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American Food Was "Biggest Change"

## Vietnamese Family Likes American Way of Life

Le - Thuan and Phan - Thi - Kim - Dung have a new home for their family after living at Fort Chaffee, Ark., for the past 3½ months.

Christ Memorial Reformed Church through Church World Service is sponsoring the Le Thuan family which arrived in Holland Tuesday evening from Fort Chaffee.

The Rev. Howard Schipper from Grand Rapids working with Church World Service went to Fort Chaffee to offer his assistance and the Le - Thuan family decided they were ready to come to Michigan.

The Rev. Donald Hoekstra, associate pastor of Christ Memorial, with a delegation from the church met the family at the Grand Rapids airport to bring them to their home at 15th St. and Maple Ave. on Tuesday night.

The Le - Thuan family consists of his wife, Phan - Thi - Kim - Dung and their children, Le - Thang, 10 years; Le - Thuc, eight years; Le - Thanh, six years; Le - Thuan, four years and Le - Dieu - My, two years. Their nephew Le Van also came to Holland with the family.

The family left Saigon, Vietnam, four months ago and they were among the first plane loads of refugees to leave the country. They were flown to Clark AFB where they stayed for nine days and then were flown to Guam where they stayed for one week. They were then taken to Fort Chaffee where they have been until they were notified 17 days ago that they were coming to Holland.

In Vietnam, Le - Thuan was a French teacher in Dalat. He left his family for one year and went to Nhatrang, which is a seashore resort town, to work with a U. S. Government agency in public information. He was then able to join his family again and stayed in Saigon for three weeks before coming to America.

He says he hopes to find another teaching job here in Holland in order "to share his French knowledge with students" but he is also looking for other work.

Le - Thuan, who speaks English fluently, when asked about American living said he liked the American way of life and said he will apply for American citizenship when he is eligible.

He remarked, "the trip and leaving Vietnam has had no real effect on the children and they really enjoy their new home and many new toys."

When asked about American food he said this was the "biggest change" but they are trying to adapt. They have no favorites as yet, but Kim is trying to cook the American food, but she adds Vietnamese food to the list at meal time to add a little flavor.

There are no other relatives in America, the whole family is still in Vietnam. Le - Thuan had contact with a French refugee, who left Saigon two weeks after the Communist take-over who had been in contact

with Le - Thuan's relatives. The reporter said the whole family was allowed to return to Dalat except for his brothers - in - law who had to stay in Saigon for an indefinite period for training.

In response to the question would they ever like to return to Vietnam, Le - Thuan said the answer was unknown due to the political situation, but he said he "very much" liked American life.

When at Fort Chaffee, Le - Thuan was in charge of a newspaper for the Vietnamese in the camp. He also worked in the relocation center and the Refugee Community Center.

Le - Dieu - My, the youngest, had a real birthday present as she came to her new home on her birthday.

Rev. Hoekstra, who has been helping the family, said the church has offered to help the family in many ways and this afternoon the family was to be introduced to shopping in Holland.

### 271 Engaged In CETA Work For Summer

The past summer Ottawa County CETA has operated a county wide work experience program for 271 young people demonstrating economic need.

The purpose of the program was to provide disadvantaged youths with opportunities to obtain valuable work experience which would otherwise be unavailable and to develop good work habits under proper supervision.

The program has assisted in the maintenance and beautification of local communities by supplying the necessary personnel without using additional local funds. CETA youths also functioned as staff for summer recreation programs and other publicly sponsored projects.

The participants, between the ages of 14 and 21, were funded under the Federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act known as CETA. To be program, a participant had to qualify by being in economic need, according to a Department of Labor criteria.

Eligible applicants were employed up to 40 hours per week between June 1 and Aug. 31 under the sponsorship of public and private non - profit organizations which were largely local units of government and school systems.

CETA Director Gary Scholten and Summer Program Coordinators Karen Craven and Melanis DeStigter expressed appreciation to cooperating organizations and individuals.

