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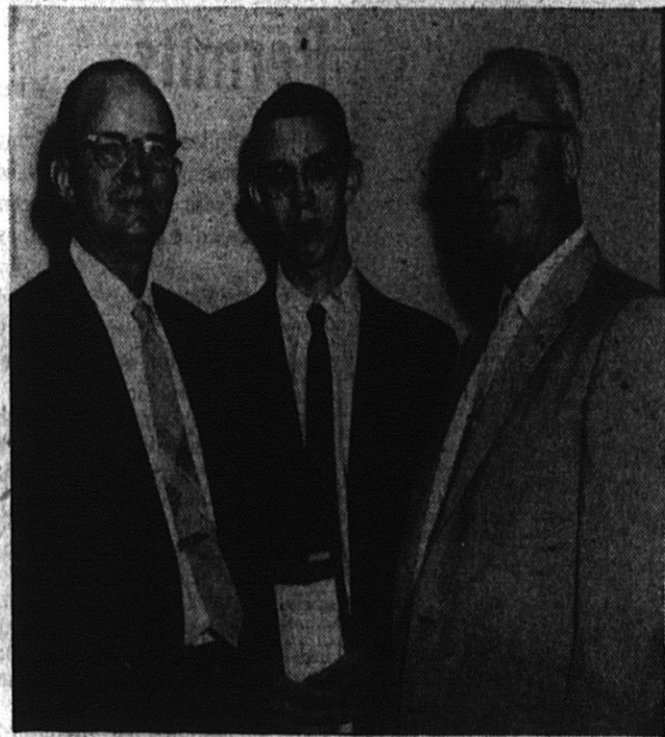

Madison Wins Scholarship

Robert Madison, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Madison, 209 West 16th St., has been awarded the Richard and Hinda Rosenthal Foundation scholarship it was announced today.

The scholarship provides for assistance to first year university or college students, who are children, grandchildren, brothers or sisters of employees of the Michigan Gas and Electric Co. Madison is district manager of the Holland branch of the company.

\$2,000 Damage Caused by Blaze

Fire caused about \$2,000 damage to the Henry G. Grote home at the Edgewood Beach Resort on Lakeshore Dr. north of Holland Monday afternoon.

Park Township Fire Chief Herman Windemuller said the fire is believed to have been started from defective wiring. Firemen from Park Township Department No. 2 were on the scene two hours, Windemuller said, and used fresh air masks to get to the fire.

The upper floor of the two story frame house was extensively damaged by the blaze and the downstairs suffered slight water and smoke damage.

Women in the neighborhood served coffee to the firemen fighting the blaze and Windemuller said their service was much appreciated.

Engineers Will Work on Pier

A 15-man crew from the Army Corps of Engineers today is ready to go to work on the north pier in the Lake Macatawa channel, shoring up the rotting wood underpinnings with steel sheet piling. The men, all civilians working for the Army, arrived here Wednesday from Sturgeon Bay, Wis., and will be working here for several months before leaving for their "home base" of Kewaunee, Wis., around the first of November.

The crew arrived with two large derrick boats, two tugs and a large "quarters" boat on which the men will live. One of the derrick boats is already in position at the north pier.

Owen Opine, the assistant engineer in charge, said 327 feet of the steel sheet piling will be put in along the north pier, on both the channel and beach side, about four or five feet out from the pier.

This phase of the job is expected to be completed about the first of November, Opine said, and then the men will leave with their equipment to winter in Kewaunee.

According to plan, the crew is due back around the first of April to begin pouring the concrete, filling in between the present pier and the sheet piling.

Opine said that although the concrete-capped pier looks solid, the timber pilings beneath are rotting and the whole structure may go anytime.

The regular weekly meeting of the Holland Kiwanis Club was held at the Kiwanis Kamp Monday night. President Lester Walker presided over the business meeting.

