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## More Plans For 125th Anniversary

Plans are progressing for celebrating Holland's 125th anniversary next year.

At a meeting of the committee Tuesday night in the mayor's office in City Hall, plans were confirmed for an opening religious service Feb. 6, 1972, in Dimment Memorial Chapel, the site of a similar service during Holland's centennial in 1947. Dr. Bastian Kruijthof is serving as chairman of the religious committee. Time was tentatively set at 2 p.m. Holland was founded Feb. 9, 1847.

Efforts are also being made to provide a bulletin cover with appropriate legend for all churches in Holland area Feb. 6, 1972.

It was announced that the Holland Herald, a Netherlands publication, is considering dedicating an issue to Holland, Mich. early in 1972. The editor, Vernon Leonard, visited Holland two years ago for a Tulip Time issue, but the issue was replaced at that time by a Japanese exposition issue. A sales representative of Holland Herald will arrive in Holland on Labor Day to solicit advertising for the special issue, over a two-week period.

Dr. H. J. Prakkie of Meppen, Drenthe, who was in Holland May 25 to present a replica of a Drenthe sculpture to the Netherlands Museum, is making plans for sending a delegation from The Netherlands by chartered plane to Holland during the 125th celebration.

Other possibilities presented were a documentary film, school and college participation, Spanish-American events, a fall celebration and colony tours. The possibility of bringing distinguished visitors to Hope College also was discussed.

Councilmen Albert Kleis Jr. and John Bloemendaal are serving as co-chairmen and William H. Vande Water will be executive secretary. Nick Prins of Fillmore township is joining Ray Van Den Brink of Holland township in area plans, and representatives also are sought from Laketown and Park townships.

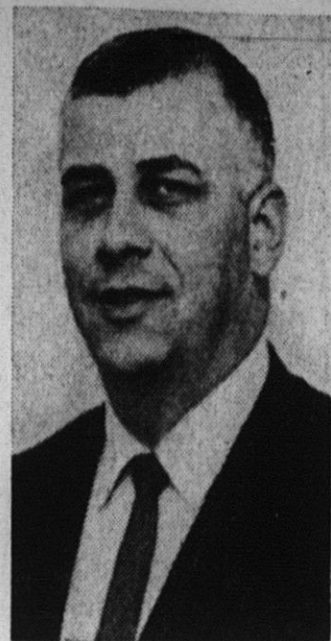

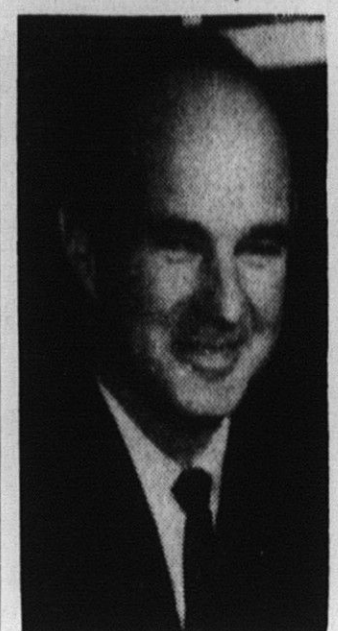

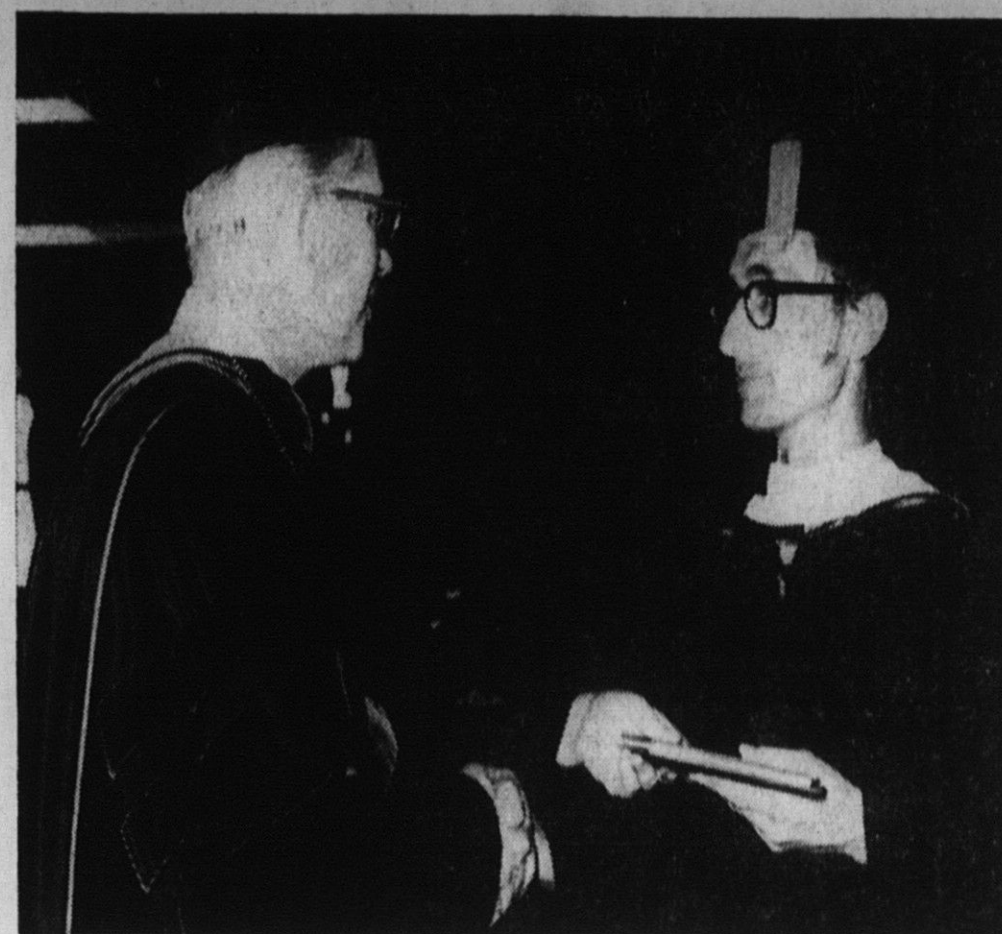

## County Acts On Program For Jobs

GRAND HAVEN—The Ottawa County Board of Commissioners

Tuesday unanimously approved a program under the Emergency Employment Act which allocated \$747,800 in federal and state funds for the county.

