BPW Postpones Rate Hearings

The Holland Board of Public Works Monday delayed a public hearing into electric and waste treatment rate hike requests until a council-ordered study of the BPW by a management consultant team is completed.

Ralph Nader To Speak At Hope

Nader gained national fame in 1965 with his best selling book about American automobiles, "Unsafe at Any Speed."

Officials Work To Deport Gypsies

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa County prosecutors office working with U.S. Immigration officials sought to have a band of so called gypsies deported to their home in Italy and Yugoslavia, State Police said today.

The group of 24 persons, including 15 juveniles, was taken into custody early Sunday after their car caravan was stopped along I-96 near Nunica.

Police said gypsies were believed involved in a series of thefts being reported in the west Michigan area including Holland and Saugatuck.

Troopers said a search warrant was obtained to search three of the cars used by the suspects but nothing was found. A fourth car was being sought but police said it was believed in the Chicago area.

Zeeland Traffic On Decrease

ZEELAND — One person was arrested for being drunk and disorderly and four others were given traffic citations Sunday night as fewer cars were reported in town during the fifth week of a disturbance.

At least 16 Ottawa County sheriff's deputies and reserve officers and six Zeeland police officers walked the streets in the business district to control the persons.

Police Chief Lawrence Veldheer said there was little trouble Sunday although traffic was still heavy along Main St. But the amount of traffic was less than the previous four Sunday evenings since the gathering began.

Police Release Gypsy Group

GRAND HAVEN — A group of 24 persons suspected of being involved in a series of larcenies and thefts in west Michigan was released by State Police Tuesday for a lack of evidence.

Troopers said three cars used by the caravan were searched after warrants were obtained but nothing was found to link the group with the thefts.

Officers said a fourth car sought was found abandoned along Lake Shore Dr. south of Grand Haven Tuesday.

Immigration authorities were working with foreign officials to seek a country that would accept the group believed in this country illegally.

Planning Unit Acts on Two Zone Changes

The Holland Planning Commission Wednesday acted on two rezoning requests, set a hearing for another request and launched plans for development of the Macatawa River area from Windmill Island to the River Ave. bridge.

The commission recommended a request to rezone 21.5 acres of land at the southwest corner of 48th St. and Lincoln from agricultural to industrial be denied following a public hearing at which five or six families objected to the proposed rezoning.

The commission recommended approval of a request to rezone land south of 32nd St. to a midpoint between 40th and 48th Sts. west of Waverly Rd., and east of railroad tracks from D-1 Industrial to D-2 Industrial.

A hearing was set for Sept. 25 on a rezoning request from Birchwood Manor seeking to have land now zoned A-1 single family changed to A-3 residential to allow for expansion of the facility.

The commission did not object to a request from Holland Hitch Co., to vacate a portion of 19th St., easterly from Homestead Ave., but urged a master plan for the development of the area by Holland Hitch should be submitted since 40 per cent of the company land was residential.

The commission heard reports on efforts to plan for development of the river front area of the city and were told the West Michigan Shoreline Regional Development Commission was preparing a proposal for a study of waterfront development.

Rainson said a delay in implementing the higher electric and sewer rates could cost the BPW \$130,000 in lost revenues.

He added that rates could be cut if the formula for contributions to the general city was changed back to the 50 per cent of net income rather than the present 5 1/2 per cent of gross. This year the contributions amounted to 89 per cent of the net, he said.

Bopf replied by saying the city subsidizes installation of sanitary sewers for the BPW by more than \$200,000 and that the city council, in ordering the BPW study, was looking at the total tax and rate package paid by the citizens.

In other business, a bill for \$4,072.50 from a Grand Rapids law firm for work in obtaining a restraining order against striking BPW union employees was submitted and the BPW decided to obtain an opinion from the city attorney on whether the BPW or general city should pay the fees.

Millage Vote Planned Sept. 19

West Ottawa Okays Contract Extension

West Ottawa schools, facing millage and contract difficulties, are scheduled to open as planned Sept. 3 while teachers have agreed to extend their old contract at least until a millage election Sept. 19.

Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte was directed by the board of education at a special meeting Tuesday night to prepare school programs to meet two millage proposals planned for the Sept. 19 vote.

Van Raalte said the West Ottawa Education Association was asked Tuesday to extend its contract through Sept. 19 plus about ten days to allow school to open on schedule. The teachers agreed to the proposal.

The school board Tuesday night decided to submit two millage proposals to the district voters Sept. 19. One calls for renewal of the expiring 18.9 mills and the other issue calls for an additional 1.5 mills. Both would be for one year.

Voters twice rejected a 22 mill proposal. Van Raalte said he was directed to prepare programs that would fit both millage proposals and one if no millage was approved. He indicated he did not anticipate any elimination of programs but was looking into ways to reduce existing programs.

The board is to meet with Van Raalte Sept. 5 to review progress in the planning.

Holland Business Hit

Gypsies Held In Series of Thefts

GRAND HAVEN — A group of 24 persons, including 15 children, were held by State Police today in connection with a series of thefts in West Michigan including one in Holland Sunday.

Troopers identified the group as Italian gypsies traveling in cars registered in Illinois and Pennsylvania. They were stopped after midnight along I-96 near Nunica after troopers received a complaint from a motel near Whitehall.

Troopers said several police agencies from Waterford north to Grand Haven have reported thefts or larcenies.

In Holland the Wooden Shoe Factory lost about \$1,800 from a safe Sunday night after six females and one male had entered the store at least twice.

A store employee noticed the cash was missing when additional deposits were being placed in the safe at about 8 p.m. Police said some of the adults engaged store personnel in conversation about prices.

Troopers said they have obtained search warrants to inspect the three vehicles impounded. At least one other vehicle was being sought.

Troopers said it was difficult communicating with any of those detained because they speak only Italian. U.S. Immigration Service officials entered the case because they said the group apparently entered the country illegally.

The 15 children ranged in age from five days to 14 years and were placed in youth homes, motels and protective and social agencies in the area. The adults were held in the Ottawa County jail.

Business men in northern Indiana and southwest Michigan told police a group had robbed

them of thousands of dollars.

In addition to Holland, troopers said they know of \$2,500 that was taken from an establishment near Grand Haven.

West Ottawa Bus Schedule Changed

Bus schedules for West Ottawa schools are being adjusted because of road construction work along East Lakewood Blvd., from the C & O railroad tracks at Rose Ave. to beyond the Windmill Trailer Park.

Stops to serve the children in the area will be at the corners of Rose Ave. and Lakewood Blvd.; Beeline Rd. and Lakewood Blvd.; 129th Ave. and Charles St., and the farm market on Lakewood Blvd. Children in the trailer park may also meet their buses at the north park entrance on James St.

Bus arrival times will be approximately the same but the bus numbers may be different from the published schedule due to a necessity to revamp routes. Parents seeking specific bus stop information may call the West Ottawa transportation office.

DAV Explains Use of Funds

Uses of funds collected through the sale of Forget Me Not flowers each year in August by the Disabled American Veterans was explained by Paul D. Fisher, commander of Chapter 14 in Holland.

Money donated remains in Holland to support the work of the chapter in such projects as entertaining veterans in the VA hospitals, purchase of personal items for the veterans and maintenance of emergency and disaster relief funds for needy local veterans.

Fisher said members of the DAV include those who have served in the armed forces and have a Purple Heart decoration or were wounded, gassed or injured in the line of duty.

Allegan County deputies said the Lake car was southbound on 62nd and pulled into the path of the Kuikendall auto eastbound on 146th Ave. after stopping at the intersection. Deputies said her vision was obstructed at the intersection.

Three juvenile boys were apprehended at Windmill Island following a break-in at Little Netherlands. Entry to the building was gained by forcing open a front door. The break-in was reported at 9:01 p.m. Monday. The youths, 11, 13 and 15 years old, were released to their parents. Officers said some candles and change were recovered. Police said a break-in arrests also cleared up a break-in reported August 14 at a home at 205 East 15th St. where the family was away.