## Plainwell Fire Kills 20 Horses

PLAINWELL — A number of Quarter horses perished in a fire that swept a barn near Plainwell struck by lightning Thursday at 7:13 p.m.

The lightning was part of a storm system that moved into Southwest Lower Michigan dumping heavy rains.

Allegan County deputies said the 100 by 225 foot barn was owned by Ralph Burns and it was burned to the ground. Lost in the blaze were 20 Quarter horses. Deputies said the dollar value of the lost horses was not available.

## BPW Studies Financing Of Coal

The Holland Board of Public Works, finding itself with a surplus of coal for its electric power plant, decided Monday to table a recommendation to cancel two shipments of coal this season.

The surplus of coal resulted from uses of the oil-fired gas turbine generator this summer following an explosion that disabled one of the coal-fired boilers and the use of natural gas in the boilers.

Without the two shipments the BPW would have enough coal to last until next August and with the two shipments the supply would run into October.

The cancellation was recommended in light of the BPW's cash situation and two less shipments could save \$600,000 but the cost of coal next year was questioned.

It was decided to table the matter until low interest bonds could be explored as a means of paying for the shipments this season.

Meanwhile an 11,000-ton shipment of coal arrived at the city coal docks Monday night.

Expansion of the city's water treatment plant at Tunnel Park was 94 per cent completed, it was reported. The \$1.6 million expansion is designed to boost the capacity of the plant from the current 14 million gallons a day to 21 million gallons and is to be operational later this year.

## PALS Holds Corn Roast

The PALS big brother "corn roast" held recently was a huge success with volunteer big brothers and little brothers coming from many parts of Ottawa County to converge on the residence of big brother Chuck Bethke in Grand Haven.

The day's activities began with a nature scavenger hunt which was won by Rusty Burghorn, who was awarded a car model. A prize was also awarded to the loser.

Occasionally, participants in the PALS big brother program get together as a group but usually big brothers and little brothers get together on a one-to-one basis about once a week.

The two engage in activities of mutual interest which may range from fishing, tennis, woodworking, camping, developing hobbies or just having a quiet talk. The big brother is not expected to "entertain" his little brother but rather to develop a meaningful friendship with the boy.

Important characteristics potential big brothers should possess are openness, a genuine concern for the welfare of youth, a willingness to spend a little time once each week and to be at least 18 years of age.

## Tax Collections At 92 Per Cent

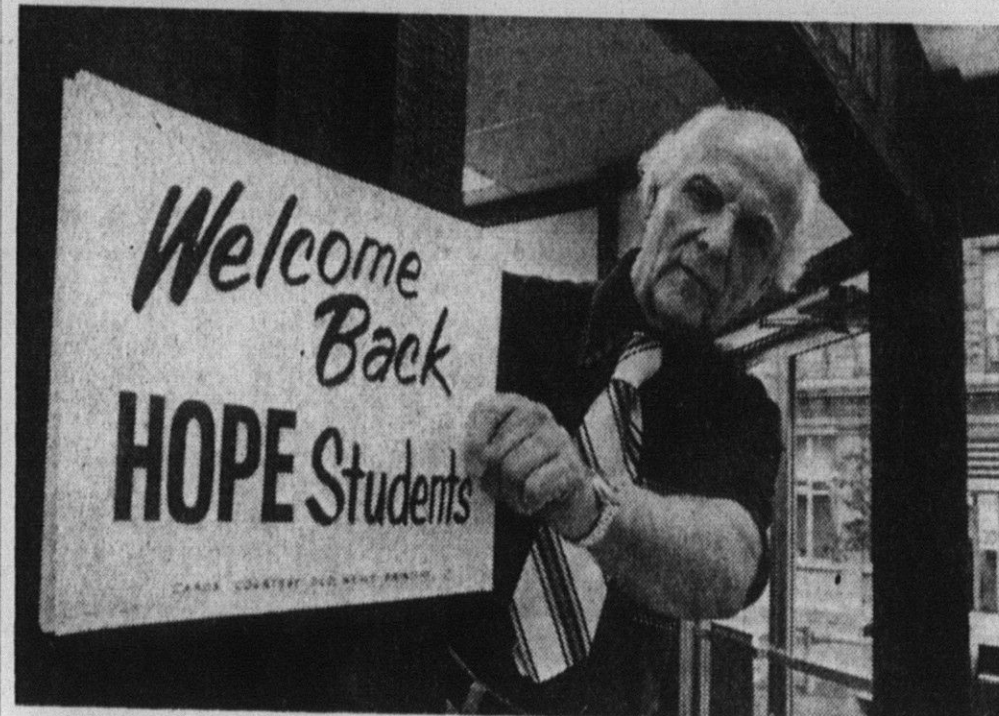
Summer tax collections through the deadline Aug. 13 amounted to \$6,938,132.19 or 92 per cent of the total levy of \$7,567,327.33, according to City Treasurer Jack Leenhouts in City Hall.