Final application for the funds are to be made by Sept. 10 and the board was to meet this afternoon with heads of departments and representative of cities, townships and schools in the county plus various county agencies.

The board has tentatively reserved 20 positions for county offices and departments. The action was taken as a guideline for directors of the program, William Kennedy of Allendale, chairman of the board, and Larry Hildore of Holland, Director of the Department of Social Services.

County positions available for hiring of unemployed under the program include personnel in Circuit Court, Clerk's office, Sheriff's department, Register of Deed office, Health Department, Equalization department, Maintenance and Probation office.

Under terms of the program, preference for hiring will be given to unemployed returning Vietnam veterans, persons over 55 years of age, persons from minority groups, and welfare clients.

The applicants for the program must be unemployed and residents of the county. The program is for one year, renewable for a second year.

## County Sets Guidelines In Job Action

GRAND HAVEN — More than 60 representatives of governmental offices, cities, townships and villages and schools met with the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners Tuesday afternoon to speed up the Federal Emergency Employment Act program in the county. The board had met in a special session in the morning to pass a resolution, adopting the program.

More than \$800,000 in federal, state and local funds may be available under the program for one year, Chairman William Kennedy of the board said. The emergency program has been set up on a two-year basis, he explained.

Larry Hildore, county social services director, is administrator of the program and is receiving requests from various units for "slots" in the program. Between 80 and 90 persons may be hired under the plan. The county has been allocated state and federal monies totaling \$746,000 and local units must contribute 10 per cent additional, Hildore said.

After the program was outlined, requests for employees immediately came in and a total of 36 were received Tuesday. Others may be made with the director at his office at Holland.

The federal government has set Sept. 10 as the deadline for applications for various agencies. Hildore reported that 18 positions have been set aside tentatively for county operation. These included additional deputies, a jail matron, help for the planning committee of the county, and clerks in circuit court, clerk's offices, health office, juvenile court and the offices of the treasurer and register of deeds.

There were 65 men and women present at the afternoon session.

Included in the 36 requests received so far are 12 from general city operation, hospital and board of public works at Holland, five from North Ottawa hospital at Grand Haven, five from Grand Haven city, two from Spring Lake, Coopersville and Park township and several from townships.

Twenty-five positions were for school systems in the county, including teachers and other personnel. These positions will be filled through the intermediate area board of education office at Grand Haven.

Kennedy urged all local units to act this week in making formal applications for employees. The deadline for these requests was set for Sept. 5, to give the director time to process applications by Sept. 10.

Kennedy said a separate fund will be set up in a Zeeland bank for the program and monies will be forwarded to meet payroll, to be refunded later from Ottawa is eligible because of seven per cent unemployment.

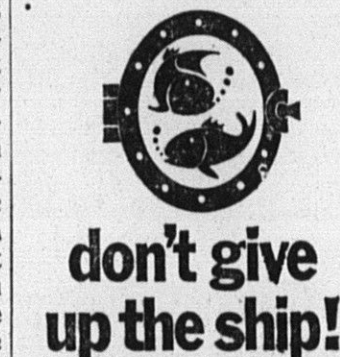

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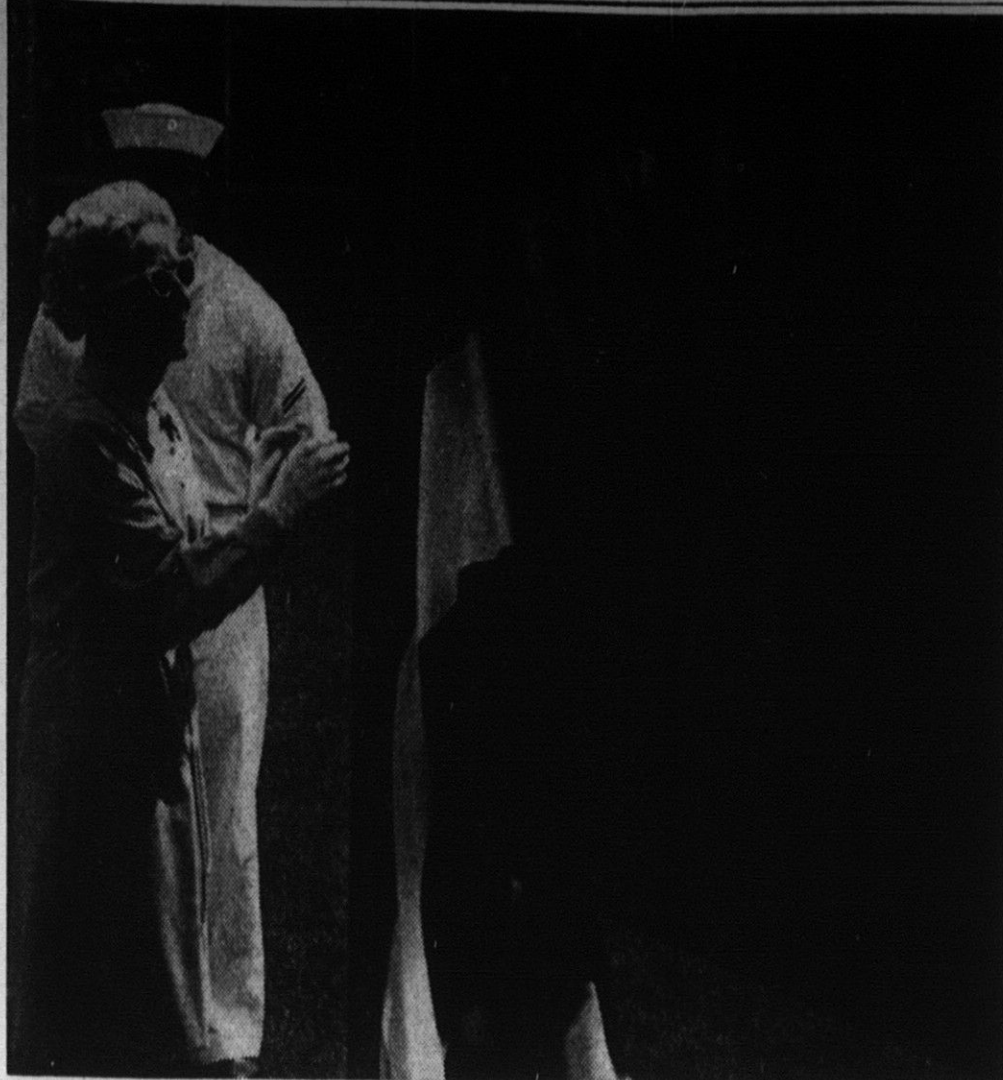

