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R.J. Danhof Named West Michigan DA

**Zeeland Native
Had Been Assistant
To Wendell A. Miles**


GRAND RAPIDS — Robert J. Danhof, a Muskegon lawyer, took over today as the new U.S. attorney for the Western District of Michigan, which has its headquarters here.

Danhof succeeds Wendell A. Miles of Holland, who resigned from the federal prosecutor's post after being nominated the past weekend as the Republican Party's candidate for state attorney general.

The district includes 49 counties in the western side of the state and the Upper Peninsula.

Danhof has been an assistant to Miles since the latter was appointed to the office by President Eisenhower in 1953.

Federal Judge Raymond W. Starr signed an order Monday giving Danhof an interim appointment which will be good until after the Nov. 8 election when the

next president will make a permanent appointment.

Danhof was scheduled to be sworn in at 10 a.m. today.

Danhof is married and the father of three children. He is a graduate of Zeeland public schools, Hope College and took his law degree at the University of Michigan. He is vice president of the Central Reformed Church Consistory in Muskegon.

Currently, Danhof is a Republican nominee for probate judge in Muskegon County. He said he can stay in that race without violating federal law because it is a non-partisan election.

Danhof is a former vice-chairman of the Muskegon County Young Republican organization and a former member of the Muskegon County Republican organization.

Danhof is a son of Mrs. Joan Danhof and the late N. J. Danhof of Zeeland. Both parents were active in Republican politics and Red Cross work and Mrs. Danhof currently is second vice president of the Ottawa County Republican party and past president of the South Ottawa Women's Republican Club. She was an alternate delegate from the 5th district to the Republican National Convention in Chicago in July.

Leg Nearly Severed In Oil Drum Explosion

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Clement Vladika, 53, route 2, Spring Lake, was in good condition Wednesday in Hackley Hospital in Muskegon after his left leg was nearly severed above the ankle in an explosion at 2:45 p.m. Tuesday at the rear of the Ottawa County Road Commission garage here.

Vladika was about to cut a bung bolt out of 55-gallon drum with the aid of a cutting acetylene torch. He thought the drum was empty but it was full of fuel oil. The explosion ripped off the top of the drum which hit him in the leg. He also received second degree burns on the face and arms. A fellow worker, Tony Fracik, Grand Haven, hastily applied a tourniquet.

Vladika was taken to Municipal Hospital by ambulance and later transferred to Hackley Hospital where a cast was applied.

James Reed, 19, of route 4, Holland, waived examination at his arraignment today in Grand Haven Municipal Court on charges of breaking and entering. He will appear in Circuit Court on Sept. 7. Bond of \$200 was not furnished, and Reed is being held in the Ottawa County jail.

A second youth allegedly involved in the thefts, Robert De Ridder, 18, of 256 1/2 West Ninth St., is presently serving a sentence at the county jail for simple larceny.

The three youths allegedly broke into the Ottawa Beach Food Center, Earl's Soda Bar and the Kilcare Tavern on Ottawa Beach Rd. on July 27. They are also alleged to have taken a 24-foot cabin cruiser owned by Robert Galien of Holland from Grissen's Sport Shop on Ottawa Beach Rd. where the boat had been moored. The boat was later recovered several miles up Black River, near 120th Ave.

Man Killed As Sports Car Hits Truck

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Martin Klein, 47, of 1495 Hendricks Rd., Muskegon, was dead on arrival at Hackley Hospital in Muskegon Tuesday night after his newly purchased sports car struck the rear of a gravel truck on a construction job on US-16 and 120th Ave. in Crookery township at 10 p.m.

Klein, manager of the Grand Haven and Muskegon offices of the Michigan Title Co. of Grand Rapids, was traveling west on US-16 when his car hit the rear of a gravel truck driven by Wayne Arden Corl, 23, Stanton, which was making a left turn at a construction job for the new Muskegon expressway. The truck was owned by Glenn Schwarting of Stanton.