Through Sept. 10, a 2 per cent penalty is added. Thereafter it will be 6 per cent to Feb. 14.

Leenhouts said 265 senior citizens took advantage of the summer tax deferral, amounting to approximately \$100,000. Had this sum been paid, the tax collections would have been boosted to 93.5 per cent.

## Dutch Diplomat in Holland

Johannes Tjaardstra, the new consul - general for the Netherlands government in Chicago, paid his first official visit to Holland Friday, laying the groundwork for a visit here in November by the new Netherlands Ambassador, A. R. Tammenoms Bakker.

The new consul - general, who was transferred to Chicago after five years in Toronto, was greeted by Mayor Lou Hallacy in the mayor's office in City Hall. Then the consul - general and Willard C. Wichers of the Netherlands Consulate went to Grand Rapids to be received by Mayor Lyman Parkes, Vice - Consul John Steketee, President William Spoelhof of Calvin College and the Dutch Immigrant Society.

Grand Rapids, Detroit and Lansing are on the tour of Dutch Ambassadors in November.

Tjaardstra, who has had diplomatic posts in Japan, Africa, England, Scandinavia and several places in the United States and Canada, is particularly

interested in the Dutch settlements in America, and concentrations in the 14 - state area his office in Chicago covers. A former assignment in California put him in contact with such Dutch settlements in the Los Angeles area as Bellflower, Ripon, Artesia, and the like.

The consul - general's wife is of Swedish descent. They have three grown children living in Montreal, the Netherlands and London, and since Mrs. Tjaardstra's family lives in Sweden, there are many places to go on vacation. The couple usually spends a part of each summer in Friesland, the Netherlands.

## GVSC Anticipates 7,400 Enrollment

ALLEDALE — Grand Valley State Colleges officials, looking toward an anticipated enrollment of 7,400 students this fall, said tuition will not be raised but indicated increases might be necessary later if the financial situation becomes critical. GVSC said there will be a continual budgetary review during the academic year and there will be a temporary hold on academic positions pending review of finances.

The current appropriation level fell \$198,000 short of the bill originally passed by the House. All planning will be contingent on Gov. William

## Special Ed Millage Is Decreased

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa Area Intermediate Board of Education lowered the 1975-76 millage levy for special education from 1.4 mills to 1.1 mills at its monthly meeting Thursday night.

This is equivalent to a 21 per cent decrease in taxes for special education programs, marking the third time in four years less than the authorized 1.4 mills was levied.

The levy for general education purposes for 1975-76 remains at .13 mill, and the levy for debt retirement was set at .05 mill.

Preliminary approval was placed on the 1975-76 special education budget calling for expenditure of \$1,847,371.

The budget hearing for general and special education funds was set 8 p.m. Sept. 18, at the intermediate offices in Grand Haven.

The resignation of Mrs. Geneva Reid of Jenison as curriculum resource consultant was accepted with regret.