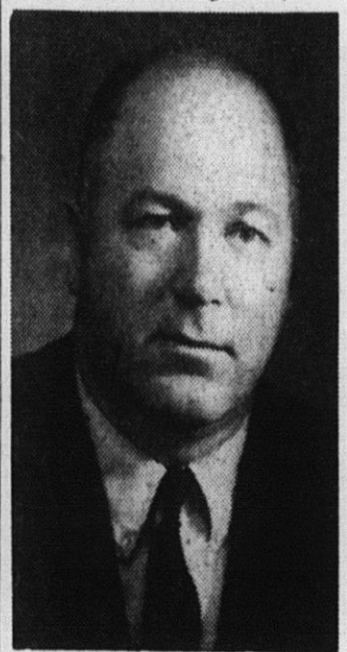

Lindstrom said state fireworks laws prohibit use of such a cannon device.

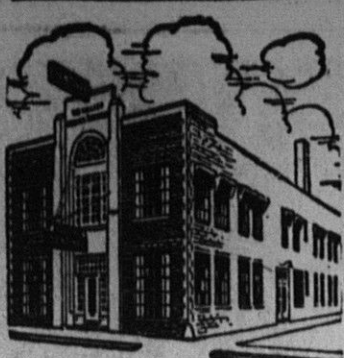
## Woman Loses Clothing, Jewels While Bathing

The Amtrak TurboTrain making a tour of the nation is put forward as an innovation which may in time become a widely patronized alternative to air and road travel. The TurboTrain is fast, capable of cruising at 140 miles an hour. That beats anything but aircraft, and considering the airport-to-town problem this would make rail travel attractive to many who want to get places in a reasonable hurry. The TurboTrain also is comfortable at high speeds.

To this must be added reliability, such amenities as good food at modest cost, and fares substantially below air fares. Plus, of course, far more than the present limited Amtrak routes. The TurboTrain is a start, but much remains to be done before Americans in large numbers will turn to rail travel.

#### Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Sept. 5  
Thinking About God  
Psalm 42:1-3; 53:1-2; 139:7  
Acts 17:22-33  
By C. P. Dame

During the last quarter of this year we will study the doctrine of God. In the first lesson we study three passages from the Old Testament and one from the New Testament which tell us what several writers of the Bible taught about God.

I. Some thirst for God. The Psalmist of old did. Who he was we do not know; perhaps it was David or some Levite who could not lead in the temple services. He could not worship in the temple; he missed fellowship with God's people; his surroundings were unpleasant; he felt ill at ease and there was an emptiness in his heart for the things of the world did not satisfy him. He expressed his feelings strongly in the words "panteth" and "thirsteth." Some people are like that writer of old — they long for God.

II. Some people deny the existence of God. Real atheists are few, but many people live as if God does not exist and they pay no attention to Him. The Psalmist calls the atheist a fool. The communists deny the existence of God and so there are many fools in this world. What we believe matters and what we do not believe also matters. Unbelief has consequences. When unbelief takes over, morality and authority go. History verifies the Psalmist who said, "Corrupt are they, and have done abominable iniquity." Crime and lawlessness abound, due to unbelief in God.

III. Some realize the omniscience and omnipotence of God. Belief in these two facts about God are important. The Psalmist knew he could not flee from God's presence. In this mobile age this truth ought to be remembered, for some people think they can do anything in a big city where no one knows them. And it is assuring to bear in mind that no matter where we go on our vacations or trips God is ever present. Practice the presence of God and you will be rewarded.

IV. Some search for God. Paul was in Athens, the intellectual center of Greece, and was disturbed by the many idols he saw there. One idol, dedicated to the unknown God, caught his attention and gave him a clue for the speech he was invited to make to the Athenian philosophers.

In his address Paul said that there is but one God who is the Creator and Ruler and the Parent of men who will judge mankind through Jesus Christ whom He raised from the dead. Some mocked; some postponed making a decision; some, just a few, believed and gained everlasting life.

The maximum temperature was 86 on Aug. 9 and 10. The maximum in July was 87 on July 7. July's average temperature was 64.5 degrees.

June was the hottest month in Holland this year with an average temperature of 69.3 degrees and 90-degree readings on three occasions. It was 94 on June 20, 91 on June 27 and 92 on June 28.

Minimum temperature in August was 40 degrees on Aug. 5. The average maximum was 78.8 and the average minimum 53.2.

Precipitation fell on 12 days. Fog was noted on at least eight occasions. There was a tornado watch with thunder and hail Aug. 10 and a severe thunderstorm watch Aug. 25.

Precipitation in July totaled 4.81 inches and in June 1.67 inches.

## Richard Machiele Retires from Post

Ottawa county lost an amiable, capable worker Tuesday with the resignation of Richard Machiele as Ottawa County Extension Director, a post he has held since 1953. Retirement comes after some 29 years of work in both Kent and Ottawa counties.

Machiele began his extension career in 1942 and spent some 11 years in Kent County before coming to Ottawa County where he has been for over 18 years. In Kent County, he spent seven years as assistant and associate director in charge of 4-H work.

Although he still does help out with the 4-H livestock programs, Machiele has been primarily involved in helping farms and farmers during his career in Ottawa County and, with the changed image of farmers and their businesses, he sees his role as a largely educational function. Farmers and farming are becoming more academic and, as a result, short courses in everything from farm management, a primary objective, to lawn and shrubbery, comprise a large portion of the work of the extension program.

