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Kiwanians To Broaden Camp Uses

Representatives of various service organizations were guests of the Holland Kiwanis Club Monday night at Camp Kiwanis, a 40-acre parcel east of Lake Shore Dr. just north of Lakewood Blvd.

The club which has been operating the camp largely for youth activities the past 20 years is attempting to broaden services to the youth of the community and is calling on other clubs and service agencies to assist in improving facilities and enlarging the program. The biggest single use of the camp the last 20 years has been that of serving as a day and tent camp for Camp Fire Girls of the Holland area.

Kiwanian Marty Hardenberg, also representing the Holland police department, took representatives on a tour of the facilities, pointing out where proposed improvements would take place. First on the list of priorities is a sanitary facility, followed by new camp sites, permanent accommodations, improved drives and parking, athletic field, possibly an outdoor amphitheatre and eventually a swimming pool.

He displayed plot plans drawn up by Kammeraad and Stroop, local architects.

The camp development program has been under study about nine months by the club, and Monday's gathering was the second held with representatives of other service organizations. Plans call for accommodating 180 campers.

Representatives were present from the Salvation Army, YMCA, Optimist Club, Camp Fire Girls, Holland and West Ottawa public schools, Boy Scouts, police department and the Good Samaritan organization.

A Kiwanis committee presently is working out costs for development and operations. Serving are Jerry Roper, camp development; William Hekman, construction; Marty Hardenberg, operations and program; Avery D. Baker, public relations; Charles Stewart, utilization.

At Monday's supper meeting, Nick Yonker gave the invocation and Riener Van Til presided. On the food committee were Walt Martiny, Roger Walcott and Howard Kole.

Young Vandals Learn Lessons The Hard Way

West Ottawa Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte has worked out a novel solution for cleaning up Beechwood School, scene of extensive vandalism during a two-hour period Monday evening.

The two boys, 8 and 9 years old, who admitted the deed, reported to the school Tuesday with their mothers and are cleaning up the mess under the supervision of the mothers.

Van Raalte said the mothers show the boys how to remove paint which was spread all over the kitchen. Fortunately, it was a tempera paint which is soluble except on certain surfaces.

The boys put in a full day Tuesday, returned Wednesday and it appears the cleanup will take several more days. The boys will be unable to undo the harm done to specially prepared instruction materials strewn over classroom floors, some of it destroyed. Teachers have salvaged a share of the materials and are rewriting others.

The boys will be cleaning up science equipment, damaged much like the mischief in the kitchen.

Supt. Van Raalte who feels people capable of committing destruction should also be capable of repairing it and cleaning it said the cleanup program is separate from whatever Juvenile Court might do. Sheriff's officers who apprehended the pair late Monday night have referred the pair to Juvenile Court.

Holland FOP To Host 1970 Convention

Holland Fraternal Order of Police Lodge No. 104 will begin making plans next month to host the 31st annual FOP convention here in June, 1970.

Holland won the bid to host the event at the 30th convention held last Sunday, Monday and Tuesday in Bay City.

There were 180 delegates at the recent convention representing 46 FOP Lodges in Michigan and some 4,221 officers. Delegates from Holland Lodge 104 were Cpl. Robert Ryzanca and Patrolman Glenn Bareman from Holland Police Department and Deputy Norman Kamps and Det. Lee Posma from Ottawa County Sheriff's Department.

Attending as guests of the local lodge were Det. Gene Geib from Holland police and Sgt. Gerald Witteveen of the sheriff's department.

Wives also attended the three-day event and participated in the FOP Women's Auxiliary sessions during which June Johnson from Grand Rapids was elected president of the women's auxiliary.

New FOP officers elected at the state convention include William Schoelles of Taylor, president; Donald Harrison of Kalamazoo, vice president; Norm Joblonski of Hamtramck, secretary-treasurer; Lorris Pafthause of Grand Rapids, guard; Robert Kimerley of St. Joseph, conductor.

Holland's Bareman was elected a trustee along with Al Sommers from Alpena, A. Sawaya from Macomb county, Edward Leachy from Warren and Robert Kammer from Northern Lodge.

Purpose of the FOP convention is to promote the police organization and make it a better profession.

The national FOP convention will be held Aug. 3-7 in Louisville, Ky., and will be attended by some 1,600 delegates representing an excess of 500,000 FOP members who are city, county, and state law enforcement officers.

Centennial Fracas Ends With Arrest

GRAND HAVEN — One person was arrested following a disturbance Tuesday night at the Spring Lake Centennial where a group of about 20 young people of the Grand Haven-Ferrysburg area converged to throw objects from roofs at the carnival scene.

Daniel Cleveringa, 18, Grand Haven, was lodged in Ottawa County jail on a charge of disorderly conduct involving a 10-inch wrench handle under his shirt.

A fire on the top of one tent of the carnival established on Main St. caused momentary alarm but it was quickly extinguished. The fracas was quelled by Spring Lake Police Chief Leon Langeland and his five men, assisted by four state police officers and a contingent of the Ottawa sheriff's department.

The troublesome group of youths had gone to the centennial Monday night because "they didn't like carnival people" but dispersed quickly. Their return Tuesday night created far more trouble.

Former Holland Man Heads Synod

GRAND RAPIDS—The Rev. William G. Brink of Fremont, formerly pastor of Bethany Christian Reformed Church in Holland from 1953 to 1964, has been elected president of the Christian Reformed Church Synod, currently meeting here in annual session.

Rev. Brink, pastor of Second Christian Reformed Church in Fremont, previously served as synod president in 1966.

Elected vice president was the Rev. Henry Vander Kam of Grace Christian Reformed Church in Kalamazoo. He previously served the Twelfth Avenue Christian Reformed Church in Jenison for several years.

Other officers are the Rev. Arnold Brink of Burton Heights Christian Reformed Church in Grand Rapids, first clerk, and the Rev. Henry De Koster of Immanuel Christian Reformed Church of Calgary, Alberta, Canada, second clerk.

In other business, synod admitted 48 candidates to the gospel ministry, and approved 25 new appointments and 40 reappointments to the faculty of Calvin College. Dr. Dennis Hoekstra was appointed assistant dean for academic affairs at the college. The Rev. Robert Recker was elected to the faculty of Calvin Seminary in the department of missions. The Rev. Richard De Ridder, formerly of Holland, was the other nominee.

Synod approved a plan to divide classis Pacific into two separate classes, bringing the total number of classes to 37 and increasing the number of delegates to annual sessions to 140.

Windmill Loan Repaid To City

The \$25,000 loan which City Council authorized to Windmill Island for operations early this year has been repaid, Council was informed by City Auditor John Fonger at a regular meeting Wednesday night in City Hall.

In fact, the amount transferred to the Windmill Island Fund turned out to be \$24,782.75 which was to carry operations through the month of April.

The auditor's report was made public at this time because the end of the fiscal year falls June 30.

City Manager Herb Holt said attendance at Windmill Island during May totaled 54,174, compared with 54,003 in May of 1968. Revenues last month totaled \$74,127.41, compared with \$50,251 in May of 1968. The 50 per cent increase in admission costs accounted for the boost.

In other business, Council passed a zoning ordinance amending rezoning a parcel at the northwest corner of 48th St. and Lincoln Ave. from AG agricultural to C-2 commercial. The parcel which runs 660 feet on Lincoln Ave. and 440 feet on 48th St. will be used for trailer sales and rentals and related items. It will be operated by Vern and Carl Edwards.

Following a public hearing Council approved a paving program in Melbourne Subdivision for 33rd, 34th and 35th Sts. west from Pioneer Ave. to the ends of the streets and for Kirkview Dr., at a cost of \$13.75 per front foot.

Oaths of office for John F. Donnelly, Alex Rivera and Alta L. Wilburn, Human Relations Commission, and Gerald Petrolje, Panel of Space Heating Examiners, were filed.

Read and filed was a communication from the city of Sault Ste. Marie urging the enactment of legislation requiring property upon which unpaid taxes and special assessments exist to revert to the local units of government in which the property is located instead of to the state.

A letter from Virginia Working suggesting that a sign in the shape of a tulip be placed at all roads entering Holland was referred to the city manager for study and report. City Manager Herb Holt commented that the final decision on the matter might rest with the State Highway Department, which is reluctant to allow signs other than those indicating direction to be erected on state right of ways.

Council accepted an invitation from Ottawa County Civil Defense Director Glen Timmer to a civil defense public officials' conference on Sept. 9 at Grand Valley State College.

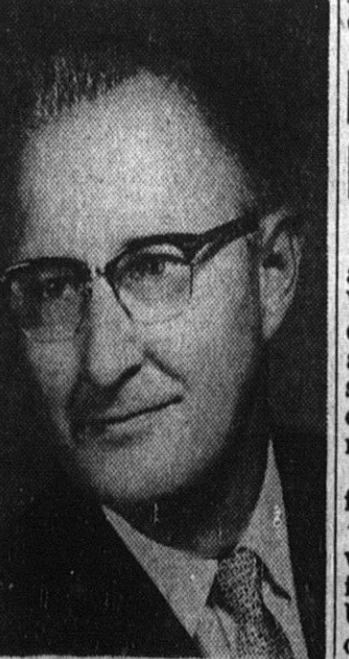

Supervisors Face Rising Expenses

GRAND HAVEN — Costs of operating various departments in Ottawa county, including the fast-growing sheriff's department, and appointment of several board members will be among the items on a long agenda for the Board of Supervisors, at its meeting June 23 and 24.

The Rev. George Timberlake of St. John's Episcopal church at Grand Haven filed a letter at the April meeting of the board, protesting the mounting costs of the sheriff's department and the overlapping of services in north Ottawa by state police, sheriff's officers and other law officers.

The sheriff's committee was asked to make a study of the comparative costs of sheriff's departments in other counties the size of Ottawa and report at the June session. Father Timberlake charges the supervisors spent thousands of dollars on a study of law enforcement in the county and have not used the survey.

Another department that will be scrutinized is the new mental health department. A written report will be submitted listing the number of employees, calls and persons served and the anticipated growth to substantiate the costs in this office.

There are also problems in the new district courts in the county and the legislative and judicial committee and the prosecuting attorney will report to the board. The marine division of the sheriff's department issues an annual report and the costs of this service will be investigated.

The social services committee will report on a plan to try to cut down the cost of the welfare load in the county and will report on a plan to remove the distribution of surplus foods to welfare people from the ground floor of the new county building.

Peter Manting of Grand Haven has retired from the Grand Haven board of education and his place on the election board must be filled Monday.

Dr. Richard Schaftenaar of Holland has resigned as county health director and a new chief medical examiner in the county must be named. Mrs. Barbara Giangrande of Spring Lake, a member of the county library board, will be reappointed to that board.

The board will hold an organizational breakfast meeting July 1 at 6:30 a.m. at the Louis Van Slooten home. Results of the June 9 election were reported. The operation millage passed, 586 to 353, Van Slooten was reelected to the board and Don Ladewig was elected, succeeding James Corwin who did not seek reelection.