The administration was authorized to arrange with the Allegan Intermediate District for services of a curriculum resource consultant and to hire an aide for the Special Education Learning Materials Center (SELMC) who would work under the curriculum resource consultant director.

A report on negotiations with the Ottawa Area Center teachers was given.

A resolution was adopted supporting the equalization of transportation costs for districts sending students to the proposed Vocational Area Center. The resolution also asked that a plan be devised to carry out the intent, if the millage issue passes.

A new slide-representation on the upcoming Skills Center election was shown to the board.

Opening day for teachers at the Ottawa Area Center is set Tuesday, Sept. 2, and the first day for students Wednesday, Sept. 3.

A separate fund was established to handle funds from business, industry and individuals to promote the Area Vocational Center.

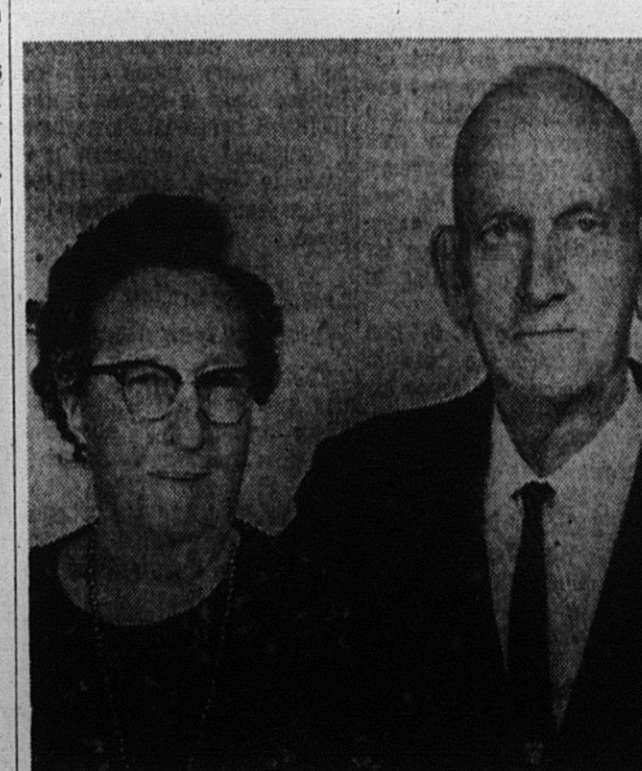

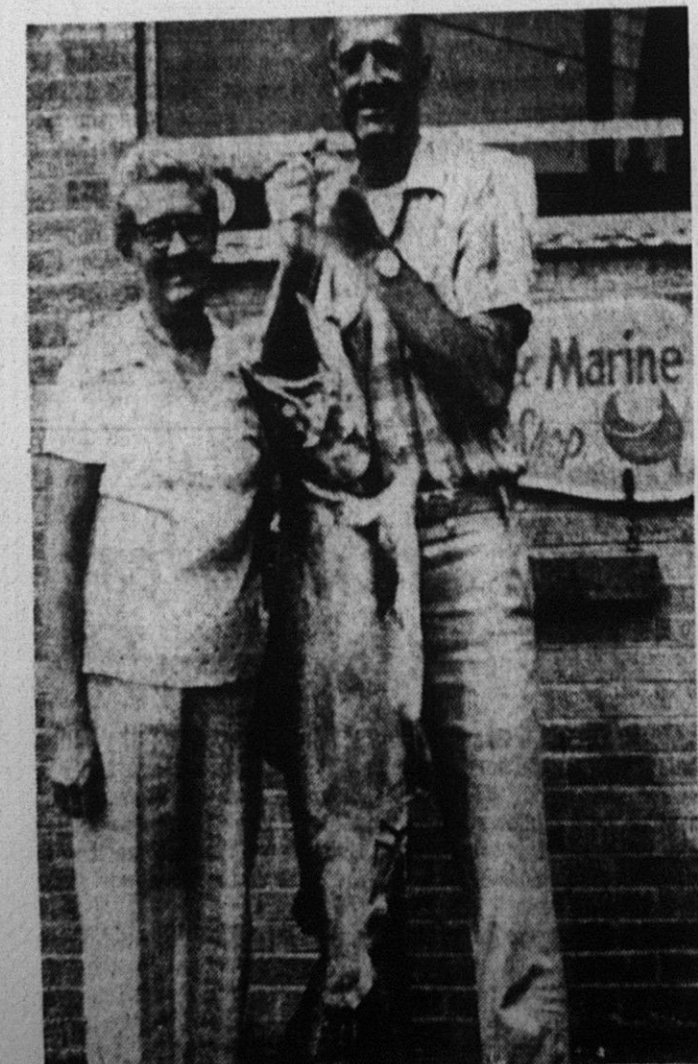

# Warning: Raising Bees Is Exciting, Addictive Hobby

Warning: raising bees can be addictive, enter into hobby at your own risk.

Jim Williams and G. L. (Red) Farabee are addicted beekeepers. For them, bee raising is an intriguing and enjoyable hobby, but it is also a hobby that involves a lot of knowledge and work.

The men have studied the history, habits, and characteristics of the bee and every trip out to the hive to check on the bees is exciting.

Williams will readily admit to the addictiveness of the bees. He started raising bees five years ago and now has 14 hives with thousands of bees per hive. "The hives started as a hobby, now it's lots of work," he said.

Williams finds the bees "fascinating" to watch and learn about. Like other beekeepers he has a healthy respect for them too. When he checks his hives he wears gloves, a bee veil, and two shirts.

Once he was stung around the head 12 or 15 times and his "eyes looked like goggles."

But these men talk of a bee sting like others speak of a mosquito bite, they are calm and have none of the "normal" fear.

Bee raising still isn't a family project at the Williams house. Mrs. Williams is afraid of the bees, and she keeps her distance. She has never yet been stung and confesses that she avoids the backyard.

Although she does not join Williams in his hobby she doesn't discourage him either and reports that since the bees need flowers in order to make honey the Williams "have to let the dandelions grow in their yard for the bees."

