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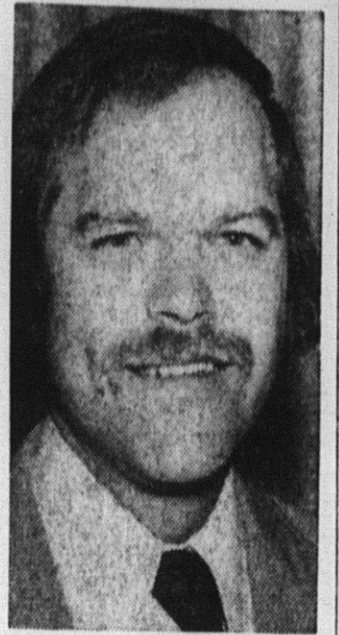
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Campaign To Open Sept. 27

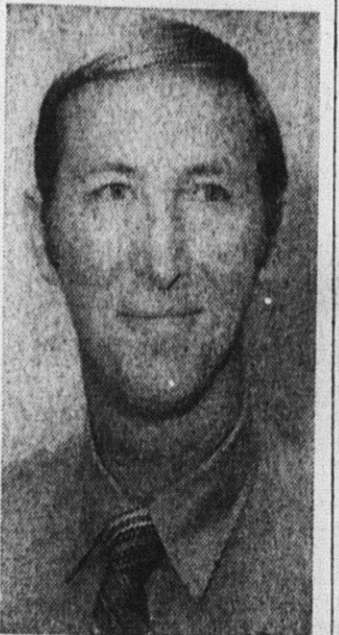
Hofmeyer, Sturgeon
Named Assistants By
Chairman Overbeek

The Greater Holland United Way, which supports financially 11 local humanitarian agencies, has adopted a 1973 campaign goal of \$246,741, it was announced today by campaign chairman Lawrence J. Overbeek.

The goal represents an 11.3 per cent increase over the

\$221,636 1972 goal. The dates for the campaign are Sept. 27 to Nov. 10.

Overbeek named two veteran United Way Volunteers as co-chairmen for the 1973 campaign. They are Terry L. Hofmeyer and William R. Sturgeon.

Hofmeyer, assistant city manager, was advisor for the 1972 campaign and was chairman of the public-civic divisions for the 1970 and 1971 campaigns. He was divisional manager of the 1968 campaign.

Married and the father of four children he lives with his family at 28 East 23rd St. He is a member of the executive committee of the GHUW.

Sturgeon, personnel manager at Parke-Davis and Co., was assistant chairman of the 1972 campaign and has worked with the industrial division in past campaigns. He is active in the Boy Scouts and Holland Community theatre.

Sturgeon and his wife have three children and live at 1195 Euna Vista Dr.

Hofmeyer will be in charge of the special gifts, professional and public-civic divisions while Sturgeon will head the construction, commercial and retail divisions. Each is to name divisional chairmen.

The 1973 campaign goal includes the following allocations to member agencies for 1974:

The United Way of Michigan supports 26 state and national member agencies.

Allocations to the member agencies were approved by the GHUW board following intensive budget studies of agency requests.

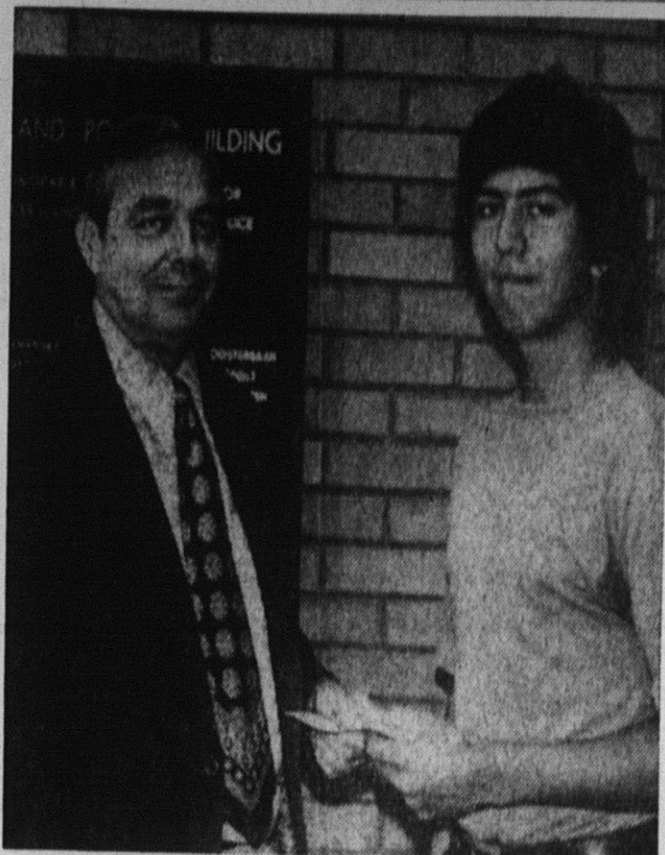

Ottawa Area District Cuts Tax Rate

GRAND HAVEN — The taxpayer in the Ottawa Area Intermediate School District will get a little break come next tax bill.