As director of Ottawa County Extension, Machiele is employed by Michigan State University supported by federal and state funds. The county furnishes office space, secretaries, etc., and the services of the program are free. The supervisory staff is at MSU and Machiele is an educational representative of the university.

Born and raised in Borculo, Machiele taught school from 1930 to 1939 in a one-room rural school and then in a two-room Vriesland school before deciding he would like a degree in agricultural education. He ended up in the extension service as a result.

There have been tremendous changes in agriculture over the years, Machiele said, with the greatest coming about as a result of specialization and automation. He feels the greatest alterations have arisen in poultry, swine and dairy production with automation leading to fewer but larger farms and to the gradual phasing out of migrant laborers.

Farms in the county, and in the country in general, are becoming increasingly specialized, according to Machiele, and the old image of the general farm complete with cows, ducks, pigs, etc., and the object of every city child's greatest desire is long dead, and now even farmers buy milk from the supermarket! Today's farm usually specializes in one phase of farming and purchases other farm commodities, Machiele said, with some of the greatest examples of specialization within the past 15 years coming with the ornamental nursery business, sod farms, blueberry farm expansion and production of flowering plants.

The average private farm is just under 100 acres, small in comparison to farms in other areas of the state, and the commercial farms average between 160 and 260 acres in the county. Most of the farms in the county, according to Machiele, are "family" farms and are handed down from father to son or are father-son ventures with little hired labor; and, although they are involved with the extension service, the program does a great deal of work with the commercial farms.

The service is on call to help with farm problems in addition to its educational role and one of its programs deal with computer work. Computer programming is coming fast for farmers, Machiele said, and the county utilizes the University of Michigan computer to help solve various farm problems

such as whether or not to purchase a piece of equipment, feeding programs and herd expansion.

Agricultural income has increased tremendously within the past few years, although some of the increase can be traced to inflation, but costs are still gaining faster than income, Machiele said, adding that this has been true since 1914. Although the margin of profit is smaller each year, the county's agricultural income has continued to move ahead in the past few years and will continue to do so, Machiele feels, because of the great variety and number of enterprises developed. Ottawa county's income from agriculture presently outstrips that of Kent county, a situation Machiele remembers as just opposite not too many years ago.

With the multitude of new ideas and processes coming on to the agricultural scene, Machiele said he has found Ottawa County farmers cautious in the face of innovations. Once new ideas have been proven successful and there is evidence that they are improvements, the farmers are ready to accept such innovative programs as free-stall housing for dairy cattle.

"Gratifying" is the word Machiele used to sum up his years of work with county extension programs and he used the word emphatically with regard to the 4-H programs. Machiele said that prior 4-H experience has had a definitely positive effect on young people who have gone on to farms of their own; and he especially enjoyed being able to watch young people grow up and become successful after participation in extension projects.

Two examples of this success are Dr. Russell Mawby, president of the Kellogg Foundation, who was a 4-Her from Grand Rapids, and Dr. Dean Allen, a Sparta 4-H member who is presently state director of 4-H in the state of Washington.

Machiele said that 4-H emphasis has switched from the project to the individual in recent years and he believes the change has been for the better. While projects still evoke a great deal of interest and care, the organization is now more aware of the member's self image and some "way out" projects have been the result, Machiele remarked.

A great many young people are interested in farming in Ottawa county and Machiele foresees the county's agriculture passing into the hands of the young and predicts larger farms and increased volumes of business in the future. He feels, however, that efficient, specialized farms will survive regardless of their size.

Machiele, who makes his home with his wife at 895 Maple Lane, Zeeland, said he does not live on a farm because he does not have the extra time an efficient farm demands. His "recreation," however, is a large garden which his wife says is "enough for the whole neighborhood."

The couple has no definite plans for retirement but would like to travel and is interested in mission work. Machiele does plan to get in a little extra hunting, golfing and especially fishing; and, with their sons, Ron, Richard and Boyd, and families in the area, even retirement should keep Richard Machiele busy.