A proposed calendar for 1969-70 was presented calling for building meetings Sept. 2 and classes Sept. 3. Christmas vacation will be Dec. 22 to Jan. 2, the new semester starts Feb. 2, and spring vacation is slated March 30 to April 3.

'No Cause' Ruled In Damage Case

GRAND HAVEN — "No cause" was the verdict of a jury in Ottawa Circuit Court Tuesday in a trial involving the alleged loss of hair through a faulty "permanent wave" at a Holland beauty salon.

Frances Speet, Holland, filed a \$3,500 damage suit in Circuit Court against Carol Heerspink Dykstra and the Hi-Fashion beauty parlor. She claimed negligence on the part of the operator. The date of the treatment was Feb. 15, 1968.

The jury deliberated one hour before reaching a verdict.

Hart Hits Nixon In GVSC Address

ALLENDALE — Sen. Philip A. Hart has joined mounting criticism of President Nixon's Air Force Academy speech by charging that over-reliance on the military also could be "neo-isolationism."

"It would be the isolation of an armed fortress ready to fight but fearing to negotiate," Hart said in a commencement address at Grand Valley State College.

"The use of broad, nameless charges opens the gates to sharp give-and-take which tends to escalate the heat but not the light of a debate," the Michigan Democrat said. "The cost of such escalation could be high, for it might be matched with an escalation of the arms race while the debaters fiddled with new phases."

Hart's criticism came during his address to the graduating seniors of Grand Valley State College during commencement exercises Sunday afternoon. Baccalaureate degrees were presented to candidates by Grand Valley president Arend D. Lubbers. The candidates were presented by George T. Potter, vice president for academic affairs and dean of faculty at the college.

President Lubbers conferred honorary degrees upon Alexander Calder and Sen. Hart. Calder, artist engineer and sculptor, was lauded by Lubbers as "a man of the twentieth century in your methods, your forms and your inspiration."

Sen Hart was recognized as "a distinguished citizen of Michigan and as an outstanding member of our nation's government."

Earlier in the weekend, at a Saturday address at the state convention of the American GI Forum in Adrian, Hart said President Nixon's announced withdrawal of 25,000 troops in Vietnam was good, but he also hoped the President could call for an "in-place cease fire."

Vacation Mail Pickup Asked

The Holland Post Office is requesting all patrons to make arrangements for the handling of their mail during any extended absence from home, according to Postmaster Louis A. Haight.

Haight said the office does not have adequate facilities to hold mail for patrons on vacation.

"It is suggested that each patron make arrangements with relatives or friends to properly protect his mail," Haight said.

Synod Rejects Black Demands

NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J., — The Reformed Church in America Wednesday night turned down the specific demands of James Forman and the National Black Economic Development Conference, but approved a powerful new attack on the problems of the black community.

Without a single dissenting vote, the Church's General Synod adopted all recommendations in a five-page report of the ad hoc committee appointed to study the demands of the black leader. The vote came after strongly supportive statements from three of the four black Elders who had served on the 15-member committee.

The report called for the establishment of a Black Council for the program of General Synod. This is to be a policy-making body empowered to decide and administer programs. The Synod agreed to create an immediate fund of \$100,000 to be disbursed according to the decisions of the Black Council for Program, and also authorized a special appeal for additional funds.

Noting that the Interchurch Center in New York City, where Reformed Church officers are located, is close to ghetto areas and that the building contains valuable equipment which can be used to help ghetto neighbors learn useful skills, Synod voted to ask other tenants in the building to cooperate in sharing facilities with local minority groups. A black executive staff person will be hired to direct this and other programs developed by the Black Council.

In making its recommendations, the ad hoc report stated, "We reject Forman's ideology, plans and tactics and its projected use of force, treading on the rights of other peoples without respect to the dignity of the individuals or other organizations." However, it added, "we do recognize that the injustices to which he points are real."

Following the adoption of the report, the Synod voted to refer to the General Synod executive committee the question of the occupation of Reformed Church facilities at the Interchurch Center and to empower it to take whatever action it judges best.

Forman learned about the Synod's action from several Reformed Church executives who made the trip from Rutgers University to the still-occupied 18th floor of the Interchurch Center. He was reported "very disappointed" by the church's failure to meet his demands. No church money is being put into funds which are under the control of his group.

Forman called for a conference with Dr. Marion De Velder, general secretary of the Reformed Church. It was learned that National Black Economic Development Conference representatives have vacated Reformed Church offices but are still occupying the conference room.

City Tax Bills Will Be Late

City tax bills will be late this summer, possibly as late as Aug. 1, instead of the customary first part of July.

City Council was given this information at its meeting Wednesday night after Councilman Morris Peerbolt inquired about developments on equalization assessments in Allegan county. Since equalization is not as yet resolved in Allegan county, all Holland city tax bills are held up because of that area in Holland city that lies in Allegan county.

City Atty. Gordon Cunningham said the city charter makes no provision for delaying the Aug. 15 tax deadline regardless when tax bills are sent, and property owners should plan now to have their taxes paid by Aug. 15 without penalty.

When Councilman Alvin Dyk asked what happens if bills are not out by Aug. 15, Cunningham said that would have to be answered when the time came.

Then he quipped, "Taxpayers are never forgotten. There will be tax bills."

Quick Thinking Averts Tragedy

Holland Fire Chief Dick Brandt said the cool-headed, quick thinking of a gasoline tank driver averted a potential tragedy when he extinguished a blaze that broke out in the loaded truck at US-31 and M-40 Wednesday night.

The blaze started in the wiring under the cab of the double-bottom gasoline tanker.

Brandt said driver R. Galbreath of South Haven had the fire out by the time firemen arrived at the scene. They had received the call at 7:45 p.m. Galbreath had also disconnected the battery to prevent a flare-up, Brandt reported.

Wiring insulation had been burned, Brandt said. Estimate of damage was to be determined later today.

Dutch Envoy Is Retiring

Mr. and Mrs. Willard C. Wichers of Holland are in Washington, D. C., to attend a dinner tonight at the Netherlands Chancery honoring Ambassador Carl W. A. Schurmann who is retiring.

Dr. Schurmann who has been in Holland on several occasions served as Netherlands ambassador to the United States in Washington since 1964, and for nine years previously he was Netherlands ambassador to the United Nations in New York.

Ambassador Schurmann was last in Holland in the company of Prince Bernhard when Windmill De Zwaan was dedicated in April, 1965.

Burnips Driver Cited

Cars driven by Robert Deipert, 18, of Burnips, and Bernice Hillebrands, 59, of 453 West 20th St., collided at the intersection of Pine and River Aves. at 10:25 a.m. Wednesday, according to Holland police who cited Deipert for disobeying a red light.

Seven Men Appointed To Boards

Several appointments were announced at a regular meeting of City Council Wednesday night.

Appointments by Mayor Nelson Bosman included Floyd J. Folkert to the Board of Public Works, five-year term; Robert Van Zanten and William E. La Barge to the Hospital Board, five-year terms, and Edward Ribbens, Human Relations Commission, three-year term. Appointments were approved by Council.

Council appointments listed Roy Heasley and William Vogelzang to the Board of Appeals, and Councilman Lou Hallacy to the Tulip Time board, all for three-year terms.

Council approved a resolution calling for a special election Aug. 19 in connection with the Ottawa-Allegan vote on a vocational-technical school, on a \$1,230,000 bond issue to help finance secondary treatment and phosphate removal at the local sewage treatment plant to meet standards required by the Water Resources Commission of Michigan.

The amount will be the city's share in the necessary improvements. Cost estimates prepared by Engineers Black and Veatch list a total cost of \$2,458,500, broken down as follows: construction, \$2,140,000; legal and administrative expense, \$21,500; engineering, plans and specifications, \$131,500; field inspection, \$48,000; contingencies, \$117,500 total, \$2,458,500.

Council also approved a BPW change order to the contract of U.O.P. Air Correction Division for the electrostatic precipitator unit 5 at the power plant. The change involves an addition to the contract of \$490.52.

The city engineer was authorized to apply to the Michigan State Highway Department for a permit to construct sanitary sewer crossings in M-40 (48th St. also Lincoln Ave.) This calls for constructing a 10-inch sanitary sewer crossing in 48th St. approximately 1117 feet east of the railroad crossing; a 15-inch crossing at the intersection of 48th and Lincoln, and 600 feet of 18-inch and 907 feet of 15-inch pipe along the west property line of Lincoln Ave., plus six-inch service crossings at various locations.

Council approved low bid of International Harvester Co. of Grand Rapids for a 25,000 GVW truck chassis for the street department with a 1959 International trade-in, in net amount of \$8,900. The Grand Rapids bid was lowest of four submitted. The vote was 8 to 1, with Lou Hallacy dissenting.

Council also approved low bid of Ideal Dry Cleaners for dry cleaning services for the police department. Mayor Bosman commented that Former Mayor Robert Visscher who operates Ideal Cleaners had been doing this service gratis for about 20 years, and Council instructed the city clerk to send a letter of thanks in recognition of this service. The three other bids ran generally about 50 per cent higher on stated items.

Also approved was a maintenance contract with the State Highway Department for the fiscal period from July 1, 1969, to June 30, 1970.

Council adopted a resolution providing for increased benefits in the employee retirement system in the 1969-70 budget. Transfers in the present budget from the contingent account listed \$1,400 to Tulip Time, \$3,000 to police, regular payroll, and \$4,650 to police, part time.

Council confirmed certifications from Councilman Lamb, Lamb, Inc., fire, engineering and cemetery departments, \$836.83, and Councilman Smith, Wade Drug Co., police, health and Windmill Island, \$554.96.

A claim against the city from John Brinkman, 139 East 16th St., was referred to the insurance carrier.

Councilman Jacob Smith called attention to raised manhole covers off the roadway in the vicinity of Myrtle Ave. and South Shore Dr., stating he felt they were potential hazards to motorists. City Manager Holt said some barriers or other restraints would be placed.

Atty. Donald Hann introduced Dave Knoll as a new attorney in Holland, stating he had just been admitted to the bar.