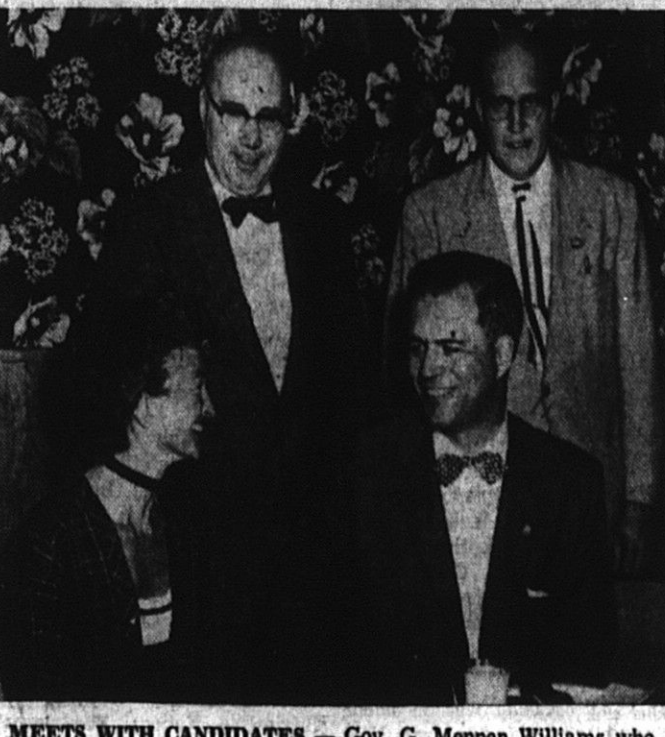

Group singing was led by Ray Roth. The invocation was given by Conrad Eckstrom.

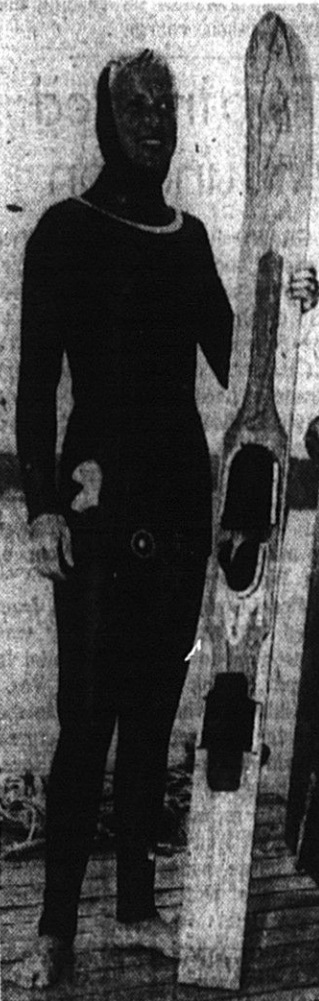

Lokers Will Head Hamilton Area Schools

ZEELAND (Special) — Raymond J. Lokers, 38, Zeeland High School principal for the past four years, has been named superintendent of the Hamilton Community Schools.

He will assume his duties at the new post Oct. 17 by mutual agreement with the Zeeland Board of Education. Oct. 17 marks the end of the first marking period of the first semester.

As superintendent, Lokers will be heading the schools of the recent 15 district consolidation of schools in the Hamilton area. The district is making plans for a new high school with a student capacity of 600. High school students are presently attending high school in Zeeland and Holland.

Commenting on Lokers' resignation as Zeeland principal, Superintendent J. F. Schipper today said, "We definitely regret losing Mr. Lokers. He is an excellent administrator."

Lokers is a native of Zeeland and a graduate of Zeeland High School where he starred on one of the finest basketball teams the Chix ever had. He also was graduated from Hope College and attended the University of Michigan and the University of Maryland. He completed work for his doctorate in school administration this spring.

He previously taught at Mackinac City high school for two years and served in the United States Army for four years. He returned to Zeeland after his discharge and has served as golf and basketball coach, guidance counselor, teacher of Bible, mathematics and science as well as serving as principal.

