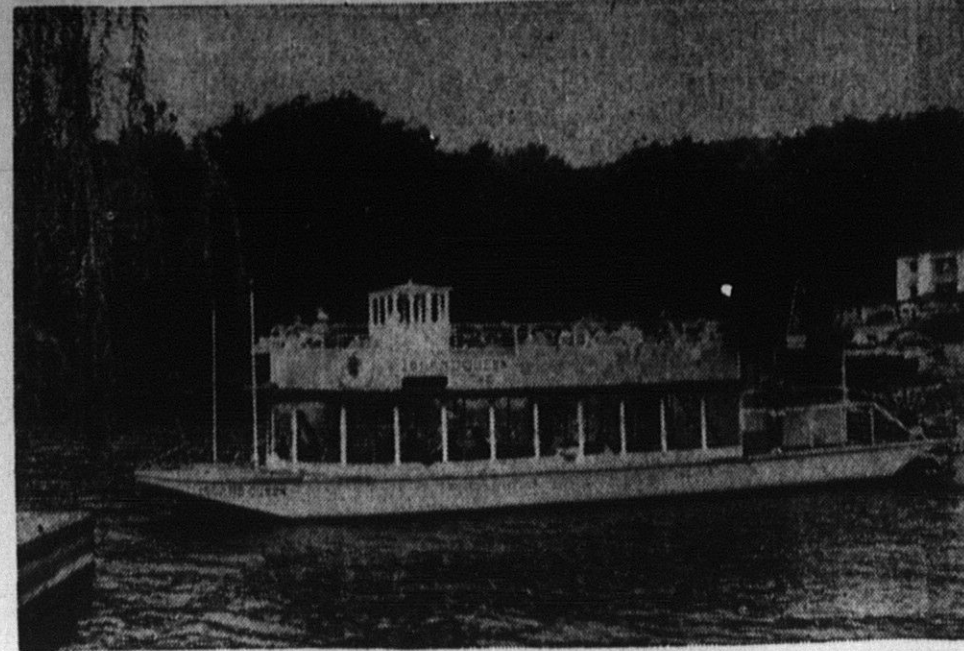

Through the ages the monks have been the preservers of all books, literature and music. The monks decorated the books with wooden covers embossed with metal and jewels."

Until 1861 the paper for all books was made from rags. The value of a rare book depends on its importance, its supply and its demand. When a book is out of print the value rises. In order to be rare it must be copyrighted.

The most valuable of rare books is a first edition of the

Gutenberg Bible, printed in Latin. There are 30 of these rare books in existence. In 1891 one copy was sold for \$14,800. In 1926 a copy was sold for \$106,000. The second best collectors items are the original Shakespeare books. In Folger Library in Washington D. C., only scholars are allowed to see these rare books.

A letter written by George Washington was auctioned off for over \$5,000. Former President Harry Truman was so incensed by a review given after a recital given by his daughter Margaret that he wrote a letter of protest. This letter with Truman's signature was up for sale for \$13,500.

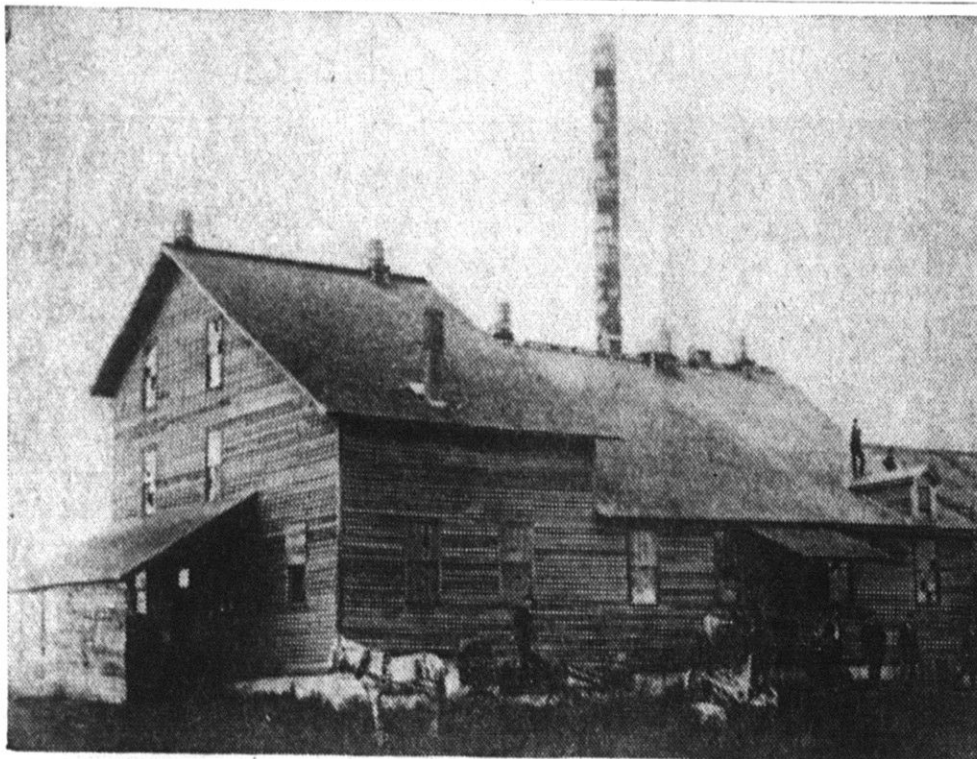

ADRIAN — Defending co-MIAA football champion Adrian College was picked Thursday by the league coaches at the Sixth Annual Press Day to take all the marbles this fall.

