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# Head Start Program Is Expanded

A year-round Head Start Program was approved by the Holland Board of Education at a regular meeting Monday night in the administration building on Apple Ave. It will replace the seven-week summer program which has been in operation for nine years under the direction of Lincoln School Principal Ivan Compagner.

Under the new arrangement, federal funds will be increased from \$12,900 to \$31,350 and the local share from \$4,604.40 to \$9,678 (in-kind) for a total annual budget of \$41,028.

The number of children, however, will be reduced from 60-68 to 30-34, and sessions will be carried on in Lincoln and Harrington Schools with sessions from noon to 3 p.m. The summer hours had been from 8:30 a.m. to noon.

Director Compagner told the board that parts of the program would be absorbed into the total school program resulting in fewer teachers and aides, and in better medical and dental followup, as well as closer contact with the parents. The program will cooperate with the Holland Day Care Center and with other agencies.

But while the Head Start program received impetus, the Bilingual Education Program, introduced last year as a federally-funded five-year program, received a sharp setback with the information July 15 that federal funds have been rejected. The program was launched last year on a \$170,000 Title VII grant, and the second-year request had listed \$231,000.

Mrs. Christine Manker and Lee Van Aelst who made the report stated that Rep. Guy Vander Jagt's staff had been particularly helpful in the Washington contacts and had promised further efforts toward possible federal funds. Meanwhile, the board and local administrators will review all local programs with the hope that something can be done to salvage at least a part of the program.

Board President Charles Bradford said local funds were limited since the millage was reduced as an economy measure on the summer tax bills. Supt. Donald L. Ihrman referred to the situation as "a frustrating experience," one in which proposals seems to carry more weight than evaluation of programs.

Under communications, Supt. Ihrman announced a Title III grant of \$30,437 through the State Department of Education for an experimental program on the kindergarten - first grade level.

The board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Karen Brohman as elementary librarian. Mrs. Brohman wrote that her husband has accepted a teaching position in Berrien Springs. She has been elementary librarian two years.

Business Manager Lee van Aelst listed an unaudited budget balance as of June 30 of \$123,217. The total budget had been \$6,814,928.

Jack Lowe, who was welcomed as the new assistant superintendent in charge of personnel, and Richard LeBlanc reported on the summer workshop on elementary mathematics, resulting in a handbook for teaching mathematics on all levels, a program in which geometry, shapes, measurement (and much more) will have some exposure at all grade levels. Supplementary supplies and inventory were emphasized.

# Coopersville Pilot Survives Crash

NUNICA — Coopersville pilot Robert Hawthorne, 56, escaped serious injuries Monday when the Cessna 150 two-seater plane he was flying dropped into high tension power lines south of Nunica and crashed in a woods near 120th Ave. at 8:10 p.m.

The power lines carried 180,000 volts of electricity and power to an unestimated number of homes in the area was knocked out.

Ottawa County deputies said Hawthorne was taken to North Ottawa Community Hospital in Grand Haven where he was treated for injuries and released.

Deputies said the pilot had been making several low passes in the area and apparently dropped into the lines spanning the Grand River.

Investigation has been turned over to the Federal Aviation Agency. The plane was valued at \$4,500 and was judged a total loss.

# On Equalization Appeals

# State May Order Study of County

LANSING — The State Tax Tribunal, conducting a preliminary hearing into an appeal by Holland challenging the 1975 equalization report, is asking the State Tax Commission to study all equalization in Ottawa County.

John A. Johnson, acting director of the Ottawa County Equalization Department, said the request for the county-wide study is part of new procedures of the Tax Tribunal and is becoming standard practice in equalization appeal cases.

Holland filed the suit regarding equalization of commercial property in the city. A preliminary hearing was held Monday in Lansing to determine whether there was a reasonable basis for Holland's position and arguments to decide whether further proceedings were in order.

Johnson said the Tax Tribunal will postpone hearings on the Holland matter until a report is received from the Tax Commission on studies of equalization in the 23 governmental units in the county.

Holland filed suit on its 1975 levy but Port Sheldon and Wright townships filed on 1974 equalization reports and those appeals were to continue Johnson said.

Meanwhile the equalization report will continue until the appeals before the Tax Tribunal are settled, Johnson added.