Applications from within and outside the Zeeland school system to fill the vacancy created by Lokers' resignation are being accepted by the Zeeland Board of Education.

Holland Boy Struck by Car, Seriously Hurt — A one-and-a-half year-old Holland boy was seriously injured at 9:45 a.m. Tuesday when he was struck by a car in front of his home at 1387 Ottagan St., (32nd St.) about a half-mile east of the Windmill Station.

Larry James Kole, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Kole, was taken to Holland Hospital, where hospital officials said he suffered head injuries and multiple lacerations.

The child, unconscious, was quickly transferred to St. Mary's Hospital in Grand Rapids by Ottawa County Deputy Ed Kampen. A nurse held the child in her arms during the trip.

Ottawa County deputies said the child was struck by a car driven by Mrs. Anna Wallace, 62, of 559 West 30th St., headed east on Ottagan, or 32nd, St.

Mrs. Wallace told deputies she had not seen the child in the road, but stopped when she heard a "thump," and found the boy lying at the side of the road near her right rear bumper.

Deputies said the child was alone when he apparently wandered into the road, and are continuing their investigation.

Leo Hoffman Plans to File New Briefs

Hearing Held Friday On Motion to Dismiss Annexation Case

ALLEGAN (Special) — Following a 32-minute hearing, Circuit Judge Tom Robinson of Benton Harbor granted a two-week period to Allegan Attorney Leo Hoffman to file briefs in connection with litigation in the Maplewood annexation election.

Fridays hearing was on a motion to dismiss the case filed by James E. Townsend, city attorney of Holland. After Hoffman's briefs are filed, at the end of the first week in September, Judge Robinson will allow a few days if Townsend desires to answer. After that, Robinson will render a decision.

Hoffman is representing 71 Maplewood residents seeking to have the Maplewood annexation declared unconstitutional.

Immediately after court opened at 11:13 a.m. Friday, Townsend referred to statutory provisions in which any tests on the validity of an election must be filed within 30 days of the election. In this case, complaints were filed almost two months after the election, he said.

Townsend briefly outlined work the city has already done in the Maplewood area — arranging for Clemmishaw appraisals at a cost of close to \$7,000, the transfer of county roads to the city, opening of one street, purchase of trucks and equipment for road maintenance and removal of elm trees afflicted with Dutch Elm Disease.

He also mentioned that the city has registered voters in Maplewood and has conducted the primary election there, besides processing new ordinances on sanitation, fire arms and voting precincts.

He pointed to new insurance rates set up by the Fire Rating Bureau of Michigan affecting the major portion of the area and said many new contracts have been rewritten.

He added that Fillmore township has started the setting — up processes with the city, and concluded by referring to the vital concern of the Holland Board of Education in the entire annexation program.

Hoffman's arguments all stemmed from his premise that the Maplewood annexation is unconstitutional. He said, the Maplewood area is 1 1/4 times the size of the original city but only 1/4 to 1/2 mile immediately south of 32nd St. has any urban characteristics.

Hoffman said Maplewood area covers 3,120 acres of which 1,500 acres in unplatted farm land are owned by the 71 plaintiffs he represents. He questioned the powers of the legislature in certain annexation laws. He said this case is not an attack on the election itself but attacks the original petitions filed with the secretary of state. "The power exercised by citizens groups in determining boundaries involving vast areas of farm land is, arbitrarily unreasonable and unconstitutional," he said.

Both attorneys quoted various court opinions to substantiate their claims.

Atty. Vernon D. Ten Cate of Holland briefly called the attention of the court to the vital interest which the Board of Education has in this case and its close cooperation with the annexed areas in reorganizing the school district.

Peach Swirl Bread Is Sweepstakes Winner

ALLEGAN (Special) — Mrs. Kenneth Donovan, Casco, with an entry of peach swirl bread, was named sweepstakes winner in the food contest of the third annual Allegan County Parade of Peaches. Mrs. George Scott, Pullman, who entered a coconut cream peach pie was selected by the judges as a reserve champion. One-hundred fifteen peach dishes were on display.