The new roofless sports car apparently went into a spin, landed in a ditch and rolled over. Klein was first taken to Municipal Hospital by ambulance and then transferred to Hackley Hospital.

Klein, a veteran of World War II, was born in the Netherlands. Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Wilhelmina Klein, and four brothers, John, Bert, Henry and Edward, all of Grand Rapids.

The body was taken to Zaagman Funeral Home in Grand Rapids where funeral services will be held Saturday. Burial will be in Woodlawn Cemetery in Grand Rapids.

This was the 13th traffic fatality in Ottawa County this year.

Handlogten, who was taken to Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids, told sheriff's officers he was blinded by the early morning sun. The truck, owned by William De Mull of Grand Rapids, was driven by Robert D. Holdridge of Cannonsburg. The truck was traveling about 15 miles an hour.

Three Grand Haven youths escaped serious injuries in a car accident shortly after midnight on 168th Ave. in Grand Haven township. Arlyn Hodges, 19, the driver, received no visible injuries but was to report to his family physician. William Schultz, 20, received facial injuries and Carl Nass arm abrasions. Both were treated in Municipal Hospital.

State police charged Hodges with violation of the basic speed law. The car was demolished.

United Fund, Red Cross Seek Funds

**Set Appropriations
To Various Agencies
Supported by Drive**

A goal of \$94,189.67 was established for the second Greater Holland United Fund-Red Cross joint campaign at last Thursday's meeting of the United Fund board of directors and representatives of the Ottawa County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

Bernard Donnelly Jr., president of the United Fund, and Arthur Read, chairman of the Ottawa County Red Cross Chapter, in a joint statement said, "The goal of \$94,189 is a consolidation of the financial requirements of all the agencies, for 1961 to maintain present effectiveness of operations and meet increasing demands for the many vital health, welfare, and youth guidance services to individuals and families in the Greater Holland community, provided by the member agencies of the United Fund and the Red Cross."

The goal for the October drive represents an increase of 8.2 percent over last year's United Fund-Red Cross campaign goal of \$87,050 which was more than met.

Donnelly said that, while increasing costs of "doing business" are reflected in the increase in this year's campaign goal, the increasing demand for services due to the rapid growth and expansion of the business community was the major factor in increasing the goal by more than \$7,000 over last year's goal.

James E. Townsend, this year's United Fund-Red Cross campaign chairman, upon being advised of the goal said, "Our community has had a reputation, of long standing, for adequately caring for the health and welfare needs of our neighbors and I am sure that this Crusade for community betterment will again be met with adequate and generous giving."

Appropriations to participating United Fund agencies for 1961, plus administration and campaign costs are: Boy Scouts, \$12,200; Camp Fire Girls, \$12,977; Child Guidance Clinic, \$4,118; Michigan United Fund, \$15,916; Prestatie Huis, \$4,700; Salvation Army, \$9,503.67; Social Service Exchange, \$675; Visiting Nurses' Association, \$2,300; administration, \$5,700, and campaign expense, \$1,900. The budget of the Ottawa County Chapter of the Red Cross, Holland Branch, is \$24,000.

The declaration shows that the daughter had stopped her car at the intersection to permit children to cross the street and had slowly proceeded when struck by the Rosso car. The girl who was married last June 21 to Albert H. De Haan, received numerous fractures and a permanent scar on her left cheek.

Council Airs Zoning for Two Hours

**All Issues Referred
To Planning Group;
Meetings Set Sept. 6**

City Council spent another two hours discussing the proposed zoning ordinance at a special meeting Wednesday night called by Mayor Robert Visscher and referred each subject to the Planning Commission for further study. At the suggestion of Mayor Visscher, all Councilmen were urged to attend the next meeting of the commission Tuesday, Sept. 6.