The intermediate board will levy 1.2 mills for special education instead of the voted 1.4 mills.

This involves a special education budget of \$1,221,519 which the board approved for the 1973-74 school year. Of this figure \$415,000 will be distributed to local districts which operate a special education program. A total of \$388,292 is budgeted for the Trainable Center program which includes the regular school year and summer school.

Approximately \$61,000 will be spent for administrative costs and the remainder will be used in local school districts for psychologists, social workers, homebound and hospitalized teachers and consultants for impaired hearing and vision.

The decrease in the tax levy was gratifying news for the board since many intermediate districts have had to seek additional millage to meet standards under the mandatory special education program which went into operation this year.

The board also approved a general fund budget of \$226,502.

The administration was directed to inform the architect to proceed with working drawings for an addition to the Trainable Center. School opening and other procedures for the Trainable Center were reviewed. The staff has been completed.

The board scheduled hearings for three families of Coopersville area seeking transfer to the Kenowa Hills district to be held Thursday at 8 p.m. in the county building here.

Panel to Outline Hospital Needs For Rotary Club

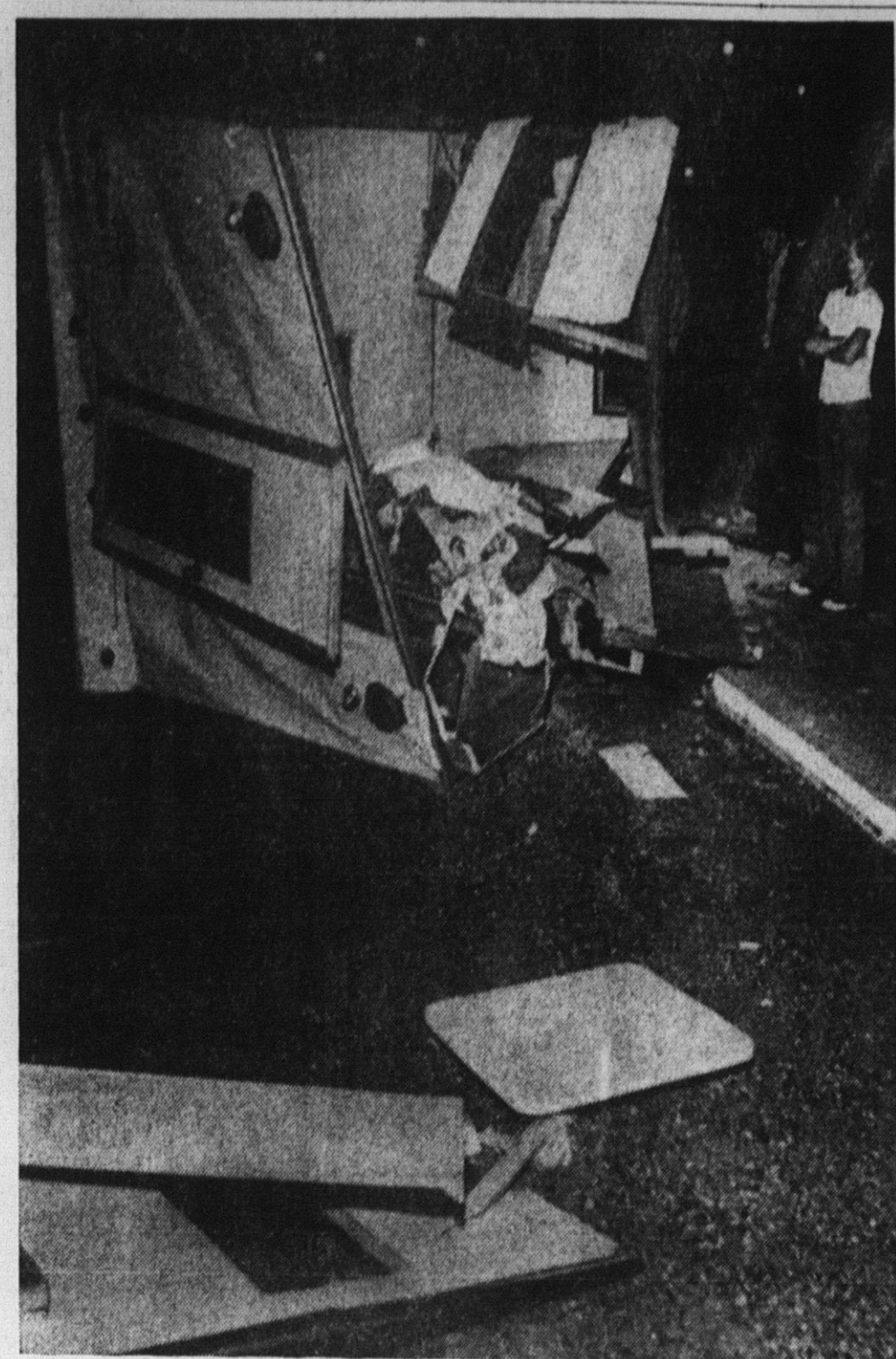
The program of the Rotary Club Thursday noon at the Macatawa Bay Yacht Club will feature a panel on "Your Hospital — Long Range Plan and Organization," moderated by John F. Donnelly, a former president of the Hospital Board.