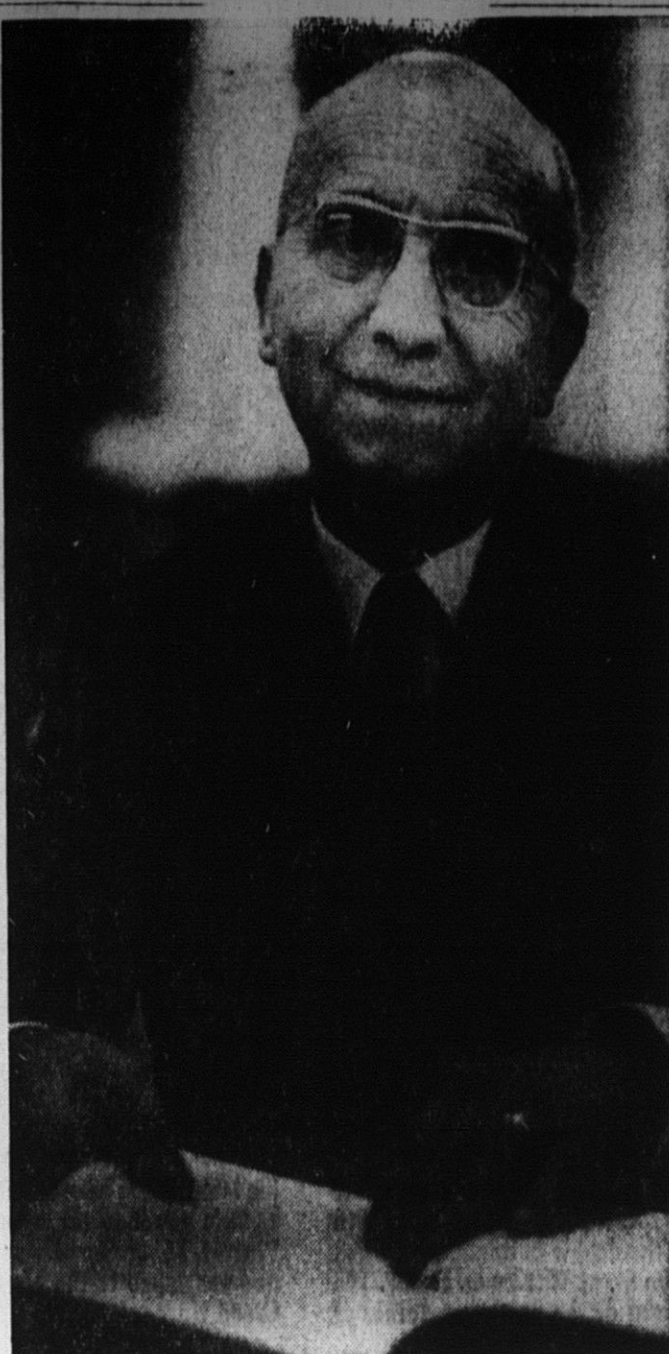

## U.S. Papers Collected For Library in Hungary

Renewing acquaintances in Holland are Dr. and Mrs. Kalman Ujszaszy and their daughter, Esther, who are in the United States to collect materials about the 130 Hungarian Reformed congregations in this country for deposit in their library at Sarospatok, Hungary.

While this is the first trip for Esther, Dr. and Mrs. Ujszaszy were here in 1965 when Dr. Ujszaszy delivered a series of lectures at Western Theological Seminary.

Their acquaintance with Holland reaches far beyond that, however, for Dr. Ujszaszy was head of the Sarospatok Reformed Academy, formerly a collection of a half dozen colleges, when Hope College assisted the 440-year-old Hungarian School.

Subsequently, local Reformed and Christian Reformed churches joined the effort and assisted the large 3,000-member Reformed congregation at Sarospatok ravaged by German and Russian armies during World War II. The relationship continued formally until 1951 when the Hungarian institution was nationalized after the Communist take-over of the country. Since then, contacts have been on an informal, personal basis.

Formerly a professor in the theological seminary at Sarospatok until its closing in 1951, Dr. Ujszaszy has since served as head librarian of the library there and was recently appointed director of the five libraries of the Reformed Church in Hungary. Mrs. Ujszaszy assists in the church museum and Esther works in the municipal library at Sarospatok.

Arriving in Holland June 9, they spent 10 days here before visiting Hungarian records elsewhere to assemble records and

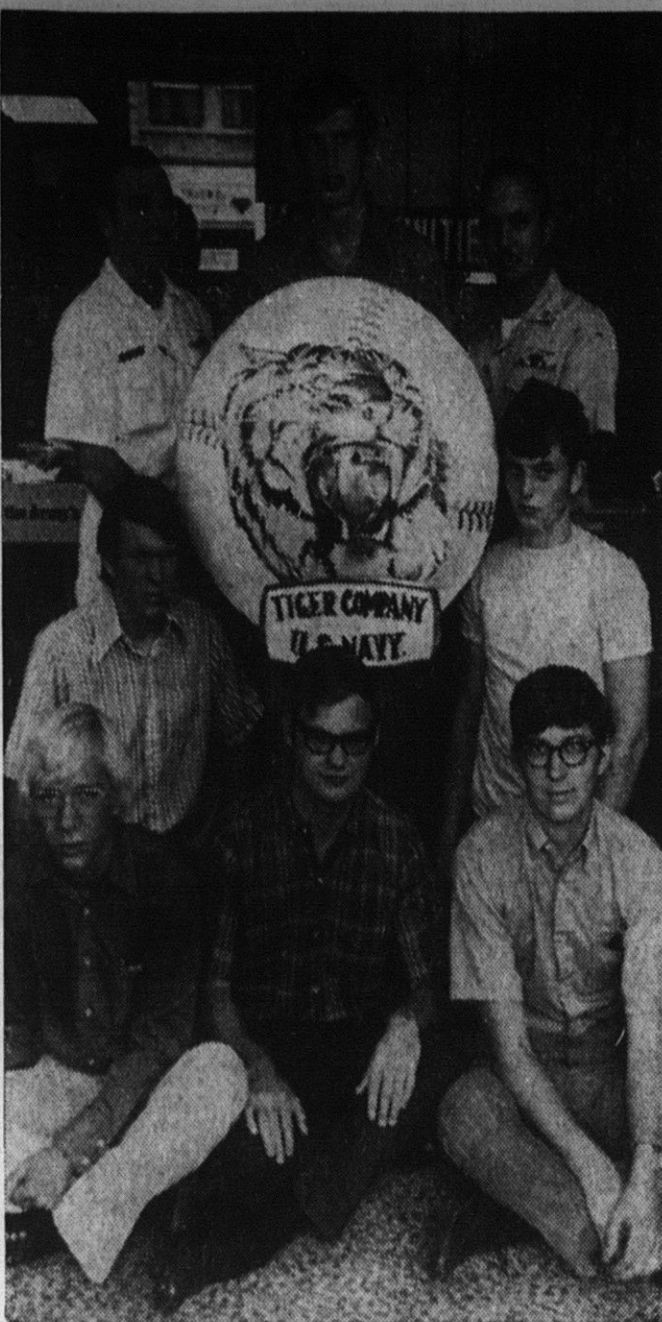

## Discovery of Old Bricks Revives Singapore Story

Some 134 years after the lashing westerly winds coming off Lake Michigan buried the town of Singapore, Michigan's lost city two miles northeast of Saugatuck, a few red bricks, discovered at the location of the Singapore bank, and a slag pile have brought thoughts of the buried city rushing to the minds of the curious. Singapore is the only known town of its kind in the state.

The sleeping town lies on the north side of the present government channel which carries the water of the Kalamazoo River into Lake Michigan and, in the days of the settlement, it was laid out in the horseshoe bend of the river and was about one-half mile wide. It covered three acres owned by New York and Michigan Co. with O. Shea Wilder, president and manager.

A map in the Allegan county courthouse showed the layout and plan of the town as approved by the trustees of the Singapore City Co. in 1838. The first settlement had been established four years earlier and the company promised to bring in settlers with the construction of large lumber mills.

