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## Group Fears High Death Toll During Coming Weekend

### Regional Conference Attracts 125 Persons; Hare Keynote Speaker

More than 125 persons attending the Governor's Regional Traffic Safety Conference in Civic Center today enthusiastically adopted a resolution calling for all Michigan citizens to exercise extreme caution during the Labor Day weekend—the last summer holiday of the year.

The resolution came at the close of the morning panel discussion which covered a wide variety of subjects on safety. It was introduced by Avery D. Baker of Midland, former Ottawa county traffic safety director, who pointed to the predicted estimate of 420 traffic fatalities as listed by the National Safety Council.

The resolution pointed also to the general improvement in the Michigan safety program and a sincere desire to keep drivers dedicated to the principles of safety. Baker's final words, "Be Alert—Not Hurt" become in effect the keynote theme of the conference.

Gerald W. Shipman, chairman of the State Safety Commission at Lansing, served as chairman of the regional conference, the last of five such conferences set up by the governor. Other conferences were held in Iron Mountain, Traverse City, Flint and Battle Creek.

The keynote address this morning was delivered by James M. Hare, Secretary of State and chairman of the Michigan State Safety Commission. "The safety program has been going well in Michigan, but people are becoming a bit complacent over safety, and the general question is 'where do we go from here?'"

He said Michigan hit a low in statistics back in 1941 when it had 14th traffic deaths for every 100,000 miles of travel on the highway. By 1947 the ratio was down to 10th, in 1955 down to eight and today it is 4.6 deaths per 100,000 miles of travel. "We can still do better. Connecticut has less than three," he said.

He pointed to 12 items passed in the 1956 legislature which contributed tremendously to the state's safety program. These included the new speed law, more state troopers, a more complete driver training program for high schools, a traffic safety center at Michigan State University, and a central filing system in which all convictions are noted.

Hare said drivers are being taken off the road in Michigan at the rate of 25,000 a year, half this number in which licenses are suspended or revoked from 30 days to life and the other half for failure to meet financial responsibility.

He said the next areas to be considered by the safety commission at its meeting after Labor Day will be a study of the correlation of the peak of deaths shortly after bars close in Michigan, and a long hard look at county roads where accidents seem to occur more frequently than on the highway or in the big cities.

A variety of interesting subjects was discussed during the panel discussion coordinated by Richard Machiele of the MSU extension service. City Manager Herb Holt and Municipal Judge Cornelius Vander Meulen joined the group of state safety representatives on the platform.

The subjects ranged from horsepower in cars to compulsory insurance, crops planted to close intersections, driver education, compulsory car checks, scooters and drag strips.

It was brought out that horsepower in cars is not necessarily related to speed—that a good share of it results in better economy and performance. Compulsory insurance is not a part of traffic safety as such, and is not a complete answer to financial security in view of stolen cars, hit-run drivers and out-state cars.

