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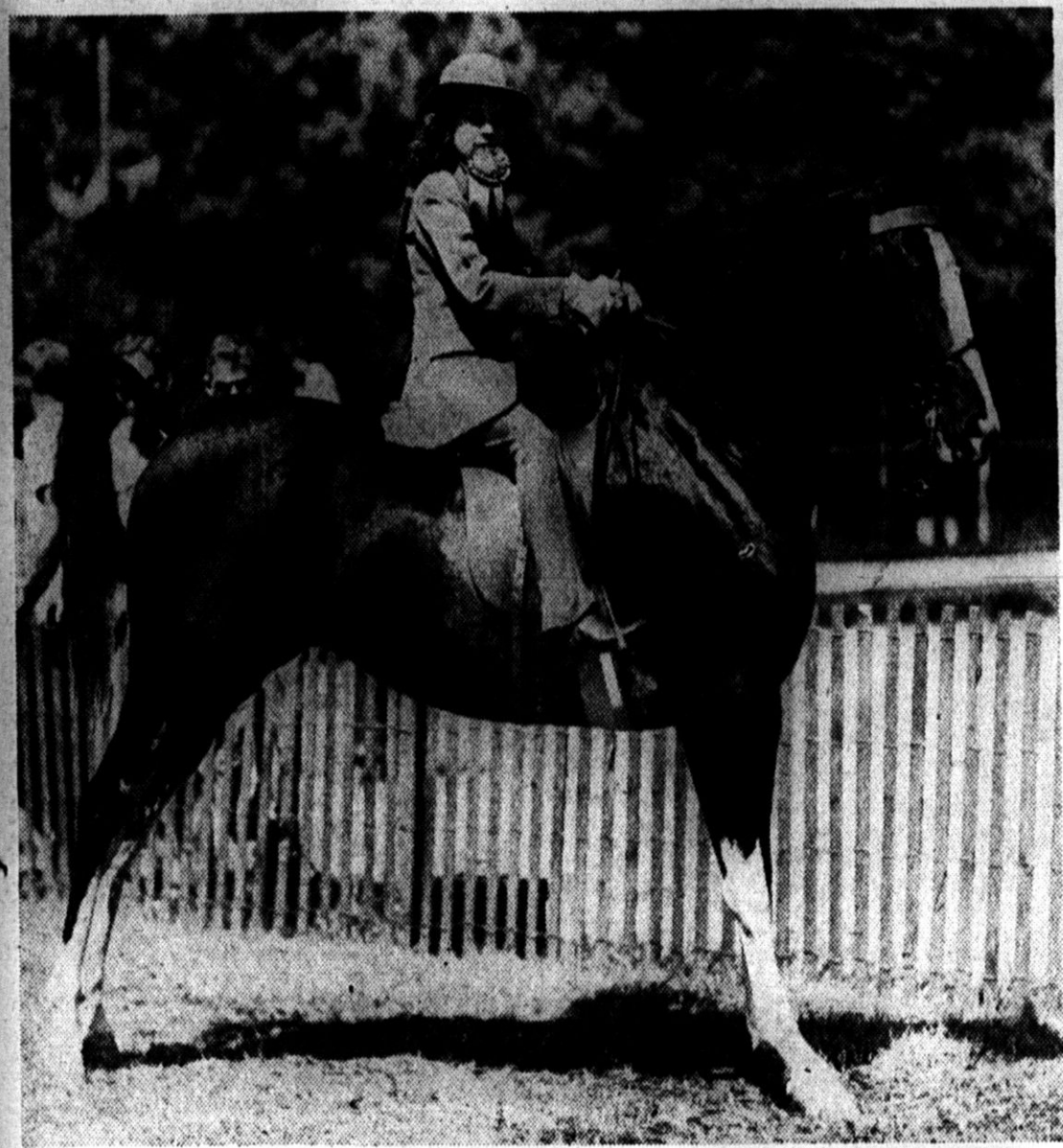


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Holland Appoints New Grid Coach

At a special meeting Tuesday, the Holland board of education approved appointment of Robert W. Stupka of Watertown, Wis. as head football coach and physical education teacher at Holland High school. Should Stupka accept he would succeed Anton J. Stofa who last week asked to be released from his contract to coach here.