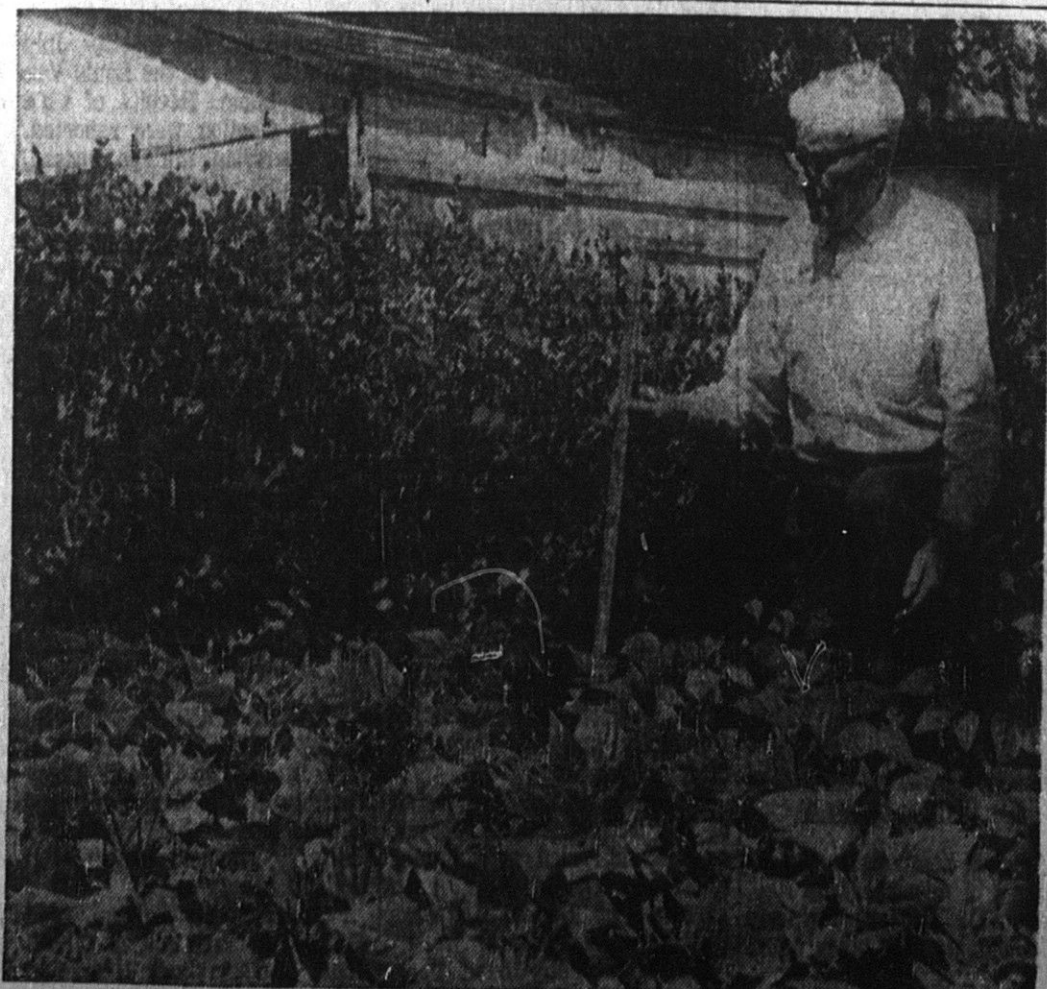

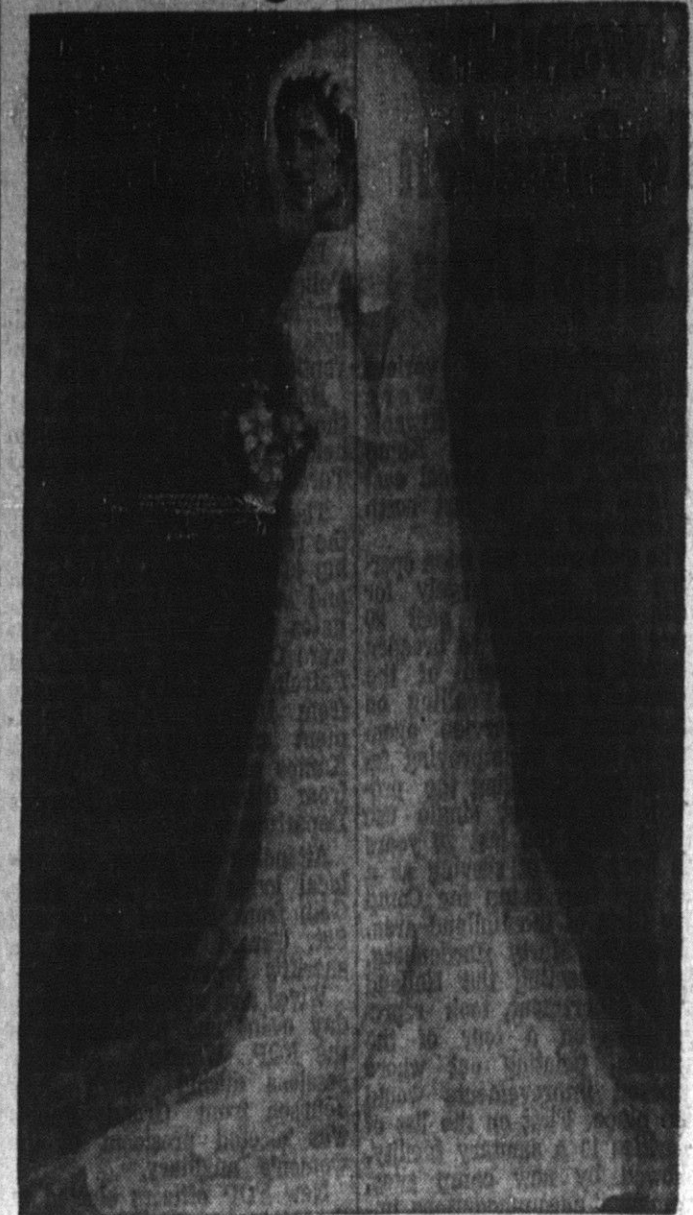

Volleys From Ambush

Gerrit Ten Zythoff's new book on "The Dutch in America" is out, giving considerable space to Holland, Mich., its colonization, Hope College, and of course, Windmill De Zwaan, pictures of which are included in the front cover layout and on the concluding page of the book.

Dr. Ten Zythoff, a native of the Netherlands, has spent considerable time in this city doing research for his book. He has taught at Western Theological Seminary and currently is an assistant professor of history at Ohio State University. His doctoral thesis was titled "The Netherlands Reformed Church: Stepmother of Michigan Pioneer, Albertus C. Van Raalte." The thesis was a detailed account of the church conflict of 1834 in the Netherlands which led to Dutch emigration in the 1840's.

The new book which is one of a series of "In America Books" carries pictures of such interesting Dutch-Americans as President Martin Van Buren, President Theodore Roosevelt, President and Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Sen. Arthur Vandenberg, Mayor John Vliet Lindsay of New York, Cornelius Vanderbilt, General Alexander Vandegrift, General Hoyt Vandenberg and Cecil B. De Mille.

There are interesting bits on such writers as Paul de Kruif, Hendrick Willem van Loon, and Mark Van Doren, Edward William Bok, Pearl Sydenstricker Buck, James Mulenburgh and Dr. Benjamin Spock.

Also out on the stands is a book by a Holland man, Fred B. Duncan, of Chippewa whose "Deepwater Family" is the story of his first 12 years which were spent aboard a sailing vessel of which his father was captain.

For Duncan, 81 years old, it was his first book. Virtually no changes were made by the editors of the Alfred A. Knopf Co., the publisher.

Duncan was all set for celebrating the book with a coming-out or autographing party, but a burn on the leg necessitated going to a Chicago hospital for skin grafts, which will take four or five weeks.

Minneapolis has always had the reputation of a city dedicated to a liberal viewpoint in politics and from the city have come some leaders who have carried that stamp. All this makes the election of Charles Stenvig as mayor a very interesting bit of politics.

Charles Stenvig, police detective and certainly a political novice, ran for the office of mayor on a campaign of law and order, though Minneapolis has had little in the way of violence. In the primaries he defeated the Democratic candidate, upsetting a man who had the backing of the party machinery. Stenvig ran as an independent. In the election he ran against Alderman Dan Cohen, the Republican candidate, and defeated him, capturing almost 62 per cent of the votes.

Politicians will certainly have a second look at what went on in Minneapolis. Why did the people turn to a political unknown? Is this simply a protest vote to tell political leaders that people want a change of direction, a different emphasis? We aren't sure.

The recent elections in scores of Michigan towns indicate that the rebellion against voting higher taxes hasn't yet run its course. The voter is trying to get across to his elected representatives that he is not satisfied with things as they are, and his only means of expressing that dissatisfaction is his ballot.

We are often told that politicians follow the ballots in making new decisions and new commitments. We have the notion that a good deal is being said by the voter that needs interpretation and then some action. Minneapolis observers were surprised by the vote given to Stenvig, a man who had no support from the party leaders. Obviously the voter felt the party leaders didn't really understand the need for some changes.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 22
God's Continuing Encounter With Men

By C. P. Dame
Deuteronomy 5:1-6; 30: 15-20.
This lesson is composed of two passages from Deuteronomy. Israel was about to enter into Canaan. Life would be different for them all, Moses tried to prepare them for the new life which awaited them. The Bible tells us how God wants us to live now. This is the truth to emphasize in this study.

I. The Bible is not for one generation but for all generations. And that also implies that it is for all times. It was for Israel in the wilderness, in Canaan and in exile, and it was for our grandparents and for us also. It was authoritative in the past and it is that today. Now the word "authoritative" is not popular today but God is not in a popularity contest.

Through Moses God had given Israel laws. "I speak to your ears this day, that ye may learn them, and keep, and do them." Moses gave a divine message to the nation. His words deserved hearing because he spoke for God. Today it is the business of the church to speak for God and therefore on the pulpit lies a Bible from which the pastor is expected to preach. Most people, when they go to church, expect to hear a message from God's Word, not what the latest magazines relate.

Moses taught. It is the mission of the Sunday School to teach God's Word. We have better facilities, better teachers, better equipment, and yet attendance in the Sunday Schools is decreasing. Why? Is this the fault of the parents, or the teachers? Again ignorance of the Bible is increasing. Why? Moses called upon his hearers to learn God's commands and then to keep and do them.

The Lord made a covenant with Israel at Mt. Horeb with the fathers of the generation Moses addressed. His hearers were also involved in this covenant. God had given His laws at Mt. Horeb to their fathers and to them also for these were for all generations—ours also.

II. The Lord gives every generation a choice. "See, I have set before thee, this day, life and good, and death and evil"—note the contrast to which the Bible refers again and again. Moses told his hearers to love the Lord and to show it by obeying Him. The people would be tempted to forsake God which they did later on over and over again. Moses tried to fortify the people for the temptations to come. Obedience would yield wholesome results—they would live, multiply and be blessed but if they would turn away from God they would surely perish. History tells us that the nation perished. We know why. Many nations have perished. Unless our nation turns eventually we too will perish.

Moses was in great earnest as he faced the nation which he had led for forty years. "I denounce unto you this day...I call heaven and earth to record this day against you, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing." The church of our times needs workers who are as earnest as Moses was in his day and time. People today face the choice Moses put before his hearers—life or death. The person who chooses Jesus Christ makes a wise choice—life, eternal life.