Discussion will be based on the six-month study of the Tri-Brook Group Inc., management consultants, of Oak Brook, Ill. Some areas are the service area population growth, requirements of acute health care service, requirements for specialized health care, emerging trends, departmental workloads and space requirements.

Serving on the panel will be Kenneth Zuverink, vice president of the Hospital Board; Dr. Edward Helbing, chief-of-est of the hospital staff, and Hospital Director Frederick S. Burd. A brief slide presentation will be included.

An important factor of the study is hospital control with options on present control through City Council, an area authority, independent board or private ownership. The study projects: hospital needs for a 10-year period with the first improvement plan at \$6.7 million in 1978 and completion in 1983 at \$4.5 million. William LaBarge is program chairman.

Youths Pulled From Burning Wreckage

Woman Dies In Car Truck Crash

An Ottawa County sheriff's reserve officer and the father of three young children were credited with saving several children from their burning camper truck following a fatal accident at Eighth St. and the US-31 bypass Friday night.

Killed in the crash of a car and the camper truck at 11:39 p.m. was Joann Delaso, 23, of Grand Rapids, a passenger in the car driven by her husband, Carl Delaso, 23. She was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital.

Delaso was listed in "serious" condition Saturday with internal injuries. The driver of the camper truck, Ernesto Garcia, 44, of Sterling, Ill., was in "fair" condition with back injuries. Both were admitted to Holland Hospital.

Deputies said the Delaso car was eastbound on Eighth St. and allegedly failed to stop for a red flashing signal light. The car was struck broadside by the Garcia truck which was northbound on US-31.

Deputies said the car spun into a ditch off the east side of the roadway while the truck and camper skidded sideways and rolled over. The camper was tossed from the truck and came to rest 75 feet from where the truck was found.

Officers said the six Garcia children were in the camper at the time and Richard Garcia, 2, was tossed from the camper and found 80 feet away from the wreckage. He suffered cuts and bruises and was treated in the hospital and released.

A propane gas tank on the camper apparently exploded, setting the camper on fire.

Reserve deputy Jerry De Jong, 29, of 396 Arthur St., dashed into the burning wreckage of the camper twice to bring out some of the Garcia children and carry them to safety. He was not reported injured.

De Jong said he saw a couple of the children standing toward the front of the burning camper and pulled them off and pulled a burning mattress away from another child.

Holland township firemen were called to extinguish the fire.

Ernesto Garcia Jr., 15, was admitted to Holland Hospital with second degree burns of the chest and arms and was in "good" condition. Garcia's wife, Juanita, 43, suffered a broken right arm while a daughter, Gloria, 17, suffered a broken foot. Both were listed in "good" condition.

Three other children escaped serious injuries. They were Norma, 9, Amanda, 7, and Edna, 13.

The death was the 25th traffic fatality reported in Ottawa County this year compared with 27 last year at this time.

Ottawa County vice detectives arrested Arthur Richard Thompson, 26, of 8238 48th Ave., Georgetown township, late Monday for growing marijuana after they had obtained a search warrant and seized 40 plants about two feet tall. Thompson demanded examination at his District Court arraignment Tuesday and was held in lieu of \$500 bond.

State Police Monday arrested Virgil Boss, 25, of 3479 Bauer Rd., Jenison, after they found 15 marijuana plants growing in a corn field. He demanded examination at his arraignment Monday and was released on \$200 bond.

Collections amounted to \$5,038,899 of the total levy of \$5,624,926. Leenhouts said the 90 per cent mark was about average for tax collections by the deadline in Holland.

Taxes unpaid now have a two per cent penalty added. Taxes still unpaid after Sept. 10 will carry a six per cent penalty charge.

Summer Classes Assist Children of Migrants

The West Ottawa Schools summer school program for migrant children ended last week after an eight-week session at Pine Creek School for children from 2½ to the teens.

Sandy Mendez is director for this year's program, which for the first time had performance objectives in communication and mathematics skills which were evaluated for each child participating.

Financed under Title I, the program is just for children of migrant workers currently working on area farms, or having left the migrant life and settled in the past five years. For the first time this year's classes included only Mexican-American children, no Anglo or Black children, as in past years.

The program has always tried to assist the children of the migrants to catch up as much as possible in their school work, which is so often interrupted as their parents follow the crops. For the Mexican-Americans, there is always a language barrier, and the West Ottawa program has always included bilingual aides. This year, most of the teachers are also bilingual, which has helped particularly in the evaluation of each child's progress. Aides include high school and college students and members of the Latino community.