He received his high school training at Watertown, Wis. high school and received an A.B. degree from the University of Wisconsin. He spent 42 months in the service and returned to inactive duty as a first lieutenant. He has served as grid coach of the University of Wisconsin varsity B team, and played end on the Wisconsin varsity eleven from 1940 to 1942.

Supt. Carroll C. Crawford said he expected word from Stupka soon regarding the appointment. Crawford also said that all prospective gridriders should report for the issuing of equipment Monday, Sept. 1 at 10 a.m. The first practice will be held Monday afternoon, he said.

Study Commission Meets in Lansing

Grand Haven, Aug. 28 (Special)—The first meeting of the State Study commission on helping teacher supervisory work in rural and village areas met at the Michigan Education building in Lansing Tuesday. Jennie M. Kaufman of the staff of the county superintendent's office of Ottawa county attended.

This study commission was appointed by Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, superintendent of public instruction, upon request of the Michigan Helping Teachers' organization and the County School Commissioners' association. The commission will make an extensive survey of the present status of supervision in rural schools and then make recommendations concerning needs that should be met.

Spectacular Castle Park Show Attracts Many Horse Enthusiasts

Although the familiar cries of "canter, walk, trot and reverse walk," have died away today, the capacity crowd which witnessed the 25th annual Castle Park show Wednesday, will long remember the horsemanship displayed by the near 80 contestants. Just a few winners as well as the title holders, which made the show a success. One horseman aptly summed up the affair by saying, "from the groom in the stable to the neatly and brilliantly clad rider, the show was a great achievement."

Particularly spectacular and always a crowd pleaser, is the hunter class over the outside course. P. T. Cheff of Holland took the first two places in this thrilling event by riding two different horses. Other events of the 22 class program which received enthusiastic applause were the horsemanship over fences and the knock-down and out event.

A new feature of the event was the inaugural awarding of the Col. William Drake Memorial trophy. Mrs. James Blackwood of Detroit is the donor of this trophy in memory of Col. Drake, one who was well known to all Michigan horse show folks. He was killed in World War II in the Leyte campaign. P. T. Cheff won the trophy this year, although it must be won three times by the same exhibitor before becoming his permanent trophy. The trophy is awarded in the hunters over the outside course event.

Christian School Opening Date Announced Today

**Classes Begin Sept. 4;
Five New Teachers
Added To School Staff**

The Schools for Christian education will begin their fall term Sept. 4. Supt. Bert P. Bos announced today. Full day sessions will be held at that time, he said.

Old and new pupils from outlying communities are asked to register in the gymnasium at 9 a.m. Sept. 2 while those from the city are required to register at 1 p.m. he reported. He also added that all pupils in the grade schools are asked to report to their respective classrooms at 8:45 a.m. Sept. 4 for a full day session. The 6-1 pupils, however, are asked to report in the basement of the Fourteenth Street Christian Reformed church, he said.

Final opportunity for registering beginning pupils will be given Wednesday afternoon from 1:30 to 2 p.m. in the Central Ave. building. Listing the requirements for beginners, Bos said they must be five years of age on or before Nov. 15, 1947. There will be no new kindergarten class in February, but children will attend half day sessions from September to June.

On Sept. 2, the board of trustees will sponsor a social meeting of all school personnel in the parish house of the Maple Ave. Christian Reformed church. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m. A faculty meeting has been called for Sept. 3 at 9 a.m. in the Christian High school, Bos said.

Five new teachers have been named for the 1947-48 year.

Wilma Bambacht of Kalamazoo has been appointed to teach in the third grade, succeeding Sylvia Stielstra who intends to take further schooling. Miss Bambacht attended both Western Michigan college and the Reformed Bible Institute of Grand Rapids. She has had several years of experience in West Olive and Federal schools in this vicinity. She also taught in the Hanford, Calif., Christian school.

Louis G. Damstra of Holland will teach mathematics in the high school. Damstra is a graduate of Hope college and formerly taught mathematics at Hopkins, Mich., High school. He will succeed Everett Kleinjans, who accepted a position as educational missionary to China under the Reformed Board of Missions.