Farabee is more involved in the history and techniques of raising bees. He has lived in Holland for 20 years and in addition to the bees has a large garden and orchard.

Although he loves to fuss with the bees and checks them often,

he quickly admits that you "can't improve on these bees." As the intriguing customs and habits of the bees were explained to me, I had to agree.

One of the initial attractions to bee keeping is that there is little investment after the first one.

A three pound package of bees shipped in from Georgia or Mississippi costs about \$22. (Three years ago the same amount came for \$11.) A queen bee, the most important member of the hive, costs about \$5.

Every member of the hive has a role to play in its functioning. The queen bee is called on to lay all the eggs and a good one lays 1,000 to 2,000 eggs per day. The shape of the cells in the honeycomb and the type of food they are given determines what type of bees they will be. To hatch a queen the bees feed a regular worker egg "royal jelly."

The females are the workers and "every bee is busy." They feed the eggs, bringing in water, nectar, and pollen from the fields, and guard the hive from strange bees. A worker bee literally works herself to death in six to seven weeks.

The male bee, the drones, have only one function in the hive, that of mating with the queen. Outside of this the drones only take up space and food in the hive.

Beekeepers raise Italian or European bees for honey. The bees have a "mild temper" although Williams warns there is "no such thing as a tame bee."

There are 5,000 to 15,000 bees in each hive. The bees swarm about the first of June and honey is usually gathered in July and in the fall.

The flavor of the honey is determined by the kind of flowers from which the bees have gathered nectar and the different pollens used also give the honey a unique color, according to Farabee.

The bees fly up to two miles

away, (a four mile radius) to collect their pollen. They always come back to the same place. If the box has been turned around they will bang against the spot the opening was before and it takes them quite a while to find the opening back. If the hive is moved back and forth they can find it. If it is moved to either side they can't find it back.

The bees also control the temperature of their hive. In the winter they knot together in the center of the hive and by eating honey and moving around they can keep the hive at 90 degrees.