The performance objectives standards set this year are part of a pilot program set up by the State of Michigan and the evaluations will hopefully follow each child returning to schools in Texas' Rio Grande Valley.

A parent advisory committee was also set up this year to enlist parents' help in the objectives and to broaden the program to include nighttime activities involving the parents. An open house and Chalupa (games) night have been held, with opportunities afforded the youngsters to show off new skills for parents. A pinata party is scheduled Thursday.

In addition to regular school classes, the pupils are served breakfast and lunch, plus a snack during the day. This year, the cooking staff provided several Spanish meals, in addition to the regular menu, which is often strange and exotic to the migrant students.

Joy Muehlenbeck was evaluator of the program this year and Sue Mooy served as resource teacher, with Valerie Bakker as her assistant. Emily Bloemendaal and Pamela Wiersma were program volunteers.

As individual attention is the key to improving performance, each class had a teacher plus two or three aides. The staff included the following:

Barbara Ester, pre-schoolers (2½ to 5) and aides Beatrice Fierro, Gloria Schultz and Nancy Locker.

Luis Destefano, ages 6 and 7, with aides Marc Rivera, Norma Grijalva and Mike Bredeweg.

Barbara Schilling, ages 8 and 9, with Margie Arispe, Carolyn Vander Schaaf, and Doug Van Den Berg, aides. Ven Den Berg also assisted with the music for the entire program.

Rosie Garcia, ages 10 and 11, was called away by a death in the family and Diane Van Kampen completed the program for her with Patty Briggs, Nilda Valderas and Kristi Kalkman, aides.

Pamela Guerra was in charge of ages 12 and up, who completed a special study on Mexico, the United States and Africa, which compared cul-

tures and afforded opportunities for many individual and group projects, including map-making. Her aides are Wanda Schutt, who also served as physical education teacher, conducting a track and field day for the entire student body. Nahuma Nunez and Martin Trevino.

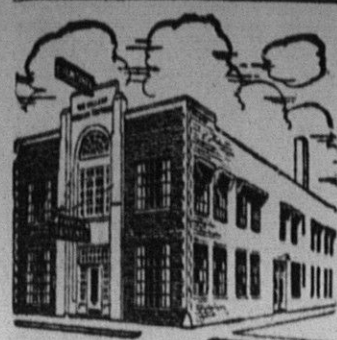

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BACK TO BASICS

With all the calls for controls and no controls, it is good to have someone put a bit of the problem in a very pithy way. Prof. Andrzej Brzeski, professor of economics in the University of California at Davis, isn't afraid to label himself as one of those who wants an uncontrolled marketplace.

He still believes the old economic laws of supply and demand do operate. And he gets this across by telling us that if controls are such an effective way to carry on business, then there ought to be plenty of grain and beef in the Soviet Union, a country that is completely controlled. Of course he might have added China and a number of other countries where all of life is controlled.

The very best control we have over high prices is the good sense of the consumer who lets the high priced stuff stay on the shelf and is willing for a time to make do with other cheaper goods. It is interesting to note that already certain food isn't selling and we can be quite sure that it will require a price drop to get them moving.

If we had had a controlled situation on our farms we might not be in the present state. Our farmers have done well in spite of the government. But granted a good growing year, and the right to run their own business, we can expect that they will do even more.

Meddling in the marketplace has never produced good results. Human nature isn't that predictable. Oddly enough it all brings us back to a pretty basic philosophy that just won't go away.

From 4000 B.C. to the time of Christ "cuneiform" (having the form of a wedge), writing was used. The Hebrews had the story of the tower of Babel to account for the many different spoken languages.

Words change from generation to generation. Infant originally meant "non speaking" and applied to the very young. Person originally was a mask worn by a Roman actor. The word "babble" came from the Tower of Babel. In New York we say "block," in Philadelphia "square." In New York they say "soft drink" and in Boston "tonic."

The word hamburger came from Hamburg, Germany. The term sandwich came from the Earl of Sandwich who liked his beef between two slices of bread. In America we say desert, in England it is called sweets. Goodbye is short for, "In God We Trust." Holiday means Holy Day. Protestant came from the word protester.

Many of our places are of Indian origin. For example: Dakota was the confederate of Sioux tribes. Chicago was the place of skunks. Illinois was the Tribe of Perfect Men. Iowa meant the sleepy one. Texas meant friends. Waukazoo came from Chief Waukazoo.

Many American words had their origin in the Dutch language. Cookie (from the Dutch koeke, a little cake), Catskill (from Kaateskill, (kil in Dutch means channel), Bergen is a Dutch word meaning hills. Sandy Nook is of Dutch origin (Nooks means corner). The Bronx was named for Jonas Bronck.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Aug. 26
Redemptive Love in Action
Mark 2:16-17; Galatians 5:25-6:5

Jesus often shocked the religious people of His day by His attitude to the lost and wayward whom they neglected. Christians are called upon to follow in the footsteps of Jesus and minister as He did, especially to those who have needs of any kind.