The first mill was built in the spring of 1837; and barracks and houses were erected for mill hands, a company store was built and put into operation and the "boom" was on. The mill was the finest erected in the country and is said to have cost in the neighborhood of \$60,000 to build seven boilers were installed to produce steam for rotary engines which furnished power for \$25,000 worth of machinery delivered at the Singapore dock. It was big money for the times.

The Astor House, a 40x60-foot building three stories high, was also built in 1837 and was considered the finest hotel in the state. Early settlers came from miles around by ox cart, horse-drawn survey and covered buggy to visit the dining room which also served as the dance hall. H. H. (Doc) Stimpson was clerk.

Some of the bricks presently visible are from the pretentious bank built in 1833 by Wilder and Sons with Daniel Wilder as president and Robert Hill, cashier. Old-time Saugatuck citizens, "Uncle Stephen D. Nicholas and Ben Ager, were among the bank's directors. A good deal of money in the form of notes was issued to pay the mill laborers and was then taken in trade at the company store. Even at that, it was "wildcat" specie.

"The money was good enough at home, but you couldn't travel on it any farther than you could on a piece of birch bark," Nicholas quipped.

The law required in those days that each bank have a certain amount of specie on hand at all times as a reserve fund. As a result, the bankers of southwestern Michigan arranged to have the right amount of specie at that point in the territory where the bank examiner would stop first. When the specie had been counted at Battle Creek or Kalamazoo, a special messenger hurried on with the specie, either by horseback or canoe, to the next bank on the route.

After being counted at Allegan, the fund was sent to Singapore, a distance of 40 miles by the meandering Kalamazoo River and about 30 miles by land. The longer water route was much preferred to the shorter, but densely forested, land route.

A near disaster occurred once when an Indian messenger carrying the sack of gold to Singapore in a canoe round-

ed a bend in the river above the present location of Saugatuck, struck a submerged log and overturned, dropping the gold into the river. The Indian reported to the bank officials, who got word of the dilemma to New Richmond, eight miles up the river.

The New Richmond people cooperated by detaining the examiner with feasting and entertainment until a detachment of men searched the river and recovered the bag of gold with a pair of blacksmith tongs. (The tongs were on display for many years in the Village Hall.) When the examiner reached Singapore, the specie was ready in the bank.

The bank vault was built of pressed brick shipped from Boston and these are the bricks now visible in the sand.

In 1844, the New York and Michigan Co. sold its interest in Singapore to James G. Carter and in 1847 Carter sold out to F. B. Stockbridge and Artemus Carter, who overhauled the mill, replacing the rotary engines and long boilers with a steam pressure engine and boilers of greater capacity. The single upright saw was replaced by a gang saw; and, with plenty of timber in the area, a second sawmill was built by Robert Helmer about 100 feet from the old mill, which was operated by Stockbridge and Carter for two years until Stockbridge became sole owner in 1850.

In 1862, Tim Coates rented the large store from Stockbridge, making it one of the best stocked in the county, and he remained in business three years. Stockbridge eventually formed a partnership with O. R. Johnson in 1863, known as O. R. Johnson and Co., and purchased the entire town of Singapore.

In 1868, the large upper mill, the property of the Johnson interests was destroyed by fire and a new mill was erected on the site in 1869. Records show that this mill sawed more than 175 million feet of white in service in Singapore, lumber with a record of 60,000 feet in one day. With the decrease in timber, however, the mill was dismantled and moved

to St. Ignace.

Singapore in the "wildcat" days was one of the most flourishing lumber towns in the state. It boasted three large lumber mills, two hotels, several general stores and a bank that issued its own currency. In the '60's Singapore lots sold at a premium and its richly engraved currency circulated far and wide, gaining credit throughout the east and mid-west. But like other lumber towns, Singapore was doomed to an early and speedy decline. The pine forests, which once seemed inexhaustible and so dense that the Kalamazoo River was hidden, vanished in plain boards, shingles and sawdust and the mills moved.

The bank closed its doors, hotels and stores had to close for want of customers and the people gradually left the area, moving to the village of Saugatuck. Residents were gone by 1895 and the streets with their plank sidewalks were soon overgrown with shrubbery. Eventually, the shifting dunes moved by the wind and waves of Lake Michigan performed the last rites and Singapore, the great lumbering town, was gradually buried.

In 1945 David A. Bennett, a Chicago importer, purchased the old Singapore site and erected a house overlooking the dunes, and a few cottages have been built on the dunes, which now cover the once-busy streets of the town. The present owner of the house built by Bennett is Frank Denison of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., who bought the place from the estate of David C. Cook of Elgin, Ill., publisher of Sunday School materials.

Today the dunes are giving up part of their secret as a small group of wind-worn bricks, shipped from Boston and used to build a wildcat bank, are the visible evidence of the famous buried city at the mouth of the Kalamazoo River in Saugatuck township.

The first aerial bombs were used by the Austrian army in 1849, when small bombs attached to balloons were allowed to drift over Venice. Little damage was done.