The Flying Dutchmen of Hope College, who were tabbed along with the Bulldogs as the team to beat at last year's press outing, were picked to finish fourth this time around.

Surprising Olivet College were figured by the league coaches to finish second with Alma third. Kalamazoo and Albion were named to follow the Dutchmen in that order.

"No, I don't think it's going to hurt us being picked to finish fourth," said Coach Ray Smith of Hope. "I think the league coaches are being more realistic this time than they were last year. Although I can tell you, we will be shooting for the top like the rest of the clubs."

Smith's big problem this season will be coming up with a quarterback to replace the departed Jon Constant of Grand Haven.

Second year men Jim Wojcicki of Chelsea, Ray Lubberts of Coopersville and Bob Carlson of Muskegon are returning from last year's team that ended the season at 4-5 overall.

Smith has three other quarterback candidates. They include Tim Van Heest of Delmar, N.Y., Keith Derrick of Lucas and Frank Gucker of Dexter.

Coach Smith's pre-season roster includes 40 veterans and 25 freshmen. Nine regulars return to the offensive squad that established six new school records a year ago. In contrast, however, only six regulars are back on the defensive unit including just one member of the interior line.

Record breaking junior tailback Greg Voss of Muskegon, who twice has had seasons of 1,000 or more rushing yards, leads the offensive returnees. A two-time All-MIAA selection, Voss ended sixth in that nation among small college rushers last fall gaining a school record, 1,284 yards.

Voss is joined in the backfield by veterans Ed Sanders of Brewton, Ala. and Barry Brugger of Grand Haven. Sanders averaged a team leading 5.2 yards a carry from his fullback position last fall.

Returnees on the offensive line include ends Dave Johnson of Watervliet and Mark Meyer of Fremont, guards Pete Semeyn of Muskegon and Jeff Winne of Kinelon, N.J., and tackles Bob Tiggleman of Grand Rapids and Bob Kibbey of Farmington.

The defense is strong in the secondary where a year ago Hope ended eighth in the nation in pass defense allowing only 57 completions in 130 attempts for 669 yards.

Senior Ted Albrecht of Grand Rapids, is the only returning interior lineman, but secondary vets include linebacker Mark Bolthouse of Muskegon halfbacks Jim Courter of Wyoming and Bob Lamer of Zeeland and safeties Doug Smith of Grand Rapids and Wojcicki.

The Dutchmen will be trying to fill the holes of graduated senior stars like middle guard Ted Rycenga and end Jim Lamer this fall.

After winning their first back to back co-championship in history, Adrian's Coach Bill Davis' Bulldogs will again be the team to beat.

Returning to bolster the league's leading defensive unit will be four All-MIAA headhunters, including Harry Marok at linebacker, Dave Zimmerman and Don Stormer at halfbacks and John Zang at end.

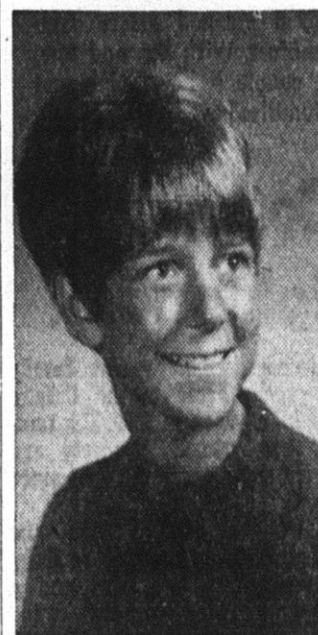

Plan Resort Community At Crystal Highlands

For years John D. French of Birmingham has been spending at least part of each summer in the Crystal Lake area of Benzie County. Now he's helping to preserve it for others.

The French family and Mr. and Mrs. James Kelly of New York are developing Crystal Highlands, a planned resort community. The 550-acre area is located on Crystal Drive near the intersection of M-22 between Beulah and Frankfort. It has 3,000 feet of water frontage on Crystal Lake, Long Lake and Rush Lake.

Planning for the area started over three years ago. Both families wanted to create a resort community that would be outstanding, while maintaining the ecology of the area. As a result, the roads follow the natural terrain, the homesites are unusually large and are carefully matched to nature. There are also restrictions to insure the preservation of wooded areas and tasteful growth. As a safeguard to the ecology and overcrowding, a number of conservation areas have been located throughout the site.

GRAND HAVEN — The first draft of the 1965 updated vocational feasibility study were presented to the Ottawa Area Intermediate Board of Education last week.

Since the need for vocational and technical training is as great today as it was when the measure was defeated in 1969, further study will be given to the study and a good share of the September meeting will be devoted to the question. The 1969 vote concerned establishment of a community college to serve vocational and technical needs.

Announcement was made of open house Aug. 25 and 26 at the new Trainable Center for severely and multi-handicapped youngsters. A Title VI grant of \$45,538 for the center was announced.

The board also is considering a therapy pool for the orthopedic program houses in Holland. A concept of such a pool is favored and the board indicated it will participate financially if the proposal is determined to

be feasible. The orthopedic program serves all youngsters in the Ottawa intermediate district.

The board went on record as opposing two constitutional amendments concerning property tax reform and the graduated income tax that will be on the ballot in November. It is the board's belief that all citizens in the state are not being given full facts on what the constitutional amendments mean.

The board was notified that the county staff is complete except for one aide. Signing recent contracts were Mrs. Sylvia Russell of Grand Haven as a homebound and hospitalized teacher and Dale Boeve of Hudsonville as a social worker.

An update on mandatory special education is progressing well. The plan is due to be completed Nov. 1, 1972, and then goes to the state for approval.