For this prize winner Mrs. Donovan used 1 package of hot roll mix to which she added 1/2 cup water, 1 egg, 1/4 cup liquid shortening and 1-3 cup sugar. This was allowed to rise, then rolled to a 12 by 7 inch rectangle, spread with butter, sprinkled with cinnamon and then covered with peach jam.

The rectangle was then rolled as a jelly roll and the edges sealed well. This placed in a greased bread pan and allowed to rise 30-60 minutes until the dough was slightly rounded above the pan.

The bread was completed by baking 50 minutes at 375 degrees F.

Man Held on Charge Of Concealed Weapon

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Lonnie Brown, 42, of 2533 Hoyt St., Muskegon Heights, waived examination before Justice Lawrence De Witt Saturday on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon.

At 10 p.m. Friday, state police stopped Brown after he made an improper left turn from US-31 on to M-104 just east of the state police post and while searching the car found a .22 caliber automatic in the locked glove compartment.

The gun was loaded with one round in the chambers and four in the clip.

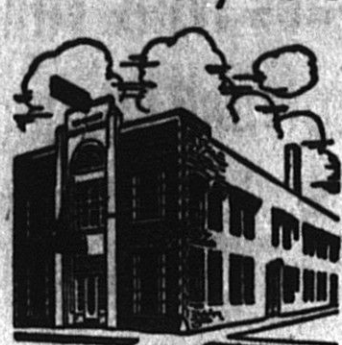

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THE GHOST OF
FRANK KIERDORF

We are being solemnly briefed
by political prognosticators on what
to expect in the current political
campaign in Michigan. Says one
of them:

"There are growing indications
that the 1958 election campaign
will see an attempt by Republi-
cans to use developments sur-
rounding Kierdorf's death in an
effort to link Democrats with un-
ion gangsterism."

If the Frank Kierdorf incident
does not raise its head in the
campaign the people of Michigan
will be criminally lacking in po-
litical intelligence. Not only in Mich-
igan but throughout the nation
Frank Kierdorfism is so urgently
important that the ghost of the
dead man should guide the ballot
both pencil of every voter in the
land.

But it does not follow that the
ghost of Frank Kierdorf should
send shivers along the backbone
of Democrats alone. What the so-
called "human torch" symbolizes
has little to do with partisan po-
litics.

It merely so happens that in
Michigan at the moment Kierdorf
dramatizes labor racketeering. But
his death is only an incident that
will soon be forgotten. In Mich-
igan and throughout the nation, it
is people like the Dave Becks and
their associates who are the real
live ghosts that should haunt the
American voters.

And those ghosts are not con-
fined to a single political party.
In Michigan the Democrats are in
control of the executive branch of
the government, and so it is con-
venient for the Republicans to
scare them with the Kierdorf ghost.
But the ghosts of labor racketeers
are not confined to a single party;
such ghosts, live or dead, are in
politics for business reasons and
they are as ready to work through
one party as through another.

The McClellan committee has
brought out enough evidence to
prove that unless the American
people wake up, and that not too
far in the future, the labor rack-
eteers are going to rule us.

In the first decade of the present
century the capitalists represented
the same menace that the labor
racketeers now stand for. People
like Lincoln Steffens exposed them
over and over again. St. Louis was
honeycombed with business rotten-
ness; Minneapolis was a stench
in the nostrils of the nation; Pitts-
burg was a shame and a disgrace;
Philadelphia was described as the
worst governed city in America;
New York and Chicago were not
far behind.

Such revelations of business and
political squalidness resulted in
Theodore Roosevelt and Woodrow
Wilson and others. Today we have
the squalidness of labor leaders.
The question is: Will the revela-
tions of such agencies as the Mc-
Clellan committee result in simi-
lar corrective men and measures?

That is what the ghost of Frank
Kierdorf means - not only to
Michigan, not only to one political
party, but to all the 48 states and
to both parties.