Husband, Wife Die In Crash

Grand Rapids Couple Fatally Injured; Four Persons Injured

A Grand Rapids couple was fatally injured in a two-car collision Sunday at 11:55 a.m. at Port Sheldon Rd. and US-31 north of Holland.

Pronounced dead at the scene was Robert Johnston, 82, of Grand Rapids, driver of one car. His wife, Patience, was pronounced dead a short time later in Holland Hospital.

Their death brought to 23 the number of persons killed so far this year in Ottawa County traffic accidents.

Injured in the crash and admitted to Holland Hospital in "fair" condition was Amanda Kirkland, 86, of Grand Rapids, a passenger in the Johnston car.

Also admitted to Holland Hospital and reported in "good" condition today was Carol Morrison, 35, of 117 East 12th Ave., a passenger in the car driven by her husband, Ross, 37. A son, Gary, and daughter, Kelly, 9, were treated in the hospital and released.

State Police at Grand Haven said the Johnston car was westbound on Port Sheldon and crossed the northbound traffic lanes of the divided highway, pulled into the median and went into the south bound traffic lane hitting the Morrison car broadside. The Morrison car was southbound.

Teusink Named Athletic Director

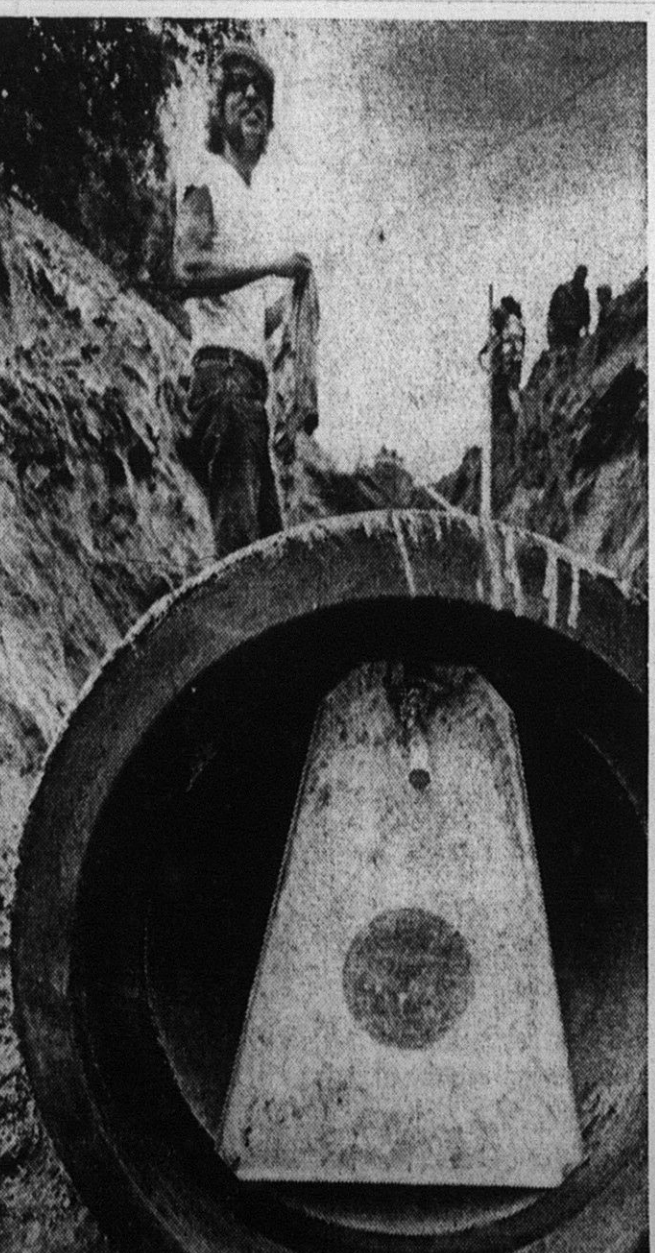

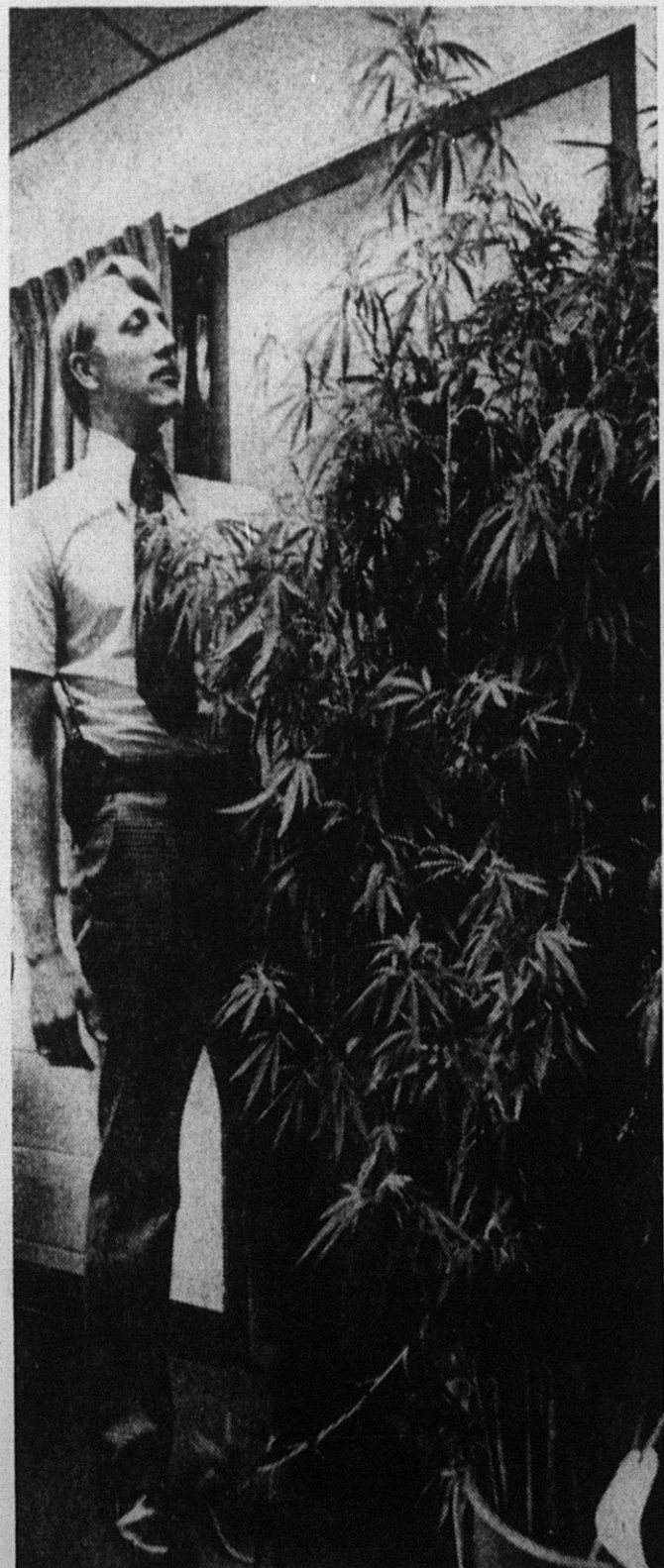

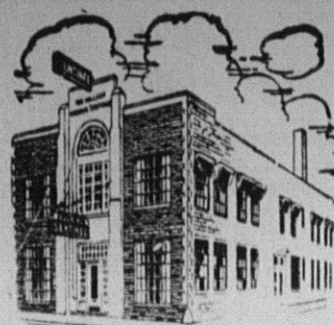

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LINDBERGH: AUTHENTIC HERO

Charles A. Lindbergh represented something that may be gone from the earth forever: the hero, who alone against terrible odds, through personal courage and daring, succeeds.