# County Delays Bike Path Funds

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Commissioners Monday delayed until next year any county participation in construction of bicycle paths until a county-wide study of the paths is completed.

Commissioners voted six to four to table action on a proposed matching fund plan with county governmental units and to wait for the bike path study and system of determining allocation of funds.

Commissioners allocated \$25,000 in federal revenue sharing funds for construction of bicycle paths in the county.

The County Development Committee had proposed a 60-40 match with townships and a 50-50 match with cities for the construction of bicycle paths four feet in width.

The proposal appeared to be in answer to an offer from Park township to share in the cost of bicycle paths along a portion of Ottawa Beach Rd. to be widened by the Road Commission from Division Ave. west for 2,000 feet.

The action by the Commissioners apparently delays installation of the bike paths. Park township supervisor Jay Van Wieren said later he doubted whether his board would pay the full share of the bike paths.

The township, he added, had plans for bike paths along Ottawa Beach Rd. to Holland State Park and along one of two routes leading to Tunnel Park as well as along South Shore Dr. from Old Orchard Rd. to Macatawa.

The County Road Commission had taken bids for the installation of the bike paths along Ottawa Beach Rd.

Among those voting in favor of the motion to delay action on the bike paths were commissioners Donald Stoltz and Donald K. Williams of Holland. Voting against delaying the matter was commissioner Kenneth Raak of Park township.

In other action commissioners decided to seek additional bids from persons or companies qualified to perform plumbing inspections for county government.

A contract with John Kistler & Associates of Grand Haven was presented for plumbing inspections for county government. Units not wishing to conduct the inspections themselves.

The cost for a minimum of three inspections for a residential structure was proposed at no more than \$50 and for commercial and industrial buildings at \$150.

Under state codes the county becomes responsible for providing plumbing inspections if governmental units decide not to conduct them.

Ottawa County deputies said Westerlund was eastbound on Douglas while the car, driven by Rhoda Bitner, 53, of 615 Douglas Ave., was eastbound on Douglas attempting a left turn onto Aniline and the cycle struck the car from behind.

Herrick Library in Holland is planning a display entitled "Symbols of a New Nation," to be open to the public October 3 to November 30.