Wednesday's discussion was a continuation of previous hearings and meetings but appeared considerably more calm than meetings the two previous Wednesdays. It followed the procedure of the special meeting a week ago with virtually all discussion in the committee-of-the-whole with Mayor Pro Tem John Beltman presiding. Councilmen Henry Steffens and William Heeringa were absent.

City Attorney James E. Townsend explained changes to date in the text and map and because of the number of revisions recommended another public hearing so that persons affected by the revisions recommend h-r-7 TT&d a visions would have an opportunity for questions and review. He said such a hearing would require a 15-day notice. The alternative would be to adopt the original ordinance, but this appeared unlikely in view of revisions already committed in previous meetings.

Thus, it appeared that actual passage of a new zoning ordinance for Holland city is weeks away at the earliest.

Council discussed specific items presented during the public hearing two weeks ago and considered at the second meeting a week ago.

Work Slated For Zeeland

LANSING (UPI) — Four construction projects, including 6.9 miles of U.S. 27 Freeway in Roscomon, have been added to three separate bid openings scheduled this month, the Highway Department said Wednesday.

They call for work in Roscomon, Ottawa, Keweenaw and Tuscola counties.

Low bidder on the U.S. 27 project will be determined at the Sept. 21 bidding session.

Also scheduled for the Sept. 21 letting was an Ottawa County Road Commission project for work near Zeeland.



Boy Dead On Arrival At Hospital

**Robert Fischer, 4,
Dies of Brain Injury
Suffered in Accident**

A four-year-old rural Holland boy was killed today when he was struck by a car on Lakewood Blvd. near Aniline Ave. at 10:35 a.m.

The victim, Robert Fischer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alan W. Fischer of 263 Beech St., was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital of injuries suffered in the accident.

Ottawa County deputies said the driver of the car was Mrs. Marianne H. Veit, 27, of 961 Lakeside S.E., East Grand Rapids.

According to Dr. William Weststrate Jr., medical examiner, death was due to a brain injury.

Deputies said Mrs. Veit was heading east on Lakewood Blvd. when the accident occurred. The child had been playing on the south side of the road and darted into the road in front of a utility truck which was parked on the south shoulder, deputies said.

Deputies said Mrs. Veit swerved into the westbound lane in her attempt to avoid hitting the boy. According to detective John Hemple, Mrs. Veit's car skidded 66 feet before stopping, most of the skid marks coming after hitting the youngster. Hemple said the boy's body was thrown 71 feet by the impact.

Deputies are continuing their investigation of the mishap. Hemple said he would confer with Prosecutor James W. Bussard on possible charges.

The boy was the 12th traffic fatality in Ottawa County this year.

Fischer; two brothers, Alan and Donald, at home; two sisters, Linda and Diana, at home; the paternal grandfather, Edwin Arnold of Saugatuck; the maternal grandmother, Mrs. Ruth Fischer of Holland; the maternal grandfather, Warren Fischer of Hartford; the maternal great grandmother, Mrs. Henry Lugers of Holland, and the paternal great grandmother, Mrs. Frank Fowler of Norwalk, Ohio.

School Aids Discussed

The Administrative Council of Holland public schools continued its series of meetings today in Thomas Jefferson School, discussing improvement of teachers' time and the need for a teacher to be available in classrooms at the close of each school day for counseling boys and girls or meeting parents.

There also was discussion on communications facilities for better understanding on the part of parents and citizens of school matters as well as public relations through newspaper, radio and special publications.

Tuesday's session of the Administrative Council featured talks by Dr. Robert De Haan of Hope College and Robert Brown, newly appointed employee of Hope college, the public schools, Christian schools and St. Francis school. They reported on the cooperative work of the Holland Youth Development project which is operated by a grant of the U. S. Office of Education.

Present at Tuesday's meeting in addition to public school staff were Dr. Bert P. Bos, superintendent of Christian schools, and Christian school elementary principals.