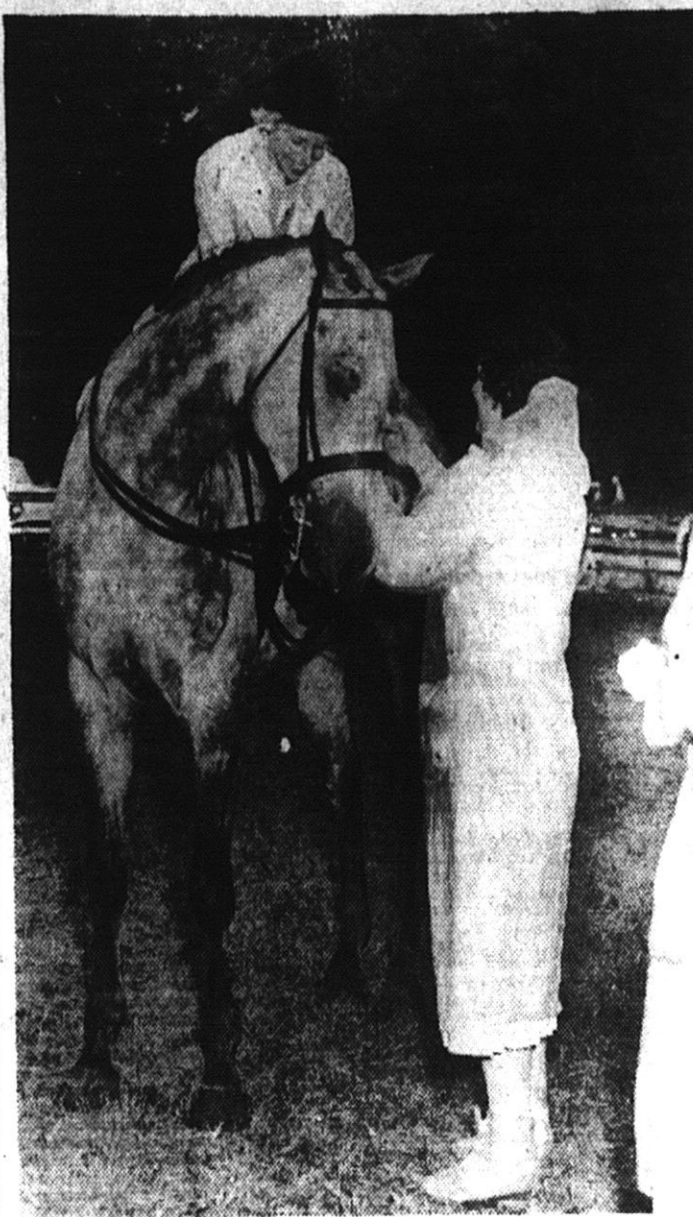
Farmers are becoming increasingly more cooperative about planting crops (usually tall corn) near intersections, and the day is approaching when laws will control the situation even better. Compulsory car checks are highly desirable, and Michigan is looking up to as a leader. Accidents are caused more by driver attitudes than by defective equipment, but the latter is a big factor.

Discussion groups and final reports were on the agenda for this afternoon with adjournment scheduled at 4 p.m. The conference opened at 9 a.m. with a coffee kiosk. Mayor Robert Visscher gave the official welcome.

### Five Men Injured In Headon Crash

Five men were injured in a head-on collision three and a half miles south of Holland on US-31 Wednesday night about 7:15 p.m. Relays of ambulances rushed the men to Holland Hospital as traffic piled up far down the road in both directions.

Allan County deputies, investigating the accident, still do not know how it happened. All of the victims are in shock and cannot recall the events leading to the accident, deputies said.

John J. Arden, 34, of North Lake, Ill., driver of the 1957 model headed north, alone in the car, is reported to be in fair condition. He has fractures of the right ankle, left arm, left ribs and facial lacerations.

Henry Fielding, 34, of Lacota, Mich., driver of the other car headed south, is also in fair condition and hospital authorities said he has possibly fractured ribs and facial lacerations.

James L. Englehart, about 35, of Marcellus Mich., is in fair condition with fractures to the right knee, right ankle, left wrist, and severe facial and head lacerations.

Neil Toole, 25, of South Haven, owner of the 1955 model Ford, was driving, has a fractured right shoulder, and lacerations of the head and mouth.

Emmett Roberts, 40, of Lawrence, Mich., is reported to be in good condition with just a bump on the head. Hospital authorities said he may be discharged today.

### Zeeland Scout Sees Queen, Duke

She received a B.S. degree at Western Michigan University and then completed 45 credits in therapy work. She does all her work from a wheel chair.