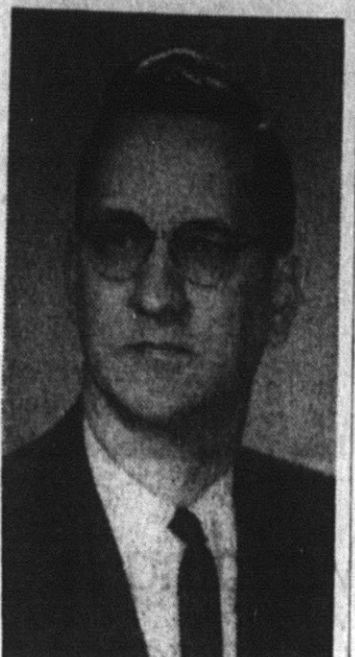

A new administrative structure has been named for the two Reformed seminaries by Dr. Herman J. Ridder. Dr. Ridder was recently named president of both seminaries in a move to achieve a unified administration.

Dr. Elton M. Eenigenburg is named to serve as the Academic Dean of Western Seminary and Henry Kleinheksel becomes

the Assistant to the President. At New Brunswick Seminary Dr. Norman E. Thomas is made Dean and Walter C. Gates becomes Assistant to the President.

In each case the dean will be responsible to the president in all matters relating to academic affairs and will be the administrative head of the school in the absence of the president. The assistants to the president will be responsible for all non-academic matters.

Dr. Eenigenburg joined the faculty of Western Seminary in 1952 as Professor of Historical Theology and Church History, following pastorates in Long Branch, N.J.; Passaic, N.J.; and Chicago. His degree is in the field of the philosophy of religion and ethics. In 1963 he was named academic dean at Western and professor of Christian ethics and philosophy of religion. He now continues in that post under the new administrative structure.

Dr. Thomas is now serving as the minister of the historic First Reformed Church of Albany, N.Y. He is a 1941 graduate of Rutgers University and graduated in 1944 from New Brunswick Theological Seminary. During his term of service as president the General Synod in 1961-62, Central College of Pella, Iowa conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity. In 1966 he received the Master's degree in theology from Union Theological Seminary in New York City. He served as an army chaplain during the Korean war.

The new appointments were made in consultation with each faculty and the executive committee of the Board of Theological Education, Reformed Church in America.

Kleinheksel became business manager at Western in 1961. Recently his title was changed to that of Assistant to the President. A graduate of Hope College, Kleinheksel came to Western from his position as production manager of the Holland-Suco Color, a division of Chemtron Corporation.

Gates has been at New Brunswick since 1961 serving as business manager there. A graduate of Syracuse University, he was employed as eastern sales manager for the Twin Harbors

Lumber Company of New York City prior to his coming to New Brunswick.

The Curriculum Design Committee, named earlier by the board, and composed of faculty and students of the two seminaries, is expected to make its final report to the board in the fall of 1969. Synod Plans Committee On Dissolution

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J. — After hours of heated debate which ended Wednesday at 1 a.m., the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America adopted a Plan for Understanding which is intended to prevent the eventual dissolution of the historic church.

The plan calls for a committee of 18 to be named to "explore every possibility for understanding and reconciliation within the RCA." However, if differences within the denomination appear to be irreconcilable and non-negotiable, another Committee of 18 may be appointed in 1970 to draft a plan for the orderly dissolution of the Reformed Church in America, that plan to be reported to the Synod of 1971.

Dr. Harold J. Schut, Scotia, N. Y., brought the original resolution for dissolution before the Synod Monday and served as chairman of the ad hoc committee appointed to study the matter. He termed it "the greatest issue to face our church in all its history."

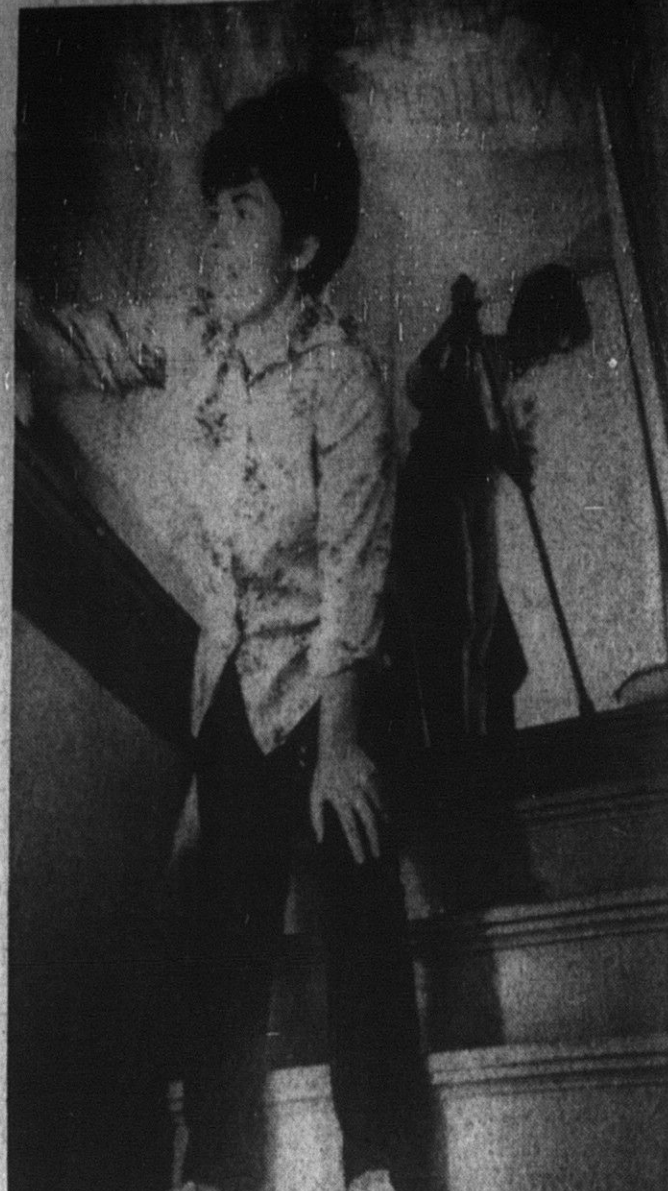
During the long discussion, delegates heard emotional pleas for church unity as speakers called upon Synod to "not break up the church."

Others expressed the hope that by facing the realities of dissolution and its attendant problems, a stronger basis for unity might be found.

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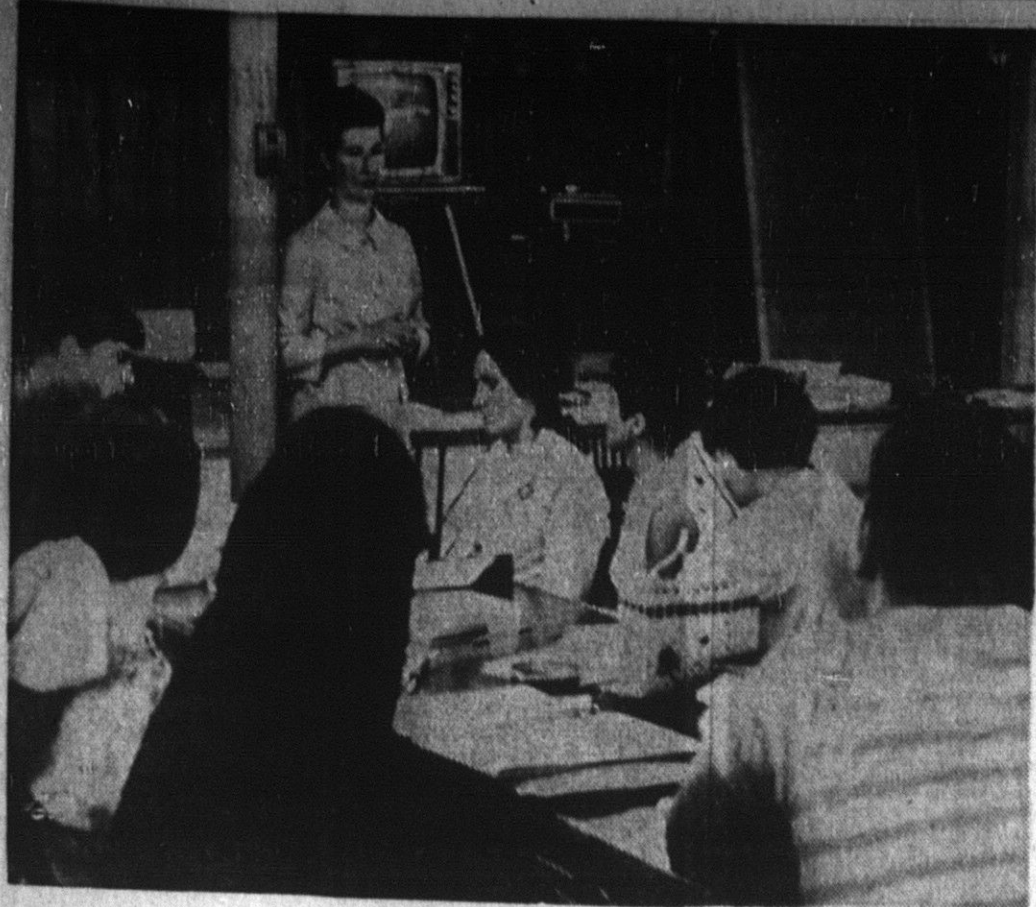

First Migrant Head Start Program Located in Holland

St. Francis school was the scene of a week-long training session which ended Friday for a staff of some 80 teachers, teacher aides and nursing personnel who will work in Migrant Head Start and Infant Nursery programs for the next four months.

The Pine Creek School in Holland is one of three centers in western Michigan which will serve migrant children aged one month to five years from mid-June until mid-October. A fourth center will operate in Saginaw

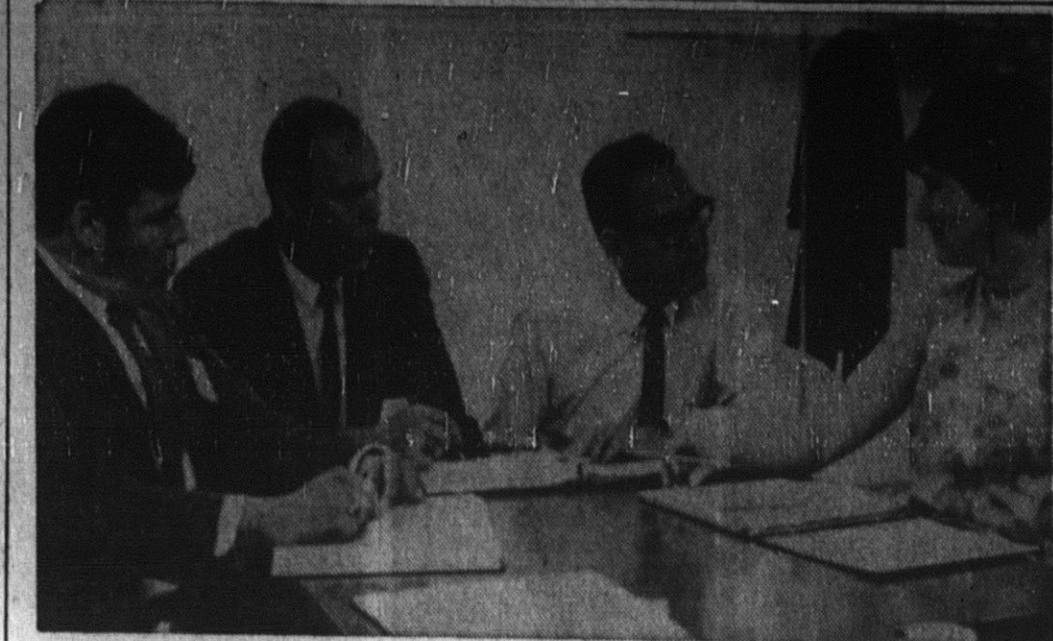
until mid-November.