Wednesday was devoted to a discussion of foreign language, art, music and physical education programs for elementary schools. This year Spanish will be offered for the first time in Montello Park School and German for the first time in Apple Avenue School. This extends these educational opportunities to newly annexed areas.

Blaze Destroys Graafschap Barn

GRAAFSCHAP (Special)—Graafschap and Park Township firemen spent three hours Wednesday night battling a fire which destroyed John Harger's barn on route 1, Holland but they did prevent the blaze from spreading to nearby buildings.

Graafschap Fire Chief David Schripsema estimated the damage at more than \$5,000 for the barn and 250 chickens, a tractor, car, baled straw, 150 bales of hay and other farm implements which were lost. Buildings owned by Leon Scholten and Harger were successfully protected from the fire.

Mrs. Harger called Graafschap firemen about 9 p.m. when her son noticed smoke, but within minutes, she said, the barn was ablaze. The combustion of damp straw or hay was credited with starting the fire, Schripsema said.

About 12 firemen from the Graafschap area used two trucks and six to eight Park Township men responded to the call for aid. One of the two Park Township trucks left after bringing water.

Harger said the car and the barn were insured and that the contents of the barn were partially covered by insurance.

Pleads Guilty to Charge In Municipal Court

Willie Henry Pearson, 24, of route 4, New Holland St., pleaded guilty to a charge of larceny in Municipal Court today. He was released to the custody of his mother and will return Sept. 9 for sentencing.



Section of Hamilton School Will Be Ready About Sept. 19

HAMILTON (Special)—Seventh, eighth and ninth graders in the Hamilton Community Schools will be having classes in a new high school building about Sept. 19.

However, until the 13 classrooms which they will occupy are completed, some Hamilton students will be studying on half-day shifts. The deadline of early September for completion of the junior high section has been extended because of delays in getting construction materials.

When the \$1,250,000 combined junior-senior high school is finished in July 1961, it will contain 29 regular class rooms, one science laboratory, one shop, one home economics room, a library and a gymnasium.

This year, the new school will have an enrollment of about 250, according to Principal William Backs. By adding one grade of senior high school each year, the school will eventually attain its capacity of 700 students. In the meantime, juniors and sophomores from Hamilton will attend Zeeland High School and seniors this year will be at Holland High School.

Until the junior high school rooms in the school are ready, all Hamilton ninth graders and eighth graders from Brookside, Elmwood, West View, Russcher and Hamilton schools will have classes from 12 noon to 4:30 p.m. in the Hamilton Elementary School.

All seventh graders and the remaining eighth grade pupils will be at their regular schools, according to Backs. The children ordinarily attending Hamilton Elementary School will be in school for mornings only for the first several weeks.

Allegan Fair Grounds Are Remodeled

ALLEGAN (Special)—Riverside Park, 100-acre site of the Allegan County Fair, was a bustling place this week as crews of workmen prepared buildings and grounds for the 108th fair.

According to Fair President James Snow, all the activity added up to "just routine maintenance and ordinary improvements," but the cost will total nearly \$10,000.

When the curtain rises Sunday, Sept. 11, for the week-long event, fair-goers will discover that another mile of the fair's "three mile midway" has been paved with bituminous concrete, along with aisles in 4-H livestock barns and open class cattle barns.

The poultry division will have a big, new cement-lined pond for exhibits of ducks and geese in an outdoor, lighted area.

Fair officials feel the problem of exhibit space for 4-H club members has been solved for a long time to come. The second-floor dormitory in the 4-H building is being remodeled this week to house exhibits, nearly doubling display space. Club members who remain at the fair throughout the week to care for their livestock will be quartered off the grounds this year and new one-story dormitories will be erected for them in the youth division area before the 1961 fair.

Elsewhere on the grounds, the sheep barn is being remodeled and virtually all of the buildings will be wearing fresh paint. Gates and doors have been painted in contrasting colors.

It will be "Christmas in September" in the area set aside for entries in the new Christmas tree division. The open-air display will be festooned with yule lights and displays typical of the season.