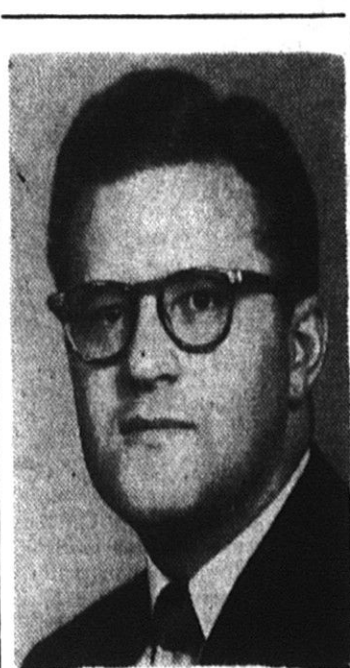

The exact nature of the charges will not be known until the deputies confer with Ottawa County Prosecutor James Bussard. No charges against the father, William S. Miller, 54, are anticipated at present, deputies said.

The younger Miller is reported to be in good condition in Grand Haven Municipal Hospital following surgery Saturday night on his right shoulder. The 12-gauge shotgun charge ripped his arm from shoulder midway to the elbow, hospital authorities said, but did not hit the bone.

The father told deputies that his son had been drinking during the day before coming to the small, three-room house on Fillmore St. just east of 128th Ave. The Millers, who come from Catron, Mo., are renting the home from T. A. Stone, of West Olive for whom they are picking blueberries.

When young Miller began to abuse his wife, the father said, he attempted to intervene. The son then drew a knife and threatened to kill the father, who told deputies he ran into the house and seized the loaded shotgun.

Young Miller pursued the father into the house and ignored his warnings to stay away. The elder



Miller said that he shot at his son charged with the knife. Miller ran from the house and a fellow migrant drove him to the hospital. He is the father of three young children.

In Cleveland Jean will live in a slum area with a girl friend from New York who is a social worker in inter-denominational Protestant Parish. She is religious education director for the Parish. Jean will serve as a music director for the Parish, without pay.

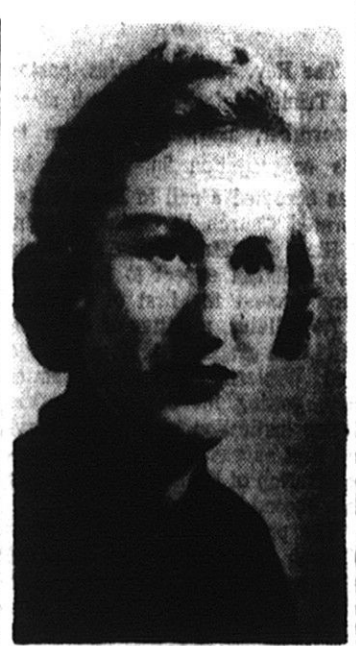

## Countersuit Filed In Van Tongeren Case

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — An answer and countersuit were filed with the Ottawa County Clerk's office Wednesday by Chester and Mae Van Tongeren of Holland in a case brought against them by Evelyn Irvine of Zeeland who is seeking \$35,000 damages caused by the alleged removal of a loading dock and stairway at the rear of a building at 5 West Eighth St., Holland, which Mrs. Irvine leased from the Van Tongerens from July 7, 1953, running until 1958.

The answer denies allegations made by Mrs. Irvine, and in the countersuit the Van Tongerens are seeking judgment for damages amounting to \$7,500. Furthermore, they claim Mrs. Irvine is indebted to them for \$14,500 for rent pursuant to a lease dated June 20, 1955. They also claim plaintiff sold at an auction, Aug. 22, two air conditioning units owned by defendant.

Answering allegations on damages sustained by removal of the dock and stairway, the Van Tongerens said a new cement block rear wall and grade level covered entrance had been constructed at great expense providing indoor storage space and generally greatly improving facilities at the rear of the building which previously housed the Dutch Mill Restaurant.

An institution died slowly this summer right at the spot where it had its finest hour.

Whether it will be "buried" for good remains to be seen but as it looks right now the funeral was last Monday night.

The institution — The Holland independent baseball team — probably breathed its last Monday at Riverview Park since team officials have decided to cancel all remaining games.

Actually the climax was a post mortem for something that was opened last fall and only procrastinated this summer.