All of the programs are under the sponsorship of United Migrants for Opportunity, Inc., which is the official migrant agency in the state of Michigan funded by the Office of Economic Opportunity.

T. Kevin Glynn, Head Start Director for United Migrants for Opportunity, Inc., explained that Michigan was chosen for this experimental and demonstration program on how best to provide Head Start services to a mobile population because it

is the third largest user of migrant labor in the United States and because the migrants remain in the state for a relatively long period of time. Some 90,000 migrants come to work in Michigan each year between April and late November.

School age migrant children as well as some pre-schoolers are enrolled in summer education programs operated by local school districts for four to eight weeks but many children are not reached by these programs. The UMOI program will enroll migrant children between infancy and five years of age. A nursery staff headed by a registered nurse will care for the 30 children under 2½ years of age who will be enrolled at

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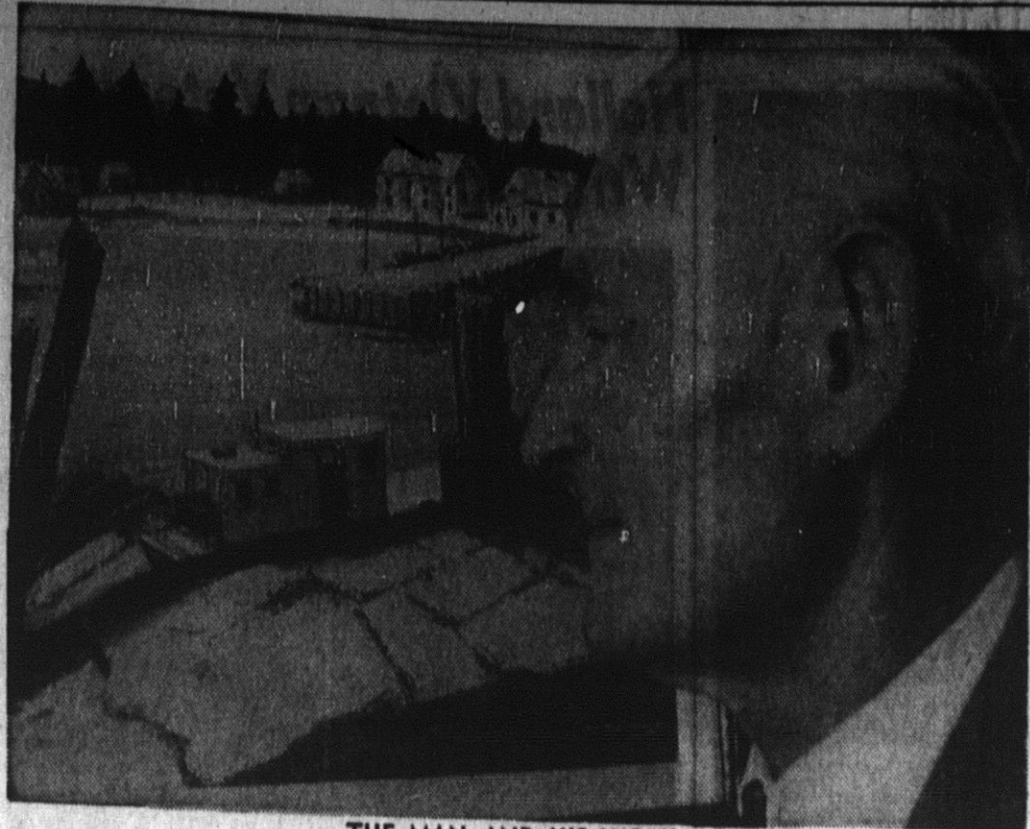
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THE MAN AND HIS WORK

Cartoonist Turned Painter Exhibits at Holland Hospital

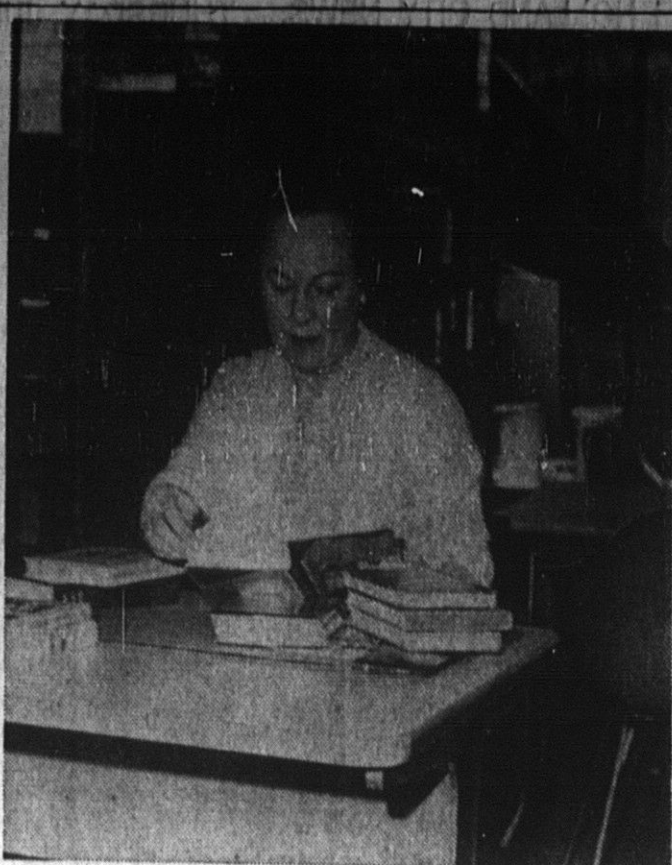

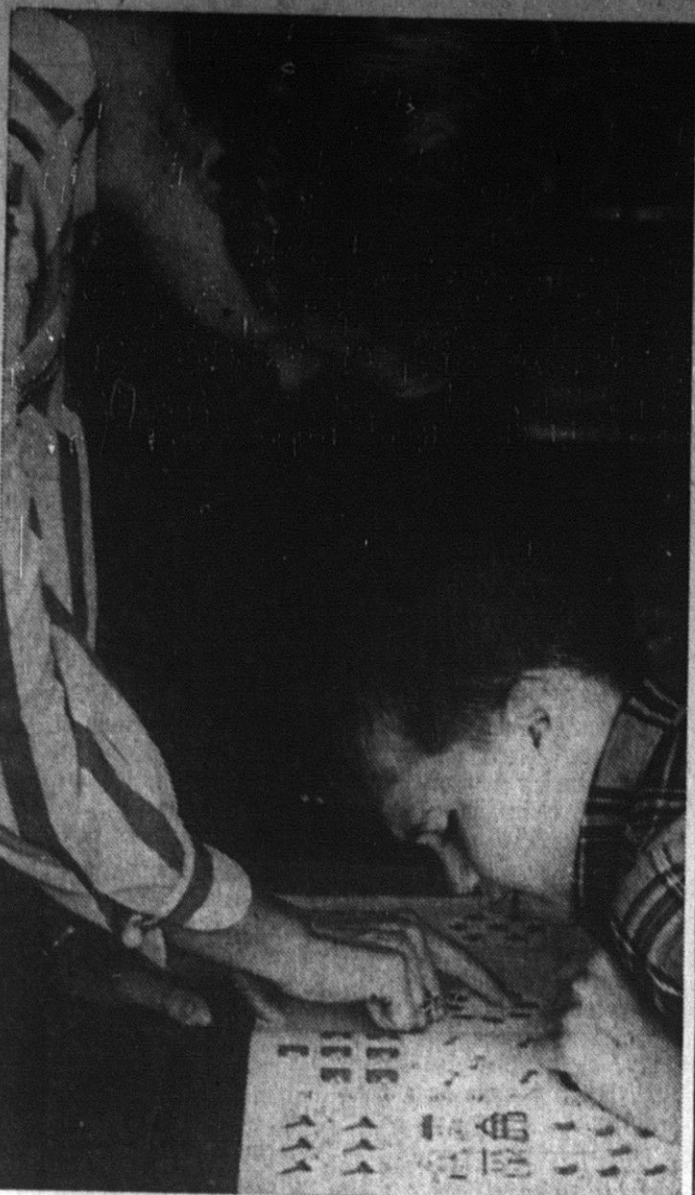
Ottawa County 4-H News

This camp will help these young people understand the importance of our natural resources and their interrelationships. The experience should be especially beneficial for youth from urban areas who have not previously had the opportunity for this type of exposure.