Our Mid-Twentieth Century heroes, the astronauts, no less brave, are team men. Lindbergh was the epitome of the loner, and with his solitary flight between continents ushered in an era of discovery paralleled only by Columbus' voyages to the New World.

America loved him more than any of her heroes, but that adoration led to tragedy for him and his wife, the kidnapping and death of their firstborn son. Embittered, he fled and we could not quite forgive him. But he continued to serve us with his quiet heroism, to an extent we shall never quite appreciate.

Now, nearly half a century after his flight which resulted in a shrinking globe, he is gone, the last of his breed. We will always remember him as a boyish figure, sitting stiffly in the back of a limousine, driving through the summer sun of 1927, unsmiling as the crowds cheered.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Sept. 1
God's Purpose for Man
Genesis 1:26-31; 2:15-17; 3:22-24
By C. P. Dame

During the next six months we will take a survey of the entire Bible, studying in the first 13 lessons the great events and personalities involved. This lesson tells that God created man and gave responsibilities, to him, and to his creation.

I. God Created man. Genesis is a book of beginnings. It records the creation of the world, man's origin, his fall, the origin of sin and guilt, of marriage and of the sabbath, and of the beginning of God's people. In Genesis one, God is mentioned many times—He spoke and acted, thought before doing either. God is a person. Genesis one refutes atheism, humanism, polytheism, pantheism, says God is triune. Note the word "us" which tells us that even before creation God loved and communicated. The word "us" is also used in Gen. 3:22 and in Isaiah 6:8.

After God had created the world He took an important step and created man, in His own image, a person like unto Himself to whom He gave dominion over nature. The act of creation is an historical event. Adam is a historical person just like Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. Take note of the fact that God made man a sexual being—male and female giving him the power to perpetuate the race. God told man to be fruitful and multiply. Man is dependent and so God said that he could eat "of every bearing seed." In Gen. 9:1,2 God gave man the right to use animals for food. After God had created the world by His word, He noted it was very good; there was harmony between God and man, between man and nature and man and man.

II. God gave man a responsibility. The Bible tells about man beginning his story in a garden, ending it in a city. God told man to work in the garden in which he had been placed—"to dress it and keep it." Work is not a curse, it involves responsibility, to God and to creation. The Creator gave a command to His creature which implied self-discipline. Man could eat of every tree in the garden save one, if he would eat from it he would die.

III. Disobedience has consequences. Gen. 3 records the story of man's first temptation. Satan approached the woman with a lie, saying that eating of the forbidden fruit would not result in death but in a greater knowledge of both good and evil. The woman ate, led her husband to do the same, and then they realized that they had experimental knowledge of evil and guilt took over. God had given man dominion over creation, to manage it for Him, but due to his sin, relationship with God and with his fellow human beings and nature was broken. Genesis reveals the need of redemption and contains a promise of its coming—Gen. 3:15.

Craftsmanship: Imprint On a Langejans Guitar

The rosewood guitar nestled in the corner of the mirrored display case bears some flaws. Nevertheless it may someday become valuable.

The first effort of Del Langejans, local guitar luthier, is not for sale. Del attaches far too much sentiment to his initial creation to part with it at any price.

So rare is Del's trade that he is only one of two guitar luthiers in Michigan working at the trade in a fulltime capacity. The other luthier is employed in the Eastern part of the state.

"How do you do it," customers and curiosity seekers in his Eighth St. shop ask. Del usually replies with a brief description but admits honestly that he can't possibly give detailed information to all who seek it or he wouldn't have time to construct guitars.

The part that seems to fascinate the most people, according to Del, is how the wood is curved. It's a process that includes boiling the wood for five hours to make it as "pliable as plastic" and inserting it into a mold which Langejans himself constructed. Langejans speaks fluently and demonstrates the differences between handmade guitars and assembly line products, variations in craftsmanship which become evident upon close inspection to even the beginner.