The huge Industrial Hall has been extensively refurbished. Installation of 400 feet of fluorescent lighting will provide illumination for booths and exhibits. Several new drinking fountains have been added throughout the grounds and there will be more of the park-type benches for foot-weary fair-goers.

The fair's courtesy bus—a new feature last year—will be following a slightly different route, shuttling patrons from more distant parking lots to the midway and exhibit areas. "Bus-stop" shelters will be located at several points on the bus route.

In the 4,500-seat grandstand, box seats will provide a better view of the various programs. Concrete slabs have been poured to raise the third row of chairs in each box. The reserved seat ticket booth also has been remodeled to provide faster service and eliminate what was just about the last of the fair's que-line bottlenecks.

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Can't Market New Egg Nog

ALLEGAN (Special) — Special legislation designed to help one segment of Michigan agriculture today appeared to have frustrated a plan which would have aided both dairy and poultry farmers.

Carl C. Hoyt, district marketing agent for the Cooperative Extension Service who serves farmers in Allegan and Ottawa counties, said today that dairy and association-sponsored legislation which went into effect Aug. 17 blocked efforts to market a low-calorie, high energy egg nog drink which gave promise of providing and outlet for fresh egg and dry skim milk surpluses.

House Bill No. 156, enacted during the last session of the legislature and approved by Gov. Williams on April 14, specifies that any egg nog, drink or mix, shall contain not less than 8 per cent butterfat.

According to Hoyt, when the meaning of the new legislation became clear, plans to test market the egg nog drink on a diet-conscious public went "down the drain."

He said "tentative arrangements had been made to test this drink on a consumer panel and to serve it at the Allegan County Dairy Council's booth at the Allegan fair and, if consumer response was good, to market it through one of the Holland area supermarkets as a part of the consumer acceptance test."

"It looks like the only solution to our present situation is to seek an amendment to the law to exempt low calorie egg nog," Hoyt said.



Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Sept. 4
God's Hand in History
Isaiah 10:5-7, 12-15; 14: 24-27
By C. F. Dame

This lesson is especially suited for our times. People who believe the truth taught in this lesson have something to cling to even though the world situation may be dark. On the other hand, those who do not believe that God is in control, are apt to become pessimistic. God rules all nations—this truth keep to the fore.

I. God uses the nations. God calls Assyria, "the rod of mine anger." In the days of Isaiah, Assyria was the most powerful and most brutal nation in the world. God was angry with His people, Israel. God said that He would send Assyria against "an hypocritical nation."

In the Revised Standard Version Israel is called "a godless nation." The people who had been chosen by God to make Him known and to instruct other nations had become godless. Instead of giving knowledge to others they ignored it themselves. The nation failed to use its knowledge and therefore lost it. This still happens to people.

God's people fell so low that they worshiped idols instead of the living God Who had made them a people. The sin of Israel was willful. Assyria was brutal but God used that nation in order to chastise His own people. Of course Assyria did not know that it was used of God to punish Israel.

"Howbeit he meaneth not so, neither doth his heart think so." The only purpose Assyria had in mind was "to destroy and cut off nations not a few." Assyria had one purpose. God had another. In these days when so many nations are in turmoil, it is well to remember that God uses nations and that back of all this confusion there is a Sovereign God.

II. God punishes nations. The kings of Assyria were proud. In the British Museum there is a stone engraving showing the Assyrian king on a throne as he is receiving tribute from the Israelites. A clay cylinder has also been found on which are written the boastful words of the Assyrian king in which he tells about his conquests. God said that He would punish "the fruit of the stout heart of the king of Assyria, and the glory of his high looks."

Assyria was proud. God has no regard for a proud person nor for a proud nation. The kind said, "By the strength of my hand I have done it, and by my wisdom; for I am prudent." Today we read about nations taking over the property of other nations. Cuba grabs American property and justifies the theft. Assyria placed people here and there and robbed them of their treasures and subjected them to its rule. It was like robbing a bird's nest.