Replacing Henry Bengelink, who accepted a Calvin college appointment, in the science department is John B. Ham of Grand Rapids. Ham is a graduate of Calvin college and is completing work for a masters degree at the University of Michigan. He formerly taught in the Seymour Christian Junior High school in Grand Rapids and was also principal of the Hudsonville Christian school. He served in the armed forces from 1943 to 1945.

Garrett Keuning, who recently returned to Michigan from Bellflower, Calif., where he taught in the Christian school, has been named to teach English and some commercial subjects here. He is a graduate of Calvin college and has had considerable teaching experience.

Also listed to teach in the Junior High school is Willemina Twilight of Whitinsville, Mass. She replaces Margaret Gerritsen, who will teach the fourth grade. Miss Twilight also graduated from Calvin college.

Public Schools Begin Sessions On September 4

**School Superintendent
Reports Improvements
Made During Summer**

Holland public schools will open Thursday, Sept. 4, after a pre-school conference of teachers Sept. 2 and 3. Junior and Senior high schools will begin at 8:15 a.m. and elementary schools at 8:45 a.m., according to Supt. Carroll C. Crawford.

A new policy was adopted this spring by the Board of Education regarding entrance age of children into kindergarten. To enter a child must be five years of age by Nov. 15, 1947.

All buildings have been cleaned and renovated for the beginning of school, Crawford said. Repairs and changes were made during the summer.

The entire high school, with the exception of the auditorium and gymnasium, has been redecorated in light colors. New stage and drop curtains were purchased and have been installed in the auditorium. These were bought with funds left for that purpose by the senior classes of 1942, 1943 and 1944. Classroom desks have been sanded and varnished. A new refrigerator has been added to the Home Economics department.

In the Junior high building the gymnasium floor has been sanded and coated with a new type of gymnasium seal. New lockers have been installed in the annex. Edward Donovan, director of the Veterans' Institute, has moved his office to the second floor of the annex. The library has been enlarged and moved to a larger room and a new electric stove was purchased for the Home Economics department.

New desks have been ordered for one room in both Longfellow and Van Raalte schools and a new electric clock has been put in each room of both schools. A new stoker has been installed in Longfellow school. The exterior of Washington school has been painted and pane bars were put on the doors of Froebel and Lincoln schools. Lincoln and Longfellow playgrounds have been resurfaced and plans have been made to enclose Longfellow playground with a six-foot fence.

Crawford reports that 10 new teachers have been added to the public schools faculty.

Robert Van Voorhees of Marshall will teach physics and photography in the high school, replacing Paul Camburn who resigned to enter industry. Margaret Waltz of Grand Rapids will replace Elizabeth Arendshorst in the home economics department. Miss Arendshorst has accepted employment with the Michigan Gas and Electric Co.

Elaine Ackerson of Princeton, Ill., will be in charge of vocal music in the secondary schools, replacing Trixie Moore who will teach at Bethany college in Kansas. Replacing Beatrice Denton, who will teach in Benton Harbor Junior college, will be Donna Bolte of Muskegon, teaching history in the high school. Fritz Jonkman of Holland will replace Mrs. Donna Wagner as history teacher in Junior High.

In the elementary schools, Mrs. Ada Zickler of Holland will teach Van Raalte school first grade. Marian Dame will teach fourth grade in Washington school. Mrs. Edwin Sharland of Holland will replace Mrs. Ralph Ten Clay in the 4-A and 5-B grades at Longfellow school and Harriet Hains of Coopersville will teach 4-B.

Robert Stupka of Watertown, Wis., has been secured to coach football and teach physical education. Malcolm Mackay will become study hall supervisor and dean of boys at the high school. Mackay will continue to coach basketball and one spring sport.

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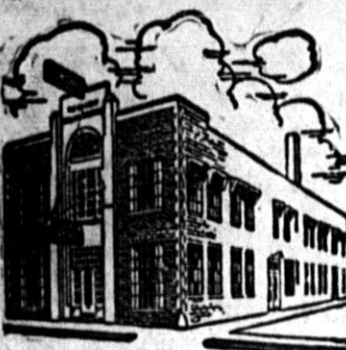
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THE HOLLANDERS
AND WITCHCRAFT

The fascinating reminiscent
story about witchcraft agitation in
Graafschap in connection with the
centennial celebration, might
leave the impression that Holland-
ers were specially addicted to be-
lief in that superstition. The con-
trary is true. Hollanders, like na-
tionals from all the countries of
Europe who people America, had
their superstitions, and the more
ignorant the person the more su-
perstitious he was likely to be. But
as a nationality Hollanders were
freer from this weakness than
were, for instance, the English.