The most formidable enemy of the bees is moisture and if the bees get wet they can't keep warm. Many beekeepers lose about half of their bees in the winter.

In the summer the bees fan and "air condition" their hive so the cones won't melt.

Each hive has its own scent so the bees can't rob honey from each other. If an "outsider" tries to get into the hive the guard bees fight to keep him out.

Although neither of the men seem at all anxious about being stung by the bees, they both occasionally use a smoker when they check their hives. The smoker makes the bees go into the hive and eat honey and then they aren't as likely to sting. Bees are attracted to water and are "meaner" when it is stormy or wet.

The bee business has its own unique set of problems and disease can mean disaster for a business. The hives are checked yearly by a state bee inspector and if a contagious disease is found he will burn the hive and kill all the bees in it.

Even though the bees are interesting to learn and study about, most people still show more interest in their product.

The honey is gathered by taking the supers, square shaped boxes in which the honey combs are made, off the hives. The men then use an extractor which whirls the honey out of the comb. After one straining it is put in jars and ready for consumption.

Honey is a link between ancient times and the modern world. It was used as a sacrifice to the gods and has been found in the tombs of Egyptian kings.

Marriage contracts in Egypt required the bridegroom to promise to supply his bride every year of their life together with a certain amount of honey.

The Greeks thought honey prolonged youth and life and some people still highly praise the healing powers of honey.

Although people do not all agree on the mental and physical effects of eating honey, they will agree that for a natural, sweet taste it is tops.

Even if you are immune to the excitement and adventure of raising bees, beware, they have more to offer. The honey they produce is guaranteed to be addictive.