I. Jesus was criticized. When the religious leaders saw Jesus associating with publicans and sinners they found fault. In those days there were two kinds of people in the nation — those who kept the Old Testament law and the traditions added by the religious leaders, and the people who ignored both. The Pharisees would not have anything to do with the latter group whom they called "the people of the land." The publicans and sinners were in this group. Religious leaders shunned them, Jesus associated with them and was criticized.

Jesus defended His actions. He used the illustration of the doctor who ministered to the sick. The morally and spiritually sick needed healing. When Matthew heeded the call of Jesus to follow Him he responded. Since he got a blessing from Jesus he wanted his friends to meet Him and therefore he invited them to a great banquet where Jesus was the guest of honor. This made the Pharisees critical. The problem of separatism merits attention. We are in the world but not of the world. We should win sinners but not become contaminated by their sins. Love should prompt all believers to seek the lost, least and the last.

II. The guidance of the Spirit is essential. Today we hear a lot about the Holy Spirit. The Spirit leads people to a certain kind of life. He constrains us to shun the evils which mar life, particularly selfishness and pride. The Spirit promotes the brotherly attitude in the church. Christians are brothers and hence have obligations to each other. Christians do wrong deeds now and then. It is easy to blame the Christian who committed a sin. The spiritual-minded Christians will try to bring back the wanderer and restore him to the fold, doing this "in the spirit of meekness," watchful lest a fall follow.

"Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ" — to love one another. All have burdens and the opportunity to help is there. Every man has his own special burden — his own pack such as a soldier has to carry. Christians can share their problems and help and encourage each other in burden — bearing but there are some burdens which belong to the individual just as a man wears his own suit of clothes. We all have obligations to others and every one has an obligation to himself. God will help us all to meet the demands which He makes.

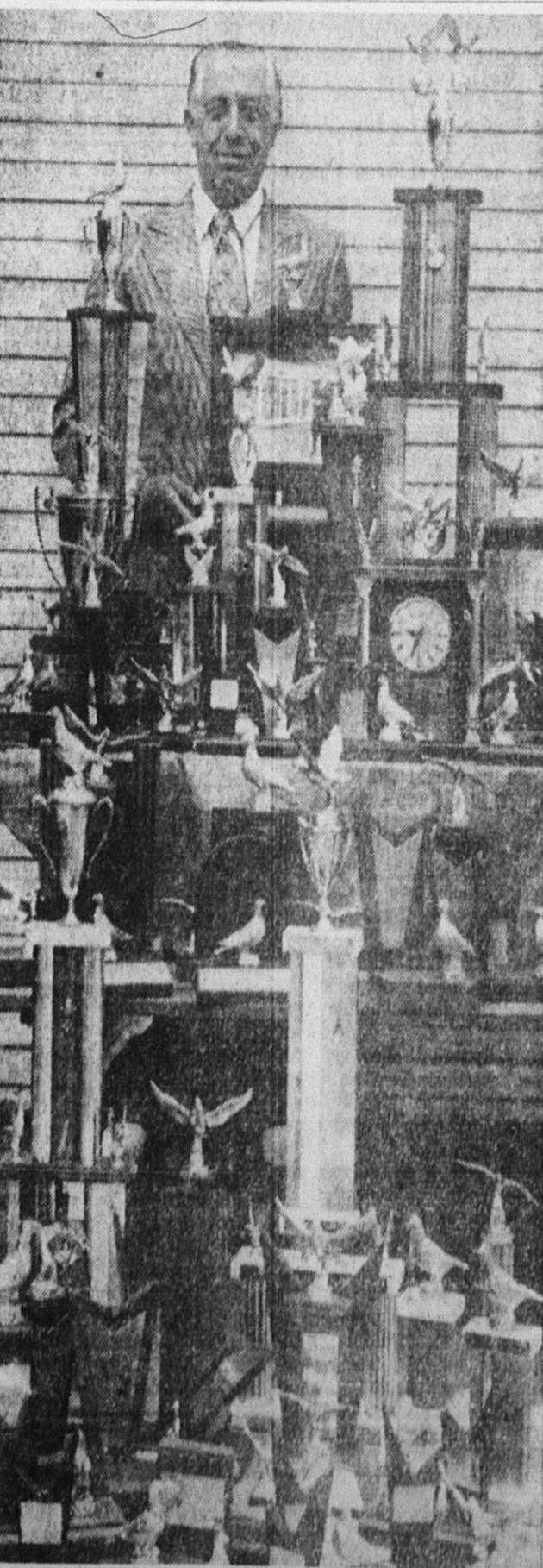
Total cost of the addition was not revealed and completion was expected next spring. The new facility will house the machine and sub-assembly departments which employ some 50 persons.