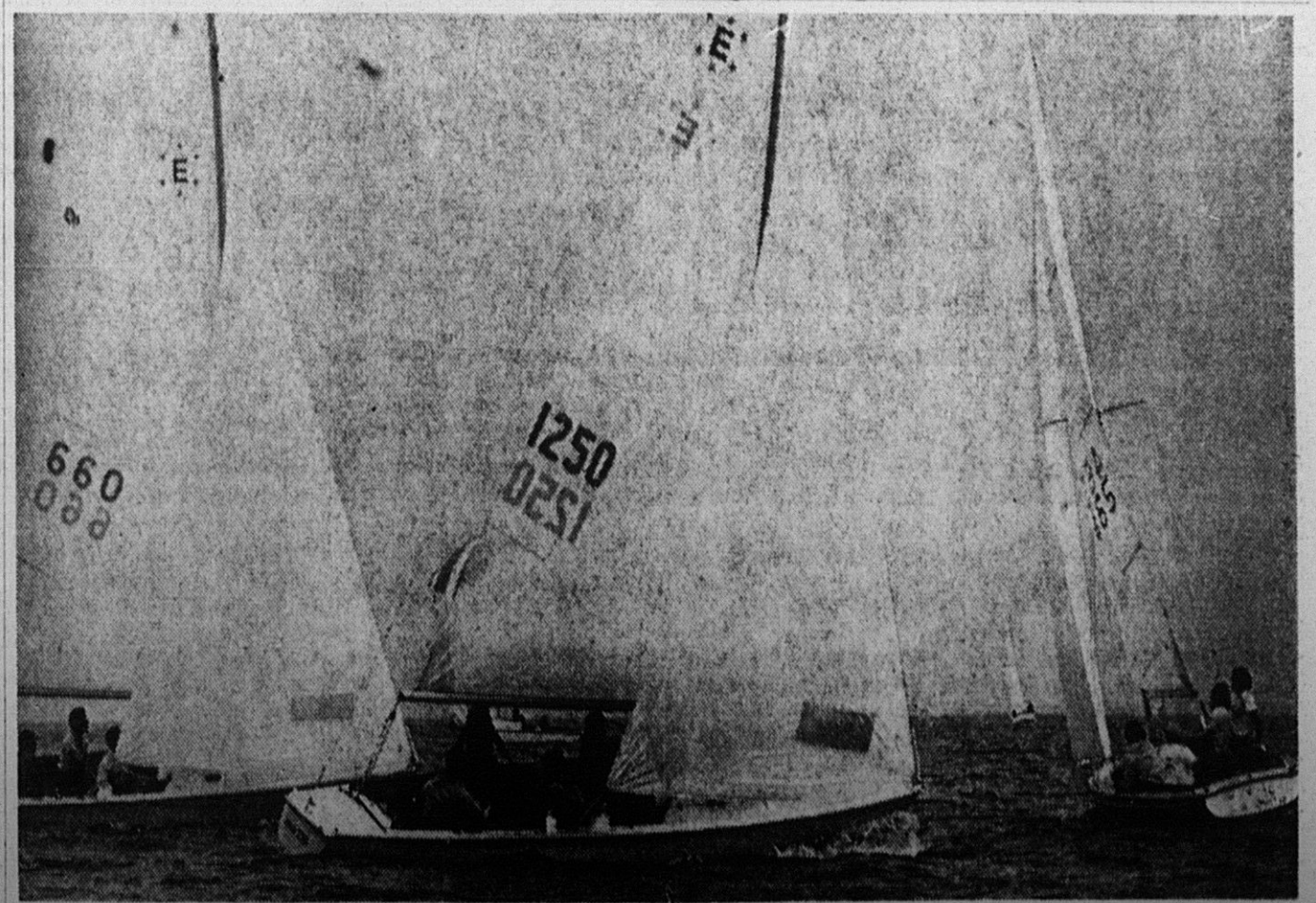

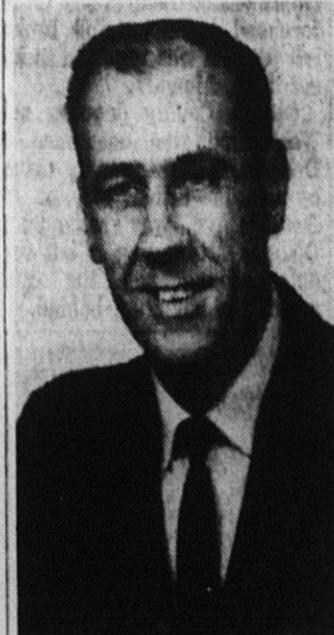

## Miss Dig Assists Contractors In Locating Utilities

A state-wide toll-free telephone number to aid contractors in locating underground utilities prior to digging has gone into effect.

Known as Miss Dig it is a utility communication program in which all utilities in the area are notified of excavation, drilling or blasting plans so that utilities can stake out areas where underground lines and pipes are buried.

State law requires anyone planning to dig to notify the one-number system 48 hours or two working days in advance. Each utility must stake out its underground lines with an identifying color.

Once a call has been received the information is fed into a computer and participating utilities and governmental units are notified.

Local utilities taking part in the service are the Holland Board of Public Works, Michigan Power Co., Michigan Bell Telephone, Consumers Power Co., Holland township and City of Zeeland.

The Holland BPW has been part of a regional system since early this year. That system was known as CONA and covered only the immediate area. The CONA telephone number has been replaced with the statewide Miss Dig number.