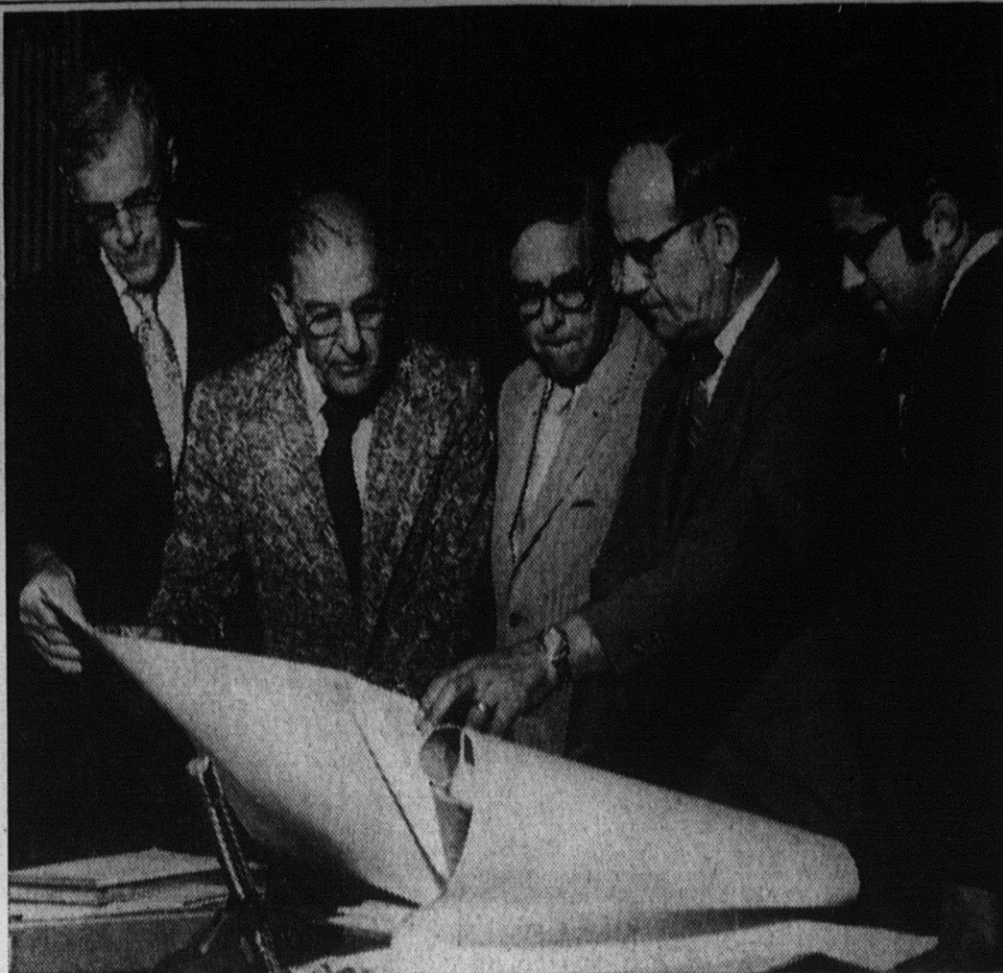

## Mortgage Loan Approved For New Housing Project

State Senator Gary Byker, R-Hudsonville, and State Representative James S. Farnsworth, R-Plainwell, announced today that the Holland-Zeeland Area Non-Profit Housing Corporation has received a mortgage loan of \$2,232,537 from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority to develop 118 units of housing in Holland.

The development, to be known as Meadow-Lanes, will be built on an 18.5 acre site fronting on Washington Ave. in the southwest section of Holland. It will consist of 21 buildings and a community center clustered along individual streets, giving the appearance of a single-family neighborhood. All units will have basements and individual carports.

Construction has begun and initial occupancy is expected in six months. An estimated 105 jobs will be created in construction of the development.

Meadow-Lanes will be for low and moderate income families—working people with children—who have been priced out of the conventional new and used housing market. Families with adjusted incomes of \$5,000 to \$15,000 annually are eligible to live in Authority-financed homes.

The mortgage principal, part of the interest and all operating, management and maintenance costs will be paid by the residents. The balance of the

interest will be paid through federal subsidies for housing development. There is no cost to the general fund of the state.

The Michigan State Housing Development Authority was established by the Legislature to help alleviate the critical housing shortage in Michigan with homes of quality design and construction. Financing is available through the sale, by the Authority, of revenue notes and bonds.

The Holland-Zeeland Area Non-Profit Housing Corporation, formed about three years ago, is made up mostly of civic-minded businessmen. Huger Burnham, vice president for marketing for DePree Chemical Co., Holland, is the corporation's president. The Corporation has previously purchased and rehabilitated five single-family homes for low income families.

Architect for Meadow-Lanes is Environmental Partnership, Kalamazoo, in association with Kammeraad - Stroop - Van der Leek, Holland. Attorneys for the development are Lokker, Boter, Dalman and Murphy, Holland, and the housing consultant is American Dwellings, Inc., Kalamazoo. The contractor is Lawrence Properties, Inc., Flint.

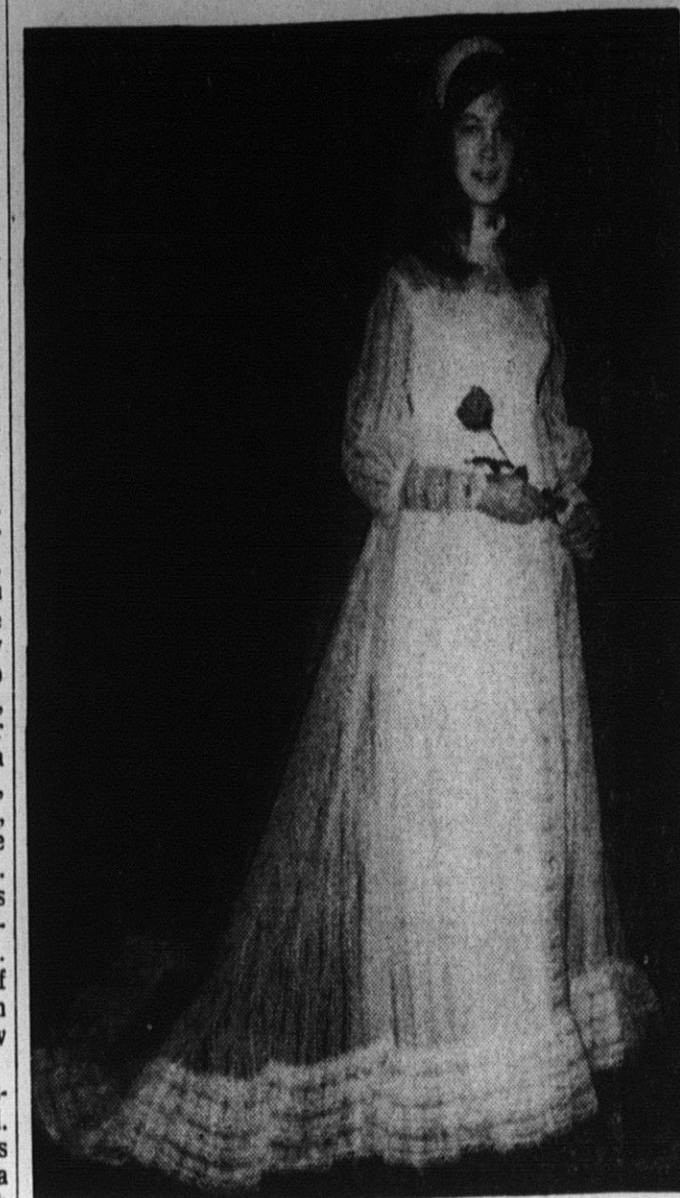

## Local Effort Needed To Preserve Lighthouse

Making the Holland Lighthouse a historic site has been attempted by many Macatawa area residents who do not want the lighthouse destroyed as was reported last year.