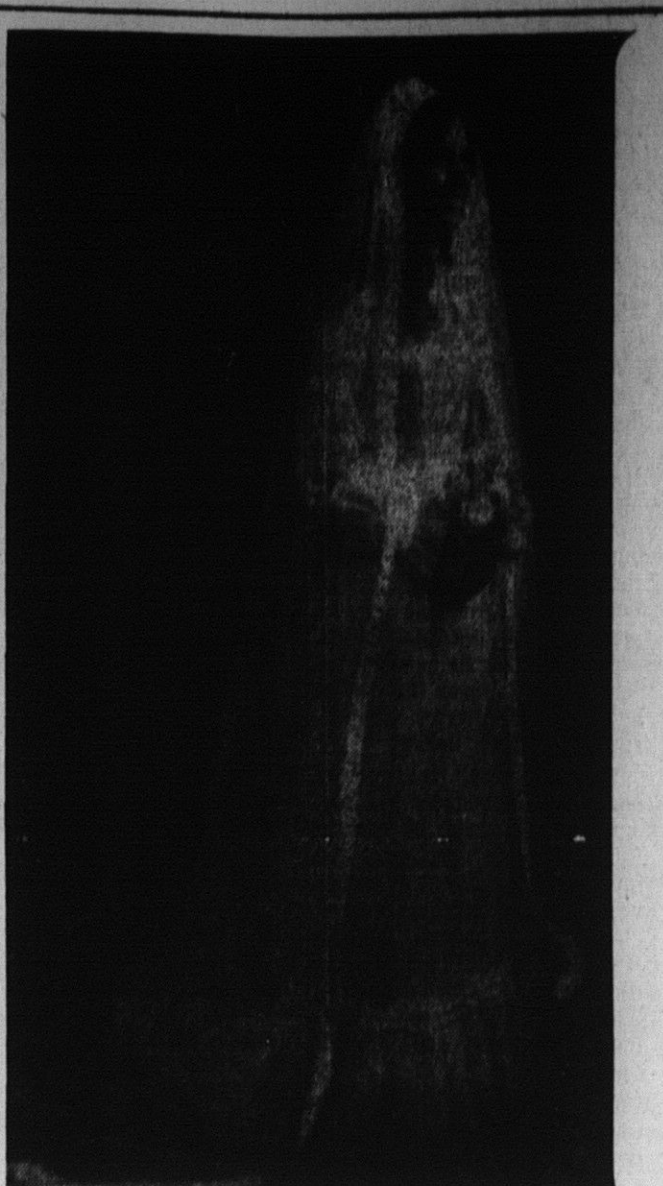

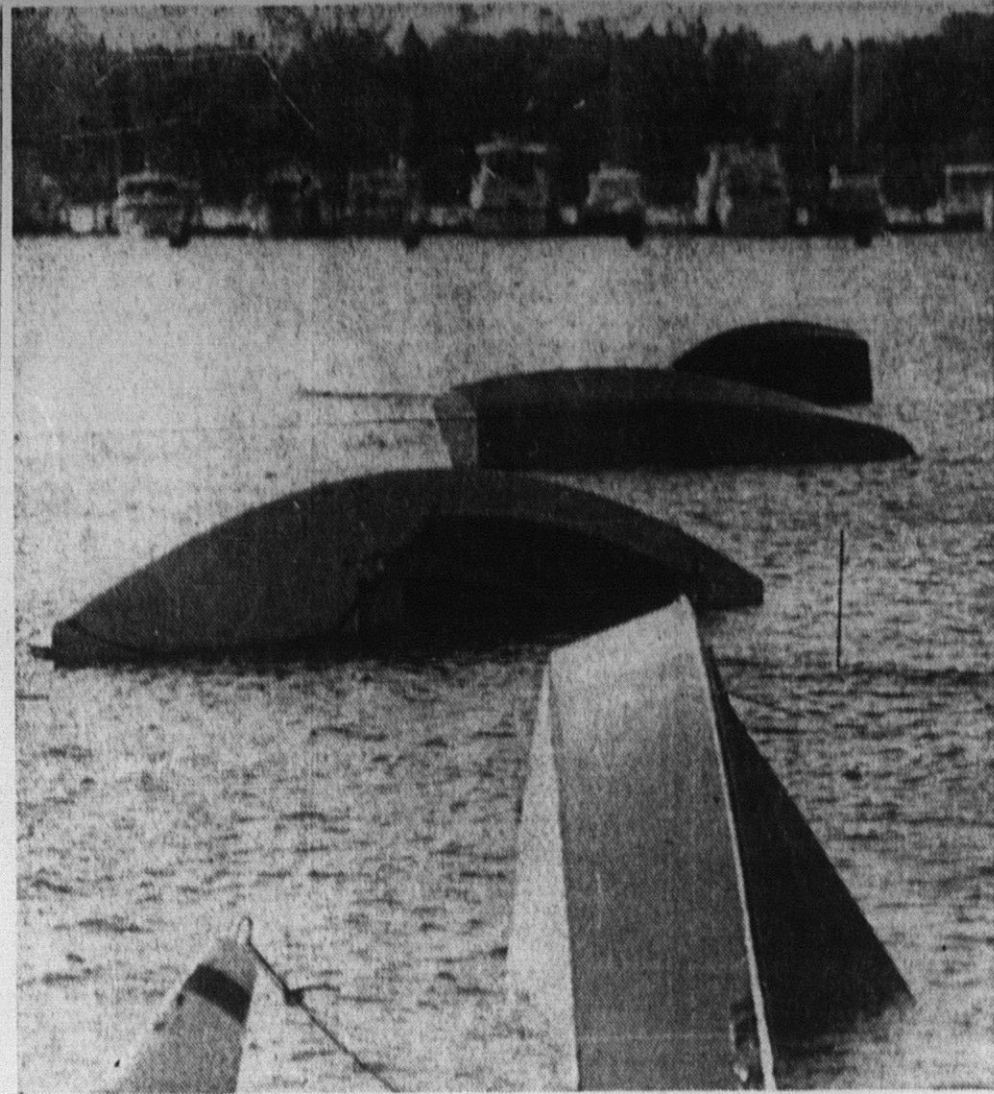

'The Gingerbread Lady' Opens at the Red Barn

Neil Simon has written many plays, mostly comedies with a moral which comes through in the lines of his characters. In "The Gingerbread Lady" which opened Monday night at the Red Barn Theatre, he tries hard to show how a group of people in abnormal situations react to personal tragedies.

The dialog is clever, the lines are Simon's but the first night audience seemed reluctant to get involved with Evy Meara's return from a hospital where she spent several weeks in the alcoholic ward and must now return to face reality and her friends and a daughter. It is Dorothy Lee Tempkins' show and she is on the set throughout the three acts.

Don Bonevich is her gay friend, Jimmy Perry, who is her real friend in spite of his own problems in not succeeding as an actor. Elizabeth Lowry is the beauty out-of-a-jar Toby Laudau, who is also having trouble and during the course of the play is beset by divorce problems.

Norman E. Anderson, who has been in several plays this season, is surprisingly adept in his role as Evy's lover and "leaver," and never overplays his role. As Evy's 17-year-old daughter, Polly, apprentice Ellen Somers is a believable teenager.

Comedy relief, which was badly needed, is provided by Michael Salvaor as the Puerto Rican delivery boy, Manuel.

The cast did the best it could with a play that may be fine for a study of characters but is not really a good play for summer theater. The audience wants to laugh and be entertained, and human tragedies, even with Simon's funny lines is certainly not entertainment, unless you like to suffer.

The fault was not with the director, Jim Dyas, or the production stage manager Bruce Hall, it just isn't a play you expect from Neil Simon.

Next week will be a different story when "The Odd Couple"

also written by Simon is presented as the finale of the season. It will star Don Bonevich as Felix and Bruce Hall as Oscar. This is one of the author's top hits. The play runs through Sept. 2.