Temperance and Social Justice
Romans 13:11-14; 14:4; 14:15-21

We are living in a time of great
prosperity and of many problems.
Our prosperity brings us problems.
One of the most serious problems
of our nation is the liquor prob-
lem. Every Christian should be
conscious of the seriousness of this
problem.

I. Holy living becomes Christian
people. And holy living means alert
living too. Paul summoned the Ro-
man Christians to "awake out of
sleep" seeing that salvation was
now closer than when they first
believed. And that is true of all
of us. Salvation is spoken of in the
Bible in a threefold sense. A
Christian was saved, is being
saved and will be saved comple-
tely when he leaves this world.
Every day brings the Christian
nearer his death and closer to full
salvation. In view of this fact a
Christian should "cast off the
works of darkness" and "put on
the armor of light." All manner
of rioting, drunkenness, clamber-
ing, wantonness, strife and envy-
ing are unbecoming a Christian.
Mark well that Paul mentions two
kinds of sins—those of the flesh
and those of the spirit. Liquor
fosters both kinds of sins — it
promotes the sins of the flesh and
of the spirit.

Let us point out right here a
few of the evils liquor causes.
Many auto accidents are caused
by the use of liquor. Drunken driv-
ers kill people on our highways.
The drunken driver is a potential
murderer. The divorce rate is in-
creasing. Liquor is fast becoming
a major factor in divorce. More
women are alcoholics today than
ever before and this has caused
divorces to increase. A divorce
means a broken home and if there
are children they suffer. It is al-
so a fact that liquor fosters
crime.

Frequently we read in our news-
papers about crimes that were
committed after those who com-
mitted them had been in a tavern.
Social drinking has increased
greatly. It is popular to drink at
conventions, parties, and social
gatherings. Many people have not
the stamina to stand up against
social pressures of our time. Li-
quor is advertised heavily, children
hear the radio programs and see
the television programs which
commend drinking. We hear it
said that "beer belongs" and we
read about "men of distinction"
who use a certain kind of whiskey.

II. Personal liberty has its limi-
tations. Those who advocate mod-
eration say that they can handle
liquor but they forget that many
people do not know how to drink
moderately and they become al-
coholics. In the early church
there was a dispute about eating
meat that had been sacrificed to
idols. Some thought it was right
to do so, others disagreed. Paul
said that though the people who
wanted to eat this meat had the
right to do so, they were not ac-
tually according to love, if they
were doing this they were griev-
ing their fellow Christians. It would
be far better to sacrifice the privi-
lege upon which they insisted and
show love for the weaker brethren.

Some people in the church insist
upon exercising their right to use
liquor and they do not show any
regard for people who by their
example may be led to the mis-
use of liquor and even become
alcoholics. Christians should al-
ways think of others, and espe-
cially of those who are weaker. It
is a fact that the more liquor is
used the more problems it
creates, the more total abstainers
increase in number the fewer
problems liquor will create and the
more happy, contented people
there will be in our world and
nation.