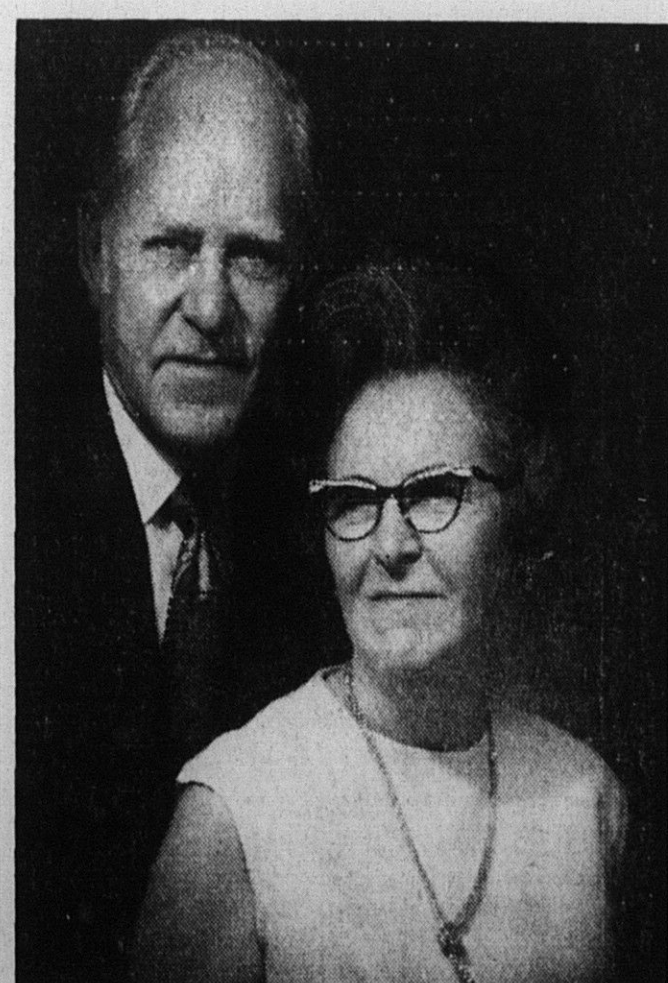

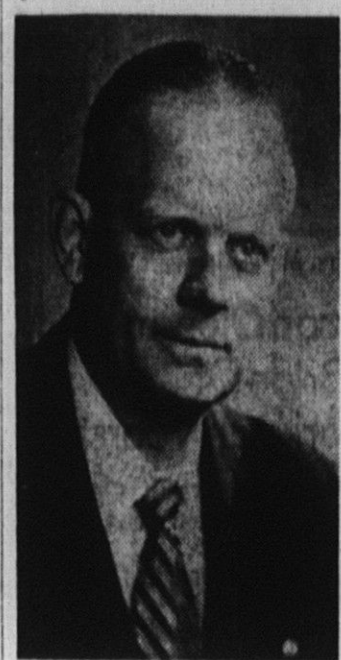

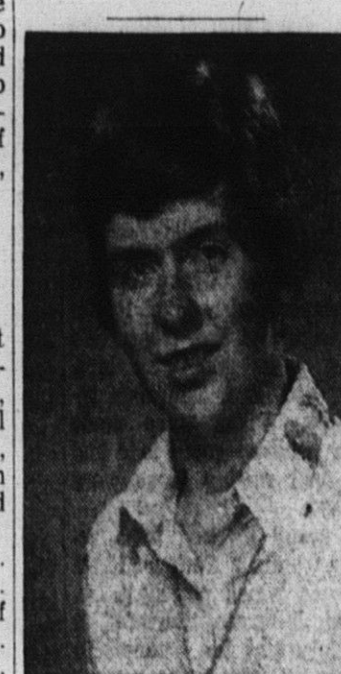

## Holland Student Participates In Saugatuck Dig

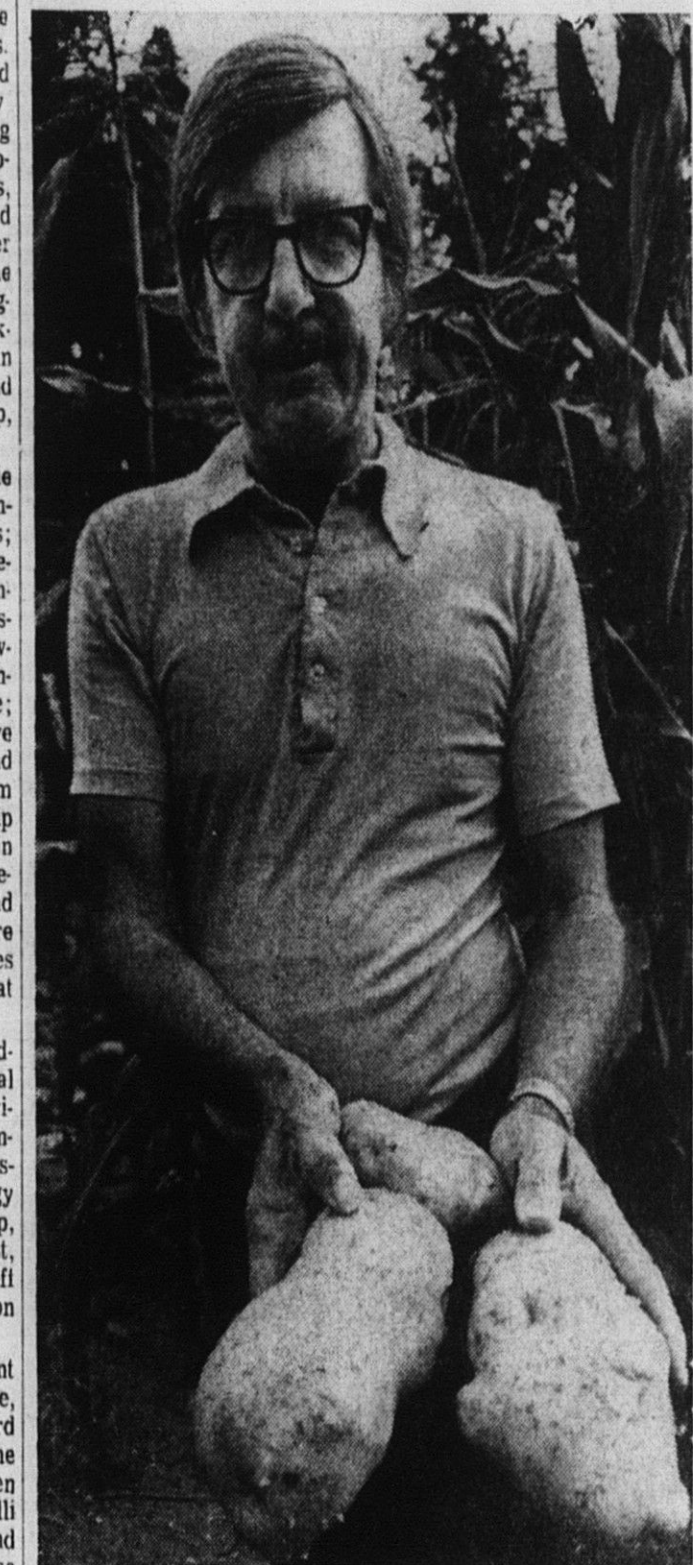
The students uncovered bits of pottery, fragments of stone tools and remains of animal bones and further results will require carbon-dating to evaluate the materials.