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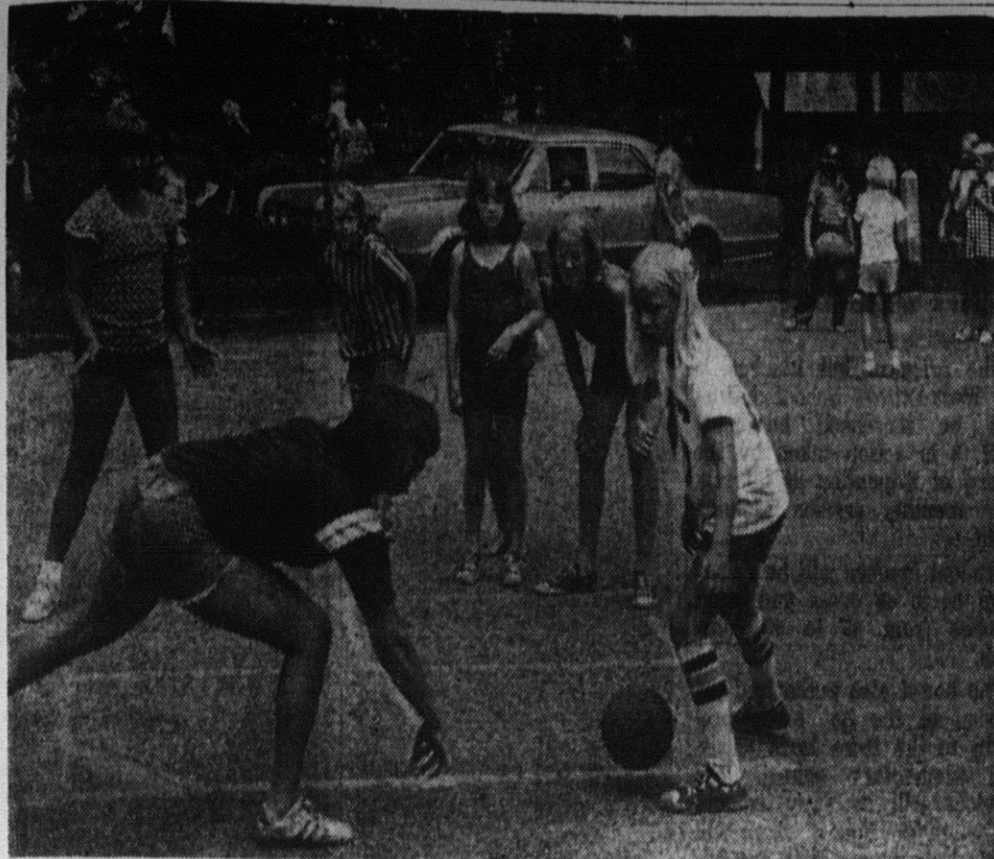

## Community-Schools Plan Working Well in Zeeland

ZEELAND — More than 2,500 area residents have taken part in the first year of the Zeeland community - Schools Program which is a cooperative effort by the City of Zeeland, the public schools and Zeeland Christian Schools.

A wide range of adult education, leisure time and recreation services are offered throughout the year. Prime objectives of the program are to utilize available school and community facilities for the benefit of citizens.

The high school completion program allows adults to earn a high school diploma and improve basic skills and opportunities for job advancement. Industry has joined in the program by allowing use of plant facilities for educational programs for employees.

A roving teacher program is available and adults with handicaps or lack of transportation

may study at home and be visited weekly by an instructor. The City of Zeeland's recreation program has been incorporated with the community - schools program and includes baseball, softball, basketball, volleyball, swimming, ice skating, snowmobiling, summer and expertise in providing need-playgrounds, tennis, gymnastics and arts and crafts.

Adult leisure time from September through May offered 36 courses including sewing, typing, small engine repair, floral arrangement, and furniture refinishing.

New programs being considered may include recreation and education services to long-term hospital or nursing home patients and the physically and mentally handicapped.

Success of the community - schools programs has been attributed to several reasons. It is a major step toward

efficient co-ordinated services provided by several governmental and private entities. The geographic boundaries between governmental agencies have been eliminated allowing the program to serve an 80 square mile area under one policy forming body.

The program is unique in its application and operation. The Michigan Conference of Mayors recently acknowledged it as one of the most significant examples of inter-governmental cooperation in Michigan.

Duplication was eliminated and services were enhanced by joining together.

Funding was received through several Michigan educational grant programs which has enabled the program to operate without local city or school tax monies.

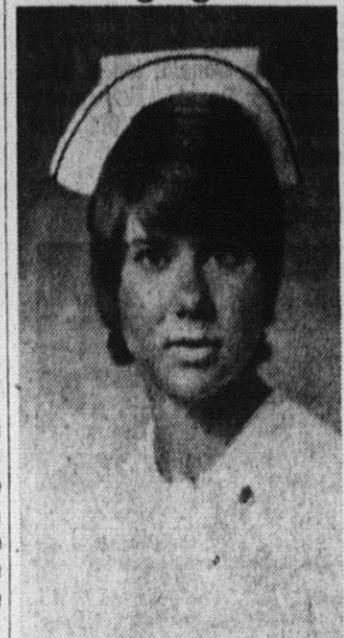
An 11-member community-schools council oversees the program. Included are three mem-

ber search from the City of Zeeland, public schools and the Christian schools and two members at large. The council is assisted by an 11-member advisory committee whose membership represents a number of varied professions, service organizations and age groups.