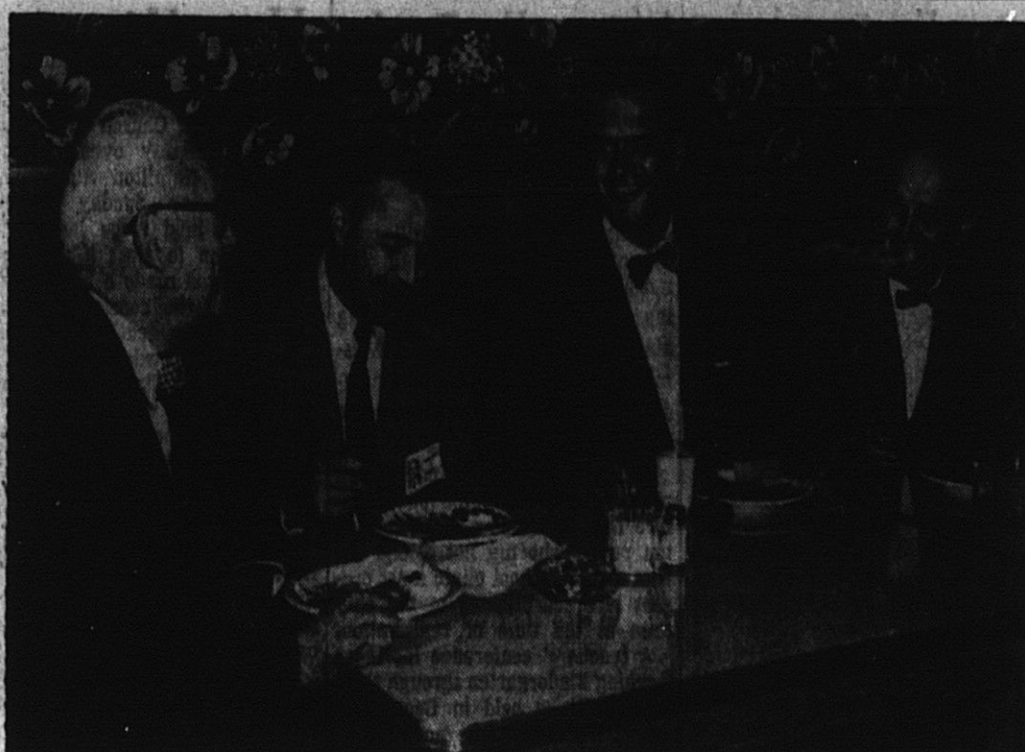

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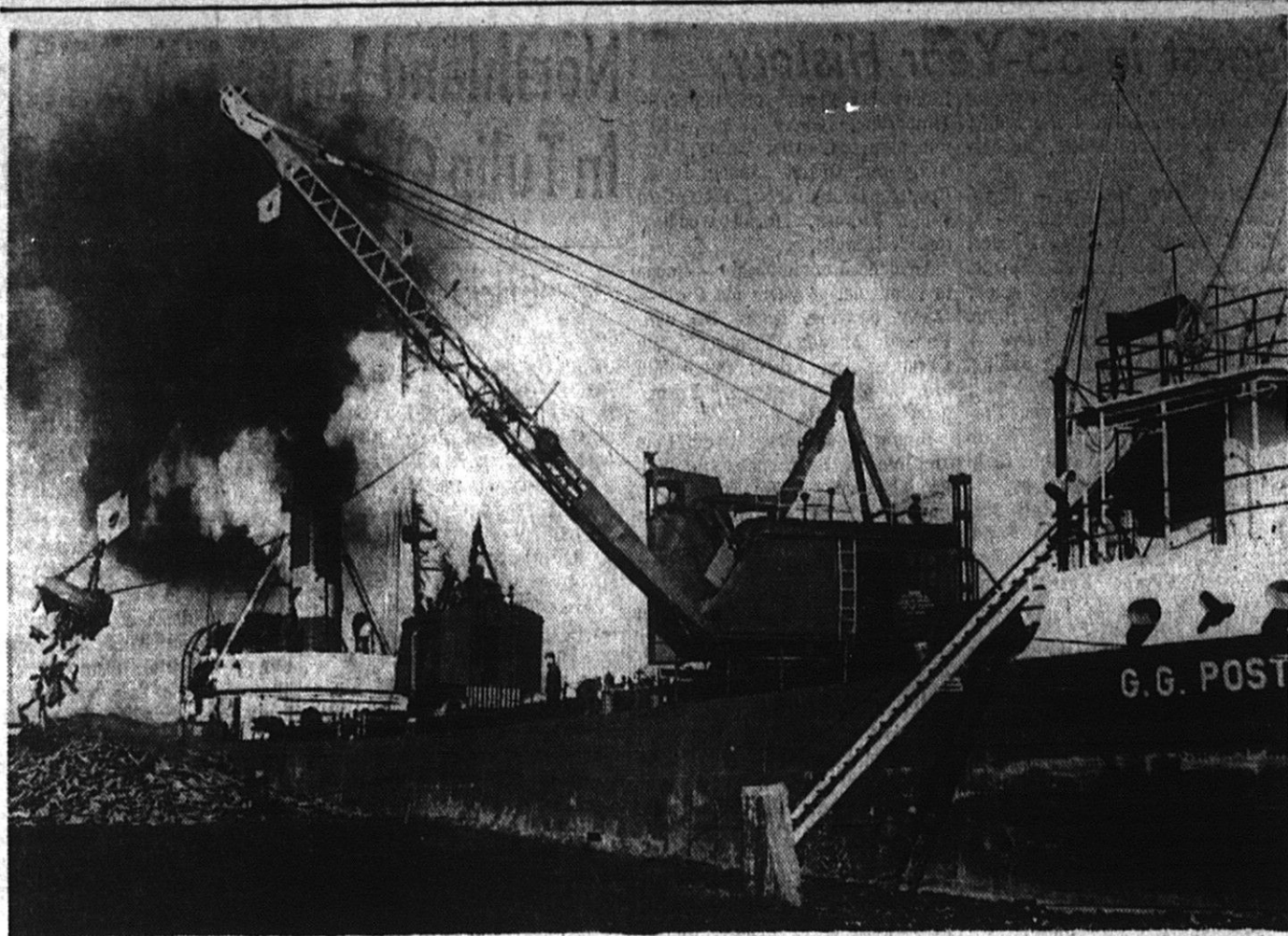