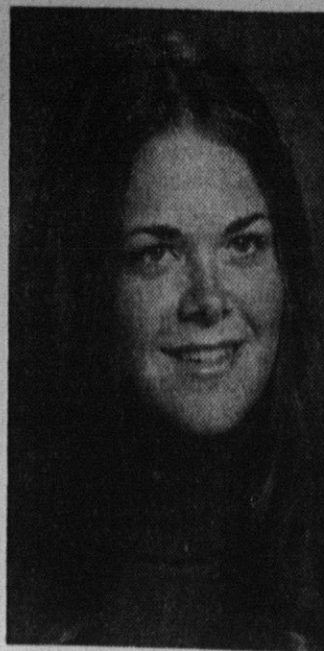

## Sunday School Lesson

Accepting the Challenge to Grow  
II Timothy 1:6-10; II Timothy 2: 6-10

By C. P. Dame

Every Christian is expected to grow spiritually. If there is a desire, the possibility is offered him. God expects his children to grow and has made ample provisions. Acceptance of the challenge results in continuous growth.

I. Being stirred up now and then benefits. In studying the lesson note the two men involved. Paul was in prison facing death. Timothy was a young preacher who needed encouragement. Paul was eager to make him grow. Christians can spur each other on to grow. In the first part of the chapter, Paul reminds Timothy of his early home training from his grandmother and his mother. He had a fine heritage. In addition, he had been ordained to preach the gospel. Paul spurred him on to rekindle the fire of faith. God had not given him fear to restrain him or weaken his ministry but the spirit of power, love and self-control. God offered supplies.

Of course Timothy would not be ashamed of the gospel, nor of him his teacher. He would reveal his loyalty to the gospel and to Paul by his willingness to endure suffering for the sake of both his gospel and teacher. The opposition facing the gospel called for affliction.

II. The blessed must bless. Paul reminded Timothy of his blessings. He had, as Paul, received salvation. In addition he had been called to preach the gospel, like Paul. Both of these privileges had been given to them not because of their merit but because of God's grace revealed supremely in Jesus Christ, who by his sacrificial death had abolished death and made real life possible. It's good to be reminded of our blessings given so that we might bless others.

III. Christian living involves discipline. We, used to ease, need to be reminded of this. Paul told Timothy to convey to others what he had received. Every Christian is duty-bound to pass the faith on to the next generation.

Paul knew his world. He wrote about being a good soldier. A soldier is always a soldier, ever ready to make sacrifices. A Christian should be like that. Paul also refers to an athlete who keeps on training in order to remain fit. A farmer works and waits expecting a harvest. The soldier and the athlete and the farmer are all conscious of their calling and give themselves to their work. Christians have a cause worthy of all they have.