H. W. Morse, Holland industrialist, wanted to help and this spring forked over the money so that the team could operate. His stipulation was that it carry his name.

But regardless of name, the team and the problems remained the same as the troubles had by the Holland Flying Dutchmen the last few years.

The Dutchmen died at the scene of their past greatness and death was due to famine and starvation. The famine was caused because of the lack of good baseball talent.

The starvation was brought about by the fans, who for most of the time, let the two teams play before their respective dugouts.

Crowds refused to support the Dutchmen, especially for the last few years, and the only thing possible now appears to be to let the institution die.

The post mortem group, organized a few years ago to keep the club alive, was called the Dutchmen Boosters. And this group boosted the team every chance it had.

They worked hard prior to and during the season to keep the team together. But it was a losing battle.

Whether the Boosters will get the urge to continue and have a team next spring remains to be seen. The townspeople hold the key. They can decide if they again want an independent team. Then, if enough people are interested, steps can be taken to re-organize.

The American Legion program, in operation for several years, has reached new heights in the last couple of seasons. If the program continues to get bigger, the fans and the Legion graduates (18-year-olds and older) may want to start another independent team.

With the Legion program the way it is, the players, upon reaching the "too old" age should be ready to supply a pretty fair brand of baseball.

And this might bring the Dutchmen back stronger than ever.

The Pakistani student declared that, in the face of growing Communist subversion in the Middle East, Pakistan and the United States would have to be on their guard.

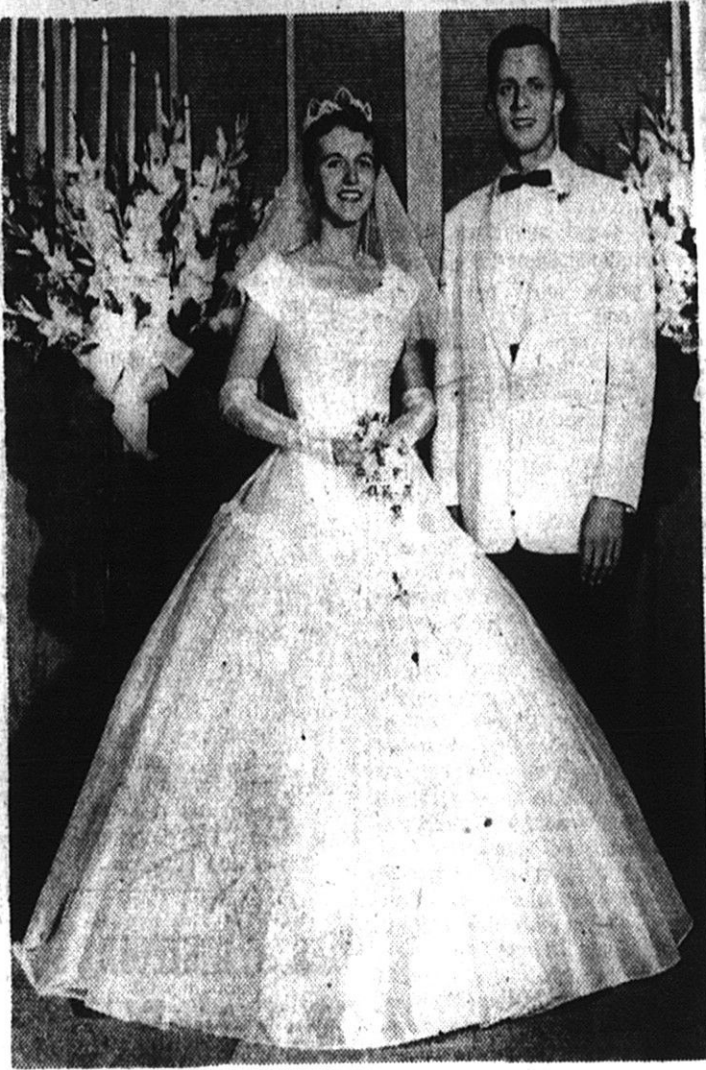