12 Cases Processed in Ottawa Circuit Court This Morning

GRAND HAVEN (Special)—Two Holland youths were put on probation for two years when they appeared before Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith Monday.

Vernon L. Teske, 17, of 447 Howard Ave., and Kenneth Vander Molen, 17, of 198 West 16th St., had pleaded guilty Aug. 14 to charges of malicious destruction of property after doing about \$1,000 damage shooting up the Holland Furnace picnic grounds north of Holland last July 21.

Since both youths told the court they expect to return to school, Judge Smith withheld a jail sentence although he said both of them deserved to spend 60 days in the county jail. "Boys of your age are treated too tenderly and are given too much consideration," he said.

The probation provides that each make restitution of \$200 within a reasonable length of time. While in school, they must maintain passing grades and when out of school must be employed and self-supporting. There must be no drinking. "There is no explanation for the type of conduct that brings you before the court," Judge Smith said.

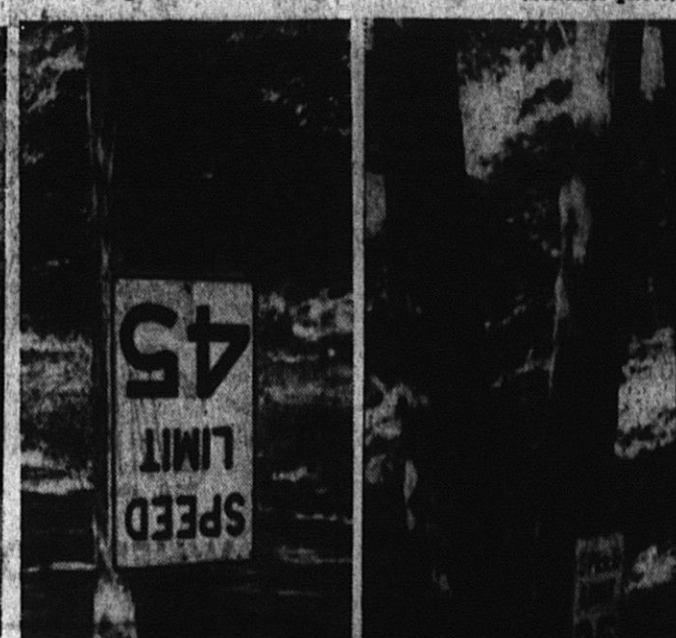