The famous witchcraft trials in
New England go back to the
closing years of the seventeenth
century. They were exclusively
British trials. Throughout the
whole of the seventeenth century
no case of witchcraft was tried
by the Hollanders who at that
time occupied New York state,
New Jersey, part of Pennsylvania,
most of Delaware. In the Nether-
lands itself no witchcraft trial was
held since the very beginning of
the seventeenth century, nearly
a hundred years before the New
England witchcraft fanaticism.

In America only one Dutch na-
tional, a woman, was ever for-
mally accused of witchcraft—and
that action was brought by a
British court at Hartford, Con-
necticut; the woman was employ-
ed as a servant in a British fam-
ily.

The lower classes among the
Hollanders here doubtless believed
in witchcraft, but the ruling au-
thorities were too intelligent and
had too much common sense for
such credulity. In New England it
was particularly the ruling classes,
such men as the learned Cotton
Mather, who believed in witches
and pushed the trials.

How tragic that credulity was
for innocent people is shown by
the records. In June, 1692, the
first New England victim was
hanged; in July five more went
to the gallows; in August there
were six, and in September 14—
all hanged for a crime that ob-
viously did not exist. There were
many other cases, and how sav-
age the fanaticism was is shown
by the fact that one 80-year-old
man was pressed to death under
heavy stones.

The fact that the educated
classes among the Hollanders in
both Europe and on the frontier
in America kept clear of this fan-
aticism is a fairly good measure
of the state of culture and de-
velopment in Holland at a time
when much of the rest of Europe
was less enlightened. In fact, a
British historian has testified dur-
ing the recent past that in the
seventeenth century Holland was
the most highly civilized country
in Europe.

Lesson

August 31, 1947
Wise Words About Work
Proverbs 6:6-11; 24:30-32

By Henry Geerlings

The history of the Hebrew peo-
ple indicates that they were re-
quired to put a premium on work.

They appear at first as herdsmen,
who braved the torrid days and
frigid nights of Palestine, the
scarcity of food and water for
their families and flocks, the Be-
doun marauders, the wild ani-
mals prowling at night, and the
thousand and one hazards that be-
set cattlemen on the open range.

Through the entire period of
their residence in Egypt they
knew the meaning of hard work,
and the closing years were mark-
ed by bitter toil. Even with man-
na from heaven and water from
the rocks, the forty year experi-
ence in the wilderness was never
easy. At times there were diffi-
culties that made the people wish
that they were back in Egypt.

Lured by the hope for plenty in
the land of Canaan, they discov-
ered, nonetheless, that the prob-
lem of keeping alive was a taxing
one. It was not until after the
close of king Solomon's reign and
after three centuries in Canaan
that the Hebrew people became
prosperous; and even at that time
the wealth was in the hands of a
few.

The Hebrews thought of God as
a worker. The account of creation
describes the Creator at work. Jesus
felt the need of doing the works
of Him that sent Him, while it
was day. Every possibility of
achievement through work has
its season. If neglected by a
little folding of the hands there
is no repair for the individual's
failure. It is hard for the earth-
ly toiler to imagine God working.

We think of Him as speaking the
word and it is done. But with God
"work" and "achieve" are synon-
ymous. We think of work as a
synonym for effort and toil, with
resultant fatigue and final ex-
haustion. This has to be the hu-
man way to some extent, more
with some than with others. Jesus
came in the flesh to share this
necessity, and hence have fellow-
ship with man. There is a spiri-
tualized meaning of work, a kind
of real work, during which the work-
er receives spiritual rest. It is the
work of one who has eternal life.
It begins on earth, it does not
cease in heaven. It is the work
of one who has learned that there
remains a rest for the people
of God. A rest not only in heaven,
but a rest that recuperates and
refreshes the individual within,
amidst his scenes of toil.