Watching Del explain the step-by-step process from bits of wood to a finely crafted, gleaming instrument, it becomes readily apparent that the word "construct" (which Dell himself readily uses) falls far short of apt description of his talents. Saying that Del "creates" is far more in line with his incredible skill.

While he doesn't totally discount the quality of factory produced guitars. — "You can't expect a beginner to pay \$300 or more for a guitar" — he does feature only one manufacturer whose quality he trusts. With the cost of raw materials, especially wood, skyrocketing, Del faces the dilemma of increases costs and prices.

"I will continue to buy the best wood available no matter what the cost," he vows.

One of the very few parts which he didn't construct from scratch in his shop, the bridge, has doubled in cost the last month (from \$9 to \$18) and the bone has risen from 90 cents to \$4.50 in six months. Del now intends to construct his own bridges rather than pay the inflated price.

Currently he purchases 25-year-old Bavarian Spruce from an importer in Chicago who sells only to guitar luthiers. The top sound board alone, sectioned in halves for balance, is valued at around \$50. Manufacturers will frequently use plywood, which because of the lack of grain, doesn't allow the sound waves to travel along the grain of the wood. And each brace must be a different thickness and height.

As it is now a single guitar takes between 100 and 150 hours of work making the \$325-and-up price tags seem modest. And \$1,000 is still considered reasonable for a handmade guitar though he has yet only sold one in that price range, an electric model.

Though he concedes that business might be more brisk (half of his customers come from Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo and Muskegon) in a larger city, the 28-year-old accomplished musician plans to stay in Holland and let the word of his accomplishments be spread through current owners.

Beginning with two years of piano lessons at the age of six, Del continued with percussion lessons under Cal Langejans at West Ottawa and playing in hand recitals kept him interested in music. In high school he took four guitar lessons and

"got sick of it."

But despite the lack of lessons Del continued to pick up the guitar and with his music background was able to teach himself. He progressed in ability with the guitar through the Navy but won't concede that he "got good."

During a demonstration of one of his guitars, the customers readily admit that he is indeed a very good guitarist.

Del is currently having his workshop at 23 East Eighth St. expanded with an additional room which he says will help facilitate increased production but the expansion is primarily for convenience and to allow for more and larger equipment.

Learning his craft primarily by repairing guitars, (Ninety per cent of the repairs are from neck trouble and warpage is another big problem," Del says) Del determined that there was

a good demand for handcrafted guitars and decided there was no reason he couldn't make them from scratch. So he learned through trial and error.

Del credits his wife, the former Frannie Mrok, with helping him by putting up with his long hours which generally stretch into 60 hours a week, his father with helping to teach him woodworking, "and his friends in furniture factories who taught him about finishing."

His display case in the shop features five models, none of which he will sell, until he completes another identical model. Orders for handcrafted guitars usually take from three to six months which seems like a long time to wait for a guitar.

But carefully examine a Del Langejans' guitar. It's really not such a long wait after all.