The program is operated by the Community Education Department of the Grand Rapids Public Schools under a contractual arrangement and program personnel are mostly local school instructors and other personnel with abilities to administer educational, cultural enrichment and recreational services.

In the coming year emphasis will be in high school completion, leisure time and youth enrichment. Programs will be geographically placed so as to serve rural areas within the service district.

### Holland Case Sets County Value Study

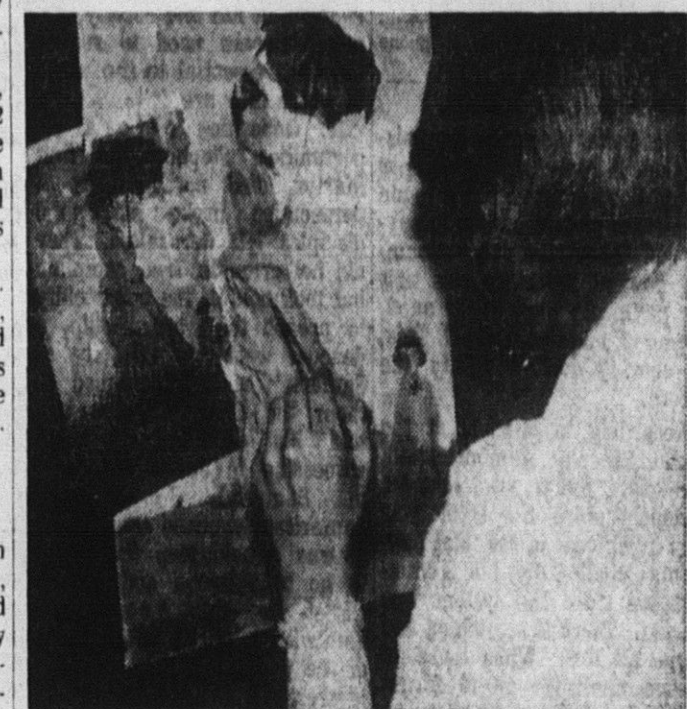

Under new state codes, the Tax Tribunal, in cases of just cause, now directs the Tax Commission to conduct the studies and report back.