God said that He would punish Assyria for its misuse of power. It was foolish for Assyria to brag and boast. Why should an ax boast of its cutting ability and ignore the axman or a saw glory in its deeds and slight the man who handles it, or a rod imagine it can function without a worker? It is foolish for any person or nation to boast of doing great things when it receives its strength from God. All strength comes from Him. Modern man tries to remember this fact.

III. God rules all nations. God has purposes in mind for the nations. Some Israelites thought that God was only concerned with His own people. The prophet said that God's hand "is stretched out upon all the nations." If one nation refuses to function God uses another, and if one congregation does not minister God calls another. People who believe in the sovereignty of God have a faith that keeps them standing in dark times. Isaiah had confidence in the sovereign God in the days when Assyria was brutal, and today we need the faith of Isaiah as we face the communistic world.

The Columbia University research team has published a radioactive fallout report which indicates that the danger from strontium 90 had been over-estimated in the past. This is heartening news, though there are qualifications which will be noted below. It means, among other things, that fallout resulting from nuclear test explosions over the course of several years has done less potential damage to human beings than had been supposed.

The Columbia scientists also conclude—and this may be placed hesitantly on the credit side of the ledger, as being the lesser of two evils—that if nuclear war came the long-range hazard from radioactive fallout would not be as great as has been widely feared. Short-term survival would not necessarily lead, in other words, to prolonged suffering and death from the cumulative effects of radiation. There is comfort of a sort in that.

The Columbia report offers no comfort, however, when it comes to the matter of genetic damage. Though relatively little is yet known about the long-range effects of excessive radiation, through changes in the genes by which characteristics are passed on from one generation to the next, the consensus is that these effects would be harmful. There is good reason to fear the massive doses of radiation, such as would occur during nuclear war, might eventually be fatal to the race.

Millions of people have looked into the skies and watched Echo travel across from horizon to horizon in a matter of some few minutes. As we are able to see these man-made objects travel across the skies we hope that with all of this scientific knowhow, we will use our great efforts for preserving the peace and making the lives of people all over the globe better.

THREAT TO THE UNBORN

With many governments sending objects into the air we sometimes wonder just what will be the end result.

We hope that it will be all for the best.

When millions of people all over the world continue to read about all of the scientific objects that are being placed in orbit, and with some of the research teams making reports like the Columbia University research team, there does not seem to be anything but to hope and work toward the end of no nuclear war.

It also is to be hoped that resumption of nuclear test explosions which breed fallout can be avoided. The strontium 90 from such fallout may not be as much of a threat as had been feared, but genetic damage remains the big question mark.

Regulations For Library Auditorium

The Holland Library Board today announced policies governing the use of the auditorium in the new Herick Public Library which has been in operation since its dedication early in May.

The board of which Mrs. Henry Steffens is president has decided that the auditorium will be available for such functions which are of a cultural, educational or civic nature and which are appropriately allied with the library's character and purpose. These uses are subject to the following regulations:

1. Not available for partisan or sectarian purposes, either political or religious.

2. No admission fees, nor use of the auditorium for fund raising.

3. Permission for groups or organizations not to extend beyond a year with continuation determined upon application of organization or group.

4. When auditorium is engaged for use during regular library hours, no charge will be made by the Library Board. Evening use that extends beyond regular closing time of 9 p.m. will require payment of \$5 in advance, said charge to compensate staff member or custodian who must remain on duty to extinguish lights and lock doors.

5. Groups desiring use of auditorium for exhibition purposes in the broad realms of art, history, hobby and handicrafts should have the library's full encouragement. In such case, there shall be no objects attached to walls.

6. Requests for use of auditorium must be made at least two weeks in advance with such requests written on application form supplied.