Labor has a place and it is an
honorable place. When we think
of labor we think usually of those
in the trades. Actually labor em-
braces many more than these. Al-
ready organized are such groups
as garment workers, teachers, mu-
sicians, actors, auto workers and
many others. It is the aim of or-
ganized labor to organize unions
for all brackets of workers. For
a long time we thought of labor
as only the trade workers, but now
we see that it takes all kinds of
workers to build a world. The
man in the office is as important
as the man outside on the sea-
fold. The man bending over the
drafting board is as important as
the carpenter. If it were not for
workers of all kinds we would be
living under primitive conditions.
We learned something of this dur-
ing the war, when many things
which we were accustomed to
buying in the stores were no longer
obtainable. The manpower
shortage, is only an insignificant
example of what life would be
without the working man and wo-
man. Labor holds an important
and honorable position in modern
life, and should do all in its power
to live up to its responsibilities
and opportunities.

As we think of the problem of
working here in America we re-
joice that our nation is committed
to the principle of free enterprise.
In no other land have people been
so free to express their talents as
here. Not yet, however, have we
succeeded in achieving equal op-
portunity for all, regardless of
race, creed, or color. We must
work toward that end. We must
make our democracy work. That
is the best way to fight commu-
nism, or any other un-American
idea. We believe that in our de-
mocratic system we have the basis
for achieving the highest standard
of living for all. We must dem-
onstrate to the world that we re-
ally mean for all.

We have reached the place in
industry where labor must be a
cooperative enterprise. Labor
must learn to cooperate with la-
bor. Labor and capital must learn
to cooperate with each other. And
each must think more of serving
the public than of gaining its own
special advantage. The post-war
period has been one of strife. We
all worked together during the
war. We must learn to work to-
gether during peace.

Labor seems to have the idea
that the church is not sympathe-
tic to its cause. If that is true,
it must be corrected. But the
church must show that it stands
for justice and fair play for all
—for both labor and management.
For the church is interested in all
men, and in whatever affects
their lives.

Got Hay Fever? Here Are Rules That May Help

Ottawa County Health Director Releases List of What to Do's

Grand Haven, Aug. 28—Science has made vast strides in many fields, but the poor hay fever victim has to go on using the old, tested methods of gaining what comfort he can from "symptomatic" treatment. So says Dr. C. Dale Barrett, Ottawa county health director.

Dr. Barrett quotes a set of rules for asthma and hay fever victims. The rules were compiled by Dr. John M. Sheldon, head of University hospital. Dr. Barrett says the rules still are valid:

1. From mid-August to late September, sleep with as many windows closed as is comfortable; avoid drafts and cross-ventilation.
2. Turn down automobile rides,

especially pleasure drives in the country where a sufferer is exposed to hundreds of times as much pollen as usual.

3. Beware of unnecessary exposure to dusts, particularly house dusts. Don't use a broom, carpet sweeper or duster. Try instead a damp cloth, oil mop or vacuum cleaner.

4. Avoid all flowers, such as daisies, dahlias, asters, zinnias and dandelions, members of the same botanical tribe that produces the ragweed. Don't pick, smell or permit such flowers in your house.

5. If possible, go to a region where the pollen exposure is less intense. In Michigan many persons find relief above the Muskegon-Bay City line.

"Of course, in certain severe cases of allergy the sufferer can obtain great benefit from desensitizing injections. These 'shots' must be given over a long period of time by a physician, for any appreciable benefit. And there are certain new drugs which give marked symptomatic relief in some cases," Dr. Barrett said.

The birds have created a nuisance in that particular area of the city said Van Hoff. Several other cities have complained of the starling problem.

The police will watch the area Friday to find out if more of the pests return, said the chief.

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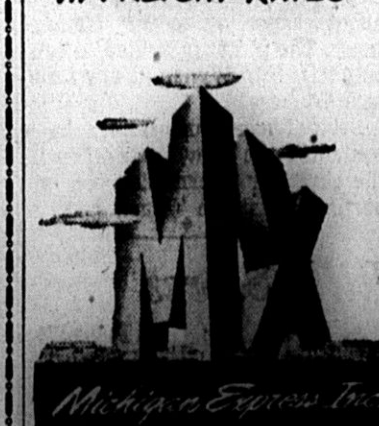
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Local Jaycees Attend State Training Meet

Itch Reported to Health Department

Several reports of a skin infection that may be swimmer's itch were received at Allegan county health department last week. Persons reporting the condition are said to have been swimming in lakes in the vicinity of Allegan.