In a letter to Mrs. Mary Heuvelhorst of Macatawa, Ralph A. MacMullan, director of the Department of Natural Resources in Lansing, brings the matter up to date. He quotes from a letter sent to the Coast Guard March 15, 1971.

The letter follows: "During the past several months, the matter of the Holland Lighthouse has come up at a number of meetings concerning historic preservation. Research into the background of this Lighthouse leads to the conclusion that, historically, it is not one of the most significant in the more than 100 now existing along Michigan's shores, yet undoubtedly it has high local significance, and there is a substantial amount of interest locally in preserving it; both important considerations.

"It is assumed that the State could acquire this property from GSA for a very nominal sum, so an initial outlay of capital is not a problem; the restoration and continuing maintenance commitment is. One way it could be done would be

to integrate it into a State Park operation, but this is not feasible as it is located on a pier across the channel from the Holland State Park. The present restriction on additional State spending is also a factor that has to be considered.

"The Department position at this time is that the State cannot assume the financial burden of maintaining the Holland Lighthouse as a historic site. The Department is interested in working with local groups in helping to organize an effort to transfer it to some sort of local ownership which would provide supervision and maintenance; if such is possible under GSA regulations. As is true in most cases, the best defense against destruction is a strong local effort, particularly where the subject is one of primarily local significance.

"We have not heard from the Coast Guard since then nor have we had any word from the General Services Administration that this Lighthouse has been declared surplus. When we do have further word, we will be glad to get in touch with you. If you have further ideas on how we could assist in this matter, please contact us again."

The bride's sister, Miss Jayne

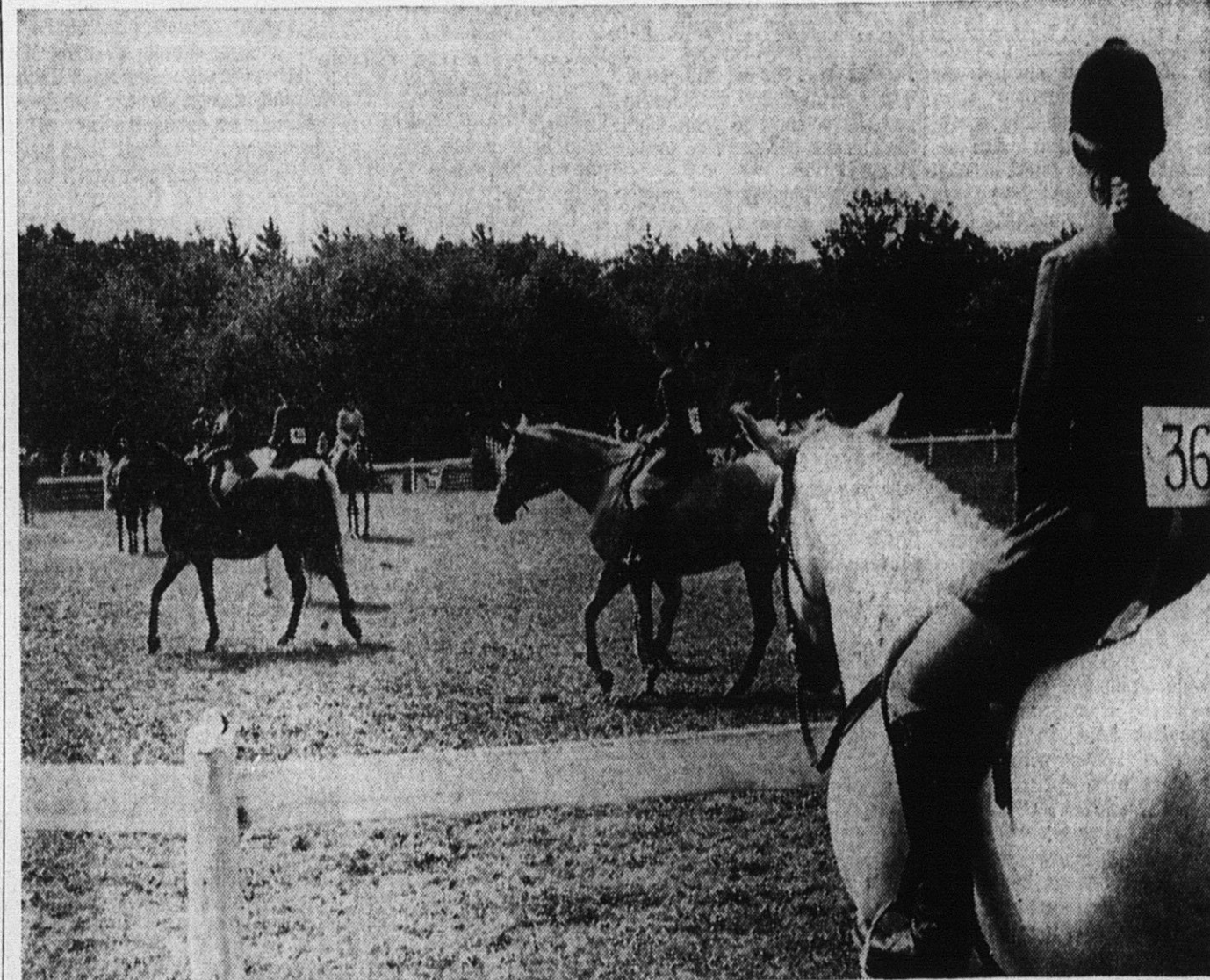