7. The auditorium will be open during the following hours only with no deviation permitted except by board action: mornings, 10 a.m. to noon; afternoons, 1 to 5 p.m.; evenings, 7 to 10 p.m.; Sundays and holidays, none.

8. Smoking in auditorium is granted to adult groups only.

9. Those to whom permission is granted for auditorium use shall be held responsible for costs arising from any damage or loss incurred during such use.

10. Those seeking use of the auditorium will be given a copy of these regulations, and same shall become a part of the acceptance of the privilege of using the auditorium.

11. These regulations may be altered or added to by the Library board at its discretion.

The board has decided that library uses of the auditorium will take precedence over all other uses.





Four Escape Death as Car Jumps Bank

DOUGLAS (Special) — Four persons miraculously escaped death at 3:15 Saturday when their car careened off the road, hurtled down a 110-foot embankment and came to rest on its top at the edge of Lake Michigan, two miles south of here.

The driver of the car, Walter Meyrick, 33, of Chicago Heights, Ill., was admitted to Douglas Hospital with possible fractured ribs, lacerations and multiple bruises.

Joe Devine, 22, of Saugatuck, was admitted with a severe scalp laceration. Frank Fiall, 22, of Saugatuck, suffered multiple bruises and lacerations and was also admitted to the hospital. Meyrick's wife, Alice, 31, was treated for cuts and bruises, and discharged.

Allegan County deputies, South Haven State Police, Saugatuck Police and Douglas Police teamed with ambulance attendants in the delicate task of transporting the injured people from the wrecked car on the beach, up the steep, sandy embankment to ambulances waiting on the road above.

Two of the people were carried up a stairway several hundred yards north of the crash scene, with the help of a winch on a wrecker. Two others were carried up a nearly washed-out stairway near the crash scene.

Meyrick told officers that he was driving north along Lake Shore Rd., when a dog ran in front of his auto. He said he struck a tree and then came off the bank.

Officers said skid marks from the point where Meyrick first applied his brakes to where he crashed through a small wooden fence measured 500 feet. They said the skid marks indicate the car first veered to the right and then to the left toward the drop-off.

The car rolled all the way down the bank, officers said, landing on its top. They said some of the occupants were out of the car when authorities arrived, but they believed they extricated themselves.

The 1960 model car was utterly smashed. State police are continuing the investigation.



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Boards Deny Castle Park Transfer

Combined school boards of Ottawa and Allegan counties conducted two public hearings in Federal School Monday night on proposals involving transfer of areas in Harrington, Laketown, Saugatuck and Hamilton districts. Both county boards met since Harrington and Lakeview districts are fractional in both counties.

By a vote of 6-4, the boards denied a petition from Castle Park residents to transfer the Castle Park area from Harrington school district to Saugatuck district. The resort was well represented by some 75 persons at the hearing. Austin Brown of Castle Park was chief spokesman for the petitioners and Robert Sligh represented Harrington School Board.

A factor in Castle Park deliberations was the equalized value of the area which is listed at \$558,767.60. No children of the resort area as such attend Harrington or Saugatuck schools. Main issue appeared to be the threat of political annexation rather than school district boundaries.

The other proposal involved transferring some areas from Lakeview district to Hamilton district and transferring some Hamilton areas to Lakeview. There was no opposition to the action as outlined in the petitions and both boards voted unanimously to grant the proposal.

All members of both county boards were present. Harvey Scholten of Grand Haven was elected chairman for the evening and Allegan Supt. William Sexton served as secretary. Jennie Kaufman, Ottawa County superintendent, also was present. Visitors were dismissed after the hearings and the two boards took final action in official session.

Campers Beat 1959 Figure

The camping permits at Holland State Park last week surged 191 ahead of 1959 but the attendance this year of 1,058,835 stayed behind the previous season's figure of 1,131,993.

The bathers totaled 61,850 last week with 11,935 on Ottawa Beach Sunday and 11,240 on Saturday. The week's permits for camping added up to 509 making 5,507 for the year.