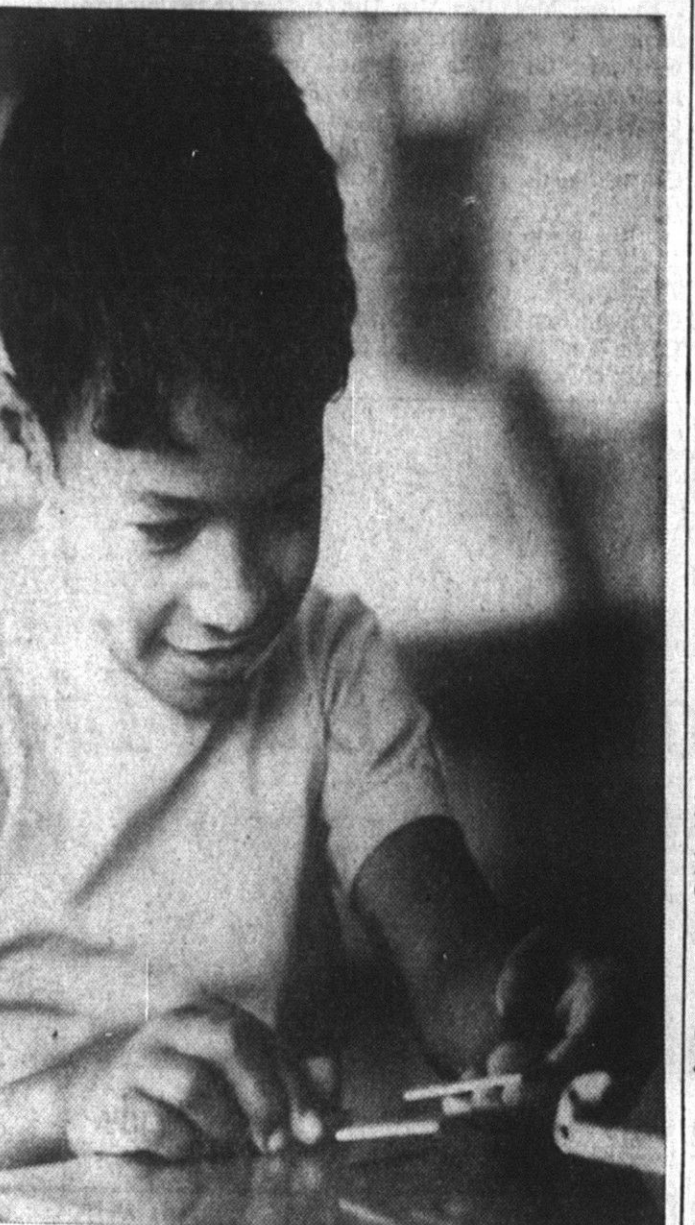
The Ottawa County delegates to the camp will concentrate on four areas of natural resources—soil, forests, water and wildlife. Each day at the camp will be action-packed from "first call" at 6:20 to "lights out" at 11 p.m. The week's activities will include a trip to the Upper Peninsula experimental forest, an electrofishing demonstration, a visit to the Marquette fish hatchery and a trip to the Au Train Lake area and the Lake Superior shore. There will also be a boat trip to the Pictured Rocks and visits to the Casino Wildlife Experiment Station and the Seney National Wildlife Refuge.

Discussions at the end of each day's activities will integrate the newly learned information into an understanding of the total environment. 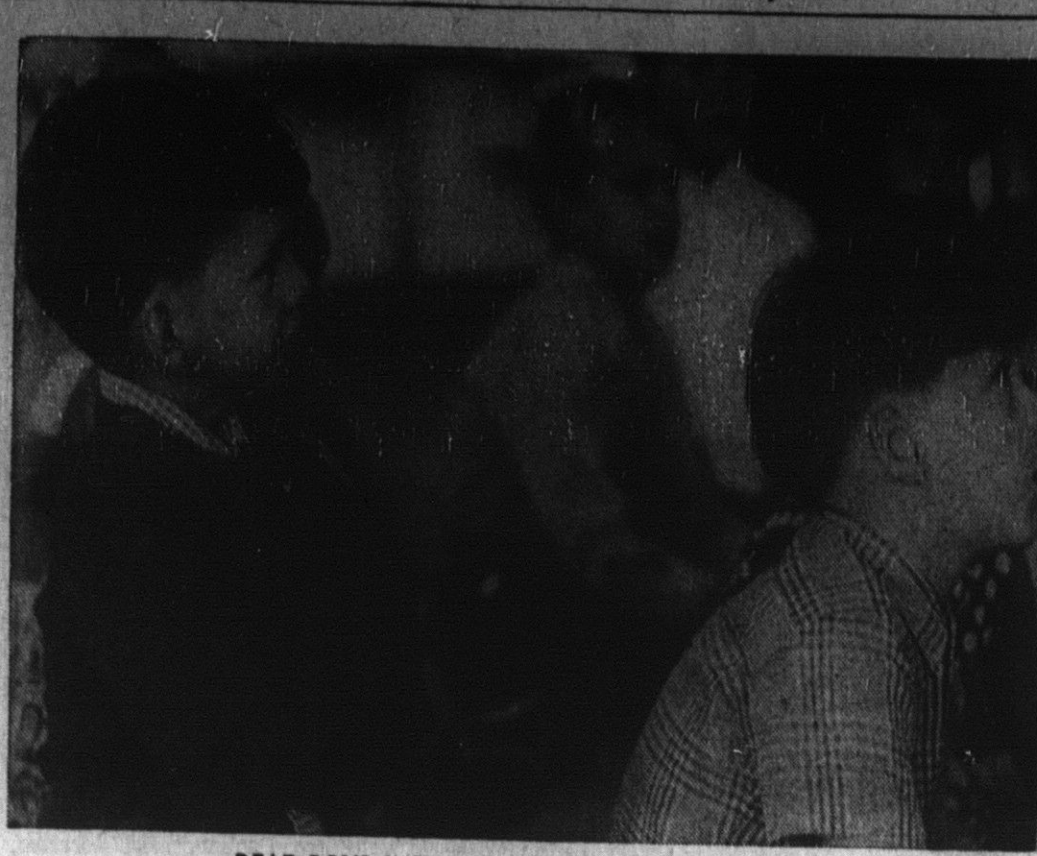
for both breeding and market classes, at the Ron Machiele farm in Zeeland on Tuesday evening, June 24 starting at 7 p.m. Graydon Blank from the Animal Husbandry Dept. at M.S.U. will give us considerable information about housing, feeding, fitting, showing and grooming of lambs. Any leaders or members involved or interested in the sheep project are urged to attend.

A beef tour and clinic have been set up for June 28, with Dick Dunn, specialist from Michigan State University, on hand to explain and discuss the beef project. The clinic will start at 9 a.m. at the Paul Allen Farm located at 7432 Home-rich, Byron Center. From there we will go to the Andy Van Dyke farm at 3675 40th Ave. in Hudsonville. Then at 10:30 a.m. we will go to the Marvin Overway farm at 4175 40th St. in Hudsonville and from there to the Jim Victory place at 5790 22nd Ave., Hudsonville. We hope to be completed there by 12 or 12:15 and after lunch we will go to the Gene Hovingh farm which is 3/4 mile north of Allendale.

After this stop we will go to one more farm which will be named at a later date. Each member should take a sample of their animal's feed with them to this meeting and they should also know the approximate weight of their animal. Mr. Dunn will talk about feeding, housing, pasture, and fitting and showing at each of the stops. We will also discuss the fair procedure, as it has been changed.

We are in the process of setting up three horse clinics. The first one is planned for Monday, June 30. The Jamestown 4-H Club will sponsor this county wide fitting, showing and grooming clinic. Time and place will be announced later. On Wednesday, July 2 another clinic will be held at the Abel Kuyers place on 120th Ave., just north of Holland.

Exceptional Program Aids Handicapped

The basic right of every child to the education of which he is capable is the motivating force behind the Special Education Department of Ottawa County.

With this in mind the program which began with a single multiple-handicapped room after World War I has grown to a six part program helping nearly 200 children. The help is given in occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech correction, to the physically handicapped, oral deaf, and the educable mentally retarded.

The hope for the future is for a room for the socially and emotionally disturbed, the perceptually handicapped, the blind, and for more qualified teachers.

This community was farsighted enough to begin work with the handicapped long before special funds were available. Presently it is operating on funds granted through Ottawa county and the State Department of Education. In 1955 the program moved to Jefferson School with three rooms for the physically handicapped, mentally handicapped and orthopedic. It was placed under the direction of Carroll W. Norlin.

Since then it has grown steadily.

Today's operation involves 16 teachers, and children through age 12. A continuing program is being developed in the junior and senior high schools with five teachers to provide the needed follow-up when the students leave Jefferson.

The children begin work with specially trained teachers in classes small enough to offer the needed individual attention. They are taught to define their problem and then how to cope with it. The deaf learn to read lips. The mentally retarded are taught the three R's at their own speed. The physically handicapped learn to perform the simple actions so many of us take for granted but which mean months of work and concentration for them.

From this point the hope is that the children will be able to be placed in a regular classroom and compete with others who lack their handicap. With continuing counseling for the child and his new teacher this hope of integration is working well.

Once through with school

these children are more than able to hold their own in normal society. Some of the finest workers in the community are drawn from their ranks. They have learned to discipline themselves, to work hard, and most important, do not become bored with the repetitiveness often connected with assembly line work.

The problem confronting the Special Education Department today is the need to educate the public. People must learn to accept and integrate the physically and mentally handicapped into normal society. It will do no good to ignore and isolate these people. Such an action will never solve the problem, it can only aggravate it. These people can cope with their handicap, can be educated, and can make a contribution. It is much easier to aid them at this stage in their life than to place them on the welfare roles or institutionalize them for life. But beyond such a mercenary attitude is the acknowledgment that their handicaps do not lessen them as individuals or their right to an education.

Californian Recalls Slower Paced Holland

Reminiscences of an earlier Holland were recalled by Willis G. Hop, currently a resident of La Habra, Calif., who can't quite forget the town he grew up in. Like an old saying, he says "You can take the boy out of Holland, Mich., but you can't take Holland, Mich., out of the boy."

Back on Nov. 11, 1918, bands were playing and loud noises were coming from downtown and while I was only four years old I left my home at 13th St. and Central Ave. and headed for downtown. It was Armistice or Peace Day as they called it then. That parade of people went west on Eighth St. up to the old tannery ruins (now Civic Center). By the time I got home, my mother was worried and I got a spanking.

I remember those Memorial Day parades through the years. Dr. William Westrate used to ride a spirited horse. When you saw him in his officer's uniform it reminded you of General "Black Jack" Pershing, another striking figure on horseback.

The old Strand Theatre was located on Eighth St. between Central and River Ave. (Now site of the the serpentine garden wall of First National Bank). For the Saturday matinee we would see a newsreel, comedy, weekly serial and a full length feature film with Tom Mix, William S. Hart or maybe even Joot Gibson . . . all for 10 cents.

Another bargain was at Fabiano's ice cream parlor where for 10 cents you could get a "tin roof" which translated was chocolate marshmallow ice cream sundae with fresh warm Spanish peanuts on top.

Those were the days when you could get a peck bag of fresh toasted broken rug for only a quarter from the Rusk Co. on east Eighth St.

I remember the fairgrounds on East 16th St. next to Pilgrim Home Cemetery. Harness racing was popular in those days and a man named Nichols who was year-round caretaker of the grounds also was a popular driver.

Just about the most exciting experience in those years was to see the horse drawn wagons going to fires with a loud bell ringing as it went on its way.

In the late 1920's a tragedy on Lake Macatawa claimed the lives of four persons when a speedboat piloted by Paul Landwehr hit the sidewheel of one of the boats. Paul and his cousin, John Nystrom, were among the victims.

In those days the interurban cars ran from Grand Rapids to Macatawa Park. These oversized street cars ran down Eighth St. to River Ave., south to 13th St. and then west to Jenison and Macatawa Parks. At the time Jenison Park was a popular amusement Park and many picnics were held there for churches, lodges and other large groups. Besides a roller coaster, ferris wheel and merry-go-round, the park had the best cotton candy machine in Western Michigan.

Dutch children in Holland didn't have to wait until Saturday night for a bath in the summer. They would just head east on 24th St. on their bikes about two miles past Bush and Lane Piano Co. (now Baker Furniture Co. and visit the "ole swimming hole," also known as Big Creek. Only boys went and they didn't use bathing suits.