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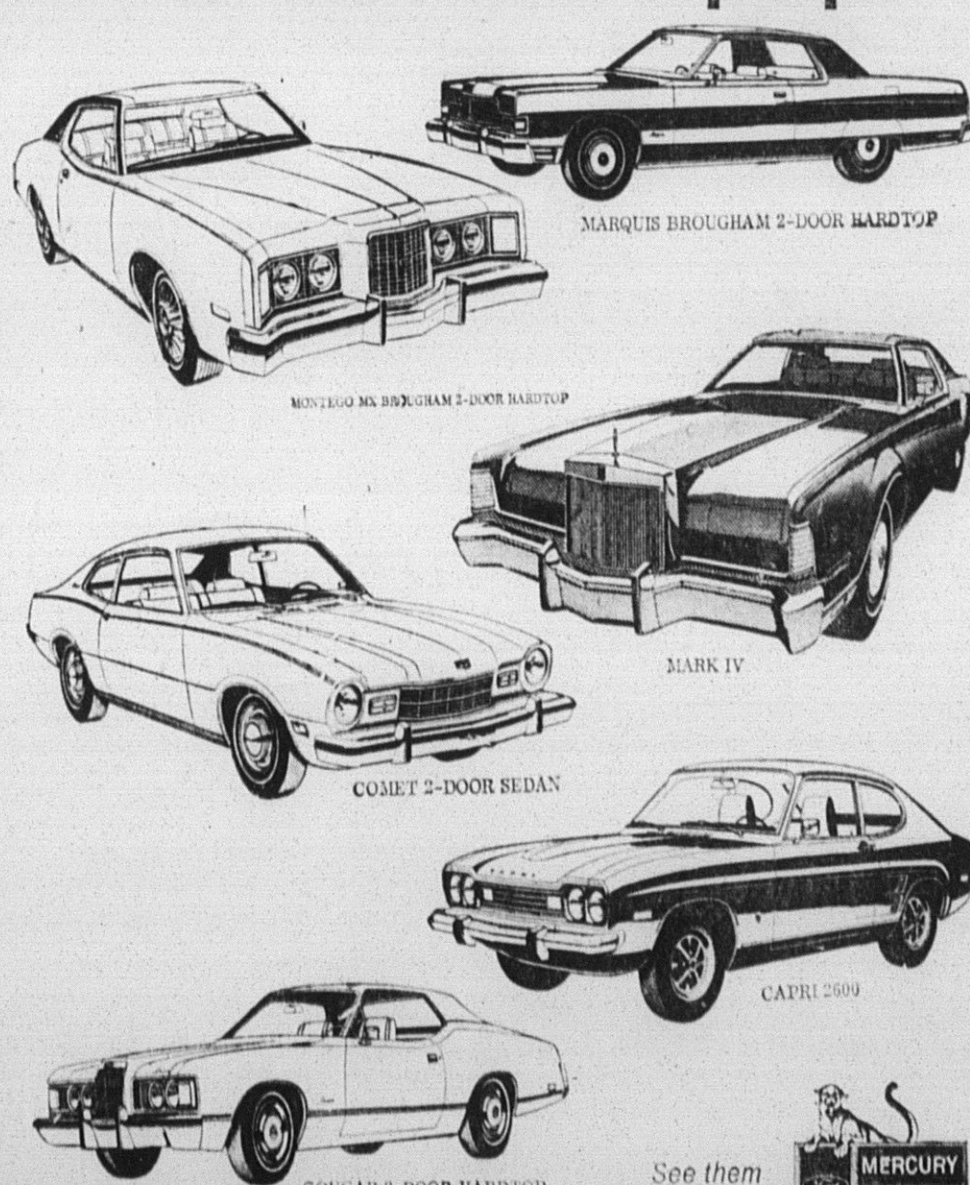
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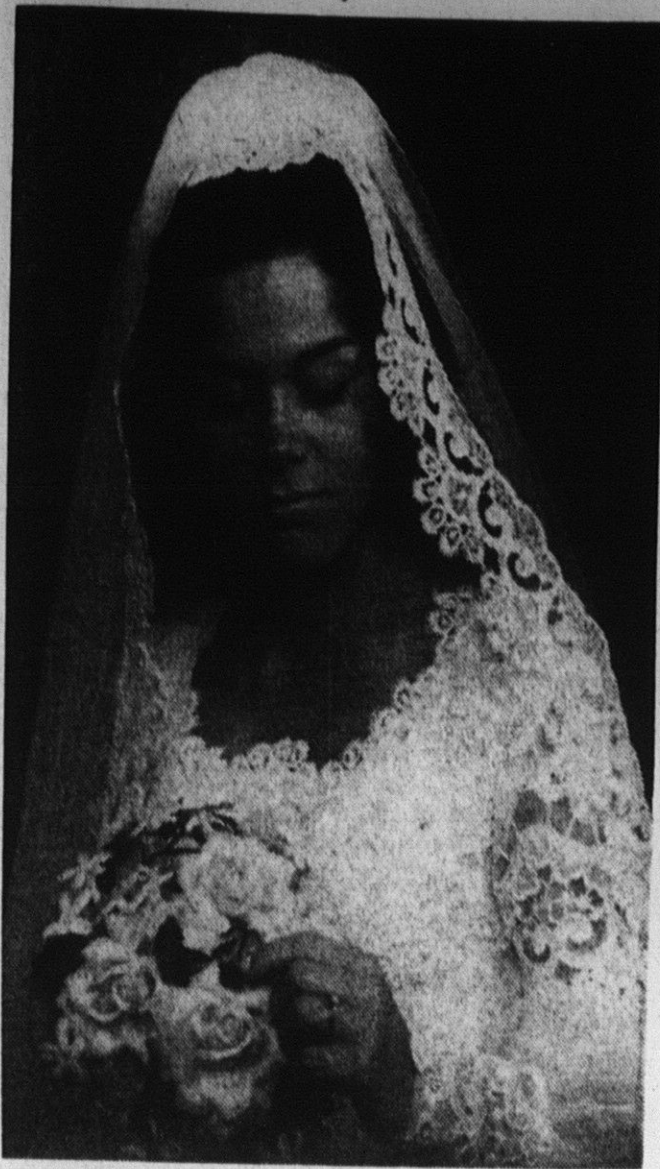

With tax collections coming in the first of the year, the district generally has to borrow funds to operate during the first half of its fiscal year.

The hot lunch charge will remain at 35 cents a meal and will be reevaluated when the effects of phase 4 and the availability of food is known. Food stocks are sufficient for three weeks with the exception of hamburger, an important item in food preparation.

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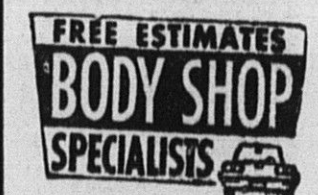


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