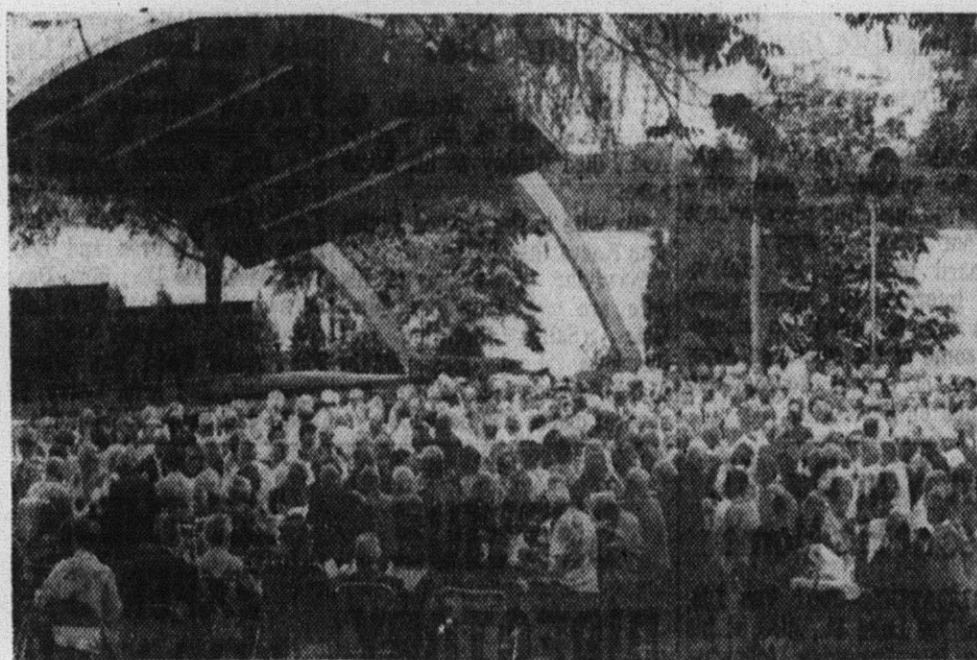

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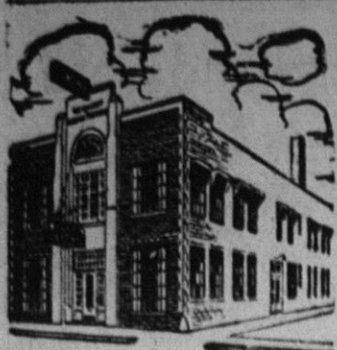

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#### JUST A SLIGHT ERROR

The Social Security Adminis-  
tration, in reply to a newspaper  
story, has admitted that it made  
a mistake of \$403 million in pay-  
ments. About the only redeem-  
ing part of the story was that  
the payments went to the aged,  
the blind, and the disabled. This,  
of course, doesn't justify the errors.

According to officials at the  
Social Security Administration,  
one ought not to take this too  
seriously since the error was  
only 3 per cent of the total pay-  
ments handled by the Adminis-  
tration since the system was  
started. There is something sad  
about all this. When those in  
charge challenge us to forget  
about the seriousness of more  
than \$400 million because this  
is peanuts in comparison to the  
amount spent, then someone,  
or a number of people, ought to  
get fired. But this is the next  
sad feature about the whole  
problem. Nobody ever gets the  
axe for all these errors.

If this is the size of the error  
in one segment of the govern-  
ment, then we can be sure that  
the overall picture must run  
into billions of dollars each  
year. And simple efficiency  
would be enough to give us all  
a tax cut. It seems that Con-  
gress has gotten so used to all  
this, and the country also, that  
the error becomes more of a  
joke than a problem. And the  
bureaucracy, our hidden govern-  
ment, that really governs,  
keeps moving on, setting its  
own rules, and those under  
which we all must live.

Every Christian has the duty  
to witness for his Lord daily.

I Christians are indispensable.

## West Ottawa Lunch Prices Increased

The price of hot lunches in  
the West Ottawa School district  
will be increased beginning  
Sept. 3 in action taken by the  
Board of Education at its reg-  
ular monthly session Monday  
night.

Student lunches will be raised  
from 35 to 40 cents and adult  
lunches from 35 to 50 cents  
each.

The board also authorized ex-  
tension of the hot lunch pro-  
gram to the Rose Park Chris-  
tian elementary school. The  
services will be satellited out  
of the Middle School which will  
reach its capacity with the ad-  
ditional school.

In other action the board vot-  
ed to allow spouses of fulltime  
personnel to purchase football  
and basketball tickets at stu-  
dent (half) prices.

Approval was given to busi-  
ness manager, Gordon Scheer-  
horn to revise medical coverage  
on the school buses only. The  
change would allow the school  
coverage to become secondary to  
the individual's coverage be-  
coming the primary source only  
in the event of no or insufficient  
insurance on the individual.

The board also authorized the  
sale of Robart School, currently  
used for storage, on the bid  
system with proceeds from the  
sale used to help finance the  
construction of a new 42 by 80  
foot storage building to be lo-  
cated somewhere near the Mid-  
dle and High Schools.

The mileage reimbursement  
was increased by board action  
from 12 to 15 cents a mile ef-  
fective July 1 and the board  
formally accepted the bid of  
West Shore Construction for  
\$7,880 to blacktop the road con-  
necting the Middle and High  
Schools.

The board also approved a  
proposal allowing select eighth  
grade math students to take be-  
ginning Algebra in the high  
school for credit.

Lengthy discussion was held  
on the first reading of policies  
relating to the use of school  
facilities, including eligible or-  
ganizations, application and  
approval and hours and fees.  
The policies do not become ef-  
fective until approval at the  
second reading.

The board accepted the pro-  
posal to sell the right of way  
for burial of cable at North  
Holland School to Michigan Bell  
at a cost of \$148.

Locations of board meetings

approved including the meetings  
at four school locations.

Board president Ed Halten-

ference on Sept. 24-26.