Who could forget Minnie K. Smith, the principal of Junior High School, and E. E. Fell, superintendent of schools. These devoted educators held their positions for many years.

I remember when very few streets were paved in Holland. Busiest thoroughfares were Eighth St. and River Ave. and they were of brick pavement.

And who can forget the city dump on Sixth St. between Central and College Aves. Coal furnaces were used in those days and that meant ashes had to be carted to the dump, on small wagons in clear weather and sleds when there was snow. You can't say I didn't help build Holland.

Those two lovable and wonderful home town characters, Lardy and Yocum, enlivened man; a show on Saturday nights in the Holland Theatre, especially when there was vaudeville. They both had infectious laughs and when they laughed everybody had to join in—even the vaudevillians.

This pair also would show up at baseball and basketball games and other functions. They produced a lot of hilarity and fun for the residents of Holland.

When I was 11 years old, I became the proud possessor of Holland Evening Sentinel newspaper route No. 9. My predecessor was Watson Spoelstra who later became a reporter for The Sentinel and then sports writer in Detroit. When I was 11 the

Sentinel was located on River Ave. between Seventh and Eighth Sts. Across the street at Seventh and River was the Dutch newspaper De Grondwet. This newspaper helped out several times when The Sentinel presses broke down. Pay Day was every second Tuesday. We received two silver dollars and two dimes. One dime was sure to wind up at Fabiano's for a "tin roof."

These are just a few pleasant memories I have about happy boyhood days in Holland. The unpleasant things I have long since forgotten.

Holland Vietnam Veteran Writes to President Nixon

A Vietnam veteran from Holland has written to the President of the United States with his opinions of the war in Vietnam. He is Sgt. Charles S. Van Ark, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Van Ark, 588 Graafschap Rd.

Sgt. Van Ark, wounded in Vietnam Jan. 1, 1969, has been on convalescent leave in Holland and has now returned to a New Jersey hospital for therapy.

In his letter to President Nixon, Sgt. Van Ark said in part "I ask you as a veteran of the war in Vietnam to please consider carefully any terms for peace which you might be contemplating. While it is true that many people consider this war to be totally unnecessary, a waste of both men and materials, yet I have seen the results of terrorist tactics first hand."

"I served with the 25th Infantry Division, and saw many instances of civilians mutilated for their support of the Saigon government, or just for living their own lives. A 15-year-old girl whose eyes had been put out; a 10-year-old boy whose leg had been hacked off at the knee, little children whose fingers had been chopped off."

"Yes, the war is a terrible thing, but perhaps there are some things worse—the Communists who committed these deeds want to take over the whole of South Vietnam. Their peace terms are the submission of the United States of America to their will and to her humiliation."

"If South Vietnam is allowed to fall into the hands of these evil men, then what? Another whole nation of people will then be taught to hate the free world, another people will become our enemy. They will never have the chance which all men deserve, of discovering, on their own, the advantages of freedom."

"I cannot forget an old woman, who, after the rockets and the artillery and the machine guns had torn up part of her village, Dodge City East, in September, 1968, cried on my shoulder as the Americans swept through. Though I could speak no Vietnamese and she could speak no English, she conveyed her hatred of the Viet Cong. She pointed to several sacks of rice which she indicated were taxes exacted by them."

"I do not know the exact figure to date, but I do know that about 35,000 Americans have lost their lives in Vietnam already—not to mention the suffering of the maimed and wounded. While this is indeed tragic, I feel it would be infinitely more tragic to allow the battle to go for naught."

Who does not have some friend or relative who has made the supreme sacrifice in Vietnam? Can we say with a clear conscience I'm sorry, John, but

your son died in vain. We've changed administrations now, so the war has to be halted. Public opinion, you understand, don't you?"

"After Vietnam the Communists will take Cambodia, Laos, Thailand, yes, all of Indo-China. They continue to promote revolutions in Africa and South America. Their declared aim is to take over the whole world, by force if necessary or expedient."

"Mr. President, I feel that it is not in America's best interest to turn over South Vietnam to the enemy. We must, and I pray, will, defeat the Communists in this and any other theater in which they threaten the rights and lives of free men."

"I thank you for your time, I am and will continue praying for you and for a just and lasting peace." The letter was signed Charles S. Van Ark, Sgt., Infantry.

Sgt. Van Ark was wounded on New Year's Day, 1969 near Saigon when a Chinese Communist grenade exploded a mine lacerating his right ankle and shrapnel wounds in the left leg which was broken and in a cast for many months. He was given emergency treatment and sent to the hospital in Okinawa. He arrived in this country on Feb. 5 for further treatment. Currently he is at Fort Dix, N.J., undergoing therapy at Walston Hospital.

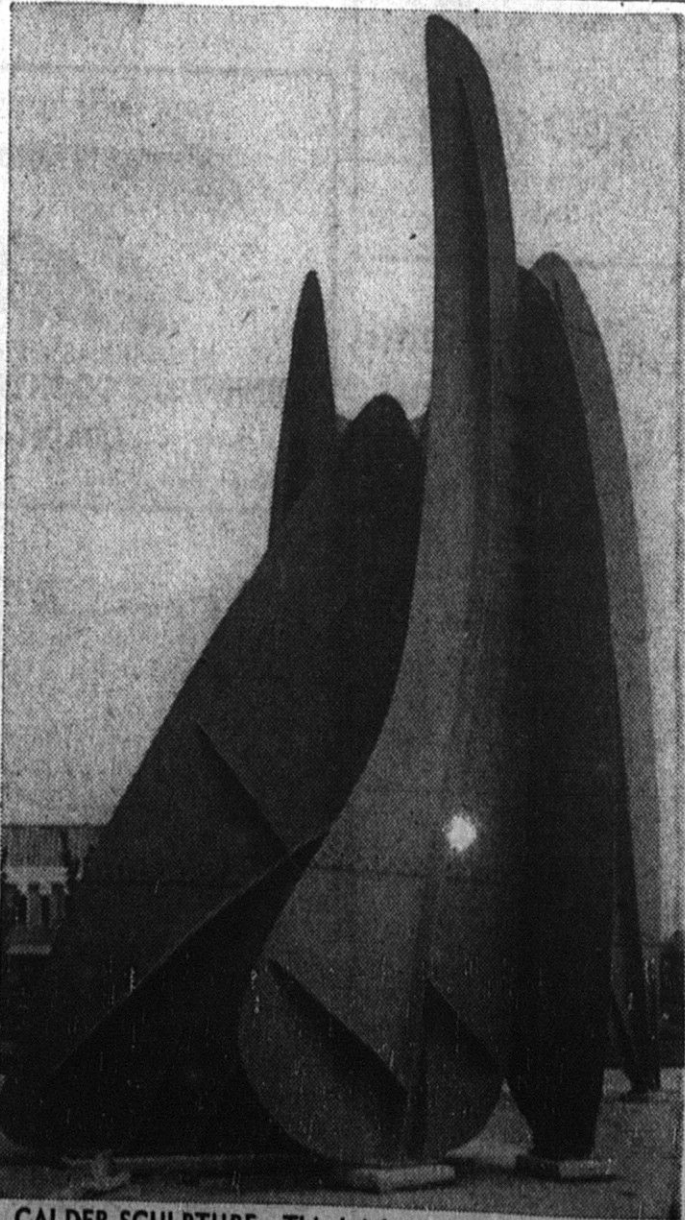

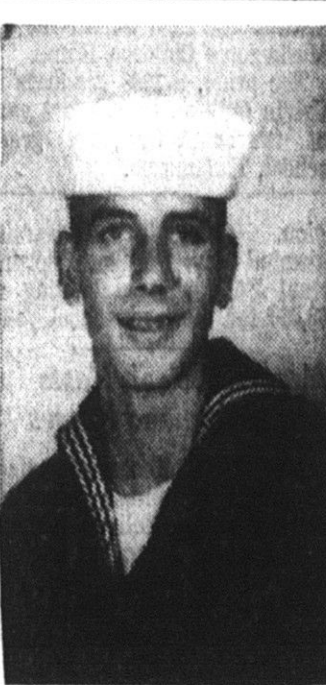

Holland Graduates Hear Dr. Harrison

Dr. Clinton B. Harrison who graduated from Holland High School in 1939 and became a distinguished neuro surgeon in Baltimore, Md., pointed to the traditions of excellence of Holland High School when he addressed the 320 graduates at the school's 36th commencement Thursday night in Civic Center.

He gave a moving tribute to the late J. J. Riersma who served as principal of the high school almost 40 years. It was in the Riersma home that Dr. Harrison and his two brothers grew up.

Aware that the present generation did not know Principal Riersma, Dr. Harrison said, "You should know a little about him, how he worked to produce a tradition of excellence here that became known far and wide, how he rejected flattering offers from elsewhere, how he personally worked out schedules for all students every summer and how he often got out of bed at midnight to intercede for students at police headquarters who were in trouble. He would work out disciplinary solutions with parents and saved many, many young people from police records."

"Jock Riersma was feared, loved, liked and disliked, but he was respected by all and was universally trusted. Your principal today is another man in another time, but he is building on the tradition of people like Jock Riersma, and many of you will not appreciate the fine education you have received at Holland High until you are thrown together with young people from many other places in your college years."

Dr. Harrison spoke of the problems confronting the world today, the criticism of moral deterioration and the threats to existence — nuclear, chemical, biological weapons, population explosion, pollution and war — all of them man made. He said some commencement speakers would have despair outweigh hope because of the Vietnam war, but in a brief review of history he concluded that what is going on in the world today is not much different from other times despite an inordinate amount of propaganda over the present war, and he was inclined to be hopeful.

Principal Fred Bertsch Jr. called the role while Supt. Donald L. Ihrman presented diplomas. The traditional Elgar Processional music was provided by the school orchestra under

Gerrit Van Ravenswaay. Class President Steven E. Browe announced class gifts to school in memory of Robert C. Ford of the faculty who died the past year. Gusty Winds Sweep Storm in Holland

Ominous skies clouded Holland area Thursday afternoon as gusty winds swept a brief cloudburst that left a .27-inch rainfall. Rain, hail and high winds spawned isolated damage in other sections of Lower Michigan as part of the thunderstorm system that accompanied a four-state tornado watch bulletin issued at 1 p.m.

Storm damage in Holland was at a minimum with Holland police receiving a few reports of tree branches down on private property. Police patrolled on special weather watch along with Ottawa county sheriff's deputies, civil defense personnel and CBERS.

Ottawa deputies reported heavy winds blew a pickup truck off the road on Quincy St. a half mile west of 136th Ave., slamming it into a bridge railing and guard post. Driver Douglas Craig Van Hill, 17, of 10880 Chicago Dr., Zeeland, escaped injury deputies said.

Deputies also reported a tree was blown across Paw Paw Dr. south of M-21 at 3:35 p.m.