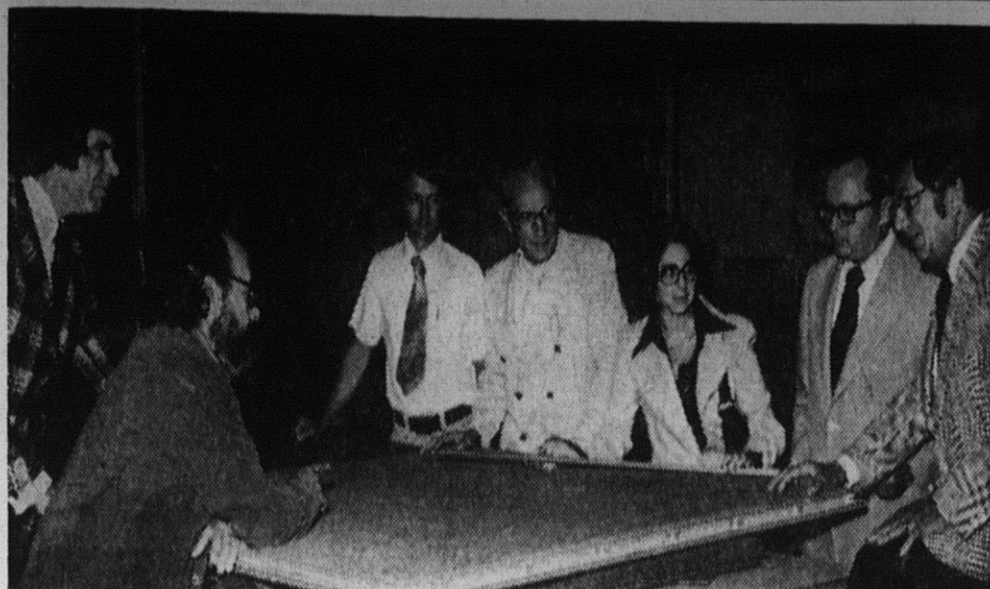

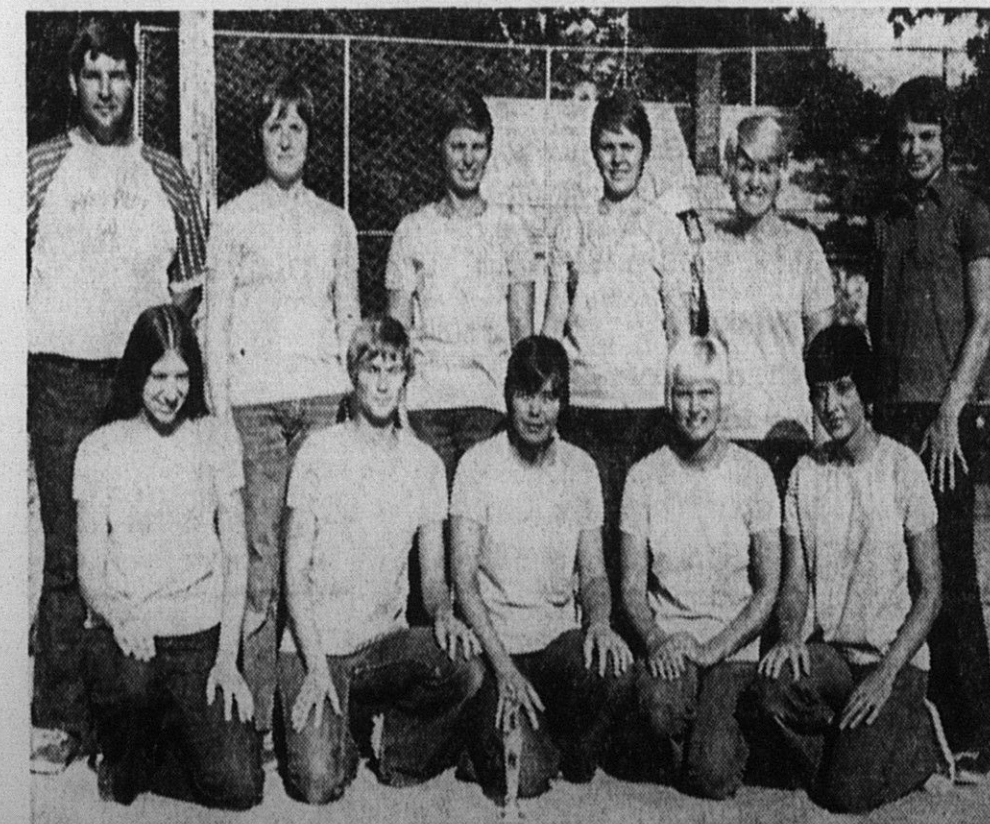

Dr. Donald DeWitt Talks To Diabetes Association

New officers were elected at the August meeting of the Otawara — Allegan Unit of the Michigan Diabetes Association. Nominations chairman, Miss Janet Witteveen, presided over the elections in which Dr. Richard Brockmeier was re-elected chairman, Thomas Bates newly elected vice chairman and Mrs. Ruth Walters, secretary — treasurer. Appointive offices are now being filled.