To avoid the infection Dr. A. G. Baker, director of the county health department, suggests that bathers take a shower and wash with soap immediately upon leaving the water. If this is not possible, rinse carefully and dry with a rough towel. Do not just lie on the beach or on a dock or diving tower, or in the sun to dry yourself.

Swimmer's itch is a skin infection that usually lasts for a week or 10 days. Although it causes discomfort for a week or more, it is not a dangerous condition. It is caused by microscopic larvae that develop in certain kinds of shore line snails. If all the snails on the beach are killed the larvae die.

Chemical treatment of shore line beaches will kill the snails within a few hours, without injury to bathers, free swimming fish or clams. With a thorough killing of snails, swimmer's itch disappears until a new crop of snails arrives, generally in about two or three years. In some places treatment is required every year. To be effective the chemical should be applied to at least 1,000 continuous feet of frontage, extending from the shore line to the drop off.

Dutch Decoration Worn By Friends of Crown

The Order of Orange-Nassau is the Dutch government's equivalent of the French Legion of Honor. It was instituted by an act of the Dutch parliament in 1892, at the suggestion of Queen Emma, and the act was amended in 1910 and 1923.

The purpose of the Order, in the language of the statute itself, is to recognize "the heroic distinction of Our subjects or foreigners who have deserved singularly well of Us and the State or Society."

There are five grades. The highest is that of Grand Crosses. The next four classes, in order of distinction, are: Grand Officers, Commanders, Officers and Knights.

The government act describes the insignia as follows: "The insignia of this Order shall consist of a Cross with eight beaded points and a continuous laurel wreath between the arms and capped by a Royal Crown, all this made of gold for the first four classes and of silver for the fifth class; the arms of the cross are white enameled with a blue enameled heart; in the center of the cross there is a blue enameled round shield, surrounded by a white enameled circular band, both bordered with gold, the round shield bearing on the obverse side the Lion, as it appears in the coat of arms of the Kingdom and on the circular band in golden letters the words: 'Je Maintiendrai' and on the reverse side on the round shield a golden W capped by a golden Royal Crown, and bearing on the circular band the words: 'God zij met ons' in golden letters."

A curious provision of the Order is an article that gives a certain permanence to such an award: "The membership and insignia of this Order cannot be forfeited except in the case of an unrepentable sentence to imprisonment for a period of three years or more."

And the practical Dutch government also provided for funds in the act itself with which to finance the manufacture of the insignia and other expenses of the Order by ordering that an appropriation shall be made annually in the state budget.

Donkey Contest Ends in a Tie

About 1,500 spectators laughed and cheered for their favorite donkeys Thursday night as the Holland and Zeeland American Legion clubs battled to a 2-2 tie in a donkey baseball game. The game was sponsored by the Holland Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Holland's "Rough Riders" netted two runs on seven hits in the contest while Zeeland's "Bronco Busters" were able to garner but five hits. Although both sides had difficulty in getting their mules started in the right direction, Chuck Cooper and Jim Hallan of the locals managed to cross home plate. Chuck Cooper had a novel method of scoring as he reversed the normal procedure and carried the donkey. Scoring for the Zeelanders were De Vries and Hartley.

Reports from both camps said that the game was an errorless affair, on the part of the players, but a different story concerning the donkeys.

State X-Ray Unit Appears at Fair

All persons over 14 attending the Berlin fair at Marne Aug. 26-29, are urged by the Ottawa county health department to get their chests X-rayed at the mobile unit which will appear at the fair under the auspices of the Michigan department of health. The service is free.

The procedure takes only two minutes and is the best way of detecting tuberculosis of the lungs. If an abnormality is found the person is notified by the State health department and his physician and the local health department are contacted.

The trailer is one of five operating throughout the state. Since the purchase of the first unit, about 50,000 persons have had their chests X-rayed. The chances are 500 to one that a person does not have the disease in an active state.

The fair features livestock shows, fruit contests, vegetable exhibits and a horse show. Thursday and Friday afternoons and evenings there will be entertainment including animal, musical, acrobatic and comedy acts.