The storm swept across Lake Michigan from Wisconsin with winds whipping between 30 and 40 knots as they hit here, according to Holland Coast Guardsmen.

At 3:30 p.m., Ottawa County Civil Defense Director Glen Timmer said warning sirens were sounded in Coopersville as heavy winds turned over small buildings and carports. Visibility was reported at zero.

Several water spouts were reported sighted over Lake Michigan west of Holland around 2:55 p.m.

Hail and high winds were reported in Borculo, Spring Lake, Hudsonville, Zeeland and Jenison where it was reported an 8 x 10 metal shed was blown down. Ottawa county civil defense personnel said slight damage was reported to trees and buildings in the areas.

ESSA weather bureau issued the all-clear for Allegan, Ottawa, Kent, Van Buren and Berrien counties at 5 p.m.

Timmer said an unconfirmed report of a funnel at Riverside Park near Grand Haven was made at 9:26 p.m.

Power was out on Van Buren, east of Hudsonville, and Timmer said civil defense generators were prepared to assist farmers in that area with milking the cows; however, power was restored in time.

A tornado touched down seven miles north of Centerville at 5:12 p.m. Thursday, tearing apart three mobile homes. Five persons in the trailers were injured, three of them seriously.

There were unconfirmed reports of tornadoes at Clare and near Pinconning in Lower Michigan where a truck was reported overturned. Trees were up-

rooted and power lines downed in other areas.

Consumers Power Co. reported 82,000 customers lost power during the night in several parts of the state, 50,000 of them in Flint for about an hour and 15 minutes at about 7 p.m. Thursday. Power also went out at Bay City, Grand Rapids, Lansing and Mount Pleasant.

About 4,000 customers were still without power after daybreak, most of them in the Grand Rapids area.

At Otsego, firemen rigged an emergency generator at the high school for the community of 5,000 so high school commencement could proceed without a hitch.

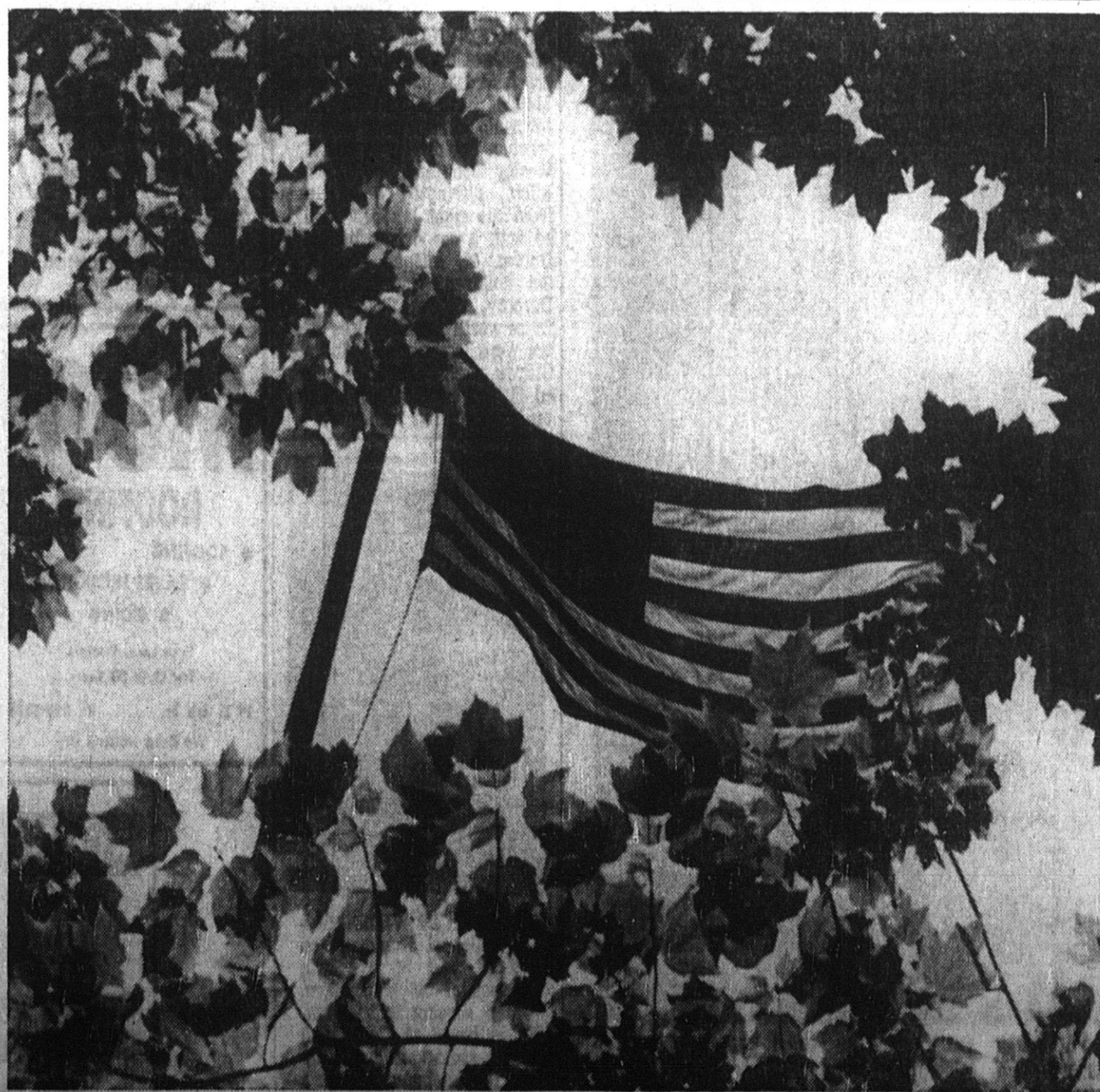

A study of the molecular basis for chemical reactions which occur at surfaces is to be pursued at Hope College by Dr. Dwight M. Smith, professor of chemistry, with the support of a \$12,000 research grant from the Petroleum Research Fund.

Dr. Smith will be aided in this research project, entitled "Infrared Spectra of Adsorbed Molecules," by several Hope chemistry students.

"Chemical reactions at surfaces are of great importance in the industrial production of chemicals, responsible for corrosion and of significance in biochemical processes," said Dr. Smith. "Little direct evidence for the molecular basis of such reactions now exists."

The project initially will involve the use of infrared spectrophotometers in conjunction with high vacuum systems to examine the structure and strength of bonding of molecules to solid surfaces. The information obtained through such studies may yield not only fundamental knowledge about adsorption, but could also result in improved catalyst materials for the production of industrial chemicals.

The Petroleum Research Fund, endowed by a group of major oil companies and administered by the American Chemical Society, has supported several basic research projects at Hope in recent years. The grants provide funds for the supplies used in the research and stipends for student participants.

Presently participating with Dr. Smith in the surface chemistry research are Charles Lieder, a senior from Dearborn; Stephen Parker, a senior from Ridgewood, N.J.; and Mark Van Dort, a junior from Zeeland.

More than 60 countries are involved in this annual exchange of about 5,000 young men and women between the United States and 100 nations around the world.

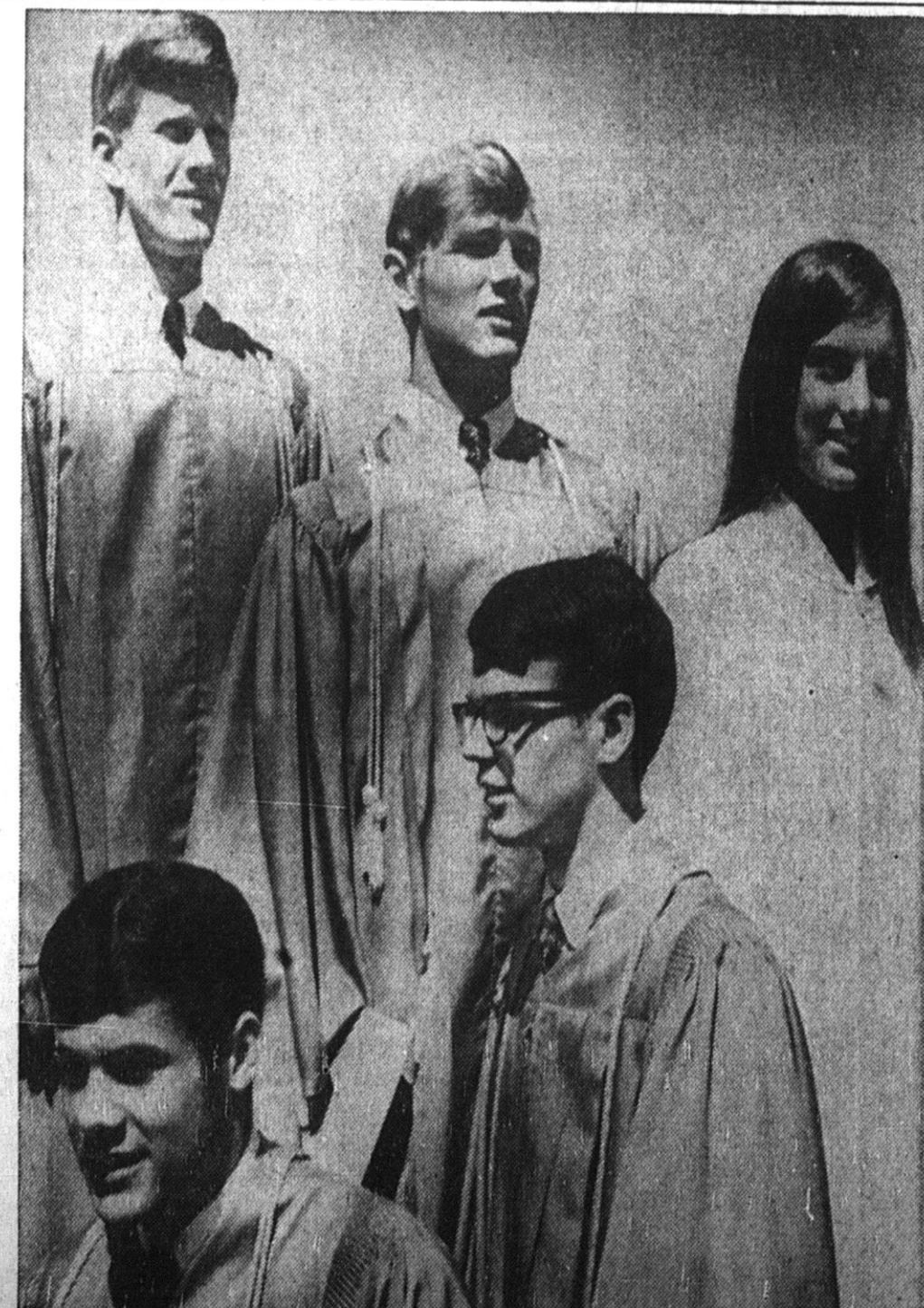