Mrs. Joyce Kortman, state and national liaison, reported that Dr. G. Donald Whedon, M.D., Director of the National Institute of Arthritis, Metabolism and Digestive Diseases which funds all diabetes research on the federal level, will speak in Grand Rapids on Sept. 21 at 7:30 p.m. Only 400 seats will be available for that event.

Mrs. Kortman also reported that a bill authorizing \$40 million for diabetic research and educational centers on the federal level has passed both Houses of Congress and the President has signed it. The Michigan House and Senate have each passed bills for research in Michigan for \$200,000 and the Governor has signed it into law.

Dr. Donald DeWitt, M.D. was the guest speaker. His talk entitled "Diabetes Smorgasbord" described the two main types of diabetes and the differences in care for each. He reviewed

the important factors to consider when vacationing with diabetes and stressed the importance of identification on the person notifying someone who might try to help that the person is diabetic. Cards in wallets and purses are too often overlooked.

Illness away from the home was also discussed and pointers given as to how the diabetic can counter nausea and diarrhea which are particularly debilitating to the diabetic.

Dr. DeWitt's "New News" in Diabetes pointed out the successes and problem involved with artificial pancreas experiments, beta cell transplants, and pancreas transplants as possible future cures for diabetes. "New Diet News" included the reduction of animal fats (saturated fats) in the diet of the diabetic, the realization that if a diabetic is overweight his chances of an early death are multiplied by 100, and the extremely difficult and personal nature of a proper diet prescription for a diabetic which demands trained personnel to determine.

Dr. DeWitt congratulated the Holland area for its good fortune in having Mrs. Joyce Savastano, Director of Patient Services at Holland Hospital, who is competent in this field. Dr. DeWitt concluded with 18 separate factors which should be considered when prescribing the diet of each diabetic.

125 Visit City Council In Allegan

ALLEGAN — More than 125 residents overflowed the city council chambers here Monday and most of them wanted to go on record in opposition to the council's plan to contract for public safety services with the Allegan County Sheriff's Dept.

Admitting that "we were premature on this" Mayor Henry Barber told the crowd the council had only agreed to begin negotiations with the county and pointed out that such a contract would have to be approved by the county Board of Commissioners. That board will meet on Sept. 10.

Barber also described as premature a letter directed to six police officers and three full-time fire dispatchers advising them a contract might go into effect on or about Sept. 1.

The crowd was informed that the wage dispute between the city and the police is scheduled

to go before an arbitration panel on Oct. 17. Michael Ward, the city's labor attorney said the complete package demanded for a police officer with four year's service represented an 82 per cent increase, including fringe benefits. The city offered a two-year package with an 18 per cent increase. By unanimous vote, the council agreed to hold a public hearing before taking any further action on the public safety contract plan.

In other action, the council approved placing a one-mill, five-year tax proposal to help finance a public library addition on the Nov. 5 ballot.

The one-mill tax would raise an estimated \$140,000, with the balance of the \$300,000 project funds coming from revenue sharing and private gifts.

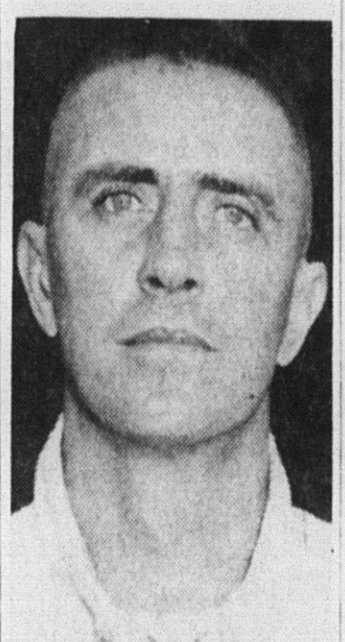

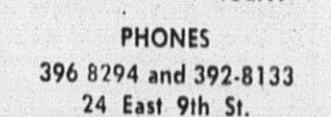
